Mr. Mase explained that the school needs to have 10 students enrolled by August 10, 2015. Community members discussed possibilities for getting at least one more student in the village by that time.

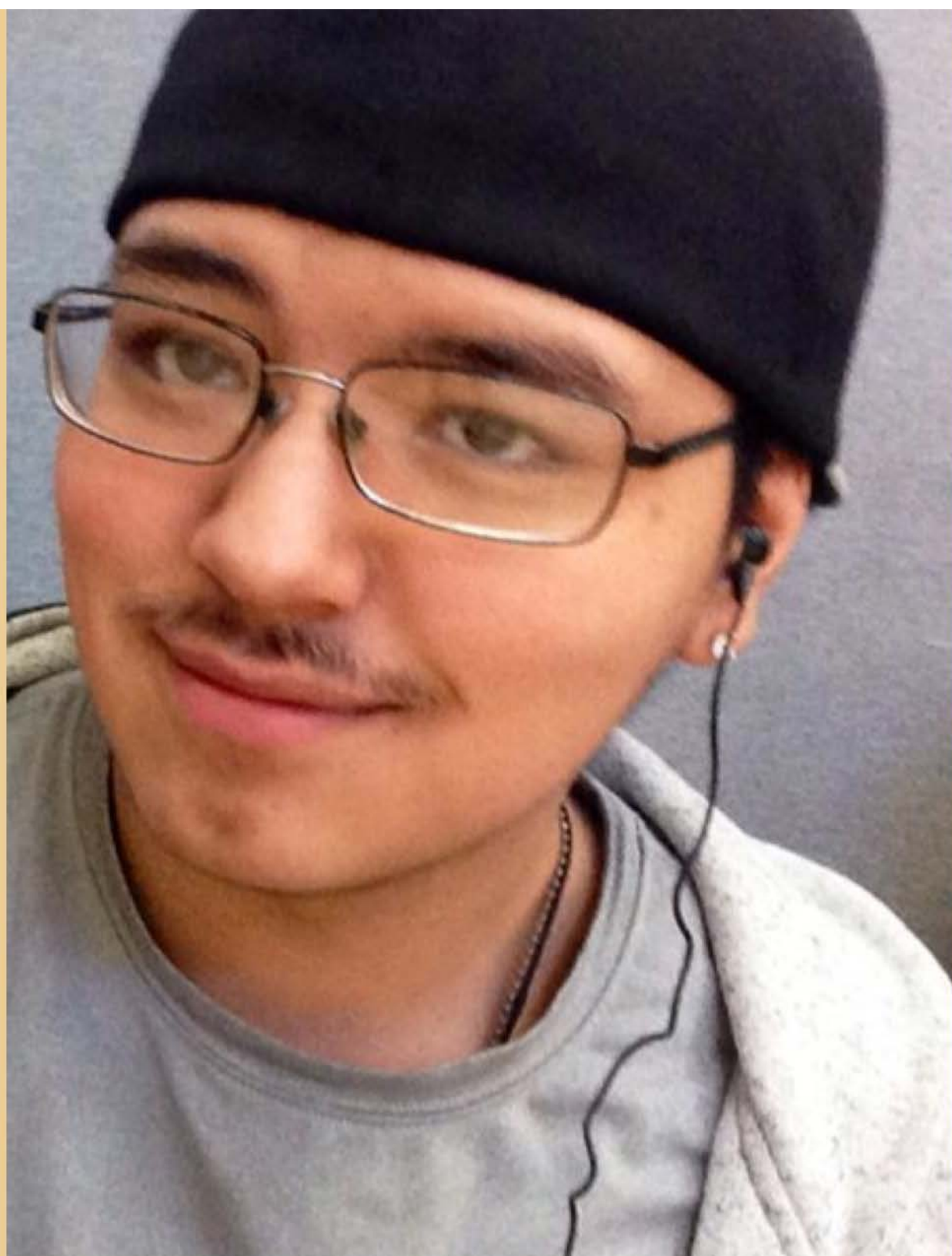

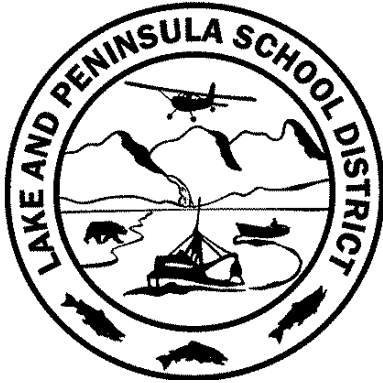

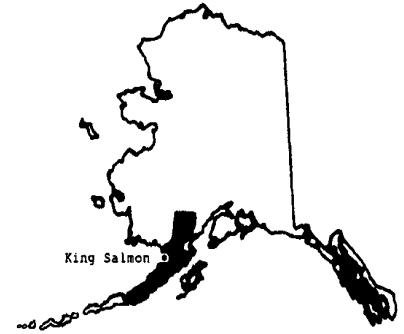

Re: Superintendent's Report - May 2015

As we close the school year and reflect back, I have mixed emotions. On one hand we have worked hard to do what has become the norm in LPSD, provide an impressive education and extracurricular activities for our students. On the other hand, it has been a political / financial rollercoaster. With each passing year it becomes more difficult to maintain the system of excellence that we have built. I say this because it is becoming increasingly obvious that we will need more local support from our Borough.

