1.A Election of Secretary Pro Tem - The Board elected Afeef as Secretary Pro Tem due to Falk's absence.

3.A Recognition of Visitors – Vice President Nolan and Superintendent Mongan welcomed attendees and those watching remotely.

3.B Public Comments – Public comments were shared regarding concerns about transgender issues and LGBTQ topics in school.

4. Action Items

4.A Consent Agenda– Business Manager Pflug reviewed the revenues and expenditures. Numbers presented are pre-audit numbers and some adjustments will be made. The District did not receive any impact or transition fees since the last Board meeting, so they will be under budget for FY23. The Board will be asked to approve end of June bills as well as July bills. NKRVS had some late June bills but no July bills. The audit will begin on August 7, 2023.

4.B Approve Cross Country Overnight Trip – The Cross Country team will travel to Peoria for an overnight trip September 8-9, 2023. They have participated in this event for several years.

4.C Approve Elementary Handbook Revisions – The Board approved the proposed revisions to the elementary Handbook that were discussed at the June Board meeting.

- 4.I Approve Prom Venue for SY24 and SY25 - Athletics and Activities Director Juske shared that we are working with Pinstripes to host prom for the 2023-2024 and 2024-2025 school years as they can accommodate us on the dates we want, but we hope to move back to the Q Center in the future.
- 4.J Approve Concrete Bid - Facilities Director Polowy explained that this bid is for exterior concrete work for the high school addition. The lowest responsible bid was from Ed Fogarty Concrete Construction. While we have not worked with them in the past, our construction management company has numerous times.
- 4.K Approve Excavation/Site Utilities Bid - Facilities Director Polowy explained that this bid is for exterior land work for the high school addition. The lowest responsible bid was from Stark and Son Trenching, Inc., with whom we have worked in the past.
- 5. Information Items
 - 5.A Facilities Update – Facilities Director Polowy shared that the department is busy preparing to start on the addition at CHS and completing the remodel of the District Office. They have been working on updating the Lily Lake HVAC system and getting buildings cleaned and ready for the next school year. They continue to work on mobile unit flooring, roofs, and door hardware.

 - 6.A Local Labs – We received a FOIA requesting contracts, agreements, invoices, payments, reports, evaluations, and communications with DEI vendors. We requested verification of a secure email address but have not received a response.
 - 6.B Mr. Davis - We received a FOIA requesting employment, benefits, and pension information about IMRF employees earning less than \$75,000. We denied this request as it was unduly burdensome.
 - 6.C Central Education Association - We received a FOIA requesting any and all contracts, invoices and expenses related to the District's use of Embarc and Otus. We were able to comply with this request in part.
 - 6.D Central Education Association - We received a FOIA requesting invoices from the law firm regarding grievances on internal substitution and coursework approvals. We were able to comply with this request in part.
 - 6.E NBC Chicago - We received a FOIA requesting judgments, settlement agreements, insurance and financial costs relating to FOIA request challenges. We were able to comply but had no pertinent information to release.

RE: Board Financial Report

- The Revenue and Expenditure Summary Reports are included in your Board Packet. Revenues are currently at 3.84% compared to 2.36% a year ago. Expenditures are at 7.57% as compared to 6.26% a year ago.
- The district received impact fees for June \$176,832.85 for 23 home starts and July \$180,868.94 for 20 home starts. Transition fees came in this month at \$10,815.00.
- The bills payable reports are typical for the month of August. Included this month is \$743,446 for network switches that is paid through the new the FY2023 Digital Equity Formula Grant funded through ESSER Federal Funding we received.
- Annual audits for both Central 301 and Northern Kane have started. The auditors have been working efficiently and I am anticipating clean audits.
- The district is preparing for the installation of generators at Lily Lake, Howard B. Thomas and Prairie View Grade School for an estimated total cost of \$900,000 in the spring. We have received School Maintenance Project Grant funding of \$100,000 to offset Lily Lake and Howard B. Thomas's projects. We are also preparing for the 20-classroom addition at Central High School, including the FF&E for the teachers' rooms. The project amount is anticipated to be between \$9-11 million, which we will be using current fund balances to finance this project. Included in the board packet are the Applications for Building Permits for the Board of Education to approve and authorize to continue with these projects.

Waiver of Student Fees

The Superintendent will recommend to the School Board a schedule of fees, if any, to be charged students for the use of textbooks, consumable materials, extracurricular activities, and other school student fees. Students must also pay **fees** for the loss of or damage to school books or other school-owned materials.

Fees for textbooks, other instructional materials, and driver education, **as well as fees for the loss or damage of school property** are waived for students who meet the eligibility criteria for a **fee waiver** as described in this policy. In order that no student is denied educational services or academic credit due to the inability of parents/guardians to pay student fees **and fines**, **the following fees are also waived for students who meet the eligibility criteria for waiver: athletic participation fees, lock fees, towel fees, shop fees, laboratory fees and registration fees.** The Superintendent will recommend to the Board which additional fees **and fines**, if any, the District will waive for students who meet the eligibility criteria for **fee a waiver**. ~~Students receiving a fee waiver are not exempt from charges for lost and damaged books, locks, materials, supplies, and equipment.~~

Notification

The Superintendent shall ensure that **a notice of waiver applicability is provided to parents/guardians with every bill for fees and/or fines, and that** applications for **fee** waivers are widely available and distributed according to State law and Ill. State Board of Education (ISBE) rule and that provisions for assisting parents/guardians in completing the application are available.

Eligibility Criteria

A student (**kindergarten through grade 12**) shall be eligible for a fee **and fine** waiver when:

1. **The student currently lives in a household that meets the same income guidelines, with the same limits based on household size, that are used for the federal free meals program;**
2. **The student's parents/guardians are veterans or active-duty military personnel with income at or below 200% of the federal poverty line; or**
3. **The student is homeless, as defined in the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. §11434a).**
4. **The student is in foster care, migrant, or a runaway.**

The Superintendent or designee will give additional consideration ~~when~~ one or more of the following factors are present:

- Illness in the family;
- Unusual expenses such as fire, flood, storm damage, etc.;
- Unemployment;
- Emergency situations;
- When one or more of the parents/guardians are involved in a work stoppage.

Verification

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a process for determining a student's eligibility for a waiver of fees **and fines** in accordance with State law requirements. ~~The Superintendent or designee may require family income verification at the time an individual applies for a fee waiver and anytime thereafter, but not more often than once every 60 calendar days. The Superintendent or designee shall not use any information from this or any independent verification process to determine free or reduced-price meal eligibility.~~

If a student receiving a ~~fee~~ waiver is found to be no longer eligible during the school year, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the student's parent/guardian and charge the student a prorated amount based upon the number of school days remaining in the school year.

Determination and Appeal

Within 30 calendar days after the receipt of a waiver request, the Superintendent or designee shall mail a notice to the parent/guardian whenever a waiver request is denied. The denial notice shall include: (1) the reason for the denial, (2) the process and timelines for making an appeal, and (3) a statement that the parent/guardian may reapply for a waiver any time during the school year if circumstances change. If the denial is appealed, the District shall follow the procedures for the resolution of appeals as provided in the ISBE rule on waiver of fees.

**AFFILIATION AGREEMENT
BETWEEN
Northern Kane County Region 110
AND**

**Animal Clinic of South Elgin
for Student Veterinary Assistant Externship Experience**

THIS AGREEMENT (“Agreement”) is entered into this 26th Day, of April , 2023 by and between Animal Clinic of South Elgin (“**Facility**”), the Board of Education of Central Community Unit School District No. 301 (“**District**”), and Northern Kane Region 100 (collectively the “**Parties**”).

WHEREAS, the District desires to utilize Animal Clinic of South Elgin facility at 896 N La Fox Street, South Elgin, IL 60177 for the purpose of providing veterinary assistant practical learning and clinical experiences (see Exhibit A for program-specific requirements) to the high school students of the District and the high school students of the other school districts in Northern Kane Region 110 (an intergovernmental agreement between Community Unit School District 300, Community Unit School District 301, Community Unit School District 303, and Unit School District U-46); and

WHEREAS, the Facility desires to provide such practical learning and clinical experiences to students, both as a community service and as ongoing education for its own staff.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is understood and agreed upon by the parties hereto as follows:

A. SCHOOL RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. **Provision of foundational curriculum to students.** The District shall have the total responsibility for planning and determining the adequacy of the educational experience of students in theoretical background, basic skill, professional ethics, attitude and behavior, and will assign to the Facility only those students who have satisfactorily completed the prerequisite didactic portion of the District’s curriculum.

2. **Liability insurance.** The Facility and each participating school district shall provide its own General Liability insurance, including but not limited to property loss and damage claims, claims for bodily injury or death, and other civil actions, claims or suits, including the defenses thereof, which may be made against the insured party. No provision of insurance or self-insurance by the District, Northern Kane County Region 110, or other participating school district shall modify, amend, or in any other way remove the immunities of public employees and local governmental entities granted in the *Local Governmental and Governmental Employees Tort Immunity Act*, 745 ILCS 10/1 et seq.

3. **Designation of liaison to Facility; communications relating to clinical placements.** The District and/or Northern Kane County Region 110 will designate a faculty or other professional staff member to coordinate and act as its liaison to the Facility. The

assignments to be undertaken by the students participating in the educational program will be mutually arranged and a regular exchange of information will be maintained by on-site visits when practical and by letter, email or telephone in other instances.

The District shall notify the Facility in writing of any change or proposed change of the person(s) responsible for coordinating clinical placements with the Facility.

4. School notices to students. The District shall notify each student prior to his or her arrival at the Facility that he/she is required to:

- (a) Follow the administrative policies, standards, and practices of the Facility.
- (b) Obtain medical care at his or her own expense for any injuries or illnesses sustained as a direct or indirect result of his/her affiliation with the Facility.
- (c) Provide his/her own transportation.
- (d) Report to the Facility on time and follow all established regulations during the regularly scheduled operating hours of the Facility.
- (e) Conform to the standards and practices established by the District while functioning at the Facility.
- (f) Obtain prior written approval of the Facility and the District before publishing any material relating to the clinical learning experience.
- (g) Meet the personal, ethical, and professional standards required of employees of the Facility and that are consistent with the applicable professional Code of Ethics and the applicable standards of relevant accrediting or regulatory bodies.
- (h) Notify his or her home school district of any medical conditions which may affect participation at the Facility.

B. FACILITY RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. Provision of facilities for supervised experiences. Subject to the provisions of Section C.2 of this Agreement, the Facility agrees to make the appropriate facilities available to the District in order for the District to provide supervised clinical experiences to students. Such facilities shall include a safe working environment conducive to the learning process of the students as intended by the terms of this Agreement and conforming to customary Facility procedures. Students shall be supervised by qualified Facility staff at all times.

2. Facility rules applicable to students during clinical assignments. Students are to remain subject to the authority, policies, and regulations imposed by the District and, during periods of clinical assignment, students will be subject to all rules and regulations

of the Facility and imposed by the Facility on its employees and agents with regard to following the administrative policies, standards, and practices of the Facility. The Facility must notify the District in advance of any specific requirements for the Facility, such as dress code, uniforms, or other workplace rules.

3. Emergency treatment of students. In case of emergency at a non-hospital site, standard procedure will be followed. The District may provide the Facility with specific protocols to be followed for emergency treatment of an individual student, if necessary. The Facility shall immediately notify the District liaison of any student injury or other emergency involving students. It is the student's responsibility to bear the cost of the emergency treatment.

4. Designation of liaison to the District; communications relating to placements. The Facility shall designate a liaison responsible for coordinating the placements. That person shall maintain contact with the District's designated liaison person to assure mutual participation in and surveillance of the program. The Facility shall notify the District in writing of any change or proposed change of the person(s) responsible for coordinating the placements.

5. School Tour of Facility. The Facility shall, on reasonable request, permit a tour of its clinical facilities and services available and other items pertaining to clinical learning experiences, by representatives of the District and agencies charged with responsibility for approval of the facilities or accreditation of the curriculum.

6. Provision of Relevant Facility policies. The Facility shall provide the student(s) and the District the Facility's administrative policies, standards, and practices with which the students must comply relevant to the placement.

7. Facility Transportation and Use of Mobile Units. The Facility must obtain advance written permission from the District for transportation of students by the Facility or its staff or for student participation in any mobile veterinary unit. Such permission must be signed by the Facility staff member, a District representative, the student, and the student's parent or guardian. At no time will one student be alone with any one Facility employee.

8. FERPA Compliance. The Facility shall comply with the applicable provisions of the *Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974*, 20 USC 1232 (g), otherwise known as FERPA or the Buckley Amendment, as well as the *Illinois School Student Records Act*, 105 ILCS 10/1 et seq., and shall take all measures necessary to ensure the confidentiality of any and all information in its possession regarding the District's students who train at the Facility pursuant to this agreement. The Facility shall have access to student record information (records which alone, or with other records, personally identify a student) only to the extent necessary for student participation in the program. The Facility will maintain such records as confidential records and shall not disclose them to third parties except pursuant to court order, in the case of an emergency, or with consent of the District or student and parent/guardian. At the conclusion of a student's participation in the program, the Facility shall return all student records in its

possession to the District or, at the District's request, directly to the student's home school district if other than the District.

C. OTHER RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. **Compliance with client/patient privacy laws.** The District agrees to abide by and require that its participating faculty and students abide by all applicable state and federal laws, rules and regulations regarding client/patient privacy, including but not limited to, laws relating to consumer financial information. Students shall be required to comply with the Facility's policies and procedures regarding the confidentiality of client/patient information and the use of all such information. The Facility will notify the District and students of the foregoing laws and policies applicable to the Facility program. The Parties shall notify one another if there are known breaches of this confidentiality.

The District will advise students that dissemination or public posting of any client/patient information through social media or other means will be prohibited.

2. **Determination of instructional period.** The course of instruction will cover a period of time as arranged between the District and the Facility. The starting clinical date will begin on August 1st, 2023 with the last clinical on July 31st, 2024 .

