COVID-19 UPDATE

POLICY ISSUE/SITUATION:

Many areas of the world, including the United States, are experiencing an expanding outbreak of respiratory illness caused by a novel (new) coronavirus, COVID-19.

On March 11, 2020 the World Health Organization characterized COVID-19 as a pandemic. To slow the spread of the virus, on March 17, 2020, Governor Brown ordered all public schools in Oregon to remain closed through April 28, 2020.

As schools, students, families, and communities plan for and experience closures, Beaverton School District is committed to providing ongoing guidance and resources as we sort through this unprecedented situation together.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

On March 12, 2020, Governor Brown issued Executive Order No. 20-05, prohibiting gatherings of 250 or more people statewide. She also announced a statewide closure of Oregon K- 12 schools from March 16, 2020, through March 31, 2020.

On March 13, 2020, the President of the United States declared the COVID-19 outbreak a national emergency.

On March 17, 2020, Governor Brown issued Executive Order 20-8, extending closure for all public schools from March 16, 2020, through April 28, 2020. The order also stated during the closure period all public schools shall continue to receive allocations from the State School Fund, as if they had been actually in session during the closure period. In order to receive allocations from the State School Fund during the closure period, public schools shall:

- (a) Continue delivering supplemental education and learning supports to students to the extent practical through independent study and other appropriate options.
- (b) Provide school meals in non-congregate settings through the Summer Food Service Program and Seamless Summer Option.
- (c) Provide for supplemental services and emergency management services, including but not limited to, the provision of childcare for first responders, emergency workers, health care professionals, and other individuals, consistent with any guidance and requirements provided by the Oregon Department of Education.
- (d) Develop plans for the operation of essential, non-educational services, including food services, to students and families.

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- (e) Continue to regularly pay all employees of public schools. A public school subject to this Executive Order may require school employees to report to work to assist with the provision of supplemental services and emergency management activities.

PANDEMIC TEAM:

The Pandemic Team was formed on March 2, 2020 and had upwards of 25 personnel and included representatives from Operations & Support Services, Teaching & Learning, and District Nurses. The team met every weekday from March 2, 2020 and March 20, 2020. The Pandemic Team focused on providing direction/guidance across the school district and in support of the Governor's orders. The team also focused on providing daily messaging to Administrators, staff, and our families.

MEAL SERVICES:

The Nutrition Services (NS) Department provided free breakfast and lunch for all students and children ages one (1) and up to 18 years of age from the period of March 16-20. NS served meals from 11:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. at 15 designated school sites and served 13,199 meals during this period. The number of school sites expanded to 17 sites on March 30, 2020.

On Tuesday, March 31, 2020, NS, Transportation Department (over 60 drivers), and over 170 district volunteers started delivering grab & go meals to 38 designated bus stop [locations](#) on 19 routes.

Grab and go school sites included: Aloha Huber Park K-8, Barnes Elementary School, Beaver Acres Elementary School, Chehalem Elementary School, Elmonica Elementary School, Fir Grove Elementary School, Greenway Elementary School, Hazeldale Elementary School, Kinnaman Elementary School, McKinley Elementary School, Raleigh Hills K-8, Vose Elementary School, William Walker Elementary School, Whitford Middle School, Beaverton High School, Southridge High School, Sunset High School.

DAYCARE PROGRAMS:

BSD, in partnership with the Oregon Department of Education (ODE), and the Early Learning Division is assisting families who are working on the front lines access childcare. First responders, emergency workers, and health care professionals were directed to find more information on the [Emergency Child Care page](#) or contact the private daycare providers Champions Daycare/KinderCare or ClubK. Daycare service started at Cooper Mountain ES, Terra Linda ES, and Vose ES on March 16, 2020. As of today, the private providers shifted daycare operations to Cooper Mountain ES and Terra Linda ES.

DONATED SUPPLIES

On March 24, 2020, BSD donated the following supplies to the VA Portland Medical Center, Providence St. Vincent on Murray & Scholls and TVF&R:

- 1,310 boxes of nitrile exam gloves
- 2,107 N95 masks
- Large and small bottles of hand sanitizer
- 700 blue face masks
- 80 safety goggles from school science labs

ELEMENTARY CHROMBOOK DISTRIBUTION:

On April 1 – 3, 2020, the Information Technology Department distributed over 4,900 Chromebooks to elementary students. Two [surveys](#) were sent to families to determine Chromebook requirements and the data collected was shared with IT to determine each school's needs. The following steps were also performed in support of this massive effort of Chromebook distribution:

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- Create information that's included with Chromebook student name, ID, & password
- [Quick Guide\(s\)](#) info on how to connect to Wi-Fi, Login to Chromebook, get to resources
- Schedule created for distribution in coordination with each elementary school
- Deployment Shift Signup by IT staff and school staff
- Chromebook Prep done by TSS
- Remove from carts along with power cord. Power on to verify it's working, verify it connects to network and can get to login screen, in addition to cleaning each device
- Principal, Custodian, and TSS determined setup plan and traffic flow. Posted signs to use for the check-in area and the handout area
- Plan to greet and stage volunteer team ensuring social distancing is maintained

ONLINE RESOURCES AND DISTANCE LEARNING FOR ALL:

During the extended closure directed by Governor Brown, the District will provide the opportunity for supplemental education and learning supports. The initial BSD Remote Learning Plan ([Phase 1](#)) was implemented to cover the first ten days of school closure (March 16, 2020 to April 3, 2020), excluding the week scheduled for spring break. When Governor Brown extended the closure to April 28, 2020 the District began planning for Phase 2 of the Remote Learning Plan.

The significant difference between Phase 1 and Phase 2 is the involvement of District teachers. In Phase 2, teachers will facilitate learning opportunities, provide feedback to students on work submitted, and will connect with students on a regular basis. At this time, students are not required to participate in remote learning but encouraged to access the resources provided, complete assigned work, and engage with their teachers. Teachers will not grade student work and will not hold students accountable if they do not participate. We encourage students to participate in learning opportunities as the time spent away from school and not engaged in learning may have a significant negative impact on future academic success.

As we were planning for Phase 2, which was to be implemented on April 6, 2022, we were informed by the ODE that we were required to implement a plan for Distance Learning for All. We are planning, per directive by ODE, Distance Learning for All, or Phase 3 of our Remote Learning plan. We will send communication to staff and families as soon as the planning is complete.

