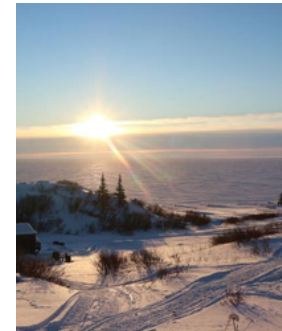

## Introduction

The Northwest Arctic Leadership Team (NWALT) convened a two-day meeting in Kotzebue, Alaska, bringing together board and assembly members, and key staff from the Maniilaq Association (Maniilaq), NANA Regional Corporation (NANA), Northwest Arctic Borough School District (NWABSD), and the Northwest Arctic Borough (NAB). This collaborative event, known as the Quad meeting, focused on advancing NWALT’s mission of reducing duplication of efforts and maximizing resources to address issues affecting the people of the northwest Arctic.

The meeting’s theme, **Uvagulli Qiñikkaqput, Uvagulli Itqanaigaksraigikput – Our Vision, Our Responsibility**, set the tone for fostering in inter-organizational relationship-building, collaboration, and information sharing. The event also reinforced collective ownership and accountability for shaping the future of our region.

Discussions during the meeting focused on NWALT's five key focus areas. These focus areas define the scope of NWALT's work, and therefore the scope of a five-year regional strategy plan. The purpose of the plan is to provide NWALT with actionable strategies that leverage partnerships and resources to create meaningful change in the areas that are most important to the region.

A total of 87 people participated in the event, including 47 board members, 36 staff, and 4 facilitators. The event cost \$44,300, with an additional \$17,000 estimated for remaining facilitation services bringing the total to \$61,300 - approximately \$13,700 under budget. This figure excludes costs for future community engagement or regional strategy sessions.

The Quad meeting is the first phase in a multi-phased approach to developing and implementing the regional strategy plan. The next phase will involve engaging with additional stakeholders, including Tribes, cities, Elders, youth, and other regional and local entities to further refine the strategy plan.

## Pre-Meeting Preparation

To prepare for the Quad meeting, the facilitators, Denali Daniels + Associates (DDA), conducted a pre-meeting survey to gauge participants' vision for the region withing the five focus areas. The survey received a nearly 50% response rate, with input from the board, assembly and staff participants.

The responses were categorized into themes and used as discussion points during the second day of the meeting. These responses will continue to guide development and implementation of the strategy plan.



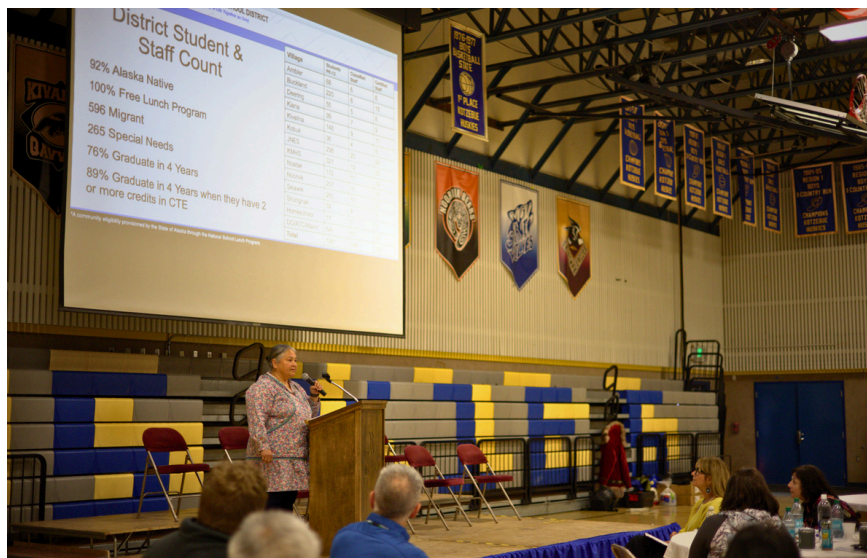
## State of the Region Reports

Each NWALT organization provided a report on its current activities, achievements, and areas for improvement. This context-setting exercise was critical for establishing a foundation for strategic planning. Attendees' questions were recorded for follow-up and are included in *Appendix A*. Additionally, facilitator Annie Thomas-Landrum shared a personal story about managing large-scale change and overcoming burnout, encouraging participants to prioritize health and well-being.

## Small Group Discussion and NWALT Panel

Participants were assigned to new tables to encourage networking and collaboration. The facilitator asked the participants to discuss the following question at their tables, “*After hearing the state of the region and organizations’ priorities, and when you think about strategic planning, what stands out to you?*” Each table recorded their answers and reported to the full group (*Appendix B*).

The NWALT panel allowed leaders to address specific questions about their organizations and priorities, fostering dialogue about ongoing efforts and potential partnerships. Due to time constraints and the volume of questions, every question was written down on a sticky note and recorded for organizations to address at a later time.

