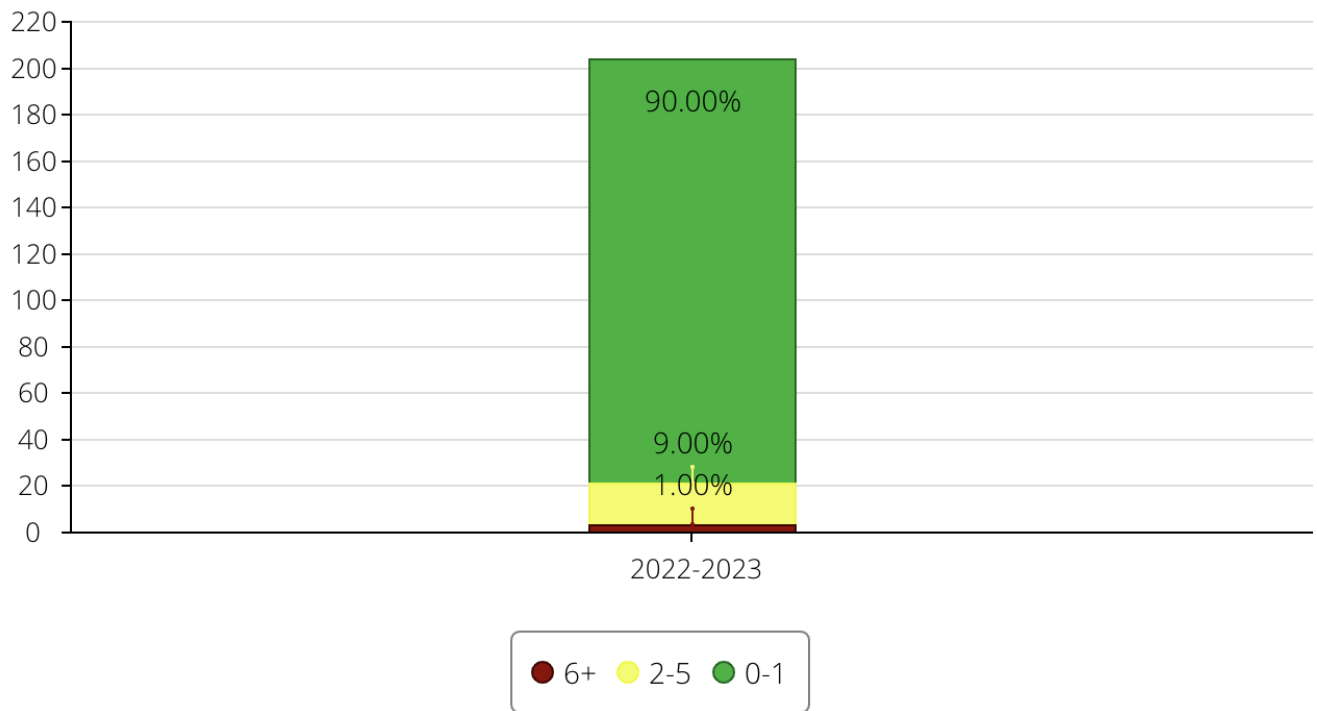

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ARTICLE I: Purpose

Parties: This Agreement is entered into between Independent School District #118, Remer, Minnesota, hereinafter referred to as the School District, and the Minnesota School Employees Association, (MSEA), hereinafter referred to as exclusive representative, pursuant to and in compliance with the Public Employment Labor Relations Act of 1971 as amended, hereinafter referred to as the P.E.L.R.A., to provide the terms and conditions of employment for paraprofessionals, para/driver, bus drivers, bookkeeper, cooks, custodians, mechanics, and clerical employees during the duration of this Agreement.

ARTICLE II: Recognition of Exclusive Representative

SECTION 1. Recognition: In accordance with the P.E.L.R.A., the School District recognizes Minnesota School Employees' Association, as the exclusive representative for paraprofessionals, para/driver, bus drivers, bookkeeper, cooks, custodians, mechanics, and clerical employees employed by the School District, which exclusive representative, shall have those rights and duties as prescribed by the P.E.L.R.A. and as described in the provisions of this Agreement.

SECTION 2. Appropriate Unit: The exclusive representative shall represent all employees of the School District contained in the appropriate unit as defined in ARTICLE III, SECTION 2 and the P.E.L.R.A. and in certification by the Commissioner of the Minnesota Bureau of Mediation Services (BMS).

SECTION 3. Unit Stewards: The exclusive representative shall provide the School District with the name of the stewards and secretary by October 1 each year.

ARTICLE III: Definitions

SECTION 1. Terms and Conditions of Employment: The term, "terms and conditions of employment," means the hours of employment, the compensation therefore including fringe benefits except retirement contributions or benefits other than School District payments of, or contributions to, premiums for group insurance coverage of retired employees or severance pay, and the School District personnel policies affecting the working conditions of the employees. "Terms and conditions of employment" is subject to the provisions of the P.E.L.R.A.

SECTION 2. Description of Appropriate Unit: All members of the appropriate unit of the School District, not required to be licensed by the State of Minnesota, who are public employees within the meaning of the P.E.L.R.A., excluding supervisory and confidential employees are members of the bargaining unit.

SECTION 3. School District: For purposes of administering this Agreement, the term, "School District," shall mean the School Board or its designated representative(s).

SECTION 4. Health Care Savings Plan (HCSP): In 2001 The Minnesota State Retirement System (MSRS) was granted authority to offer a post employment health care savings plan, (HCSP), Minnesota Statute §352.98 (2001 Supp).

SECTION 5. Other Terms: Terms not defined in this Agreement shall have those meanings as defined by the P.E.L.R.A.

ARTICLE IV: School District Rights

SECTION 1. Inherent Managerial Rights: The exclusive representative recognizes that the School District is not required to meet and negotiate on matters of inherent managerial policy, which include, but are not limited to, such areas of discretion or policy as the functions and programs of the School District, its overall budget, utilization of technology, the organizational structure, and selection and direction and number of personnel.

SECTION 2. School Board Responsibilities: The exclusive representative recognizes the rights and obligation of the School Board to efficiently manage and conduct the operation of the School District within its legal limitations and with its primary obligation to provide educational opportunities for the students of the School District.

SECTION 3. Effect of Laws, Rules and Regulations: The exclusive representative recognizes that all employees covered by this Agreement shall perform the services prescribed by the School Board and shall be governed by the laws of the State of Minnesota, and by School Board rules, regulations, directives, and orders, issued by properly designated officials of the School District. The exclusive representative also recognizes the right, obligation and duty of the School Board and its duly designated officials to promulgate rules, regulations, directives, and orders from time to time as deemed necessary by the School Board insofar as such rules, regulations, directives and orders are not inconsistent with the terms of this Agreement. The exclusive representative also recognizes that the School District, all employees covered by this Agreement, and all provisions of this Agreement are subject to the laws of the State of Minnesota, Federal laws, rules and regulations of the State and Federal governmental agencies. Any provisions of this Agreement found to be in violation of any such laws, rules, regulations, directives, or orders shall be null and void and without force and effect.

SECTION 4. Reservation of Managerial Rights: The foregoing enumeration of rights and duties shall not be deemed to exclude other inherent managerial rights and managerial functions not expressly reserved, and all managerial rights and managerial functions not expressly delegated in this Agreement are reserved to the School District.

ARTICLE V: Employees' Rights

SECTION 1. Employee Rights: Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed to limit, impair, or affect the right of any employee or his/her representative to the expression or communication of a view, grievance, complaint, or opinion on any matter related to the conditions or compensation of public employment or their betterment, so long as the same is not designed to and does not interfere with the full, faithful and proper performance of the duties of employment or circumvent the rights of the exclusive representative.

SECTION 2. Dues Checkoff: Employees shall be allowed dues checkoff for the exclusive representative. Upon receipt of a properly executed authorization form from the employee, the School District shall deduct from the employee's paycheck the dues the employee has agreed to pay to the exclusive representative.

SECTION 4. Sums Deducted from Salary: With respect to any sums deducted from an employee's paycheck for membership dues, the School District shall transmit such items to the exclusive representative together with a list of names of employees for whom deductions were made and the amount of such deduction within 30 calendar days of such deduction. In the event an employee requests that dues check off be stopped or leaves the employment of the School District, any deduction shall cease.

SECTION 5. Access to Financial Information: The School District shall provide, at the written request of the exclusive representative, access to School District financial information, budgets, and such other information necessary for collective bargaining purposes.

SECTION 6. Personnel Files: Employees, upon written request to the supervisor having custody of the files, have the right to review the content of their own personnel files and evaluations. Employees shall have the right to reproduce, any of the contents of their own files. Employees shall have the right to submit for inclusion in their own files written information in response to any material in the files, and such information shall become a part of the files.

SECTION 7. Access to School District Facilities for Exclusive Representative Business: The exclusive representative and its members shall have access to School District facilities for the purpose of conducting business with the written approval of the building administrator. Employees shall not conduct exclusive representative business during duty hours without the express written prior consent of the Superintendent.

ARTICLE VI: Rates of Pay

SECTION 1. Rates of Pay:

Subd. 1. Wages and Classifications: The wages and classifications reflected in SCHEDULE A and SCHEDULE B, attached hereto, shall be a part of the Agreement for the period commencing July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2024.

Subd. 2. Salary Schedules: During the duration of this Agreement, advancement on any salary schedule shall be subject to the terms of this Agreement. In the event a successor Agreement is not entered into prior to the expiration of this Agreement, employees shall be compensated according to their current rate until a successor Agreement is entered into. When a successor Agreement is entered into, compensation shall be retroactive to July 1.

SECTION 2. Occupational Injury Pay: Employees who are forced to leave their jobs because of occupational injury will receive pay for all hours scheduled to work on that day of injury or accident.

SECTION 3. Beginning Salary: Previous experience and special training may affect the beginning salary, but a new employee may not exceed the highest rate of pay in any given classification.

SECTION 4. Boiler and Building Check Pay: Any employee required to perform a boiler check outside of his/her normal workday shall be paid a minimum of two hours of pay. If other work, such as snow removal, has to be done during the check, the time will run concurrently.

SECTION 5. Call-in Pay: Any employee called by his/her supervisor for work outside the normal work day shall be paid a minimum of 2 hours and School Board approved mileage rate for a round trip from home to work and back. This section shall not apply to situations directly related to late starts and/or early dismissal.

SECTION 6. Demotions: If a demotion requires an employee to transfer to a job with a lower band and grade, the employee shall be frozen at the employee's rate of pay prior to the demotion for a period of twelve months or until the employee's schedule placement catches up, whichever occurs first. This section shall not apply to any demotions resulting from any disciplinary action.

SECTION 7. Salary Schedules: SCHEDULE A and SCHEDULE B reflect the agreements made for hourly wages.

SECTION 8. Call Back: Minimum Callback for In-Service: Employees called in for in-service training shall be paid for a minimum of two (2) hours.

SECTION 9. Shift Differential: Employees working janitorial shifts starting after 2:00 P.M. Monday through Friday or for any shift on a Saturday, Sunday or holiday shall receive an additional thirty-five cents (35¢) per hour. Shift differential shall not apply to boiler and building checks that are two hours or less.

SECTION 10. Para II Stipend: Paraprofessionals who are working in positions under the Para II sub classification shall receive a wage rate of 110% of his/her paraprofessional rate of pay for all hours paid.

SECTION 11. Custodial employees with a class 1 licensure will receive an additional thirty-five (35¢) cents per hour.

SECTION 12: Class III Drivers will receive an additional thirty-five (35¢ per hour for driving hours).

ARTICLE VII: Group Insurance

SECTION 1. Selection of Carrier: The selection of the group insurance carriers and policy shall be made by the School District as provided by law.

SECTION 2.

Subd 1. Health and Hospitalization Insurance Premium Contributions: The School District shall contribute for health and hospitalization- During the -2020-22 contract years, the District will offer a Cafeteria (125) plan and will contribute up to \$10,000 per year towards family health insurance only, or \$7000 per year which may be utilized toward the combined cost of any of the following:

- The premium for coverage for each regular employee employed by the school district that qualifies for and is enrolled in the School District group health and hospitalization plan;
- The premium for a Basic Life Insurance Policy (\$50,000);
- The premium for Supplemental Life Insurance up to \$50,000 (this would be taxable);
- The premium for any other District group supplemental insurance plans approved as pretax options;
- Employees shall be paid 50% of any remaining funds after purchasing insurance up to a maximum of \$2,850. Employees electing not to purchase insurance shall be paid \$2,850 per year. This payment shall be taxable.

Any additional cost of the premiums selected is to be borne by the employee and paid by payroll deduction.

Subd. 2 Dental Insurance: During the 2022-24 contract years, the District will contribute up to \$35 per month towards the premium for dental insurance.

Subd. 2: Selection of Provided Policies: An employee has the option to select coverage under the School District group policy.

Subd. 3. Allowance for Husband and Wife: When two employees are married and are both employed by the School District, each shall be allowed the insurance contribution as stated in ARTICLE VII,

Subd. 4. For employees electing the District's HSA plan, a contribution of \$1000 will be made into the employee's HSA account for the 2022-2023 and the 2023-2024 school years.

SECTION 3. Long Term Disability Insurance (LTD): The School District shall contribute a sum not to exceed \$12.00 per month toward the school districts LTD policy for all employees covered by this Agreement.

SECTION 4. Employee Assistance Program (EAP): The School District shall pay the full cost toward the school district's EAP policy for all employees covered by this Agreement and their eligible family members.

SECTION 5. Claims Against the School District: The School District's only obligation is to provide a group policy (or to allow an employee to purchase individual health insurance policies) and to pay such amounts as agreed to in this Agreement. The School District's obligations are strictly administrative, and, under no circumstances, shall a claim be made against the School District as a result of a denial of insurance benefits by any insurance carrier.

SECTION 6. Duration of Insurance Contribution: An employee is eligible for School District contribution as provided in this article as long as the employee is employed by the School District. Upon termination of employment, all School District contributions shall cease.

SECTION 7. Eligibility: Benefits provided in this article shall be available according to the following criteria:

1. Employees hired before May 1, 2014 shall be eligible for the contributions listed in Article VII, Section 2.
2. Employees hired after May 1, 2014, who are employed 20 or more hours per week including bus drivers, shall be eligible for the contributions listed in Article VII, Section 2.

SECTION 8. Reduction in Hours Protection: Employees who are reduced in hours through no fault of their own shall suffer no reduction in insurance benefits for the duration of the balance of the employment contract period in the current fiscal year, provided the insurance carrier allows.

ARTICLE VIII: Leaves of Absence

SECTION 1. Sick Leave:

Subd. 1. Annual Allowance: An employee shall earn sick leave at the rate of 1 2/3 days for each month of service in the employ of the School District credited to the employee's sick leave bank each month. New employees shall receive a sick leave advance of 4 months credited to his/her sick leave bank upon hire. Beginning on the new hire's fifth month of service, he/she shall earn sick leave on a monthly basis at the rate established.

Subd. 2. Accumulation: Unused sick leave days may accumulate to a maximum credit of 110 days of sick leave per employee for 12 month employees and 90 days for less than 12 month employees.

The maximum credit of days shall be resolved after June 30 of each contract year. Twenty-five percent (25%) of any hours earned under Section 1 above in excess of the 110 or 90 days an employee is eligible to

accumulate as of June 30 shall be deducted and deposited into a HCSP in the employee's name. The rate of pay shall be the rate the employee was earning as of June 30 of that contract year and deposited into an HCSP by August 1 of the same calendar year. (Example: If an employee who could accumulate 90 days of sick leave started contract year 1 with 80 days already accumulated on July 1 and did not use any additional days earned each month throughout the contract year, this employee would have 95 days accumulated on June 30 of contract year 1. Twenty-five percent of the 5 days in excess at this employee's rate of pay as of June 30 of contract year 1 would be deposited into a HCSP in the employee's name. This employee would start contract year 2 out with 90 days of sick leave accumulation.)

Subd. 3. Eligibility: Sick leave with pay shall be allowed when the employee's absence is found to have been due to his/her illness or disability, which prevented his/her attendance and performance of duties on that day or days. Such days are to be deducted from accrued sick leave.

Subd. 4. Illness of Family Members: In accordance with Minnesota statute §181.9413 an employee may use personal sick leave benefits provided by the employer for absences due to an illness of or injury to the employee's child ("child" means an individual under 18 years of age or an individual under age 20 who is still attending secondary school), adult child, spouse, sibling, parent, mother-in-law, father-in-law, grandchild, grandparent, or stepparent, for reasonable periods of time as the employee's attendance may be necessary, on the same terms upon which the employee is able to use sick leave benefits for the employee's own illness or injury. Such days are to be deducted from sick leave.

Subd. 5. Proof of Illness: The School District may require an employee to furnish a medical certificate from a qualified physician as evidence of illness, indicating such absence was due to illness, in order to qualify for sick leave pay. In the event that a medical certificate will be required, the employee will be so advised.

Subd. 6. Authorization for Payment: Sick leave pay shall be approved only upon submission of a signed request upon the authorized sick leave pay request form available in the offices.

Subd. 7. Wellness Incentive:

1. Employees whose annual use of sick leave is less than 3 days will have 1 day of accumulated sick leave placed on a "wellness accumulation schedule" for that year of service.
2. Upon retirement and/or resignation, an amount equal to the current substitute current wage for the classification the employee was currently holding will be deposited in the HCSP program.
3. Eight hours of substitute pay will be deposited for each accumulated day for all classifications except drivers. Drivers will have 4 hours of substitute pay for each accumulated day.
4. Employees must have a minimum of 20 accumulated days on the "wellness accumulation schedule" to be eligible for the wellness benefit.
5. This benefit will not be pro-rated.

SECTION 2. Workers' Compensation: Pursuant to M.S. 176, an employee injured on the job in the service of the School District and collecting workers' compensation insurance may draw sick leave and receive full salary from the School District, said salary to be reduced by an amount equal to the insurance payments, and only that fraction of the days not covered by insurance will be deducted from his/her accrued sick leave.

