**X.L. Resolution Authorizing the Transfer of Funds, the Establishment of an Escrow Account with Respect to and the Defeasance of Certain of the General Obligation School Building and Improvement Bonds, Series 2018, Dated July 2, 2018.**

WHEREAS, the D.C. Everest Area School District, Marathon County, Wisconsin (the "District") has outstanding its General Obligation School Building and Improvement Bonds, Series 2018, dated July 2, 2018 (the "2018 Bonds") which were issued for the public purpose of paying the cost of a district-wide school building and improvement program consisting of: construction of classroom and technical education additions at Senior High; remodeling and building modernizations at Senior High, Junior High, Middle School, and Hatley Elementary; construction of cafetorium, classroom additions, and remodeling and reconfiguration at Rothschild, Weston, Riverside, and Evergreen Elementary Schools; district-wide safety and security, capital maintenance, building infrastructure and parking and site improvements including Mountain Bay Elementary; and acquisition of furnishings, fixtures, and equipment; WHEREAS, the District has certain debt service funds and other funds on hand (the "Funds") sufficient to defease a portion of the debt service on the 2018 Bonds; WHEREAS, the School Board of the District deems it desirable and in the best interest of the District to transfer and apply such Funds to the defeasance and early redemption of a portion of the 2018 Bonds; and WHEREAS, since the 2018 Bonds are not currently callable, it is necessary for the available Funds to be irrevocably deposited into an escrow account, invested in direct obligations of the United States of America, treated as a portion of the debt service fund for the 2018 Bonds and applied to pay the principal of and interest on \$1,500,000 of the 2028 maturity, \$1,410,000 of the 2033 maturity and all of the remaining outstanding portion of the 2034 maturity of the 2018 Bonds (the "Defeased Obligations") on the April 1, 2027 early redemption date. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the School Board of the District that: 1. Establishment of Escrow Account. The School Board hereby authorizes and directs the officers of the District to enter into an Escrow Agreement with Associated Trust Company, National Association, as Escrow Agent (the "Escrow Agent"), for the purpose of effecting the provisions of the Resolution. 2. Transfer and Deposit to Escrow Account. The School Board hereby authorizes and approves the transfer and deposit of the Funds into the Escrow Account to be established with the Escrow Agent in an amount sufficient, together with earnings

thereon, to provide for the payment of the Defeased Obligations concurrently with the execution of the Escrow Agreement, and the subsequent use, investment and disbursement thereof by the Escrow Agent in the manner provided by the Escrow Agreement. 3. Professional Services. The School Board hereby ratifies and approves the retention of PMA Securities, LLC ("PMA") to provide general consulting services in connection with this transaction; Quarles & Brady LLP ("Bond Counsel") to provide limited, special counsel legal services in connection with this transaction; and Robert Thomas CPA, LLC to provide mathematical verification and related services in connection with this transaction. 4. Redemption of the Defeased Obligations, Notice of Defeasance and Redemption. The Defeased Obligations are hereby called for redemption on April 1, 2027. The School Board hereby directs the Escrow Agent pursuant to the Escrow Agreement to provide a notice of the defeasance of said Defeased Obligations and a notice with respect to the redemption of the Defeased Obligations at the times and in the manner set forth in the final Escrow Agreement. 5. Authorization of Officers and Agents. The School Board hereby authorizes the appropriate officers and agents of the District to work with PMA and the Escrow Agent to review and approve the finalized Escrow Agreement including the escrow deposit and other details, to provide the notices of defeasance and redemption and to execute and deliver all documents required by Bond Counsel with respect to this transaction. #### 5136 - PERSONAL COMMUNICATION DEVICES

The Board is aware that PCDs are used by students and parents to communicate with each other. However, the use of PCDs on school grounds must be appropriately regulated to protect students, staff, and the learning environment.

"Personal communication devices" ("PCDs"), also referred to as "wireless communication devices", as used in this policy, mean a portable wireless device that has the capability to provide voice, messaging, or other data communication between two (2) or more parties and includes all of the following: ~~are defined in Bylaw 0100.~~

- A. cellular/mobile telephone;
- B. tablet computer;
- C. laptop computer;
- D. gaming device;
- E. smartphone;
- F. e-reader;
- G. smartwatch;
- H. wearable technology that captures images or video;
- I. any other web-enabled devices of any type.

Students may use PCDs before and after school, during their lunch break, in between classes as long as they do not create a distraction, disruption, or otherwise interfere with the educational environment, during after-school activities (e.g., extra-curricular activities), and at school-related functions. Use of PCDs, ~~except those approved by a teacher or administrator,~~ at any other time is prohibited and they must be powered completely off (i.e. not just placed into vibrate or silent mode) and stored out of sight. Individual buildings may develop more stringent protocols based on the ages of the students they serve.

~~During after school activities, PCDs shall be powered completely off (not just placed into vibrate or silent mode) and stored out of sight when directed by the administrator or sponsor.~~

Except as authorized by a teacher, administrator, or IEP team, students are prohibited from using PCDs during the school day, including while off-campus on a field trip, to capture, record, and/or transmit the words or sounds (i.e., audio) and/or images (i.e., pictures/video) of any student, staff member, or other person. Using a PCD to capture, record, and/or transmit audio and/or pictures/video of an individual without proper consent is considered an invasion of privacy and is not permitted. Students who violate this provision and/or use a PCD to violate the privacy rights of another person may have their PCD confiscated and held until the end of the school day and/or a parent picks it up and may be directed to delete the audio and/or picture/video file while the parent is present. If the violation involves potentially illegal activity, the confiscated PCD may be turned over to law enforcement.

PCDs with cameras or any other recording capabilities may not be activated or utilized at any time in any school situation where a reasonable expectation of personal privacy exists. These locations and circumstances include, but are not limited to, classrooms, gymnasiums, locker rooms, shower facilities, rest/bathrooms, and any other areas where students or others may change clothes or be in any stage or degree of disrobing or changing clothes. The Superintendent and building principals are authorized to determine other specific locations and situations where use of a PCD is absolutely prohibited.

Students shall have no expectation of confidentiality with respect to their use of PCDs on school premises/property.

Students may not use a PCD in any way that might reasonably create in the mind of another person an impression of being threatened, humiliated, harassed, embarrassed, or intimidated. See Policy 5517.01 – Bullying. In particular, students are prohibited from using PCDs to: 1) transmit material that is threatening, obscene, disruptive, or sexually explicit or that can be construed as harassment or disparagement of others based upon ~~any Protected Class consistent with Board Policy 2260 - Nondiscrimination and Access to Equal Educational Opportunity~~ their race, color, national origin, sex (including sexual orientation/transgender identity), disability, age, religion, ancestry, or political beliefs; and 2) engage in "sexting" - i.e., sending, receiving, sharing, viewing, or possessing pictures, text messages, e-mails, or other materials of a sexual nature in electronic or any other form. Violation of these prohibitions shall result in disciplinary action. Furthermore, such actions will be reported to local law enforcement and child services as required by law.

Students are also prohibited from using a PCD to capture, record, and/or transmit test information or any other information in a manner constituting fraud, theft, cheating, or academic dishonesty. Likewise, students are prohibited from using PCDs to receive such information.

Possession of a PCD by a student at school during school hours and/or during extra-curricular activities is a privilege that may be forfeited by any student who fails to abide by the terms of this policy, or otherwise abuses this privilege.

### Policy Violations

Violations of this policy may result in disciplinary action and/or confiscation of the PCD. The building principal will also refer the matter to law enforcement or child services if the violation involves an illegal activity (e.g., child pornography, sexting). Discipline will be imposed on an escalating scale ranging from a warning to an expulsion based on the number of previous violations and/or the nature of or circumstances surrounding a particular violation. If the PCD is confiscated, it will be released/returned to the student's parent after the student complies with any other disciplinary consequences that are imposed unless the violation involves potentially illegal activity in which case the PCD may be turned over to law enforcement.

A confiscated device will be marked in a removable manner with the student's name and held in a secure location in the building's central office until it is retrieved by the parent or turned over to law enforcement. School officials will not search or otherwise tamper with PCDs in District custody unless they reasonably suspect that the search is required to discover evidence of a violation of the law or other school rules. Any search will be conducted in accordance with Policy 5771 - Search and Seizure. If multiple offenses occur, a student may lose his/her the privilege to bring a PCD to school for a designated length of time or on a permanent basis.

### [DRAFTING NOTE: The language below is required per WI Statute 120.12 (29)]

Student use of PCDs in the following circumstances will not be considered a violation of this policy:

- A. **Emergency or Threat:** Student use of a PCD is allowed in the event of an emergency or a perceived threat to address the safety and security of students and staff.
- B. **Health Care Management:** Student use is authorized as necessary to manage or support a specific student's health care needs (X ) as approved by the District Nurse ( ) as defined in the individual student health plan **[END OF OPTIONS]**.
- C. **Individualized Education Plans:** Student use is authorized consistent with a student's Individualized Education Program (IEP) or a plan developed under Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973.
- D. **Educational Purposes:** Student use is authorized by a teacher for legitimate educational purposes during instructional time as described above.

### Duty to Report

A person who discovers a student using a PCD in violation of this policy is required to report the violation to the building principal.

### Students Responsible for Their PCDs

Students are personally and solely responsible for the care and security of their PCDs. The Board assumes no responsibility for theft, loss, or damage to, or misuse or unauthorized use of, PCDs brought onto its property.

**X ]** Parents are advised that the best way to get in touch with their child during the school day is by calling the school office.

Students may use school phones to contact parents during the school day.

### Annual Notice

No later than October 1 of each year, the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) shall be notified by the District of whether any changes have been made to this policy and, if so, the updated policy shall be submitted to the DPI.

The guidelines shall also require that the funds are used for school-related projects that have the approval of the Superintendent and the Principal.