3. **Determination of number of participating students.** The number of students eligible to participate in the clinical placement will be determined, and may be changed, by mutual agreement of the Parties. For certain clinical programs, IDPH regulations may limit the maximum number of students per sessions. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Facility and the District agree and understand that the availability of clinical placements at the Facility during the term of this Agreement may periodically be affected by a variety of factors. In such event, the Facility may reduce the number of students eligible to participate in the clinical education program with prior notice to the District and adequate time for the District to reassign the student(s) to another clinical site. The Facility agrees further to accommodate students of the District who are similarly displaced from other clinical affiliates of the District to the extent that clinical space is available at the Facility.

4. **Evaluation of students' experiences.** Evaluation of the clinical learning experiences of the students will be accomplished jointly by the appropriate school district staff. The Parties agree that a clinical supervisor must be present throughout the entire time the students are present. Each student must be paired with a Facility staff member and supervised at all times. These Facility staff members will complete evaluations of the student she or he supervises, including but not limited to, evaluating the student's professionalism and personal attributes related to performance of outline skills. Specifically, the supervising Certified Veterinary Technician or Licensed Veterinarian must sign off on all performed skills listed on the Evaluation Form attached to this Agreement as Exhibit A. The Facility staff and the District's externship coordinator will communicate on a regular basis for the purpose of reviewing and evaluating current clinical experiences offered to students.

5. Removal of students.

(a) The District has the right to remove a student from a clinical education program. The District shall notify the Facility of such removal in writing.

(b) The Facility may immediately remove any student participating in a clinical education program from the Facility's premises for behavior that the Facility deems to be an immediate threat to the health or welfare of its clients/patients, staff members, visitors, or operations. In such an event, the Facility shall notify the relevant District staff member in writing of its actions and the reasons for its actions as soon as practicable. If the Facility desires to remove a student for any other reason, it shall notify the relevant District staff member in writing of the reasons for the removal and shall consult with that individual before removing the student.

D. TERM OF AGREEMENT:

The term of this Agreement shall be for one (1) year, to commence on 1st Day of July, 2023 . Either party may terminate this Agreement at any time, with or without cause, upon ninety (90) days prior written notice to the other party. In the event that this Agreement is not renewed for a subsequent term, students who are participating in the clinical learning experiences at the time of termination shall be allowed to complete such assignment under the terms and conditions herein set forth.

E. ADDITIONAL TERMS:

1. **Stipulations as to liability.** Subject to applicable state law, neither party to this Agreement shall be legally liable for the consequences, whether bodily injury or property damage, occasioned by an act, omission, or neglect chargeable to the other party. Where Worker's Compensation or other obligation for payment of benefits may arise, this Agreement shall neither enlarge nor diminish such obligation.

2. **Criminal Background Screening:** Facility staff who come to the District schools to work with students will need to comply with the District's onsite security protocols, including sex offender and criminal background screening.

3. **Assignment of Agreement.** This Agreement may not be assigned without the prior written consent of the other party, which will not be unreasonably withheld.

4. **Entire Agreement.** This Agreement supersedes any and all other agreements, either oral or written, between the parties hereto with respect to the subject matter hereof. No changes or modifications of this Agreement shall be valid unless the same are in writing and signed by the parties. No waiver of any provisions of this Agreement shall be valid unless in writing and signed by the parties.

5. **Severability.** If any provision of this Agreement or the application thereof to any person or situation shall, to any extent, be held invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of

this Agreement, and the application of such provision to persons or situations other than those to which it shall have been held invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected thereby, but shall continue valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permitted by law.

6. Employment Status. No assigned student or District faculty member under this Agreement shall in any way be considered an employee or agent of the Facility nor shall any such student or faculty member be entitled to any compensation, fringe benefits, Worker's Compensation, disability benefits, or other rights normally afforded to employees of the Facility. The students shall not at any time replace or substitute for any employee at the Facility or perform any of the duties normally performed by an employee of the Facility, except as such duties are part of the students' training or learning experience.

7. Notice to Parties. Any notice, demand, or request required or permitted to be given under the provisions of this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given under the earlier of (a) the date actually received by the party in question, by whatever means and however addressed, or (b) the date sent by facsimile (receipt confirmed), or on the date of personal delivery, if delivered by hand, or on the date signed for if sent by an overnight delivery service, to the following addresses, or to such other address as either party may request, in the case of the District, by notifying the Facility, and in the case of the Facility, by notifying the District, or to such other addresses as the parties may specify in writing from time to time:

**AFFILIATION AGREEMENT
BETWEEN
Northern Kane County Region 110
AND**

**Lombard Veterinary Hospital
for Student Veterinary Assistant Externship Experience**

THIS AGREEMENT (“Agreement”) is entered into this 26th Day, of April , 2023 by and between Lombard Veterinary Hospital (“**Facility**”), the Board of Education of Central Community Unit School District No. 301 (“**District**”), and Northern Kane Region 100 (collectively the “**Parties**”).

WHEREAS, the District desires to utilize Lombard Veterinary Hospital facility at 1300 S Main Street, Lombard, IL 60148 for the purpose of providing veterinary assistant practical learning and clinical experiences (see Exhibit A for program-specific requirements) to the high school students of the District and the high school students of the other school districts in Northern Kane Region 110 (an intergovernmental agreement between Community Unit School District 300, Community Unit School District 301, Community Unit School District 303, and Unit School District U-46); and

WHEREAS, the Facility desires to provide such practical learning and clinical experiences to students, both as a community service and as ongoing education for its own staff.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is understood and agreed upon by the parties hereto as follows:

A. SCHOOL RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. **Provision of foundational curriculum to students.** The District shall have the total responsibility for planning and determining the adequacy of the educational experience of students in theoretical background, basic skill, professional ethics, attitude and behavior, and will assign to the Facility only those students who have satisfactorily completed the prerequisite didactic portion of the District’s curriculum.

2. **Liability insurance.** The Facility and each participating school district shall provide its own General Liability insurance, including but not limited to property loss and damage claims, claims for bodily injury or death, and other civil actions, claims or suits, including the defenses thereof, which may be made against the insured party. No provision of insurance or self-insurance by the District, Northern Kane County Region 110, or other participating school district shall modify, amend, or in any other way remove the immunities of public employees and local governmental entities granted in the *Local Governmental and Governmental Employees Tort Immunity Act, 745 ILCS 10/1 et seq.*

3. **Designation of liaison to Facility; communications relating to clinical placements.** The District and/or Northern Kane County Region 110 will designate a faculty or other professional staff member to coordinate and act as its liaison to the Facility. The

assignments to be undertaken by the students participating in the educational program will be mutually arranged and a regular exchange of information will be maintained by on-site visits when practical and by letter, email or telephone in other instances.

The District shall notify the Facility in writing of any change or proposed change of the person(s) responsible for coordinating clinical placements with the Facility.

4. School notices to students. The District shall notify each student prior to his or her arrival at the Facility that he/she is required to:

- (a) Follow the administrative policies, standards, and practices of the Facility.
- (b) Obtain medical care at his or her own expense for any injuries or illnesses sustained as a direct or indirect result of his/her affiliation with the Facility.
- (c) Provide his/her own transportation.
- (d) Report to the Facility on time and follow all established regulations during the regularly scheduled operating hours of the Facility.
- (e) Conform to the standards and practices established by the District while functioning at the Facility.
- (f) Obtain prior written approval of the Facility and the District before publishing any material relating to the clinical learning experience.
- (g) Meet the personal, ethical, and professional standards required of employees of the Facility and that are consistent with the applicable professional Code of Ethics and the applicable standards of relevant accrediting or regulatory bodies.
- (h) Notify his or her home school district of any medical conditions which may affect participation at the Facility.

B. FACILITY RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. Provision of facilities for supervised experiences. Subject to the provisions of Section C.2 of this Agreement, the Facility agrees to make the appropriate facilities available to the District in order for the District to provide supervised clinical experiences to students. Such facilities shall include a safe working environment conducive to the learning process of the students as intended by the terms of this Agreement and conforming to customary Facility procedures. Students shall be supervised by qualified Facility staff at all times.

2. Facility rules applicable to students during clinical assignments. Students are to remain subject to the authority, policies, and regulations imposed by the District and, during periods of clinical assignment, students will be subject to all rules and regulations

of the Facility and imposed by the Facility on its employees and agents with regard to following the administrative policies, standards, and practices of the Facility. The Facility must notify the District in advance of any specific requirements for the Facility, such as dress code, uniforms, or other workplace rules.

3. Emergency treatment of students. In case of emergency at a non-hospital site, standard procedure will be followed. The District may provide the Facility with specific protocols to be followed for emergency treatment of an individual student, if necessary. The Facility shall immediately notify the District liaison of any student injury or other emergency involving students. It is the student's responsibility to bear the cost of the emergency treatment.

4. Designation of liaison to the District; communications relating to placements. The Facility shall designate a liaison responsible for coordinating the placements. That person shall maintain contact with the District's designated liaison person to assure mutual participation in and surveillance of the program. The Facility shall notify the District in writing of any change or proposed change of the person(s) responsible for coordinating the placements.

5. School Tour of Facility. The Facility shall, on reasonable request, permit a tour of its clinical facilities and services available and other items pertaining to clinical learning experiences, by representatives of the District and agencies charged with responsibility for approval of the facilities or accreditation of the curriculum.

6. Provision of Relevant Facility policies. The Facility shall provide the student(s) and the District the Facility's administrative policies, standards, and practices with which the students must comply relevant to the placement.

7. Facility Transportation and Use of Mobile Units. The Facility must obtain advance written permission from the District for transportation of students by the Facility or its staff or for student participation in any mobile veterinary unit. Such permission must be signed by the Facility staff member, a District representative, the student, and the student's parent or guardian. At no time will one student be alone with any one Facility employee.

8. FERPA Compliance. The Facility shall comply with the applicable provisions of the *Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974*, 20 USC 1232 (g), otherwise known as FERPA or the Buckley Amendment, as well as the *Illinois School Student Records Act*, 105 ILCS 10/1 et seq., and shall take all measures necessary to ensure the confidentiality of any and all information in its possession regarding the District's students who train at the Facility pursuant to this agreement. The Facility shall have access to student record information (records which alone, or with other records, personally identify a student) only to the extent necessary for student participation in the program. The Facility will maintain such records as confidential records and shall not disclose them to third parties except pursuant to court order, in the case of an emergency, or with consent of the District or student and parent/guardian. At the conclusion of a student's participation in the program, the Facility shall return all student records in its

possession to the District or, at the District's request, directly to the student's home school district if other than the District.

C. OTHER RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. **Compliance with client/patient privacy laws.** The District agrees to abide by and require that its participating faculty and students abide by all applicable state and federal laws, rules and regulations regarding client/patient privacy, including but not limited to, laws relating to consumer financial information. Students shall be required to comply with the Facility's policies and procedures regarding the confidentiality of client/patient information and the use of all such information. The Facility will notify the District and students of the foregoing laws and policies applicable to the Facility program. The Parties shall notify one another if there are known breaches of this confidentiality.

The District will advise students that dissemination or public posting of any client/patient information through social media or other means will be prohibited.

2. **Determination of instructional period.** The course of instruction will cover a period of time as arranged between the District and the Facility. The starting clinical date will begin on August 1st, 2023 with the last clinical on July 31st, 2024 .

3. **Determination of number of participating students.** The number of students eligible to participate in the clinical placement will be determined, and may be changed, by mutual agreement of the Parties. For certain clinical programs, IDPH regulations may limit the maximum number of students per sessions. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Facility and the District agree and understand that the availability of clinical placements at the Facility during the term of this Agreement may periodically be affected by a variety of factors. In such event, the Facility may reduce the number of students eligible to participate in the clinical education program with prior notice to the District and adequate time for the District to reassign the student(s) to another clinical site. The Facility agrees further to accommodate students of the District who are similarly displaced from other clinical affiliates of the District to the extent that clinical space is available at the Facility.

4. **Evaluation of students' experiences.** Evaluation of the clinical learning experiences of the students will be accomplished jointly by the appropriate school district staff. The Parties agree that a clinical supervisor must be present throughout the entire time the students are present. Each student must be paired with a Facility staff member and supervised at all times. These Facility staff members will complete evaluations of the student she or he supervises, including but not limited to, evaluating the student's professionalism and personal attributes related to performance of outline skills. Specifically, the supervising Certified Veterinary Technician or Licensed Veterinarian must sign off on all performed skills listed on the Evaluation Form attached to this Agreement as Exhibit A. The Facility staff and the District's externship coordinator will communicate on a regular basis for the purpose of reviewing and evaluating current clinical experiences offered to students.

5. Removal of students.

(a) The District has the right to remove a student from a clinical education program. The District shall notify the Facility of such removal in writing.

(b) The Facility may immediately remove any student participating in a clinical education program from the Facility's premises for behavior that the Facility deems to be an immediate threat to the health or welfare of its clients/patients, staff members, visitors, or operations. In such an event, the Facility shall notify the relevant District staff member in writing of its actions and the reasons for its actions as soon as practicable. If the Facility desires to remove a student for any other reason, it shall notify the relevant District staff member in writing of the reasons for the removal and shall consult with that individual before removing the student.

D. TERM OF AGREEMENT:

The term of this Agreement shall be for one (1) year, to commence on 1st Day of July, 2023 . Either party may terminate this Agreement at any time, with or without cause, upon ninety (90) days prior written notice to the other party. In the event that this Agreement is not renewed for a subsequent term, students who are participating in the clinical learning experiences at the time of termination shall be allowed to complete such assignment under the terms and conditions herein set forth.

E. ADDITIONAL TERMS:

1. **Stipulations as to liability.** Subject to applicable state law, neither party to this Agreement shall be legally liable for the consequences, whether bodily injury or property damage, occasioned by an act, omission, or neglect chargeable to the other party. Where Worker's Compensation or other obligation for payment of benefits may arise, this Agreement shall neither enlarge nor diminish such obligation.

2. **Criminal Background Screening:** Facility staff who come to the District schools to work with students will need to comply with the District's onsite security protocols, including sex offender and criminal background screening.

3. **Assignment of Agreement.** This Agreement may not be assigned without the prior written consent of the other party, which will not be unreasonably withheld.

4. **Entire Agreement.** This Agreement supersedes any and all other agreements, either oral or written, between the parties hereto with respect to the subject matter hereof. No changes or modifications of this Agreement shall be valid unless the same are in writing and signed by the parties. No waiver of any provisions of this Agreement shall be valid unless in writing and signed by the parties.