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**ACCEPTING THE SUPERINTENDENT'S EMERGENCY DECLARATION
AND APPROVING AN EXEMPTION FROM THE COMPETITIVE BIDDING REQUIREMENTS
IN RESPONSE TO THE GOVERNOR'S EXECUTIVE ORDERS
REGARDING THE COVID-19 PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY**

POLICY ISSUE / SITUATION:

OAR 137-49-0620 and ORS 279C.010 (1)(f) and ORS 279B.080 permits the Beaverton School District Board of Directors to exempt specific contracts or class of contracts from the competitive bidding requirements of ORS 279. Per ORS 279C.010 (1)(f), 279B.080, and 279C.335 this Board of Directors acting as the Local Contract Review Board can exempt the contracts anticipated to be required for the District to effectively mitigate the emergency caused by COVID-19. The District personnel, to the greatest extent practicable, will engage in competitive bidding processes in an effort to obtain the most effective cost in dealing with the emergency at hand.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

On March 16, 2020 Governor Brown issued Executive Order 20-08 closing K-12 schools through April 28, 2020 and requires school districts to take certain actions as a condition for continued provision of State School Funds. On March 30, 2020 the Oregon Department of Education issued guidance in implementing Distance Learning for All beginning April 13, 2020. The following are a synopsis of requirements:

- Continue delivering supplemental education and learning support to students to the extent practical through independent study and other appropriate options.
- Each District should have their Distance Learning for All Plan in place by April 13, 2020. Distance learning is not just online instruction. It provides for blended learning strategies and access to appropriate educational materials through multiple modes of communication. As Schools transition to distance learning, successful approaches will be centered on care, community and continuity of learning.
- Provide school meals in non-congregate settings through the guidance of the Oregon Department of Education and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.
- Provide for supplemental services and emergency management services, including the provision of childcare for first responders, emergency workers, health care professionals, and other individuals, consistent with any guidance and requirements provided by the Oregon Department of Education.
- Develop plans for the operation of essential, non-educational services, including food services, to students and families.
- Transportation services to meet any of the requirements of the Executive Order and operations of the District as determined by the Superintendent.
- Continue to regularly pay all employees of public schools. A public school subject to this Executive Order may require school employees to report to work to assist with the provision of supplemental services and emergency management activities,
- Public school employees in at risk-categories, or public school employees who have an at-risk member of their household are not required to take action that is inconsistent with public health recommendations or the advice of the employee's physician.

District Goal: WE empower all students to achieve post-high school success.

RECOMMENDATION:

The School Board, acting as the Local Contract Review Board, must approve the particular findings delineated in the accompanying Resolution supporting the use of Emergency Purchasing Exemption pursuant to ORS 279B.080 and ORS 279C.335(2)(4)(b)(c).

It is recommended that the School Board accept the Superintendent's Declaration of an Emergency and acting as the Local Contract Review Board approve the exemption from the competitive bidding requirements of the contracts anticipated to be required in responding to the Emergency.

**BOARD RESOLUTION NO. 20-0406:
ACCEPTING THE SUPERINTENDENT'S EMERGENCY DECLARATION
AND APPROVING AN EXEMPTION FROM THE COMPETITIVE BIDDING REQUIREMENTS IN RESPONSE TO
THE GOVERNOR'S EXECUTIVE ORDERS
REGARDING THE COVID-19 PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY**

The Superintendent of Beaverton School District 48-J, under authority delegated by the School Board which acts as the District's Local Contract Review Board, finds that an emergency exists and thereby requests that the District's Board authorize the District's administration to waive competitive bidding procedures within the parameters established by this Resolution.

THE BOARD FINDS:

1. Introduction: Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS 279.010(1)(f) and ORS 279B.080 and the District Administrative Policy DJ-AR allow the District to enter into public contracts without competitive bidding if an emergency exists. District policy DJ-AR provides that the District Board, as the Local Contract Review Board, has delegated its authority under the Public Contracting Law to the District Superintendent, who is required to make all public purchasing processes comply with applicable state public contracting law. The Superintendent seeks to extend the District's ability to use emergency public contracting provisions.

2. Governor Brown's Executive Orders: On March 8, 2020 Governor Brown declared an emergency under ORS 401.165 due to the public health threat posed by the novel infectious coronavirus (COVID-19). On March 12, 2020 Governor Brown announced the closure of Oregon K-12 schools from March 16, 2020 through March 31, 2020. On March 16, 2020 Governor Brown extended school closures through April 28, 2020.

3. COVID-19 Is a Public Health Emergency: The Superintendent finds that the Governor Brown's Executive Orders referenced in paragraph 2 above qualify as an emergency for the purposes of ORS 299B.080.

4. Services required by Governor Brown for School Districts to receive State School Funds: On March 16, 2020 Governor Brown issued Executive Order 20-08 closing K-12 schools through April 28, 2020 and requires school districts to take certain actions as a condition for continued provision of State School Funds. The following are a synopsis of requirements:

- a. Continue delivering supplemental education and learning supports to students to the extent practical through independent study and other appropriate options.
- b. Provide school meals in non-congregate settings through the guidance of the Oregon Department of Education and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.
- c. Provide for supplemental services and emergency management services, including the provision of childcare for first responders, emergency workers, health care professionals, and other individuals, consistent with any guidance and requirements provided by the Oregon Department of Education.
- d. Develop plans for the operation of essential, non-educational services, including food services, to students and families.

- e. Transportation services to meet any of the requirements of the Executive Order and operations of the District as determined by the Superintendent.
- f. Continue to regularly pay all employees of public schools. A public school subject to this Executive Order may require school employees to report to work to assist with the provision of supplemental services and emergency management activities,
- g. Public school employees in at risk-categories, or public school employees who have an at-risk member of their household are not required to take action that is inconsistent with public health recommendations or the advice of the employee's physician.

5. Addressing the Executive Orders requires the prompt execution of contracts: Use of standard public contracting procedures for services, goods and materials to assist the District to respond to Executive Order 20-08 is not feasible, as it would result in unacceptable delays. Any delay would have an immediate detrimental impact on students and their families, staff, first responders and public health professionals.

