**Northville Youth Network Program Report for December 2025
& 2025 Accomplishments**

PROGRAMS, SERVICES & COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

Youth Programs

This month we held one B-Well program. We held a workshop titled *Zumba Kids: Wellness in Motion* with 15 elementary-aged participants. This workshop brought children together through energetic movement, fostering community, cooperation, and connection while promoting physical activity and healthy habits.

Partnership Development

Staff met with a new officer of the Northville Township Police Department as part of their onboarding process to orient them to the programs and services of NYN as well as the process for making referrals. Strengthening this partnership ensures that officers are well-informed about the resources available to youth and families in the community, allowing them to connect young people with supportive programs quickly and effectively. By fostering this collaboration, NYN and our local police departments work together to promote positive outcomes for youth while enhancing the overall safety and well-being of the community.

YOUTH SUPPORT SERVICES

We received 8 referrals in December. The tables on page 2 indicate the status of all referral participants served this month. The first table outlines the number of clients who are new, in progress, or have been discharged during this period. The second table provides a detailed breakdown of Youth Assistance Program (diversion program) referrals by reason, as well as behavioral health support referrals from all other sources (e.g., parent or school) by reason and type. During December, staff collectively held 7 individual appointments with referred youth and/or parents.

2025 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

2025 was a highly productive year for Northville Youth Network. We began the year by completing our 2025–2030 Strategic Plan, which established a clear roadmap for strengthening our impact and guiding our work over the next five years. Each year, we identify and pursue annual goals that align with and advance the strategic priorities outlined in this plan.

A key focus in 2025 was strengthening communications and more intentionally telling the NYN story across multiple platforms. I worked closely with the communications teams from both the city and township to increase NYN’s visibility through news stories, social media content, and program and event announcements. These efforts resulted in coverage in Northville Today, expanded visibility on city and township social media channels, and a 124% increase in engagement on NYN’s own social media platforms compared to 2024.

We also completed a comprehensive update of our Community Resource Guide, which now serves as an extensive and user-friendly listing of local supportive resources available to meet the diverse needs of our community. This guide was shared with all social work and counseling staff across the school district, as well as with other youth and family-serving organizations, strengthening access to timely and coordinated support.

Partnership development was another area of strong growth this year. We were fortunate to deepen existing relationships and establish new collaborations with city and township departments, our schools, and organizations both within and beyond the Northville community. In partnership with Northville Parks & Recreation, we collaborated on events and programs designed to support youth and families. We also supported the launch of a new mentoring initiative at Northville High School, *Mustang Mentors*, in which upperclassmen mentor incoming freshmen to support their transition to high school.

Additionally, we began working with the administration at Hillside Middle School to support the development of a young men’s mentoring program focused on addressing the social, emotional, and behavioral challenges that can arise during early adolescence. In collaboration with the Northville Educational Foundation, we brought a highly impactful substance use and mental health awareness program to youth and parents/caregivers.

I was invited to participate in the Western Wayne Alternatives to Suspension work group, which brought together representatives from school districts and youth-serving agencies to develop a new diversion model for handling school suspensions. Many elements of the group’s work closely aligned with NYN’s restorative practices and school-based support approach. The group expressed strong interest in NYN’s programs and planned to replicate several of our strategies within their own model. These efforts reflect just a few of the many ways NYN works collaboratively with partners to share strengths, leverage resources, and better support our community.

NYN’s programmatic success this year was driven by the exceptional work of our staff. Bridget Drzewicki, our Wellness Program Coordinator, led the re-imagining of our wellness programming through the launch of the new B-Well initiative. This school-based, “push-in” model allows us to reach more students during the school day. One example is *Community Builders*, our bullying prevention program launched in the fall, which now provides programming to all fifth-grade students across the district. This shift in delivery played a significant role in the substantial increase in the number of youth served in 2025.

Christine Spangler, our Youth Assistance Program Coordinator, provided support to more than 68 youth referred by schools and police for court diversion and decision-making support. She also facilitated over 15 cohorts of NYN’s restorative practice programs, including Teen Talk, Prime for Life, and Project

Respect. In addition, Christine completed Prime for Life facilitator certification training, giving NYN greater flexibility in offering this critical substance use prevention program.

