6.A. Executive Committee - Action as Required

6.A.1. MEETINGS

6.A.1.a. Pending

6.A.1.a.1. Groundwater Foundation National Conference

The Groundwater Foundation Annual Meeting will be in Lincoln on October 20-22. This is the first time in recent history that the meeting will be in Nebraska and we hope for a large turnout from local residents and members. LPNNRD contributed \$250 and is listed as a conference sponsor in the program. We encourage directors to attend. Registration is \$355 with a \$60 discount if registered by September 1 so we encourage early registration. There are also tour choices before and following the conference for those wishing to participate.

6.A.2.b.1. Monthly Conference Call and Update

Bob is planning to be in Nebraska the first week of August and we will conduct our monthly call/meeting at that time. He is planning to spend time in each of the three NRDs to view projects, in our case Wanahoo, Schuyler, Fremont and Clear Creek. Attached is his monthly report.

Simone Rock from HDR will give the education program that is an update on the Basin Water Plan.

6.A.2.d. LARM Insurance for F.Y. 2016

Attached find the Renewal Coverage Proposal for our 2015-16 Pool Year with LARM that begins October 1. To formalize acceptance of the proposal we need to approve the attached resolution, however two major decisions need to be made along with this acceptance. 1.) Do we want to have our notice of termination be 90 or 180 days and 2.) Do we want to commit to LARM for one, two or three years. There are financial incentives to lengthen both these, see attached LARM Discount Spreadsheet.

LARM has been very accommodating and we have had no problems, however we have not had any major claims in the past year to judge against this. What we do know is comparing 2014 to 2016 our premium is \$26,000 less (30%).

Clausen (our LARM representative) and Miyoshi have reviewed the proposal and recommend the 180 day termination notice and either a two or three year contract length.

6.A.2.e. NARD Foundation Auction Item

In the past we have supported the NARD Foundation Auction with an item costing \$100- \$150. As the benefit auction continues to expand we should consider increasing our donated item to \$250. We can do this by motion or the Executive Committee can direct management to carry this out if an increase is desired.

6.A.2.h. CCEI Lawsuit

Attached find a note from Lausterer that CCEI is pressing for recovery of interest lost during appeal of the case in the amount of \$8,558. His suggestion is to pay this amount with the stipulation that no other fees or charges will be asked for.

6.A.2.i. 1 to 1 Ratio for Sub-Districts

Last month our education program was on our election costs. The cost for the 2014 general election was \$28,473.13 and would have been reduced by \$19,017.91 if we voted by sub-district instead at large. There would also be savings at the primary election.

Unfortunately to vote by sub-district would require us to be at a one to one ratio, meaning the population of our smallest to largest sub-district would need to be within 10% (1 - 1.1 ratio). At the 2010 census we were at a 1 - 2.73 ratio (state statute allows up to a 1 - 3 ratio).

If we maintain a 19 member board going 1 to 1 would require us to have a third subdistrict in Fremont (currently two) with the remaining six (currently seven) each becoming geographically larger. The largest change would occur in Colfax County where most of the county would join Platte, Boone and Madison and smaller areas divided between rural Dodge and Butler Counties.

The Executive Committee felt we should make no changes to way we currently elect board members.

6.A.2.j. NWRA Dues

It is time to pay our annual Dues to NWRA (National Water Resources Association) that are \$1,950.

6.A.2.k. Quarterly NRDF Payment

We should receive our first quarter NRDF payment for our Sand Creek

Project that should go towards our Union Bank Note that is expected to be just over \$150,000.

6.A.2.1. New Director of Natural Resources

Jeff Fassett the new Director of DNR is set to begin work on August 3. Jeff comes from Wyoming and has an impressive resume in the water arena.

6.A.2.m. NARD Video Project

We previously approved the Nebraska Educational Television NRD Video Project that is being coordinated by NARD. Attached find a letter from Dean Edson with more detail on the project and to inform us that the cost has gone up from \$3,000 to \$3,710 per NRD.