Each volunteer organization that intends to work within the school setting may only do so in cooperation with the Principal and other staff members, including for such activities as fundraisers, meetings, and the like.

The Board believes that school support organizations (SSOs) provide invaluable assistance to the students of this District and its programs and appreciates the efforts of all organizations whose objectives are to enhance the educational experiences of District students, to help meet educational needs of students, and/or provide extra educational benefits not provided for, at the time, by the Board. The Board encourages parents and staff to participate in such organizations.

## **Definitions**

For purposes of this policy, the following terms are defined as follows:

**SSOs:** include the following: Booster Club, Foundation, Parent Teacher Association (PTA), Parent Teacher Organization (PTO), Parent Teacher Support Association, or any other nongovernmental organization or group of persons whose primary purpose is to support a District, school, school club, or academic, arts, athletic or social activities related to a school, that collects or receives money, materials, property or securities from students, parents or members of the general public.

**[ ]** A group of people who merely request that students, parents, or members of the general public make donations to a District, school, school club, or academic, arts, athletic or social activity related to a school or assist in the raising of funds for a specified purpose under the sponsorship of a school employee where the funds are turned over to the school to be used for the specific purpose for which the funds were raised, shall not be considered a SSO. **[END OF OPTION]**

**Donation:** Any gift or contribution of money, materials, property or securities from any nongovernmental source received by a school official or employee for the benefit of a District, school, school club, or academic, arts, athletic or social activity related to a school.

**Internal School Funds:** Any and all money received and accounted for at individual schools by school administration, and specifically include, but are not limited to: (a) Any donation or grant made to the school, a school club, or any academic, arts, athletic or social activity related to a school; (b) Funds for cafeteria services operated at the school; (c) Fees collected by the school; (d) Funds transferred to the local school from the school board that are to be accounted for at the local school level; (d) Funds raised through cooperative agreements with outside organizations; (e) Rental fees charged outside entities for use of school facilities; and (f) Student activity funds.

The ( X ) Superintendent (  ~~) Principal **[END OF OPTION]** is authorized to provide support and assistance as appropriate upon the request of such an organization.~~

## **X ] Prior Approval Process**

Before the SSO may begin soliciting, raising, or collecting money, materials, property, or securities to support a District, school, school club or any academic, arts, athletic or social activity or event related to a school, the SSO shall submit documentation to the District, that at a minimum, documents the following:

- A. The SSO's status as a nonprofit organization, foundation or a chartered member of a nonprofit organization or foundation; provided, however, that nothing in this section shall require that the organization be a 501(c)(3) organization under the Internal Revenue Code, codified in 26 U.S.C. 501(c)(3);
- B. The goals and objectives of the SSO; and
- C. The telephone number, address and position of each officer of the organization.

Additionally, prior to approving an SSO, the Superintendent shall:

- A. review the objectives of the SSO to determine that relevant educational needs are being addressed;
- B. monitor the plans and activities of the SSO for compliance with laws, Board policies, and any administrative guidelines;

### Annual Requirements

~~(-) The SSO shall annually, before the beginning of the school year, submit documentation to the District verifying its continued existence as a nonprofit organization. The digital form shall document, at a minimum:~~

- A. ~~the goals and objectives of the organization; and~~
- B. ~~the current telephone number, address and position of each officer of the organization.~~

~~(-) The SSO shall file a statement of total revenues and disbursements at the end of the school year.~~

~~(-) The SSO shall also annually provide a digital record an annual remittance of insurance coverage.~~

Approval is required before an SSO undertakes any fundraising activity to ensure there will be minimal conflicts in the scheduling of fundraisers. This approval shall not make the fundraising activity a school-sponsored activity.

~~(-) The District shall post or publish a list of organizations that have complied with State law and the requirements detailed in this policy. This posting or publication will be published by \_\_\_\_\_ on the District's website.~~

~~(-) Any SSO that has met the requirements of this policy and is officially listed on the District's website, the Board will provide annual training to, at a minimum, the officers of the SSO to aid in full compliance with these established standards.~~

### Recordkeeping Requirements

All SSOs shall maintain, at a minimum, the following:

- A. detailed statements of receipts and disbursements;
- B. minutes of any meetings; and
- C. a copy of its charter, bylaws, and documentation of its recognition as a nonprofit organization.

~~(-) The SSO records shall be maintained for a period of at least four (4) years and be available upon request by any member of the District community.~~

~~(-) Upon request, the SSO shall provide to the District, or any authorized and appropriate Auditor, access to all books, records, and bank account information for the organization.~~

### SSO Officer Responsibilities

~~(-) A District staff member may not be a treasurer or bookkeeper for an SSO. Further, a staff member shall not be the signatory on the checks of an SSO.~~

### **[ X Limitation of Liability**

The Superintendent shall require each SSOs fundraising activities comply with all applicable Board policies, including, but not limited to, the requirement that, if approved, fundraisers that involve the sale to students of food items or beverages to be consumed on campus can only be conducted from thirty (30) minutes following the close of the last lunch period until thirty (30) minutes after the end of the school day.

All disbursements of donations shall comply with State and Federal law as well as the provisions in Policy 6608 - Accountability and Oversight of Fundraiser and Crowdfunding Disbursements.

**(X )** SSOs shall indemnify and hold the Board harmless from and against any and all claims and causes of action arising out of or related to the SSOs' acts and omissions in carrying out their activities. The District, Board, or any Board staff member shall not incur any liability for the recognition of an SSO or the SSO's failure to safeguard school support organization funds.

~~(-) SSOs shall purchase liability insurance (riders—self insured) to cover such indemnification and to protect the SSO and Board against claims for damage or injury resulting from any act or omission on the part of the SSO. The amount of insurance coverage shall not be less than \$1,000,000, and the SSO shall provide the Board with sufficient digital documentation demonstrating that the Board is named as an additional insured on the policy.~~

~~(-) The Board may require additional coverage for on site events.~~

~~(-) The Board may offer the opportunity for any authorized SSO to receive coverage under the Board's liability insurance program to protect the entity against claims resulting from damage or injury resulting from any act or omission of the SSO. The SSO shall pay for such coverage.~~

### **Nondiscrimination**

SSOs shall allow participation by parents, staff, and community members. All meetings should be communicated to the District and/or school and be open to the public. SSOs shall not discriminate on the basis of a class of individuals protected by State and/or Federal law (collectively "protected classes").

Persons shall not be excluded from participation in SSOs based upon the extent or level of their past participation.

**Other Rules and Procedures**

The following additional rules and procedures shall govern the working relationships between the Board, staff, and any approved SSO. The Board may revoke formal recognition and suspend fundraising privileges of any SSO that fails to comply with these rules:

- A. The Board relies upon approved SSOs to operate in a manner consistent with public expectations for the schools and reserves the right to withdraw sponsorship from any outside support organization that violates the bounds of community taste.
- B. Membership should be available to staff, as appropriate, and members of the community in addition to parents.
- C. SSOs shall work in cooperation with the Principal and other staff members and shall abide by the policies of the Board. It shall be the responsibility of each outside support organization to monitor its activities to assure compliance with Board policy.
- D. SSOs are encouraged to set goals that are consistent with those of the particular programs, activities or sports being supported as articulated by the coach/advisor and/or athletic director of such program, activity or sport, to avoid duplication of effort and to maximize the benefit to the organization or group.
- E. SSOs must abide by the policies and procedures established for the use of Board facilities and grounds. Projects that require any modification or alteration to Board property must be pre-approved by the Superintendent.