6. Authority to Enter into Emergency Contracts: Based on the above, the Superintendent of the Beaverton School District 48-J, declares an emergency, pursuant to ORS 279B.080 and requests the School Board, acting as the District's Local Contract Review Board, waive Competitive Bidding and Public Contracting requirements. This declaration of emergency authorizes the Superintendent, and their designees as determined in District Policy DJ-AR 9 (a) (b) the authority for immediate negotiation and execution of contracts with one or more qualified contractors, service providers and providers of goods and materials for the following purposes:

- a. To assist the District in its response to the COVID-19 public health emergency and the Governor's Executive Order 20-08 and any subsequent Executive Order related to K-12 education.
- b. To take all necessary action to deliver supplemental education and learning support to students during the school closure. This is to include the ODE guidance issued March 30, 2020 concerning Distance Learning for All.
- c. To take all necessary action to provide meals in non-congregate areas.
- d. To take all necessary action to provide supplemental services and emergency management services.
- e. To take all necessary action to provide childcare for first responders, emergency workers and health care professionals.
- f. To develop plans for the operation of non-educational services, including food services, to students and families.
- g. To take all necessary action to maintain operational stability within the District including but not limited to sanitizing and maintaining facilities.

7. Notification to Board: The Superintendent or designee shall provide written notification to the Board of any expenditure under this Resolution in any amount greater than \$150,000.

8. Emergency Declaration: An emergency declaration adopted by the District's Local Contract Review Board is consistent with the emergency needs of the District. The circumstances presently existing meet those contemplated in ORS 279B.080 as an emergency.

1. Inclusion and Adoption of existing Declarations: This Declaration is intended to incorporate, include, and expand other Emergency Declarations made and approved as a more limited response to the circumstances at that time.

2. Adoption of most recent ODE guidance: Each District should have their Distance Learning for All Plan in place by April 13, 2020. Distance learning is not just online instruction. It provides for blended learning strategies and access to appropriate educational materials through multiple modes of communication. As Schools transition to distance learning, successful approaches will be centered on care, community and continuity of learning.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the School Board for the Beaverton School District 48-J, acting as the District's Local Contract Review Board, and based on the above findings, hereby approves the Superintendent's Declaration of an Emergency and approves the temporary revisions in the District's Purchasing Policies for all contracts required for the District's comprehensive response to the COVID-19 public health emergency and the District's response to Executive Order 20-08 dated March 16, 2020 and any subsequent Executive Order or Oregon Department of Education guidance related to K-12 education in Oregon.

Adopted by the Beaverton School Board acting as the Local Contracting Review Board this 6th day of April 2020.

TRANSPORTATION SUPPLEMENTAL PLANS FOR 2020-2021

SITUATION:

Oregon Revised Statute (ORS 327.006) establishes the criteria for reimbursement of approved transportation costs by the State at 70%. The primary component of the reimbursement is daily round-trip home-to-school transportation for elementary and secondary students living outside transportation zones established by statute (1.0 and 1.5 miles respectively).

The statute also includes provisions for reimbursing transportation costs for students living within these zones if it is required for "health or safety reasons." To qualify for reimbursement, routes servicing areas within these zones must be approved annually by the Oregon State Board of Education as local district Transportation Supplemental Plans.

The primary reason for providing transportation for students within the 1.0 and 1.5-mile zones is lack of sufficient infrastructure for a safe walkway (e.g. no sidewalks, no designated walkways away from traffic, need to cross major traffic arterials, etc.) A committee comprised of BSD Transportation, Public Safety, and Risk Management staff along with representatives from the City of Beaverton Traffic Department, Washington County Land Use, Washington County Safe Routes to School, and the THPRD Planning Department evaluate planned & completed road and pedestrian access improvements within our boundaries and determine their effect on BSD student transportation. In many cases, road and sidewalk improvements have a positive effect on school accessibility by creating safe walking routes for students living nearby who are presently transported by school buses.

Staff has met with building administrators, mailed correspondence to student homes, and held community meetings for the proposed changes.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the Beaverton School Board approve the proposed Transportation Supplemental Plan for the 2020-2021 school year.

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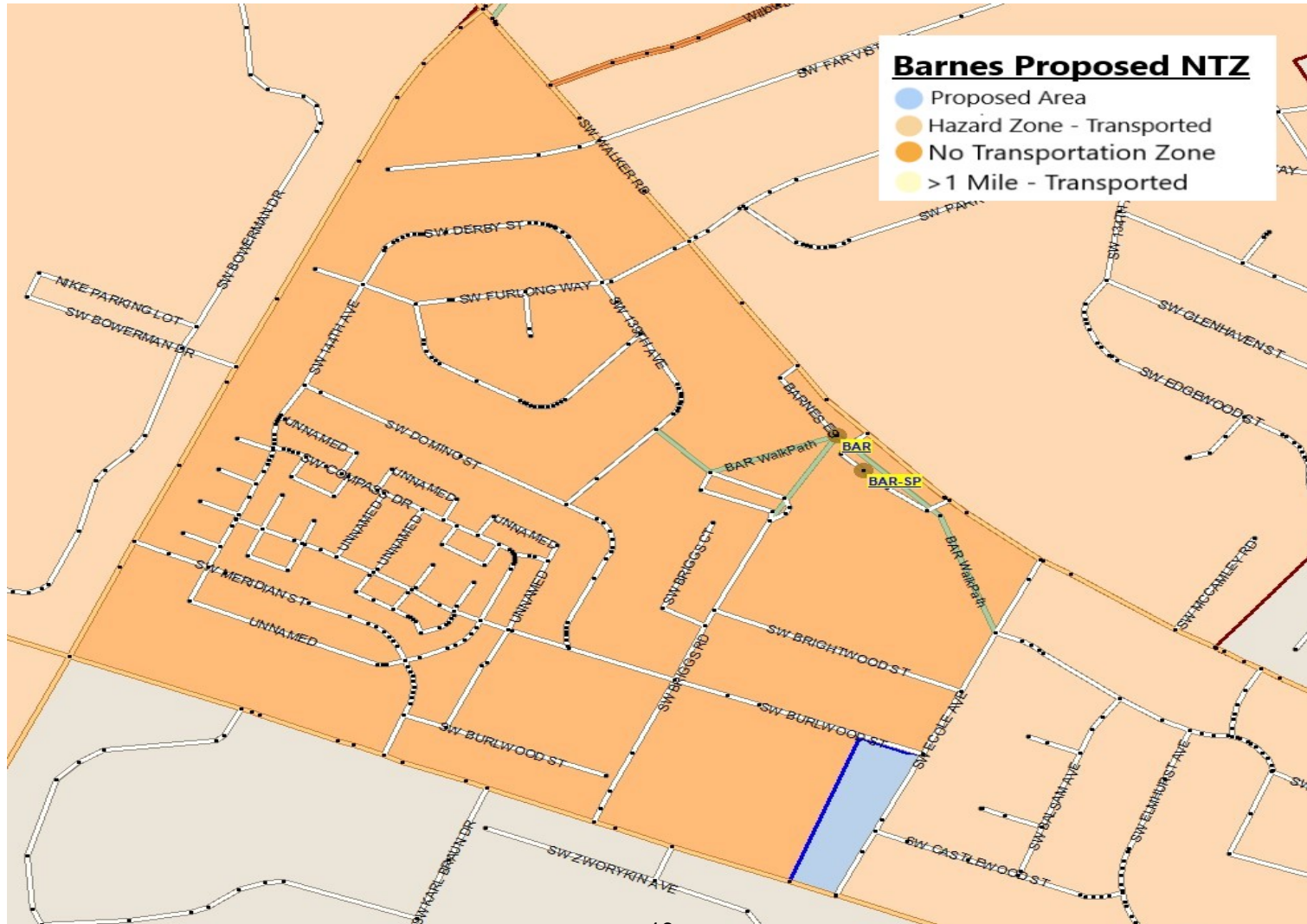