SECTION 3. Personal Leave: Employees shall be allotted 3 personal leave days (pro-rated based on the employee's regularly scheduled work day), non-accumulative, per school year, July 1 through June 30. Requests for approval of personal leave must be made in writing to the Superintendent or his/her designated representative at least 3 days in advance.

No more than 3 employees shall be granted personal leave on the same day. Substitutes must be available for all who are on leave. In the event that more than 3 requests are received for the same date, the leave shall be granted based upon the order in which the requests are received. The order in which the requests are received is determined by the date and time received placed on the request by the Superintendent or his/her designee.

Employees shall be paid for any unused personal days at the end of the school year at the hourly rate paid to substitutes.

SECTION 4. Bereavement: Up to 3 days of leave per occurrence shall be allowed, the days to be deducted from sick leave, for death in the employee's immediate family. "Immediate family" is defined as the employee's spouse, child, parent, mother-in-law, father-in-law, grandparents, brother, sister, aunt, uncle, cohabitating adults and those adult's' children, or other relative living in the household of the employee. The specific amount of leave allowed is subject to the discretion of the Superintendent depending on the circumstances. Denial of such leave shall not be subject to the grievance procedure.

SECTION 5. Emergency Leave:

Subd. 1. Eligibility: An employee may be granted a leave at the discretion his/her immediate supervisor of up to 2 days per year, non-accumulative, for situations that arise requiring the employee's emergency attention which cannot be attended to outside the employees workday or for an unscheduled school closing and which are not covered under other provisions of this Agreement. At the discretion of the Superintendent, more than 2 days of emergency leave may be granted. All emergency days are to be deducted from sick leave.

Subd. 2. Application: Requests for emergency leave must be made in writing to the employee's immediate supervisor at least 3 days in advance whenever possible or prior to the processing of payroll for that pay period in the event of an unscheduled school closing. The request shall state the reason for the proposed leave. The immediate supervisor reserves the right to refuse to grant such leave if, under the circumstances involved, such leave should not be granted. Emergency leaves must have prior, written approval whenever possible.

Subd. 3. Authorization: An emergency leave day shall not be granted for the day preceding or the day following holidays or vacations or the first and last days of the school year, unless it is a request due to an unscheduled school closing. The Superintendent may allow 1 of these days to be granted due to extenuating circumstances, but denial of such leave shall not be subject to the grievance procedure.

SECTION 6. Medical Leave:

Subd. 1. Eligibility: A medical leave of absence may be granted to an employee who meets either of the following qualifications:

1. Has completed his/her probationary period and;
2. Is unable to perform his/her duties because of illness and injury, and
3. Has exhausted all sick leave credit, OR
4. Has become eligible for LTD compensation.

This leave is without pay and may be up to 6 months. This leave may be renewed at the discretion of the School Board.

Subd. 2. Application: A request for leave of absence, or renewal thereof, under this section shall be accompanied by a written doctor's statement outlining the condition of health and estimated time at which the employee is expected to be able to resume his/her normal responsibilities.

Subd. 3. Insurance Coverage: An employee on unpaid leave is eligible to continue to participate in group insurance programs if permitted under the insurance policy provisions. The employee shall pay the entire premium for such insurance commencing with the beginning of the leave and shall pay to the School District the monthly premium in advance. Failure to pay the premium in advance may result in the cancellation of the policy by the insurance company.

Subd. 4. Effect on Accrued Time: An employee who returns from unpaid leave shall retain experience credit for pay purposes and other benefits which he/she has accrued at the time he went on leave. No credit shall accrue from the period of time that an employee was on unpaid leave.

SECTION 7. Well Childcare/Adoption Leave:

Subd. 1. Application for Leave: A well childcare/adoption leave may be granted by the School Board, subject to the provisions of this section, to 1 parent of an infant child, provided such parent is caring for the child on a full-time basis.

Subd. 2. Notice: An employee making application for well childcare/adoption leave must inform the Superintendent in writing of his/her intention to take the leave at least 3 calendar months before commencement of the intended leave.

Subd. 3. Use of Sick Leave: An employee shall not be eligible for sick leave during the period of time covered by a childcare/adoption leave.

Subd. 4. Substitute Availability: The availability of a substitute may also be considered by the School District in determining the beginning or the duration of the leave.

Subd. 5. Commencement and Duration: In making a determination concerning the commencement and duration of a well childcare/adoption leave, the School Board shall not, in any event, be required to:

1. Grant any leave more than twelve (12) months in duration.
2. Permit the employee to return to his or her employment prior to the date designated in the request for well childcare/adoption leave.

Subd. 6. Reinstatement: An employee returning from well childcare/adoption leave shall be reemployed in a position for which he or she is classified unless previously discharged or laid off.

Subd. 7. Termination: Failure of the employee to return pursuant to the date determined under this section shall constitute grounds for termination unless the School Board and the employee mutually agree in writing to an extension in the leave.

Subd. 8. Probationary Period: The parties agree that periods of time for which the employee is on

well childcare/adoption leave shall not be counted in determining the completion of the probationary period.

Subd. 9. Retention of Rights: An employee who returns from well childcare/adoption leave within the provisions of this section shall retain all previous experience credit for pay purposes and any unused time accumulated under the provisions of this Agreement at the commencement of the beginning of the leave. The employee shall not accrue additional experience credit for pay purposes or leave time during the period of absence for well childcare/adoption leave.

Subd. 10. Insurance Participation: An employee on well childcare/adoption leave is eligible to participate in group insurance programs if permitted under the insurance policy provisions but shall pay the entire premium for such programs as the employee wishes to retain, commencing with the beginning of the well childcare/adoption leave. The right to continue participation in such group insurance programs, however, will terminate if the employee does not return to the School District pursuant to this section, subject to COBRA requirements.

Subd. 11. Pay: Leave under this section shall be without pay or fringe benefits unless required by state or federal statute.

SECTION 8. Jury Service Leave: Jury service will be administered pursuant to Minnesota statutes. An employee who serves on jury duty shall be granted the day or days necessary as stipulated by the court to discharge this responsibility without any salary deduction or loss of basic leave allowance. The compensation received for jury duty service shall be remitted to the School District.

SECTION 9. Exclusive Representative Leave: A leave of absence, without pay, may be granted for a reasonable length of time to officers or appointed representatives of the exclusive representative to attend meetings of the exclusive representative. All requests for such leave must be submitted to the Superintendent, in writing, at least 3 days in advance. No more than 4 officers may utilize this leave on the same day.

SECTION 10. Eligibility:

Subd. 1. Eligibility: Leave benefits provided in this article shall apply only to employees who are included in the bargaining unit.

Subd. 2. Absences Not Covered by Leave: Any person requesting to be absent from work for a reason not covered by leave provisions of this agreement must have such request approved by the superintendent in writing prior to seeking a substitute. However, denials may be appealed to the School Board at the next regularly scheduled school board meeting. The Board's decision is final. All such leaves may be denied and are not subject to the grievance provision.

SECTION 11. Reassignment of Management Paraprofessionals: Management paraprofessionals are employed based on a need for services for individual students. The amount of needed service is found in the particular IEPs. Management paraprofessionals are assigned working hours tied to the individual students they serve. When the student and/or students are absent from school and services are not needed; therefore, the management paraprofessional's working hours may be reduced.

Subd. 1. One-to-One Assignments: When a management paraprofessional is providing 1-to-1 services to a student, if the student is absent the management paraprofessional will be reassigned duties for up to 2 days for each accumulative occurrence of absence of the assigned student.

Any management paraprofessional who has no one to provide services to due to student absences exceeding 2 consecutive days will be placed on a first call substitute list. Seniority will determine the order of substituting.

If a student requiring a 1-to-1 management paraprofessional leaves the School District permanently, the management paraprofessional assigned to the student will not work until reassigned based on seniority among management paraprofessionals. Reassignment will occur following the end of the next full pay cycle during which time the management paraprofessional will not work.

Subd. 2. Serving Multiple Students: In a situation where a management paraprofessional is assigned to multiple students and a student assigned to that management paraprofessional leaves the School District permanently, his/her work schedule will be adjusted prior to the end of the next full pay cycle during which time management paraprofessional may be re-assigned or laid off.

Subd. 3. Listed by Name: A management paraprofessional who is listed by name in an IEP as the serving paraprofessional will not have his/her assignment changed due to the leaving of other students served by other management paraprofessionals until change of school years. However, the School District and exclusive representative must meet and negotiate before a listing by name applies.

Subd. 4. Communication: The School District Central Office needs to be informed when such changes occur. Changes must be noted on the time cards. If a reassigned management paraprofessional is assigned to work as a substitute, his/her name must be listed on the "Leave of Absence Form" for the employee for whom the management paraprofessional is substituting.

Subd. 5. Alternative work when no Paraprofessional Work is Available:

1. School District Food Service Supervisor and the School District Custodial Supervisor update work available daily to the assigned clerical paraprofessional who is charged with finding substitutes.
2. The clerical paraprofessional prepares a spreadsheet of all custodial and food services paraprofessional and secretarial absences each morning.
3. The clerical paraprofessional emails the updated spreadsheet to building secretaries.
4. The management paraprofessional is given a copy of available openings and must indicate in writing if he/she does not wish to take openings and, if not, leaves work and is not paid for the absence.
5. The management paraprofessional must document on his/her time card the employee for whom he/she substituted, and the time will be charged to that department.

ARTICLE IX: Hours of Service and Duty Year

SECTION 1. A Full-Time Employee is:

Subd. 1. Regular Work Week: A regular work week shall consist of a maximum of 40 hours, or a minimum of 20 hours, exclusive of lunch.

Subd. 2. Bus Drivers: A full-time bus driver is one who is contracted to drive a regular route for the school year. The normal day for a bus driver is to transport the students to and from school. A bus driver's

daily schedule is based on a total of 4 hours, inclusive of inspection time.

SECTION 2. Part-Time Employees: The School District reserves the right to employ such personnel as it deems desirable or necessary on a part-time or casual basis as long as doing so does not affect the regular work week of employees covered by this Agreement.

SECTION 3. Shifts and Starting Times: All employees will be assigned starting time and shifts by the School District.

SECTION 4. Lunch Periods: Employees working more than 5 consecutive hours per day shall be provided an unpaid-duty free lunch period of at least 30 minutes.

SECTION 5. School Closing: In the event that school closes for (e.g. distance learning day, weather related closing, other emergency closing, etc.) employees will have the following options made available to them:

- a. work remotely as assigned by the District
- b. take the day unpaid
- c. Take sick or personal time
- d. Make up the time as mutually agreed between the employee and their building supervisor or administrator

If an employee reports to work prior to school being closed he/she will be paid a minimum of 2 hours. The previous options may be used for the remaining lost time.

SECTION 6. Shortened Workday: In the event of a late start or an early out, employees shall be given the opportunity to make up any missed hours. Any employee choosing to make up missed hours will consult with their supervisor regarding the scheduling of this make up time. An employee who is denied the opportunity to schedule make up hours, by their supervisor, may appeal the issue to the Superintendent. The Superintendent's decision will be final. These added hours cannot be added to a full week in order to be paid as overtime.

SECTION 7. Overtime: Time and a half shall be paid for all hours worked over 40 hours in any work week. In the event of an emergency that occurs on a holiday, employees required to work will receive their regular rate of pay in addition to their pay for the holiday.

To work overtime that is not part of an employee's regular schedule, the employee must have prior, written approval from the employee's immediate supervisor. If prior, written approval is not possible, the immediate supervisor's written approval must be obtained prior to the completion of the current pay period.

Employees, who work beyond their regular daily schedule on any day, shall not be required to take time off later in the work week because of such extra work.

ARTICLE X: Holidays

SECTION 1. Paid Holidays: Twelve-Month, Full-Time Employees:

Subd. 1. Twelve-Month, Full-Time Employees: Twelve-month, full-time employees shall be granted the following paid holidays: July 4th, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Friday following Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve Day, Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Good Friday, and Memorial Day. Pay

for Memorial Day and July 4th will only be allowed if scheduled work days extend over the particular paid holiday.

Subd. 2. Paid Holidays for Less Than 12 Month and 20 Hours or More Per Week Employees: Employees working less than 12 months and 20 hours or more per week shall be granted the following paid holidays: Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Friday following Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve Day, Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Memorial Day, and Good Friday. Paid holidays will be pro-rated based on the employee's normal work day. For example, an employee who normally works 4 hours per day will receive 4 hours pay for each holiday while an employee normally working 6 hours per day will receive 6 hours pay for each holiday.

Subd. 3. Paid Holidays for Less Than 20 Hours Per Week Employees: Employees working less than 12 months and less than 20 hours per week shall be granted the following paid holidays: Labor Day, Christmas Eve Day, Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Memorial Day. Paid holidays will be pro-rated based on the employee's normal work day. For example, an employee who normally works 4 hours per day employee will receive 4 hours pay for each holiday while an employee normally working 6 hours per day will receive 6 hours pay for each holiday.

SECTION 2. Weekends: Holidays that fall on weekends shall be observed on a day established by the School District.

SECTION 3. School in Session: The School District reserves the right, if school is in session, to cancel any of the above holidays and establish another holiday in lieu thereof. Any legal holiday which falls within an employee's vacation period, shall not be counted as a vacation day.

SECTION 4. Application: In order to be eligible for holiday pay, an employee must have worked his/her regular workday before and after the holiday unless he/she is on excused leave or vacation. Eligible employees shall receive Labor Day as a paid holiday provided they work the Tuesday following Labor Day and Memorial Day if they work the day before Memorial Day.

ARTICLE XI: Vacations

SECTION 1. Eligibility: This article shall apply only to employees who are regularly employed on a 12-month basis and 40-hour week.

SECTION 2. Earned Vacations: Full-time, 12-month employees under these provisions shall accrue and use vacation in the same year as follows:

Years of Service	Accrual Rate per Month
Less than 1 (one) year	0 days
1-8	1 day
9-15	1.25 days
16-30	1.667 days
31+ years	2.0834 days

Earned vacations can only be used after completing a full year of service. Use of vacation time may start upon the anniversary date of employment. The 18-month period of time in which the vacation days are to be used is the 18 months from the anniversary date of the employee each year.

SECTION 3. Unused Vacation and Scheduling:

Subd. 1. Resignation: An employee who has completed at least one year of service shall be entitled to receive the pro-rata pay for unused vacation time provided such employee provides the School District with at least 2 weeks' advanced written notice of his/her resignation time.

Subd. 2. Scheduling: The scheduling of all vacation shall be determined by the employee's immediate supervisor.

Subd. 3. Unused Vacation Days: An employee may choose to be paid for up to 3 days of unused vacation time instead of using the vacation days. Unused days, over 3 days and up to 5 days, will be placed in the employee's HCSP.

ARTICLE XII: Discipline, Discharge, and Probationary Period

SECTION 1. Probationary Period: An employee shall serve a probationary period of 1 calendar year of continuous service during which time the School Board shall have the unqualified right to discharge such employee. During this probationary period, the employee shall have no recourse to the grievance procedure insofar as discharge is concerned. However, a probationary employee shall have the right to bring a grievance on any other provisions of the Master Agreement alleged to have been violated. A new employee shall not be considered a permanent employee until the employee has served this 1 calendar year probationary period. Subsequent to that period, the employee shall attain permanent status and may be discharged only for just cause.

SECTION 2. Discipline: Disciplinary action shall normally include only the following measures and shall normally be administered progressively depending on the severity of the incident. Disciplinary action may be taken against an employee for just cause.

The School Board or designee shall have the right to discipline/discharge an employee for just cause. Disciplinary actions by the School Board or their designee may include the following 5 steps:

- A. oral reprimand
- B. written reprimand
- C. suspension with pay
- D. suspension without pay
- E. discharge

The School District reserves the right to move directly to a higher level of discipline based on the seriousness of the offense and other relevant factors.

SECTION 3. Meetings to Discuss Discipline Measures: If a supervisor meets with an employee to discuss written reprimand, suspension, or discharge, the employee has the right to have a representative of the exclusive representative present. When possible, the School District will attempt to discuss with the employee(s) any concern which may lead to a disciplinary action and shall offer constructive suggestions for correction before any disciplinary action is initiated.

SECTION 4. Discharge Due Process: No employee who has completed the probationary period shall be discharged without having been afforded an opportunity to hear the reason(s) for the discharge and without an opportunity to offer an explanation of the relevant facts and circumstances surrounding the events which

preceded the discharge and/or any extenuating or mitigating circumstances which the employee believes are relevant to the discharge decision. Whenever possible and practical, such opportunities shall be provided in a conference with the School District which shall be conducted after advance notice to the employee and his/her representative who shall be permitted to attend the conference.

SECTION 5. Disciplinary Action Records: A written record of all disciplinary actions within the meaning of this article shall be provided to the involved employee(s) and will be entered into the employee's personnel file. Investigations into conduct, which do not result in disciplinary action, however, shall not be entered into the employee's personnel file. The disciplined employee shall be entitled to submit a written response to be included in the employee's personnel file.

SECTION 6. Probationary Period Change of Classification: In addition to the initial probationary period, an employee transferred or promoted to a different classification shall serve a new probationary period of 90 working days in any such new classification. If during this 90-day probationary period, the School District is not satisfied with the job being done in the new classification, the employee will be returned to the old classification with no loss of seniority in that classification.

SECTION 7. Unpaid Leaves and Probationary Period: Periods of absences for unpaid leaves taken under ARTICLE VIII, SECTION 2, and SECTION 7, or absences exceeding allotted sick leave will not count as part of the probationary period. The probationary period will be lengthened to equal those absences unless otherwise required by law.

SECTION 8. Seniority Date: Employees shall acquire seniority upon completion of the probationary period and, upon acquiring seniority, the seniority date shall relate back to the first date of hire. If more than 1 employee is hired on the same date, seniority ranking for such employees shall be determined by the order of hire.