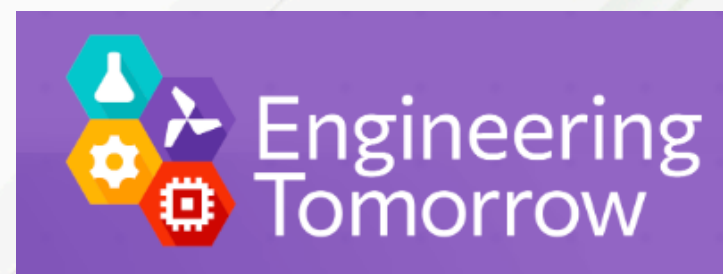

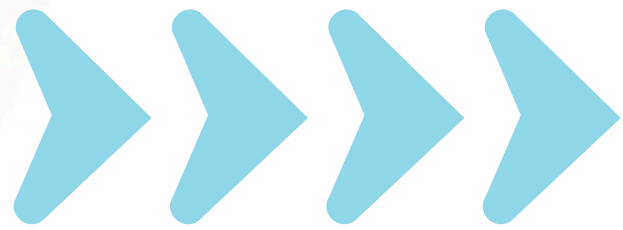


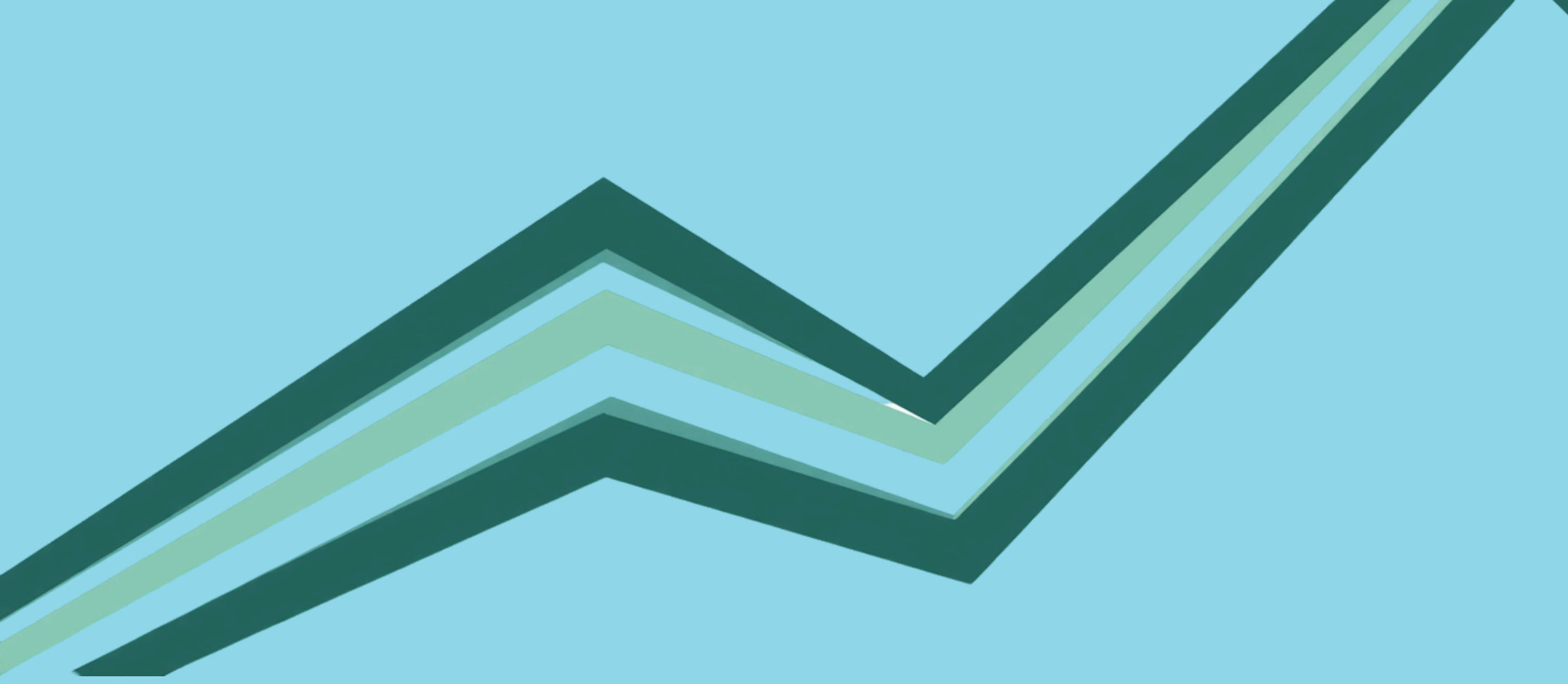

A school or school district is required to exclude non-compliant students if the compliance level was less than 99% during the previous school year. Students are considered “compliant” if they meet minimum requirements, are considered in process, or have a waiver. Our school district’s compliance percentage for the 2025-2026 school year increased to 99.9%. Since we met the 99% compliance criteria as a district, it is not recommended to exclude non-compliant students for the 2026-2027 school year. By the end of the school year, the total compliance percentage for the district was 99.8%. This shows the continued time and effort that the health team puts into contacting families to encourage them to have their student(s) immunized - including students who transfer into our district mid-year.

New immunization requirements were in place for 7th, 8th, and 12th graders for the 2025-2026 school year. This caused hundreds of secondary building students to be behind schedule in their immunizations at the start of the school year - with the Middle School at 86.6% and the SRHI at 86.3%; however, both ending at greater than 99% when numbers were reported to the local health department. Again, this shows the time and effort put into connecting with students and families.

The total number of Health Room visits continues to increase every year. We continue to see an increase in chronic health conditions which require more daily attention and support. There is also an increase in training and delegation requirements among buildings to support students' health conditions during the school day and school sponsored events.

Last year there were a total of 297 field trips across the district in the months of May/June. This year, there were 365 field trips. This shows the added time and energy given at the end of the school year and the increased planning required by Health Room staff.

A lot of time and effort goes into supporting students so that they can remain at school. This can include following their action plan, giving medications, educating them on their health, referring to other Student Services staff, etc. This data shows that 93% of students were able to remain at school with Health Room support.

In addition to calling EMS services for students, 911 was called for several staff/community members' health emergencies and district staff supported them during that time.

Health conditions continue to range from mild to severe. Understanding these conditions is important for health staff, teachers, coaches, nutrition staff, and others so that the district can ensure students are kept safe and receive appropriate care in and out of the building. The health team navigates the upward trend of complex conditions, additional building coverage, school-sponsored extracurricular activities, and training. Even though we continue to see a gradual decrease in student enrollment, the number of health conditions continues to increase in both number and complexity.

The total number of medications includes prescription or non-prescription medications that a student has available in the Health Room, self-carries, or supplies for an overnight field trip. During the 2024-2025 school year, there were a total of 659 students with a total of 1,111 medications. This school year showed a large increase - 789 students with 1,470 medications.

This education was provided by the three district nurses and is done annually for emergent medical needs such as anaphylaxis, diabetes, and seizures. The increase in the number of emergent health conditions requires us to spend more time each year training staff on more rescue medications.

### **Narcan Training**

Cally Gordon-Haessley, Medical Director from SAFER, provided the annual Narcan training following DPI recommendations for a select group of staff. This year there were 35 staff who were trained. We also offered for all district staff to attend optionally; however, none chose to attend.

### **CPR and First Aid Training**

District staff who need this training as part of their job duties, or staff would like to have this training, are able to choose from several opportunities provided by Jamie Betry throughout the year. This year there were 139 staff who were trained. Training needs to be renewed every 2 years.

### **Flu Shot**

Staff had the opportunity to receive their flu shot at the Administration Building through a partnership with Aspirus. This fall, 114 staff took advantage of this opportunity.

## **Evaluation**

DC Everest Area School District provided a high level of health care services to students during the 2025-2026 school year. The data trend supports the yearly increased workload that our health team navigates. This report provides numbers showing that the health needs of students are increasing, along with the amount of time spent supporting them throughout the school year. *The consistent increase of chronic health needs exceeds the current nurse FTE so the continued recommendation is to add an additional nurse FTE.*

We also updated AED pads and batteries for Group 2 in our 2024 AED proposal to ensure that our emergency supplies are ready to support students, staff, visitors and families.

## **Goals for 2026-2027**

With new immunization requirements being put into place again, we will continue to work towards meeting a 99% compliance rate when submitting our reports to the Wisconsin Department of Health Services.

With the high likelihood of 8th grade joining the Middle School and 9th grade joining the SRHI in the next few years, we will continue to have conversations regarding health coverage, workload, and safety. Our biggest concerns with this change include staffing with managing hundreds of extra visits at both the SRH and MS and whether the Health Room spaces are large enough to accommodate those extra students. Currently, the SRH and MS have the highest monthly health office visits across the district so we would need to discuss further how we can continue to provide quality care.

We will continue to partner with the School Nutrition team to ensure that our students and their families receive updated menu information. We would love to see our menu have allergen, “may contain”, or “contains” information to increase the safety of our students! This will allow students with diabetes to make informed decisions, provide students with anaphylactic allergies a safe meal, and allow students with dietary restrictions (i.e. gluten free, lactose intolerant) to know what their meals contain.

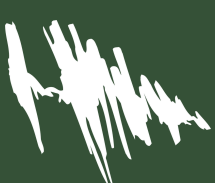

- Implements supports for about 6-8 weeks and monitors student progress.

After 6-8 weeks, the ESS team reviews/discusses student progress.

Adequate Progress Made:

- ESS team discusses need for continued Tier I supports and documents decision on ESS form.
- If supports will continue, team continues documentation while supports continue. Team reviews progress regularly.

Adequate Progress Not Made:

- ESS team discusses need for Tier II intervention and documents decision on ESS form.
- ESS team notifies Tier II/III representative of need for collaboration.

Tier II/III—Everest System of Support—D.C. Everest Area School District

This flowchart describes the progression used to monitor academic, behavioral, social, emotional needs while considering culturally-responsive practices. Depending on implementation, many interventions fall under both Tiers. There is not a designated number of interventions to be provided at each Tier. SLD referrals need a minimum of two interventions that were progress-monitored weekly using a district-designated tool. Students who have been referred continue to receive tiered supports/interventions while referral is in progress. Students not meeting special education eligibility requirements continue to receive tiered supports/interventions.

ESS team participation is evaluated and updated to include additional members if necessary. Parent/Guardian must be informed and provided opportunity to contribute to discussion.



Prior to intervention starting, ESS team:

- Discusses and completes Tier II/III Documentation section of ESS Form
- Determines level of support and decides on an appropriate scientifically-researched or evidence-based intervention (see ESS/Assessment Canvas resource for interventions provided by classroom teachers)
- Plans and establishes roles and responsibilities of team members
- Chooses a district-designated progress-monitoring tool/establishes schedule
- Schedules mid-point review meeting



During intervention, ESS team:

- Reviews/discusses progress halfway through intervention if intervention updates parent/guardian on progress.
- Documents data review and any decisions on ESS form in eduCLIMBER
- Schedules end-of intervention review meeting



Near the end of intervention, ESS team reviews progress.



Adequate Progress Made:

- ESS team discusses need for continuing the intervention and documents decision on ESS form.
- If intervention will continue, team continues documentation while intervention continues. Team reviews progress regularly.

Adequate Progress Not Made

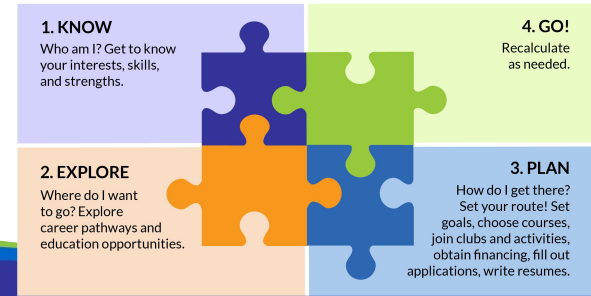

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On April 17, 2026, a tornado impacted the Ringle area and caused significant damage to Riverside Elementary School. The severity of the storm resulted in Governor Tony Evers declaring a state of emergency for affected areas, including Marathon County.