5. **Severability.** If any provision of this Agreement or the application thereof to any person or situation shall, to any extent, be held invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of

this Agreement, and the application of such provision to persons or situations other than those to which it shall have been held invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected thereby, but shall continue valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permitted by law.

6. Employment Status. No assigned student or District faculty member under this Agreement shall in any way be considered an employee or agent of the Facility nor shall any such student or faculty member be entitled to any compensation, fringe benefits, Worker's Compensation, disability benefits, or other rights normally afforded to employees of the Facility. The students shall not at any time replace or substitute for any employee at the Facility or perform any of the duties normally performed by an employee of the Facility, except as such duties are part of the students' training or learning experience.

7. Notice to Parties. Any notice, demand, or request required or permitted to be given under the provisions of this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given under the earlier of (a) the date actually received by the party in question, by whatever means and however addressed, or (b) the date sent by facsimile (receipt confirmed), or on the date of personal delivery, if delivered by hand, or on the date signed for if sent by an overnight delivery service, to the following addresses, or to such other address as either party may request, in the case of the District, by notifying the Facility, and in the case of the Facility, by notifying the District, or to such other addresses as the parties may specify in writing from time to time:

8. Governing Law. This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois, without regard to the conflict of laws provisions thereof.

9. Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument.

10. No Third-Party Beneficiaries. This Agreement shall inure exclusively to the benefit of and be binding upon the parties hereto and their respective successors, assigns,

executors and legal representatives. Nothing in this Agreement, expressed or implied, is intended to confer on any person other than the parties hereto or their respective successors and assigns any rights, remedies, obligations or liabilities under or by reason of this Agreement.

11. Agreement binding on parties successors and assigns. This Agreement shall be binding upon the District and the Facility, their successors, employees, agents and assigns, during the initial term of this Agreement and any extensions thereof.

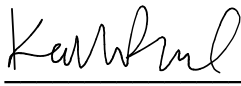

I am requesting the approval of EF's Educational Tours trip *Costa Rica: A Touch of the Tropics* for CHS Spanish students who will graduate between 2025 and 2027. This ten-day trip is scheduled to depart between May 31 and June 4, 2024 and will be paid for by students and their families. The total program price is currently \$3,859, which will be divided into monthly payments upon enrollment. The cost includes round trip airfare on major carriers, all on-tour transportation, nine overnight stays in hotels with private bathrooms, meals, full-time tour director, local guides, daily activities and tours, entry fees, and cultural experiences.

The student to chaperone ratio is typically 6:1. Students pay for snacks, souvenirs, and gratuities for our tour director, local guides, and bus drivers.

2023 SAMPLE TOUR SCHEDULE: COSTA RICA: A TOUCH OF THE TROPICS

****Note:** The below is an example of how this tour may run. All times and durations are subject to change, and the order of activities may be switched or substituted as needed based on availability. **

****Note:** There are only 2 seasons in Costa Rica – rainy and dry. There is little rainfall during the dry season, which extends from December – April, whereas rainy season is known for its bountiful precipitation (often scattered throughout the day) between the months of May – November. **

Day 1: Fly to Costa Rica | Arrive into San José

Depart North America today on a day flight to Costa Rica. Most groups arrive in the afternoon or evening. Upon arrival to the airport, the group will meet up with their Tour Director and should be prepared to wait up to 2 hours for consolidated groups to arrive. Afterwards, the group will transfer to the hotel for check in. Hotel rooms in Costa Rica often have two double beds and students will be expected to share beds. Groups arriving before 5 PM into San José will be provided a dinner at the hotel; groups arriving after 5 PM will be provided with a boxed dinner. *Fees for checking a bag to/from San José are NOT included in the price of the traveler's tour. Travelers are responsible for purchasing this on their own at the gate, or can avoid the baggage fee by bringing only a carryon.*

Day 2: Coffee Plantation Tour | Travel to the Arenal region | Arenal Volcano National Park

- Morning: Group will depart from the hotel and head to a tour of a coffee plantation (1.5 hrs). Throughout the tour (and especially at the end), travelers will be able to sample a variety of different coffees and chocolates! Afterwards, the group will continue on their transfer to Arenal Volcano National Park (2 hrs).
- Afternoon: After an included lunch en route, the group will go for a hike in Arenal Volcano National Park (2 hrs). *Lunches in Costa Rica are included and will be a combination of boxed lunches, lunches at the hotel, at local restaurants, or at rest stops along the road during longer transfer days. Tap water in Costa Rica IS safe to drink, so travelers should bring a reusable water bottle in order to refill their bottles throughout their tour, especially since single-use plastics are no longer allowed in National Parks.*
- Evening: Dinner will be included at the hotel, with free time after.

Day 3: Kayaking on Lake Arenal | La Fortuna Waterfall | Local Exchange | Hot Springs

- Morning: Group will depart from the hotel and go kayaking on Lake Arenal (2 hrs) with professional local guides. The kayaks are singles or doubles, and there will be a larger pontoon boat with additional guides following the group during the entire trip (2 hrs). *Life jackets will be available for all travelers. For safety reasons, the maximum weight limit for this activity is 250 lbs.*
- Afternoon: After an included lunch at the hotel, group will transfer for a visit of the La Fortuna Waterfall (1.5 hrs). Travelers go down (and then up!) over 600 stairs to access this natural wonder. There are various benches and viewpoints throughout the staircase for travelers to stop and take a break, and to take photos if desired. Travelers can then swim in the fresh pools alongside the bottom of the waterfall – swimming near or under the waterfall itself is prohibited. *This activity does require a certain level of physical stamina; if travelers are not interested in participating they may choose to sit out and wait for their group - there is a little café and a butterfly garden at the start of the hike, at which people who don't want to go down can wait.* Travelers will then participate in a local exchange arranged by their Tour Director (1.5 hrs), which may include a school visit, playing soccer with local children, or even meeting the Tour Director's family.

Note:

The above is an example of how this tour may run. All times and durations are subject to change, and the order of activities may be switched or substituted as needed based on availability.

- Evening: The group will visit the Arenal Hot Springs (2 – 3 hrs), which is home to 16 spring fed pools of varying temperatures! Bathing suits, flip flops, and towels are recommended. Lockers and towels are available for an additional cost. Dinner will be included at the hotel, with free time after. *For safety reasons, travelers are not allowed on the water slides at the hot springs.*

Day 4: Travel to Monteverde | *Optional Local Food Workshop*

- Morning: Group will depart for their transfer to Monteverde (4 hrs).
- Afternoon: After an included lunch, group will have a free afternoon in Monteverde.

Add this in-depth excursion: Local Food Workshop

Try your hand at creating some of Costa Rica's culinary specialties during a visit to a local working mill. You'll make – and sample – tortillas, artisanal coffee, and juice extracted from sugar cane (Just save room for "sobado", a candy made from the sugar cane plant.)

- Evening: Dinner will be included at the hotel, with free time after.

Day 5: Santa Elena Cloud Forest | Ziplining Adventure

- Morning: Group will depart from the hotel and head to the Santa Elena Cloud Forest (30 mins – 1 hr), where they will receive a Tour Director-led walking tour through the trails of the Cloud Forest (1.5 hrs). Travelers will then get to plant a tree and give back to the sustainable environment of Costa Rica at the EF reserve (30 mins).
- Afternoon: After an included lunch, group will transfer to their ziplining adventure (30 mins). After a safety demonstration, travelers will be able to enjoy the Costa Rican jungle from above, with professional guides helping them zipline through the rainforest (2 hrs). *For safety reasons, the maximum weight limit for this activity is 200 lbs. Travelers should wear clothing that they don't mind getting dirty/greasy.*
- Evening: Dinner will be included at the hotel, with free time after.

Day 6: Travel to the Central Pacific Coast | Crocodile Safari | Rainforest Adventure Park

- Morning: Group will depart for their transfer to the Central Pacific Coast (2 hrs). Travelers will enjoy a cruise (1.5 hrs) along the Tarcoles River, where they will board a small boat and see crocodiles up to 23 feet long. *Life jackets will be available for all travelers.* Group will then continue on to the Rainforest Adventure Park (30 mins).
- Afternoon: After an included lunch at the Rainforest Adventure Park, travelers will ride an Aerial Tram through the tree line of the jungle (1 – 1.5 hrs). Travelers will then go on a nature hike to see plant and animal life, as well as see a butterfly garden (2 hrs). Group will then continue on to the Central Pacific Coast (1.5 hrs).
- Evening: Dinner will be included at the hotel, with free time after. *For safety reasons, strict swimming restrictions apply in this region. Tour Directors will provide further instructions.*

Day 7: Manuel Antonio National Park | Free Time in the Central Pacific Coast

- Morning: Group will depart very early from the hotel (6 -7 AM) for a visit to Manuel Antonio National Park (5 hrs). The group might have to wait in line in order to gain entrance to the park upon arrival. Once in the park, travelers will have free time to enjoy the beach, as well as ample time to hike through the lush rainforest and see native wildlife that make their home in Manuel Antonio. *No food or snacks are allowed inside of Manuel Antonio National Park.*
- Afternoon: After a late (but included) lunch back at the hotel, group will have a free afternoon in the Central Pacific Coast.
- Evening: Dinner will be included at the hotel, with free time after. *For safety reasons, strict swimming restrictions apply in this region. Tour Directors will provide further instructions.*

Day 8: Travel to San José | Free Time in Sarchí | *Optional Folklore Evening*

- Morning: Group will depart for their transfer to San José (1.5 hrs). Group will stop in Sarchí where they will learn about the history of ox-cart making, and have free time to explore (1 hr).
- Afternoon: After an included lunch in Sarchí, the group will continue on to San José (1.5 hrs).

Note:

The above is an example of how this tour may run. All times and durations are subject to change, and the order of activities may be switched or substituted as needed based on availability.

- Evening: Dinner will be included at the hotel, with free time after.

Add this in-depth excursion: Folklore Evening

Opt to spend the evening learning about the rich cultural traditions of the region over a traditional Costa Rican dinner. After dinner, marimba music and entertainment by a local dance troupe will make this a night to remember.

Day 9: Depart for Home

- Morning/Afternoon: Group will transfer to the airport for their flight home.

1-Day Extension

Day 8: Travel to San José | Free Time in Sarchí | *Optional Folklore Evening*

- Morning: Group will depart for their transfer to San José (1.5 hrs). Group will stop in Sarchí where they will learn about the history of ox-cart making, and have free time to explore (1 hr).
- Afternoon: After an included lunch in Sarchí, the group will continue on to San José (1.5 hrs).
- Evening: Dinner will be included at the hotel, with free time after.

Add this in-depth excursion: Folklore Evening

Opt to spend the evening learning about the rich cultural traditions of the region over a traditional Costa Rican dinner. After dinner, marimba music and entertainment by a local dance troupe will make this a night to remember.

Day 9: Travel to Sarapiquí | Whitewater Rafting

- Morning/Afternoon: Group will transfer to Sarapiquí for whitewater rafting (2 hrs). After a safety demonstration, the group will split up into boats of 5-6 travelers and enjoy an afternoon zipping through Level 2 and Level 3 rapids. Lunch will be included on-site for the entire group. *Life jackets will be available for all travelers. All travelers must wear closed-toe shoes or sandals with straps – flip flops are not acceptable footwear for this activity.*
- Evening: Group will transfer back to San José (2 hrs). Dinner will be included at the hotel, with free time after.

Day 10: Depart for Home

- Morning/Afternoon: Group will transfer to the airport for their flight home.

The above is an example of how this tour may run. All times and durations are subject to change, and the order of activities may be switched or substituted as needed based on availability.

Costa Rica information

Travel documents

U.S. citizens traveling to Costa Rica must have a passport that is valid for six months after their expected return date. No entry visas are required for U.S. citizens. Please check travel.state.gov to confirm passport validity requirements prior to your tour. Citizens of all other countries should contact their appropriate embassies to find out what specific documentation is required for them to travel.

For travelers under the age of 18, parents or guardians will be asked to sign a liability waiver. This allows the Group Leader to assume limited power of attorney and sign liability releases for certain included activities. If the traveler's parent or guardian does not submit this waiver, the traveler cannot participate in those specific activities.

Vaccinations and health precautions

To learn about necessary vaccinations, we recommend you visit [cdc.gov](https://www.cdc.gov) or consult your physician for the most updated information.

Tour Director and bus driver

You will have the same Tour Director during your entire tour and they will also act as local guides throughout the tour. You will typically have the same bus driver during the entire tour, as well.

Tipping

It's customary to tip your Tour Director and bus drivers as a token of appreciation at the end of the tour. We recommend:

- \$6–8 per person per day for the Tour Director
- \$3 per person per day for the bus driver
- \$1-2 per person per tour for each guided activity (like zip-lining, kayaking, etc.)

We encourage Group Leaders to collect tip money from their travelers before leaving on tour. You can tip in U.S. dollars and present the money to your Tour Director and bus driver at the end of tour in the tip envelopes provided by EF. If you have any questions on tipping, please reach out to your Tour Consultant.

Currency

Costa Rica's currency is the colon. However, U.S. dollars are accepted throughout Costa Rica, so you do not need to change money. Visit xe.com for current exchange rates and more information.

When you use an ATM, you will be given colon. We recommend withdrawing money from a bank or ATM machine instead of using credit cards. Although most shops accept credit cards, the phone lines are much slower, which makes using credit cards time-consuming. It may also cause delays in your group's schedule. Please note that traveler's checks are usually not accepted in Costa Rica.

Be sure to notify your bank or credit card company that you will be traveling abroad and ask what international fees you may have to pay.

Transportation

Travel time between destinations on your Costa Rica tour may take between three and four hours, depending on road conditions and the season. The country's topography includes curved roads and many steep hills. Those prone to motion sickness should consider bringing medication. The distance between destinations is normally longer than it appears on a map due to limited highways and many unpaved roads (especially going to and from Monteverde).

Accommodations

While you are in Costa Rica you will stay in hotels and lodges which are simple, but clean and comfortable. Accommodations vary from large and modern hotels to rustic lodges, separate cabins, and family-owned bungalow-style hotels. Some may have swimming pools. Be aware that tropical conditions in Costa Rica make insects and other small animals (such as ants, mosquitoes, lizards, spiders, and frogs) more prevalent. Some hotels in Tortuguero that are more surrounded by nature will have mosquito nets on the beds.

