1. Opening of Meeting

The meeting was called to order by Board President Belk at 7:01 p.m. Board President Belk read the opening statement and Trustee roll call was taken. Trustee Smith-Thomas and Trustee Denson both have excused absences. Technical support is being handled by M1 Studios. We all stood for the Pledge of Allegiance.

2. Board Matters

- Trustee Johnson reported out on the Sustainability Committee outing. The reason for the outing was to experience firsthand some of the activities and initiatives the Sustainability Committee is engaging in within the district. They began their day at the bus yard where they met with the First Student team. The First Student team spoke about their experiences with the traditional school buses verses the electric school buses. The Sustainability Team rode on one of our brand new electric buses over to Kennedy Learning Center (KLC). It was a smooth and quiet ride. Some of the benefits of the electric buses: our students and drivers are not breathing in the diesel exhaust fumes, which in turn is better air quality and the smooth quiet ride would help cut down on the loud chatter over the traditional school buses. In addition to the health and environmental benefits, they discussed the operational and financial benefits. The electric buses could save the district approximately \$6,000 - \$8,000 per year in fuel and maintenance costs. The electric buses can have a full charge in an hour and a half. We have ten electric buses currently with ten more coming in July. When the Sustainability Committee arrived at KLC, they were welcomed by Dr. George. The recycling program has more than 50% student participation. Students have learned what materials can and cannot be recycled, sort the materials for the specific bins, help with transporting material to the larger receptacles. Dr. George, staff members, and the students are doing a great job with recycling.
- Secretary Ware-DeVauil reported out on Governance Relations Committee through Oakland County Schools Board Association (OCSBA). Currently, they have been talking about legislation and how it is affecting our district as far as the money afforded to the district. Secretary Ware-DeVauil will speak about cell phones and what that would look like next year, as this bill develops.

- President Belk states that the district will be enforcing the student code of conduct. She is asking parents to speak to their children.
- President Belk indicated that the Board will be revoking privileges such as, attendance to the prom and graduation for poor behavior.
- Parents talk to your students about bringing water guns and having any water activities on the school campuses, as this is not tolerated.

b. Report 64-78 Firewall Replacement E-Rate: 2020 Building and Site Fund

- The district firewall has reached the end of its life and is scheduled for replacement. A firewall acts as a digital security guard, monitoring and filtering incoming and outgoing network traffic based on predefined security rules. It protects systems by blocking malicious traffic, preventing unauthorized access, and managing network resources. This is an essential piece of the district's network security.
- Oakland Schools issued a Request for Proposals for Firewall hardware, software, and installation services through the Federal government E-Rate program on behalf of the 15 supported districts and Oakland Schools. The Oakland Schools Security Team reviewed the existing solutions and researched the current market. The new specification took into account the district's current needs and growth capacity to accommodate the next five to seven years. As part of the IGA with Oakland Schools, the OS security team manages each district's firewall through a centralized management system.
- Utilizing the Federal E-Rate program, the district is eligible for partial reimbursement on the new hardware. The anticipated reimbursement is approximately \$23,000 based on eligible items.
- Under E-Rate program rules, some of the software is not eligible for reimbursement. Oakland Schools will purchase this software and invoice the district a one-time cost of \$11,436.07. This will cover the software and maintenance for 5 years.
- Attached is the Oakland Schools board meeting minutes and solicitation summary that was approved at the March 24, 2026, Board of Education meeting.
- \$67,593.00 with approximately \$23,000 reimbursement from E-Rate. This covers the next 5 years for firewall hardware.
- Trustee Johnson introduced a motion to open and approve Report 64-78 Firewall Replacement E-Rate and it was supported by Trustee Holloway.
- This report is in regard to the firewall system we have in the district to safeguard against cyber-attacks throughout our district's network for the next five years of our infrastructure.
- The e-rate program is a federal program that affords us an opportunity to receive up to 80% reimbursement for certain technological advancements in our district. We apply to the federal government to receive an 80% reimbursement on these upgrades.

c. Report 64-79 BP #48 University K12 Addition and Renovation: Bond Funds

- The Trustees moved down to Report 64-80 BP #63 Birney K-8 Playground.
- Formal bids were received for BP #48 UK12 Addition and Renovation. The project scope includes a new gymnasium, cafeteria, natatorium, classroom, and administrative spaces as well as rework of

existing campus parking, drives, and athletic fields. Renovations to the existing auditorium and associated fine arts classrooms are included as well.