6.A.2.n. Electronic Voting

At the last board meeting a question came up concerning electronic voting at board meetings. Lausterer checked with the Nebraska Attorney General's Office who continues to maintain their current opinion that NRD boards cannot utilize electronic voting at board meetings. Nebraska statutes contain a section that allows such voting by a municipality, a county, a learning community, a joint entity pursuant to the Interlocal Cooperation Act ... The statute does not specifically name NRDs, even though the intent appears to be there to allow all political sub-divisions this option. Lausterer's recommendation is that we do not use electronic voting. If we are serious about this option we could send a resolution to NARD asking for legislation to include NRDs on the list for those who can vote electronically at board meetings.

6.A.2.o. Yutan Fire and Rescue Request

The Yutan Volunteer Fire Department mans a Water Rescue Team. Through Mutual Aid this team is available to many of the Fire and Rescue Departments in this portion of the state. Our staff meets with this team and local law enforcement agencies on a bi-annual basis to prepare for water emergencies. The team has used Lake Wanahoo as a practice area to be better prepared if they are ever called for assistance. Attached find a letter of request asking for assistance to purchase a water rescue boat. The cost of the boat is \$49,750.

The Executive Committee asked staff to find out who Yutan has mutual aid agreements with and see if a water rescue boat would qualify for use of hazard mitigation funds.

6.A.4.a. Shell Creek Coordinator Position

Over the past six months we have worked to make the Shell Creek Watershed Improvement Group (SWIG) a sub-committee advisory group to LPNNRD. If the board approves the Projects Committee recommendation this will occur in August. One of the key needs is to continue the SWIG Coordinator position. SWIG established a Coordinator position several years ago to organizing meetings, provide grant and program administration along with a host of other management and clerical duties. LPNNRD has effectively teamed with the coordinator to organize and advance SCWIG activities and needs.

The position has been funded by NDEQ and NET grants and has proven to be an effective means to help accomplish SCWIG business. LPNNRD has accepted management and responsibility for SCWIG's existing NET grants and would like to continue the coordinator position to assist with SWIG activities and grant administration. Melissa Foreman has been the coordinator for several years (housed at the Columbus NRCS office) and our desire is to establish a part-time Shell Creek Coordinator position at LPNNRD and hire her to continue with these duties. The part-time position will average about 20 hours per month (up to a maximum of 40 hours) and our intention is to continue funding the position through existing grants. A draft LPNNRD "Shell Creek Watershed Coordinator" Job Description is attached that was modeled from the SWIG Position Description.

6.A.4.b. Hire Shell Creek Coordinator

The previous agenda item created the Shell Creek Coordinator Position and explained how Melissa Foreman has been a key person to make SWIG successful. SWIG members have stressed the importance of keeping Melissa as part of the team to smooth the transition of SWIG to an LPNNRD Advisory Group.

Melissa's current rate of pay is \$19 per hour with no benefits. Management supports the SWIG recommendation to hire Melissa.

6.B.1. WILD NE/CREP REPORT

One CREP payment of \$72.16 for Tim & John Gronenthal Trust in Platte County on 4.4 acres.

6.B.2. OPERATION & MAINTENANCE & OTHER ITEMS

6.B.2.a. O & M Crew

The O & M crew helped plant numerous trees on the Wanahoo Rec area. The trees were from the Arbor Day Foundation. Also watered many or all the trees at the Wanahoo SRA. We also shredded some problem areas. Checked wetland drop structures below some of the Sand/Duck Creek structures. We will start our shredding circuit on levees and ditches in August. Also, miscellaneous vehicle and equipment maintenance. The summer interns are working on water sampling and chemigation inspections.

6.B.2.b. District Grass Drill Rentals

The Saunders County grass drill at Rezac Seed brought in \$2,132.93 from March - June.

The Platte County drill at Mueller Seed Farm brought in \$897.50 for the first half of the year.

The Colfax County drill at Schuyler Co-op last fall brought in \$170 and the first half of this year \$1,314.

The total for the three drills during the first half of 2015 is \$4,344.43.

6.B.2.c. Wanahoo Grassland Hay

The two cooperators have not started haying the Wanahoo grasslands, they both are waiting for more growth. They will start in August and they must finish by the 30th.

6.B.2.d. Fremont GI Flood Study

The Feasibility Cost Share Agreement (FCSA) has been approved and signed by both the NRD and the COE, the Corps is asking for a payment of \$100,000 in August. (See attached Request)

The Corps will also ask for \$100,000 in September and the remaining \$75,000 in the Spring of 2016.