Due to the damage and resulting safety concerns, Riverside Elementary was closed on April 20th and 21st to allow for damage assessment, debris removal, safety inspections, and planning for continuity of instruction. Students were temporarily relocated to an alternate instructional site from April 22 through April 30 while temporary repairs were completed. The school remained closed on May 1 and reopened on May 4 following safety inspections and completion of temporary repairs. Permanent repairs will be completed during the summer months.

As a result of the tornado and subsequent recovery efforts, the District was unable to fully recover all instructional hours lost during the closure and relocation period. The challenge was compounded by the fact that the District had already lost four instructional days during the 2025-26 school year due to inclement weather, significantly limiting available opportunities to make up additional lost time. Wisconsin law requires school districts to provide a minimum number of hours of direct pupil instruction each school year. Accordingly, the District is seeking a waiver from the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction for the instructional hours that could not be recovered due to these extraordinary circumstances.

### Recommendation

Administration recommends that the Board approve the attached waiver resolution and authorize submission to the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction requesting a waiver of instructional hour requirements for Riverside Elementary School associated with the instructional time lost as a result of the April 17, 2026, tornado and the subsequent recovery and relocation efforts.

SCHOOL BOARD RESOLUTION FOR THE WAIVER OF CERTAIN SCHOOL BOARD OR SCHOOL DISTRICT REQUIREMENTS PURSUANT TO WIS. STAT. §§ 118.38(1) AND (1m)

WHEREAS, Wis. Stat. §118.38(1) and Wis. Admin. § PI 8.01(4) authorize school boards to request the Department of Public Instruction to waive any school board or school district requirement in Wis. Stat. chs. 115 to 121 or in the administrative rules promulgated by the Department under the authority of those chapters; and

WHEREAS, Wis. Stat. §118.38(1)(b) requires that, before requesting a waiver, a school board shall hold a public hearing in the school district on the request for a waiver of any requirement in Wis. Stat. chs. 115 to 121; and

WHEREAS, Wis. Stat. § 118.38(1m) requires that “the school board shall specify in its request for a waiver its reason for requesting the waiver.”

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that:**

1. On June 17, 2026, the Board of Education held a public hearing, in satisfaction of Wis. Stat. §118.38(1)(b), concerning requests for waivers of the requirements identified herein; and
2. In compliance with Wis. Stat. §§ 118.38(1) and (1m), and for the reasons set forth herein, the Board of Education hereby directs the Superintendent or his/her designee to apply, on behalf of the Board, to the Office of the Superintendent for Public Instruction (OSPI) for the waiver of the following:
3. Waiver of the minimum number of hours of instruction set forth in Wis. Stat. §121.02(1)(f) for the 2025-26 school year due to the tornado that hit Riverside Elementary School and the neighborhood surrounding it on April 17, 2026, and resulted in 12.5 hours of lost instructional time for Riverside Elementary.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that execution of this Resolution is conclusive evidence of the Board of Education’s approval of this action and of the authority granted herein at a duly-noticed meeting of the Board held on June 17, 2026.

## **§118.38 Waiver Application Background and Guidance**

### **Waiver Provisions**

Under Wisconsin Statutes [§118.38](#), a school board may request a waiver of any requirement in Wisconsin Statutes Chapters 115 to 121 or related administrative rules, except for statutes or rules related to any of the following:

1. The health or safety of pupils;
2. Pupil discrimination under s. 118.13;
3. The pupil assessment program under s. 118.30 and the standardized reading test required under s. 121.02 (1) (r);
4. Pupil records under s. 118.125;
5. The collection of data by the department;
6. The uniform financial fund accounting system under ss. 115.28 (13) and 115.30 (1) and audits of school district accounts under s. 120.14;
7. Licensure or certification under s. 115.28 (7) or (7m) other than the licensure of the school district administrator or business manager;
8. The commencement of the school term under s. 118.045; and
9. The requirements established for achievement guarantee contracts under s. 118.43 and for achievement gap reduction contracts under s. 118.44.

In requesting a waiver a school board must hold a public hearing in the school district on the request. The school board is also required to specify in its request for a waiver its reason for requesting the waiver. If requesting a waiver for hours of instruction, a resolution must also be submitted along with information detailed in Wisconsin Administrative Code [PI 8.01\(4\)\(b\)](#). In reviewing waiver requests, the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) must consider whether the statute or rule requested for waiver impedes the district's progress in achieving educational goals to best serve all students.

For any hours of instruction waiver requests as per statute, the DPI must additionally consider the response of the community to the proposed waiver, the length of the school closure, and whether there is sufficient time before the end of the school year to adjust the school calendar to provide the required hours of direct pupil instruction missed (See appendix A on page 6).

### **Considerations Before Applying for a Waiver**

School districts have flexibility to implement changes regarding how a program is delivered, how much of a program is delivered, and who delivers it. Temporary variations like this to planned school operations do not need a waiver. They temporarily disrupt the normal flow of programming implementation or delivery, but do not necessarily require an entire program or service to be discontinued for the school year.

Consideration should be given to the flexibility or options available under the law. For instance, what are the minimum requirements? Are there alternative compliance options? The DPI has published documents detailing flexibility around aspects of the law and is available to answer your questions.

A waiver should only be considered when a school district anticipates or has determined it cannot offer a program or service required under the law during the school year. A waiver may also be desired if a school district does not anticipate being in compliance with a statutory requirement by virtue of the design of its plan of instruction or an innovation it desires to implement. Where this is the case, a school board may complete a request for waiver from a particular statute or administrative rule and explain the circumstances that will require a formal waiver.

## District Waiver Application

Applications will be accepted on a rolling basis.

The waiver application includes the following seven components.

- I. **General Information:** The information in this section details which schools are affected by the request. Waiver requests could apply to one school, more than one school, or all schools in a district. As a result, this section of the application should note the specific schools included in the waiver request. If all district schools are impacted, the applicant should note that the request applies district-wide.
- II. **Waiver Request:** The applicant will specify the statutory and/or administrative rule provisions for which they are requesting a waiver. Additional information about statutory requirements can be found in the [2021 Legislative Fiscal Bureau Informational Paper #31, Statutory Requirements for School Districts](#).
- III. **Statement of Need:** This section of the application should address the district's rationale for the requested waiver(s).
- IV. **Abstract:** Address how the granting of the waiver impacts the school and/or school district's ability to meet educational goals and, if applicable, improvement plans.
- V. **General Assurances:** This portion of the application is intended to ensure that several steps have occurred. Specifically:
  - Stakeholder engagement has occurred, including a school board hearing and a board resolution or vote approving the flexibility application;
  - The district has conducted a financial review and can assure the plan's fiscal viability;
  - The district's flexibility request is in full compliance with all state and federal laws, including those outlined above regarding waiver requests; and
  - The district has developed a process for reviews of the implemented flexibilities with its local school board, and those reviews will be publicly available.
- VI. **Certifications/Signatures:** The application requires the signature of both the district administrator in charge of implementing the waiver and the school board president, certifying school board approval of the request.
- VII. **Appendix A:** There are additional administrative rule requirements for the hours of instruction waiver request. This appendix details those additional requirements which must be completed in addition to the rest of the form.

**II. REQUESTED WAIVERS**

The D.C. Everest Area School District requests a one-year waiver of the minimum instructional hours requirement under Wis. Stat. §121.02(1)(f) and related administrative provisions. The waiver request applies to Riverside Elementary for the 2025-26 school year and is necessitated by the loss of instructional hours resulting from a tornado that caused significant damage to the school facility and required the temporary closure of the school.

The District seeks waiver of the instructional hours that could not be recovered through reasonable calendar adjustments while maintaining safe and effective educational operations for students and staff.

**III. STATEMENT OF NEED**

Address the rationale for the requested waiver(s) *Limit response to space provided.*

The D.C. Everest Area School District requests this waiver due to instructional hours lost as a result of the April 17, 2025, tornado that impacted the Ringle area. The severity of the storm led Governor Tony Evers to declare a state of emergency for affected areas, including Marathon County. Due to damage to Riverside Elementary, the school was closed on April 20 and 21 to assess damage, ensure safety, and develop a continuity of instruction plan. Instruction was relocated to an alternate site from April 22 through April 30 while temporary repairs were completed. The school remained closed on May 1 and reopened on May 4 following safety inspections and temporary repairs. Permanent repairs will be completed during the summer.

Despite the District's efforts to minimize disruption and continue instruction, the closure and transition period resulted in instructional hours that could not be fully recovered within the remaining school calendar. The requested waiver is necessary due to this unforeseen natural disaster and the resulting loss of instructional time beyond the District's control.

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**IV. ABSTRACT**

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Address how the granting of the waiver impacts the school and/or school district's ability to meet educational goals and, if applicable, improvement plans. *Limit response to space provided.*

Granting this waiver will support the D.C. Everest Area School District's ability to continue meeting its educational goals following the tornado that impacted Riverside on April 17, 2025. Although instructional hours were lost due to the disaster and subsequent recovery efforts, the District acted quickly to minimize disruption to student learning by developing a continuity of instruction plan and relocating educational services to an alternate site, our community center, from April 22 through April 30. As a result of previous inclement weather days and the tornado, Riverside Elementary is short 12.5 hours of instruction.

The District's ability to resume instruction in an alternate location and return students and staff to the school building on May 4 following temporary repairs allowed educational programming, student services, and school improvement initiatives to continue with minimal interruption. Permanent repairs were completed during the summer, ensuring the facility was fully restored without further disruption to student learning.