SECTION 9. Job Posting: Job openings in any classification covered by this Agreement will be posted in all buildings in the School District for a period of 5 days. The School District determines what position is to be posted after an employee submits his/her resignation or leaves employment for other reasons. This allows for managerial transfers of employees prior to position posting. Employees interested in the positions must advise the School District in writing within the posting period. A permanent job opening is a vacancy in a position scheduled that provides enough hours for unit inclusion. Permanent job openings shall be filled within 40 days from the last day of the job-posting period.

SECTION 10. Job Posting Copies: Copies of all job posting shall be provided to the chief steward(s).

SECTION 11. Reduction in Force: The parties recognize the principle of seniority in the application of this Agreement, within classification, concerning reduction in force, provided the employee is fully qualified to perform the duties and responsibilities of the position. An employee on layoff shall retain his/her seniority and right to recall, within classification, in seniority order for a period of 15 months after the date of layoff. The employee must be fully qualified for the position to be recalled. Fully qualified means the person must meet all current federal and/or state qualifications for the position, even if qualifications for the position have changed since the date of lay off. The School District determines the actual date of recall. No job opening shall exist within the district if someone from that job classification is on layoff.

SECTION 12. Notifying the School District of a Change of Address: An employee on lay off must advise the School District of any change in address which occurs during his/her period of recall.

SECTION 13. Seniority List: A seniority list will be made up by the School District and posted once a year.

When the seniority list is posted, an employee shall have 15 working days to request a correction on the list.

SECTION 14. Loss of Seniority and Related Benefits: Employees who are terminated during their initial probationary period, resign, retire, are discharged for just cause, or fail to return to work following the completion of a leave of absence, or fail to respond to a recall notice within 16 calendar days while on layoff shall lose their seniority rights, longevity pay, and other related benefits.

SECTION 15. Job Classifications: Employees may be reassigned within their classification whenever employee absences create the need for reassignment.

ARTICLE XIII: Grievance Procedure

SECTION 1. Grievance Procedure: A “grievance” shall mean an allegation by an employee or group of employees resulting in a dispute or disagreement between the employee or group of employees, as filed by the exclusive representative, and the School District as to the interpretation or application of terms and conditions of employment insofar as such matters are contained in this Agreement.

SECTION 2. Representative: The employee, administrator, or School Board may be represented during any step of the procedure by any person or agent designated by such party to act in the party’s behalf.

SECTION 3. Definitions and Interpretations:

Subd. 1. Extension: Time limits specified in this Agreement may be extended by mutual agreement.

Subd. 2. Days: Reference to “days” regarding time periods in this procedure shall refer to all weekdays not designated as holidays by this contract or state law.

Subd. 3. Computation of Time: In computing any period of time prescribed or allowed by procedures in this article, the date of the act, event, or default for which the designated period of time begins to run shall not be included. The last day of the period so computed shall be counted, unless it is a Saturday, a Sunday, or a legal holiday, in which event the period runs until the end of the next day which is not a Saturday, Sunday, or a legal holiday.

Subd. 4. Filing and Postmark: The filing or service of any notice or document required by this Agreement shall be timely if it bears a postmark of the United States mail or if it has been faxed or personally served within the time period. The counting of the time line begins the day after the employee, the employee's representative, or School District receives notice.

SECTION 4. Time Limitations: A grievance shall not be valid for consideration unless the grievance is submitted in writing to the principal(s) or building administrator setting forth the facts and the specific provision(s) of the Agreement allegedly violated and the particular relief sought within 20 days after the date of the event giving rise to the grievance occurred.

Failure to file any grievance within such period shall be deemed a waiver thereof. Failure to appeal a grievance from one level to another within the time periods hereafter provided shall constitute a waiver of the grievance. An effort shall first be made to adjust an alleged grievance informally between the employee and the School District's designee.

SECTION 5. An Adjustment of Grievance: The School District and the employee shall attempt to adjust all grievances which may arise during the course of employment of any employee in the following manner:

Subd. 1. Level I - If the grievance is not resolved through informal discussion, the principal(s) or building administrator shall give a written decision on the grievance to the parties involved within 5 days after receipt of the written grievance.

Subd. 2. Level II - Superintendent: In the event the grievance is not resolved in Level I, the decision rendered may be appealed to the Superintendent, provided such appeal is made in writing within 5 days after receipt of the decision in Level I. If a grievance is properly appealed to the Superintendent, the Superintendent or his/her designee shall set a time to meet regarding the grievance within 10 days after receipt of the appeal. Within 7 days after the meeting, the Superintendent or his/her designee shall issue a decision in writing to the parties involved.

Subd. 3. Level III - School Board: In the event the grievance is not resolved in Level II, the decision rendered may be appealed to the School Board, provided such appeal is made in writing within 5 days after receipt of the decision in Level II. If a grievance is properly appealed to the School Board, the School Board shall set a time to hear the grievance at the next regular School Board meeting after receipt of the appeal. Within 10 days after the hearing, the School Board shall issue its decision in writing to the parties involved. At the option of the School Board, a committee or representative(s) of the School Board may be designated by the School Board to hear the appeal at this level, and report the findings and recommendations to the School Board. The School Board shall then render its decision.

Subd. 4. Grievance Mediation: Either party may request grievance mediation at any time by sending a written request to the BMS and by sending a copy of such requests to the other party.

SECTION 6. Denial of Grievance: Failure by the School Board or its representative to issue a decision within the time periods provided in this article shall constitute a denial of the grievance, and the employee

may appeal it to the next level.

SECTION 7. Arbitration Procedures: In the event that the employee and the School Board are unable to resolve any grievance, the grievance may be submitted to arbitration as explained in this article.

Subd. 1. Submission to Arbitration: The grievant may submit to arbitration any grievance which has been properly processed through Level III of the grievance procedure. The exclusive representative must file with the Superintendent a written notice of intention to arbitrate not more than 12 days after the written decision of the grievance at Level III. Arbitration proceedings shall be conducted according to labor arbitration rules.

Subd. 2. Prior Procedure Required: No grievance shall be considered by the arbitrator which has not been first duly processed in accordance with the grievance procedure and appeal provisions.

Subd. 3. Selection of Arbitrator: The School District and employee or employee's representative shall endeavor to select a mutually acceptable arbitrator to hear and decide the grievance. If the School District and the employee or employee's representative are unable to agree on an arbitrator, they may request from the Commissioner of the BMS, a list of 5 names. The list maintained by the Commissioner shall be made up of qualified arbitrators who have submitted an application to the Commissioner. The parties shall alternately strike names from the list of 5 arbitrators until only 1 name remains. The remaining arbitrator shall hear and decide the grievance. If the parties are unable to agree on who shall strike the first name, the question shall be decided by a flip of the coin. Each party shall be responsible for equally compensating the arbitrator for his/her fee and necessary expenses.

Subd. 4. Jurisdiction: The arbitrator shall have jurisdiction over disputes or disagreements relating to grievances properly before the arbitrator pursuant to the terms of this procedure. The jurisdiction of the arbitrator shall not extend to proposed changes in terms and conditions of employment contained in this written Agreement; nor shall an arbitrator have jurisdiction over any grievance which has not been submitted to arbitration in compliance with the terms of the grievance and arbitration procedure as outlined in this article; nor shall the jurisdiction of the arbitrator extend to matters of inherent managerial policy, which shall include, but are not limited, to such areas of discretion or policy as the functions and programs of the School District, its overall budget, utilization of technology, the organizational structure, and selection and direction and number of personnel. In considering any issue in dispute, the arbitrator's order shall give due consideration to the statutory rights and obligations of the School District to efficiently manage and conduct its operation within the legal limitations surrounding the financing of such operations.

Subd. 5. Decision: The decision of the arbitrator shall be final and binding on all parties to the dispute. The decision shall be issued to the parties by the arbitrator, and a copy shall be filed with the BMS.

Subd. 6. Extension of Time Limits: The parties, by mutual written agreement, may waive any step and extend any time limits in this grievance procedure.

Subd. 7. Employee Participation: Employees shall not lose wages due to their necessary participation in grievance hearing held locally during the working hours. No reprisals of any kind will be taken by the School District against any employee because of his/her participation in this grievance procedure.

ARTICLE XIV: Miscellaneous

SECTION 1. Boiler License Fee: The School District shall pay the cost of a boiler license fee when the

School District requires the custodian to maintain a boiler license as a requirement for his or her job. A custodian who is hired without the qualification of possessing a “Special Class Boiler License” will obtain a Special Class boiler license within 30 workdays of employment and will obtain a “Second Class Boiler License” within 28-months. The School District shall pay only the actual cost of the boiler license fee. The district agrees to pay only once for training time, testing materials, testing time, and exam for each license level required.

SECTION 2. Para Pro Test: The School District shall pay the test fee for the Para Pro Test for currently employed paraprofessionals. The district will pay the fee only once for any paraprofessional. If the district becomes a Title I School Wide project, the School District shall pay the test fee for the Para Pro Test.

SECTION 3: Extra Trips

Subd. 1. POSTING: All extra trips sponsored by the School District shall be posted.

Subd. 2. SIGN-Up: Regular drivers who want to drive posted trips can sign up for posted trips.

Subd. 3. ASSIGNMENTS: The senior driver with the least accumulated trip hours shall have the trip. However, the transportation supervisor may reschedule the driver in the event that special circumstances arise. In the event no driver signs up by the deadline, the transportation supervisor has the authority to fill the trip by any means necessary.

ARTICLE XV: Extra Compensation

SECTION 1. 403(b)

Subd. 1. Eligibility. Pursuant to the provisions of M.S. 123B.02, Subd. 15 and Section 403(b) of the Federal Internal Revenue Code, the School District will make matching contributions for each employee.

Subd. 2. Amount of School District Contribution:

403(b) – Beginning January 1, 2019 members of the Minnesota Schools Employees Association Northland Community Schools Unit shall be eligible to participate in this plan and receive matching contributions from the District, according to the following schedule:

ARTICLE XVI: Duration

SECTION 1. Term and Reopening Negotiations: This Agreement shall remain in full force and effect for a period commencing on July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2020, and thereafter until modifications are made pursuant to the P.E.L.R.A. If either party desires to modify or amend this Agreement commencing at its expiration, it shall give written notice of such intent to the other party no later than 60 days prior to said expiration. Unless otherwise mutually agreed, the parties shall not commence negotiations more than 60 days prior to the expiration of this Agreement.

SECTION 2. Effect: This Agreement constitutes the full and complete Agreement between the School

District and the exclusive representative. The provisions of this Agreement relating to terms and conditions of employment supersede any and all prior agreements, resolutions, and practices, and School District policies, rules or regulations concerning terms and conditions of employment inconsistent with these provisions. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to obligate the School District to continue or discontinue existing or past practices or prohibit the School District from exercising all management rights and prerogatives, except insofar as this exercise would be in express violation of any term of this Agreement.

SECTION 3. Finality: Any matters relating to the terms and conditions of employment, whether or not referred to in this Agreement, shall not be open for negotiation during the term of this Agreement.

SECTION 4. Severability: The provisions of this Agreement shall be severable, and if any such provision or the application of any such provision under any circumstances is held invalid, it shall not affect any other provisions of this Agreement or the application of any such provisions thereof.

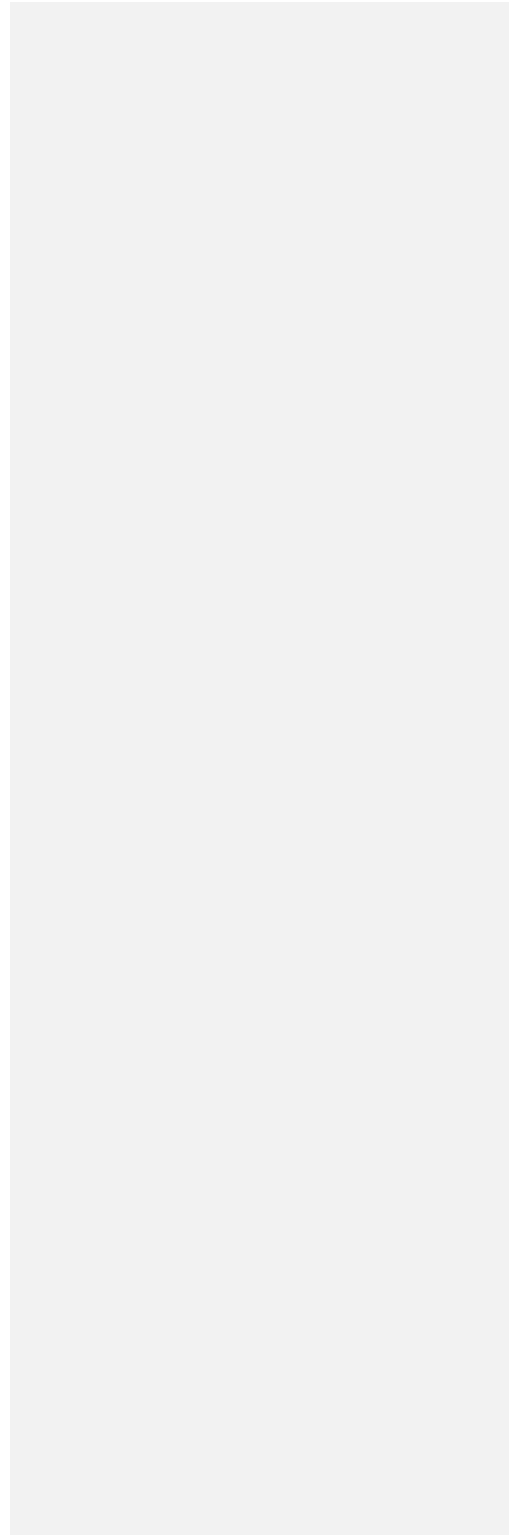

Memorandum of Understanding

It is agreed by both parties that a trial period of the contract language below will cease upon the completion of the 2024-2026 round of contract negotiations. It is the intent of both parties upon the completion of the trial period to add or amend the following language to be included in the next Bargaining Agreement.

Both parties agree that these additions/changes will apply to page 7 of the CBA. ARTICLE VI RATES OF PAY: Add Section 12. Extra Hours, Summer School, or After School Program Employment Opportunities; Seniority & Posting. The agreed upon language is as follows.

Section 12. Extra Hours, Summer School, or After School Program Employment Opportunities; Seniority & Posting.

Extra Hours, Summer School or after school program employment opportunities will first be offered, to qualified employees in order of seniority, to the qualified staff working at the building or work location during the regular school term for Summer School or regular day for after school programs. Positions not filled through this process will be offered first to those qualified staff who worked the Summer School or after school program opportunity the previous school year if that staff member exhibited success in working with the program. Any remaining unfilled positions will be posted and the program/building supervisor may exercise discretion in selection of staff.

If the District, due to a student's IEP and/or medical recommendation, requests the same paraprofessional for the summer school session as the student had for the regular school year, the District shall meet and confer with the Union field representative or local unit leadership. If the paraprofessional is willing to accept the summer assignment, the unit leadership shall have the authority to grant a waiver of the seniority provision for the summer session.

By signing below, each party acknowledges that it has read this agreement and that it voluntarily agrees to all terms of this agreement.

410 FAMILY AND MEDICAL LEAVE POLICY

[Note: School districts are required by statute to have a policy addressing these issues.]

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to provide for family and medical leave to school district employees in accordance with the Family and Medical Leave Act and also with parenting leave under state law.

II. GENERAL STATEMENT OF POLICY

The following procedures and policies regarding family and medical leave are adopted by the school district, pursuant to the requirements of the Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (FMLA) and consistent with the requirements of the Minnesota Parenting Leave laws.

III. DEFINITIONS

A. “Covered active duty” means: 1. in the case of a member of a regular component of the Armed Forces, duty during the deployment of the member with the Armed Forces to a foreign country; and 2. in the case of a member of a reserve component of the Armed Forces, duty during the deployment of the member with the Armed Forces to a foreign country under a call or order to active duty under a provision of law referred to in 10 U.S.C.—§United States Code, section 101(a)(13)(B).

B. “Covered servicemember” means: 1. a member of the Armed Forces, including a member of the National Guard or Reserves, who is undergoing medical treatment, recuperation, or therapy, is otherwise in outpatient status, or is otherwise on the temporary disability retired list, for a serious injury or illness; or 2. a covered veteran who is undergoing medical treatment, recuperation, or therapy for a serious injury or illness and who was a member of the Armed Forces, including a member of the National Guard or Reserves, and was discharged or released under conditions other than dishonorable, at any time during the period of five years preceding the first date the eligible employee takes FMLA leave to care for the covered veteran

- C. “Eligible employee” means an employee who has been employed by the school district for a total of at least 12 months and who has been employed for at least 1,250 hours of service during the 12-month period immediately preceding the commencement of the leave. An employee returning from fulfilling his or her Uniformed Services Employment and Reemployment Rights Act (USERRA)-covered service obligation shall be credited with the hours of service that would have been performed but for the period of absence from work due to or necessitated by USERRA-covered service. In determining whether the employee met the hours of service requirement, and to determine the hours that would have been worked during the period of absence from work due to or necessitated by USERRA-covered service, the employee’s pre-service work schedule can generally be used for calculations. While the 12 months of employment need not be consecutive, employment periods prior to a break in service of seven years or more may not be counted unless: 1) the break is occasioned by the employee’s fulfillment of his or her USERRA-covered service obligation; or 2) a written agreement, including a collective bargaining agreement, exists concerning the school district’s intention to rehire the employee after the break in service.
- D. “Military caregiver leave” means leave taken to care for a covered servicemember with a serious injury or illness.
- E. “Next of kin of a covered servicemember” means the nearest blood relative other than the covered servicemember’s spouse, parent, son, or daughter, in the following order of priority: blood relatives who have been granted legal custody of the covered servicemember by court decree or statutory provisions, brothers and sisters, grandparents, aunts and uncles, and first cousins, unless the covered servicemember has specifically designated in writing another blood relative as his or her nearest blood relative for purposes of military caregiver leave under the FMLA. When no such designation is made and there are multiple family members with the same level of relationship to the covered servicemember, all such family members shall be considered the covered servicemember’s next of kin, and the employee may take FMLA leave to provide care to the covered servicemember, either consecutively or simultaneously. When such designation has been made, the designated individual shall be deemed to be the covered servicemember’s only next of kin.
- F. “Outpatient status” means, with respect to a covered servicemember who is a current member of the Armed Forces, the status of a member of the Armed Forces assigned to:
1. a military medical treatment facility as an outpatient; or
 2. a unit established for the purpose of providing command and control of members of the Armed Forces receiving care as outpatients
- G. “Qualifying exigency” means a situation where the eligible employee seeks leave for one or more of the following reasons:

1. to address any issues that arise from a short-notice deployment (seven calendar days or less) of a covered military member;
2. to attend military events and related activities of a covered military member;
3. to address issues related to childcare and school activities of a covered military member's child;
4. to address financial and legal arrangements for a covered military member;
5. to attend counseling provided by someone other than a health care provider for oneself, a covered military member, or his/her child;
6. to spend up to fifteen calendar days with a covered military member who is on short-term, temporary rest and recuperation leave during a period of deployment;
7. to attend post-deployment activities related to a covered military member;
8. to address ~~parental~~ care needs of a covered military member's parent who is incapable of self care; and
9. to address other events related to a covered military member that both the employee and school district agree is a qualifying exigency.

