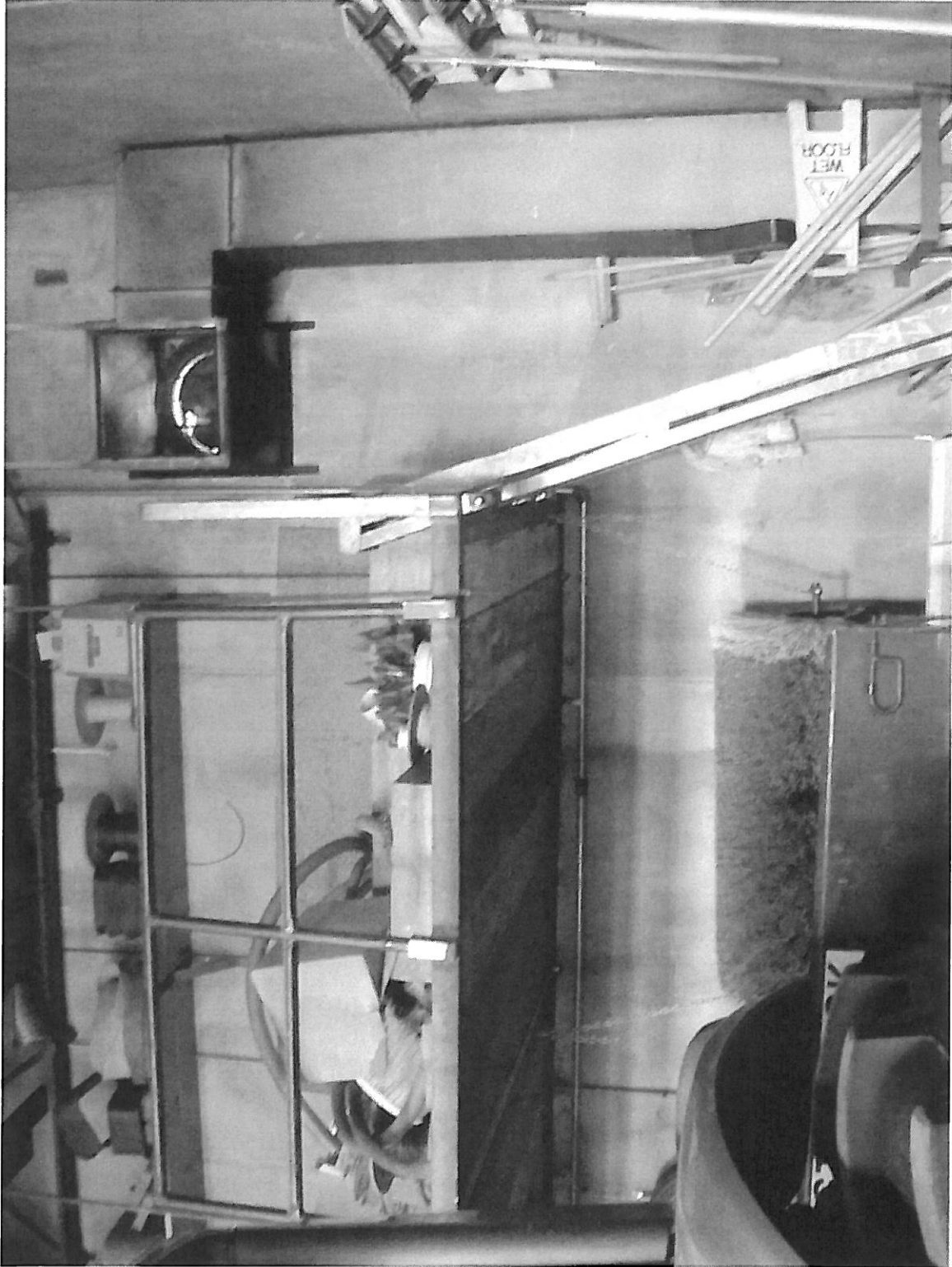

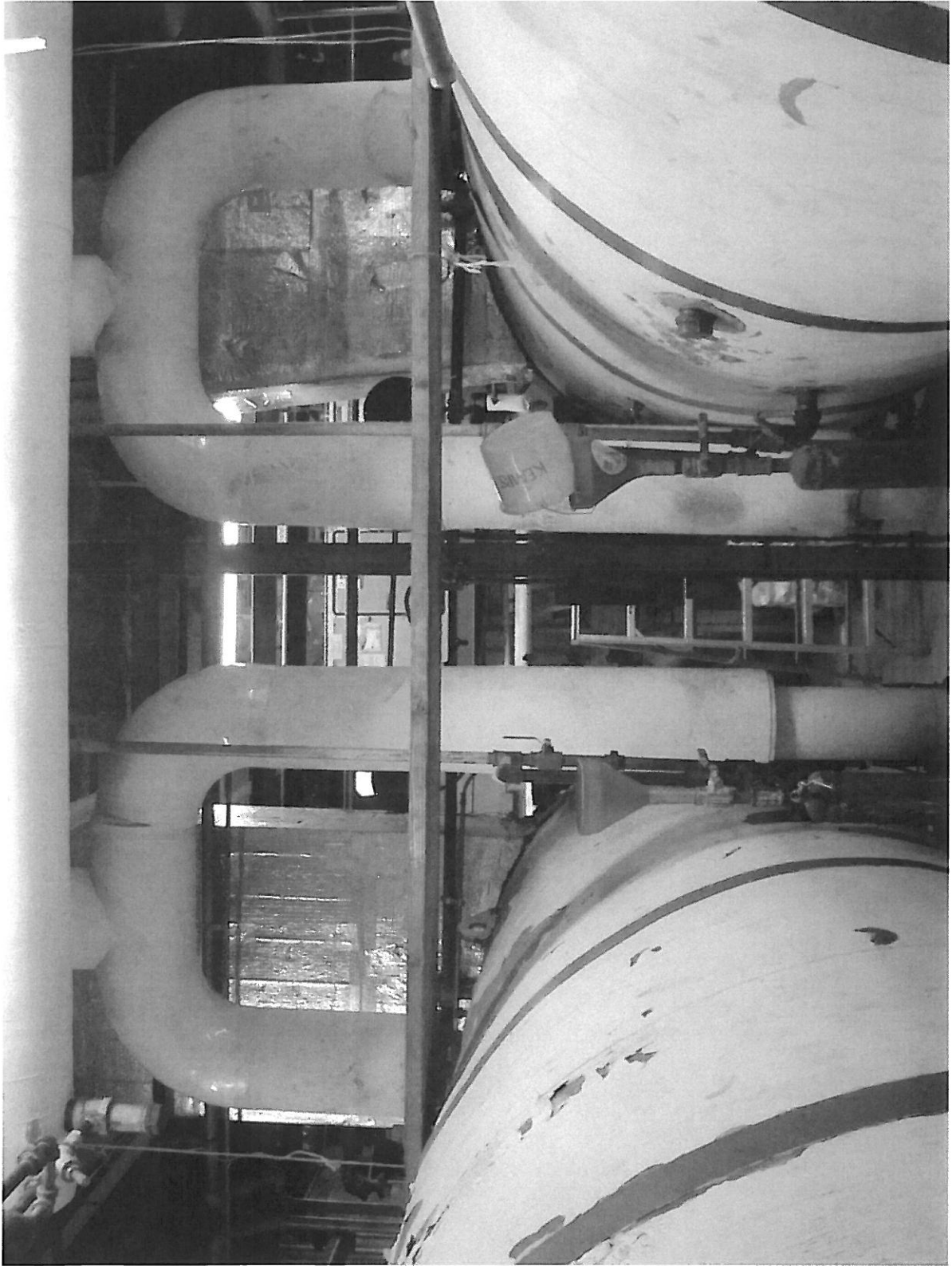

CONTRACT FOR EDUCATIONAL SERVICES FOR
EARLY CHILDHOOD SPECIAL EDUCATION STUDENTS

THIS CONTRACT entered into this 1st day of July, 2010 by and between INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT 284, Wayzata, Minnesota, (the "School District") and Wayzata Community Church Nursery School (the "Nursery School").