Granting this waiver acknowledges the extraordinary circumstances associated with a state declared emergency while recognizing the District's successful efforts to maintain educational continuity throughout the recovery process. The waiver will not adversely affect the District's ability to achieve its educational goals or implement improvement plans. Rather, it recognizes that the temporary loss of instructional hours was the result of circumstances beyond the District's control and supports the District's continued commitment to student achievement, continuous improvement, and providing a safe and effective learning environment for all students.

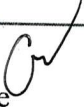

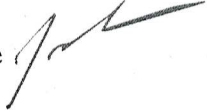

### **Longevity Compensation**

To reward athletic coaches for their dedication to our students and programs, coaches will receive a payment based on the years of service coaching that sport for D.C. Everest. Years of service do not need to be consecutive. If a coach coaches multiple sports, the longevity stipend is calculated and paid per season, per sport. Coaches will earn a year of service for each year coaching that sport at D.C. Everest. Years of service will be calculated separately for coaches that coach the same sport in different seasons (i.e., Boys Tennis and Girls Tennis).

Coaches that are funded by a SBAA or Booster Club (non-budgeted) are not eligible for longevity compensation. However, for the purposes of calculating coaching years of service, years as a non-budgeted coach will count for determining longevity compensation for district-budgeted coaches. Coaches are not eligible for years of service for years as an unpaid volunteer coach. Weight Room Supervisors and Strength & Performance Coordinator are not eligible for longevity compensation.

The longevity stipend amount will be reflected on the coaching agreement that is issued to the coach at the start of the season. The longevity stipend schedule listed below is not cumulative, when a level is reached, the associated amount is the stipend amount paid each season until the next level is reached.

Longevity compensation for part-time coaches will not be prorated; they will receive the full amount listed. Coaches are only eligible for one longevity stipend per season. If they have two agreements due to sharing two positions with another coach or for other unique circumstances, they are only eligible for longevity compensation for one position.

## **Extended Season Compensation**

### *Background*

Most high school sports automatically qualify for tournament play. There are a few sports that must qualify based on the success they have throughout the season. The extended season compensation is not intended to be an incentive for teams to advance. The purpose is to modestly compensate coaches for the extra time it takes for preparation, practice, and competitions that take place in the playoffs.

### *Guidelines*

The extended season compensation will begin if there is advancement beyond the first playoff competition for all sports that automatically qualify to participate in the playoffs. For those sports that must earn a place in the playoffs, their extended season compensation will begin after their last regular season game and continue until their season ends.

Extended season compensation is by the calendar week. For example, if a team won their first playoff game on a Thursday, the first week of extended season compensation will run from the following day (Friday) through Thursday of the following week. They will receive one week of extended season compensation regardless of how far into the week the team progresses. If the team advances beyond the Thursday of the following week, the second week of extended season compensation will immediately kick in and so forth. The extended season compensation process will continue in this manner through state championship events.

For team sports that do not have individual events, all coaches would be afforded the extended season compensation that are under agreement with the district. For teams with specific event coaches (i.e. track) the head coach and only the specific event assistant coach will receive the extended season compensation. For example, if only one long jumper advanced, we will not compensate all the assistant track coaches with extended season compensation.

### Compensation

Head Coaches = \$175 per week

Assistant Coaches = \$135 per week

### Procedure

Requests for extended season compensation must be completed by the head coach and submitted to the Athletic Director at the end of the season. The Athletic Director will review and sign the forms and send them to Payroll for processing. Any decisions regarding questions or anomaly situations that may arise out of this process will be decided by the Superintendent.

### **Number of Coaches**

D.C. Everest recognizes the number of coaches, identified by sport, as the current maximum number of coaches required to field the existing number of teams in each sport.

- 1) If the number of athletes in any sport increases to the point that safety and effective skill instruction is jeopardized, the Athletic Director may submit a request for an additional coach.
- 2) If the number of athletes increases to cause an addition in the number of teams in any sport, the Athletic Director may submit a request for an additional coach.
- 3) If the number of athletes decreases enough to cause a reduction in the number of teams in any sport, the Athletic Director will consider whether to reduce the number of coaches.

### **Guidelines**

- Should the new compensation model (stipend and longevity combined) result in a loss of pay for a current coach, the coach will continue to be held at the rate of pay (stipend and longevity combined) they would have received prior to the 2025-2026 school year until such a time the new compensation model does not result in a loss of pay.
  - If a coach that is held at their same rate of pay as under the previous compensation model 1) has a break in service of coaching for that specific sport and season and returns to coaching in the future, OR 2) moves to a different position, they will be paid per the new compensation model, even if it is at a lesser amount than they received previously.
- Part-time coaches may be hired in lieu of a full-time coach.
  - If two part-time coaches are hired, they will each receive 50% of the stipend amount.
  - If only one part-time coach is hired, they will receive 60% of the stipend amount.
- Two full-time coaches that share two different positions (i.e., co-heads and co-assistants) will receive 50% of the stipend amount for each position.
- If a coach is unable to coach temporarily and the program wants to hire and pay an interim coach, the stipend of the coach on leave must be adjusted to offset the cost of the interim coach.

# **Extracurricular Non-Budgeted Staff Compensation**

## **Background**

Coaches, advisors, and other staff that are hired by SBAA's and Booster Clubs will be onboarded as district employees and paid through Payroll. This includes coaches that are paid for working various camps run by district programs as well. Staff paid through SBAA or Booster Club funding are considered "non-budgeted staff".

This process ensures that staff working with students have met any legal requirements and for insurance and liability purposes as well.

Staff should not be paid directly by the SBAA or Booster Club as this violates proper payroll practices and puts the district at a liability risk.

## **Guidelines**

Groups that wish to fund additional coaches, advisors, or other staff and fund the costs through a SBAA or Booster Club must inform the Athletic Director or Principal of their intent to fund additional staff. The Athletic Director, Principal, or program lead (i.e., Theatre Department Lead) will then provide Talent and Culture with the name, contact information, salary, and position of the individual they would like to hire. It is recommended that compensation for non-budgeted staff does not exceed compensation for budgeted staff as set by our compensation plans. Talent and Culture will reach out to the individual to start the onboarding process.

Once the individual is cleared to begin working by the Talent and Culture Department, the Athletic Director or Principal will submit an agreement request in the Agreements System for the non-budgeted staff member. The SBAA or Booster Club must write a check to D.C. Everest Area School District to cover the full cost of paying the non-budgeted staff member, which includes FICA, Medicare, and for some individuals, WRS. The Agreements System will indicate the amount that needs to be paid. The check should be sent to the Business Office.

The non-budgeted staff member will be paid on the same schedule that "budgeted" coaches and advisors are paid. The Business Office must receive the check at least two weeks prior to the staff member's first payment as indicated by the schedule.

SUBJECT: Year End Spending

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The School Board is asked to authorize district administration to plan for the effective use of any budgeted funds that may remain available as the District approaches the end of the fiscal year and to transfer any remaining balances to allowable funds in accordance with statute, DPI, and auditing requirements.

Utilizing available year end funds in this manner provides the opportunity to complete needed projects, address unexpected needs, and make purchases that may not otherwise fit within the annual operating budget. In addition, strategic use of year end funds helps maximize the District's state aid position in future fiscal years.

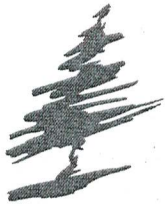
After all fiscal year obligations have been paid, the administration recommends transferring any remaining General Fund balance to Fund 73 (Post-Employment Benefits Trust) and Fund 46 (Capital Improvement Fund) to support Board-approved priorities over the coming years.

As part of the retirement benefit enhancements approved by the Board in June 2025, the District will implement the new Health Reimbursement Arrangement (HRA) benefit. Fund 73 will be used to account for the catch-up contributions associated with the expanded benefit. Until those contributions are deposited into Fund 73, the obligation will be recorded as an unfunded liability.

Given the District's current fund balance position, it is not necessary to retain additional unassigned dollars in the General Fund. Therefore, administration recommends transferring an amount sufficient to fund the HRA catch-up contribution to Fund 73, with any remaining year-end balance transferred to Fund 46 to support future capital improvement projects.

**Recommendation:**

Allow administration to strategically spend end-of-year funds to best meet the needs of the district and deposit all remaining funds into Fund 73 and Fund 46 by the statutory date of July 30, 2026.

#### 0100 - **DEFINITIONS**

The bylaws of the Board of this District incorporate quotations from the laws and administrative code of the State of Wisconsin. Such quotations may be substantively altered only by appropriate legislative, judicial, or administrative action.

Whenever the following items are used in these bylaws and policies, they shall have the meaning set forth below:

##### **Administrative Guideline**

A statement, based on policy, is usually written, which outlines and/or describes the means by which a policy should be implemented and which provides for the management cycle of planning, action, and assessment or evaluation.

##### **Administrator**

An employee who holds a position of leadership over a defined function or department of the District, is employed with an administrative contract, and/or who reports directly to the Superintendent.

Administrators may include the following positions: Assistant Superintendents, Director of Special Education, Director of Student Services, Director of Curriculum **Teaching and Learning**, Director of Talent and Culture, Director of Technology, Director of School Nutrition, Director of Buildings and Grounds, Director of Community Services, ~~Special Projects/Safety~~, Principals, Assistant Principals.

In policy and administrative guidelines, capitalization of the term Administrator may imply delegation of responsibilities, as appropriate, to staff members.

##### **Agreement**

A collectively-negotiated contract with a recognized bargaining unit.

##### **Apps and Services**

Apps and services are software (i.e., computer programs) that support the interaction of personal communication devices (as defined in Bylaw 0100, above) over a network or client-server applications in which the user interface runs in a web browser. Apps and services are used to communicate/transfer information/data that allow students to perform actions/tasks that assist them in attaining educational achievement goals/objectives, enable staff to monitor and assess their students' progress and allow staff to perform other tasks related to their employment. Apps and services also are used to facilitate communication to, from, and among and between staff, students, parents, Board members, and/or other stakeholders and members of the community.