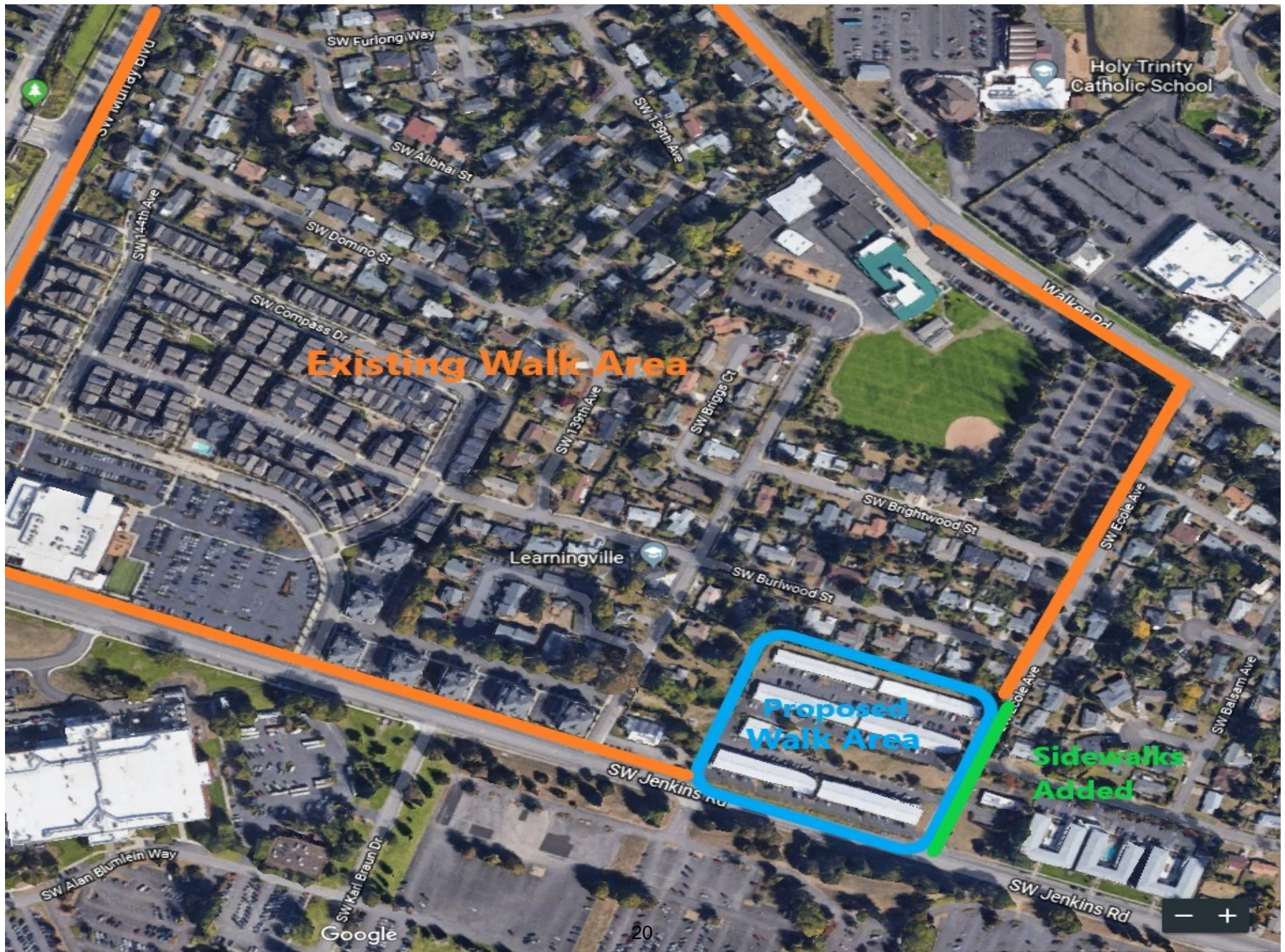

Barnes Elementary School

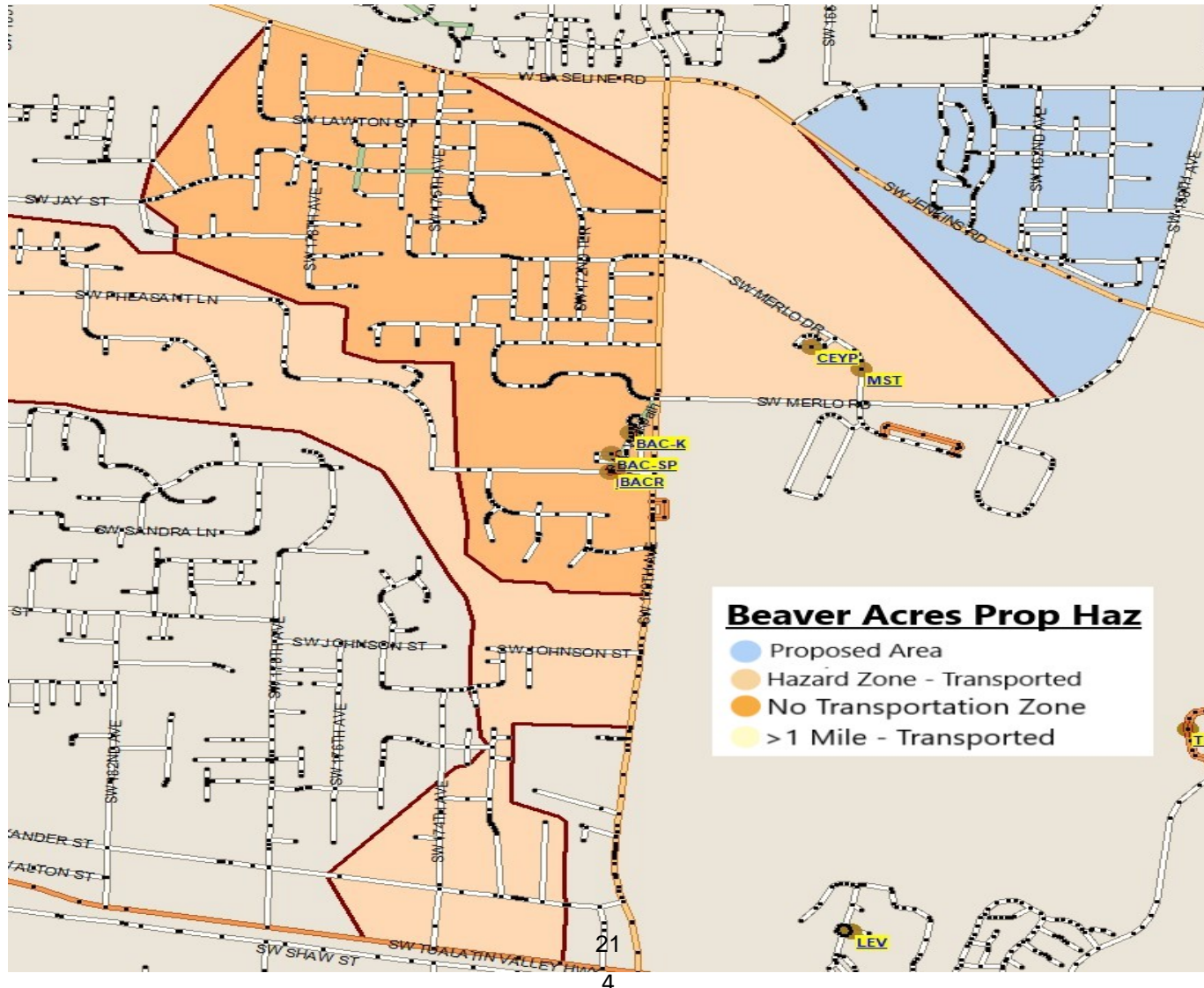
The proposed area receives bus service due to the lack of sidewalks on SW Ecole or SW Jenkins. Washington County approved and funded the addition of sidewalks to the west side of SW Ecole between SW Jenkins and SW Brightwood, which would connect this area to the existing walk zone for Barnes ES. Work is scheduled to go out for bid in January 2020 and be completed in the Spring. If for any reason work is not completed prior to the start of the Fall 2020 school year, bus service will be provided until the project is completed.





Beaver Acres Elementary School

The proposed area was transferred from Elmonica ES to Beaver Acres ES beginning in Fall 2019 as part of the Elmonica Boundary Adjustment Process. The area is under 1 mile from Beaver Acres ES, however it lacks a safe walk path to school due to the hazardous crossing at SW Jenkins Road. Board approval is required to qualify for reimbursement as a Hazard Zone.



