1. Opening of Meeting

- Secretary Ware-DeVaul spoke to things discussed at the Government Relations Committee (GRC). Our school budget should be approved by the end of June and it has not been approved at the end of June in the last couple of years. School districts are making budget decisions without a timely budget. The school aide fund for students should be protected. There is a group that is working to get the 40% IDEA funding for school districts. GRC meetings will reconvene in September.

f. Report 64-93 High School Credit Recovery Summer School – Educere: 31A Grant

- The Administration recommends approval of a contract with Educere to provide an online High School Credit Recovery Summer School program for Southfield Public Schools students. Educere is a Michigan-approved online learning provider offering a comprehensive, standards-aligned credit recovery platform designed to serve students who have failed one or more courses required for high school graduation. The program will be administered by district staff and online teachers available to eligible high school students during the summer. This initiative directly supports the district's commitment to ensuring every student has a pathway to on-time graduation and postsecondary readiness. The impact amount is \$78,000.00 from the 31A Grant.

j. Report 64-100 Food Service Contract: Food Service Funds

- The scope of work for this contract includes providing all food, labor, and supervision for all district food service programs including the National Schools Meals Program, Summer Meals Program and the Child and Adult Care Food Program. An evaluation committee including the CFO, the accounts payable specialist, and the purchasing specialist evaluated proposals. The committee ranked the proposals based on numerous evaluation factors including manager candidate, food service company support and backup, marketing and merchandising, plan of operation, nutrition education, employee training and development, integrity of the proposed budget, and plan to increase participation. Based on this evaluation the unanimous selection of the food service committee was SFE. This contract shall be for a period of twelve months effective on July 1, 2026 and ending June 30, 2027 for an estimated \$2,819,412. This amount includes the cost of all food, supplies, food service and noon aide labor and fringe benefits, a \$38,251 management fee and a \$86,386 administrative fee. This is a one-year contract renewable for two additional one-year terms.
- Trustee Johnson introduced a motion to open and approve Report 64-100 Food Service Contract and it was supported by Vice President Smith-Thomas.
- Parent Connect experienced a glitch when Vice President Smith-Thomas tried to pay the balance on the account. The charges actually doubled. The IT Team will look into that issue.
- A student gets a balance by using their Student ID Number to obtain a second meal or item. The District is only able to cover one meal per scholar, such as one free breakfast and one free lunch.
- We are working on reaching out to parents whose scholars have a \$10.00 balance on their account. SFE does not let the amount exceed \$10.00.

- Students that carry a balance are not penalized. They are still allowed to partake in breakfast and lunch. They will not be able to grab that extra item for the additional charge. Students are being fed every meal every day.
- There has been a student survey regarding meals that went out this school year. UK12 had a new kitchen staff, SFE provided them with taste tests and menu swaps.
- SFE has to follow the guidelines of the State of Michigan. They cannot provide all the salt, sugar, butter and fat in the meals they prepare. Next year, they will be forced to reduce sodium by another 7% which will affect the taste of the food.
- We have been upping our pars and true student meal counts to ensure that we are not running out or having to prepare additional items. We are also trying not to waste food so that it will end up in the trash.
- The menus are written on a four-week cycle. We have a food promotion every month.

k. Report 64-101 District Wide Community Eligibility Provision: Food Service Fund

- **What is the Community Eligibility Provision?** The Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) is a program through the USDA that allows schools in low income areas to provide free breakfast and lunch to all students.
- **How does a district qualify?** Eligibility is determined by the Identified Student Percentage (ISP) per school building. ISP is calculated by the number of students who qualify for free meals without an application (Foster, homeless, Medicaid, SNAP etc.) divided by the total school enrollment. A school must have a minimum ISP of 40% to qualify. Southfield Public Schools has an ISP of 49.8%. Districts may participate in CEP in a variety of ways: by individual school building ISP, groups of schools or the entire district. Since 2022, Southfield Public Schools has operated under a district wide Community Eligibility Provision. The 2025–2026 school year represents Year 4 of the district's current CEP cycle, requiring renewal for 2026–2027.
- **How does a district receive reimbursement for meals?** The reimbursement factor is determined by multiplying a school's ISP by the USDA factor of 1.6 to determine the percentage of meals that will be reimbursed at the federal free rate with the remainder of the meals would be reimbursed at the paid rate.
- The district's current Identified Student Percentage (ISP) is 49.8%. At this level, approximately 79.7% of all meals will be reimbursed at the federal free rate and 20.3% at the paid rate. Any revenue difference resulting from the paid rate portion is offset by increased student participation, operational efficiencies, and the existing Food Service Fund balance.

- It is important for families to fill out the Income Eligibility Forms completely so that we can continue to have free meals for our scholars.

b. Report 64-108 Parallel Virtual SLP 2026-2027: Special Education Expenditure

c. Report 64-109 Secondary Temporary Staffing Supporting Services: General Funds

- Kelly Educational Services remains the district's primary provider of substitute staffing services. In addition to Kelly Educational Services, the District may utilize secondary temporary staffing providers, including Midwest Substitute Staffing and other district-approved staffing vendors, to supplement as-needed staffing needs during periods of substitute shortages, increased absences, vacancies, and other operational staffing demands.
- The district is seeking authorization to continue utilizing secondary temporary staffing providers through district- approved contractual agreements utilizing the Southfield Public Schools Master Services Agreement and Scope of Services structure.
- These services may include substitute teachers and other district-approved temporary support personnel utilized on an as-needed basis, subject to district operational needs, staffing availability, and funding.
- Report 64-109 Secondary Temporary Staffing Supporting Services was tabled.

d. Report 64-110 Clock Systems Upgrades: Bond Funds

- Southfield Public Schools issued RFP 2026-18 – Clock Systems Upgrades (Bid Package T1) on May 5, 2026, for the replacement and upgrade of clock systems at Birney K-8 School, Levey Middle School, and Thompson K-8 International Academy as part of the District’s 2022 Bond Program. The project supports summer renovation activities and modernization efforts occurring at these facilities.
- A pre-bid meeting was conducted on May 15, 2026, with two prospective bidders in attendance. Two responsive bids were received and publicly opened on May 26, 2026.
- The bids received were: VSC, Inc. – \$119,066.00 and AMcomm Incorporated – \$146,000.00
- The bids were reviewed by representatives from Oakland Schools and Integrated Design Solutions (IDS). Both bidders submitted the required Bid Bond, Familial Disclosure Statement, and Affidavit of Compliance. A post-bid review was conducted with VSC, Inc., and its submission was determined to be complete, responsive, and compliant with all bid requirements.
- Integrated Design Solutions, the District’s technology design consultant for this project, recommends award to VSC, Inc. as the lowest responsive and responsible bidder.