**Board**

The School Board is also commonly referred to as the Board shall take action that is within the comprehensive meaning of the terms 'duties and powers' provided that such action is not prohibited by State or Federal law. (Chapter 118, Wis. Stats. and Chapter 120, Wis. Stats.).

Within these bylaws and policies, the terms Board and District may be used interchangeably, depending on the context of the policy.

**Bylaw**

Rule of the Board for its own governance.

**Clerk**

The chief clerk of the Board. (See Bylaw 0171.3 - Clerk)

**District**

The School District is the territorial unit for school administration. Districts are classified as common, union high, unified, and 1st class city school districts. A joint school district is one where the territory of which is not wholly in one municipality. (Chapter 115, Wis. Stats.).

Within these bylaws and policies, the terms Board and District may be used interchangeably, depending on the context of the policy.

**District Records Custodian**

The School District will designate one (1) District Records Custodian (DRC) to be the legal custodian of records for the District. The DRC shall keep and preserve the public records of the District and is granted authority to render a decision and carry out duties related to those public records. The DRC is designated in Policy 8310 - Public Records.

**Due Process**

Procedural due process requires prior knowledge (a posted discipline code), notice of offense (accusation), and the opportunity to respond. Specific due process requirements are dependent upon the circumstances and may vary depending on such circumstances.

**Full Board**

Authorized number of voting members entitled by law to govern the District. The full Board is the total number of Board members authorized by law regardless of the number of current sitting members.

**Information Resources**

The Board defines information resources to include any data/information in electronic, audio-visual or physical form, or any hardware or software that makes possible the storage and use of data/information. This definition includes but is not limited to electronic mail, voice mail, social media, text messages, databases, CD-ROMs/DVDs, websites, motion picture film, recorded magnetic media, photographs, digitized information, or microfilm. This also includes any equipment, computer facilities, or online services used in accessing, storing, transmitting, or retrieving electronic communications.

**Law Enforcement Officer(s) or Agencies**

These terms include any local, State, or Federal law enforcement agency of competent jurisdiction and its officers acting within their legal authority.

**Legal Custodian of Records**

See "District Records Custodian".

**Legal Notice**

Legal notice means every notice required by law to be published in a newspaper or other publication. There are

three (3) classes of notices: class 1 (requiring one (1) insertion); class 2 (requiring two (2) insertions); and class 3 (requiring three (3) insertions). When more than one (1) insertion is required, the notice must be published once each week for consecutive weeks, with the last notice published at least one (1) week before the act or event, unless otherwise specified by law. Sunday publication is permitted.

### **Local Public Office Holder or Official**

Individuals holding those positions designated by the Board as local public offices in compliance with 19.32 (1 dm), 19.42 (7w)(a)(f) and (g), Wis. Stats.

### **May**

This word is used when an action by the Board or its designee is permitted but not required.

### **Medical Advisor**

The School District is required to appoint a medical advisor. The medical advisor shall be a licensed physician and will participate in the annual review of the District emergency nursing services plan. The School District may also have the medical advisor fulfill other roles. (PI 8.01(2)(g)3.)

### **Meeting**

Any gathering which is attended by or open to all of the members of the Board held with the intent on the part of the members of the body present to discuss or act as a unit upon the specific public business of that body. 19.82(2) Wis. Stats.

### **Official Newspaper**

A newspaper may be designated by the Board under 985.05, Wis Stats. Other publication options are available to the Board pursuant to 120.11(4), Wis. Stats.

### **Parent**

The natural or adoptive parents or the party designated by the courts as the legal guardian, custodian, or surrogate of a student including a foreign exchange student. Both parents will be considered to have equal rights unless a court of law decrees otherwise.

### **Personal Communication Devices**

Personal communication devices ('PCDs'), also referred to as "wireless communication devices," means a portable wireless device that has the capability to provide voice, messaging, or other data communication between two (2) or more parties and includes all of the following: computers, laptops, tablets, e-readers, cellular/mobile phones, smartphones, smartwatches, wearable technology, gaming devices, and/or other web-enabled devices of any type.

### **Policy**

A general, written statement by the governing Board which defines its expectations or position on a particular matter and authorizes appropriate action that must or maybe taken to establish and/or maintain those expectations.

### **President**

The chief executive officer of the Board. (See Bylaw 0171.1 - President)

### **Principal**

The educational leader and head administrator of one (1) or more District schools.

In policy and administrative guidelines, capitalization of the term Principal may imply delegation of responsibilities, as appropriate, to staff members.

### **Professional Staff Member**

District employees who are either certified teachers **or other staff** employed in a position for which certification is a requirement of employment or administrative employees who are responsible for oversight or supervision of a

component or components of the District's operation, or serve as assistants to such persons, regardless of whether they hold an administrative contract or are required to have administrator certification, but excluding the Superintendent.

### **Relative**

The mother, father, sister, brother, spouse, domestic partner, parent of spouse/domestic partner, child, step-child, grandparents, grandchild, dependent, or member of the immediate household.

### **School/District Classification**

Per 115.01, Wis. Stats., Wisconsin school districts are classified as follows:

#### **Common School Districts:**

These districts are responsible for K-12 education, and are the most common type of district in Wisconsin, and operates pursuant to Subchapter I of Chapter 120, Wis. Stats.

#### **Unified School Districts:**

These districts serve all grade levels, from kindergarten through high school, and operates pursuant to Subchapter II of Chapter 120, Wis. Stats.

#### **Union High Schools:**

These districts focus on high school education and are often formed by a group of smaller common school districts. They operate pursuant to Subchapter I of Chapter 120, Wis. Stats.

### **School Nurse**

A school nurse is a registered nurse who meets the requirements of 115.001(11) Wis. Stats. A school nurse has the authority to exclude students for signs of illness.

### **School Official**

Except if otherwise defined in policy, a school official is a person employed by the Board as an administrator, supervisor, teacher/instructor (including substitutes), or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); or a person serving on the Board.

The term school official is inclusive of other parties, such as attorney, contractor, consultant, volunteer, or other party to whom the Board has outsourced a service otherwise performed by Board employees (e.g., a therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing tasks (including volunteers) pursuant to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy (FERPA) definition - See Policy 8330 - Student Records.

### **School Support Organizations (SSO)**

Any other nongovernmental organization or group of persons whose primary purpose is to support a District, school, school club, or academic, arts, athletic, or social activities related to a school, that collects or receives money, materials, property, or securities from students, parents, or members of the general public. (Examples: Booster Club, Foundation, Parent-Teacher Association (PTA), Parent-Teacher Organization (PTO), Parent-Teacher Support Association)

### **Shall**

This word is used when an action by the Board or its designee is required. (The word 'will' or 'must' signifies a required action.)

### **Social Media**

Social media are online platforms where users engage with one another and/or share information and ideas through text, video, or pictures. Social media consists of any form of online publication or presence that allows interactive communication, including, but not limited to, text messaging, instant messaging, websites, web logs ('blogs'), wikis, online forums (e.g., chat rooms), virtual worlds, and social networks. Examples of social media include, but are not

limited to Facebook, Facebook Messenger, Google Hangouts, Twitter, LinkedIn, YouTube, Flickr, Instagram, Pinterest, Skype, and Facetime. Social media does not include sending or receiving e-mail through the use of District-issued e-mail accounts. Apps and web services shall not be considered social media unless they are listed on the District's website as District-approved social media platforms/sites.

### **Student**

A person who is officially enrolled in a school or program of the District.

### **Superintendent**

Sometimes the administrative head of the school district is referred to as Superintendent. He/She has the authority of the Superintendent by law. In policy and administrative guidelines, capitalization of the term Superintendent may imply a delegation of responsibilities, as appropriate, to staff members.

### **Support Staff**

Any employee who provides support to the District's program and whose position does not require a professional certificate. This category includes special education paraprofessionals, even though it is a requirement to hold a special education program aide license issued by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) or another valid and current DPI license or permit.

### **Technology Resources**

The Board defines technology resources to include computers, laptops, tablets, e-readers, cellular/mobile telephones, smartphones, web-enabled devices, video and/or audio recording equipment, SLR and DSLR cameras, projectors, software and operating systems that work on any device, copy machines, printers and scanners, information storage devices (including mobile/portable storage devices such as external hard drives, CDs/DVDs, USB thumb drives and memory chips), the computer network, Internet connection, and online educational services and apps.

### **Treasurer**

The chief financial officer of the Board. (See Bylaw 0171.4 - Treasurer)

### **Vice-President**

The Vice-President of the Board. (See Bylaw 0171.2 - Vice President)

### **Voting**

A vote at a meeting of the Board. The law requires that Board members must be present in order to have their vote officially recorded in the Board minutes and to be available for a roll call vote. A Board member's presence at a meeting includes the Board member's presence if attending by telephone or other manner of remote access, so long as such remote access is compliant with State law. No voting by Proxy may be recorded or counted in an official vote of the Board. Remote access during quasi-judicial functions (e.g., termination hearings, expulsions) may be permitted after consultation with legal counsel.

Citations to Wisconsin statutes are shown by the Section Number (e.g., 120.11, Wis. Stats.). Citations to the Wisconsin Administrative Code are prefaced by P.I. (e.g., P.I. 11). Citations to the United States Code are noted as U.S.C., Federal Register are noted as F.R., and the Code of Federal Regulations as C.F.R.

#### 0167.3 - **PUBLIC COMMENT AT BOARD MEETINGS**

Board meetings are for the purpose of carrying on the business of the District; they are not public meetings, but official business meetings held in public. The Board recognizes the value of public comment on educational issues and the importance of allowing members of the public to express themselves on District matters.