H. "Serious health condition" means an illness, injury, impairment, or physical or mental condition that involves:

1. inpatient care in a hospital, hospice, or residential medical care facility; or
2. continuing treatment by a health care provider.

I. "Spouse" means a husband or wife. For purposes of this definition, husband or wife refers to the other person with whom an individual entered into marriage as defined or recognized under state law for purposes of marriage in the state in which the marriage was entered into or, in the case of a marriage entered into outside of any state, if the marriage is valid in the place where entered into and could have been entered into in at least one state. This definition includes an individual in a same-sex or common law marriage that either: (1) was entered into in a state that recognizes such marriages; or (2) if entered into outside of any state, is valid in the place where entered into and could have been entered into in at least one state.

J. "Veteran" has the meaning given in 38 U.S.C. §United States Code, section 101.

IV. LEAVE ENTITLEMENT

A. Twelve-week Leave

1. Eligible employees are entitled to a total of 12 work weeks of unpaid family or medical leave during the applicable 12-month period as defined below, plus any additional leave as required by law. Leave may be taken for one or more of the following reasons in accordance with applicable law:
 - a. birth of the employee's child and to care for such child;
 - b. placement of an adopted or foster child with the employee;
 - c. to care for the employee's spouse, son, daughter, or parent with a serious health condition;
 - d. the employee's serious health condition makes the employee unable to perform the functions of the employee's job; and/or
 - e. any qualifying exigency arising from the employee's spouse, son, daughter, or parent being on active duty, or notified of an impending call or order to active duty, in the reserve component of the Armed Forces or a retired member of the regular Armed Forces or reserve component in support of a contingency operation.
2. For the purposes of this policy, "year" is defined as a rolling 12-month period measured backward from the date an employee's leave is to commence.

[Note: An employer is permitted to choose any one of the following methods for determining the 12-month period in which the 12 weeks of FMLA leave entitlement occurs: (a) the calendar year; (b) any fixed 12-month leave year, such as a fiscal year, a year required by State law, or a year starting on an employee's anniversary date; (c) the 12-month period measured forward from the date any employee's first FMLA leave; or (d) a "rolling" 12-month period measured backward from the date an employee uses any FMLA leave. It is recommended, however, that school districts use the 12-month rolling measurement as it prevents employees from stacking 12-week leave entitlement that could occur if, for example, a calendar or fiscal year is utilized. Where a calendar, fiscal or similar period is used, an employee could use 12 weeks at the end of the period and then again at the beginning of the period, providing an entitlement to a leave of 24 consecutive weeks. If a school district changes its definition of a "year" in this policy, it must give employees notice of at least 60 days before implementing this change.]
3. An employee's entitlement to FMLA leave for the birth, adoption, or foster care of a child expires at the end of the 12-month period beginning on the date of the birth or placement.
4. A "serious health condition" typically requires either inpatient care or

continuing treatment by or under the supervision of a health care provider, as defined by applicable law. Family and medical leave generally is not intended to cover short-term conditions for which treatment and recovery are very brief.

A “serious injury or illness,” in the case of a member of the Armed Forces, including a member of the National Guard or Reserves, means:

- a. injury or illness that was incurred by the member in the line of duty on active duty in the Armed Forces or that existed before the beginning of the member’s active duty and was aggravated by service in the line of duty on active duty in the Armed Forces and that may render the member medically unfit to perform the duties of the member’s office, grade, rank, or rating; and
- b. in the case of a covered veteran who was a member of the Armed 410-5 Forces, including a member of the National Guard or Reserves, at any time, during the period of five years preceding the date on which the veteran undergoes the medical treatment, recuperation, or therapy, means a qualifying injury or illness that was incurred by the member in the line of duty on active duty in the Armed Forces or that existed before the beginning of the member’s active duty and was aggravated by service in the line of duty in the Armed Forces and that manifested itself before or after the member became a veteran, and is:
 - (1) a continuation of a serious injury or illness that was incurred or aggravated when the covered veteran was a member of the Armed Forces and rendered the servicemember unable to perform the duties of the servicemember’s office, grade, rank, or rating; or
 - (2) a physical or mental condition for which the covered veteran has received a U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs Service-Related Disability (VASRD) rating of 50 percent or greater and such VASRD rating is based, in whole or in part, on the condition precipitating the need for military caregiver leave; or
 - (3) a physical or mental condition that substantially impairs the covered veteran’s ability to secure or follow a substantially gainful occupation by reason of a disability or disabilities related to military service, or would do so absent treatment; or
 - (4) an injury, including a psychological injury, on the basis of which the covered veteran has been enrolled in the Department of Veterans Affairs Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers.

6. Eligible spouses employed by the school district are limited to an aggregate of 12 weeks of leave during any 12-month period for the birth and care of a newborn child or adoption of a child, the placement of a child for foster care, or to care for a parent. This limitation for spouses employed by the school district does not apply to leave taken: by one spouse to care for the other spouse who is seriously ill; to care for a child with a serious health condition; because of the employee’s own serious health condition; or pursuant to Paragraph IV.A.1.e. above.

7. Depending on the type of leave, intermittent or reduced schedule leave may be granted in the discretion of the school district or when medically necessary. However, part-time employees are only eligible for a pro-rata portion of leave to be used on an intermittent or reduced schedule basis,

based on their average hours worked per week. Where an intermittent or reduced schedule leave is foreseeable based on planned medical treatment, the school district may transfer the employee temporarily to an available alternative position for which the employee is qualified and which better accommodates recurring periods of leave than does the employee's regular position, and which has equivalent pay and benefits.

8. If an employee requests a leave for the serious health condition of the employee or the employee's spouse, child, or parent, the employee will be required to submit sufficient medical certification. In such a case, the employee must submit the medical certification within 15 days from the date of the request or as soon as practicable under the circumstances.
9. If the school district has reason to doubt the validity of a health care provider's certification, it may require a second opinion at the school district's expense. If the opinions of the first and second health care providers differ, the school district may require certification from a third health care provider at the school district's expense. An employee may also be required to present a certification from a health care provider indicating that the employee is able to return to work.
10. Requests for leave shall be made to the school district. When leave relates to an employee's spouse, son, daughter, or parent being on active duty, or notified of an impending call or order to active duty pursuant to Paragraph IV.A.1.e. above, and such leave is foreseeable, the employee shall provide reasonable and practical notice to the school district of the need for leave. For all other leaves, employees must give 30 days' written notice of a leave of absence where practicable. The failure to provide the required notice may result in a delay of the requested leave. Employees are expected to make a reasonable effort to schedule leaves resulting from planned medical treatment so as not to disrupt unduly the operations of the school district, subject to and in coordination with the health care provider.
11. The school district may require that a request for leave under Paragraph IV.A.1.e. above be supported by a copy of the covered military member's active duty orders or other documentation issued by the military indicating active duty or a call to active duty status in support of a contingency operation and the dates of active duty service. In addition, the school district may require the employee to provide sufficient certification supporting the qualifying exigency for which leave is requested.
12. During the period of a leave permitted under this policy, the school district will provide health insurance under its group health plan under the same conditions coverage would have been provided had the employee not taken the leave. The employee will be responsible for payment of the employee contribution to continue group health insurance coverage during the leave. An employee's failure to make necessary and timely

contributions may result in termination of coverage. An employee who does not return to work after the leave may, in some situations, be required to reimburse the school district for the cost of the health plan premiums paid by it.

13. The school district may request or require the employee to substitute accrued paid leave for any part of the 12-week period. Employees may be allowed to substitute paid leave for unpaid leave by meeting the requirements set out in the administrative directives and guidelines established for the implementation of this policy, if any. Employees eligible for leave must comply with the family and medical leave directives and guidelines prior to starting leave. It shall be the responsibility of the superintendent to develop directives and guidelines as necessary to implement this policy. Such directives and guidelines shall be submitted to the school board for annual review.

The school district shall comply with written notice requirements as set forth in federal regulations.

14. Employees returning from a leave permitted under this policy are eligible for reinstatement in the same or an equivalent position as provided by law. However, the employee has no greater right to reinstatement or to other benefits and conditions of employment than if the employee had been continuously employed during the leave.

B. Twelve-week Leave under State Law

An employee who does not qualify for parenting leave under Paragraphs IV.A.1.a. or IV.A.1.b. above may qualify for a 12-week unpaid leave which is available to a biological or adoptive parent in conjunction with the birth or adoption of a child, or to a female employee for prenatal care or incapacity due to pregnancy, childbirth, or related health conditions. The length of the leave shall be determined by the employee but must not exceed 12 weeks unless agreed to by the employerschool district. The employee may qualify if he or she has worked for the school district for at least 12 months and has worked an average number of hours per week equal to one-half of the full time equivalent during the 12-month period immediately preceding the leave. This leave is separate and exclusive of the family and medical leave described in the preceding paragraphs but may be reduced by any period of paid parental, disability, personal, or medical, or sick leave, or accrued vacation provided by the employer-school district so that the total leave does not exceed 12 weeks, unless agreed to by the employerschool district, or leave taken for the same purpose under the FMLA. The leave taken under this section shall begin at a time requested by the employee. An employee who plans to take leave under this section must give the employer-school district reasonable notice of the date the leave shall commence and the estimated duration of the leave. For leave taken by a biological or adoptive parent in conjunction with the birth or adoption of a child, the leave must begin within 12 months of the birth or adoption; except that, in the case where the child must remain in the hospital longer than the mother, the leave must begin within 12 months after the

child leaves the hospital

C. Twenty-six-week Servicemember Family Military Leave

1. An eligible employee who is the spouse, son, daughter, parent, or next of kin of a covered servicemember shall be entitled to a total of 26 work weeks of leave during a 12-month period to care for the servicemember. The leave described in this paragraph shall only be available during a single 12-month period. For purposes of this leave, the need to care for a servicemember includes both physical and psychological care.
2. During a single 12-month period, an employee shall be entitled to a combined total of 26 work weeks of leave under Paragraphs IV.A. and IV.C. above.
3. The 12-month period referred to in this section begins on the first day the eligible employee takes leave to care for a covered servicemember and ends 12 months after that date.
4. Eligible spouses employed by the school district are limited to an aggregate of 26 weeks of leave during any 12-month period if leave is taken for birth of the employee's child or to care for the child after birth; for placement of a child with the employee for adoption or foster care or to care for the child after placement; to care for the employee's parent with a serious health condition; or to care for a covered servicemember with a serious injury or illness.
5. The school district may request or require the employee to substitute accrued paid leave for any part of the 26-week period. Employees may be allowed to substitute paid leave for unpaid leave by meeting the requirements set out in the administrative directives and guidelines established for the implementation of this policy, if any. Employees eligible for leave must comply with the family and medical leave directives and guidelines prior to starting leave.
6. An employee will be required to submit sufficient medical certification issued by the health care provider of the covered servicemember and other information in support of requested leave and eligibility for such leave under this section within 15 days from the date of the request or as soon as practicable under the circumstances.
7. The provisions of Paragraphs IV.A.6., IV.A.9., IV.A.11., IV.A.12., and IV.A.13. above shall apply to leaves under this section.

V. SPECIAL RULES FOR INSTRUCTIONAL EMPLOYEES

- A. An instructional employee is one whose principal function is to teach and instruct

students in a class, a small group, or an individual setting. This includes, but is not limited to, teachers, coaches, driver's education instructors, and special education assistants.

B. Instructional employees who request foreseeable medically necessary intermittent or reduced work schedule leave greater than 20 percent of the work days in the leave period may be required to:

1. take leave for the entire period or periods of the planned medical treatment; or
2. move to an available alternative position for which the employee is qualified, and which provides equivalent pay and benefits, but not necessarily equivalent duties.

C. Instructional employees who request continuous leave near the end of a semester may be required to extend the leave through the end of the semester. The number of weeks remaining before the end of a semester does not include scheduled school breaks, such as summer, winter, or spring break.

1. If an instructional employee begins leave for any purpose more than five weeks before the end of a semester and it is likely the leave will last at least three weeks, the school district may require that the leave be continued until the end of the semester.

2. If the instructional employee begins leave for a purpose other than the employee's own serious health condition during the last five weeks of a semester, the school district may require that the leave be continued until the end of the semester if the leave will last more than two weeks or if the employee's return from leave would occur during the last two weeks of the semester.

3. If the instructional employee begins leave for a purpose other than the employee's own serious health condition during the last three weeks of the semester and the leave will last more than five working days, school district may require the employee to continue taking leave until the end of the semester.

4. If the school district requires an instructional employee to extend leave through the end of a semester as set forth in this paragraph, only the period of leave until the employee is ready and able to return to work shall be charged against the employee's FMLA leave entitlement. Any additional leave required by the school district to the end of the school term is not counted as FMLA leave but as an unpaid or paid leave, to the extent the instructional employee has accrued paid leave available and the school district shall maintain the employee's group health insurance and restore the employee to the same or equivalent job, including other benefits, at the conclusion of the leave.

- D. The entire period of leave taken under the special rules will be counted as leave. The school district will continue to fulfill the school district's leave responsibilities and obligations, including the obligation to continue the employee's health insurance and other benefits, if an instructional employee's leave entitlement ends before the involuntary leave period expires.

VI. OTHER

- A. The provisions of this policy are intended to comply with applicable law, including the FMLA and applicable regulations. Any terms used from the FMLA will have the same meaning as defined by the FMLA and/or applicable regulations. To the extent that this policy is ambiguous or contradicts applicable law, the language of the applicable law will prevail.
- B. The requirements stated in the collective bargaining agreement between employees in a certified collective bargaining unit and the school district regarding family and medical leaves (if any) shall be followed.

VII. DISSEMINATION OF POLICY

- A. ~~This policy~~ A poster prepared by the U.S. Department of Labor summarizing the major provisions of the Family and Medical Leave Act and informing employees how to file a complaint shall be conspicuously posted in each school district building in areas accessible to employees and applicants for employment.
- B. This policy will be reviewed at least annually for compliance with state and federal law.

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413 HARASSMENT AND VIOLENCE: Sexual, Racial and/or Religious

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to maintain a learning and working environment that is free from harassment and violence on the basis of race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, gender, age, marital status, familial status, status with regard to public assistance, sexual orientation, including gender identity or expression, or disability.

II. GENERAL STATEMENT OF POLICY

- A. The policy of the school district is to maintain a learning and working environment that is free from harassment and violence on the basis of race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, gender, age, marital status, familial status, status with regard to public assistance, sexual orientation, including gender identity or expression, or disability. The school district prohibits any form of harassment or violence on the basis of race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, gender, age, marital status, familial status, status with regard to public assistance, sexual orientation, including gender identity or expression, or disability.
- B. A violation of this policy occurs when any student, teacher, administrator, or other school district personnel harasses a student, teacher, administrator, or other school district personnel or group of students, teachers, administrators, or other school district personnel through conduct or communication based on a person's race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, age, marital status, familial status, status with regard to public assistance, sexual orientation, including gender identity or expression or disability, as defined by this policy. (For purposes of this policy, school district personnel includes school board members, school employees, agents, volunteers, contractors, or persons subject to the supervision and control of the district.)
- C. A violation of this policy occurs when any student, teacher, administrator, or other school district personnel inflicts, threatens to inflict, or attempts to inflict violence upon any student, teacher, administrator, or other school district personnel or group of students, teachers, administrators, or other school district personnel based on a person's race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, age, marital status, familial status, status with regard to public assistance, sexual orientation, including gender identity or expression, or disability.
- D. The school district will act to investigate all complaints, either formal or informal, verbal or written, of religious, racial or sexual harassment or violence, and to discipline or take appropriate action against any student, teacher, administrator or other school district personnel who is found to have violated this policy.