Students under the age of 20 will share rooms with two or three other travelers of the same gender in rooms that will have single or shared double beds (or a combination of the two). Adults will share twin rooms with other adults of the same gender. Please note that groups may not all have rooms next to each other (some may even be on different floors) and that hotels may be located outside of the city center. Electrical voltage and outlets in Costa Rica are the same as in the U.S., so you will not need an adapter or converter.

Phones and internet

If you plan to use your personal cell phone on tour, contact your wireless provider to see what fees you may incur for calling, texting, or using data abroad. Wi-Fi may not be available at all hotels in Costa Rica, and may be unreliable when available, even on the road. Travelers should plan to be without Wi-Fi for 1–2 days at a time. Consider buying a phone plan for more consistent and reliable connectivity.

Local food

Costa Rican food is flavorful but not spicy. Typical dishes include: rice and beans, plantains, spaghetti, vegetables, beef, chicken, pork, and fresh fruit. Fresh fruit juices will often be served with meals, in addition to water. Water is chlorinated throughout the country and safe to drink, however some people may choose to use bottled water. Bottled water is available for purchase everywhere for \$1–2.

Safety

Always inform your Tour Director if you should need to leave the group at any point. Store valuables in hotel safe deposit boxes and refrain from carrying large sums of money or wearing valuable jewelry. Although hotels in coastal areas may be located near the beach, swimming is only permitted in certain areas designated by EF for safety reasons. Please be sure to read EF's *Travel & Safety Guide* before going on tour.

Bathrooms and showers

While public bathroom facilities are generally available in Costa Rica, it will often cost about 50 cents (or 250 colónes) to use the facilities, which will include getting toilet paper from an attendant before you enter. Something to note: many hotel and public bathrooms do not permit toilet paper to be flushed. Water pressure in Costa Rica is often lower than in the U.S. and the amount of hot water can be limited, so be prepared for short showers. Additionally, you will often find electric shower head heaters in your hotels. This is a tankless, on-demand hot water system that is very popular and common in Costa Rica.

Weather

Costa Rica has a tropical climate with two seasons: wet and dry. The wet season begins in May and lasts through November. During the wet season it will rain every day, which can be anything from a light rain to a downpour. The dry season begins in December and lasts through April. Temperatures remain fairly constant throughout the year but may vary according to region. Please check weather.com for your destinations and travel periods.

Packing

We suggest bringing the following items: a light jacket or windbreaker, rain gear, comfortable walking shoes, water shoes, hat, sunscreen, a swimsuit and beach towel, insect repellent, and binoculars. You may also want to have a small backpack you can carry during the day to hold extra clothes in case the weather changes or you get caught in the rain. Many airlines charge fees for the first checked bag to Costa Rica, so be sure to verify with your airline before you depart or ensure your suitcase fits the allowances for carry-on luggage.

Luggage

Fees for checking a bag on the international flights between the United States and Costa Rica are not included in the price of your tour. Travelers may pay to check their bag(s) at the airport when checking in or avoid paying any baggage fees by only traveling with carry-on luggage. Please contact the airline for baggage restrictions and regulations. And, while fees for checking a bag on flights between the United States and Costa Rica are not included in the price of your tour, fees for checking a bag on flights between Costa Rica and Panama are included.

Notes on specific activities

Travelers may come across jellyfish while snorkeling in Guanacaste and should let their Tour Director know if there are any relevant allergies. Travelers may choose to sit out during the activity.

There are many ways to enjoy the beautiful hot springs in Arenal. However, please note that the water slides at these facilities are off-limits to all EF travelers, regardless of age. If found in violation of this protocol, travelers may be sent home at their own expense. Additionally, the Arenal Hot Springs does not accept credit cards, so travelers should bring extra cash with them in case they want to rent a locker to store their belongings or to purchase snacks. They may also leave their personal items on the bus free of charge.

In Sarapiquí, groups will experience difficulty levels of 2–3 while whitewater rafting (depending on whether it's dry season or rainy season). Groups will be divided into smaller groups of 5 to 7 travelers per raft, each with their own local guide. All travelers must wear closed-toe shoes or sandals with straps—flip flops are not acceptable footwear for this activity.

For those travelers participating in ziplining and/or whitewater rafting, there is a weight limit of 200 lbs for safety reasons. Before ziplining, operators will need to confirm that travelers approaching this weight restriction fit comfortably into the ziplining harness before being allowed to participate.

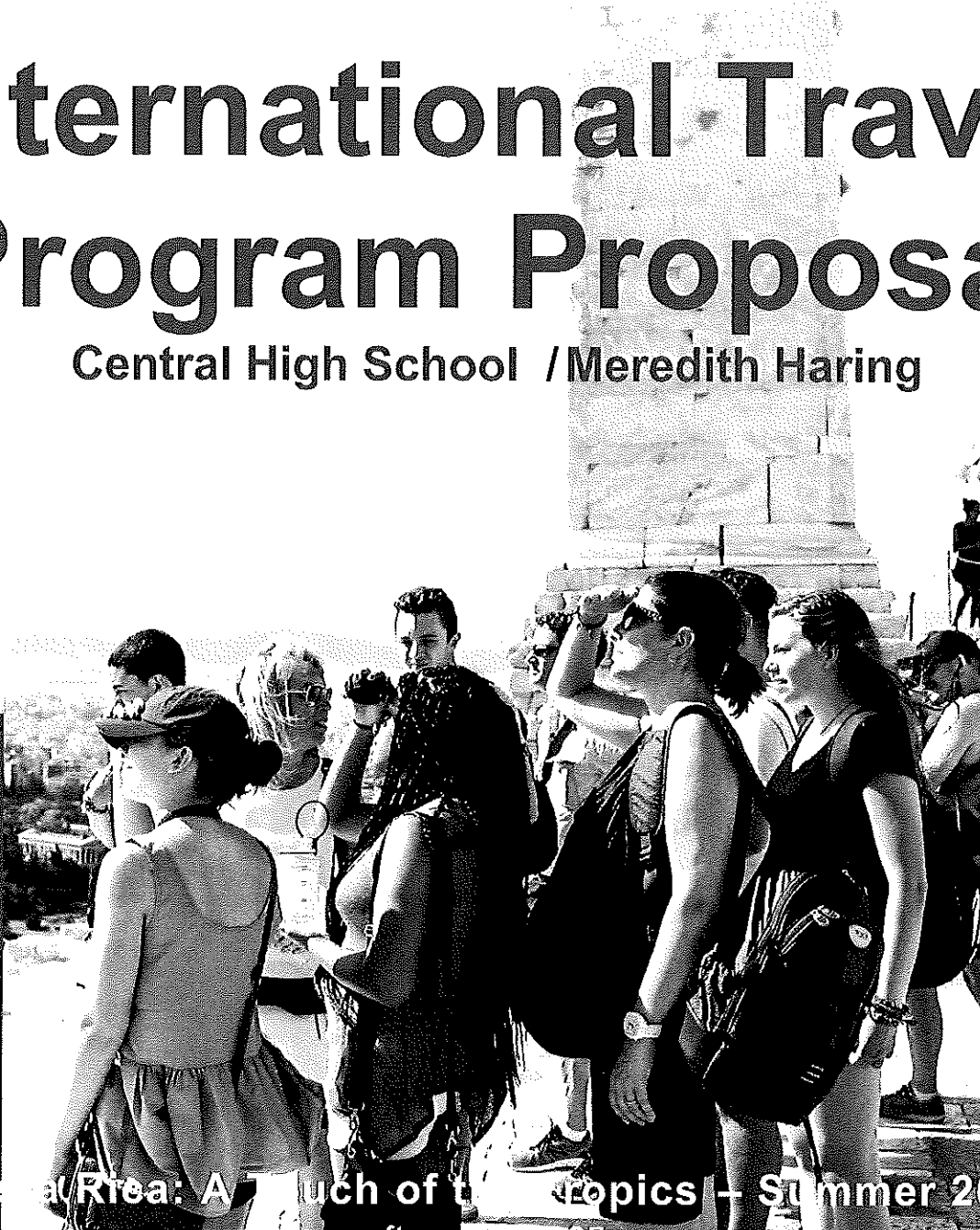

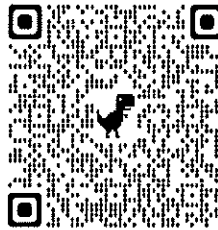

EF's Rules of the Road

When travelers enroll on tour, they agree to EF's Rules of the Road. If travelers do not conform to these regulations or any specific rules set by their Group Leader, they risk dismissal from the tour, returning home at their own expense with no refund for the missed tour portion. Decisions regarding tour dismissal are up to EF and/or the Group Leader.

All scheduled activities are obligatory. If any traveler is sick or has a physical ailment that might prevent them from participating in an activity, they must tell the Group Leader, who will notify the Tour Director.

If any traveler wants to visit friends or relatives in a destination country or region, the Group Leader must be told before the tour begins. The traveler must complete the Tour Leave Form to receive permission for the visit. The traveler must then give the form to the group's Tour Director upon arrival.

Travelers are expected to respect the nightly curfew that the Group Leader may set for their own safety and security. Room checks will be conducted at the Group Leader's discretion. Visitors or group members of the opposite sex are not permitted in travelers' room.

Smoking is not allowed on buses, during meals, in hotel rooms or in any other shared, enclosed space.

Hitchhiking and the driving or renting of any motor vehicle is strictly forbidden for all travelers.

Travelers are required to pay for any phone calls or incidental personal expenses incurred at hotels. These will be payable the evening before departure at each hotel.

Travelers under the age of 18 may not consume alcohol on tour. Travelers over the age of 18 (or older, if local laws require) may consume beer or wine in moderation. The consumption of hard liquor is strictly forbidden. Group Leaders and/or parents may prohibit all alcohol consumption at their discretion. Excessive drinking by any traveler will not be tolerated and will result in dismissal from tour at the traveler's own expense.

Illegal activities will not be tolerated and are punishable by immediate dismissal from the tour. If travelers are involved in any illegal activities, all costs to return home are at their expense. If the local authorities are involved, travelers will be subject to the laws of the destination you are visiting.

Payment for damage done to hotel rooms or to buses is your responsibility. If you notice any damage upon arrival at a hotel, you should notify the Tour Director immediately. 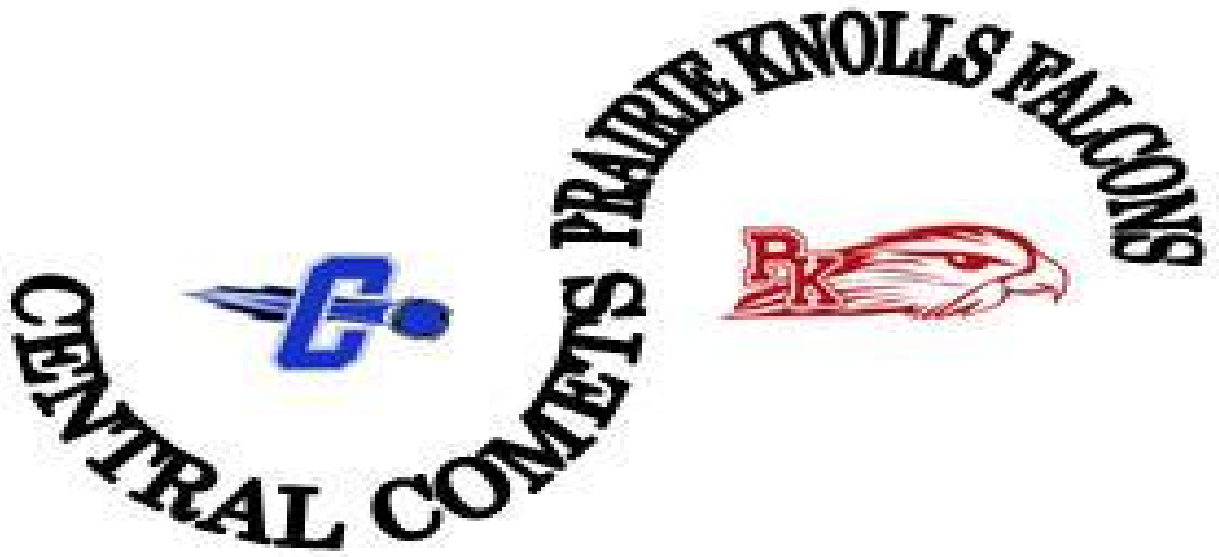

INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS

Participation in competitive interscholastic athletics and co-curricular activities (at times referred to collectively as “extracurricular activities”) at CMS/PKMS is a privilege, not a right.

Participation in extracurricular activities is an important part of a student’s development. Through participation, students develop many lifelong skills and positive values. These include cooperation, leadership, healthful living habits, self-discipline, integrity, teamwork, and respect for rules and regulations. In addition, students who participate in extracurricular activities serve as ambassadors of the school and role models for their peers. By accepting the privilege of participation in extracurricular activities, the student becomes a representative of both CMS/PKMS and Central Community Unit School District # 301, whether the student is on the playing field, in competition, in practice, in the classroom, or in the community. Individuals who serve in this capacity have a special responsibility to ensure that their actions reflect positively on CMS/PKMS and the community.

The decision to participate in extracurricular activities, therefore, involves a commitment by the student to adhere to the rules outlined in this Athletics & Activities Handbook. The Handbook goes into effect when a student begins participation in a CMS/PKMS extracurricular activity and is in effect for the duration of the extracurricular activity; it applies year-round (24/7, 365 days). Each student is responsible for adhering to the Handbook to ensure a positive experience for all District students. Students who violate the Handbook will be subject to disciplinary consequences, up to and including dismissal from extracurricular activities, as set forth in the Handbook. Depending on the nature of the violation, students also may be subject to discipline under the District’s student discipline policy, up to and including suspension or expulsion from school.

Extracurricular activities are for the benefit of students and are meant to supplement students’ educational program at CMS/PKMS. Unless pre-approved by the Administration in limited circumstances, extracurricular activities are never a reason for an absence from class or school or not completing schoolwork.