Staff has sent our partners (Fremont, Dodge County, & Inglewood) a letter and Amended Inter-Local agreement requesting payment from each. The payment percentages are 12.10%, 10.85% and 2.05% respectively.

6.B.2.e. Lower Platte Weed Management

The Lower Platte Weed Management group is planning on having the helicopter spray for invasive plants (predominately Phragmites) along the Platte River and other locations in early September. Our District may have them spray some areas around Wanahoo to control Willows & Cottonwood along with some Phragmites.

6.B.2.f. Bellwood 3-B Renovation

Staff is working with NRCS (Ken Kotera) on plans, and quantities to renovate Bellwood 3-B. The water in the structure has been lowered with the hope that work can be accomplished this fall/early winter. Cattle and wave action has deteriorated the face of the structure. The landowner is working with us well.

6.C.1.a.5.B. Sandy Pointe Development Public Water Supply Wells

Sandy Pointe Development has submitted two applications for Public Water Supply (PWS) wells in the NE 1/4 SE 1/4 Section 24-13-9E and SE 1/4 SE 1/4 Section 13-13-9E of Saunders County, Wann Subarea. The new wells will pump 300 gpm estimated water

use was not provided, but the lake is planned to have approximately 190 lots. The plans call for a third PWS well once the development becomes more populated.

Attached are section maps showing the location of the two wells, and the test hole logs provided by Sargent Irrigation on behalf of Sandy Pointe Development.

6.C.1.a.5.C. Terry Beller Stock Well Permit

Terry Beller has submitted a well permit application for a new livestock well in the SE 1/4 SW 1/4 Section 13-20-4W in Platte County, Lower Newman Grove Subarea. The stock well will be used to keep cattle cool during the hot summer months. The well will pump 350 gpm and is estimated to pump 1,440,000 gallons annually. The feedlot peaks at 5,200 head of cattle.

6.C.1.a.5.D. Brach Johnson Well Permit Application

Brach Johnson has applied for a new well to irrigate 32.8 certified irrigated acres in the NW 1/4 of the NE 1/4 of Section 7, T18N, R2E Colfax County, Shell Creek Uplands Subarea. This field is also located in the Platte-Colfax Special Quantity Subarea. The owner of the current well (Bryce Grotelueschen), and Mr. Johnson have had a falling out which has led to the submission of a new well permit.

Attached is a map of the field in question, a letter submitted by Mr. Johnson, and the well log from well G-157921.

Clint Johannes sold this property to Brach Johnson and Clint says this land has never been irrigated. The Committee took no action until this can be further reviewed.

Chris Poole reviewed this situation and found that Johannes is correct. The original well permit for Bryce Grotelueschen listed 133 acres in 2010 but the NW 1/4 of this section was not irrigated within the one year time limit of the well permit and the well registration has not updated within 60 days as required by DNR. The acre certification will be modified for both landowners to address the correct situation.

Brach Johnson was informed of the situation and he can still apply for a variance request, however since this land is in the Platte-Colfax SQS area, there is little likelihood that this will be approved.

6.C.1.a.6. Special Quantity Subareas

Recent rains have delayed the summer ground water energy level readings in the SQS areas.

Johannes informed staff that the Platte - Colfax SQS area has not been getting as much rain as other parts of the district and therefore some pivots have been running.

6.C.1.a.9. Bellwood Phase 2 Area

2014 is the twelfth year of this Phase 2 Area.

On September 1, 2015 a total of 11 sections will be removed from the Bellwood Phase 2 management area due to slowly declining nitrate-nitrogen concentrations in the groundwater (see attached map).

6.C.1.a.10. Richland - Schuyler Phase 2 Area

2014 is the eleventh year of this Phase 2 Area.

Special education class was held at the Schuyler Oak Ballroom on Wednesday July 22, 2015 starting at 7:00 pm. Topics covered the improving situation in the Bellwood Phase 2 area (lower nitrate-nitrogen levels in the aquifer) and the disappointing situation in the Richland-Schuyler Phase management area where nitrates are slowly rising and the area is getting larger.