III. DEFINITIONS

- A. "Assault" is:

1. an act done with intent to cause fear in another of immediate bodily harm or death;
 2. the intentional infliction of or attempt to inflict bodily harm upon another; or
 3. the threat to do bodily harm to another with present ability to carry out the threat.
- B. “Harassment” prohibited by this policy consists of physical or verbal conduct, including, but not limited to, electronic communications, relating to an individual’s or group of individuals’ race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, age, marital status, familial status, status with regard to public assistance, sexual orientation, including gender identity or expression, or disability when the conduct:
1. has the purpose or effect of creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive working or academic environment;
 2. has the purpose or effect of substantially or unreasonably interfering with an individual’s work or academic performance; or
 3. otherwise adversely affects an individual’s employment or academic opportunities.
- C. “Immediately” means as soon as possible but in no event longer than 24 hours.
- D. Protected Classifications; Definitions
1. “Disability” means , with respect to an individual who
 - a. has a physical, sensory, or mental impairment that materially limits one or more major life activities of such individual;
 - b. has a record of such an impairment; or
 - c. is regarded as having such an impairment.
 2. “Familial status” means the condition of one or more minors being domiciled with:
 - a. their parent or parents or the minor’s legal guardian; or
 - b. the designee of the parent or parents or guardian with the written permission of the parent or parents or guardian. The protections afforded against harassment on the basis of family status apply to any person who is pregnant or is in the process of securing legal custody of an individual who has not attained the age of majority.
 3. “Marital status” means whether a person is single, married, remarried, divorced, separated, or a surviving spouse and, in employment cases, includes protection against harassment on the basis of the identity, situation, actions, or beliefs of a spouse or former spouse.
 4. “National origin” means the place of birth of an individual or of any of the individual’s lineal ancestors.

5. “Sex” includes, but is not limited to, pregnancy, childbirth, and disabilities related to pregnancy or childbirth.
 6. “Sexual orientation” means having or being perceived as having an emotional, physical, or sexual attachment to another person without regard to the sex of that person or having or being perceived as having an orientation for such attachment, or having or being perceived as having a self-image or identity not traditionally associated with one’s biological maleness or femaleness. “Sexual orientation” does not include a physical or sexual attachment to children by an adult.
 7. “Status with regard to public assistance” means the condition of being a recipient of federal, state, or local assistance, including medical assistance, or of being a tenant receiving federal, state, or local subsidies, including rental assistance or rent supplements.
- E. “Remedial response” means a measure to stop and correct acts of harassment or violence, prevent acts of harassment or violence from recurring, and protect, support, and intervene on behalf of a student who is the target or victim of acts of harassment or violence.
- F. Sexual Harassment; Definition
1. Sexual harassment consists of unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, sexually motivated physical conduct or other verbal or physical conduct or communication of a sexual nature when:
 - a. submission to that conduct or communication is made a term or condition, either explicitly or implicitly, of obtaining employment or an education; or
 - b. submission to or rejection of that conduct or communication by an individual is used as a factor in decisions affecting that individual’s employment or education; or
 - c. that conduct or communication has the purpose or effect of substantially or unreasonably interfering with an individual’s employment or education, or creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive employment or educational environment.
 2. Sexual harassment may include, but is not limited to:
 - a. unwelcome verbal harassment or abuse;
 - b. unwelcome pressure for sexual activity;
 - c. unwelcome, sexually motivated, or inappropriate patting, pinching, or physical contact, other than necessary restraint of student(s) by teachers, administrators, or other school district personnel to avoid physical harm to persons or property;
 - d. unwelcome sexual behavior or words, including demands for sexual favors, accompanied by implied or overt threats concerning an individual’s employment or educational status;

- e. unwelcome sexual behavior or words, including demands for sexual favors, accompanied by implied or overt promises of preferential treatment with regard to an individual's employment or educational status; or
- f. unwelcome behavior or words directed at an individual because of sexual orientation, including gender identity or expression.

G. Sexual Violence; Definition

- 1. Sexual violence is a physical act of aggression or force or the threat thereof which involves the touching of another's intimate parts, or forcing a person to touch any person's intimate parts. Intimate parts, as defined in Minn. Stat. § 609.341, includes the primary genital area, groin, inner thigh, buttocks, or breast, as well as the clothing covering these areas.
- 2. Sexual violence may include, but is not limited to:
 - a. touching, patting, grabbing, or pinching another person's intimate parts, whether that person is of the same sex or the opposite sex;
 - b. coercing, forcing, or attempting to coerce or force the touching of anyone's intimate parts;
 - c. coercing, forcing, or attempting to coerce or force sexual intercourse or a sexual act on another; or
 - d. threatening to force or coerce sexual acts, including the touching of intimate parts or intercourse, on another.

H. Violence: Definition

Violence prohibited by this policy is a physical act of aggression or assault upon another or group of individuals because of, or in a manner reasonably related to, race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, age, marital status, familial status, status with regard to public assistance, sexual orientation, including gender identity or expression, or disability.

IV. REPORTING PROCEDURES

- A. Any person who believes he or she has been the target or victim of harassment or violence on the basis of race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, age, marital status, familial status, status with regard to public assistance, sexual orientation, including gender identity or expression, or disability by a student, teacher, administrator or other school district personnel, or any person with knowledge or belief of conduct which may constitute harassment or violence prohibited by this policy toward a student, teacher, administrator or other school district personnel or group of students, teachers, administrators, or other school district personnel should report the alleged acts immediately to an appropriate school district official designated by this policy. A person may report conduct that may constitute harassment or violence anonymously. However, the school

district may not rely solely on an anonymous report to determine discipline or other remedial responses.

- B. The school district encourages the reporting party or complainant to use the report form available from the principal or building supervisor of each building or available from the school district office, but oral reports shall be considered complaints as well.
- C. Nothing in this policy shall prevent any person from reporting harassment or violence directly to a school district human rights officer or to the superintendent. If the complaint involves the building report taker, the complaint shall be made or filed directly with the superintendent or the school district human rights officer by the reporting party or complainant.
- D. In Each School Building. The building principal is the person responsible for receiving oral or written reports of religious, racial or sexual harassment or violence at the building level. Any adult school district personnel who receives a report of religious, racial or sexual harassment or violence shall inform the building principal immediately.
- E. A teacher, school administrator, volunteer, contractor, or other school employee shall be particularly alert to possible situations, circumstances, or events that might include acts of harassment or violence. Any such person who witnesses, observes, receives a report of, or has other knowledge or belief of conduct that may constitute harassment or violence shall make reasonable efforts to address and resolve the harassment or violence and shall inform the building report takers immediately. School district personnel who fail to inform the building report taker of conduct that may constitute harassment or violence or who fail to make reasonable efforts to address and resolve the harassment or violence in a timely manner may be subject to disciplinary action.
- F. Upon receipt of a report, the principal must notify the school district human rights officer immediately, without screening or investigating the report. The principal may request, but may not insist upon a written complaint. A written statement of the facts alleged will be forwarded as soon as practicable by the principal to the human rights officer. If the report was given verbally, the principal shall personally reduce it to written form within 24 hours and forward it to the human rights officer. Failure to forward any harassment or violence report or complaint as provided herein will result in disciplinary action against the principal. If the complaint involves the building principal, the complaint shall be made or filed directly with the superintendent or the school district human rights officer by the reporting party or complainant.
- G. In the District. The school board hereby designates the Principal as the school district human rights officer(s) to receive reports or complaints of religious, racial or sexual harassment or violence. If the complaint involves a human rights officer, the complaint shall be filed directly with the Superintendent.
- H. The school district shall conspicuously post the name of the human rights officer(s), including mailing addresses and telephone numbers.
- I. Submission of a good faith complaint or report of harassment or violence prohibited by the policy will not affect the complainant or reporter's future employment, grades or educational or work assignments.
- J. Use of formal reporting forms is not mandatory.

- L. The school district will respect the privacy of the complainant, the individual(s) against whom the complaint is filed, and the witnesses as much as possible, consistent with the school district's legal obligations to investigate, to take appropriate action, and to conform with any discovery or disclosure obligations.
- M. Retaliation against a victim, good faith reporter, or a witness of violence or harassment is prohibited.
- N. False accusations or reports of violence or harassment against another person are prohibited.
- O. A person who engages in an act of violence or harassment, reprisal, retaliation, or false reporting of violence or harassment, or permits, condones, or tolerates violence or harassment shall be subject to discipline or other remedial responses for that act in accordance with the school district's policies and procedures.

Consequences for students who commit, or are a party to, prohibited acts of violence or harassment or who engage in reprisal or intentional false reporting may range from remedial responses or positive behavioral interventions up to and including suspension and/or expulsion.

Consequences for employees who permit, condone, or tolerate violence or harassment or engage in an act of reprisal or intentional false reporting of violence or harassment may result in disciplinary action up to and including termination or discharge.

Consequences for other individuals engaging in prohibited acts of violence or harassment may include, but not be limited to, exclusion from school district property and events and/or termination of services and/or contracts.

V. INVESTIGATION

- A. By authority of the school district, the human rights officer, within three (3) days of the receipt of a report or complaint alleging religious, racial or sexual harassment or violence, shall undertake or authorize an investigation. The investigation may be conducted by school district officials or by a third party designated by the school district.
- B. The investigation may consist of personal interviews with the complainant, the individual(s) against whom the complaint is filed, and others who may have knowledge of the alleged incident(s) or circumstances giving rise to the complaint. The investigation may also consist of any other methods and documents deemed pertinent by the investigator.
- C. In determining whether alleged conduct constitutes a violation of this policy, the school district should consider the surrounding circumstances, the nature of the behavior, past incidents or past or continuing patterns of behavior, the relationships between the parties involved and the context in which the alleged incidents occurred. Whether a particular action or incident constitutes a violation of this policy requires a determination based on all the facts and surrounding circumstances.
- D. In addition, the school district may take immediate steps, at its discretion, to protect the target or victim, the complainant, students, teachers, administrators or other school district personnel pending completion of an investigation of alleged religious, racial or sexual harassment or violence.

- E. The alleged perpetrator of the act(s) of harassment or violence shall be allowed the opportunity to present a defense during the investigation or prior to the imposition of discipline or other remedial responses.
- F. The investigation will be completed as soon as practicable. The school district human rights officer shall make a written report to the superintendent upon completion of the investigation. If the complaint involves the superintendent, the report may be filed directly with the school board. The report shall include a determination of whether the allegations have been substantiated as factual and whether they appear to be violations of this policy.

VI. SCHOOL DISTRICT ACTION

- A. Upon completion of an investigation that determines a violation of this policy has occurred, the school district will take appropriate action. Such action may include, but is not limited to, warning, suspension, exclusion, expulsion, transfer, remediation, termination or discharge. Disciplinary consequences will be sufficiently severe to try to deter violations and to appropriately discipline prohibited behavior. School district action taken for violation of this policy will be consistent with requirements of applicable collective bargaining agreements, Minnesota and federal law, and applicable school district policies and regulations.
- B. The school district is not authorized to disclose to a victim private educational or personnel data regarding an alleged perpetrator who is a student or employee of the school district. School officials will notify the targets or victims and alleged perpetrators of harassment or violence, the parent(s) or guardian(s) of targets or victims of harassment or violence and the parent(s) or guardian(s) of alleged perpetrators of harassment or violence who have been involved in a reported and confirmed harassment or violence incident of the remedial or disciplinary action taken, to the extent permitted by law.
- C. In order to prevent or respond to acts of harassment or violence committed by or directed against a child with a disability, the school district shall, where determined appropriate by the child's individualized education program (IEP) or Section 504 team, allow the child's IEP or Section 504 plan to be drafted to address the skills and proficiencies the child needs as a result of the child's disability to allow the child to respond to or not to engage in acts of harassment or violence.

VII. RETALIATION OR REPRISAL

The school district will discipline or take appropriate action against any student, teacher, administrator or other school district personnel who retaliates against any person who commits and act of reprisal or who retaliates against any person who asserts, alleges, or makes a good faith report of alleged harassment or violence prohibited by this policy, who testifies, assists or participates in an investigation of retaliation of alleged harassment or violence, or who testifies, assists or participates in a proceeding or hearing relating to such harassment or violence. Retaliation includes, but is not limited to, any form of intimidation, reprisal or harassment. Disciplinary consequences will be sufficiently severe to deter violations and to appropriately discipline the individual(s) who engaged in the harassment or violence. Remedial responses to the harassment or violence shall be tailored to the particular incident and nature of the conduct.

VIII. RIGHT TO ALTERNATIVE COMPLAINT PROCEDURES

These procedures do not deny the right of any individual to pursue other avenues of recourse which may include filing charges with the Minnesota Department of Human Rights, or another state or federal agency, initiating civil action or seeking redress under state criminal statutes and/or federal law.

IX. HARASSMENT OR VIOLENCE AS ABUSE

- A. Under certain circumstances, alleged harassment or violence may also be possible abuse under Minnesota law. If so, the duties of mandatory reporting under Minnesota Statute Chapter 260E may be applicable.
- B. Nothing in this policy will prohibit the school district from taking immediate action to protect victims of alleged harassment, violence or abuse.

X. DISSEMINATION OF POLICY AND TRAINING

- A. This policy shall be conspicuously posted throughout each school building in areas accessible to students and staff members.
- B. This policy shall be given to each school district employee and independent contractor who regularly interacts with students at the time of initial employment with the school district.
- C. This policy shall appear in the student handbook.
- D. The school district will develop a method of discussing this policy with students and employees.
- E. The school district may implement violence prevention and character development education programs to prevent and reduce policy violations. Such programs may offer instruction on character education including, but not limited to, character qualities such as attentiveness, truthfulness, respect for authority, diligence, gratefulness, self-discipline, patience, forgiveness, respect for others, peacemaking, resourcefulness, and/or sexual abuse prevention.
- F. This policy shall be reviewed at least annually for compliance with state and federal law.

414 MANDATED REPORTING OF CHILD NEGLECT OR PHYSICAL OR SEXUAL ABUSE

[Note: This policy reflects the mandatory law regarding reporting of maltreatment of minors and is not discretionary in nature.]

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to make clear the statutory requirements of school personnel to report suspected child neglect or physical or sexual abuse.

II. GENERAL STATEMENT OF POLICY

- A. The policy of the school district is to fully comply with Minn. Stat. ~~§ 626.556~~Ch. 260E requiring school personnel to report suspected child neglect or physical or sexual abuse.
- B. A violation of this policy occurs when any school personnel fails to immediately report instances of child neglect, or physical or sexual abuse when the school personnel knows or has reason to believe a child is being neglected or physically or sexually abused or has been neglected or physically or sexually abused within the preceding three years.

III. DEFINITIONS

- A. “Accidental” means a sudden, not reasonably foreseeable, and unexpected occurrence or event ~~which~~that:
 - 1. is not likely to occur and could not have been prevented by exercise of due care; and
 - 2. if occurring while a child is receiving services from a facility, happens when the facility and the employee or person providing services in the facility are in compliance with the laws and rules relevant to the occurrence of event.
- B. “Child” means one under age 18 and, for purposes of Minn. Stat. Ch. 260C [~~Child Juvenile Safety and Placement~~Protection] and Minn. Stat. Ch 260D (Child in Voluntary Foster care for Treatment), includes an individual under age 21 who is in foster care pursuant to Minn. Stat 260C.451 (Foster Care benefits Past Age 18)..
- C. “Immediately” means as soon as possible but in no event longer than 24 hours.

D. “Mandated reporter” means any school personnel who knows or has reason to believe a child is being ~~neglected or physically or sexually abused~~maltreated, or has been neglected or physically or sexually abused within the preceding three years.

~~E.~~ “Mental injury” means an injury to the psychological capacity or emotional stability of a child as evidenced by an observable or substantial impairment in the child’s ability to function within a normal range of performance and behavior with due regard to the child’s culture.

~~F.~~ “Neglect” means the commission or omission of any of the acts specified below, other than by accidental means:

1. failure by a person responsible for a child’s care to supply a child with necessary food, clothing, shelter, health care, medical ~~care~~, or other care required for the child’s physical or mental health when reasonably able to do so; ~~including a growth delay, which may be referred to as a failure to thrive, that has been diagnosed by a physician and is due to parental neglect;~~
2. failure to protect a child from conditions or actions that seriously endanger the child’s physical or mental health when reasonably able to do so, including a growth delay, which may be referred to as a failure to thrive, that has been diagnosed by a physician and is due to parental neglect;
3. failure to provide for necessary supervision or child care arrangements appropriate for a child after considering factors such as the child’s age, mental ability, physical condition, length of absence, or environment, when the child is unable to care for ~~his or her~~the child’s own basic needs or safety or the basic needs or safety of another child in his or her care;
4. failure to ensure that a child is educated in accordance with state law, which does not include a parent’s refusal to provide his or her child with sympathomimetic medications;
5. prenatal exposure to a controlled substance as defined by state law used by the mother for a nonmedical purpose, as evidenced by withdrawal symptoms in the child at birth, results of a toxicology test performed on the mother at delivery or the child’s birth, or medical effects or developmental delays during the child’s first year of life that medically indicate prenatal exposure to a controlled substance or the presence of a fetal alcohol spectrum disorder;
6. medical neglect as defined by Minn. Stat. § 260C.007, Subd. 6, Clause (5);
7. chronic and severe use of alcohol or a controlled substance by a ~~parent or~~ person responsible for the care of the child that adversely affects the child’s basic needs and safety; or

8. emotional harm from a pattern of behavior ~~which~~that contributes to impaired emotional functioning of the child which may be demonstrated by a substantial and observable effect in the child's behavior, emotional response, or cognition that is not within the normal range for the child's age and stage of development, with due regard to the child's culture.

Neglect does not include ~~does not occur solely because the child's parent, guardian, or other person responsible for the child's care in good faith selects and depends upon spiritual means or prayer for treatment or care of disease or remedial care of the child in lieu of medical care. spiritual means or prayer for treatment or care of disease where the person responsible for the child's care in good faith has selected and depended on those means for treatment or care of disease, except where the lack of medical care may cause serious danger to the child's health.~~

GF. "Nonmaltreatment mistake" ~~means~~occurs when: (1) at the time of the incident, the individual was performing duties identified in the center's child care program plan required under Minn. Rules Part 9503.0045; (2) the individual has not been determined responsible for a similar incident that resulted in a finding of maltreatment for at least seven years; (3) the individual has not been determined to have committed a similar nonmaltreatment mistake under this paragraph for at least four years; (4) any injury to a child resulting from the incident, if treated, is treated only with remedies that are available over the counter, whether ordered by a medical professional or not; and (5) except for the period when the incident occurred, the facility and the individual providing services were both in compliance with all licensing requirements relevant to the incident. This definition only applies to child care centers licensed under Minn. Rules Ch. 9503.