In order to participate in CMS/PKMS extracurricular activities, students and their parent(s)/guardian(s) must sign the CMS/PKMS Athletics & Activities Handbook Acknowledgement Form prior to participation in each interscholastic athletic team or co-curricular activity. This form will be available for an electronic signature during the registration process on ~~8to18~~ [rSchool](#).

INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS

PROGRAMS

District #301 maintains 7th and 8th grade athletic programs in Football, Volleyball, Basketball, Cheerleading, and Track. Wrestling, Cross Country and the Scholastic Team are available to 6th, 7th, and 8th graders. Intramural programs may be offered throughout the year for 7th and 8th grade students (including Scholastic Bowl at the 6th grade level). Students participating in intramural programs will be held to the same expectations and standards as students in the other athletic programs.

TEAM SIZE LIMITATIONS

Maximum team sizes for the combined teams are:

- a) Football - fifty 7th and fifty 8th graders
- b) Volleyball - twenty 7th and twenty 8th graders
(Intramurals may be offered)
- c) Basketball - twenty 7th and twenty 8th graders
(Intramurals may be offered)
- d) Cheerleading - twenty 7th and twenty 8th graders
- e) Wrestling – seventy-five 6th-8th graders (away meets limited to one traveling bus)
- f) Track – ~~no size limit for 7th and 8th Graders~~ **one hundred thirty 7th and 8th graders**
- g) Cross Country – one hundred 6th-8th graders
- h) Scholastic Bowl – sixteen 6th-8th graders

Clubs and other extracurricular activities may establish their own rules and policies that may specifically apply to that activity. These expectations will be shared at the beginning of each activity with students and parents.

ACADEMIC ELIGIBILITY

Middle school rules require that a weekly check be made on the eligibility and an eligibility list is developed. In order to have an accurate assessment of a student's progress, a weekly eligibility report will be run by the athletic director on Thursday of each week. Each coach will receive the eligibility list. Under no circumstances are students who are ineligible permitted to dress or participate in a contest.

~~When a student is declared ineligible on the weekly eligibility report, he/she will be ineligible from Monday of the following week through Sunday~~ **When a student is determined to be ineligible, the period of ineligibility starts on the Sunday following the Thursday notification and remains in effect for one (1) calendar week (Sunday through Saturday).** Upon the third occurrence of ineligibility, a student may be removed from the team with the approval of the Athletic/Activity Coordinator.

Competitions may not be used as an excuse to miss any assigned disciplinary consequence.

INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS

Students who receive the following grades on the weekly eligibility form will be ineligible for the following week:

- a) One failing grade (F), or
- b) More than two warning grades (D's).

Ineligible students may continue to practice with the team but may not participate in any contests. Ineligible students may attend home contests but may not travel to away contests.

In order to be considered eligible for the "next" activity within a school year, or the following year, students must have uniforms and/or equipment from the previous activity turned in or have the cost of replacement provided to the school.

ATTENDANCE AT PRACTICES & CONTESTS DURING INELIGIBILITY

Ineligible students are prohibited from participating in any contest during the period of ineligibility. However, students also are expected to attend and participate in all practices or meetings. Failure to attend practice(s), meeting(s), and contest(s) during the period of ineligibility will result in consequences consistent with the rules for that particular extracurricular activity. Additionally, students are expected to attend all home contests during the period of ineligibility. Ineligible students may not travel with the team for away contests. Students are not permitted to dress in the team uniform for a contest, but are expected to dress consistent with team expectations.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

ABSENCES

A student must be in school to try out for an extracurricular activity. However, if the student is absent for part or all of a school day due to an excused absence and must miss the try out, the student will be given an opportunity to try out for the extracurricular activity once he/she returns to school. Contact the appropriate coach in order to request a make-up try out. Any make-up try out must be approved by the Athletic/Activity Coordinator. If the absence is planned and known in advance, a scheduled, modified, tryout should be arranged with the head coach prior to the original tryout date.

To participate in an extracurricular activity practice or meeting (non-contest), a student must be in attendance for three clock hours, unless the student is absent from school for an excused absence for any reason other than personal illness. A student who has an excused absence for any part of the school day due to personal illness, will not be permitted to participate in the extracurricular activity practice or meeting on that school day.

Recognized excused absences are: a student's personal illness; a death in the immediate family; a family emergency; observance of a religious holiday; medical appointment with note from the physician; circumstances that cause reasonable concern to the parent/guardian for the student's safety or health; situations beyond the control of the student (e.g., court appearances); other reasons approved by the Superintendent or designee.

INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS

FIELD TRIPS

Field trips during the school day are treated as if the student was in school on that day for purposes of participation in an extracurricular activity contest or practice/meeting.

SUSPENSIONS/EXPULSIONS

Students who are assigned to an Alternative Learning Environment on school grounds or who are suspended out-of-school are prohibited from participating in any extracurricular activities during the term of their assignment to the alternative learning environment or out-of-school suspension; this includes but is not limited to any practice, meeting, contest, and performance. If the Alternative Learning Environment assignment or out-of-school suspension period continues through end of the school day on Friday or includes a weekend or non-student attendance day (e.g., school holiday, break, institute day), the student is prohibited from participating in any extracurricular activities during that weekend or non-student attendance day. The student is not permitted to participate in the extracurricular activity until he/she returns to school following the alternative learning environment assignment or out-of-school suspension. After a student's return following an out-of-school suspension, the coach(es)/sponsor(s) have the discretion to determine the student's subsequent participation in extracurricular activity.

In the event a student is expelled from school, he/she will be immediately expelled from participation in any extracurricular activity for the remainder of the school year.

If a student is under investigation for violation of the Code of Conduct or other school rule or policy, ~~the student is permitted to participate in an extracurricular activity unless~~ the student **may be** temporarily suspended from the activity pending the outcome of the investigation. This determination is within the sole discretion of the Administration or Athletic/Activity Coordinator.

Any exception to these attendance policy requirements must be approved by the Administration or Athletic/Activity Coordinator prior to the contest or practice/meeting.

P.E. EXCUSES

Students with a medical excuse from P.E. may not participate in an athletic team practice or contest for the period of time covered by the medical excuse. Depending on the nature of the medical excuse from P.E., the student may be required to provide documentation from the student's health care provider clearing the student to return to participating on an athletic team. See below for additional information regarding the District's concussion policy and procedures.

INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS

CONSEQUENCES

The following consequences will be issued for unexcused absences:

Football, Volleyball, Basketball, Cheerleading:

1st offense- Limited playing time for one competition

2nd offense- ½ of a competition suspension

3rd offense- 1 full competition suspension

Subsequent offenses- 1 full competition suspension

XC, Track, Scholastic Bowl, Wrestling:

1st offense- Warning

2nd offense- 1 full competition suspension

Subsequent offenses- 1 full competition

ATHLETIC TEAM ELIGIBILITY & PARTICIPATION

In addition to the academic and attendance eligibility requirements set forth above, students trying out for and participating in interscholastic athletics are subject to the eligibility and participation requirements set forth in this section and as established by the individual athletic team.

Students may participate in only one interscholastic athletic team at a time, unless an exception is requested and approved by the head coach of each team, as well as the Athletic/Activity Coordinator. Requests will be determined on a case-by-case basis.

Prior to participating in an interscholastic athletic team, including trying out for the team, the student must be approved by the Athletics & Activities Office. To receive approval, the student must:

- (1) submit proof of a current sports physical (annual requirement); valid for 395 days.
- ~~(2) register for each sport on the school specific 8to18 page. Central Middle (il.8to18.com/bcms)
Prairie Knolls (il.8to18.com/prairieknolls)~~
- (2) register for each sport on the **rSchool website (<https://ccusd301-ar.rschooltoday.com/>)**
- (3) have turned in all equipment/uniforms from any interscholastic athletic team the previous season.

The required pre-participation forms are available online and will be completed during the registration process. These include the Middle School Athletics & Activities Handbook Acknowledgement Form and the IESA Sports Medicine Acknowledgement & Consent Form (concussions, performance enhancing substances, and steroids). The sports physical form is also available online.

INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS

If a student is selected for an interscholastic athletic team, the \$100 participation fee must be paid before the first athletic contest. Scholastic Bowl participation fee is \$35. Central Middle School and Prairie Knolls Middle School have a \$300 family athletic fee cap. This family cap only applies to Middle School athletic fees.

Prior to the start of each athletic team season, students and their parents(s)/guardian(s) are required to attend a pre-season meeting regardless of whether the student and his/her parent(s)/guardian(s) have previously attended one or more pre-season meetings for previous seasons or school years. The purpose of the meeting is for the Athletic/Activity Coordinator and coaches to provide pertinent information regarding CMS/PKMS interscholastic athletics activities and team policies. If a student and his/her parents(s)/guardian(s) fail to attend the pre-season, the student is not eligible to participate on the athletic team until the student and his/her parents(s)/guardian(s) communicate with the Athletic/Activity Coordinator and/or coach.

IESA ELIGIBILITY

Each student participating in an IESA interscholastic activity must satisfy IESA's eligibility requirements. More information can be found at www.iesa.org.

ATHLETIC TEAM TRYOUT POLICY

In the event that a tryout is needed to determine the number of maximum students kept on the school's A/B team, every participant must attend the tryout to make the team. Students who are unable to attend the tryouts must give advance notice to the coach and building athletic director. They must also **explain the extenuating circumstances causing them to miss tryouts.** ~~have an excusable reason why (illness, injury, vacation, family death) they are missing tryouts.~~ Students who are unable to tryout due to injury or illness must complete a tryout or modified tryout within one week of the original tryout to make the team. ~~Students who are on vacation will be required to schedule and complete a tryout prior to the scheduled tryout dates with the coach at the approval of the Athletic/Activity Coordinator.~~

CARE OF EQUIPMENT & UNIFORMS

All uniforms and equipment issued by the District are the property of the District. Students are expected to care for and not abuse uniforms and equipment loaned to them for participation on an athletic team. Uniforms and equipment are only to be worn during CMS/PKMS contests and practices, or as otherwise directed by the coach(es).

Uniforms and equipment issued to students by CMS/PKMS for participation on an athletic team must be returned within one (1) week after the last contest, meeting, or performance of the year or season, or within one (1) week after a student quits the team, is dismissed from the team, or is expelled from school. Lost, not-returned, or stolen items are the responsibility of the student and his/her parent(s)/guardian(s), and the student and his/her parent(s)/guardian(s) must reimburse the District for all replacement costs of any uniforms or equipment issued to a student but not returned. All damaged uniforms and equipment must be repaired or replaced. The repair or replacement bill(s) is the responsibility of the student and his/her parent(s)/guardian(s), unless a student's uniform or District-issued equipment is damaged during participation in an athletic practice or contest, in which case the District will assume responsibility for repair or replacement. No student will be allowed to receive an end-of-season award or to participate in any future extracurricular activities unless all equipment and uniforms have been returned and accounted for, or are paid for, if damaged or not returned.

Athletic Lockers

Students who participate on an athletic team may be assigned a locker. Each student must use only the locker assigned to him/her and must keep the locker and its contents in good order. It is the student's responsibility to periodically clean out the locker to ensure the locker remains in good condition. The condition of the locker both its interior and exterior, are the student's responsibility. Lockers should never be struck, kicked, written on, or defaced. Stickers and other materials should not be attached either inside or outside the locker. A monetary fine and/or disciplinary consequence may be assessed for locker damage. In addition, no student will be allowed to receive an end-of-season award or to participate in any future extracurricular activities unless he/she pays for any locker damage for which he/she is responsible.

Students are personally responsible for the contents of the locker to which they are assigned. Lockers are the property of the District. For the safety and security of the entire school community, school authorities may inspect and search lockers, as well as personal effects left there by a student, without notice to or the consent of the student. Students have no reasonable expectation of privacy in lockers or in their personal effects left inside a locker. Any items discovered as result of a locker search may be confiscated and used as evidence in school-related investigations and may result in disciplinary action under the Code of Conduct as well as the CMS/PKMS and District student discipline rules and policies.

Team Rules

The coach(es) for each athletic team may establish rules for his/her/their team. These rules may include, but are not limited to, team expectations and requirements, practice schedule/location and practice and game

attire. Student-athletes who violate team rules may be subject to disciplinary consequences as determined by the coach(es), up to and including dismissal from the team.

TRANSPORTATION

EXPECTATIONS

- Students must be ready to depart from school or other designated location at the assigned time.
- Students are not to enter the bus/vehicle with cleats on or dirty shoes (these must be cleaned before entering the bus/vehicle).
- Students are to enter or exit the bus/vehicle through the front and designated door(s) only, not the rear or other emergency door.
- Students are not to board the bus/vehicle unless directed to by the coach/sponsor.
- Food may be consumed on the bus/vehicle with permission of the coach/sponsor.
- Students must pick up all garbage and remove all personal belongings from the bus/vehicle.
- Students who misbehave on the bus/vehicle may be subject to disciplinary action under the Code of Conduct as well as the CMS/PKMS and District student discipline rules and policies.

TO/FROM EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

All students participating in an extracurricular activity that is not being held at CMS/PKMS must use the transportation provided by the District to the activity and are encouraged to use District transportation from the activity.

In a situation where a student's parent/guardian requests to transport his/her student home at the conclusion of the activity, a "sign-out" sheet will be provided by the coach for parents/guardians to sign their own child out at the conclusion of the contest. If a student will be transported home from an athletic event by another student's parent/guardian, both families must notify both the Head Coach and Athletic/Activity Coordinator no later than 11:00 AM on the day of the contest with the transportation arrangements home from the athletic event. Both athletes will need to be signed out on the away contest sheet prior to departure.

Please contact the Athletic/Activity Coordinator with any questions.

PARENT PICK-UP

Any student who is not picked up within fifteen minutes of the end of the scheduled event will face the following consequences:

Football, Volleyball, Basketball, Cheerleading

1st offense- Limited playing time for one competition
2nd offense- ½ of a competition suspension
3rd offense- 1 full competition suspension
Subsequent offenses- 1 full competition suspension

CC, Track, Scholastic Team & Wrestling Only

1st offense- Warning
2nd offense- 1 full competition suspension
Subsequent offenses- 1 full competition

The following is a protocol used to ensure that students get home safely from after-school athletics and clubs. Parents or guardians of students involved in extracurricular activities are responsible for arranging transportation for their children from school in a timely manner. When this is not the occurrence, the following protocol will be followed by the coach or supervisor:

1. If the student's ride does not arrive at the designated time, the student will be provided a phone to call

the arranged ride. If the original ride cannot be reached, the student will be given the opportunity to call relatives, etc. for an alternative ride.

