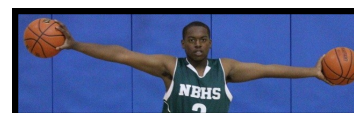

Ice Hockey

Ice Hockey is a contact, physical, and team sport. Six players from each team are allowed on the ice at a time. This includes a goalie, two defenders and three forwards. The object of the game is to move down the ice and score a goal with the puck. A pro hockey game is divided into three equal periods of twenty minutes each. On face-offs, the puck is set in the middle of the center line. Ice Hockey does have rules (even though it may seem like it doesn't).

Ice hockey started in Egypt with sticks and a ball. It wasn't until 1272 B.C. in Ireland, that it was played with a puck on frozen lakes and ponds. In 600 B.C., in Ancient Greece, the L-Shaped horn stick was created. In the nineteenth Century, the National Hockey League (NHL) and International Ice Hockey Federation (IIHF) were formed. The rules in the two Ice Hockey federations are slightly different. The rules that are the same are:

- Offsides - when a player is past the offensive sidelines before the puck crosses the line
- Icing - when the puck is shot from one side to the other and is not touched by your team or opposing goalie,
- Changing players in and out - There are four different types of penalties.
- Minor Penalties require the player to leave the ice for two to four minutes.
- Major Penalties are given when players fight on the ice.
- Penalty Shots are given when the opposing team uses illegal contact.
- Misconduct penalties are given when a player is overly aggressive toward the opposing team or attacks the referees verbally or physically.

Each player wears a helmet, mouth guard, neck guard, shoulders pads, elbow pads, gloves, hockey pants, jock, garter belt, shin pads, socks, skates and carries a hockey stick. You'll need to have a high pain tolerance and accept risking head and eye injuries if you want to play. Having great balance is also required. A great place to watch the games is on NHL or in person when you have the opportunity.

Creedence Clearwater Revival

Creedence Clearwater Revival (CCR) is a classic rock band that became famous in the late 1960's and the early 1970's. They had a number of singles pulled from multiple albums that made it to the top of the charts. They were inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1993. They combined country rock and swamp rock genres. The band consisted of John Fogerty (vocals, guitar) his brother Tom (rhythm guitar), Stu Cook (bass) and Doug Clifford (drums).

- What gave John Fogerty the inspiration to write music? While growing up, John listened to a lot of music about the South and songs by the southerners. His mother introduced him to Stephen Foster's songs about the South (e.g. Swanee River) when he was young. He said downtown El Cerrito was a pretty boring place to him so he made up a mystical Southern imagery in his head.
- What did the group do before becoming CCR? They were an amateur rock band. They formed in high school in 1959, then played as Tommy Fogerty & The Blue Velvets (1959-1964) and The Golliwogs (1964-1967) enjoying minor success in the San Francisco bay area. The quartet turned professional in December 1967 and changed their name to Creedence Clearwater Revival.
- Where did the band's name come from? Tom Fogerty had a friend at work that had a friend whose name was Creedence Nuball. John Fogerty took the "Clearwater" part from an advertisement. "Revival" referred to the band's rebirth or revival.



- Did CCR perform at Woodstock? Yes, but their performance did not appear in either the film or the original album "Woodstock" due primarily to John Fogerty's veto. He felt that CCR's performance, was not good enough to be forever documented on film.
- Why did CCR disband? They disbanded due to difference in artistic direction and management. CCR was a band dominated by their front man, John. On their six first albums he did all the vocals and played lead guitar. He also wrote all of their songs, arranged and produced each cut, and managed the band.

I hope you have enjoyed this review and enjoy CCR's music! I look forward to sharing more information with you about music in the future.

How Fast Does Your Money Grow

Would you like your savings to double?

- The rule of 72 is a quick way to calculate:
 - How long it takes to double your money if you earn a given rate of interest
 - The rate of interest you need to earn if you have a certain number of years to double your money.
- Here is how it works: Divide the interest rate your savings will earn, or the number of years you have to save, into the number 72
- How long will it take? If interest is compounded at a rate of 7% per year, your money will double in 10.3 years (72/7); if the rate is 6%, it would take 12 years (72/6). If college tuition costs are rising 8% per year, the costs of college education would double in just over 9 years (72/8).
- What rate do you need to earn? If you need \$4,000 for a car in 3 years and you have \$2,000 to invest now, you need to find an investment that will earn you 24% (72/3), which is not a realistic goal in today's market. If you have 8 years until you need the car, the investment would need to earn 9% (72/8), which is more realistic but will mean accepting some risk in the stock market. You could lower the interest rate you need to earn by saving more money each month.

