**MINUTES OF THE RETREAT OF THE
AMBOY COMMUNITY UNIT SCHOOL DISTRICT #272 BOARD OF EDUCATION
TUESDAY, APRIL 7, 2026 AT 5:00 P.M.
AMBOY JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL CAFETERIA**

The Board of Education Retreat was called to order at 5:00 p.m. Katie Pratt, Nichole Stenzel, Elsa Payne, Nick Brokaw, Rory White, Drew Montavon, and Mandy Powers were present. Also present were Superintendent Nichols, Janet Crownhart, Andrew Full, Jessica Meusel and Katie Bulfer.

Mr. Nichols began with the State of the District:

- Enrollment trend- 688 as of January 2026
- Current Revenue= \$14,172,911 or 94%
- Current Expenses= \$11,076,492 or 64%
- Fund balances, O & M trend, transportation fund were reviewed.
- Per student spending- instructional \$8,412, operational \$19,037
- IAR, ACT/ISA assessment results and trends, ISBE's ESSA goals reviewed.
- Buildings and Grounds going forward-High School parking lot and Central playground blacktop area, east wing boilers at Central, High School auditorium upgrades, ceiling tiles at HS and Central, HS bleachers, JH locker rooms, Health Life Safety Plan.
- Finances going forward- Push for \$20 minimum wage for support staff, enrollment has declined by 34% since 2001, federal revenue unknowns.
- Going forward- RTI/Remediation at Central and JH, access to viable curriculum for all students, SEL, technology integration/ usage and AI, school improvement plans and goals, professional development, and District Strategic Plan is in its 3rd year.

Principal's Presentation presented by Crownhart, Full, Meusel, and Bulfer:

- Priority Area #1- Recruit and Retain High Quality Staff
 - District Staff handbooks and Special Ed Handbooks completed and shared with all staff. Handbooks are updated regularly.
 - Job Fairs.
 - Staff recognition. Awards/pins will be given for milestone years of service
 - Mentor program.
 - Professional Learning
 - Heavy discussions were had regarding student and teacher use of AI.
 - 5 Essentials- Quality Professional Development
 - Central: 66 strong
 - AJHS: 44 neutral
 - AHS: +4 to 53 neutral
 - Coaching support
 - Walk-throughs with feedback by admin: Crownhart visits non-tenured teachers 1x/week and tenured teachers 1x every 2 weeks at the high school.
 - 5 Essentials- Instructional Leadership
 - Central: 62 strong
 - AJHS: 44 neutral
 - AHS: +14 to 61 strong
 - Teacher Collaboration
 - 5 Essentials- Collaborative Teachers
 - AJHS: 36 weak
 - AHS: +5 to 38 weak
- Priority Area #2- Maintain and Improve School Facilities and Financial Health.

- Tabled this section to next board meeting.
- Priority Area #3- Address emotional and mental health needs of students and staff.
 - Implement SEL curriculum K-12
 - Central- Implemented Leader in Me for 25-26
 - JH- Caring School Community
 - HS- Josten's
 - SAEBERS: Social, Academic, and Emotional Behavior Risk Screener is the K-12 risk screener.
 - SAEBERS data at Central used for: Check and Connect, Behavior Contract, Reward System, Peer Buddy, Small Group Social Work, individual Visuals, Alternate Seating, Regulation Strategies, One on One Social Work, Nexxus, Sinnissippi, and more.
 - Sensory room at Central is being used daily by core group of students, but other students benefit from time in the room when needed.
 - More teachers are having to "parent" and teach. There has been an increase in students that have more SEL needs.
 - SAEBERS data at Jr High used to flag students with poor ratings and set up meeting with Mr. Delimata, Ms. Stringer (student mentor), or Mr. Zarembski (Social Worker), also refer students to Sara Herebia (Sinnissippi Counselor).
 - SAEBERS data at HS used to pull names of at-risk students, monitor, hallway check-ins with students, teacher check-ins
 - ROE Mentor Program at JH
 - 53 behaviors last year to 26 behaviors this year in the fall. 51% decrease in behaviors from last year. Several students have achieved at least 1 of their SMART goals they set with 8 students having to increase their goals for exceeding their own expectations. 22 students unexpectedly seeked out mentor for walk-in support. 21/35 students increased their attendance from last year to this year.
 - ROE Mentor Program at HS
 - Students passing all classes increased from 66% to 72.8%, attendance increased from 91% to 94%, behaviors decreased from 57 to 26, OSS Days increased from 9.5 to 16.5.
 - Andrew and Janet reviewed JH and HS extra-curriculars
 - Discipline- total incidents at high school= 174, junior high= 117.
 - Attendance- Central= 129 students with 5 or more absences and 28 students with 10 or more absences, JH= 103 students with 8 or more absences and 42 with 14 or more, 4 students with over 30, 9 students with perfect attendance, HS= 88 students with 8 or more absences, 39 students with 14 or more absences, 7 students with 43 absences, 8 students have perfect attendance. 8 absences or more considers you to not be college/career ready.
- Priority Area #4: Prepare students to be college and career ready through new/innovative programming.
 - Central 2026-2027 schedule- Art will remain in morning, WIN and Guided Reading will be within first 2 weeks of school, Summer School (invite-only of Tier 2 and Tier 3 students), master schedule will be reworked for current special ed caseload using IEP minutes.
 - Central projected enrollment- ECE= 3, preschool= 40, Kindergarten= 35, 1st =41, 2nd= 54, 3rd= 40, 4th= 45
 - ELA Curriculum Exploration- 7 yr contract with Wit and Wisdom expires at end of school year.
 - Central School Reading and Math Data reviewed, and reviewed student movement between tiers. IAR test scores for Central were also reviewed.