2. If the student cannot reach anyone, the coach or supervisor will attempt to call every phone number the school has listed for that student. (*At registration, parents are asked to fill out home, work, cell and emergency contact phone numbers*). Coaches and supervisors will have these numbers readily available at all times.

3. If no one can be reached, coaches and supervisors will continue to periodically call the numbers up until one hour after (a) the home practice / event has ended or (b) an away event bus arrived at school.

4. After one hour, the coach or supervisor will contact the Police Department to ensure the student with safe transportation home.

5. School administration will contact the parents the following day to discuss the previous day's happenings.

Note to Parents: If there is anyone else you would like the school to contact before the Police, please notify the school office.

MISCELLANEOUS

REFUNDING PARTICIPATION FEES

A full refund of fees for extracurricular activities will be made only if a student is cut or quits before the first contest. If a student has already received equipment or (a) uniform(s), the participation fee will not be refunded unless all equipment and uniforms have been returned and accounted for, or are paid for, if damaged or not returned.

INTRAMURALS

Intramurals may be offered for Volleyball, Boys' Basketball, Girls' Basketball, and Scholastic Bowl.

The purpose of the Intramural program is to have participation in activities while providing the opportunity to improve skills.

Intramurals may or may not exist depending on the number of students interested and the number of coaches available for each activity.

Two ways to join Intramurals:

- a. If you try out and do not make the travel team you have the option to join Intramurals.
- b. If you do not want to join the travel team and would like to only join Intramurals you must sign up with the athletic director prior to tryouts for that sport or within one week of the conclusion of tryouts.

Intramural players will follow the same team and school rules.

Intramural practice schedules will be made available at the beginning of each season.

Size limitations for Intramurals

- a. Minimum number of participants is ten.
- b. There is no maximum number of participants.

COMMUNICATION WITH EXTRA-CURRICULAR COACH/SPONSOR

Parent/Coach Relationship:

Both parenting and coaching are extremely challenging roles. By establishing an understanding of each role, we are better able to accept the actions of the other and provide greater benefit to students. As parents/guardians, you have a right to understand the expectations that accompany your student's participation in an extracurricular activity.

This begins with clear communication from the coach(es) of your student's athletic team.

Communication You Should Expect From Your Student's Coach

1. Coaching philosophy
2. Expectations for your student as well as all the players on the team
3. Locations and times of all practices and contests
4. Team requirements, i.e., fees, special equipment, off-season conditioning
5. Procedures that will be followed should your student be injured during participation
6. Discipline that may result in the denial of your student's participation

Communication Coaches Expect from Parents/Guardians

1. Concerns expressed directly to the coach
2. Notification of any schedule conflicts well in advance

As your student becomes involved in the CMS/PKMS athletic program, he/she will experience some of the most rewarding moments of his/her life. It is important to understand that there also may be times when things do not go the way you or your student wishes. Although it may not seem so at the time, disappointment is a normal and natural part of life and, also an important part of a student's developing maturity. At these times, discussion with the coach is encouraged.

Appropriate Concerns to Discuss with Coaches

1. The treatment of your student, mentally and physically
2. Ways to help your student
3. Concerns about your student's behavior

It is very difficult to accept your student not playing as much as he/she or you may hope. Coaches are professionals. They make judgment decisions based on what they believe to be best for all students involved on the team. As you have seen from the list above, certain things can be and should be discussed with your student's coach. Other matters, such as those which follow, must be left to the discretion of the coach(es).

Issues Not Appropriate To Discuss With Coaches

1. Playing time
2. Team Strategy
3. Play calling
4. Other student-athletes

There may be circumstances that require a conference between the coach and the parent/guardian (and, if appropriate, the student). It is important that all parties involved have a clear understanding of each other's interests. When these conferences are necessary, the following procedure should be followed to help promote a resolution to the issue or concern.

Procedures for Discussing a Concern with a Coach

1. Call or email the coach and request to schedule an appointment.
2. If the coach cannot be reached, contact the Athletic/Activity Coordinator. A meeting time with the coach will be arranged.
3. Please do not confront a coach immediately before or after a practice or contest. The coach has many other responsibilities to attend to during this time period. Additionally, the excitement or disappointment related to the practice or contest can contribute to unproductive emotions. Meetings of this nature do not promote resolution.

If the coach does not provide a satisfactory resolution to your concern, contact the Athletic/Activity Coordinator to schedule an appointment. At this meeting, any appropriate next step(s) can be determined.

CPR AND AED TRAINING

Education of staff, students, and parents is an integral part of ensuring our students are safe. CONCUSSIONS

The District takes the safety of its students seriously and has developed a program to manage student concussions and head injuries. Please see Board Policy 7:305 for the District's concussion policy. BEHAVIOR EXPECTATIONS OF THE PARTICIPANTS

Accept and understand the seriousness of your responsibility and the privilege of representing the school and the community.

Treat opponents the way you would like to be treated, as a guest or friend. Never direct remarks at opponents in a taunting manner.

Respect the integrity and judgment of game officials. Respect the job and position of the officials and respect them as people. Treating them with dignity and respect, even if you disagree with their judgment, is a fundamental behavioral expectation.

BEHAVIOR EXPECTATIONS OF THE SPECTATORS

Remember that school athletics and activities are learning experiences for students and the programs are part of the educational process. Adolescents learn proper behavior from watching adults.

A ticket is a privilege to observe the contest, not a license to verbally abuse others. Positive fan support is an asset for the players, coaches and other spectators.

Parents have the opportunity to demonstrate appropriate behaviors when they show respect for the opposing players, coaches, other spectators and officials. Respect their roles even if you disagree with their judgment. Negative comments or the berating of players, coaches and officials are not in keeping with our philosophy or good forms of role modeling and will not be tolerated.

Per Board Policy of Central School District 301 Section 8.3 outlines consequences for inappropriate behavior from visitors and spectators alike here at School District 301. Removal from events could result in restorative practices (Licensure to become an IHSA official in that sport, successful completion of online training, inability to attend future events, or any other actions that the athletic director and Central Unit School District 301 deem necessary.)

CODE OF CONDUCT

~~As stated previously, participation in CMS/PKMS extracurricular activities is a privilege, not a right. Accordingly, the Athletic/Activity Coordinator is authorized to discipline students for violations of this Code of Conduct as well as other misconduct not specified below. The discipline may range from a disciplinary conference, or restitution, to suspension or dismissal from a particular extracurricular activity or all extracurricular activities. As part of the investigation, and as appropriate to the circumstances, the Athletic/Activity Coordinator may meet with the student, other student(s), staff member(s), other individuals with knowledge about the alleged violation, and/or the extracurricular activity coach(es)/sponsor(s), and will review any and all pertinent documentation or other evidence.~~
 - ~~○ After completing his/her investigation, the Athletic/Activity Coordinator or Building Administration will meet with the student and his/her parent(s)/guardian(s) to discuss the findings of the investigation and the consequence(s), if any. The Athletic/Activity Coordinator's written decision will be sent to the student's parent(s)/guardian(s) via email.~~
 - ~~○ During the Athletic/Activity Coordinator's investigation into an alleged violation of the Code of Conduct, the student is suspended from all participation in the extra-curricular activity(ies), including all contests, practices/meetings, and any team/activity events. In addition, the student may not tryout for another extracurricular activity during the investigation.~~~~
- ~~● Voluntary Admission: A student may voluntarily admit that he/she violated the Code of Conduct and forgo the Athletic/Activity Coordinator's investigation. Voluntary admission is available only to students who:
 - ~~○ Are not currently under investigation for the violation of the Code of Conduct at the time he/she makes the voluntary admission;~~
 - ~~○ Have not had prior violations of the Code of Conduct;~~
 - ~~○ Agree to participation in a formal substance abuse assessment program at a school approved agency.~~~~

~~The Athletic/Activity Coordinator or Building Administration will schedule a meeting with the student and his/her parent(s)/guardian(s) to discuss the student's voluntary admission and compliance with the above terms. If a~~

~~student fails to fulfill the above terms, the voluntary admission will count as a First Offense and the student will be required to serve that consequence.~~

~~Voluntary admission is available to a student only one time during the student's middle school career.~~

- ~~● **Appeal of Consequence for Violation of the Code of Conduct:** Because participation in extracurricular activities is a privilege and not a right, such participation is not protected by the same due process procedures applicable to regular educational programs. A student may appeal a Code of Conduct consequence to the Building Principal or designee. The request must be made in writing within five (5) days of the issuance of the consequence. The Building Principal or designee will review the appeal request, investigation information/documentation, and the Athletic/Activity Coordinator's determination. The Building Principal or designee may meet with student(s), staff member(s), and/or individuals with knowledge about the alleged violation. The Building Principal or designee then will issue his/her decision in writing. During the appeal process, the consequence imposed by the Athletic/Activity Coordinator remains in effect. - ~~● **Appeal of Total Suspension from Athletic or Co-Curricular Activity:** A student who is enrolled at PKMS, and is currently suspended from participation in any interscholastic athletic activity and/or co-curricular activity while enrolled at that school, (third offense), may, along with his/her parent(s)/guardian(s), submit a written request to the Building Principal or designee, asking that a review be held to consider reinstatement of eligibility. This request may not be made prior to one (1) calendar year from the date of the suspension for the third offense (please refer to **CONSEQUENCES**). CODE OF CONDUCT

Accordingly, the Athletics & Activities Director is authorized to discipline students for violations of this Code of Conduct as well as other misconduct not specified below. The discipline may range from a disciplinary conference, or restitution, to suspension or dismissal from a particular extracurricular activity or all extracurricular activities. Discipline issued by the Athletics & Activities Director under the Code of Conduct is separate from any disciplinary consequences issued by the Middle School Administration pursuant to the Middle School and District student discipline rules and policies. A student may receive both types of disciplinary consequences for the same offense.

We understand the importance of extracurricular activities and the roles they play among adolescent individuals. Please note that administration of School District 301 reserves the right to issue restorative practices as they deem appropriate in order to work with students in hopes of correcting behavior and decision making with 1st offenses. This includes but is not limited to community service hours, restorative hours around school (based on offense), online courses through various sources, book talks, or other variety methods in line with restorative justice best practices.

DEFINITIONS OF OFFENSES

- Conduct in violation of school rules and policies, as set forth in the Middle School Student Handbook and Board of Education policy, or that could be found to violate IHSA rules and regulations, local ordinance, or State or federal law

Hate Speech or Harassment is behavior aimed at a person's sex, gender identification, race, religion, creed, age, national origin, ancestry, pregnancy, marital or parental status, sexual orientation, or disability that substantially interferes with a student's school performance or creates an intimidating, hostile, or offensive school environment. Hate Speech or Harassment may be verbal, non-verbal, or physical acts during all competitions. This policy and procedure is designed to provide a consistent, rational framework for managing and dealing with situations at contests when a participant or coach believes an opposing school's participant or coach have used hate speech towards a member of their team or between teammate to teammate interaction.

“Target” refers to the individual who heard the hate speech. “Alleged offender” refers to the individual(s) who allegedly used hate speech. “Comment” refers to the hate speech or harassment that was used.

Hazing/Bullying/Hate Speech/Harassment includes, but is not limited to:

1. Any type of physical brutality, such as whipping, beating, striking, branding, electronic shocking or placing a harmful substance on the body;
2. Any type of physical activity, such as sleep deprivation, exposure to weather, confinement in a restricted area, calisthenics or other activity that subjects the student to an unreasonable risk of harm or that adversely affects the mental or physical health or safety of the student;
3. Any activity involving the consumption of a food, liquid, alcoholic beverage, drug, tobacco product or other substances that subjects the student to an unreasonable risk of harm or that adversely affects the mental or physical health or safety of the student;
4. Any activity that intimidates or threatens the student with ostracism, that subjects a student to extreme mental stress, shame or humiliation, that adversely affects the mental health or dignity of the student or discourages the student from remaining in school;
5. Any activity that includes the victimization of another student based on race, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or disability, sexual harassment, or sexual violence; or
6. Any activity that includes, causes or requires the student to perform a task that involves a violation of state or federal law.

Any student involved in hazing/bullying/Hate Speech/Harassment or initiation rites will be subject to disciplinary action. This action may include, but is not limited to, dismissal from the activity or athletic team, exclusion from participation in subsequent school activities and/or suspension or a recommendation to the school board for expulsion from school. These rules apply to all students during the school year, summer, in-season or out-of-season, on or off school property, during or outside of school hours. The student may face separate and/or additional disciplinary consequences as outlined in the Middle School Student Handbook.

SOCIAL MEDIA

Social Media has become ingrained into today's society. The wide variety of social networking tools presently available proves students easy access to share important information. However, they can also be disruptive when inappropriate social media postings occur. Using these communication tools in an inappropriate manner can have negative consequences, especially if unkind words or threats are used with intent to hurt others.

Central District 301 recognizes and supports its student-athletes and coaches rights to freedom of speech, expression, and association, including the use of social networks. Each student-athletes and coach must remember that participating and competition in Central District 301 is a privilege and not a right. The student-athlete and coach represent his or her high school and the district, therefore, they are expected to portray themselves, their team, and their high school in a positive manner at all times. Any online posting must be consistent with federal and state laws, as well as team, school, and district rules and regulations.

Specifically prohibited behaviors included but not limited to:

- Sexually explicit, profane, lewd, indecent, illegal, or defamatory language/actions.
- Pictures depicting drug/alcohol use, weapons, and “look a likes.”

- Derogatory language relevant to a person's race, gender identity, color, sexual orientation, sex or disability regarding school personnel or other students.
- Comments designed to harass or bully students and/or school personnel.
- Sexually/racially oriented or indecent photos, images or altered pictures.