The School District and the Nursery School represent and agree as follows:

1. The School District represents to the Nursery School that:
 - (a) The School District is authorized and required to provide special instructions and services for handicapped preschool children ("Early Childhood Special Education students") by (among other means) contracting with and through collaborative efforts with public, private or voluntary agencies, including for children under five years of age and their families, programs in which handicapped children are served with non-handicapped children, under Minnesota Statutes, Section 120.17, subject to Minnesota Rules, Chapter 3525 promulgated by the State Board of Education (the "Rules").
 - (b) The School District has determined that it is necessary and desirable to retain space and services in a qualified nursery school to provide integration experiences for identified Early Childhood Special Education students with non-handicapped students ages two and one-half to five years of age.
 - (c) The Board of Education of the School District has duly authorized the execution and performance of this Contract.
2. The Nursery School represents to the School District that:
 - (a) The Nursery School is and shall be during the term of this Contract located in the Wayzata Community Church's facilities at 125 East Wayzata Blvd., Wayzata, MN 55391.
 - (b) The Nursery School is and shall be during the term of this Contract duly licensed by the State of Minnesota Department of Human Services.
 - (c) The Nursery School has and shall maintain during the term of this Contract insurance against bodily injuries and death arising from operations of the Nursery School in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$1,000,000 annual aggregate.

3. The Early Childhood Special Education program at the Nursery School shall commence August 30, 2010 and conclude June 10, 2011 (or such earlier or later beginning and ending dates as the School District and Nursery School shall agree upon), and services of the program shall be provided during 172 days, which shall be weekdays when schools of the School District are in session.

4. The Nursery School shall provide:
 - (a) Classroom space and services for one morning (2 ½ hours per period) four days each week and one afternoon session (2 ½ hours per period) four days each week. The morning sessions will have up to six non-handicapped students on three of the days. The afternoon sessions will have up to eight non-handicapped students on three of the days.
 - (b) Nursery school slots for two morning sessions three days each week and two afternoon sessions four days each week.
 - (c) Space for two desks and phone hook-up for use by the ECSE staff members during nursery school hours.
 - (d) A fully certified and licensed nursery school teacher to team teach in the classroom three afternoons and three mornings per week for a total of nine hours in the afternoon in each class and nine hours in the morning.

In addition, the Nursery School teacher would be available for one-half to one hour each week at a mutually agreed upon time for planning and/or conferences.
 - (e) Janitor service for up to one hour each day to clean the classrooms used by the ECSE program.

5. The School District shall provide:
 - (a) One Early Childhood Special Education licensed teacher as specified by Wayzata School District.
 - (b) One classroom assistant per session as specified by Wayzata School District.
 - (c) Therapists as specified by the Early Childhood Special Education students' Individual Education Plans.

The above Wayzata School staff will follow the nursery school's policies on building use.

6. This Contract does not constitute a partnership or joint venture of the School District and the Nursery School; neither

party shall be liable for any act or failure to act by the other party, and neither party is authorized to enter into any contract or agreement binding upon the other party. The Nursery School shall be solely responsible for the services provided to non-handicapped students at the Nursery School and the Wayzata School District will be responsible for their students.

7. The School District shall pay the Nursery School the total sum of **\$47,666.34** for the space and services provided by the Nursery School under this Contract in monthly installments, prorated according to the days of space and services provided during the calendar month, upon written statements verified in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, Sections 471.38 and 471.391; such payment shall be made as promptly as possible and in any case within thirty (30) days after submission of a proper and duly verified statement.
8. In the case of any material violation of any representation or agreement contained in this Contract, the other party may terminate this Contract upon thirty (30) days' written notice specifying such default and requiring that it be cured within such thirty (30) day period. If the default is not fully cured within such thirty (30) day period, the Contract may be terminated, at the option of the party not in default.
9. This Contract may be amended or extended only by an agreement in writing duly authorized and signed by the School District and the Nursery School.
10. This Contract supersedes all prior oral or written proposals and communications related to this Contract. The School District and Nursery School each acknowledges that it has not been induced to enter into this Contract by any representations or statements, oral or written, not contained in this Contract.
11. The parties recognize that the education program that is the subject of this Contract is a trial program and that the success of such program will depend on the efforts of both parties to the Contract. Therefore, no warranties or promises are made by the Nursery School regarding the results of the program.

Neither party to this Contract is responsible for failure to fulfill its obligations under the Contract due to causes beyond its control, and neither party is liable for any special, incidental or consequential damages that may arise from any violation of the Contract.

12. Unless this Contract has been terminated pursuant to paragraph (8) of this Contract, neither party shall commence an action for damages against the other party for violation of any representation or covenant in this Contract unless it shall have mailed or delivered written notice of claim, specifying the claimed violation and the amount of damages, at least thirty (30) days prior to commencing the action for damages. No action for damages arising under this Contract shall be brought by either party more than two years after the cause of action has accrued.

Summary/Interpretation of Data Analysis:

- When comparing Kimberly Lane Elementary School to others schools in the nation that administer the NWEA MAP test, the school percentile rank for the percentage of students meeting or exceeding their RIT point growth target in reading is as follows:
 Third grade students approximately the 97.8th percentile
 Fourth grade students approximately the 99.2th percentile
 Fifth grade students above the 99.1th percentile
- Students can show growth without meeting or exceeding their expected RIT growth target.
- Significant decrease in the number of students who were below projected proficiency (for those students who made expected growth and those students who did not make expected growth) from the 07-08 school year to the 08-09 school year. In the 08-09 school year, a total of 2 students were below projected proficiency.
- Greatest opportunity for growth continues to be with the students whose MAP scores identify them as projected proficient on the MCA, yet are not making expected growth.
- In relation to the equity goal, the 12 black students at Kimberly Lane gained an average of 7.1 RIT points.



Action Plan to Achieve Goals:

- Use fall and spring assessments in grades K-1 to measure accuracy, fluency and comprehension.
- Use fall and spring MAP testing in grades 3-5 to measure growth and define instruction in the areas of Word Recognition, Analysis, and Vocabulary Expansion, Comprehension: Informational and Narrative, and Literature.
- Use baseline and unit assessments from Pearson/Scott Foresman in grades 2-5 to help identify student needs and to develop student action plans.
- Use *Emergent Reader* and *Soar to Success* strategies with lower quartile students.
- Train a cadre of teachers in the National Urban Alliance (NUA) strategies related to vocabulary, comprehension skills and thinking maps.
- Continue staff training initiatives from the National Urban Alliance.
- Continue and expand staff development opportunities in the areas vocabulary, comprehension and literature.
- Develop team and/or individual teacher goals to address individual student needs and plan for intervention strategies.
- Review strategies from *Bringing Words to Life: Robust Vocabulary Instruction* by Isabel L. Beck PhD, *Strategies That Work: Teaching Comprehension for Understanding and Engagement* by Stephanie Harvey and Anne Goudvis, and *Thinking Strategies for Student Achievement: Improving learning across the curriculum, K-12* by Denise D. Nessel and Joyce M. Graham.
- Embed best practices in vocabulary, comprehension, and NUA strategies we have learned into reading instruction.
- Provide continued support for new reading series.
- Use grade-level and cross-grade-level sharing of reading strategies and interventions to monitor progress at quarterly grade level planning days and staff meetings.
- Document the progress of individual learning outcomes of students working on intervention plans and change plans as needed for student growth and support.
- Provide staff with a Professional Development Calendar for the 2009-2010 school year.

Budget at a Glance

General

- ◆ This budget year commences July 1, 2010 and ends June 30, 2011. It is for the 2010-11 school year and is also referred to as “Fiscal Year 2011”, abbreviated “FY11”.
- ◆ Projected student enrollment remains stable at 10,376, compared with 10,373 in the prior year.
- ◆ The general fund unreserved, undesignated balance at June 30, 2011 is estimated to be \$10,556,852, or 10.5% of the expenditures. This represents 5 weeks of operations and is deemed to be adequate at year end.
- ◆ This budget assumes that there are no changes in the formula allowance enacted by the 2010 Legislature.

Revenues

- ◆ Total general fund revenues are estimated to be \$114,805,590, an increase of \$2,250,723, or 2.0% from FY10 to FY11.
- ◆ Revenue includes the referendum levy of \$1,531.00 per pupil unit.
- ◆ State special education aid and excess cost aid will still be prorated at 85% and 66%, respectively.
- ◆ Revenue also includes a technology levy of \$5,902,515.
- ◆ Investment earnings in the general fund are expected to be approximately \$200,000 due to reduced rates of return in the marketplace.
- ◆ Deferred maintenance revenue of \$643,388 and \$2,424,638 of operating capital aid are included in the budget for capital improvements and repair.
- ◆ Federal Title I revenue of \$312,563 is included. The district began receiving this revenue in FY 2009. The preliminary budget does not include any federal stimulus dollars.