- Full reviewed 2026-2027 schedule. Schedule structure= 8 period days. Curriculum changes: potentially moving math down to one period instead of a block, adding another section of 7th grade US History, and having 3 sections of Health for 7th grade.
 - 12 7th grade students will retake 7th grade US History in 8th grade. These students will take an integrated social studies course in 8th grade but will not take the same 8th grade social studies course as the rest of the class. 8th grade social studies will not need to be made up. These students will move on to freshman social studies classes upon completion of 8th grade.
- Full also reviewed 5 Essentials Data, and IAR ELA and Math trends.
 - Advanced Math was discussed. It was stated that there are not enough students to support an "Advanced Math" class due to the lack of students who "Exceed Expectations" on the IAR test. In 2025, 1 student in 5th, 6th, and 7th grades scored in the "exceeded expectations" category, and 3 8th grade students, however, potential "Advanced Math" students from benchmark testing (over 75th percentile on all 3 benchmarks) in Winter 2025: 5th grade 14%, 6th grade 5%, 7th grade 13%, and 8th grade 16%. Other reasons given for not offering "Advanced Math" to junior high students is because of scheduling issues due to block classes, and a loss of a year's instruction between 4th and 5th grade.
- Currently there are 5 students at risk of retention with 3 that have a chance to still pass. With the small number of students and the variety of courses, APEX will be offered at this time.
- Crownhart reviewed Math and ELA goals, Pathways work, Academic opportunities, and ACT/Pre- ACT secure
- 26-27 course changes at HS:
 - Integrated Science for all freshman- replaces physical science and incorporates all science concepts. Placement test available to skip.
 - Transitional ELA- students could sign-up or be hand-picked
 - 21st Century Ready and Computer Concepts combined
 - Physics will return as a course option
- 52/61 students graduated in 2025 (85.2%)
- Priority Area #5: Develop and maintain partnerships to engage students and encourage them to be invested in the community.
 - Tabled to next board meeting.

At 8:38 p.m. a motion was made by Montavon and seconded by Stenzel to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried unanimously upon roll call.

**MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE

THURSDAY, APRIL 16, 2026 AT 6:30 P.M.
AMBOY JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL CAFETERIA**

President Pratt called the regular meeting of the Board of Education to order at 6:30 p.m. All board members were present except White. Also present were Yvonne Vicks, Angie Dallam, Tina Eller, Renee Selover, Joanie Zimmerly, Aubrey Burke, Mark Becker, Anna Willis, Jeannine Otto, Kelly Klein, Janet Crownhart, Andrew Full, Jessica Meusel, Jenny Apple, and several audience members to see the Central School presentation.

President Pratt opened the floor for public comments. Central School Social Worker, Renee Selover presented 'Leader in Me' with several students sharing the 7 Habits Tree. Angie Dallam and Tina Eller shared their concerns about math scheduling and missed opportunities. Pratt and Crownhart stated that this has been and will continue to be discussed.

Board Committee Reports: Discussed Priority Areas that didn't get discussed during the retreat.

#2 – Maintain and Improve School Facilities and Financial Health: Mr. Nichols provided a Transportation Report and discussed routes, drivers, leasing, funds, and fleet. He then went on to Operations and Maintenance and discussed several of the projects that are completed and/or in the process.

#5 – Develop and Maintain Partnerships to Engage Students and Encourage Them to be Invested in the Community: The three Principals discussed what they are doing for their students in this particular area.