PROCEDURES

- **Investigation of Alleged Violation of the Code of Conduct:**
 - When a violation of the Code of Conduct is reported to the Athletics & Activities Director, the Director will commence an investigation. As part of the investigation, and as appropriate to the circumstances, the Director may meet with the student, other student(s), staff member(s), other individuals with knowledge about the alleged violation, and/or the extracurricular activity coach(es)/sponsor(s), and will review any and all pertinent documentation or other evidence.
 - After completing their investigation, the Director will meet with the student and his/her parent(s)/guardian(s) to discuss the findings of the investigation and the consequence(s), if any. The Director's written decision will be sent to the student's parent(s)/guardian(s) via email.
 - During the Director's investigation into an alleged violation of the Code of Conduct, the student is suspended from all participation in the extra-curricular activity(ies), including all contests, practices/meetings, and any team/activity events. In addition, the student may not try out for another extracurricular activity during the investigation.
- **Appeal of Consequence for Violation of the Code of Conduct:** Because participation in extracurricular activities is a privilege and not a right, such participation is not protected by the same due process procedures applicable to regular educational programs. A student may appeal a Code of Conduct consequence to the Building Principal or designee. The request must be made in writing within five (5) days of the issuance of the consequence. The Building Principal or designee will review the appeal request, investigation information/documentation, and the Athletics & Activities Director's determination. The Building Principal or designee may meet with student(s), staff member(s), and/or individuals with knowledge about the alleged violation. The Building Principal or designee then will issue his/her decision in writing. During the appeal process, the consequence imposed by the Athletics & Activities Director remains in effect. The Building Principal or designee's decision is final.
- **Appeal of Total Suspension from Athletic or Co-Curricular Activity:** A student who is in his/her 6th through 8th grade years, and is currently suspended from participation in any interscholastic athletic activity and/or co-curricular activity for the rest his/her middle school career (third offense), may, along with his/her parent(s)/guardian(s), submit a written request to the Building Principal or designee, asking that a review be held to consider reinstatement of eligibility. This request may not be made prior to one (1) calendar year from the date of the suspension for the third offense. The burden of proof to show that the student has made appropriate changes in his/her behavior (including completion of a school-approved treatment program) is the responsibility of the student and her/his parent(s)/guardian(s). The Building Principal or designee's decision is final.

CONSEQUENCES

For students who participate in interscholastic athletic activities and hold executive leadership positions in co-curricular activities, any consequence issued for violating the Code of Conduct applies to both activities based on the offense levels set forth below.

The Athletics & Activities Director retains the sole discretion to declare a student ineligible from trying out for and joining another interscholastic athletic team or joining and taking on an executive leadership role in a co-curricular activity while he/she currently has any unserved suspension pending. A student is prohibited from trying out for and joining an interscholastic athletic team or joining and taking on an executive leadership role in

a co-curricular activity for the sole purpose of serving a penalty to avoid missing all or part of a season with his/her primary interscholastic athletic team or co-curricular activity.

Consequences assessed prior to a student entering middle school shall not apply to the student's cumulative disciplinary record at middle school.

Comparable Product Offenses: *This includes but not limited to vape, vape devices, tobacco, nicotine, THC, narcotics, alcohol or any other substances deemed illegal by law or Central School District 301.*

○ **Interscholastic Athletics**

- **First Offense:** The student will be suspended for 40% of the scheduled interscholastic athletic activity contests within a season (exact number to be determined by the Athletics & Activities Director) beginning with the current season (if the student is "in season") or next season of participation for the student. If the suspension continues past the conclusion of a season, the consequence will be continued into the beginning of the next season of the student's participation.
 - This consequence may be reduced to 25% of the scheduled contests upon successful completion of the following: The student-athlete voluntarily agrees to participate in a formal substance abuse assessment program at a school-approved agency, complete restorative practices outlined by the athletic/activities department that may include by not limited to, community service hours, peer resolution, book studies, online course completion, or anything else that is deemed beneficial and necessary to try and correct student behavior.
- **Second Offense:** The student will be suspended from participating in any interscholastic athletic activity for one (1) full season. If the suspension continues past the conclusion of the season, the consequence will be continued into the beginning of the next season of the student's participation.
- **Third Offense:** The student will be suspended from participating in any interscholastic athletic activity for the rest of the student's middle school career.

○ **Co-Curricular Activities**

- **First Offense:** The student will be suspended from participating in any co-curricular activities for a period of nine (9) weeks of school (exact number of days to be determined by the Athletics & Activities Director).
- **Second Offense:** The student will be suspended from participating in any co-curricular activities for a period of eighteen (18) weeks of school (exact dates to be determined by the Athletics & Activities Director).
- **Third Offense:** The student will be suspended from participating in any co-curricular activity for the remainder of the student's high school career.

- **All Other Conduct Offenses:** The following consequences are not issued in progressive manner and may be combined.
 - Conference with student, coach(es)/sponsor(s), parent(s)/guardian(s), and/or the Athletics & Activities Director.
 - Temporary suspension from contests and/or practices/meetings.
 - Suspension for one-third (1/3) of season by contests or 6 weeks for activity.
 - Suspension for remainder of season or activity in current school year.
 - Suspension for remainder of season and up to one-third (1/3) of next season, or remainder of the activity in the current school year and up to 6 weeks of the activity the next school year.
 - Suspension for remainder of middle school career.

- Restitution for vandalism or destruction of property.

PARTICIPATION IN SUBSTANCE ABUSE ASSESSMENT PROGRAM

A student's participation in the Substance Abuse Assessment Program is cumulative over the student's middle school career for a **maximum of two times**. If a student wishes to participate in a substance abuse assessment program to reduce the imposed extracurricular activity consequence outlined above, the following rules apply:

- The program must be approved by the Building Principal or designee.
- The program must be scheduled and started within 10 school days of the start of the consequence period.
- If the program is not completed within 30 school days of the start of the program, the full suspension penalty will be in force. If a program is longer than 30 school days, it must be completed within the timeframe specified by the program. It is the student's and his/her parent(s)/guardian(s)'s responsibility to notify the Athletics & Activities Director if the program is longer than 30 school days.
- The student must agree to complete the follow-up activity developed by the Athletics & Activities Director or designee in collaboration with the program within the established timeframe.
- The student's parent(s)/guardian(s), and/or student if required, must sign a consent form that allows the program and middle school officials to exchange information and documentation regarding the student's participation in the program, program completion, and any recommended follow-up activities.
- If the student does not complete the agreed-to follow-up activity within the timeframe established by the agency or the school, the consequence will be reinstated in full. If the student has participated in any contests based on the assumption that the follow-up activity would be completed, additional suspension from contests will be added to the end of the initial suspension period.
- The student and/or the student's parent(s)/guardian(s) are responsible for all costs associated with the program and any follow-up activities.

Extracurricular activities are for the benefit of students and are meant to supplement students' educational programs at the middle school level. Unless pre-approved by the Administration in limited circumstances, extracurricular activities are *never* a reason for an absence from class or school or not completing schoolwork.

In order to participate in middle school extracurricular activities, students and their parent(s)/guardian(s) must sign the Athletics & Activities Handbook Acknowledgement Form prior to participation in each interscholastic athletic team or co-curricular activity.

ATHLETICS & ACTIVITIES HANDBOOK ACKNOWLEDGEMENT FORM

I have received and read the Student Athletics & Activities Handbook (electronic version) for the 2023-2024 school year. I understand that I am personally responsible for reviewing and understanding the information contained in the Handbook. I also understand that I am subject to and must abide by all athletics and activities rules in this Handbook, all team rules, and all District policies. I also understand that a violation of any athletics and activities rules, team rules, or the District's policies may lead to disciplinary consequences.

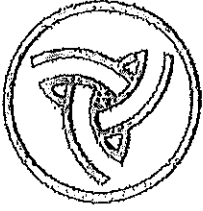

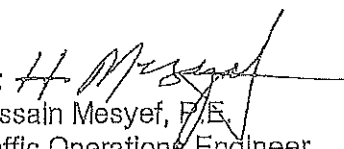

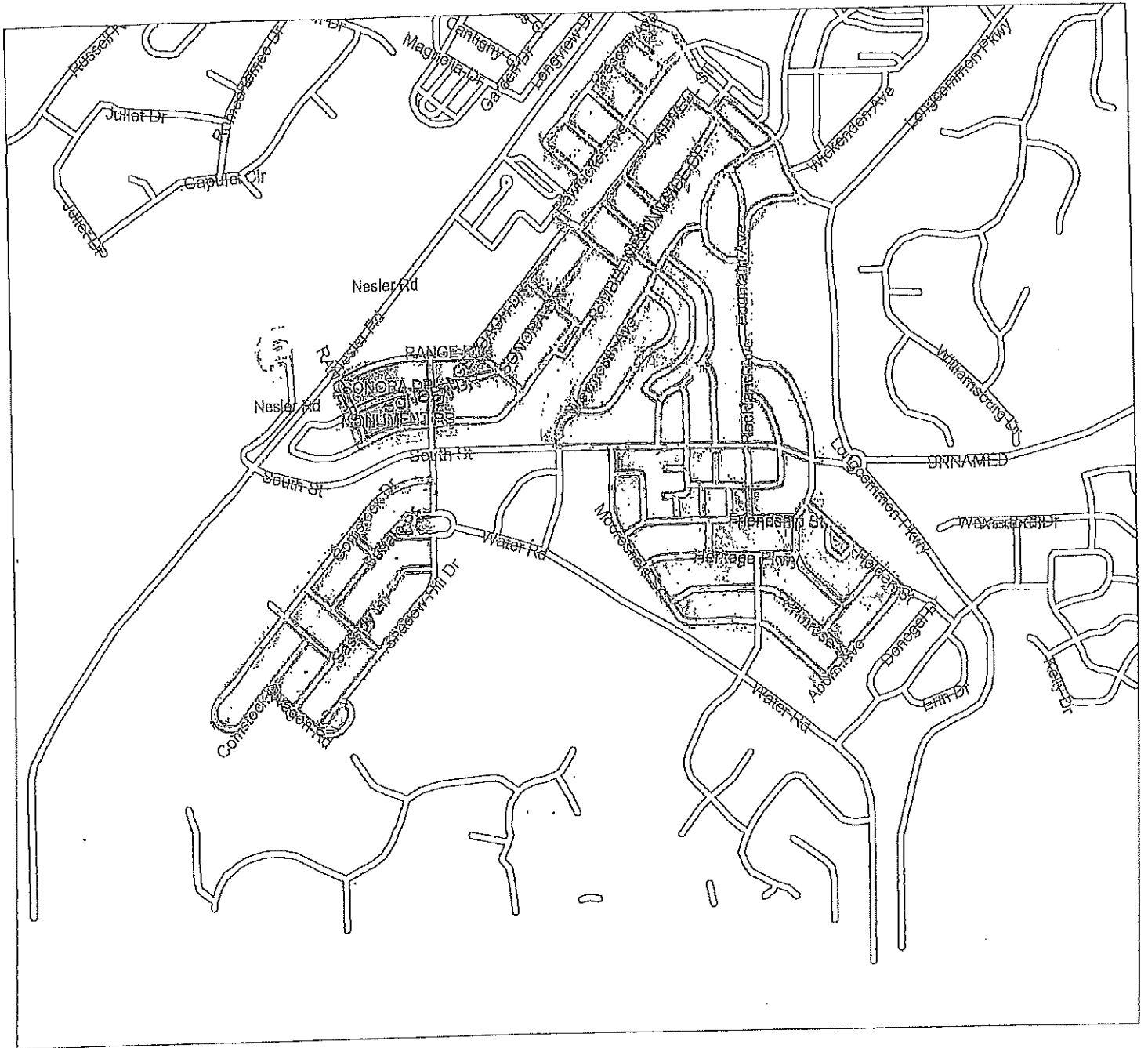

**INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT
BY AND BETWEEN
BOARD OF EDUCATION OF
CENTRAL COMMUNITY UNIT SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 301,
COUNTY OF KANE
AND
KANE COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE
FOR THE
RECIPROCAL REPORTING OF STUDENT OFFENSES**

August 1, 2023, through July 31, 2027

This Agreement is by and between the Kane County Sheriff's Office ("Sheriff's Office") and the Board of Education of Central Community Unit School District #301 ("School District"), together the "Parties."

WHEREAS, Section 10-20.14 of the Illinois School Code (105 ILCS 5/10- 20.14(b)), authorizes a reciprocal reporting system between the school district and local law enforcement agencies regarding criminal offenses committed by students; and

WHEREAS, Section 1-7(A)(8) of the Juvenile Court Act (705 ILCS 405/1- 7(A)(8)), and Section 5-905(h) of the Juvenile Court Act (705 ILCS 405/5-905(l)(h)) govern juvenile law enforcement records; and

WHEREAS, the Parties have determined they must foster cooperation and improve the flow of information between the Sheriff's Office and the School District if there is an imminent threat of physical harm to students, school personnel, or others who are present in the school or on school grounds; and

WHEREAS, for purposes of this Agreement:

"Appropriate school official" means the individual designee(s) at the School District and/or school building appointed to receive, report, and coordinate the law enforcement records or student information that is the subject of this Agreement.

"Investigation" means an official systematic inquiry by a law enforcement agency into

actual or suspected criminal activity.

"Juvenile law enforcement records" include records of arrest, station adjustments, fingerprints, probation adjustments, the issuance of a notice to appear, or any other records or documents maintained by any law enforcement agency relating to a minor suspected of committing an offense, and records maintained by a law enforcement agency that identifies a juvenile as a suspect in committing an offense, but does not include records identifying a juvenile as a victim, witness, or missing juvenile and any records created, maintained, or used for purposes of referral to programs relating to diversion as defined in subsection (6) of Section 5-105 of the Juvenile Court Act (705 ILCS 405/5-105(6)).

"Minor" means a person under the age of 21 years subject to the Juvenile Court Act.

"Juvenile" means a minor who has been investigated, arrested or taken into custody before his or her 18th birthday.

"Student information" is information pertaining to students enrolled in the School District.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing, as well as the mutual covenants and agreements herein set forth, the Parties, by their execution of this Agreement, hereby agree as follows:

The Sheriff's Office Agrees:

1. To provide, maintain, and update as needed, a list of sheriff's deputies responsible for the receipt, disclosure, and coordination of juvenile law enforcement records and student information including the sheriff's deputies' contact information.
2. Disclosure of law enforcement records to the School District
 - A. Pursuant to 705 ILCS 405/1-7(A)(8) and 705 ILCS405/5-905(1)(h), allow for the inspection and copying of juvenile law enforcement records by the appropriate school official concerning a minor who has been investigated, arrested, or taken into custody before his or her 18th birthday and enrolled in a

school within the School District, only if the agency or officer believes that there is an imminent threat of physical harm to students, school personnel, or others who are present in the school or on school grounds.