Expenditures

- ◆ General fund expenditures are estimated to be \$115,986,004, a decrease of \$171,177.
- ◆ Budget includes \$5.9 million for technology through the capital projects levy.
- ◆ Budget includes \$2.6 million for the alternative compensation plan.
- ◆ Salaries are budgeted to increase 3.0%, including step advancement, lane changes, and scheduled improvements for settled bargaining units as well as estimates for non-settled groups.
- ◆ Health insurance premiums increased 6.0%. Budget capacity was increased to account for additional employees electing to participate in the district’s insurance plans.
- ◆ Dental insurance premiums increased 3.0%.
- ◆ Public Employee Retirement Association (P.E.R.A.) employer contribution rates for non-licensed employees will increase to 7.25% on January 1, 2011 and is projected forward.

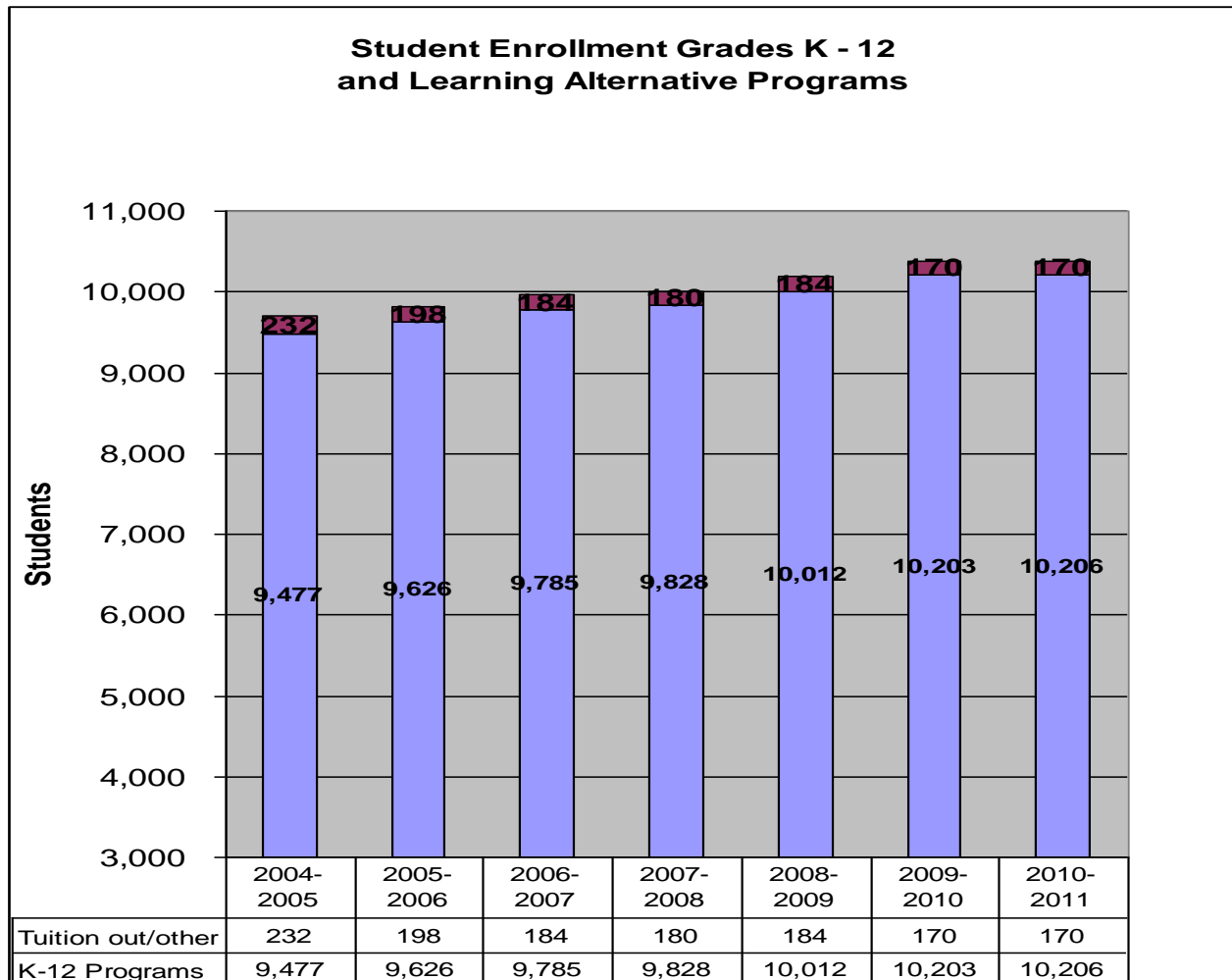
- ◆ The budget for the textbook replacement cycle is \$400,000. An additional \$50,000 is budgeted for textbooks for enrollment changes at particular grade levels.
- ◆ Budget includes a reserve of 6 teacher FTE's to address hot spots.
- ◆ Schools' allocations per pupil for supplies remain constant at current rates.
- ◆ Heating, ventilating, and air conditioning (HVAC) improvements are planned at East Middle School. This is the second year of a two-year project.
- ◆ Other deferred maintenance projects include scheduled pavement rehabilitation and flooring replacements.

◆ Enrollments

The state of Minnesota had 340 school districts with a statewide public school enrollment of 792,119 for 2009-2010. Slightly more than one percent of Minnesota's public school students are educated in Wayzata Public Schools. In 2010-2011, enrollment at Wayzata Public Schools remains stable at 10,376. Of these students 10,206 are served in the district's facilities, while 170 students are served through tuition agreements by other districts.

Student enrollment growth has leveled off, and enrollment is expected to remain level over the next ten years. In some areas of the district new homes are under development. In general, however, this new development is expected to be offset by slight enrollment declines in mature parts of the district. These projections are based upon demographic studies commissioned by the District in early 2010 that are currently being updated as of July 2010.

General Fund

Purpose

The General Fund contains all revenue and expense for the general, day-to-day operations of the school district. This includes salaries and benefits for teachers, administrators, custodians, secretaries, and paraprofessionals; instructional supplies; technology; transportation; textbooks, and money spent to operate and repair district buildings.

In some ways, it is clearer to express the general fund in terms of what it does not cover. The general fund does not cover Culinary Express; Community Education (including Home Base latchkey programs); debt service payments on bonds issued by the District; and the cost of major construction projects financed through the issuance of bonds.

The general fund does include expenditures funded with the Health and Safety levy, but in this document these expenditures are shown separately. This is because Health and Safety expenditures can fluctuate considerably from year to year and can give a distorted view of the district's funding picture.

The preliminary budget for 2010-11 contains moderate changes in staffing and programs from the previous year. The 2010 Legislature completed their session at the time that this budget was prepared and this budget correctly assumes that the state formula allowance will continue to be frozen at the 2008 level.

Fund Balance Policy

The level of spending is set with a number of considerations in mind, but one of the chief considerations is to maintain an adequate level of reserves for unanticipated events. The district has a formal policy calling for an undesignated balance in the general fund equal to at least 5% to 7% of one year's expenditures. This balance could be considered to be the District's "savings account". Maintaining a prudent fund balance is important for the stability of the district, and is a key measure that bond rating agencies examine when assigning a credit rating to a district's bond sale.

The projected undesignated, unreserved general fund balance as of June 30, 2011 is \$10,556,852. This is 10.5% of the expenditure budget, or five weeks of operations.