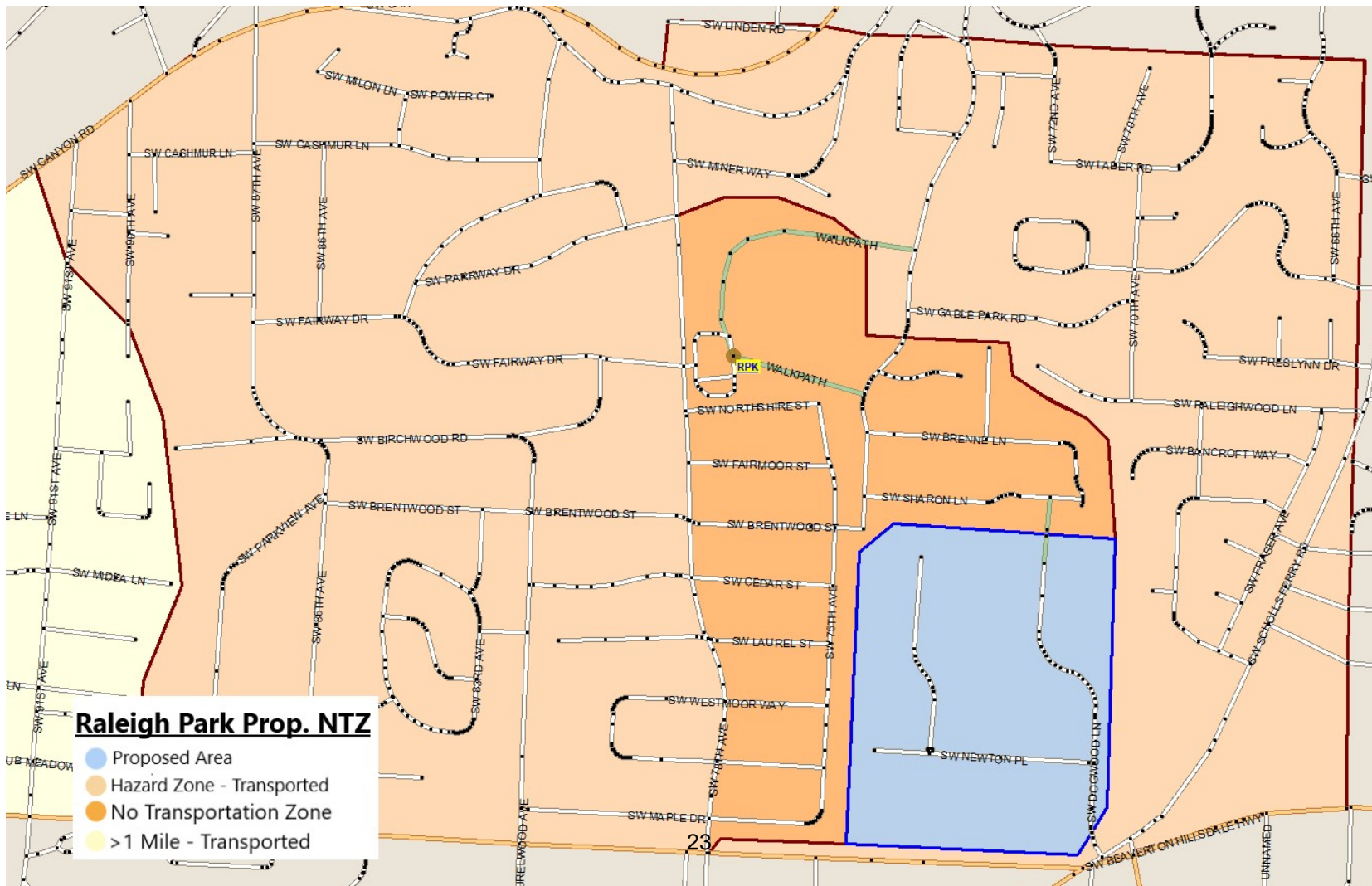

Raleigh Park Elementary School

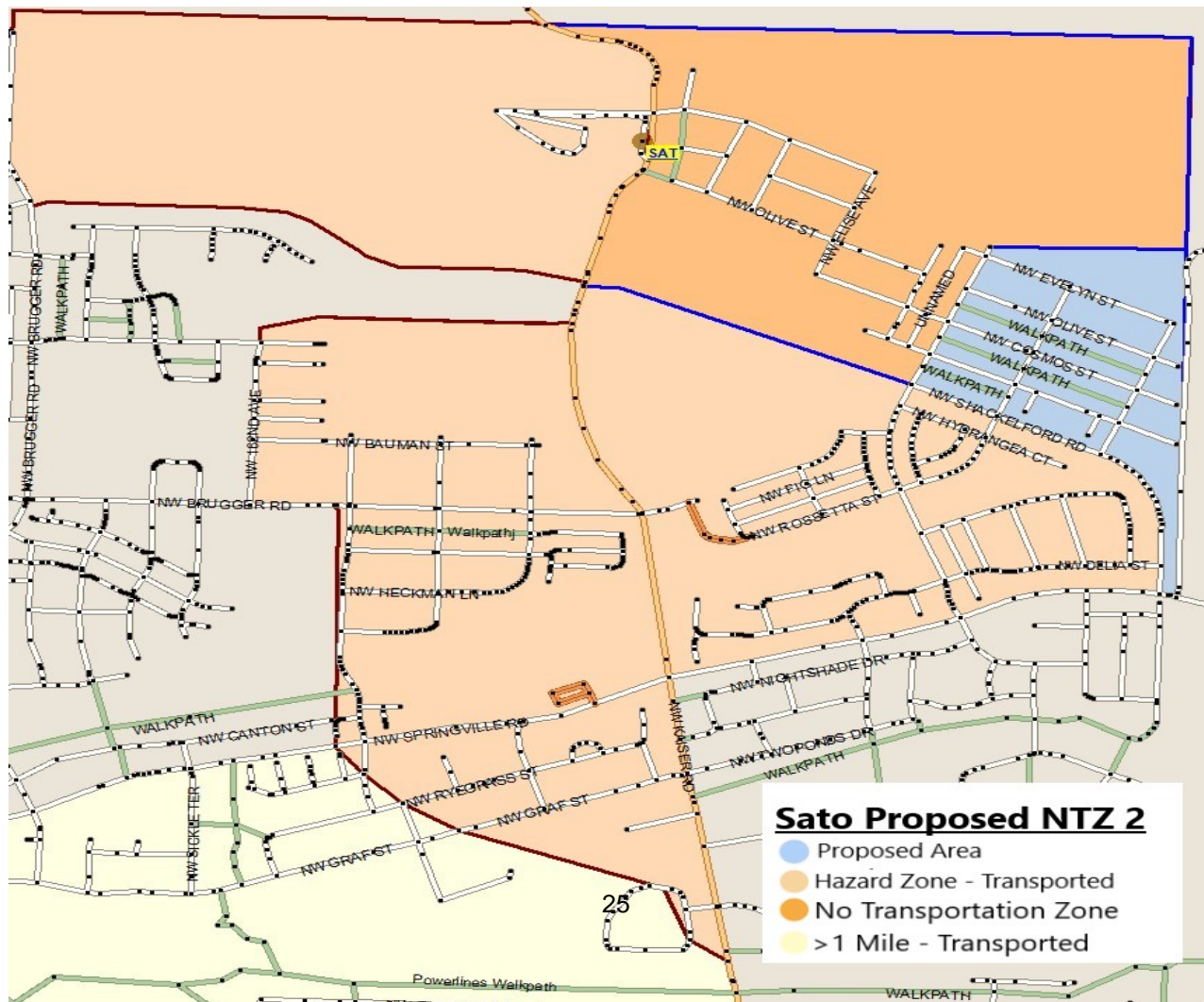
The proposed area receives service because the traditional path from this neighborhood to Raleigh Park ES exceeds 1 mile. A pedestrian path and gate exists on SW Dogwood which provides access to SW Sharon Ln. The gate is regularly used by neighborhood residents and owners of the gate and the path have provided BSD permission for students to use it also. The new path reduces walk distance to under 1 mile.