Next week we will ask our Borough for approximately 1.3 million in local contributions (up from \$722,000). Based on this increase, we will still be approximately \$200,000 into our reserves and we will have to continue to look for ways to become more efficient. While this contribution is not the cap, it is about three times the minimum set contribution and is a significant financial request.

The Board did a great job stressing the importance of funding our educational system at the last joint meeting, but we need to continue promoting our cause. We have to send the message that "our children are the priority of the region." If you are able attend, I would appreciate having you stand with me at this next assembly meeting, Monday, May 11th. If you cannot travel next Monday for the Assembly meeting, I ask that you call in to support our budget request.

There will also be a "sporting tax" presentation that has the potential to greatly increase local revenues, taking some of the strain off the ever-increasing needs of the school district. This idea has potential but will need regional support to be successful. I will get more information on this proposal to the Board early next week.

Our Borough was founded 25 years ago for Education. If LPSD is to continue into the future with a system of education we can be proud of, we will need not only continued, but further support from the Borough. We will need to be the #1 priority of the region.

ANE Grant:

- Distance tutoring was once again a success this year, in a large part due to the excellent oversight of Linda Richter. There is always room for improvement, but Linda has really been able to get the distance-tutoring program dialed in. Dozens of students across the district received tutoring, via Blackboard Collaborate, in a variety of subject areas that were tailored to the students' needs. We are looking forward to continuing the online tutoring program in the future. The biggest hurdle for the program will be figuring out funding, given that this is the last year for the ANE Grant.
- We have worked hard this year to develop in-state relationships with UAA, and UAF. I am happy to report that it looks as though we are forming some partnerships that could result in many of next year's on-site and online tutors coming from UAA and UAF.
- As this is the third and final year of *LPSD's An Exceptional Approach: University Partnerships Project*, we are required to provide final reporting in late May/beginning of June after AMP data has been received.

Curriculum:

- New Common Core aligned assessments in Reading, Writing, and Math are being finalized, as well as materials and standards in Employability and Technology. This was a huge task, and I think everyone involved is relieved in almost being finished. These assessments and materials will be valuable in determining if a student is ready to exit a level- key to our performance based system. The next step in this process will be to get everything posted to Moodle so that materials are ready to be used in the fall.
- Student Record End-of-Year Checkouts have been emphasized extensively this spring. These forms, which are filled out by teachers, are detailed descriptions of where students are at, at the end of a year. Given that our system is not based on seat-time, a student can be part way through a level at the end of the year. These forms are essential to students being able to walk in, in the fall, and pick up where they left off. They also help new teachers, who are coming in, identify where their students are at.
- With the budget crunch in mind, we have to think outside the box in terms of how we will deliver instruction and professional development in the future. For example, in the past we have typically flown committees in to work on creating assessments and materials. Instead, this year we met via Blackboard to meet in committees. I appreciate the flexibility of our teachers and other staff for working within our new parameters. Being aware of these challenges, and thinking of solutions given our limited funding, will become more crucial in the years to come. Fortunately we have some wonderfully talented and resourceful educators in this district that are willing to work with the resources we do have.

Professional Development in April:

- A professional Development Needs Survey was given to staff in late April to help identify areas of need for next year. Some of the specific areas of need that teachers identified were- teaching in multi-level classrooms; training on programs, specifically Units of Study in Writing and use of the Envision and Prentice Hall Math program; more collaborative planning time between teachers; efficient use of Educate for planning and recording; and using resources aligned to the Common Core in instruction. These topics will be the main focus of our professional development sessions next year.
- The August New-Teacher-Induction, as well as the August In-service is already being planned. The New-Teacher-Induction will take place in King Salmon on August 9-11, and whole-district in-service days will be August 12-14. The whole-district in-service days will meet via Blackboard Collaborate, due to budget constraints. This will be a new way to deliver our back-to-school professional development and training. I am optimistic that we will be able to make it work.