Unanticipated events that could occur that would require the District to dip into its undesignated fund balance include:

- Property tax delinquencies and abatements
- Enrollment fluctuations
- Unanticipated price increases for essential purchases, e.g. fuel for heating and transportation
- State revenue reductions or "aid pro-rations"
- Severe weather

General Fund Revenue

Wayzata Public Schools receives revenues from two primary sources: local property taxes and state funding. A relatively small amount of revenue is also received from the federal government; fees and charges; non-resident tuition; and interest income. A detailed explanation of general fund revenue begins on page 13. Highlights for 2010-2011 include:

Wayzata Public Schools will receive approximately \$114.8 million to support the general operations of the district. This is an increase of \$2.2 million from the preceding year. \$1.6 million of this increase is attributed to designated revenue that must be used for a specific purpose. This includes Health and Safety Revenue to complete indoor air quality improvements at East Middle School and Technology levy Revenue as approved by local voters for the exclusive purpose of providing technology resources for student learning. The remaining increases in revenue are primarily due to enrollment increases that were not originally anticipated in the district's original projections. The Minnesota Department of Education also provided more favorable Special Education reimbursements and the Wayzata district also realized additional equity revenue as additional metro school districts increased their levy authority in the fall of 2009.

State aid estimates are primarily based on session laws 2010 with the assumption that there will be no increase in the formula allowance. Special Education aid is also expected to remain similar and will continue to be prorated at 85% for general aid and 66% for excess cost aid.

Some of the major features of the general fund revenue for Wayzata Public Schools for FY11 are:

- State revenues are the single largest source of general fund revenue (64%) for Wayzata Public Schools.
- Revenue for the Alternative Compensation Plan is \$2,655,640.
- The technology levy is increased to \$5,902,515. An extensive technology plan was developed during fiscal year 2010 that will be implemented in 2010-2011 school year.
- Deferred maintenance revenue of \$643,388 is in the budget. This revenue is designated for building repairs.
- Compensatory revenue, which is state aid allocated on the basis of students eligible for free and reduced-price lunches, is increasing from \$683,278 to \$848,232. This is principally due to the fact that additional students are eligible for free and reduced-price lunches.
- Also included in revenue is \$1,600,000 in state integration aid and the local integration levy, as well as \$1,100,000 for integration-related transportation aid.

Property Taxes

Property taxes became a far less significant source of revenue for Wayzata Public Schools due to major legislative changes enacted in the 2001 Session. Two large property tax components of the school levy were eliminated or reduced, and replaced with an equivalent amount of state aid. As a result Wayzata's certified property tax levy declined by more than half, from \$55.4 million in the levy for FY 2002 to \$26.5 million in the levy for FY 2004.

In November 2005, the voters of the District approved an increase in the referendum levy that included an allowance for future inflation. The referendum levy for 2010-11 is \$1,531.00 per resident pupil unit. Total referendum revenue is \$17,158,152 for this year.

The District's property tax base remains strong. The District's referendum market value grew to just over \$10 billion in 2009 and continues to increase.

For FY11, local property taxes will provide \$35.3 million in revenue for the general fund. This source of revenue will also provide \$1.3 million for the community services fund and \$9.7 million for debt redemption fund. The total property tax levy for FY11 for all funds is \$46.3 million.

Federal Aid

Federal funding is generally provided to supplement the costs of providing instructional services in specific vocational, adult, and special education programs for educationally or economically disadvantaged students. Federal funds are a relatively modest revenue source for the general fund, but significant for target population groups. In FY11, Wayzata Public Schools will receive approximately \$4,170,898 in federal funding, which is less than 4.0% of the general fund budget.

About 75% of federal aid is designated for special education programs. In FY 2011, the district estimates that it will receive \$312,563 in Title I revenue.

Other Revenue

About \$2.9 million in miscellaneous revenues from various sources is projected to be available in FY 2011. This includes interest earnings, tuition paid from other districts, donations, and fees.

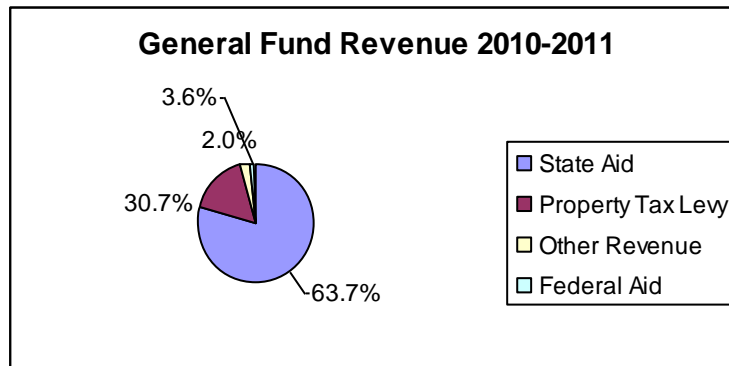
General Fund Revenue—Detailed Explanation

Most attention during this budget process is focused on the General Fund. This is the source of most expenditures having to do with general operations of Wayzata Schools for the primary mission of the District - - educating children.

The District has budgeted revenue of \$114,805,590 in its general fund for 2010-2011. Other funds will bring in additional revenue, but this money is not available to pay the general operating expenses of the District.

Where Does the Money Come From?

As the pie chart below shows, most general fund revenue for Wayzata Schools is state aid - - 63.7%. The second largest portion, 30.7%, comes from property taxes assessed on property within the District. Another 2.0% comes from local revenues, fees, admission charges, earnings on investments, and tuition payments from other school districts or from individuals. Finally, federal aid provides 3.6% of general fund revenue. Both state aid and local property tax revenues are strictly controlled by the state.

State Aid in the General Fund

State Aid falls into three major categories:

- **General Education Aid** \$63,927,972
- **State “Categorical” Aid** \$9,039,060
- **State Property Tax Credits** \$174,752

General Education Aid - Basic Formula

The principal component of **General Education Aid** is the “general education basic formula”. For 2010-2011, this formula will provide the District with \$5,124 in state aid for each “pupil unit.” (A “pupil unit” is essentially one child enrolled for the entire school year, but each child is counted as more or less than 1 pupil unit, depending on grade level.) Currently pupils are weighted as “pupil units” according to the following:

<u>Grade Level</u>	<u>“Pupil Unit” Weight</u>
Kindergarten	0.612
Grades 1 – 3	1.115
Grades 4 – 6	1.06
Grades 7 – 12	1.3

For example, since each high school student counts as 1.3 pupil units, the school district receives 1.3 X \$5,124 in general education basic revenue for each high school student, or \$6,661.

The general education basic aid formula is the single largest source of revenue for Wayzata Public Schools, providing an estimated \$61,196,598 in 2010-2011. This comprises 53% of the District’s total general fund revenue for the year.

Other General Education Aid Components- Continued

- **Operating Capital Aid** is designated for capital expenditures for buildings and equipment. It is based on the number of students enrolled and the age of the District's buildings. Beginning in FY05, much of this revenue comes from a property tax levy; previously it was all state aid. Beginning in 2008-09, Wayzata does not receive this aid; all of the District's operating capital revenue comes from levy.
- **Compensatory Revenue** is based on the number and percentage of students eligible for free or reduced-price lunch. This revenue goes to the school where the low-income students are enrolled, and must be used to serve students needing extra assistance.
- **Limited English Proficiency (L.E.P.) Revenue** is based upon the number and percentage of students whose native language is not English.
- **Referendum Tax Base Reduction Aid** is money paid to districts because the Legislature reduced the referendum property tax base in 2001 by exempting certain types of property (farmland and cabins) from school operating referendum taxes. The referendum levy of the District is reduced by the amount of the aid.
- **Extended Time Revenue** is aid for "extended time" pupil units, that is, students who attend school for an extended day or extended year (e.g. summer school). The program must be affiliated with an Area Learning Center (ALC). The extended time cannot exceed 20% of the regular school day/school year.
- **Transportation Sparsity Revenue** is based on the student population, and area of the district in square miles. It is a small amount for Wayzata, but a significant revenue source for rural school districts.
- **Gifted and Talented Revenue** is equal to \$12 per pupil unit, and is to be used to enhance programs for gifted and talented students.
- **Alternative Compensation Revenue** is a new program established by the 2005 Legislature to encourage school districts to implement merit-based compensation plans for teachers. The total revenue is \$260 per pupil. Part of this revenue comes from a property tax levy.
- **Pension Subtraction** is a reduction in aid to the District. In 1997 the Legislature reduced employer pension contribution rates on behalf of teachers, but reduced school district aid so that the reduced expenditures would not accrue to the benefit of school districts. The reduction was modified for 2007-08 to offset the effects of an increase in the employer's share of teacher retirement costs.
- **Endowment Fund** is revenue from a statewide trust fund for education, established at the time Minnesota attained statehood. Revenue from the trust fund is distributed to all school districts in proportion to enrollment. Prior to FY 2010-2011, the revenue amount was subtracted from general education aid, so there was no net gain to the District. Beginning in 2010-2011, the subtraction no longer occurs, resulting in approximately \$272,000 of additional revenue to the district.