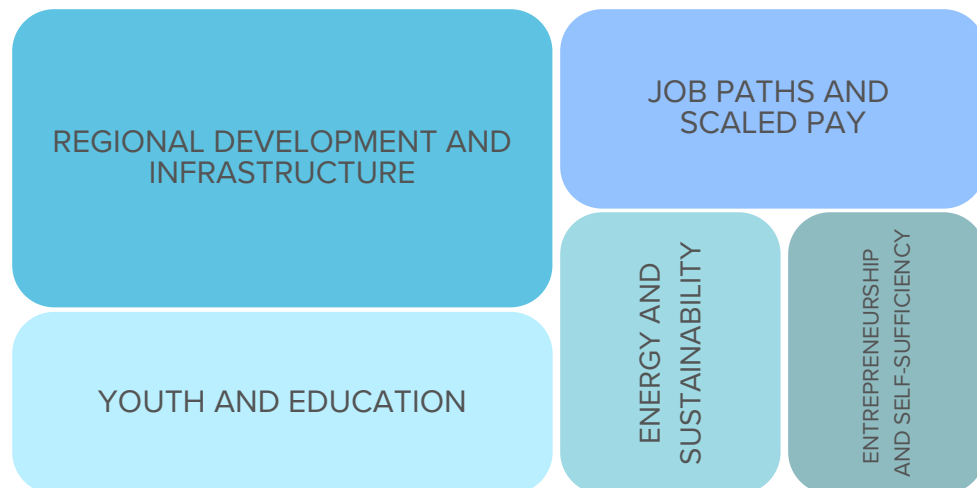


# Day Two

Day two focused on three key activities: focus area stations, organization caucuses, and a review of focus area results. Special video messages from U.S. Senators Lisa Murkowski and Dan Sullivan and closing remarks from NWALT capped the event.

## Focus Area Stations

Participants rotated through five stations corresponding to the focus areas. Facilitators and subject-matter experts guided discussions, capturing participants' responses to questions such as “Where do you want to be five years from now?” and “Who needs to be involved?” Responses were prioritized using sticker dots, with results detailed in *Appendix C*, along with worksheets in *Appendix D*.

## Organization Caucuses and Closing Ceremony

Each organization held private caucuses to review the gathered input, identify priorities, and plan for community engagement. Recommendations were shared with the group, reinforcing NWALT's commitment to collaboration.

Closing remarks emphasized the importance of collective responsibility, gratitude for participants' efforts, and hope for the region's future. Marie Greene and Nellie Sheldon concluded the event with a prayer and the song *Aarigaa*.



## What's Next?

In Phase II, the Northwest Arctic Leadership Team and the facilitators will create a draft strategy plan using the information gathered from the Quad meeting. Beginning in early 2025, they will present the draft plan to community leaders, elders, and youth to gather their perspectives, concerns, and support. This data will be integrated into the draft plan. A final strategy plan with clear, actionable strategies, timelines, and leads will be completed by Summer 2025.

**Re: Urging action to preserve the Universal Service Fund**

Dear Honorable Senators Murkowski and Sullivan,

The Northwest Arctic Leadership Team (NWALT) is writing to express our deep concern regarding the significant risks to the Universal Service Fund (USF) program and to urge immediate action by Congress to implement solutions to preserve the USF program. A loss or disruption to USF would be devastating for Alaska, and particularly for our region and other rural regions of Alaska.

NWALT is comprised of the top executive and chairperson of the following organizations which serve communities in Northwest Alaska: Maniilaq Association, a consortium of 12 federally recognized Tribes which provides health, social, and tribal government services through compacts with the Indian Health Service and Bureau of Indian Affairs; NANA Regional Corporation, an Alaska Native corporation formed pursuant to the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act; Northwest Arctic Borough, a home rule regional government formed under the laws of the State of Alaska; and the Northwest Arctic Borough School District, a public school system educating about 2,000 students in 11 villages. Together, our organizations are entrusted with the responsibility of ensuring the people of our region have every opportunity to live a quality life and achieve the American Dream right here in our home communities along the Arctic Circle.

Our regional leadership has significant concern over the recent SCOTUS decision to hear a case that has the potential to jeopardize the USF program, for which our communities rely. As you know, USF helps ensure rural areas stay connected to the outside world, receive critical healthcare, access education, and maintain economic opportunities. Our region relies on the program to access health services through the Rural Health Care Program and for education through the E-Rate Program. Between these two programs alone, our region could lose nearly \$50 million per year if the USF went away.

Additionally, an adverse decision by the U.S. Supreme Court jeopardizes ongoing projects aimed at bridging the digital divide, such as the NANA regional broadband project, further isolating vulnerable populations and widening inequalities. It is vital that the USF remains intact so that rural Alaskans can continue to thrive and have equal access to the services they deserve.

To safeguard Alaskans' social and economic wellbeing, we urge you and your colleagues in Congress to take swift action to protect the Universal Service Fund. Preserving the vital infrastructure and telecommunications that keeps our communities connected and supported is of the utmost importance. Thank you for your attention to this critical matter.