H. ~~"Person responsible for the child's care" means (1) an individual functioning within the family unit and having responsibilities for the care of the child such as a parent, guardian, or other person having similar care responsibilities, or (2) an individual functioning outside the family unit and having responsibilities for the care of the child such as a teacher, school administrator, other school employee or agent, or other lawful custodian of a child having either full-time or short-term care responsibilities including, but not limited to, day care, babysitting whether paid or unpaid, counseling, teaching, and coaching.~~

IG. "Physical abuse" means any physical injury, mental injury (under subdivision 13), or threatened injury (under subdivision 23), inflicted by a person responsible for the child's care on a child other than by accidental means; or any physical or mental injury that cannot reasonably be explained by the child's history of injuries or any aversive or deprivation procedures, or regulated interventions, that have not been authorized by Minn. Stat. § 121A.67 or § 245.825.

Abuse does not include reasonable and moderate physical discipline of a child administered by a parent or legal guardian ~~which~~that does not result in an injury. Abuse does not include the use of reasonable force by a teacher, principal, or school employee as allowed by Minn. Stat. § 121A.582.

Actions ~~which~~that are not reasonable and moderate include, but are not limited to, any of the following that are done in anger or without regard to the safety of the child: (1) throwing, kicking, burning, biting, or cutting a child; (2) striking a child with a closed fist; (3) shaking a child under age three; (4) striking or other actions ~~which~~that result in any nonaccidental injury to a child under 18 months of age; (5) unreasonable interference with a child's breathing; (6) threatening a child with a weapon, as defined in Minn. Stat. § 609.02, Subd. 6; (7) striking a child under age one on the face or head; ~~(8) striking a child who is at least age one but under age four on the face or head, which results in an injury;~~ (9) purposely giving a child poison, alcohol, or dangerous, harmful, or controlled substances ~~which~~that were not prescribed for the child by a practitioner, in order to control or punish the child, or ~~giving the child~~ other substances that substantially affect the child's behavior, motor coordination, or judgment or that result in sickness or internal injury, or that subject the child to medical procedures that would be unnecessary if the child were not exposed to the substances; (9) unreasonable physical confinement or restraint not permitted under Minn. Stat. § 609.379 including, but not limited to, tying, caging, or chaining; or (10) in a school facility or school zone, an act by a person responsible for the child's care that is a violation under Minn. Stat. § 121A.58.

“Report” means any communication received by the local welfare agency, police department, county sheriff, or agency responsible for child protection pursuant to

this section that describes ~~neglect or physical or sexual abuse~~maltreatment of a child and contains sufficient content to identify the child and any person believed to be responsible for the ~~neglect or abuse~~maltreatment, if known.

~~K.~~ “School personnel” means professional employee or professional’s delegate of the school district who provides health, educational, social, psychological, law enforcement, or child care services.

~~L.~~ “Sexual abuse” means the subjection of a child by a person responsible for the child’s care, by a person who has a significant relationship to the child (as defined in Minn. Stat. § 609.341, Subd. 15), or by a person in a current or recent position of authority (as defined in Minn. ~~L.~~ “Person responsible for the child’s care” means ~~(1) an individual functioning within the family unit and having responsibilities for the care of the child such as a parent, guardian, or other person having similar care responsibilities, or (2) an individual functioning outside the family unit and having responsibilities for the care of the child such as a teacher, school administrator, other school employees or agents, or other lawful custodian of a child having either full-time or short-term care responsibilities including, but not limited to, day care, babysitting whether paid or unpaid, counseling, teaching, and coaching.~~

IV. REPORTING PROCEDURES

- A. A mandated reporter ~~as defined herein~~ shall immediately report the ~~neglect or physical or sexual abuse, which he or she knows or has reason to believe is happening or has happened within the preceding three years~~ information to the local welfare agency, agency responsible for assessing or investigating the report, police department, county sheriff, ~~or agency responsible for assisting or investigating maltreatment.~~ tribal police department. This reporter will include his or her name and address in the report.
- B. ~~If the immediate report has been made orally, by telephone or otherwise,~~ The the oral report shall be followed by a written report within 72 hours (exclusive of weekends and holidays) to the appropriate police department, the county sheriff, local welfare agency, or agency responsible for assisting or investigating ~~maltreatment~~ the report. ~~The written~~ Any report shall be of sufficient content to identify the child, any person believed to be responsible for the ~~abuse or neglect~~ maltreatment of the child if the person is known, the nature and extent of the ~~abuse or neglect~~ maltreatment and the name and address of the reporter.
- C. Regardless of whether a report is made, as soon as practicable after a school receives information regarding an incident that may constitute maltreatment of a child in a school facility, the school shall inform the parent, legal guardian, or custodian of the child that an incident has occurred that may constitute maltreatment of the child, when the incident occurred, and the nature of the conduct that may constitute maltreatment.
- D. A mandated reporter who knows or has reason to know of the deprivation of parental rights or the kidnapping of a child shall report the information to the local police department or the county sheriff.
- E. With the exception of a health care professional or a social service professional who is providing the woman with prenatal care or other health care services, a mandated reporter shall immediately report to the local welfare agency if the person knows or has reason to believe that a woman is pregnant and has used a controlled substance for a nonmedical purpose during the pregnancy, including, but not limited to, tetrahydrocannabinol, or has consumed alcoholic beverages during the pregnancy in any way that is habitual or excessive.
- F. A person mandated by Minnesota law and this policy to report who fails to report may be subject to criminal penalties and/or discipline, up to and including

termination of employment.

- ~~G. An employer of a mandated reporter shall not retaliate against the person for reporting in good faith maltreatment against a child with respect to whom a report is made, because of the report.~~
- ~~G. Submission of a good faith report under Minnesota law and this policy will not adversely affect the reporter's employment, or the child's access to school.~~
- H. Any person who knowingly or recklessly makes a false report under the provisions of applicable Minnesota law or this policy shall be liable in a civil suit for any actual damages suffered by the person or persons so reported and for any punitive damages set by the court or jury, plus costs and reasonable attorney fees. ~~Knowingly or recklessly and the reckless-making of a false report also~~ may result in discipline. ~~The court may also award attorney's fees.~~

[Note: The Minnesota Department of Education (MDE) is responsible for assessing or investigating allegations of child maltreatment in schools. Although a report may be made to any of the agencies listed in Section IV. A., above, and there is no requirement to file more than one report, if the initial report is not made to MDE, it would be helpful to MDE if schools also report to MDE.]

V. INVESTIGATION

- A. The responsibility for assessing or investigating reports of suspected ~~neglect or physical or sexual abuse~~maltreatment rests with the appropriate state, county, state, or local agency or agencies. The agency responsible for assessing or investigating reports of ~~child~~maltreatment has the authority to interview the child, the person or persons responsible for the child's care, the alleged ~~perpetrator/offender,~~ and any other person with knowledge of the ~~abuse or neglect~~maltreatment for the purpose of gathering ~~the~~ facts, assessing safety and risk to the child, and formulating a plan. The investigating agency may interview the child at school. The interview may take place outside the presence of the alleged offender or parent, legal guardian or school official. The investigating agency, not the school, is responsible for either notifying or withholding notification of the interview to the parent, guardian or person responsible for the child's care. School officials may not disclose to the parent, legal custodian, or guardian the contents of the notification or any other related information regarding the interview until notified in writing by the local welfare or law enforcement agency that the investigation or assessment has been concluded.
- B. When the investigating agency determines that an interview should take place on school property, written notification of intent to interview the child on school property ~~will~~must be received by school officials prior to the interview. The notification shall include the name of the child to be interviewed, the purpose of the interview, and a reference to the statutory authority to conduct an interview on school property.

- C. Except where the alleged ~~perpetrator-offender~~ is believed to be a school official or employee, the time and place, and manner of the interview on school premises shall be within the discretion of school officials, but the local welfare or law enforcement agency shall have the exclusive authority to determine who may attend the interview. The conditions as to time, place, and manner of the interview set by the school officials shall be reasonable and the interview shall be conducted not more than 24 hours after the receipt of the notification unless another time is considered necessary by agreement between the school officials and the local welfare or law enforcement agency. Every effort must be made to reduce the disruption of the educational program of the child, other students, or school employees when an interview is conducted on school premises.
- D. Where the alleged ~~perpetrator-offender~~ is believed to be a school official or employee, the school district shall conduct its own investigation independent of MDE and, if involved, the local welfare or law enforcement agency.
- E. Upon request by MDE, the school district shall provide all requested data that are relevant to a report of maltreatment and are in the possession of a school facility, pursuant to an assessment or investigation of a maltreatment report of a student in school. The school district shall provide the requested data in accordance with the requirements of the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minn. Stat. Ch. 13, and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, 20 U.S.C. § 1232g.

VI. MAINTENANCE OF SCHOOL RECORDS CONCERNING ABUSE OR POTENTIAL ABUSE

- A. When a local welfare or local law enforcement agency determines that a potentially abused or abused child should be interviewed on school property, written notification of the agency's intent to interview on school property must be received by school officials prior to the interview. The notification shall include the name of the child to be interviewed, the purpose of the interview, and a reference to the statutory authority to conduct the interview. The notification shall be private data. School officials may not disclose to the parent, legal custodian, or guardian the contents of the notice or any other related information regarding the interview until notified in writing by the local welfare or law enforcement agency that the investigation has been concluded.
- B. All records regarding a report of maltreatment, including any notification of intent to interview which was received by the school as described above in Paragraph A., shall be destroyed by the school only when ordered by the agency conducting the investigation or by a court of competent jurisdiction.

VII. PHYSICAL OR SEXUAL ABUSE AS SEXUAL HARASSMENT OR VIOLENCE

Under certain circumstances, alleged physical or sexual abuse may also be sexual harassment or violence under Minnesota law. If so, the duties relating to the reporting and investigation of such harassment or violence may be applicable.

VIII. DISSEMINATION OF POLICY AND TRAINING

- A. This policy shall appear in school personnel handbooks.
- B. The school district will develop a method of discussing this policy with school personnel.
- C. This policy shall be reviewed at least annually for compliance with state law.

415 MANDATED REPORTING OF MALTREATMENT OF VULNERABLE ADULTS

[Note: This policy reflects the mandatory law regarding reporting maltreatment of vulnerable adults and is not discretionary in nature.]

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to make clear the statutory requirements of school personnel to report suspected maltreatment of vulnerable adults.

II. GENERAL STATEMENT OF POLICY

- A. It is the policy of the school district to fully comply with ~~Minnesota Statutes section~~ § 626.557 requiring school personnel to report suspected maltreatment of vulnerable adults.
- B. A violation of this policy occurs when any school personnel fails to report suspected maltreatment of vulnerable adults when the school personnel has reason to believe that a vulnerable adult is being or has been maltreated, or has knowledge that a vulnerable adult has sustained a physical injury which is not reasonably explained.

III. DEFINITIONS

A. "Abuse" means:

1. An act against a vulnerable adult that constitutes a violation of, an attempt to violate, or aiding and abetting a violation of: (1) assault in the first through fifth degrees as defined in Minnesota Statutes sections 609.221 to 609.224; (2) the use of drugs to injure or facilitate crime as defined in Minnesota Statutes section 609.235; (3) the solicitation, inducement, and promotion of prostitution as defined in Minnesota Statutes section 609.322; and (4) criminal sexual conduct in the first through fifth degrees as defined in Minnesota Statutes sections 609.342 to 609.3451. A violation includes any action that meets the elements of the crime, regardless of whether there is a criminal proceeding or conviction.
2. Conduct which is not an accident or therapeutic conduct as defined in Minnesota Statutes section 626.5572 which produces or could reasonably be expected to produce physical pain or injury or emotional distress including, but not limited to, the following: (1) hitting, slapping, kicking, pinching, biting, or corporal punishment of a vulnerable adult; (2) use of repeated or malicious oral, written, or gestured language toward a vulnerable adult or the treatment of a vulnerable adult which would be considered by a reasonable person to be

disparaging, derogatory, humiliating, harassing, or threatening; (3) use of any aversive or deprivation procedure, unreasonable confinement, or involuntary seclusion, including the forced separation of the vulnerable adult from other persons against the will of the vulnerable adult or the legal representative of the vulnerable adult; and (4) use of any aversive or deprivation procedures for persons with developmental disabilities or related conditions not authorized under Minnesota Statutes section 245.825.

3. Any sexual contact or penetration as defined in Minn. Stat. § 609.341 between a facility staff person or a person providing services in the facility and a resident, patient, or client of that facility.

4. The act of forcing, compelling, coercing, or enticing a vulnerable adult against the vulnerable adult's will to perform services for the advantage of another.

Abuse does not include actions specifically excluded by Minnesota Statutes section 626.5572, Subd. 2.

B. "Caregiver" means an individual or facility who has responsibility for the care of a vulnerable adult as a result of a family relationship, or who has assumed responsibility for all or a portion of the care of a vulnerable adult voluntarily, by contract, or by agreement.

C. "Common entry point" means the entity responsible for receiving reports of alleged or suspected maltreatment of a vulnerable adult and designated by the Commissioner of the Minnesota Department of Human Services as the MN Adult Abuse Reporting Center (MAARC).

D. "Financial Exploitation" means a breach of a fiduciary duty by an actor's unauthorized expenditure of funds entrusted to the actor for the benefit of the vulnerable adult or by an actor's failure to provide food, clothing, shelter, health care, therapeutic conduct or supervision, the failure of which results or is likely to result in detriment to the vulnerable adult. Financial exploitation also includes: the willful use, withholding or disposal of funds or property of a vulnerable adult; the obtaining of services for wrongful profit or advantage which results in detriment to the vulnerable adult; the acquisition of a vulnerable adult's funds or property through undue influence, harassment, duress, deception or fraud; and the use of force, coercion, or enticement to cause a vulnerable adult to perform services against the vulnerable adult's will for the profit or advantage of another.

E. "Immediately" means as soon as possible, but no longer than 24 hours from the time initial knowledge that the incident occurred has been received.

FA. "Mandated Reporters" means a professional or professional's delegate while engaged in education. ~~any school personnel who has reason to believe that a vulnerable adult is being or has been maltreated.~~

GB. "Maltreatment" means the neglect, abuse, or financial exploitation of a vulnerable adult.

HC. “Neglect” means the failure or omission by a caregiver to supply a vulnerable adult with care or services, including but not limited to, food, clothing, shelter, health care, or supervision which is: (1) reasonable and necessary to obtain or maintain the vulnerable adult’s physical or mental health or safety, considering the physical and mental capacity or dysfunction of the vulnerable adult; and (2) which is not the result of an accident or therapeutic conduct. Neglect also includes the absence or likelihood of absence of care or services, including but not limited to, food, clothing, shelter, health care, or supervision necessary to maintain the physical and mental health of the vulnerable adult which a reasonable person would deem essential to obtain or maintain the vulnerable adult’s health, safety, or comfort considering the physical or mental capacity or dysfunction of the vulnerable adult. Neglect does not include actions specifically excluded by Minn. Stat. § 626.5572, Subd. 17.

I. Neglect also means the absence or likelihood of absence of care or services, including but not limited to, food, clothing, shelter, health care, or supervision necessary to maintain the physical and mental health of the vulnerable adult which a reasonable person would deem essential to obtain or maintain the vulnerable adult’s health, safety, or comfort considering the physical or mental capacity or dysfunction of the vulnerable adult. Neglect does not include actions specifically excluded by Minnesota Statutes section 626.5572, Subd. 17.

~~D. “Abuse” means: (a) An act against a vulnerable adult that constitutes a violation of, an attempt to violate, or aiding and abetting a violation of: (1) assault in the first through fifth degrees as defined in sections 609.221 to 609.224; (2) the use of drugs to injure or facilitate crime as defined in section 609.235; (3) the solicitation, inducement, and promotion of prostitution as defined in section 609.322; and (4) criminal sexual conduct in the first through fifth degrees as defined in sections 609.342 to 609.3451. A violation includes any action that meets the elements of the crime, regardless of whether there is a criminal proceeding or conviction. Ch. 245A, except as excluded under Minn. Stat. § 626.5572, Subd. 21(a)(2); (3) receives services from a licensed home care provider or person or organization that offers, provides, or arranges for personal care assistance services under the medical assistance program; or (4) regardless of residence or whether any type of service received, possesses a physical or mental infirmity or other physical, mental or emotional dysfunction that impairs the individual's ability to adequately provide adequately for the person's individual's own care without assistance or supervision and, because of the dysfunction or infirmity and need for care or services, has an impaired ability to protect the individual's self from maltreatment.

~~G. "Caregiver" means an individual or facility who has responsibility for the care of a vulnerable adult as a result of a family relationship, or who has assumed responsibility for all or a portion of the care of a vulnerable adult voluntarily, by contract, or by agreement.~~

~~H. "School Personnel" means professional employees or their delegates of the school district engaged in providing health, educational, social, psychological, law enforcement or other caretaking services of vulnerable adults.~~

~~I. "Immediately" means as soon as possible, but no longer than 24 hours from the time initial knowledge that the incident occurred has been received.~~

IV. REPORTING PROCEDURES

- A. A mandated reporter as defined herein shall immediately report the suspected maltreatment to the ~~common entry point responsible local welfare agency, police department, county sheriff, or agency responsible~~ for receiving reports.
- B. Whenever a mandated reporter, as defined herein, knows or has reason to believe that an individual made an error in the provision of therapeutic conduct to a vulnerable adult which results in injury or harm, which reasonably requires the care of a physician, such information shall be reported immediately to the designated county agency. The mandated reporter also may report a belief that the error did not constitute neglect and why the error does not constitute neglect.
- C. The reporter shall to the extent possible identify the vulnerable adult, the caregiver, the nature and extent of the suspected maltreatment, any evidence of previous maltreatment, the name and address of the reporter, the time, date, and location of the incident and any other information that the reporter believes might be helpful in investigating the suspected abuse or neglect. A mandated reporter may disclose *not public data* as defined under Minn. Stat. § 13.02 to the extent necessary to comply with the above reporting requirements.
- D. A person mandated to report suspected maltreatment of a vulnerable adult who negligently or intentionally fails to report is liable for damages caused by the failure. A negligent or intentional failure to report may result in discipline. A mandatory reporter who intentionally fails to make a report, who knowingly provides false or misleading information in reporting or who intentionally fails to provide all the material circumstances surrounding the reported incident may be guilty of a misdemeanor.
- E. Retaliation against a person who makes a good faith report under Minnesota law and this policy, or against vulnerable adult who is named in a report is prohibited.
- F. Any person who intentionally makes a false report under the provisions of applicable Minnesota law or this policy shall be liable in a civil suit for any actual damages suffered by the person or persons so reported and for any punitive damages set by the court or jury. The intentional making of a false report may result in discipline.