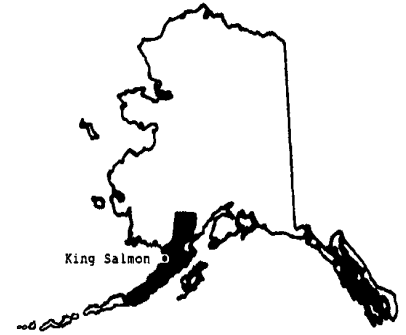
Impact Aid

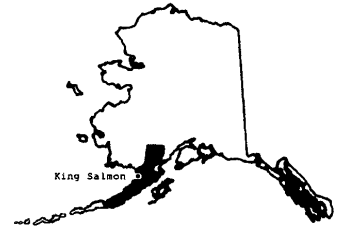
Alaska Construction Academy/Denali Foundation Grant

Linda Johnson Memorial Scholarship Fund (“LJMS”) Committee By-Laws
The Lake and Peninsula School Board and The Lake and Peninsula Borough Assembly

Purpose

The Linda Johnson Memorial Scholarship Fund was established by the Lake and Peninsula School District (the “District”) as a memorial to the late Linda Anelon Johnson, a former member of The Lake and Peninsula School Board who was thirty-six when she died in a snow-machine accident. The Linda Johnson Memorial Scholarship Committee (the “Committee”) serves to administer the District’s program for awarding scholarships, as more fully set forth in these Bylaws, as may be amended from time to time. In all its activities and actions, the Committee shall be bound by these Bylaws.

Organization and Responsibilities of the Committee

The Committee is comprised of the Superintendent or his designee and one or more volunteer board member(s) appointed annually by the Lake and Peninsula School Board President during the November Board meeting. In the event of a vacancy, the School Board President may appoint a replacement Committee member.

The Committee reserves the right to establish both the amount and number of scholarships it deems necessary and appropriate. The aggregate amount of scholarships awarded shall not exceed the amount of available funds. The Committee will report to the School Board, at the May regular meeting, or upon request, the names and amounts of scholarships awarded.

The Committee will also select the District's designee for the Alaska Teacher Scholarship Loan Program.

Scholarship Committee Procedures:

1. The Committee will operate under the established guidelines.
2. Each January, applications will be sent to every Lake and Peninsula School District senior.
3. Each July, an attempt will be made to contact potential sustaining scholars.
4. All scholarship applicants will be notified of the status of their application within a reasonable timeframe.
5. Scholarship payments will be released only if verification of acceptance or enrollment is received. **Deferments may be allowed at the discretion of the Scholarship Committee.**
6. All scholarship payments will be made directly to the academic institution.

LJMS GUIDELINES:

Eligibility

To be eligible for consideration for the Linda Johnson Memorial Scholarship, a student must:

NEW HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES:

- Graduate from a school within the District
- Provide a copy of an acceptance letter or course schedule from the educational institution the student will be attending
- Submit a completed LJMS application

SUSTAINING SCHOLARS/FORMER LPSD

GRADUATES:

- **If previously enrolled in post-secondary institution**, must have maintained an academic load of traditional full-time students, as defined by carrying a course load of at least 12 academic hours in an undergraduate or technical school program

- **If previously enrolled in post-secondary institution**, must have maintained a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.0
- **If previously enrolled in post-secondary institution**, must have maintained self as a student in good standing
- May receive the scholarship for up to 5 years if he/she attended high school only in the District; otherwise, the recipient is limited being a recipient for the number of high school years a LPSD school was attended
- **If a former LPSD student who did not apply during his/her senior year, the student may still be considered for LJMS Scholarship funding for up to 5 years after graduation, and will maintain eligibility as described above**

Application Components

NEW HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES/FORMER LPSD GRADUATES:

- (a) Cover letter which explains reason financial assistance is needed, and lists all other scholarships applied for or granted
- (b) **A district-representative** signed copy of high school transcript reflecting all grades to date
- (c) Letter of recommendation from either a principal and/or a teacher who is familiar with the student’s character and academic history. **Former LPSD graduates may substitute a letter from an employer, and instructor, or academic advisor.**
- (d) A 500 word narrative which both details applicant's four years as a high school student and reflects applicant's goals for the future. This essay should accent any school and/or community activities or functions which applicant may have participated in during high school. **Former LPSD graduates may modify narrative to include post-secondary work experience and motivation for returning to school.**
- (e) Notification of acceptance to post-secondary school, if available at time of application

SUSTAINING SCHOLARS:

- A written request for sustaining scholarship funding
- A copy of most recent transcript, indicating that a 2.0 cumulative GPA has been maintained
- A copy of course schedule for the upcoming semester indicating that course-load is a minimum of 12 academic hours

Application Deadlines

NEW HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES:

Applications are due at District Office by March 31, 5:00 p.m. or next work day if the 31st falls on a weekend.

SUSTAINING SCHOLARS/FORMER LPSD GRADUATES:

Sustaining Scholars: A written request, to include proof of continued eligibility as described above, is due at District Office by August 15, 5:00 p.m. or next work day if the 15th falls on a weekend.

Former LPSD Graduates: Application components referenced above are due at the District Office by August 15, 5:00 p.m. or the next work day, if the 15th falls on a weekend.