State “Categorical” Aid

State categorical aid is calculated on the basis of expenditures for a particular program or “category.” The District’s largest categorical aid is special education aid, which is based on a formula that considers the District’s expenditures on salaries of special education personnel, special education transportation costs, and other factors. Categorical aid amounts for 2010-2011 for Wayzata Public Schools are as follows:

Special Education Aid is paid to offset the additional expense associated with serving students with special needs. This aid formula provides approximately 68 percent of salary of special education teachers and aides. It also contains factors for special education transportation costs, supplies and equipment, and contracted special education services. The state appropriation for this aid was increased substantially in 2007. Still, the appropriation does not cover the full cost, so the aid is still pro-rated. For FY10, school districts can expect to receive only 85% of the revenue that the formula would provide if fully funded.

Special Education Excess Cost Aid is paid via an aid formula that is triggered when a district’s expenditures for special education exceed certain thresholds. This aid is volatile, and is very difficult to predict. The state appropriation for this aid is expected to be insufficient to fund more than about 66% of the aid that the formula would provide if fully funded.

School to Work Special Education Aid, formerly a separate aid category, is now included in the regular special education aid formula.

Integration Aid is revenue of \$129 per pupil unit to provide services relating to voluntary integration programs. There is a tax levy component to this also.

Alternative Attendance Aid is aid of \$351 per pupil unit for students who reside in Minneapolis and attend school in Wayzata under integration programs.

Nonpublic Pupil Transportation Aid is aid to offset the cost of providing transportation to District residents who attend nonpublic schools.

Integration Transportation Aid is paid to reimburse the District for the cost of transporting students who come to Wayzata under a voluntary integration program (“Choice is Yours.”) This aid also covers the cost to transport Wayzata students to two integration magnet schools: Fine Arts interdisciplinary Resource (F.A.I.R.) School in Robbinsdale, and the Interdistrict Downtown School in Minneapolis.

Advanced Placement Testing Aid is aid paid to offset the cost of advanced placement tests for high school students.

State Property Tax Credits

The state pays a portion of the property tax bill on homesteads and agricultural homesteads. The credit is a maximum of \$304 for low-value homes, and declines in amount as the value of the home increases. The credit is paid to the school district, city, county, township, etc., in proportion to each taxing jurisdiction's levy. The Wayzata School District's estimated share of this credit for the general fund is \$166,032.

Property Tax Levy

The District's property tax levy is limited by state law. The property tax components in the general fund for 2010-2011 are as follows:

Referendum Levy

This levy requires voter approval. In 2009 Wayzata voters approved an increase in the levy to \$1,609.08 per pupil unit, which is above the maximum that state law allows for Wayzata. The district levied the maximum allowed--\$1,531.00 per pupil unit. Inflation in future years will eventually raise the state maximum to reach or exceed the full amount approved by the voters. (Some districts are grandfathered in at higher amounts, and rural districts are exempt from the state maximum limits.)

Technology Levy (also known as Capital Projects Levy)

This is a voter-approved levy. This money can be spent only on technology and telecommunications (including staffing).

Integration Levy

This levy is used to support integration and diversity education programs.

Building Lease Levy

This levy is for payment of costs to rent space for instructional purposes or storage. The largest single lease is the lease/purchase agreement for the athletic bubble at Central Middle School. Also included in this levy is the District's share of leased space for District 287 special education programs. Also included are short-term athletic facility leases, such as ice time for hockey teams.

Ice Arena Operating Levy

This levy is for the net operating costs of the District ice arena.

Safe Schools Levy

This levy is \$30 per pupil unit for 2010-2011. The money can be spent for a variety of security items, ranging from personnel to technology.

Operating Capital Levy

Operating capital revenue in previous years was all state aid; now districts must levy for much or all of the revenue. This revenue is for equipment, building construction projects, and textbooks.

Deferred Maintenance Levy

New since 2007-08, this is to pay the costs of major building maintenance projects.

Equity Levy

Is additional money for districts whose revenue from other sources is low compared to the highest revenue districts in the region.

Transition Levy

Is a "grandfather" provision. Some aid formula changes regarding Limited English Proficiency and Alternative Learning Center students reduced aid for districts, and this provision allows districts to levy for the lost revenue.

Secondary Vocational Levy

Is a levy to pay for secondary vocational programs.

Alternative Compensation Levy

This levy is to pay the additional costs of a merit-based compensation plan for teachers. There is a state aid component to this as well.

Judgment Levy

Districts can levy for the cost of court-ordered judgments imposed on them. This amount is Wayzata's share of a judgment against Intermediate District 287, of which Wayzata is a member.

Reemployment

This levy is for costs of reemployment compensation. This is actually a negative adjustment for prior years.

Adjustments for Tax Abatements

Tax abatements are property tax assessment adjustments for prior years. When these occur, the district loses tax revenue, which is recovered through an additional levy amount.

Tax Delinquency

Adjustments are necessary because not all taxes are paid in a timely fashion.

Federal Aid

Federal aid in the general fund budget for the 2010-2011 school year totals \$4,170,898. Of this amount, 75% is for special education programs. Most federal programs have restrictions as to how the money can be spent. Even when increases in federal aid are enacted, the money can seldom be used to fund existing positions or programs; instead it must be used to “supplement, not supplant” existing expenditures.

Other Revenue

This catchall category includes a number of revenue sources, most of which are local in nature (i.e. not state or federal aid).

Other Local Revenue

This includes a variety of items. Private music lessons of \$95,000 are included here. There are Local Collaborative Time Study grants of \$124,300. Also included is a federal “e-rate” rebate on telecommunication costs of \$41,000.

Tuition

Tuition is paid by other school districts, usually for special education services to students who are not residents of Wayzata. (In Minnesota, special education costs are normally the responsibility of the school district where the child’s parents reside.) On occasion, but rarely, tuition is paid by a student’s family, usually when they are residents of another state or country.

Investment Income

This is interest earned on cash balances held by the District.

Fees from Patrons

These fees consist of athletics participation fees (\$367,340), parking fees (\$125,000), and advanced placement testing fees (\$36,800), ice arena rentals (\$37,000), and music instrument rental fees (\$13,000). Rental fees of \$265,500 to cover the operating costs of the athletic bubble are included. Also, this category includes \$327,150 in fees for field trips.

Gate Receipts

Are the admission charges for athletic events.

County Apportionment

State Law requires that certain fees and fines collected by the county must be allocated to school districts. These fees in turn are subtracted from state aid, so there is no net gain to the district.

General Fund Expenditures

Technology Levy

The capital projects levy revenue for technology in FY 2011 is \$5,902,515. This amount is transferred out of the general fund and into the construction fund. The actual expenditure items will be accounted for in the construction fund.

The focus of this program is curriculum and classroom technology, particularly expansion of classroom tools: projection and soundfield systems, smartboards, and software.

- The focus of the Technology Levy for the 2010-2011 school year remains curriculum and classroom technology. All regular grades K-12 have been outfitted with projector and sound fields.
- With the increase of classroom tools, there is a need to upgrade the network storage capacity and backup system. Teachers simply need more space to store their curriculum related data, videos and other classroom files.
- About 900 computers will be purchased as part of the computer replacement cycle.

Transportation Expenditures

The transportation budget is increased by \$249,294 or 3.62% over the 2009-10 budget. This is primarily attributable to an increase in transportation of Minneapolis students for desegregation purposes and an increase in special education transportation costs. State transportation aid reimburses the district for most of this increased amount.

Health and Dental Insurance

The District has a self-insurance plan for employee health insurance with stop-loss coverage for extraordinarily high claims. Premiums in the aggregate have been increased by 6.0% for FY11. The employee/employer share of this increase depends on the employee's bargaining unit contract. Dental premiums increased by 3.0%.

Allocations

Amounts distributed to schools and other offices for supplies and similar expenses remained the same as in the prior year.

The school district budget consists of the following types of expenditures. About 75 cents of each dollar will be spent for salaries and employee benefits.