A motion was made by Powers and seconded by Montavon to approve the consent agenda items, as presented:

- Minutes of the March 19, 2026 open & closed meetings;
- The 2026-2027 IESA Registration; and
- Delete audio recordings dated October 17, 2024.

Motion carried unanimously upon roll call.

A motion was made by Brokaw and seconded by Payne to approve the Board of Education meeting dates, as presented. Motion carried unanimously upon roll call.

Superintendent Nichols reviewed the financial reports. The district has received 96% of the anticipated revenue for the year and \$549,702 in sales tax revenue. This represents around 100% of the anticipated local revenue and 73% of the anticipated Evidence Based Funding. The district has used 72% this fiscal year.

A motion was made by Stenzel and seconded by Brokaw to approve the current expenditures and payroll, as presented. Motion carried unanimously upon roll call.

Principals Andrew Full, Janet Crownhart, and Jessica Meusel reviewed their presented reports that consist of curriculum and school improvement, PBIS, school activities, and end of year dates.

For his report, Superintendent Nichols noted on items from the maintenance report. 1) Replaced heat exchanger in Central's music room and added a vent to the next door book room. 2) Repaired boiler pipes in Central's basement. 3) Summer workers helped clean up around the schools. 4) Helm is working on getting the concrete slabs poured for the bleacher project and after sewer line back-up, look into a backflow preventer.

FOIA Requests: 1) Justin Wenig requested purchasing records. Molly Noble responded in a timely manner. 2) CT Mills, Public Info Access LLC, wanted records identifying the full name, official title, and district-issued work email address for the individuals responsible for leadership and supervision for particular subjects. Mr Nichols responded with the available records and ⁵link to our district website. He also informed him that

we are a small district and most of these responsibilities fall on either the Superintendent or the Building Administrators.

Received first reading of the 2026-2027 fee schedule. The district fees have remained the same for at least the last eight years. Total fee revenue so far this year is \$68,203. Individual building fees vary by class. Purchasing an Individual Sports Pass for all sports would cost \$215, so we are raising that from \$110 to \$150 and the Family All Sports Pass from \$150 to \$190.

Received first reading of Issue 121 of the Illinois Association of School Boards policy revisions.

At 7:54 p.m., a motion was made by Powers and seconded by Montavon to move to executive session to discuss the appointment, employment, compensation, discipline, performance, or dismissal of specific employees, specific individuals who serve as independent contractors in an educational setting; collective negotiating matters between the public body and its employees or their representatives; and student discipline. Motion carried unanimously upon roll call.

At 8:45 p.m., a motion was made by Montavon and seconded by Brokaw to return to open session. Motion carried unanimously upon roll call.

A motion was made by Stenzel and seconded by Montavon to approve the suspensions of students 4-16-26-1 through 4-16-26-4, as presented. Motion carried unanimously upon roll call.

A motion was made by Powers and seconded by Stenzel to accept the retirement resignation of Maureen Harris as Assistant Head Cook, effective May 27, 2026 and the resignation of Pamela Morris as Custodian, effective April 7, 2026. Motion carried unanimously upon roll call.

A motion was made by Brokaw and seconded by Montavon to approve the following personnel, pending successful criminal background checks, proper licensure, and submission of pre-employment requirements: Tabitha Berogan as Cook, effective April 7, 2026, Shellie Hansen as Bus Aide, Mark Schuemann as Substitute Bus Driver, and Kimzey Spreeman as 6th Grade Math Teacher, effective for the 2026-2027 school year. Motion carried unanimously upon roll call.

President Pratt announced the next meeting date:

Regular Meeting - Thursday, May 14, 2026 – 6:30 p.m. – Junior High School

There being no further business to bring before the Board, a motion was made by Powers and seconded by Stenzel to adjourn the meeting at 8:48 p.m. Motion carried unanimously upon roll call.

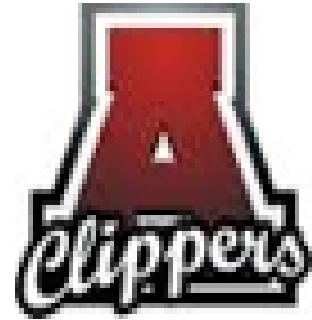

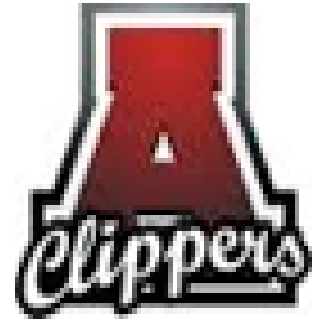


Curriculum and School Improvement