On September 1, 2015 the existing Richland-Schuyler area will move from Phase 2 to Phase 3 and the ten sections on the northern edge will move from Phase 1 to a Phase 2 management area (see attached map). A demonstration of the SENSE program was held on July 28, 2015 at Columbus Ag. Park. Approximately 12 producers attended and 4 LPNNRD directors were also in attendance.

6.C.1.a.11. James Barta Drain Tile Issue

Staff has been working with Edward Duda and Sue Healey on a potential issue involving James Barta installing drain tile in a field near Linwood in Butler County. Drainage of this water would cross unto their property and therefore could limit access to their fields . The LPNNRD lacks any real authority in this matter and therefore a possible civil suit between landowners maybe the only recourse.

6.D.2. WATERSHEDS

6.D.2.a. Shell Creek Watershed

6.D.2.a.1. Approving SCWIG as LPNNRD Advisory Sub-committee

Over the last several months we have been working toward making the Shell Creek Watershed Improvement Group (SCWIG) devolve as a separate entity and become an advisory sub-committee to LPNNRD. As part of this process, we have accepted sponsorship of SCWIG's existing Nebraska Environmental Trust (NET) grant and are also sponsoring their new grant. In February, Jovan Lausterer outlined several steps (attached) that should be taken for making SCWIG strictly our advisers and be covered under our liability insurance. We need to formally appoint SCWIG as our advisory subcommittee, formally ratify the draft set of policies for the group, and affirm SCWIG's Chair and Co-Chair.

6.D.2.a.2. Establishment of Part-Time Shell Creek Coordinator Position

The Shell Creek Watershed Improvement Group established a Coordinator position several years ago to work closely with the group, organizing meetings, providing grant and program administration and provide a host of other duties. LPNNRD has effectively teamed with the coordinator to organize and advance SCWIG activities and needs. The position has been funded by NDEQ or NET grants and has proven to be an effective means to help accomplish SCWIG business. LPNNRD has accepted the responsibility for SCWIG's existing and recent NET grants and would like to continue with the coordinator position to assist with Shell Creek activities and grant administration. Melissa Foreman has been the coordinator for several years now (housed at the Columbus NRCS office) and our desire is to establish a part-time Shell Creek Coordinator position at LPNNRD (job description attached) and hire her to continue with her duties. The part-time position will average about 20 hours per month (up to a maximum of 40 hours) and it is intended to continue to fund it through grants. Her current rate of pay is \$19/hour, with no benefits. The Executive Committee will be

addressing this issue and will bring forth a recommendation to the Board.

6.D.2.b. Wahoo Creek Watershed

Gottschalk and Mountford met with JEO and Saunders County (Steve Mika) on July 23 to review and prioritize potential grade stabilization and dam sites in the Wahoo Creek Watershed. We will be working with JEO and NRCS to put together new grant applications for Wahoo Creek to fund a grade stabilization structure and a small dam. We are also looking to apply for additional grant funding for landowner conservation practices and for our Lands for Conservation Program.

6.D.3. LOWER PLATTE RIVER CORRIDOR ALLIANCE

6.D.3.a. LPRCA Monthly Report

There were two companies that submitted bids for the obstruction removal at Two Rivers-Hawkins Construction and Valley Corp. Hawkins Construction submitted the low bid of \$1,125,940.37. Valley Corp's bid was significantly higher at \$2.7 million. Olsson Associate's estimate for construction was \$1,102,000. We currently have \$1,204,000 on hand between NRD funds and grant funds. Approval of the low bid was approved by LPSNRD's subcommittee and Board next Wednesday, June 15th and things are moving forward. Construction can begin on August 15th. 6.D.4.e. Mike Chvatal Dam Assistance Request

Mike Chvatal is interested in repairing a small old dam located above our Cottonwood Creek Floodwater Dam Site 21-A, near Malmo. Earlier this year, Mike purchased 80 acres above this site and is evaluating options for restoring the small dam (a portion of the embankment has been washed out) which would act as a silt trap above the larger dam. In the past, LPNNRD has given priority to conservation practices located above our dams, so this request is being investigated. We normally do not provide funds for dam repair, but under certain circumstances we have done so. In this case, it appears that this old dam was not a structure designed by NRCS and it appears to have been a landowner project where an earth embankment was built with no tube. Mike is working with a contractor to get a rough cost estimate, but it is questionable if we will have any involvement. For LPNNRD to be involved, it appears that the best route may be for Mike to apply for EQIP or SWCP funding to build a new structure designed by NRCS. Mr. Chvatal may attend the September 3rd Projects Committee Meeting to discuss this project.