Salaries (\$63.4 million)

Regular salary related to personnel positions, extra curricular assignments, overtime, substitute cost.

Employee Benefits (\$18.2 million)

Health, Dental, Life, Long-term disability, workers' compensation, retirement plans and recording of post retirement benefits for current employees. Health insurance costs are of great concern from a budgeting standpoint. The district's rates have been very stable since 2002. The rate increase in the district's self-insured health plan this year was 6.0%.

Purchased Services (\$17.8 million)

Includes consultants, postage, insurance, repair and maintenance services, transportation contracts, travel/conferences, payments to other districts and tuition.

Supplies & materials (\$3.5 million)

Textbooks, instructional supplies, office and custodial supplies, computer software, and related copier costs. Includes fuel for buildings.

Capital (\$2.2 million)

Replacement and additional equipment, facilities repair and maintenance, vehicles, and computer equipment.

Miscellaneous and Other expenditures (\$1.6 million)

Includes all expenses that cannot be classified as above.

Transfer to Other Funds (\$9.2 million)

Includes transfer of technology levy and Health and Safety levy to Construction Fund; also some transfers from General Fund to Community Services Fund.

ADMINISTRATION: Includes all costs for general administration, instructional administration and school site administration. This area covers the school board, superintendent, principals, and directors.

DISTRICT SUPPORT SERVICES: Consists of activities related to general administrative support not listed above. This area covers federal programs, human resources, government relations, school elections, and miscellaneous district administration not otherwise classified. Anticipated salary increases and district contingency reserves have temporarily been budgeted here.

ELEM/SEC REGULAR INSTRUCTION: Consists of all activities dealing directly with the teaching of pupils, the interaction between teachers and pupils in the classroom and co-curricular activities at the kindergarten, elementary and secondary levels.

Expenditures by Program (continued)

VOCATIONAL INSTRUCTION: Courses and activities which develop knowledge, skills, attitudes and behavioral characteristics for students seeking career exploration and employability.

SPECIAL EDUCATION INSTRUCTION: Activities providing learning experiences for pupils of any age who, because of certain atypical characteristics or conditions, need, or who would benefit by, educational programs different from those provided pupils in regular or vocational instruction.

INSTRUCTIONAL SUPPORT SERVICES: Activities for assisting the instructional staff with the content and process of providing learning experiences for pupils in kindergarten through twelfth grade.

PUPIL SUPPORT SERVICES: Includes all services provided to pupils who do not qualify to be classified as instructional services (counseling/guidance, health, psychological, social work, transportation, other)

SITES & BUILDINGS: Activities related to the acquisition, operation, maintenance, repair and remodeling of all physical plant, facilities and grounds of the school district.

FISCAL & OTHER FIXED COSTS: Fiscal and fixed cost activities that are not recorded elsewhere.

Personnel

Wayzata Public Schools has five collective bargaining units. Principals, teachers, custodial and maintenance employees, food service employees, and clerical employees are organized for bargaining purposes. In addition, some administrative and confidential employees, referred to as “unaffiliated,” are not in a collective bargaining unit.

The number of FTE personnel is increased slightly for 2010-2011 over the preceding year.

Operating Capital Expenditures

Operating capital revenue is allocated by state law based on a formula that considers the number of pupils in the District and the average age of District facilities. For Wayzata Public Schools, the formula will provide an estimated \$201.68 per pupil unit in 2010-11 for a total of \$2,424,636. This money can only be used for capital expenditures as defined in state law.

In addition, in 2010-11 the district will receive deferred maintenance revenue. This is a fairly new category of revenue, enacted in 2005 by the Legislature. This revenue is intended to correct inequities in revenue available to different school districts for building repairs. Deferred maintenance revenue totals \$643,388 for 2010-11.

The District annually reserves \$325,000 of its operating capital for current and future roof repairs. The District has over \$2.9 million reserved for this purpose.

Larger projects funded with operating capital reserves in FY11 include:

- Flooring replacement at various schools \$105,000
- Exterior wall repair, window & door replacements \$300,000
- Phase 1 of Indoor Air Quality upgrades at East Middle School \$600,000

The amount of operating capital expenditures in this budget are equal to revenues.

Culinary Express Food Service Fund

Culinary Express is the District department that provides meal services and nutrition education services in Wayzata Schools. Over 7,000 lunches are served each day, and over 1,250,000 meal equivalents are served each year. Lunch prices for FY 2011 will remain the same as the prior year.

All revenues and expenses associated with the program must be accounted for in a separate fund. By law, these revenues can only be spent to provide school lunches and pay certain closely related expenses.

Revenues consist of:

- Lunch sales to student and adults
- A-La-carte sales to students and adults
- Federal aid (generally, commodities)
- State aid provided on each lunch served
- Federal subsidies for food served to students from families with low incomes
- Catering sales to groups using the schools

Expenses consist primarily of food and labor costs.

Revenue, expense, and fund balance information follows. In the preliminary budget, expenditures exceed revenues by \$84,840.

Community Services

Community Education programs provide school district residents with the opportunity to use educational facilities and programs during non-school hours. Community Education programs are also available to K-12 students during the summer. Major programs include Adult Basic Education, Wishes (after-school enrichment program), Home Base (latch-key programs), Wayzata Plus (kindergarten combined with latch-key to provide full-day services), and Peppermint Fence Nursery School and other Early Childhood Family Education programming.

The Community Education Department also schedules the use of the district's facilities outside of school hours, including athletic facilities.

Fiscal Year 2011 revenue is budgeted at \$7,516,861 for a decrease of 3.2% when compared to FY 2010. Expenditures are budgeted at \$7,606,896 for a decrease of less than 1.0%.

The decreases in revenue and expense are primarily attributable to increased costs in the category of school-aged care, including the Wayzata Plus Program for kindergarten. In addition, there has been an increase in the number of families that qualify for scholarships, which requires the district to subsidize or discount the fees collected. School-aged care comprises over 60% of the Community Education budget in Wayzata.

Health and Safety Activity

Wayzata Public Schools continues to budget all activities associated with Health and Safety projects separately. Types of projects within this activity include hazardous substance removal, fire and safety code repair systems, indoor air quality, ADA and OSHA compliance, and asbestos removal.

Any single Health and Safety project may not exceed \$500,000 in cost. Projects that exceed \$500,000 must be financed via a separate provision known as the Alternative Facilities program. The Alternative Facilities program is quite similar to the Health and Safety program in most respects. However, the Minnesota Department of Education requires that expenditures for Alternative Facilities projects be recorded in the Construction Fund. Alternative facilities revenue is initially received in the Health & Safety account, then transferred to the Construction Fund.

In Wayzata, Health and Safety revenue and Alternative Facilities revenue consists entirely of property tax revenue. State approval of each project is required before the district can collect the revenue. This program often runs at a deficit in the school district due to the structure of the financing mechanism for the program, although currently Wayzata carries a positive balance. There is sometimes a long elapsed time period between a project's inception and the collection of the tax levy funding the project, and it is often not feasible or advisable to delay projects until the revenue is in hand.

Health and Safety revenue for FY 2011 is \$773,907, and Alternative Facilities revenue is \$2,603,200 (to be transferred to the construction fund for expenditure). The total expenditure for health & safety will be \$591,075.

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Construction Fund

The construction fund is used for three purposes:

- Expenses of construction projects financed with bond proceeds;
- Expenses of alternative facilities projects (health and safety projects exceeding \$500,000); and
- Expenses associated with the capital projects (technology) levy.

The revenue budget is \$8,505,715. This is comprised of \$5,902,515 from the general fund for the capital projects levy, and \$2,603,200 for alternative facilities projects.

The expenditure budget is \$7,502,515. This includes an alternative facilities project at East Middle School and technology expenditures of \$5,902,515. Any unused amounts will be carried forward to further years.

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Debt Service Fund

The debt service fund is designated to account for revenues and expenditures associated with redemption of bonds issued by the school district. These bonds were issued to finance the acquisition, improvement and equipping of the district's buildings. By state law, debt service revenues and expenditures must be maintained in a separate fund.

Revenue consists of local taxes levied to pay the obligations, plus interest earnings on the balance in the fund. Expenses consist of principal and interest on bonds, plus a small amount for bank fees, service fees, etc.