B. Pursuant to 705 ILCS 405/1-7(A)(8), inspection and copying of juvenile law enforcement records shall be limited to records concerning a minor enrolled in a school within the school district, who has been arrested or taken into custody for any of the following offenses, as such list may be revised by statutory amendment:

- (i) any violation of Article 24 of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012;
- (ii) a violation of the Illinois Controlled Substances Act;
- (iii) a violation of the Cannabis Control Act;
- (iv) a forcible felony as defined in Section 2-8 of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012;
- (v) a violation of the Methamphetamine Control and Community Protection Act;
- (vi) a violation of Section 1-2 of the Harassing and Obscene Communications Act; (Repeal ed.)
- (vii) a violation of the Hazing Act; or
- (viii) a violation of Section 12-1, 12-2, 12-3, 12-3.05, 12-3.1, 12-3.2, 12-3.4, 12-3.5, 12-5, 12-7.3, 12-7.4, 12-7.5, 25-1, or 25-5 of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012.

C. Any information provided to the appropriate school officials by the Sheriff's Office about a minor who is the subject of a current police investigation that is directly related to school safety, shall consist of oral information only and not written juvenile law enforcement records.

D. Pursuant to 105 ILCS 5/22-20, report to the principal of a child's public school

if the child is detained for proceedings for any criminal offense or a violation of a municipal or county ordinance by providing information as to the basis of the detention, the circumstances surrounding the events which led to the child's detention, and status of the proceedings, and updates as appropriate to notify the principal of developments and the disposition of the matter.

- E. To the extent allowed by law, provide to the School District law enforcement record information concerning students enrolled in the District who have been arrested or taken into custody on or after their 18th birthday.

The School District Agrees:

1. To provide, maintain, and update as needed, a list of appropriate school officials responsible for the receipt, disclosure, and coordination of law enforcement records and student information, including contact information.

2. To provide student information to the Sheriff's Office, verbally or in writing, when requested by the Sheriff's Office as needed for the performance of their official duties related to preadjudicatory intervention with students when determined by the School District to be lawful and appropriate.

3. That oral information provided by the Sheriff's Office about a minor who is the subject of a current police investigation that is directly related to school safety, shall be used solely by the appropriate school official or officials to protect the safety of students and employees in the school and aid in the proper rehabilitation of the child.

4. That juvenile law enforcement record information received from the Sheriff's Office shall be kept separate and shall not become a part of the official school record of the student in accordance with 705 ILCS 405/1-7(A)(8)(A), 705 ILCS 405/1-7(8)(B), and 705 ILCS 405/5- 905(1)(h).

The Parties Agree:

- 1. Any and all information received by any Party as a result of this Agreement

shall be kept confidential by the Parties in accordance with any and all applicable laws, and shall not be disclosed to another party except as provided by law.

2. If the designated law enforcement and school officials deem it to be in the best interest of the minor, the student may be referred to in-school or community-based social services if those services are available. "Rehabilitation services" may include interventions by school support personnel, evaluation for eligibility for special education, referrals to community-based agencies such as youth services, behavioral healthcare service providers, drug and alcohol prevention or treatment programs, and other interventions as deemed appropriate for the student.

3. The term of this Agreement shall begin upon execution by both Parties or July 31, 2023, whichever is later, and shall continue until July 31, 2027, or upon termination by either Party.

4. Any modifications to this Agreement may be made only through written mutual consent of the Parties.

5. A Party may terminate their involvement in this Agreement by providing thirty days' prior written notice to the other Party.

6. The Parties are entering into this Agreement to support the lawful exchange of information related to students. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to limit a Party's authority otherwise granted by law to release information to the other Party.

RE: FY24 Northern Kane County Regional Vocational System Final Budget

Attached is the final budget for FY24. There were no budget revisions made from the tentative budget to the final budget. The unaudited beginning fund balance is still recorded in this budget and may change slightly once the audit is complete. Current cash reserves from the Treasurer's report dated June 30, 2023 total \$428,177.64.

1. The budget is balanced with revenues and expenditures.
2. Revenues for the Federal Perkins V Grant increased from \$611,156 to \$677,270 for FY24. The CTEI Grant also had an increase in revenues from \$1,151,201 to \$1,320,526 and may be increased in the future depending on State funding.
3. The CTE Education Pathway Grant revenues decreased from \$91,836 to \$45,233 as this is only a four-year grant and we are spending down the total grant amount each year.
4. This year we also have a new revenue stream from the STAMP Grant (Scaling Transformative Advanced Manufacturing Pathways) from the Illinois Manufacturers Association. This total grant is \$34,000 and will be used to fund work-based learning opportunities and summer internships for students.
5. Expenditures will be covered by a combination of all four of these grants.

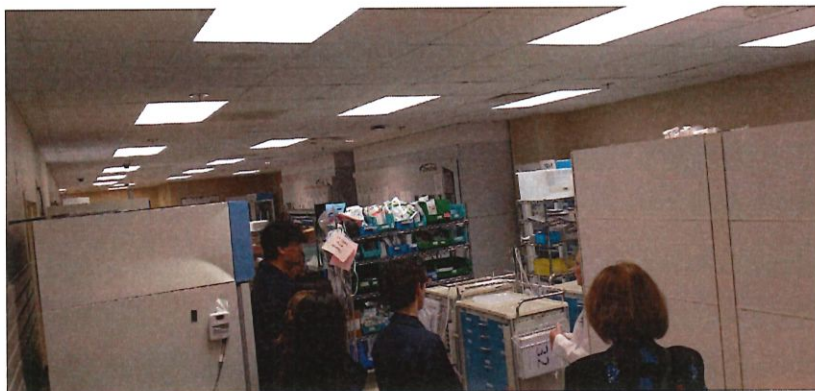

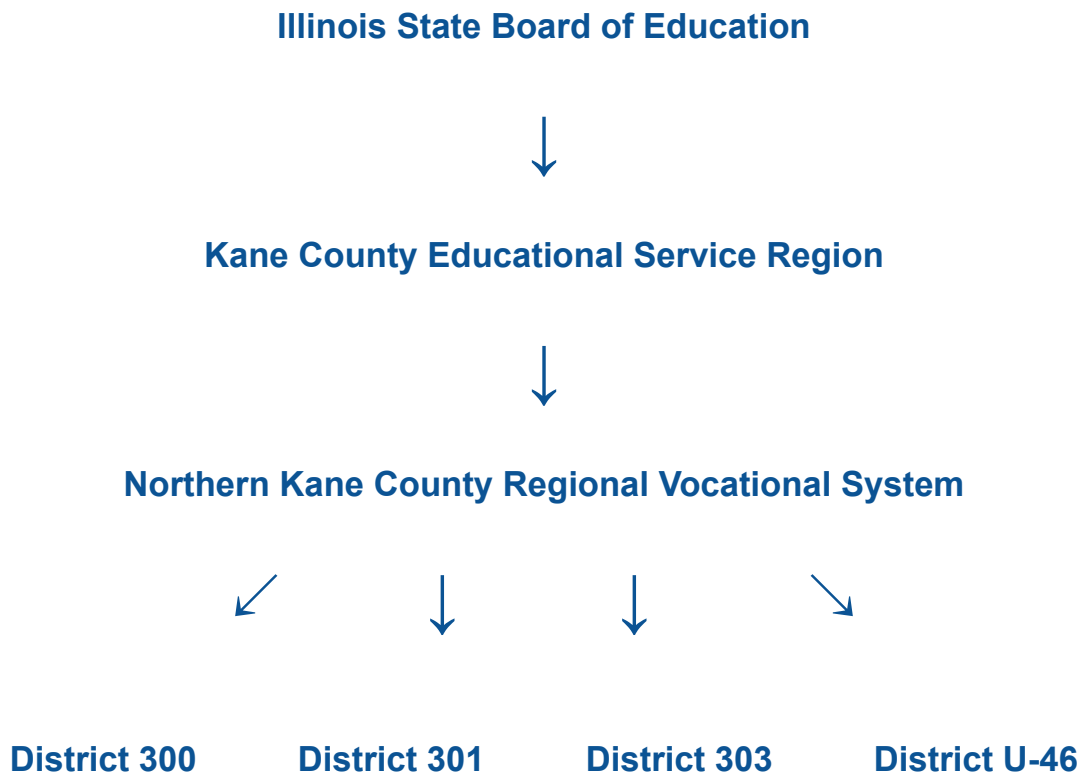
Revenues

Attached is the tentative budget for FY24. Listed below are some key points:

1. The tentative budget has a deficit balance in Operations & Maintenance Fund due to capital projects drawing down the fund balance. Since we have been fiscally responsible in previous years, our accumulated increases in our fund balances allow us to pay for these capital projects without needing to go out to referendum or increasing taxes to our community.
2. All funds are projected to end in positive fund balances.
3. The Illinois State Board of Education has projected that Central 301's Evidence-Based Funding revenues will increase by \$2,992,208. We are still in Tier 1 in the EBF calculation which gives us more funding.
4. Categorical payments have been budgeted at four payments - one owed from FY23 and three of the four owed for FY24.
5. These figures are conservative but realistic, especially with all the unknowns of prices increases.
6. Budget revisions may come in the final budget for grants, new staff salaries, levy revenues and possible shifts in EBF revenues and balance transfers from funds to offset some of the Operations and Maintenance deficit.

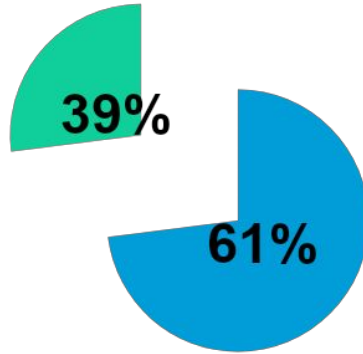

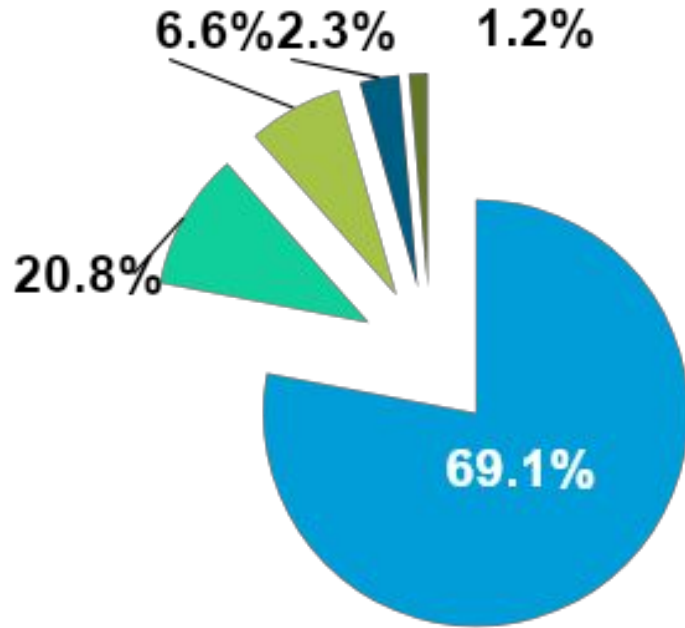

Thank you for writing to Central Community Unit School District No. 301 ("District") with your request for information pursuant to the Illinois *Freedom of Information Act* ("FOIA"), 5 ILCS 140/1 et seq., received on Thursday, July 26, 2023.

Your request is restated below.

“ Please provide me with documents sufficient to show all communications (emails, letters, texts, board proceedings, or notes from phone calls) received by Central Community Unit School District 301, which include a request to reconsider, ban, and/or challenge any book or any other material in any of your school district’s libraries or classrooms. I am hoping that any existing documents will include the following:

- 1. The date of each such request;*
- 2. The title(s) of each book(s) or other material that was requested to be pulled from your shelves or classrooms, as well as any reason stated by the requestor;*
- 3. Any response (email, letters, texts, board proceedings, or notes from phone calls) from anyone in your district, your school board, or individual school, to each request;*
- 4. The resolution of each request (i.e.: the book or material was removed completely; the book or material was partially restricted; the book or material remains on your shelves or in your classrooms; etc.).*

· Please also provide me with any documented threats that have been received by Central Community Unit School District 301, your school board, or any of your individual schools, librarians or teachers, via email, letters, texts, or voicemail recordings, that are related to books or other material kept in one of your libraries or classrooms.”

As written, your request would require the District to review thousands of potentially responsive emails to determine what information is responsive and exempt under FOIA. It would take an inordinate amount of staff and/or attorney time to analyze, review, and redact all of the responsive materials to comply with your request. See Ill. Att’y Gen. PAC Req. Rev. Ltr. 37598, issued October 27, 2015, at 2-3 (a request requiring a school district to de-duplicate, review, and redact over 2000 e-mails was unduly burdensome). In addition, your request fails to include any search terms in which you are interested. See *National Ass’n of Criminal Defense Lawyers v. Chicago Police Dept.*, 399 Ill. App. 3d 1, 17 (1st Dist. 2010) (“A request that is overly broad and requires the public body to locate, review, redact and arrange for inspection a vast quantity of material that is largely unnecessary to the appellants’ purpose constitutes an undue burden.”). Because of the size and anticipated burdens of your request, we must invite you to confer with us in an attempt to reduce the request to



more manageable proportions. Unless you reduce the request to a manageable scope and provide more specific search criteria and a much narrower date range, we believe that compliance with your request would disrupt the duly-undertaken work of the District in violation of the purposes of the FOIA statute. See 5 ILCS 140/1. If you choose not to narrow your request, we believe the burdens of your request will outweigh any public interest in the information, and we would need to deny your request pursuant to FOIA Section 3(g).

If you wish to discuss your options for reducing the scope of your request, kindly contact me. If you narrow your request to a manageable scope, we will be happy to provide a response to your request on its merits, which may include a denial of your request in part or in full as allowed under the FOIA statute. If you do not wish to narrow the request, the request will be deemed “unduly burdensome” within the meaning of FOIA. See 5 ILCS 140/3(g).