Sato Elementary School

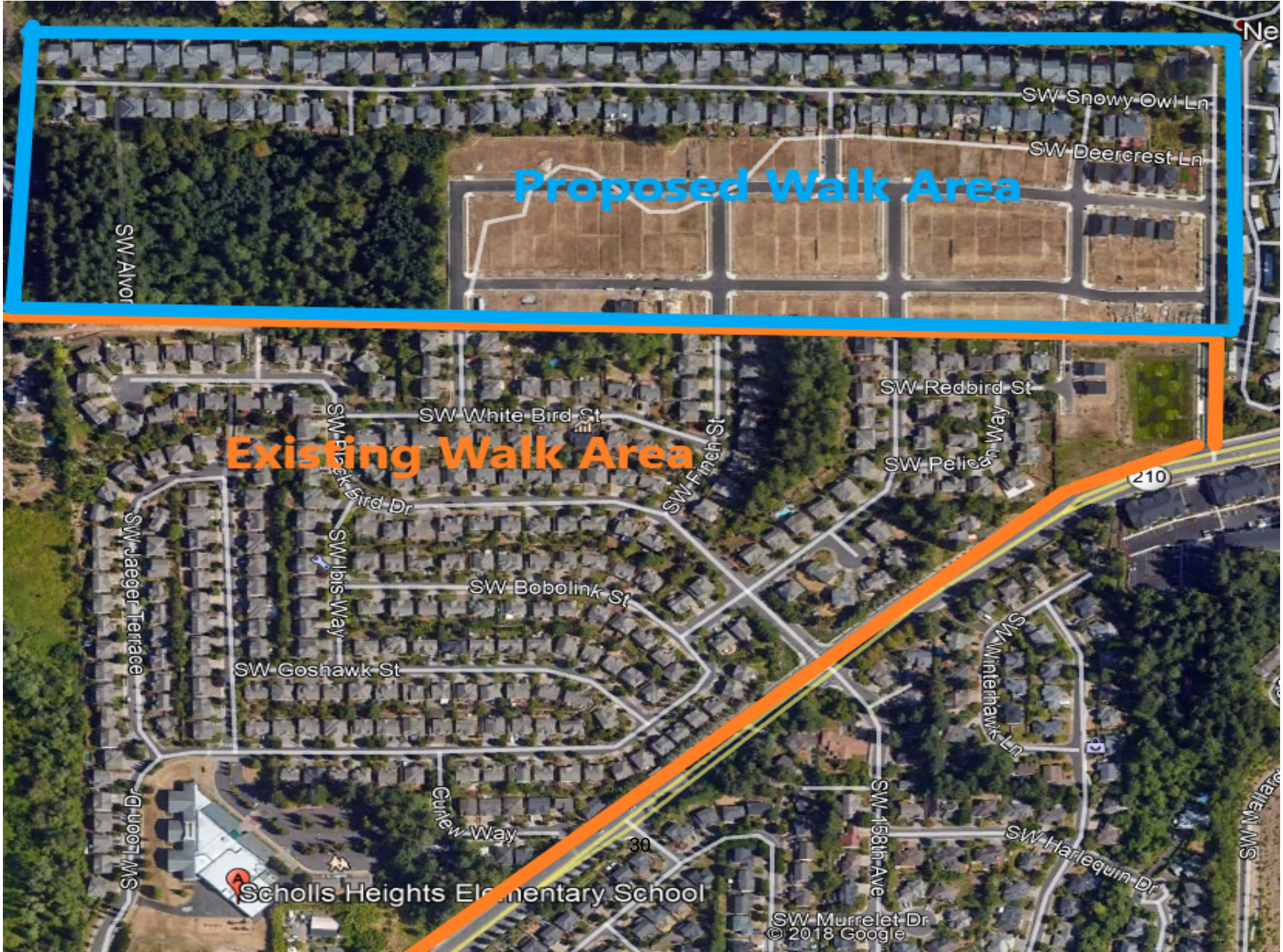
The proposed area receives bus service due to lack of a safe crossing on NW Kaiser Rd. In Fall 2019, Washington County installed a 4-way stop sign at NW Kaiser and NW Ridgeline and implemented 20 MPH Speed Zone signage on NW Kaiser. BSD currently staffs a crossing guard at this intersection. This neighborhood connects to the existing walk zone immediately to the west and has sidewalks available for students. Hazard criteria initially identified when establishing this area as a hazard zone have now been addressed.