V. INVESTIGATION

The responsibility for investigating reports of suspected maltreatment of a vulnerable adult rests with the entity designated by the county for receiving reports.

VI. DISSEMINATION OF POLICY AND TRAINING

- A. This policy ~~shall~~ should appear in school personnel handbooks ~~where as~~ appropriate.

514 PROHIBITION OF HARRASSMENT, INTIMIDATION AND BULLYING

I. PURPOSE

A safe and civil environment is needed for students to learn and attain high academic standards and to promote healthy human relationships. Harassment, intimidation and bullying, like other violent or disruptive behavior, is conduct that interferes with students' ability to learn and/or a teachers' ability to educate students in a safe environment. The school district cannot monitor the activities of students at all times and eliminate all incidents of harassment, intimidation and bullying between students, particularly when students are not under the direct supervision of school personnel. However, to the extent such conduct affects the educational environment of the school district and the rights and welfare of its students and is within the control of the school district in its normal operations, the school district intends to prevent harassment, intimidation and bullying and to take action to investigate, respond to, and to remediate and discipline for those acts of harassment, intimidation and bullying which have not been successfully prevented. The purpose of this policy is to assist the school district in its goal of preventing and responding to acts of bullying, intimidation, violence, reprisal, retaliation, and other similar disruptive behavior.

II. GENERAL STATEMENT OF POLICY

A. An act of harassment, intimidation and bullying, by either an individual student or a group of students, is expressly prohibited on school premises, on school district property, at school-related functions or activities, or on school transportation. This policy applies not only to students who directly engage in an act of harassment, intimidation and bullying but also to students who, by their indirect behavior, condone or support another student's act of harassment, intimidation and bullying. This policy also applies to any student whose conduct at any time or in any place constitutes bullying or other prohibited conduct that interferes with or obstructs the mission or operations of the school district or the safety or welfare of the student or other students, or materially and substantially interferes with a student's educational opportunities or performance or ability to participate in school functions or activities or receive school benefits, services, or privileges. This policy also applies to an act of cyberbullying regardless of whether such acts are committed on or off school district property and/or with or without the use of school district resources.

B. No teacher, administrator, volunteer, contractor, or other employee of the school district shall permit, condone, or tolerate harassment, intimidation or bullying

C. Apparent permission or consent by a student being harassed, intimidated or bullied does not lessen or negate the prohibitions contained in this policy.

D. Retaliation against a victim, good faith reporter, or a witness of harassment, intimidation or bullying is prohibited.

E. False accusations or reports of harassment, intimidation and bullying against another student are prohibited.

F. A person who engages in an act of bullying, reprisal, retaliation, or false reporting of bullying, or permits, condones, or tolerates bullying shall be subject to discipline or other remedial responses for that act in accordance with the school district's discipline policy (See policy 506). The school district may take into account the following factors:

1. The developmental ages and maturity levels of the parties involved;
2. The levels of harm, surrounding circumstances, and nature of the behavior;
3. Past incidences or past or continuing patterns of behavior;
4. The relationship between the parties involved; and
5. The context in which the alleged incidents occurred.

Consequences for students who commit prohibited acts of harassment, intimidation and bullying may range from remedial responses or positive behavioral interventions up to and including suspension and/or expulsion. The school district shall employ research-based developmentally appropriate best practices that include preventative and remedial measures and effective discipline for deterring violations of this policy, apply throughout the school district, and foster student, parent, and community participation.

Consequences for employees who permit, condone, or tolerate bullying or engage in an act of reprisal or intentional false reporting of bullying may result in disciplinary action up to and including termination or discharge. Consequences for other individuals engaging in prohibited acts of bullying may include, but not be limited to, exclusion from school district property and events.

G. The school district will act to investigate all complaints of bullying reported to the school district and will discipline or take appropriate action against any student, teacher, administrator, volunteer, contractor, or other employee of the school district who is found to have violated this policy.

III. DEFINITIONS

A. "Bullying" means intimidating, threatening, abusive, or harming conduct that is objectively offensive and:

1. an actual or perceived imbalance of power exists between the student engaged in the prohibited conduct and the target of the prohibited conduct, and the conduct is repeated or forms a pattern; or
2. materially and substantially interferes with a student's educational opportunities or performance or ability to participate in school functions or activities or receive school benefits, services, or privileges.

The term, “bullying” specifically includes cyberbullying as defined in this policy.

B. “Cyberbullying” means bullying using technology or other electronic communication, including , but not limited to, a transfer of a sign, signal, writing, image, sound, or data, including a post on a social network Internet website or forum, transmitted through a computer, cell phone, or other electronic device. The term applies to prohibited conduct which occurs on school premises, on school district property, at school functions or activities, on school transportation, or on school computers, networks, forums, and mailing lists, or off school premises to the extent that it substantially and materially disrupts student learning or the school environment.

C. “Immediately” means as soon as possible but in no event longer than 24 hours.

D. “Intimidating, threatening, abusive, or harming conduct” means, but is not limited to, conduct that does the following:

1. Causes physical harm to a student or a student’s property or causes a student to be in reasonable fear of harm to person or property.

2. Under Minnesota common law, violates a student’s reasonable expectation of privacy, defames a student, or constitutes intentional infliction of emotional distress against a students; or

3. Is directed to any student or students, including those based on a person’s actual or perceived race, ethnicity, color, creed, religion, national origin, immigration status, sex, marital status, familial status, socioeconomic status, physical appearance, sexual orientation including gender identity and expression, academic status related to student performance, disability, or status with regard to public assistance, age or any additional characteristic defined in the Minnesota Human Rights act (MHRA). However, prohibited conduct need not be based on any particular characteristic defined on this paragraph or the MHRA.

E, “On school premises, on school district property, at school-related functions or activities, or on school transportation” means all school district buildings, school grounds, and school property or property immediately adjacent to school grounds, school bus stops, school buses, school vehicles, school contracted vehicles, or any other vehicles approved for school district purposes, the area of entrance or departure from school grounds, premises, or events, and all school-related functions, school-sponsored activities, events, or trips. School district property also may mean a student’s walking route to or from school for purposes of attending school or school- related functions, activities, or events. While prohibiting harassment, intimidation and bullying at these locations and events, the school district does not represent that it will provide supervision or assume liability at these locations and events.

F. “Prohibited conduct” means bullying or cyberbullying as defined in this policy or retaliation or reprisal for asserting, alleging, reporting, or providing information about such conduct or knowingly making a false report about bullying.

G. “Remedial response” means a measure to stop and correct prohibited conduct, prevent prohibited conduct from recurring, and protect, support, and intervene on behalf of a student who is the target or victim of prohibited conduct.

H. “Student” means a student enrolled in a public school or a charter school.

IV. REPORTING PROCEDURE

A. Any person who believes he or she has been target or the victim of bullying or any person with knowledge or belief of conduct that may constitute bullying or prohibited conduct under this policy shall report the alleged acts immediately to an appropriate school district official designated by this policy. A person may report bullying anonymously, However, the school district may not rely solely on an anonymous report to determine discipline or other remedial responses.

B. The school district encourages the reporting party or complainant to use the report form available from the principal or building supervisor of each building or available in the school district office, but oral reports shall be considered complaints as well.

C. The building principal or the principal’s designee or the building supervisor (hereinafter “building report taker”) is the person responsible for receiving reports of bullying or other prohibited conduct at the building level. Any person may report bullying or other prohibited conduct directly to a school district human rights officer or the superintendent. If the complaint involves the building report taker, the complaint shall be made or filed directly with the superintendent or the school district human rights officer by the reporting party or complainant.

The building report taker shall ensure that this policy and its procedures, practices, consequences, and sanctions are fairly and fully implemented and shall serve as the primary contact on policy and procedural matters. The building report taker or a third party designated by the school district shall be responsible for the investigation. The building report taker shall provide information about available community resources to the target or victim of the bullying or other prohibited conduct, the perpetrator, and other affected individuals as appropriate.

D. A teacher, school administrator, volunteer, contractor, or other school employee shall be particularly alert to possible situations, circumstances, or events that might include harassment, intimidation and bullying. Any such person who witnesses, observes, receives a report of, or has other knowledge or belief of conduct that may constitute bullying or other prohibited conduct shall make reasonable efforts to address and resolve the bullying or prohibited conduct and shall inform the building principal immediately.

E. Reports of harassment, intimidation and bullying are classified as private educational and/or personnel data and/or confidential investigative data and will not be disclosed except as permitted by law.

F. Submission of a good faith complaint or report of harassment, intimidation and bullying will not affect the complainant’s or reporter’s future employment, grades, or work assignments, or educational or work environment.

G. The school district will respect the privacy of the complainant(s), the individual(s) against whom the complaint is filed, and the witnesses as much as possible, consistent with the school district’s obligation to investigate, take appropriate action, and comply with any legal disclosure obligations.

V. SCHOOL DISTRICT ACTION

A. Upon receipt of a complaint or report of harassment, intimidation and bullying, the school district shall undertake or authorize an investigation by school district officials or a third party designated by the school district. For the incident to be classified as bullying there must be:

1. An inequity of power between parties;
2. the event must have occurred over time, i.e., repeated;
3. must have malicious intent;
4. substantially interferes with the student's educational benefits, opportunities or performance.

OR Within three days of the receipt of a complaint or report of bullying or other prohibited conduct, the school district shall undertake or authorize an investigation by the building report taker or a third party designated by the school district.

B. The school district may take immediate steps, at its discretion, to protect the complainant, reporter, students, or others pending completion of an investigation of harassment, intimidation or bullying, consistent with applicable law.

OR The building report taker or other appropriate school district officials may take immediate steps, at their discretion, to protect the target or victim of the bullying or other prohibited conduct, the complainant, the reporter, and students or others, pending completion of an investigation of the bullying or other prohibited conduct, consistent with applicable law.

C. The alleged perpetrator of the bullying or other prohibited conduct shall be allowed the opportunity to present a defense during the investigation or prior to the imposition of discipline or other remedial responses.

DC. Upon completion of the investigation that determines that bullying or other prohibited conduct has occurred, the school district will take appropriate action. Such action may include, but is not limited to, warning, suspension, exclusion, expulsion, transfer, remediation, termination, or discharge. Disciplinary consequences will be sufficiently severe to try to deter violations and to appropriately discipline prohibited behavior. School district action taken for violation of this policy will be consistent with the requirements of applicable collective bargaining agreements; applicable statutory authority, including the Minnesota Pupil Fair Dismissal Act; school district policies; and regulations.

ED. The school district is not authorized to disclose to a victim private educational or personnel data regarding an alleged perpetrator who is a student or employee of the school district. School officials will notify the parent(s) or guardian(s) of students involved in a harassment, intimidation or bullying incident and the remedial action taken, to the extent permitted by law, based on a confirmed report.

F. In order to prevent or respond to bullying or other prohibited conduct committed by or directed against a child with a disability, the school district shall, when determined appropriate by the child's individualized education program (IEP) team or Section 504 team, allow the child's IEP or Section 504 plan to be drafted to address the skills and proficiencies the child needs as a result of the child's disability to allow the child to respond to or not to engage in bullying or other prohibited conduct.

VI. REPRISAL

The school district will discipline or take appropriate action against any student, teacher, administrator, volunteer, contractor, or other employee of the school district who retaliates against any person who makes a good faith report of alleged harassment, intimidation and bullying or against any person who testifies, assists, or participates in an investigation, or against any person who testifies, assists, or participates in a proceeding or hearing relating to such harassment, intimidation and bullying. Retaliation includes, but is not limited to, any form of intimidation, reprisal, harassment, or intentional disparate treatment.

VII. TRAINING AND EDUCATION

A. The school district will provide information and any applicable training to school district staff regarding this policy. This policy will be reviewed annually with staff.

B. The school district will provide education and information to students regarding harassment, intimidation and bullying, including information regarding this school district policy prohibiting bullying, the harmful effects of harassment, intimidation and bullying and other applicable initiatives to prevent harassment, intimidation and bullying. This policy will be reviewed with students annually.

C. The administration of the school district is directed to implement programs and other initiatives to prevent harassment, intimidation and bullying, to respond to harassment, intimidation and bullying in a manner that does not stigmatize the victim, and to make resources or referrals to resources available to victims of harassment, intimidation and bullying.

VIII. NOTICE

The school district will give annual notice of this policy to students, parents or guardians, and staff, and this policy shall appear in the student handbook.

IX. PROCEDURES

A. The Superintendent of Schools or the Superintendent's designee shall annually place this policy in all publications of the School District's comprehensive rules, procedures and standards of conduct for schools within the district, including the student handbook.

B. The Principal or the Principal's designee is responsible for receiving complaints alleging violations of this policy. All school employees are required to report alleged violations of this policy. All other members of the school community including students, parents, volunteers and visitors, are encouraged to report any act that may be in violation of this policy. The reporting party is encouraged to submit reports in writing. Oral reports also shall be considered official reports. Reports may be made anonymously, but formal disciplinary action may not be based solely on the basis of an anonymous report.

C. The Principal or the Principal's designee shall conduct a prompt, (within 48 hours excluding weekends & holidays) thorough and complete investigation of the alleged incident.

D. The School District prohibits reprisal or retaliation against any person who reports an act of harassment, intimidation or bullying. The consequence and appropriate remedial action for a person who engages in reprisal or retaliation shall be determined by the administrator after consideration of the nature and circumstances of the act, in accordance with case law, federal and state statutes and regulation and district policies and procedures.

E. In determining the appropriate response to students who commit acts of harassment, intimidation or bullying, the Principal shall consider the following factors:

1. the developmental and maturity levels of the parties involved,
2. the levels of harm,
3. the surrounding circumstances,
4. the nature of the behaviors,
5. past incidences or past or continuing patterns of behavior,
6. the relationships between the parties involved and the context in which the alleged incidents occurred,
7. an inequity of power between parties,
8. the event must have occurred over time, i.e., repeated,
9. must have malicious intent,
10. Substantially interferes with the student's educational benefits, opportunities or performance.

Consequences and appropriate remedial action for students who commit acts of harassment, intimidation or bullying may range from positive behavioral interventions up to and including suspension or expulsion.

F. The Principal or the Principal's designee shall develop appropriate remedial action for a student found to have falsely accused another as a means of harassment, intimidation or bullying range from positive behavioral interventions up to and including suspension or expulsion. Consequences and appropriate remedial action for a school employee found to have falsely accused another, as a means of harassment, intimidation or bullying shall be disciplined in accordance with District policies, procedures and agreements.

**ISD #118 POLICIES FOR PARTICIPATION
IN ATHLETICS AND ALL EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES INCLUDING
NON-MSHSL ACTIVITIES**

Interscholastic/Intramural Athletics:

The Board of Education believes individual students will grow physically and mentally through their experience in self-discipline and their contribution to team effort made possible through competitive inter school and intramural team and individual sports activities.

Participation in interscholastic athletics, as per Minnesota State High School League, shall be limited to students in grades 7-12 with participation of properly supervised teams from grades 7 and 8 also permitted in a limited program within their own grade levels with other schools.

Those teachers having direct responsibility for the conduct of the athletic program of the school are required to conform in all ways to the general education program as established by the Board and administration, including such matters as schedules, financial expenditures, relationships with other schools, and health and safety regulations.

District participation in interscholastic athletics shall be subject to approval by the Board. This shall include approval of membership in any leagues, association, or conferences, or rules for student participation, and of annual sports schedules.

All athletic programs shall operate in accordance with state law M.S. 1978, 126.21 as regards sex discrimination in athletics.

Philosophy of the Extracurricular Program:

The primary purpose of the ISD #118 program of athletics and extra-curricular activities will be to provide students with as wide a variety of non-academic educational opportunities as is economically and practically feasible. The program shall select activities that offer students the greatest possible opportunity to develop their physical and intellectual skills, sportsmanship, fair play, and teamwork.

Purpose:

In general, the purpose of activities offered to students in the middle grades (7th and 8th) will be upon the integration of fundamental skills with the concepts of teamwork and performance, and the development of more sophisticated skills. Every effort will be made to maximize participation for all students in grades 7-8. Sixth grade participation is not universal to all sports. Sixth grade participation will be determined by recommendations to the school board by the activities director on an individual sport/activity basis.

The purpose of activities in the upper grades (9th through 12th) will be upon the development of sophisticated skills in individuals, and especially upon the development of groups and teams that are, through their demonstration of teamwork, fair play, and perseverance, capable

representatives and ambassadors of the school. Participation and performance in competitions may be limited to students with appropriated skill levels, as determined by their supervisors and coaches, but will include at least as many students as can be outfitted with available uniforms (where these may be a limiting factor).

Supervision and Direction:

Each activity in the extracurricular program will be supervised and directed by one or more members of the ISD #118 staff or by an adult designed by the principal or by the Activities Director. All practices, meets, competitions, and meetings will require the presence of at least one adult supervisor. Supervisors (coaches) are required to supervise all of their players until all members of their team(s), are picked up after a home or away event. Supervisors (coaches) may not authorize practices, competitions, or other meetings to take place in their absence or in the absence of adult supervision, and may, as required by the Minnesota State High School League, be restricted to specified dates and periods for holding practices for MSHSL sponsored activities. Participating students will not be permitted to practice or compete when no supervisor is present. In general, where not governed by other regulations established in this policy or by MSHSL regulations (where applicable), the supervisors and directors will have the right and responsibility to establish all rules and regulations for participation, conduct, appearance, attendance at practices, and performance in competitions. Students' participation will be contingent upon their willingness to abide by the regulations set forth by their supervisors. There shall be no force of precedence imposed upon supervisors in establishing these regulations excepting those expressly stated in this policy.