The district's underlying bond rating by Moody's Investors Service is Aaa and the district's underlying bond rating by Standard & Poor's is AAA. This rating was upgraded and affirmed in May 2010, when the district issued bonds. These ratings are the highest received of any school district in the State of Minnesota.

The debt service fund budget for FY 2011 shows revenue of \$10,472,007 and expense of \$10,336,474. The fund balance is projected to increase to \$2,092,437 by June 30, 2011. No bond issuance for new projects is expected in FY 2011.

2009-2010 School Year Highlights

Wayzata Public Schools strives each year to be a “model of excellence among learning communities” and regularly achieves accomplishments that demonstrate the overall quality of the district. The highlights for the 2009-10 school year include the following:

- Wayzata Public Schools’ bond rating by Standard and Poor’s of “AAA’ was reaffirmed.
- The Wayzata High School math team won its third straight state championship. Three students on the math team were also the top three scorers at the state meet. Two of the students tied for first place and one of them is the first in the league’s 26-year history to have a perfect season and a perfect tournament in the same year.
- The Wayzata High School synchronized Swim team won the state championship for the fourth consecutive year and took first place in 10 of the 15 events at the state meet.
- Twenty-two Wayzata High School students were named National Merit Scholarship Finalists and qualify for awards of up to \$10,000 annually for up to four years of undergraduate study.
- More than 88 percent of Wayzata High School’s class of 2010 chose to attend two- or four-year colleges or universities. Students were accepted to prestigious public and private colleges and universities throughout the nation.
- Thirteen WHS students won Minnesota Scholastic Arts awards with one student winning a gold key award at the state level for her entire portfolio and a silver key award at the national level.
- The district’s director of Culinary Express received the Silver Leadership Award from the National Foodservice Achievement Management Excellence Award program.
- The district’s assistant activities director received a “Breaking Barriers” award for her positive impact and contributions towards providing athletic opportunities for girls and women of all races, all ages and all levels of abilities.
- The district’s electrical technician received the Minnesota Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association’s Distinguished Service Award.
- The district’s special services director was named the 2010 Special Education Administrator of the year by the Minnesota Administrators for Special Education
- The district’s communication director received the 2010 Dawn Kay McDowell Leadership Award from the Minnesota School Public Relations Association.
- The district’s executive director of curriculum and instruction was named the 2010 Outstanding Central Office Leader by the Minnesota Association of School Administrators.
- The Wayzata High School Trojets Jazz Funk Dance Team won its third straight state championship.
- Wayzata Public Schools’ students continued to score well on the state MCA-II tests.
- Three WHS students earned perfect scores on the ACT exam and one student earned a perfect score on the SAT exam.

Basic Fund Structure

To understand this budget document, it is helpful to know that there are a number of legal restrictions on how school districts must spend and account for the public funds that they receive. Because of state requirements, Wayzata Public Schools must separate its money into six major areas. They are as follows:

- **General Fund** – Used for all operating expenses for the general purposes of the school district. This fund includes salaries and benefits for teachers, principals, custodians, secretaries, paraprofessionals, and administrators; cost of supplies, textbooks, transportation contracts, utilities, repairs, equipment, and so on.
- **Health and Safety** – Used for essential improvements to district buildings related to protecting the health and safety of the occupants. Expenditures for asbestos removal, fire safety, indoor air quality, and the like can be made with money in this fund. It is actually a subpart of the general fund, but we account for these funds separately in Wayzata, largely because the amounts spent can fluctuate widely from year to year, distorting the apparent spending patterns. Health and Safety money comes from the property tax levy. State approval of all expenditures is required before the District can collect this tax.
- **Food Service Fund** – Used for all expenses related to operating the Culinary Express Department, including food, salaries, benefits, supplies, and equipment. Food Service revenues come primarily from the sale of meals to students and adults. Some federal and state aid is also provided.
- **Community Services Fund** – Used for expenses related to community education programs such as Early Childhood Family Education, Adult Basic Education, Home Base (after-school and summer child care programs), WISHES (summer enrichment programs), and Community Education Programs. Community Services revenue primarily comes from fees charged for the programs, and property tax revenue dedicated to community services.
- **Building Construction Fund** – Used for expenses of major building projects. Proceeds from sale of bonds authorized in an election are placed in this fund. Under recent changes in law and state policy, this fund now is also used for alternative facilities projects (health and safety projects exceeding \$500,000) and for the capital projects levy (technology levy).
- **Debt Service Fund** – Used to pay the debt service on bonds sold to finance construction. These are akin to a homeowner's payments on a mortgage.

Why is all of this important? - It is important to be aware of the fund structure because, ***with very few exceptions, money cannot be transferred from one fund to another.*** So, for example, raising school lunch prices or Home Base tuition is not a solution to a shortfall in the general fund. Similarly, money in the debt service fund or the construction fund cannot be used to pay teacher salaries.

Legislative Action Committee (LAC) 2009-2010 Summary Report

The Wayzata LAC recommends an annual legislative platform to the school board and advocates on behalf of the approved platform during the spring legislative session.

I. Platform and Legislative Results

Platform

Based on a severe deficit forecast for the current biennium, our legislators communicated the unlikelihood of any additional money for education—and a real probability of actual cuts. Accordingly, the LAC re-structured its platform into short-term and long-term sections. The short-term provisions focused on goals which the committee believed were both helpful and reasonable during the current deficit; those goals emphasized legislation which saves local taxpayer and/or district monies, does not increase state costs, minimizes mandates upon the district, and maintains local control. (In contrast, the long-term provisions advocated for programs and initiatives which are more dependent upon increased state funding.) The platform (attached) was approved on January 25, 2010.

Wayzata Advocacy Priorities

LAC advocacy during the session focused on three primary issues:

- 1.) gaining early admission into the Alternative Facilities Program, Stat. 123B.59, subd.1
Existing state law allows districts which have buildings of a certain size and age to participate in a bonding and levy program to address deferred maintenance, repairs, etc. Wayzata becomes eligible to participate in this program in five years. Wayzata seeks early admission because the district could complete more projects at a lower cost to taxpayers due to current low interest rates and construction costs. There would be no net change to taxpayers. Proceeds from bonds issued under this program would be used to accelerate completion of deferred projects.
- 2.) codifying the state aid shifts of 73/27 implemented in 2009 by the Governor
The shift delays payment of 27% of funds due a district until the following year, allowing the state to save money in the current year. The other primary method for the state to save on education costs is to actually reduce—not just delay—the per-pupil state aid formula. However, a “codified” shift (i.e. one enacted into law by the legislature rather than simply mandated by the Governor) is preferable because it legally obligates the state to eventually forward the delayed funds to the district, whereas the cut is a permanent reduction in money.
- 3.) defeating a mandatory health insurance program for school districts
Legislation introduced in the last several sessions creates a mandatory state-wide pool of school districts. Research is conflicting and inconclusive as to any cost-savings; several studies suggest the proposed legislation would be detrimental to most metro districts. Wayzata opposes this legislation, which would require Wayzata to abandon its current self-insured program with low annual premium increases and join a state program which could both increase costs and remove local incentives to control such costs.

Review of the Session, February 4 – May 17, 2010

Key influences. Education legislation (or lack, thereof) was influenced by current and future deficits in the state budget; disagreement over education reforms, especially those necessary for the federal Race to the Top program; controversy over a bill authorizing school boards to renew an existing levy; and a late-session Supreme Court ruling limiting the Governor’s budget authority.

The deficit. The initial deficit of \$994 million, established in the February 2010 revised forecast, was reduced to \$536 million early in the session after some initial program cuts. However, the deficit abruptly rose to \$2.92 billion in the final two weeks of the session when \$2.7 billion, representing 2009 gubernatorial unallotments, was added back. The add-back was necessary after the Minnesota Supreme Court ruled that Governor Pawlenty did not have the authority to make such unallotments. (The Governor had used the unallotments/shifts to balance the state budget after the Legislature ended the 2009 session with a deficit budget. Although the court’s ruling technically applies to only one of the unallotments, the opinion is generally interpreted to apply to all of them.)