Art Class

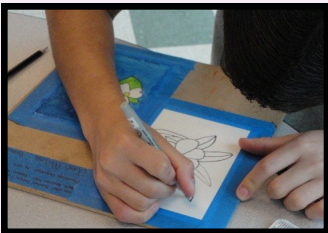

Science and the Metric System

Scientists all over the world use the metric system. There's a very good reason for this - it's so everyone is doing the measuring the same way all over the world. Most countries already use the metric system for measuring everything.

Another good reason to use metric is that you don't have so much to remember - no 12 inches in a foot or 5,280 feet in a mile. It's all decimals! The larger or smaller units go up or down by 10, 100, or 1,000.

- Meter is for length. A meter is a little longer than a yard. For long distances, there is the kilometer (a thousand meters). For small things, there is the centimeter (100 centimeters in a meter).
- Liter is for volume. A liter is a little larger than a quart. There are a thousand milliliters in a liter.
- Gram is for mass. A gram is a little more than the mass of a paper clip. For heavier things, there is the kilogram (a thousand grams).
- Temperatures are in degrees Celsius (also called centigrade). Water freezes at 0 degrees Celsius and boils at 100 degrees Celsius. Now that's easy!

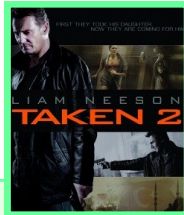

Earning a GED

Public Education grades K-12 culminates (ends) with a student receiving a high school diploma. March's newsletter covered the specific requirements by the state of Oregon for the class of 2013 and 2014. For a small percentage of students, other options exist. They are:

- Certificate of Completion - issued to students who experience significant medical related absences or learning disabilities (it is NOT considered a high school diploma)
- Modified Diploma - issued to students who require learning standards to be modified (it is NOT considered a high school diploma)
- General Education Development (GED) - issued to students who are credit deficient and cannot earn a regular high school diploma (a GED is NOT considered a high school diploma)

WHY should I get a GED:

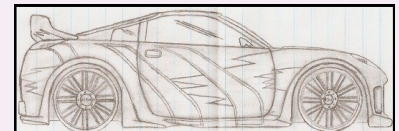
- You will turn 21 before receiving your high school diploma
- MDT determines it's your best option
- Earning it allows for your next step in community placement

HOW do I get my GED:

- GED placement is an outcome from a MDT meeting
- Your Treatment Manager, QMHP, PO and Principal must ALL agree that a change of placement (from diploma track (path) to GED track) is best for you
- MAPS score requirements are 220 in Reading, 220 in Writing and 230 in Math

WHEN placed on the GED track:

- Weekly assignments will be given by the GED coordinator
- Pre-tests will monitor progress and prepare you for the GED test
- The GED test will be scheduled when success has been demonstrated on the preparatory work

Jewish American Heritage Month

Jewish American Heritage Month is an annual celebration for Jewish Americans and their achievements and contributions to the United States. It is celebrated in the U.S. during the month of May. Passover is a Jewish Holiday and an eight day festival that commemorates the emancipation of the Israelites from slavery in ancient Egypt. **Tzimmes** is a traditional stew for Passover and is made from a combination of sweet potatoes and dried fruit. Here's the recipe for Tzimmes:

Ingredients:

- 9 medium carrots (about 1 pound) peeled
- 4 sweet potatoes (about 2 pounds)
- 1 cup bite-sized prunes (about 6 ounces)
- 1 cup dried apricots (about 5 ounces)
- 2 tablespoons of fresh lemon juice
- 1/3 cup of fresh orange juice
- 1/4 cup honey
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 2 1/2 teaspoons orange zest (from orange peel)
- 1/4 teaspoon salt



Directions:

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Cut carrots into 2-inch pieces. Bring a large saucepan to boil, and lower heat to medium. Add sweet potatoes in their skins and cook for 20 minutes, adding the carrots after 10 minutes. Drain into a colander and set aside until cool enough to handle.

Peel sweet potatoes into 1-inch chunks, place in a large bowl along with carrots and remaining ingredients, mix well and transfer to a 2-quart baking dish.

Cover with foil, and bake for 30 minutes, basting with pan juices after 15 minutes. Remove from oven and serve immediately.