Participation and Performance in Competitions:

All students enrolled in ISD #118 schools who meet eligibility standards set forth by this policy, by the Minnesota State High School League (where applicable), and by the coaches and supervisors of the activity are entitled to participate. Every effort will be made, at the elementary and junior high level, to give each student equal opportunity to participate and play. Students are expected to attend all practices, unless valid reasons are given to the coach in advance. Good attendance at all practices will be a major factor in determining how much a student will play. At the varsity level, the right to participate does not guarantee that the student will be permitted to compete or perform. Determination of which participants will compete shall always be the exclusive right of the directors and supervisors of the activity.

Eligibility:

No student will be excluded from participation in any activity on the basis of race, creed, gender, or ethnic, although performance in competitions sponsored by the Minnesota State High School League may be limited to students of a specified gender. ISD #118 subscribes and adheres to all federal regulations governing equality of opportunity to participate in educational activities.

Eligibility standards will include, but are not necessarily limited to:

1. standards set forth by the MSHSL for all MSHSL sponsored activities (as distributed to students prior to the commencement of practices) -- these standards regulate eligibility

- on the basis of age, academic standing, and compliance with rules concerning use of tobacco, alcohol, and illegal drugs;
2. academic standards as established by the school;
 3. compliance with school regulations concerning physical examinations, parental permission, the payment of activities fees, and the payment of fines assessed for lost or damaged books and materials or other legitimate bills:
 4. compliance with regulations established by the activities directors and supervisors (coaches) regarding behavioral conduct (both associated with the activity and elsewhere in school), attendance at practices, timely registration, cooperativeness, and, where applicable, adherence to the conditions of the MSHSL Sportsmanship Code (see Appendix A); and
 5. appropriate level of physical or technical skill as determined by the activity directors and supervisors consistent with the focus of the activities program.

Eligibility Policy for Grades 7-12:

Academic Standards

Student-athletes must make progress towards graduation. To do this, they must be receiving credit in every class and passing all classes. The following is the Northland Community School policy for student progress.

Every 3 weeks, student-athletes must turn in their progress reports, with a parent signature, to coaches.

- If the student has an F on this progress report, the student goes into "on watch." They do not have to sit.
- If two consecutive progress reports have an F, then the student must sit for half of the event. The student will still be expected to go to practice during their ineligibility. For football and basketball, it is a half. For baseball and softball, it is 3 innings. For volleyball, it is 2 sets. For cross country, it is missing every other event. This continues the entire 3 weeks. For other events, it will be up to coach and administration discretion.
- If three consecutive progress reports have an F, then the student is out for the entire event. The student will still be expected to go to practice during their ineligibility This continues the entire 3 weeks.
- Once a student has a progress report of no F's, then they reset to the very beginning.
- At the beginning of each season, Activities Directors or Principals will look at the previous quarter grades to determine eligibility for the first 3 weeks of the season.

Behavioral Standards

Student-athletes are role models at Northland Community School and should demonstrate our Eagle Pride every day. The following is the Northland Community School policy for student behaviors.

- 1st Major Discipline Referral = warning
- 2nd Major Discipline Referral = sit for 1/2 of next game

- Football and basketball = half a game
- Baseball and softball = 3 innings
- Volleyball = 2 sets
- Cross Country and Track = every other event
- 3rd Major Discipline Referral = sit entire next event
- 4th Major Discipline Referral = sit entire next 2 events
- Etc.

- *It will reset at the next sports season.

School Attendance:

Students must be in attendance all day on the day of competition, contest or practice.

Students must be in attendance at the 8:25 am start time for the beginning of the next school day following the event, contest or game.

Any deviation of this rule must be cleared, in advance by the parent through the coach, Activities Director, or Principal's Office. Excused absences will be accepted. Those students not in compliance will not be eligible to participate in the event following the infraction.

However, if trends develop that reflect poor student attendance before or after games, or if it becomes apparent that student activities are having a detrimental effect on school attendance, players will need to take the following actions to remain eligible:

1. **Meet with respective coach and Activities Director to develop attendance improvement plan.**
2. **If attendance concerns persist, a parent meeting with the Activities Director and Principal will be held; consideration will be given to suspending student from respective activity.**

Coaches will utilize student attendance; both activity attendance and school attendance, to determine which students participate in activities and which students do not. **If a coach feels that poor attendance may create a safety issue or may inhibit student academic success, a coach may withhold a student from an activity until school/activity attendance is improved.**

Physical Examination:

The MSHSL requires students in grades 7 through 12, who participate in athletics, to have a physical examination at least once every three years. Standard State of Minnesota examination forms are available at most clinics and should be turned in to the high school office when the examination is completed. Students usually obtain physicals during the summer prior to 7th and

10th grades. The office must have a copy of the physical on file before the student will be permitted to compete.

Although a physical exam is only required every three years by the MSHSL, it is highly recommended by coaches at ISD #118 that all athletes have a physical exam every year.

Parental Permission:

All athletic participants must present a slip signed by a parent or guardian granting them permission to participate in the activity before they will be allowed to compete.

Fees:

ISD #118 assesses a participation fee for all of its MSHSL Activities except band and choir. The fee for each activity for a student who plays varsity or junior varsity is \$50. The participation fee for junior high, 7th & 8th grade level activity is \$35 per activity. The fee for One Act Play and Visual Arts is \$15.

Family max is \$200.

Uniform Deposit is \$100 for the year and is due at the start of the first sports season played. This will be returned at the end of the last season.

Activity fees must be paid prior to practicing or have worked out a payment plan with the Activities Director or Principal.

If a student discontinues his/her participation in an activity during the first two weeks of the activities season, including practice time, then he/she may receive a refund of the activity fee. The student must notify the coach during the first two weeks that he/she is quitting the activity. No other refunds are possible.

Use of Tobacco, Alcohol, and Controlled Substances:

In keeping with MSHSL regulations student violations will be accumulated, during 7th and 8th grade then again from 9th through 12th grade. Violations accrued prior to the 9th grade will not be considered for students in 9th through 12th grades.

1. First Violation:
 - a. MSHSL consequences will apply, which means that the student shall lose eligibility for the next two scheduled interscholastic events or two weeks of scheduled events for each activity in which
 - b. The student participates, whichever is greater. This two- week or two-event consequence will carry over into the next season or if the violation occurs in the spring, it will carry over into the next school year.

2. Second Violation:

- a. MSHSL consequences will apply, which means that the student shall lose eligibility for the next six scheduled interscholastic events or six weeks of scheduled events for each activity in which the student participates, whichever is greater. This six week or six event consequence will carry over into the next season or if the violation occurs in the spring, it will carry over into the next school year.
3. Third Violation:
 - a. MSHSL consequences will apply, which means that the student shall lose eligibility for the next twelve scheduled interscholastic events or twelve weeks of scheduled events for each activity in which the student participates, whichever is greater. This twelve week or twelve events consequence will carry over into the next season or if the violation occurs in the spring, it will carry over into the next school year.
 - b. Eligibility may be restored after a minimum of six weeks have elapsed and only when the student presents a certificate signed by the director or a counselor of a chemical dependency treatment center indicating that a treatment program has been satisfactorily completed. Students will enroll in dependency treatment at their own expense.

As required by law, all violations of chemical use will be reported to law enforcement and to the local district Chemical Assessment team for review and evaluation.

Locker Use:

It is the responsibility of the student to ensure that all personal belongings are stored within their sports locker and locked at all times during their absence. Lockers and locks are provided to all students. Personal locks are not allowed.

Non-Athletic - Category II Activities:

Teachers, coaches, directors or advisors of MSHSL and non-MSHSL activities may impose consequences such as not allowing students to participate in pep band, tournaments, concerts, performances, etc.

As required by law, all violations of chemical use will be reported to law enforcement and to the local Chemical Assessment team for review and evaluation.

During the investigation of a chemical or any MSHSL or non-MSHSL violation, if the student claims they were not in violation, but at a later date, it is found or facts show that the student was lying, the student will become ineligible for any MSHSL or non-MSHSL activity participation for an additional 9 week period in accordance to MSHSL or non-MSHSL rules.

Northern Lakes Conference Sportsmanship:

The Northern Lakes Conference is a tradition rich conference comprised of seven schools in Northeastern Minnesota: Bigfork, Deer River, Greenway, Hill City, Little Fork/Big Falls, Nashwauk-Keewatin, and Northland Community Schools. The Northern Lakes Conference is committed to developing and practicing good sportsmanship throughout all of their programs.

The Northern Lakes Conference has adopted the following:

- Sportsmanship Creed
 - It is read by the public address announcer prior to every athletic contest and published in the event program.
 - **The creed states:** Sportsmanship and courtesy go hand in hand. Good sportsmanship is strived for in all Northern Lakes Conference events. Good sportsmanship is a responsibility of players, coaches, faculty, cheerleaders, students, adult spectators, officials and the media.

EXPECTATIONS OF STUDENT PARTICIPANTS:

1. Treat opponents with respect - shake hands prior to and after contest.
2. Respect judgment of contest officials, abide by rules of the contest and display no behavior that could incite fans.
3. Cooperate with officials, coaches, and fellow participants to conduct a fair contest.
4. Shake Hands with officials at the conclusion of the contest.

EXPECTATIONS OF COACHES:

1. Always set a good example for participants and fans to follow, exemplifying the highest moral and ethical behavior.
2. Instruct participants in proper sportsmanship responsibilities and demand that they make sportsmanship the no. 1 priority.
3. Respect judgment of contest officials, abide by rules of the event and display no behavior that could incite fans.
4. Treat opposing coaches, participants and fans with respect. Shake hands with officials, opposing coach in public.
5. Develop and enforce penalties for participants who do not abide by sportsmanship standards.
6. Shake hands with the officials at the conclusion of the contest.

EXPECTATIONS OF SPIRIT GROUPS:

1. Stimulate desired crowd response using only positive cheers, signs and praise without antagonizing or demeaning opponents.
2. Treat opposing spirit groups and fans with respect.
3. Recognize outstanding performances on either side of the playing field or court.
4. Understand rules and strategies of the contest in order to cheer at proper times.
5. Maintain enthusiasm and composure, serving as a role model.
6. Sportsmanship behavior must be practiced by the group. The school district will not tolerate unacceptable practices such as taunting, or any other type of negative behavior directed at our opponents. Individuals or groups not abiding by good sportsmanship practices will face disciplinary actions.
7. All signs and location of signs must be approved by game management.
8. Respect the efforts of the cheerleaders.
9. Sing the Sportsmanship song along with the cheerleaders:

SPORTSMANSHIP SONG

Come on let's raise our voices loud and strong'
And give a cheer to boost our team along
Let's urge the teams to fight with all their might,
And win a victory in sportsmanship tonight.
For if we win or lose, we'll never fuss
We'll make our Alma Mater proud of us.
So with a loud and lusty hip hurrah
Our friendly foes we'll play.

EXPECTATIONS OF FANS:

1. Realize that a ticket is a privilege to observe a contest and support High School activities not a license to verbally assault others or be generally obnoxious.
2. Respect decisions made by contest officials.
3. Respect other fans, coaches, and participants.
4. Be a FAN....NOT A FANATIC!!!!
5. Be an exemplary role model by positively supporting teams in every manner possible, including content of cheers and signs.

6. Maintain self control at all times.
7. Parents are asked to maintain control of younger children during an event.

General Rules and Regulations Governing Activities Participation: (including all extracurricular activities)

1. Student serving in-school-suspension for any reason, will be ineligible to participate in any competition during the date(s) of suspension. They are still expected to participate in practice during that time.
2. Student serving out-of-school-suspension for any reason, will be ineligible to practice or participate in any competition during the date(s) of suspension.
3. Participants, coaches or advisors shall leave all practice areas and dressing rooms in a neat and orderly condition as well as seeing that all doors are locked and all lights turned off that were used during practices and games. The coach or supervisor is responsible for the supervision of participants until the activity has been completed and is the last one to leave the building.
 - a. Coaches or supervisors are also responsible for supervising students while they are in the building waiting for an activity to begin. An area or room should be assigned for students that are waiting for the activity to begin or to load buses for out of town events.
2. **As a rule, for liability purposes, students are to use school transportation to and from school sponsored events and activities. Students are to be released only to their own parents or guardians unless permission was granted by the principal or his designee in advance.**
 - a. **Under no circumstances will a student be permitted to provide his(her) own transportation to or from an event held off the school grounds, nor will a student participant be permitted to ride with another parent or person unless approved by the principal or his designee.**
3. **Students that willfully, without permission from the coach, advisor or superintendent or his designee use transportation other than stated above, shall lose eligibility for the next two interscholastic events or two weeks of scheduled events for each activity in which the student participates, whichever is longer.**
4. Students may, on occasion, be asked to contribute to the cost of food, transportation and lodging. This will be done in accordance with district policy.

Procedure for Administering the Code of Conduct and Eligibility Regulations:

All allegations and complaints relative to a student's violation of the Code of Conduct, all inquiries, investigations of complaints, disciplinary actions taken, and appeals of disciplinary decision will be handled according to guidelines established by the Minnesota State High School League as outlined in Appendix B.

Student participants will be expected to provide their own clothing for practices, and their own shoes, socks, underclothing, towels, and toiletries for both practices and competitions. They will also provide any accessories to standard uniforms that are not required equipment (e.g., special eyeglasses and special footwear).

Students who require medication or who have sustained unusual injuries will be required to provide their own medications. Under no circumstances will any activity supervisor administer medication of any sort (including aspirin) to a student participant. The school will not be required to provide meals or food allowances for student participants while students are on activities trips. The school does however, have the option of providing food and lodging to those competing above the district level.

Student participants will be expected to keep their practice clothing clean and may be asked to clean uniforms and equipment issued them by the school.

Injuries and Insurance Coverage:

ISD #118 assumes no liability for illness or injury to any student participating in athletics or extracurricular activities not due directly or indirectly to negligence on the part of activities supervisors.

District employees are expected to take reasonable and accepted precautions against injury and to provide for proper maintenance of equipment and facilities. Students who engage in activities such as football, wrestling, basketball, etc., do so with the knowledge that injuries are not uncommon to these sports. Coaches are strongly encouraged to provide students both with understanding of the risks they are taking by participating, and with a vigorous conditioning program to guard against undue risks of injury.

In the event of injuries and illnesses of which coaches are aware, reasonable accommodations will be made for the student so as not to aggravate the condition or prolong the period of recovery. When a student's health precludes his (her) from practicing and performing as expected, (s)he may be asked to provide written recommendations from a physician indicating the nature of permissible and not permissible activities and indicating a time at which full participation can be resumed. Ill and injured students who do not obtain physician's recommendations may, in some circumstances, be withheld from participation.

The health and well being of our students is a paramount concern. Coaches and supervisors will take every reasonable action to secure adequate and immediate assistance in handling injuries that result from students' participation in practice and competition. In the case of injuries that are serious or life-threatening, however, EMT or professional help will be secured immediately without regard for the students' level of insurance coverage or parents' ability to pay.

ISD #118 does not carry any individual student insurance. However individual insurance is made available as an option to each parent/student at their expense. This insurance information is provided to each student and parent at the beginning of the school year.

ISD 118 Procedures for School Sponsored Trips

1. Each student must have a signed permission slip and signed emergency authorization slip prior to leaving the campus for the trip. This can be completed at the beginning of a season for extra-curricular activities/sports and apply to the entire season. All permission slips and emergency authorization slips are to be taken on each trip.
2. No student is permitted to travel with or leave the school group with someone who is not an assigned coach, advisor, pre-approved trip chaperone, or the student's parent/legal guardian without the written permission of the student's parent/guardian.
3. Fast food or family-style restaurants should be used for school sponsored trips. Examples of such restaurants include: McDonalds, Subway, Perkins, etc. Restaurants that serve alcohol are not approved eating establishments for school sponsored trips **unless** pre-approved by the superintendent and will be considered only when determined to be educationally relevant to students.
4. Absolutely no alcohol consumption is permitted during the duration of the school sponsored trip by any district employee, advisor, student, or chaperone assigned to the trip. Illegal drug use is prohibited.
5. Recreational activities and entertainment options during school sponsored trips should be age-appropriate, respectful, and represent a positive image to our students. Examples of appropriate entertainment are athletic events, museum or zoo visits, movies that are age-appropriate to the students on the trip (i.e.: no "R" rated movies if there are students under the age of 17 on the trip), theater productions that are age-appropriate to the students on the trip, etc. School sponsored trips should not include recreational activities and/or entertainment that include violence, sexual content, drugs/alcohol or any other content that portrays a negative image. Any exceptions are to be pre-approved by the superintendent and will be considered only when educationally relevant to students.
6. The superintendent must pre-approve plans for overnight trips to include student names, emergency contact names/phone numbers, approved chaperone names, district employees participating, trip itinerary, hotel accommodations and a summary of sleeping and supervision assignments. Once initial superintendent approval is obtained, the plan will be presented to the Board for final approval. Final revisions to the plan are to be provided to the superintendent prior to trip departure.

The lead teacher, head coach, and/or advisor have primary responsibility to oversee any school sponsored trips. This includes making all arrangements; ensuring required permission is obtained and taken for each student; assigning and ensuring proper supervision during the trip; ensuring that all district employees, students, and chaperones are aware of the expectations; obtaining any necessary administrative permissions and/or pre-approvals; handling of funds; and communicating effectively with everyone in regard to the trip. Any concerns that occur in regard to any trip are to be immediately reported to school administration.

Guidelines