Achieving a balanced budget. The Governor refused to sign any bill which achieved a balanced budget through a tax increase. Therefore the legislature needed to achieve a balanced budget through cuts equal to the \$2.92 billion deficit. This was done primarily by adopting into law most of the Governor’s improper unallotments and shifts, thus making them legal. (The budget agreement actually specifies three years of school shifts: 73/27 for 2010, 70/30 for 2011, and 90/10 in 2012.) Schools contributed the biggest portion of this budget solution: \$1.963 billion in school aid payment and levy recognition shifts. Unfortunately, \$408 million in anticipated federal Medical Assistance matching funds, which could have been used to help balance the state budget, was not received.

No Omnibus bill. No comprehensive K-12 education bill was passed, although some individual pieces of education-related legislation survived.

Race to the Top implications . The Governor will not authorize the Minnesota Department of Education to apply for the next round of Race to the Top federal grant monies because the Legislature failed to pass the education reforms critical to a successful application. (Minnesota’s first-round application was not successful.)

Results relative to Wayzata #284 interests

Alternative facilities. Our key priority, a request for early admission to the Alternative Facilities program, was eliminated in the final moments. Although the Senate approved the provision, the House had not heard the bill in committee during the session and did not have enough votes to allow the rules to be suspended in order to hear the bill.

Shift codification. Shifts of 73/27 in 2011, 70/30 in 2012, and 90/10 in 2013 were approved as part of the budget agreement. Although we advocated for these “codification-of-the-shifts” as preferable to the alternative—an actual cut in state aid—

the codification means a delay in state payments for the foreseeable future. And continued deficit projections, including a 2012-2013 deficit of \$5.7 billion, makes the state's ability to actually repay the shifts questionable. Practically, the codification allows the state to borrow money from school districts and achieves a balanced budget to the detriment of education.

Mandatory health insurance. As he has done previously, the Governor vetoed the mandatory health insurance bill. The veto was not over-ridden. Wayzata did not support this legislation.

Other legislation of note passed:

- An Early Childhood Omnibus Bill, including the establishment of new criteria for school readiness programs, the approval for districts to spend general community education levy on school readiness, and the establishment of a task force to develop recommendations for coordinating resources, funding, and accountability for birth through kindergarten services, was signed.
- The Pension Sustainability Act, requiring an increase in employer/employee contributions to state employee retirement programs, such as the Teachers Retirement Account (TRA), was passed. The bill gradually raises member and employer TRA contribution rates from the current 5.5% to 7.5% by 2014.
- Physical education is added to the list of state standards beginning in 2012-13, uses standards already adopted by a district, and establishes other recommendations and requirements involving recess, exercise goals, nutrition, and the communication of related district policies to the public.
- The state's ability to borrow money from schools during a cash flow crisis is changed from a mandatory action to an optional tool. Additionally, the amount of a district's fund balance sheltered from borrowing under this law is raised to \$700 per resident pupil.

Other legislation of note not advanced:

- School board authority to renew an existing referendum by board resolution but subject to a reverse referendum was referred back to committee in the final days.
- Education reforms were passed by the Senate but not the House. Proposals included alternative licensure, principal/ teacher evaluations, differentiated and enhanced licensure, pay-related-to-student performance, and responses to low-performing schools.

II. Committee Activities and Membership

Activities

- Met with 284 Senators and Representatives who sit on K-12 education committees for input prior to preparation of our platform
- Proposed a two-part (short-term and long-term sections) legislative platform to the school board, which approved the document on January 25, 2010
- Met individually with legislators, or a staff member, at the Capitol in order to present the approved platform and key priorities
- Attended or observed key hearings and communicated with legislators during the session
- Prepared monthly updates of legislative news for inclusion in newsletters/parent communications at each district school
- Solicited names and created a master advocacy contact list (the “Contact Your Legislator NOW” group) of over 60 district residents who agreed to receive legislative alerts and contact our legislators
- Invited 284 legislators to the June LAC meeting to review the legislative session
- Presented a session regarding Wayzata’s approach to LAC communication and organization as part of AMSD’s November training event for metro area LAC’s
- Regularly attended legislative events sponsored by AMSD, Parent’s United, and Twin West Chamber of Commerce
- Staffed a booth at the district “Parenting those Wonderful Kids” event
- Hosted guest speakers Jim Westrum, Executive Director of Finance and Business, regarding Alternative Facilities Legislation and Jane Sigford, Executive Director of Curriculum and Instruction, regarding federal and state curriculum and instruction issues
- Created a single-page, fold-out alternative to the multi-page “Legislative Toolkit”
- Successfully recruited at least one member from each school
- Met monthly as a full committee from September-June; met at least monthly as a steering committee (July-June); and met as needed as Platform and Communications sub-committees

Membership

21 members represented each K-12 school in the 284 district, as well as the 284 Wayzata Education Association, 284 Family Learning Center, 284 Administration, 284 School Board, and the Caring for Kids Initiative. The committee leadership is a 3 person steering committee comprised of a citizen co-chair, school board co-chair, and the district Director of Communications. (Citizen and board alternates participate informally in the steering committee.)

Legislative Action Committee – 2010 Platform

The state of Minnesota is facing unprecedented budget deficits. The December 2009 announcement of a \$1.2 billion projected shortfall for the current biennium and the projected shortfall of more than \$5 billion for the 2012-2013 biennium has created a dire outlook for our state. In these difficult times, it would be easy to focus on the immediate budget concerns and lose enthusiasm for the initiatives and ideas that would help to transform how we fund and deliver education to our students. To that end, the Wayzata Public Schools Legislative Action Committee (LAC) has organized its 2010 Legislative Platform in two sections: short-term priorities and long-term priorities. The short-term priorities section includes issues to consider for the 2010 legislative session including those issues related to the projected budget deficit. The long-term priorities section includes issues and ideas for stabilizing funding for K-12 schools. The format of this platform is designed to help legislators understand the district's immediate concerns and future vision.

Short-term Priorities

For the 2010 Legislative Session, the Legislature and Governor should:

- ★ Support legislation to allow Wayzata Public Schools to qualify early for the state's alternative facilities program
- ★ Oppose any legislation that would reduce state funding for districts with undesignated fund balances above a specified amount
- ★ Allow the 73/27 aid payment shift to remain in place for the remainder of the 2010-2011 biennium in order to limit other reductions in K-12 funding
- ★ Maintain support and funding for the state's alternative compensation (QComp) program
- ★ Oppose any **mandatory** statewide school employee health insurance pool
- ★ Oppose any **mandatory** shared services initiative
- ★ Allow districts to spend and generate financial resources to best meet local needs, especially when state funding increases are limited
- ★ Reduce or eliminate state-mandated reports and requirements that are unproductive, outdated or not funded

If additional reductions to K-12 funding are necessary to address the \$1.2 billion project shortfall, the Legislature and Governor should:

- ★ Collaborate with the education community to identify funding categories to be reduced
- ★ Consider creative solutions that lead to cost savings for the state and new ways for schools to function
- ★ Adjust policy language in statutes to allow districts to operate differently if funding is decreased
- ★ Understand and communicate to the public that reduced funding levels for schools will require an adjustment in expectations by stakeholders

Long-term Priorities

Investing in the education of Minnesota's children is essential to the continued and future excellence of our state. Cutbacks today will have repercussions well into our future. The platform items noted below underscore the fundamental importance of preparing our students today for the challenges of tomorrow.

Reform Funding to be Simplified, Equitable and Predictable

The Legislature and Governor should:

- ★ Provide adequate and stable funding for schools for the current biennium and into the future
- ★ Fully fund the basic instructional needs of all preK-12 students, recognizing recent research on the cost of educating students
- ★ Pay its full share of special education costs
- ★ Implement location equity index to recognize higher labor costs in the metro area
- ★ Continue support of the teacher alternative compensation (QComp) program

Enhance Local Decision Making which Allows for Innovation, Flexibility and Use of Best Practices

The Legislature and Governor should:

- ★ Allow districts to spend and generate financial resources to best meet local needs, especially when state funding increases are limited
- ★ Reduce or eliminate state-mandated reports and requirements that are unproductive, outdated or not funded
- ★ Oppose any **mandatory** statewide school employee health insurance pool
- ★ Oppose any **mandatory** shared services initiative

Invest More in Our Youngest Learners

The Legislature and Governor should:

- ★ Increase funding for programs and services for children ages birth-K and their families
- ★ Allow flexibility for districts to use school readiness funds to best meet local needs
- ★ Fully fund voluntary all-day, every-day kindergarten while recognizing the cost and time needed to secure additional classrooms