Such requests shall be subject to the approval of the Superintendent and the Board President.

#### **Public Comment Section of the Meeting**

To permit fair and orderly public expression, the Board may provide a period for public comment at any regular in-person meeting of the Board and publish rules to govern such comment in Board meetings. All public comment will be made in person.

If a meeting is held entirely virtually, intentions for making public comment should be emailed to [esuckow@dce.k12.wi.us](mailto:esuckow@dce.k12.wi.us) one hour in advance, including the name and address of the presenter. Arrangements will then be communicated to the presenter to allow the presenter to speak in the virtual meeting.

The presiding officer of each Board meeting at which public comment is permitted shall administer the rules of the Board for its conduct.

The presiding officer shall be guided by the following rules:

- A. Public comment shall be permitted as indicated on the order of business at the discretion of the presiding officer.
- B. Attendees must register their intention to comment in the public portion of the meeting upon their physical arrival at the meeting.
- C. Participants must have a legitimate interest in District business such as current District residents, students, parents, guardians, employees, or contractors of the D.C. Everest Area School District.
- D. Participants must be recognized by the presiding officer and will be requested to preface their comments by an announcement of their name; address; and group affiliation, if and when appropriate.
- E. Each participant's comments shall be limited to three (3) minutes duration. No amount of time may be "donated" to a different speaker.

- F. Participants shall direct all comments to the Board and not to staff or other participants.
- G. Participants shall address only topics within the legitimate jurisdiction of the Board.
- H. **Participants may not bring handouts or presentations. This is a verbal address to the Board only.**
- I. All statements shall be directed to the presiding officer; no person may address or question Board members individually.
- J. The presiding officer may:
  - 1. interrupt, warn, or terminate a participant's statement when the statement is too lengthy, personally directed, abusive, obscene, or irrelevant;
  - 2. request any individual to leave the meeting when that person does not observe reasonable decorum;
  - 3. request the assistance of law enforcement officers in the removal of a disorderly person when that person's conduct interferes with the orderly progress of the meeting;
  - 4. call for a recess or an adjournment to another time when the lack of public decorum so interferes with the orderly conduct of the meeting as to warrant such action;
  - 5. waive these rules with the approval of the Board when necessary for the protection of privacy or the administration of the Board's business.
- K. The portion of the meeting during which the comment of the public is invited shall be limited to thirty (30) minutes unless extended by a vote of the Board.

Recording, filming, or photographing the Board's open meetings by Third Parties is permitted pursuant to 19.90, Wis. Stat. Recording, filming, or photographing the Board's closed session is only permitted pursuant to Bylaw 0167.2 – Closed Session. The person operating the equipment should contact the Superintendent prior to the Board meeting to review possible placement of the equipment, and must agree to abide by the following conditions:

- A. No obstructions are created between the Board and the audience.
- B. No interviews are conducted in the meeting room while the Board is in session.
- C. No commentary, adjustment of equipment, or positioning of operators is made that would distract either the Board or members of the audience or otherwise disrupt the meeting while the Board is in session.

### 3120 - **EMPLOYMENT OF PROFESSIONAL STAFF**

The Board recognizes that it is vital to the successful operation of the District that positions created by the Board be filled with highly-qualified and competent personnel.

All employees other than the Superintendent or support staff members (Policy 0100 – Definitions) are considered professional employees.

~~In addition, certain categories of staff employed in a professional capacity, such as network manager, but not requiring a license or certification, are considered professional staff. The compensation and benefits for such positions shall be established by the Superintendent.~~

The Board shall approve the employment, fix the compensation, and establish the term of employment for each professional staff member employed by this District. Teachers may only be employed by contract, and full-time teachers may only be employed following a majority vote of the full membership of the Board or as required or permitted by law. The Board shall approve the employment of any employee required by law to be employed only following the majority vote of the full membership of the Board.

Such approval shall be given only to those candidates for employment recommended by the Superintendent.

All applications for employment shall be referred to the Talent and Culture Department.

When any recommended candidate has been rejected by the Board, the Superintendent shall make a substitute recommendation. All applications for employment shall be referred to the Talent and Cultures Department.

Relatives of Board members may be employed by the Board, provided the Board member does not participate in any way in the discussion or vote on any matter related to said employment.

Relatives of staff members may be employed by the Board, however, arrangements should be made so that the staff member being employed is not placed in a position in which s/he would be supervised directly by or supervise directly the relative staff member.

Any professional staff member's intentional misstatement of fact material to his/her qualifications for employment or the determination of salary shall be considered by this Board to constitute grounds for dismissal.

The employment of professional staff members prior to approval by the Board is authorized when their employment is required to maintain continuity in the educational program, except as prohibited by law, including the employment of full-time teachers and certain administrative employees on a substitute basis, pending Board approval. Employment shall be recommended to the Board at the next regular meeting.

No candidate for employment to the professional staff shall receive a recommendation for such employment without having provided visual evidence of proper certification or that application for such certification is in process.

For those staff members who will be instructing children in reading and/or language arts pre-school and/or grades kindergarten through sixth grade, their certificate must verify successful completion of the instruction that includes the teaching of phonics.

There must also be verification that a satisfactory background check has been conducted by the Department of Public Instruction or appropriate State agency.

The Superintendent shall prepare procedures for the recruitment and selection of all professional staff which includes reporting newly hired employees to the Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development.

### **DISTRICT SUPPORTED ALTERNATIVE LICENSING PROGRAMS**

As part of the Board's efforts to provide the highest quality education for all students in all subject areas, the Board authorizes the Superintendent, where appropriate, to support teacher licensure opportunities.

### **EXPERIENCED-BASED LICENSURE FOR TECHNICAL AND VOCATIONAL EDUCATION**

"Technical education" means technology education and any technology-related occupation.

"Vocational education" means agriculture, child services, clothing services, food services, housing and equipment services, family and consumer education, family and consumer services, home economics-related occupations, health care-related occupations, trade specialist, business education, business and office, and marketing education as defined by DPI.

The Superintendent may support the application for an experience-based license for a teacher to teach in a technical and/or vocational education field, provided that the individual can be credited with at least 100 points using the following system:

- A. The following points for experience in a technical field (must comprise at least twenty-five (25) of the required 100 points):
  1. For a bachelor's degree in any science, technology, engineering, or mathematics field and any teaching license or permit, or in a field related to the vocational subject, 100 points.
  2. For a bachelor's degree in any science, technology, engineering, or mathematics field, or in a field related to the vocational subject seventy-five (75) points.
  3. For a bachelor's degree in a field other than those described in numbers 1 and 2 above, sixty-five (65) points.
  4. For industry or vocational certification, ninety (90) points.
  5. For industry experience in a trade or technical field or vocation, five (5) points per forty (40) hours worked up to a maximum of ninety (90) points.
  6. For an internship in a trade or technical field or in the vocation, twenty-five (25) points.
  7. For being mentored in a trade or technical skill or in the vocation by a colleague or a Wisconsin Technology Education Association or a recognized vocational association approved mentor, twenty-five (25) points.
  8. For an apprenticeship in a trade or technical field or in the vocation, five (5) points per forty (40) hours worked up to a maximum of ninety (90) points.
- B. The following points for pedagogical experience (must be at least twenty-five (25) out of the 100 required points):
  1. For a bachelor's degree in technical or technology education, 100 points.
  2. For a bachelor's degree in a field other than any science, technology, engineering, mathematics, or technical or technology education field, or in a subject related to the vocation and any teaching license or permit, seventy-five (75) points.
  3. For credit earned at an accredited institution of higher education or technical college, three (3) points per credit up to a maximum of seventy-five (75) points for technical or technology education courses and

science, technology, engineering, or mathematics courses or any field related to the vocation and three (3) points per credit up to a maximum of seventy-five (75) points for education and pedagogical courses.

4. For completing at least 100 hours of training in pedagogy, five (5) points per fifty (50) hours up to a maximum of seventy-five (75) points.

Individuals who have sufficient points may be employed by the District under an experience-based license provided that the Superintendent implements a professional development curriculum for the teacher to follow during the three (3) year period of the initial license. The Superintendent shall monitor the teacher's progress in fulfilling the curriculum.

### **PROFESSIONAL TEACHING PERMIT**

The Superintendent may support the teaching license application of an individual to teach a course in engineering, mathematics, science, computer science, art, music, or world languages that do not yet hold a professional teacher license provided that the following criteria are met:

- A. The District is experiencing a shortage in the availability of teachers with professional teaching certification in the subject area and is unable to fill a position with an acceptable licensed teacher.
- B. The individual holds at least a bachelor's degree in engineering, mathematics, science, computer science, art, music, or world languages.
- C. The individual possesses at least five (5) years of verifiable industry experience in the same field as the bachelor's degree.
- D. The individual has completed at least 100 hours of pedagogical training in an alternative teacher licensing program approved by DPI.
- E. The Superintendent shall implement a plan to provide supervision of the teacher by a teacher that holds regular professional teaching licensure during the two (2) year period of the permit.
- F. The hiring of the teacher under this alternative licensure program will not displace a regularly licensed teacher in the District.

**3120.05 - EMPLOYMENT OF PERSONNEL IN COMMUNITY EDUCATION PROGRAMS**

The School Board recognizes that the success of the community education programs depends in large measure upon the employment of qualified and competent personnel.

~~The Board shall fix the compensation and set the term of employment for each person employed in the subject programs established for this District.~~ The Superintendent shall approve the employment and establish the term of employment for each support staff member employed by this District. Compensation shall be fixed by an established compensation structure or Board action. ~~The Board will employ only those candidates recommended by the Superintendent.~~

A candidate's intentional misstatement of fact material to his/her qualifications for employment or the determination of his/her salary will be considered by the Board to constitute grounds for dismissal.