- The total contract award amount for BP #48 UK12 Additions and Renovations is \$87,343,168.54. BP #48's 10% contingency of the project's total value is \$8,734,316.85 bringing the total to \$96,077,485.39. This project is bond funded.
- Trustee Johnson introduced a motion to open and approve Report 64-79 BP #48 University K12 Addition and Renovation and it was supported by President Belk.
- Report 64-79 BP #48 University K12 Addition and Renovation comes in \$1 million dollars under budget.

d. Report 64-82 Building Envelope Commissioning Award Recommendation: Bond Funds

- In February 2026, PMR requested a proposal from Soil and Materials Engineers (SME) for independent Building Enclosure Design review and commissioning to satisfy the Envelope Performance Verification requirements in the newly adopted 2021 Michigan Commercial Energy Code (MCEC 2021) for the new University K-12 addition and renovation of the performing arts wing. A lump sum fee for the proposed services was negotiated. The project team recommends a total recommendation of \$117,810.00, which includes 10% contingency based on SME's lump sum fee of \$107,100.00, and will be funded out of the 2022 Bond proceeds. The reimbursables are included in the lump sum amount.
- Trustee Johnson introduced a motion to open and approve Report 64-82 Building Envelope Commissioning Award Recommendation and it was supported by Trustee Anderson.
- This is quality control to ensure that the foundation of the building is solid. This is ensuring the checks and balances with the contractors hired to do the work. This is for UK12 – the new build.

e. Report 64-83 Environmental Consultant Services — Arch Environmental Group, Inc. Amendment #4: Bond Funds

- The amendment adds Asbestos Project Coordination and Air Monitoring Environmental Consulting Services at University K-12 Academy and Thompson K-8 Academy. The project team recommends a total recommendation of \$163,900, which includes 10% contingency based on Arch's fixed fee of \$149,000 and will be funded out of the 2022 Bond proceeds. A breakdown of total authorized compensation is previously authorized compensation \$365,300 + \$149,000 (asbestos project coordination and air monitoring at UK12 and Thompson K-8) = \$514,300.
- Trustee Johnson introduced a motion to open and approve Report 64-83 Environmental Consultant Services — Arch Environmental Group, Inc. Amendment #4 and it was supported by Secretary Ware-DeVauil.
- This company handles the abatement work and monitor the air quality throughout the district.

- As we continue to move throughout the district with each additional projects we amend the prior contract to ensure that they are doing the work. We do not give them blanket contracts for all of the bond work. We put out specific bid packs as we go throughout the process and identify areas that need addressing.
- The prework for the abatement is important to ensure that we keep those surprises to a minimum.
- This report is for UK12 and Thompson K-8.
- O House has been abated.
- At the end of the summer, we will have five buildings complete.
- No one will be able to go on the University property for three years once it becomes an active construction site, without the approval of the construction team.

6. Information Items

a. Report 64-87 BP #46 Kennedy Learning Center (KLC) Boiler Replacement: Bond Funds

- On April 14th, 2026, formal bid proposals were received and read publicly concerning BP 46 Kennedy Boiler Replacement. The collective Bond Team (BMB, French, PMR, and SPS) has reviewed the proposals. The attached bid tabulation lists all of the bid proposals received. After a review of all bid proposals, post bid reviews were conducted to verify the proposals were inclusive of the scope of work and schedule. Based upon the evaluation of the project team, we present the following company for consideration by the administration and the Board of Education: The initial low bidder, A.J. Miller Mechanical, Inc., did not provide a complete bid per the bidding documents. The second low bidder, Delta Temp Services, Inc., provided a complete bid per the bidding documents and is the recommended bidder. Alternate M1 was accepted and incorporated into the project and are identified in the bid tabulation. The project scope includes the installation of the pre-purchased boilers and associated pumps at Kennedy Learning Center. The total cost of the project plus the contingency is \$357,720.00.
- The scholars will be moved to other places around the building to assure that we can get the work done.
- Report 64-87 BP #46 Kennedy Learning Center (KLC) Boiler Replacement was tabled.

b. Report 64-88 DTE Method of Permanent Electrical Service – UK12 Campus Construction: 2022 Bond Funds

- Our current circuit feed is inadequate for our new University campus. Some of our current equipment will be fused to new equipment giving us adequate electricity to run our new campus. To perform the work necessary to accommodate this feed we will install a new 300 VAR capacitor, replace 1 pole with a 50' class 2 pole, install 2 tangent fiberglass crossarms, install 2 dead end fiberglass crossarms, install 2 sets of 600 amp disconnect switches.
- The cost of the system work is \$107,787 and will include an additional \$1500 primary service connection fee. Total cost of the job is \$109,287.
- Report 64-88 DTE Method of Permanent Electrical Service – UK12 Campus Construction was tabled.