Kerri Ann Sondreal, our Youth Support Specialist, delivered vital case management and referral services to youth and families navigating complex and challenging circumstances. She approaches her work with empathy, kindness, and compassion, and has a remarkable ability to help parents and caregivers feel truly seen and supported. Northville families are incredibly fortunate to have her as a trusted community resource.

Because of the dedication and impact of the NYN team and the collective work we do to support youth and families, I was honored to receive a nomination for the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) Michigan Honors Award in the Administrator category. This meaningful recognition reflects not only my leadership, but the strength, commitment, and compassion of the entire NYN team.

As we reflect on 2025, it is clear that this was a year of meaningful growth, strong partnerships, and expanded impact for Northville Youth Network. Through the dedication of our staff, the support of our community partners, and a continued focus on meeting the evolving needs of youth and families, we were able to strengthen both our reach and our services. 



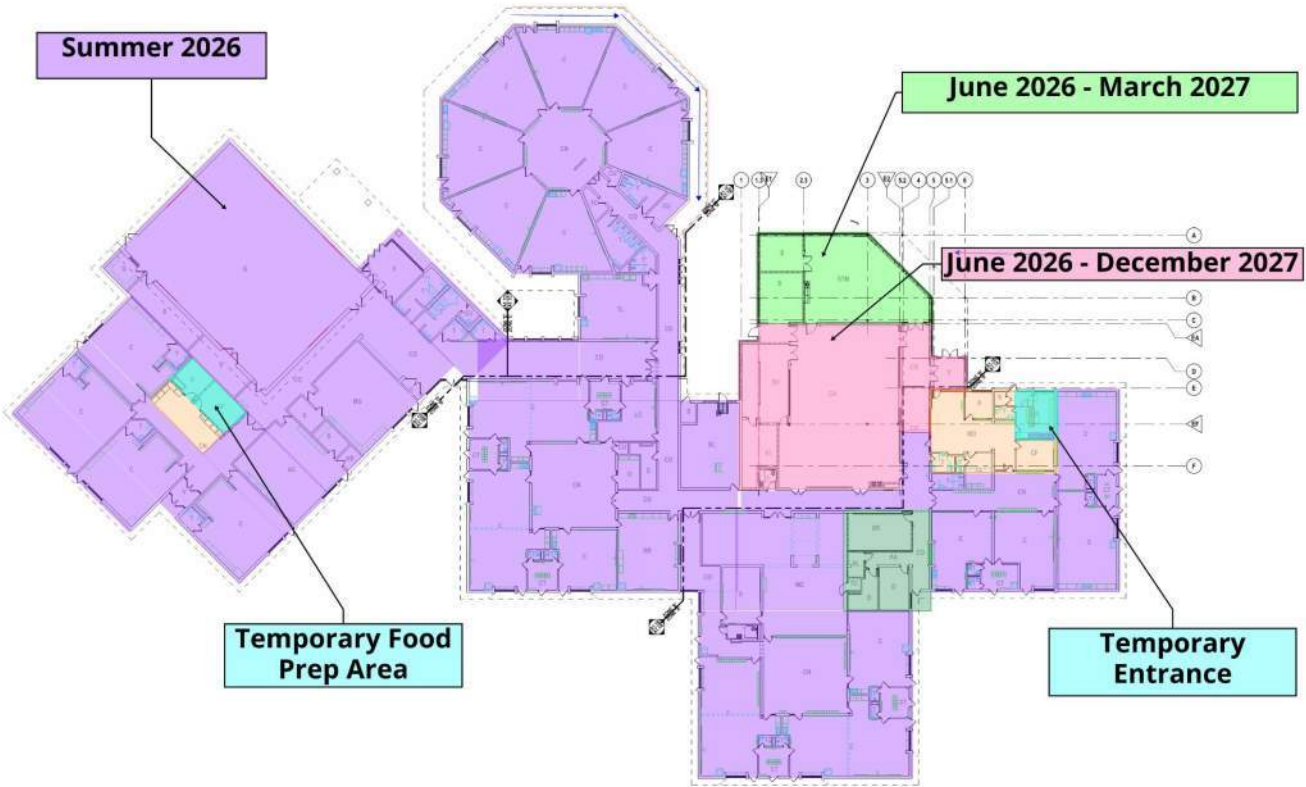