No candidate for employment shall receive recommendation for such employment without having proffered visual evidence of proper certification, if needed, or that application for such certification is in process.

### 3140 - **NON-RENEWAL, RESIGNATION, AND TERMINATION**

A critical function of the Board is maintaining personnel necessary to carry out the District's educational program and mission. In the course of carrying out this function, the Board will at times find it necessary to end an employment relationship with a member of the professional staff. This policy governs the process of nonrenewal and termination of employees, as well as the conditions under which a resignation may be accepted.

#### **Full-Time Teachers**

All full-time teachers are required to be under contract with the District. A full-time teacher's employment contract is automatically void and employment ended if the teacher does not have an appropriate teaching license issued by the DPI. Otherwise, a full-time teacher's employment shall be subject to non-renewal, termination, or resignation as follows:

#### **A. Non-Renewal**

In the event that the Superintendent intends to recommend the non-renewal of a full-time teacher's contract, all applicable statutory non-renewal procedures and timelines will apply, including both preliminary and final notice of nonrenewal. No teacher may be non-renewed solely on the basis of the results of mandatory student examinations. The Superintendent shall be responsible for notifying the affected teacher of his/her rights relative to the non-renewal process.

Teacher contracts may be non-renewed upon a majority vote of the Board.

#### **B. Termination**

A full-time teacher's contract may be terminated only by a majority vote of the Board. The Superintendent shall, if deemed appropriate, recommend a teacher's termination to the Board. The Superintendent is responsible for providing the teacher with appropriate notice regarding the hearing and for taking the necessary steps to present any such recommendation to the Board.

The Superintendent may engage in negotiations with the teacher for purposes of resignation short of a hearing, subject to final Board approval.

#### **C. Resignation**

A full-time teacher may resign from his/her position only upon approval of a majority of the Board. The Superintendent may negotiate terms of resignation with such a teacher as appropriate and present those terms to the Board in an appropriately noticed, regular or special Board meeting, as necessary. A resignation is only in

effect once approved by the Board. A resignation, once accepted by the Board, may not be rescinded without approval by the Board.

### **Part-Time Teachers**

Teachers employed less than full-time, but not including substitute teachers whose employment is covered by Policy 3120.04, and whose employment contract does not specify procedures for termination of contract, may be terminated either by the District for appropriate reasons or through resignation to the Superintendent. A resignation, once accepted, may not be rescinded by the teacher.

A part-time teacher whose contract does not specify otherwise is not entitled to notice of intent to renew or of intent not to renew his/her contract for a subsequent school year.

The terms of the part-time teacher contract shall apply when the contract provides for procedures different than those noted in this policy.

### **Administrators**

The Board employs administrative employees under a variety of employment arrangements. Generally, those arrangements include those administrators who, by law, are required to have an employment contract and are provided statutory rights with respect to those contracts; those that are not required to have contracts by law, but are nonetheless employed pursuant to a written contract approved by the Board; and those who perform administrative functions, but who do not have a contract which specifies the terms of employment as they relate to termination, resignation, and nonrenewal of the employment arrangement.

#### **A. Statutory Administrators**

The Board shall employ by contract the following persons: the Superintendent, operations manager, school principals, and assistants to such persons, as well as the following persons employed solely to perform administrative functions: personnel administrators and supervisors, curriculum administrators, and assistants to such administrative personnel.

Such administrators may only be terminated, either due to appropriate circumstances justifying termination of employment or by tendered resignation, by a majority of the full membership of the Board.

Such administrators are entitled to contract renewal or notice of intent not to renew the administrator's contract pursuant to applicable statutory procedures, and any additional procedures incorporated into the said contract.

The Superintendent shall be responsible for assuring compliance with the procedures necessary for Board action to terminate or to non-renew an administrator's contract. In the case of the Superintendent's contract, the Board President with the assistance of Board legal counsel shall be responsible for assuring procedural compliance with termination or non-renewal processes.

A resignation, once accepted by the Board, may not be rescinded except by approval of the majority of the full membership of the Board.

#### **B. Administrators with Contracts including Provisions Governing Termination**

The Board may employ administrators who are not statutorily entitled to an employment contract or to statutory termination and non-renewal procedures, but who nonetheless are issued employment contracts with provisions governing this process applicable to the manner in which the employment relationship is concluded, either by resignation, termination, or non-renewal. In such cases, the Superintendent shall be responsible for assuring adherence to applicable contractual procedures.

#### **C. Administrative Personnel with no Contractual or Statutory Coverage**

Employees performing administrative functions, but who are not covered by applicable statutory termination or non-renewal procedures, and who have not been issued an employment contract with provisions governing the termination or non-renewal process, are not entitled to notice of intent to renew or not to renew an employment agreement. In such a case, an employment agreement shall expire and the employee shall have no expectation of continued employment beyond the term of the agreement.

Such an administrative employee's employment may be terminated by the Superintendent.

Such an administrative employee's resignation may be accepted by the Superintendent.

A resignation, once accepted, may not be rescinded without agreement.

D. **At-Will Salaried/Exempt**

**Termination**

Employment may be terminated upon approval of the Superintendent.

**Resignation**

A support staff member may resign by filing a written resignation with the Superintendent.

A resignation, once accepted, may not then be rescinded.

The Superintendent may act for the Board in the acceptance of a resignation.

#### 4120.04 - **EMPLOYMENT OF SUBSTITUTES**

The Board recognizes its responsibility to procure the services of substitute support staff in order to prevent the interruption of the operation of the schools.

The Superintendent shall make appropriate arrangements to ensure the availability of substitutes for assignment as services are required to replace temporarily absent regular staff members and to temporarily fill new positions. Such assignments of substitutes may be terminated, including permanent removal from the substitute roster, when their services are no longer required or for other reasons as determined by the Superintendent that are not arbitrary, capricious, or discriminatory.

The names of potential substitute personnel and the positions in which they may substitute shall be maintained by the Talent and Culture Department.

Proper certification shall be on file if the position requires certification. A satisfactory background check shall be conducted consistent with Policy 4121 - Criminal History Record Check and Employee Self-Reporting Requirements.

In order to retain well-qualified substitutes for service in the District, the Board will offer compensation at a rate set by the Board.

A person will be considered a long-term substitute if the person is appropriately certified and the staff member for whom the person has been hired to replace has a leave that extends for more than five (5) consecutive school days. The long-term substitute position will be terminated by the end of the school year, subject to issuance of reasonable assurance to the substitute support staff member regarding intent to provide substitute assignments in the subsequent school year, whether in the same or different assignment.

Relatives of staff members may be employed by the Board, provided the staff member being employed is not placed in a position in which they are supervised directly by the staff member who is related.

~~The employment of substitute support staff prior to approval by the Board is authorized when their employment is required to maintain continuity of services in the District. Retroactive employment shall be recommended to the Board at the next meeting.~~

Prior to the end of the school year, District-employed substitutes, who the District intends to employ for the ensuing school year, will receive a letter of reasonable assurance of continued employment.

#### 5200.01 - **FULL-TIME STUDENT**

**Students are required to be full-time.** The Board defines a full-time student as a student enrolled in:

- A. ~~a student enrolled in a Board approved program in accordance with other statutory required programs and exceptions;~~
- B. six (6) class periods per day (grades six (6) through twelve (12));
- C. ~~unless the student is enrolled in a Board approved~~ **a Board-approved program in accordance with other statutory required programs and exceptions:**
  - 1. Early College Credit Program/Youth Options program;
  - 2. Start College Now program;
  - 3. special education program identified in an IEP;
  - 4. modified program authorized for medical, emotional/social, or disciplinary reasons;
  - 5. an alternative education program;
  - 6. a student enrolled as a 5th-year senior approved by the Senior High principal.

~~Students who do not meet one (1) of the standards identified above will be classified as part-time students.~~

**A student may register for a maximum of 7.5 credits per calendar year (August 1-July 31). An exception applies to students in a youth apprenticeship experience. In addition, the principal may approve additional exceptions for extenuating circumstances pertaining to high school completion.**

Re: 7.5 Credit Annual Cap

The D.C. Everest Senior High recommends a 7.5 original credit annual cap for students in grades 9-12. Implementing a 7.5 original credit annual cap supports a high-quality, balanced high school experience while prioritizing student well-being and responsible use of district resources. Below are rationales on why creating a 7.5 credit cap is beneficial:

#### 1. Promotes Academic Balance and Depth of Learning

A defined credit limit encourages depth of learning rather than rapid credit accumulation, reinforcing that high school coursework is intended to be rigorous and developmental across four years. When students overload their schedules, learning can become transactional, with less time for reflection, feedback, and mastery of essential skills.

#### 2. Protects Student Mental Health and Well-Being

The credit cap also plays an important role in supporting student mental health. Excessive course loads are associated with increased stress, anxiety, sleep deprivation, and burnout. A reasonable limit helps students maintain balance between academics, extracurricular involvement, family responsibilities, and personal wellness. A 7.5 credit limit supports healthy pacing, allowing students to challenge themselves while still maintaining balance, resilience, and overall wellness.

#### 3. Responsible Use of District Financial Resources

Students who typically take more than 7.5 credits do so through EVA, Start College Now or Early College Credit Program. From a financial perspective, EVA courses and Early College Credit/Start College Now carry direct costs to the district, including tuition, course fees, and staff oversight. A 7.5 credit cap ensures these opportunities are accessed intentionally and equitably while preserving district resources.

#### 4. Aligns With College and Workforce Expectations

Finally, the cap aligns with post-secondary expectations, as colleges and universities limit full-time enrollment and emphasize workload management. Establishing these boundaries in high school helps students develop time-management skills and prepares them for the academic demands they will face after graduation.