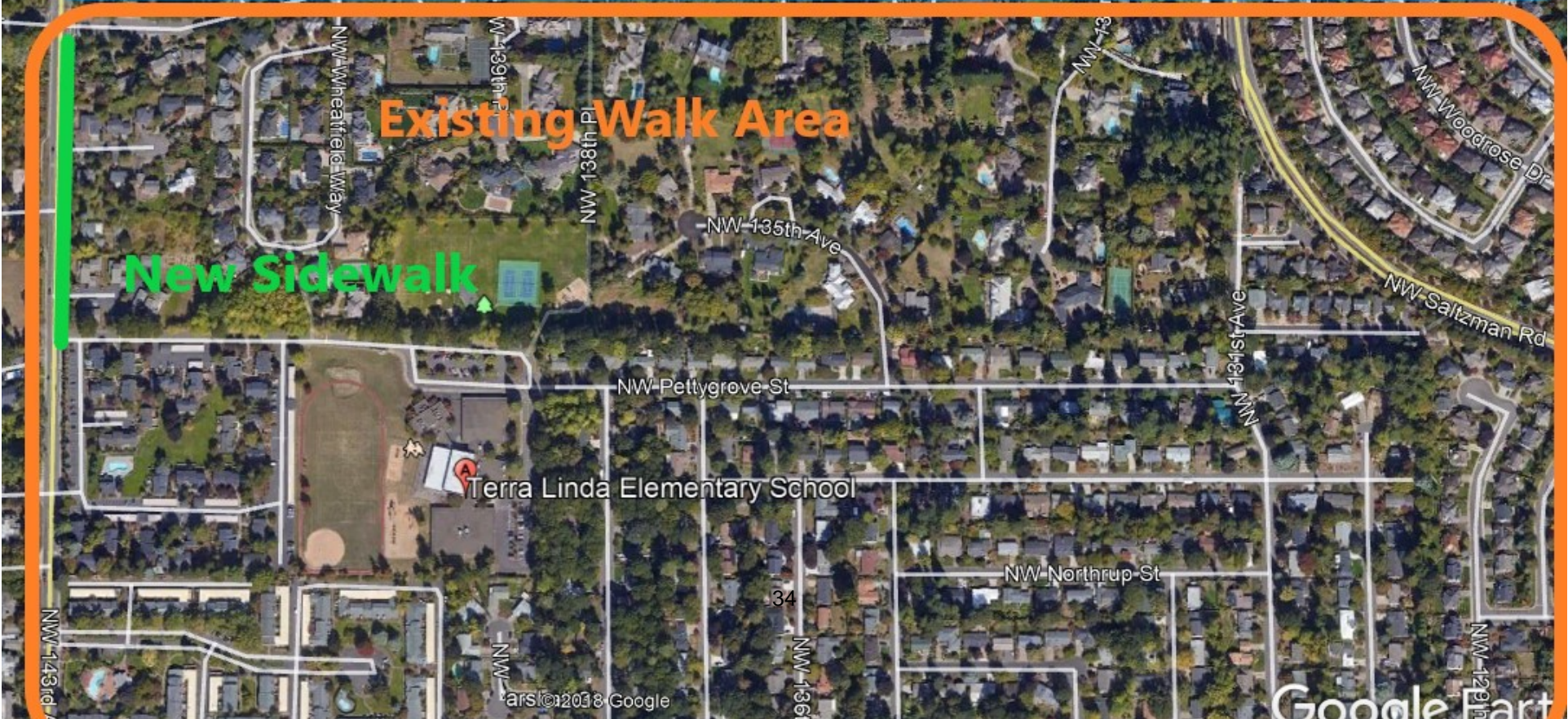

The signed residents below live in the neighborhood surrounding SW 90th St. We are writing to you regarding our concern about the west side portion of SW 90th St that runs from NW Leahy, south to the 4-way stop intersection at SW Leahy Rd/Taylor St/SW 90th St. This is a very dangerous section of road for pedestrians.

This section of SW 90th St has significant amounts of 35+ mph traffic. SW Taylor St was opened to through traffic several years ago, and this has increased the flow of traffic on SW 90th St. The east side of SW 90th St has no shoulder, and is very unsafe for walking or biking. The west side of the street has a wide shoulder, but the shoulder has deteriorated and is in serious need of repair. We would like to see the western shoulder repaired by leveling and a consistent width, and we also request that pedestrian facilities be added to the shoulder. We would love to have a sidewalk added. If you cannot install a sidewalk, please install a curb or an asphalt path that is separated from the traffic lane.

This area leads to West Tualatin View Elementary School, Catlin Gable and the park. At the present time, students who live west of SW 90th are entitled to a bus, despite living less than .5 miles from the school. This is due to the safety concerns on SW 90th. This is an absurd situation. We want to see the road improved so that students can safely walk to school, and others can enjoy the walk to school on SW 90th in safety.

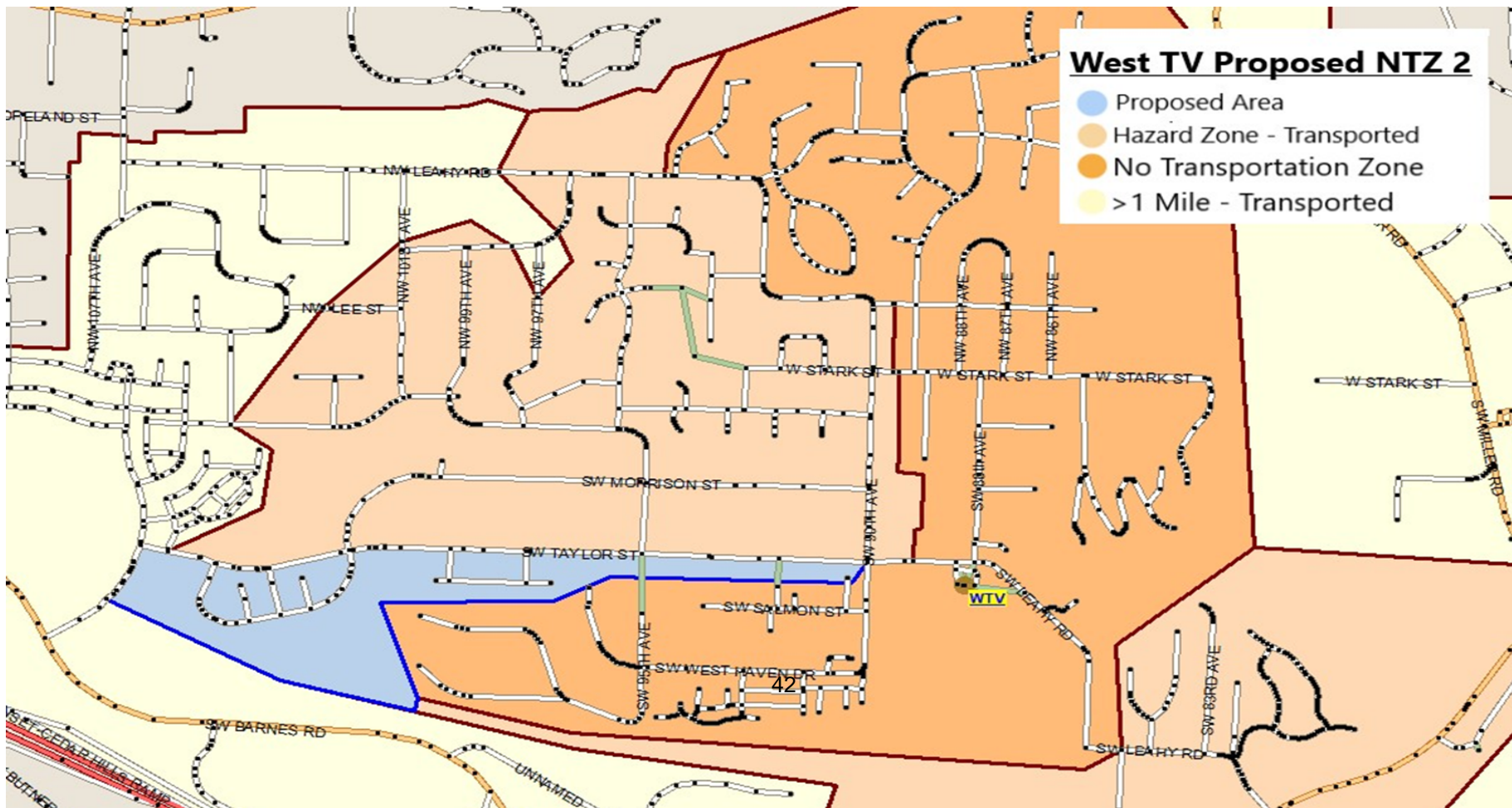

This area receives service due to the lack of sidewalks on SW Taylor. The traffic volume and speed on SW Taylor exceeds guidelines for students to walk without sidewalks.