6.D.4.f. Wahoo to Lake Wanahoo Trail

LPNNRD has approved allowing a portion of the Wahoo to Lake Wanahoo trail to be located on our property with the direction that the trail be located near the south and west boundary just below Lake Wanahoo Dam. Curt

Hohn has requested that the trail footprint be relocated to a diagonal alignment as shown on the attached map. Both city officials and NRD staff support the new alignment as there will be a cost savings to the project, grade (percent slope) will be reduced and drainage will be easier to accommodate. Water

Over 40 individuals (including 5 board members) attended the Richland/Schuyler Phase III Groundwater Management Area meeting on July 22 at the Oak Ballroom. Angle's program reviewed Phase II requirements and then the additional requirements for the Phase III area. We were surprised by how few questions were asked concerning the new areas.

The Project Sense public meeting was held on July 27 in Columbus. It will be interesting to get the yield results at the end of the season. We appreciate the cooperation of Joe Birkel and Matt Bailey for assisting UNL with this nitrogen application project.

Items of Interest

Milkweed availability has been identified as a limiting factor for monarch butterflies. UNL is hosting a Milkweed Watch action group who are establishing milkweed plots across the state with one of the plots being located at Lake Wanahoo. Lon Olson worked with Natalina Bjorklund to get the area located that will include all 16 varieties of milkweed common to Nebraska. The purpose is to create an educational awareness. Bob Heimann is our staff person coordinating the effort.

A recommendation from the Projects Committee will come to the board tonight that will allow realignment of the Wahoo to Lake Wanahoo Trail on our property. The new alignment will shorten the trail and allow for a more moderate grade. Construction of the trail is to take place in 2016.

On July 31 a changing of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Omaha District Commander took place. Col. Joel Cross is leaving and our new Commander is Col. John Henderson. We look forward to working with Col Henderson.

HBE conducted the fieldwork for our annual audit on August 3-7 and were very complementary about the condition of our records. The audit should be completed by October 2 when HBE will meet with our Audit and Executive Committees.

On August 4 the Lower Platte River Corridor Alliance held their quarterly meeting with 3 LPNDRD directors in attendance. Project summaries and updates were given.

Bob Weaver was in Nebraska and toured our active projects immediately after the Alliance meeting. Projects toured included; Western Sarpy/Clear Creek, Upstream Dams, Schuyler Levee, Fremont GI Study and Lake Wanahoo.

Our Budget Workshop was held on August 5 with several adjustments being made. Barring no major changes following our Budget Hearing, we will approve the FY16 Budget later tonight.

The Opening Ceremony for the Wahoo Expressway is scheduled for August 25 at 11:00 p.m. We are planning to add an extra item to the ceremony with the dedication of the "Doug Bereuter Dam". Bereuter was unable to attend the Grand Opening of Lake Wanahoo so we felt this was a great time to recognize his work and leadership on our Sand Creek Project.

Attendance numbers and income continue to increase with our current income over \$9,600 higher compared to last year at this time due to Jason's leadership. Jason recently secured donation of a 27-foot flag pole and concrete for the base for the recreation area.

**Report on Federal Legislation, Appropriations, Agency
Developments, and Other Washington Developments**


- The FY 2017 Energy and Water Appropriations bill passed the full House on May 1, 2015. The Senate is pending before the full Senate. The Administration's FY 2016 budget exceeds prior Congressional sequestration levels. The potential for a Presidential veto of some appropriations bills is growing. Failure by the Congress and the White House to agree on budget levels and appropriations bills for FY 2016, which begins on October 1, 2015, could lead to shut-down of the federal government.
- Litigation on EPA's Waters of the United States Rule has begun in numerous Federal court venues throughout the United States. Implementation by the Corps of Engineers under the Section 404 Permit Program is proceeding at various levels and subject to varying interpretations by Corps staff. The Corps must be held to the limits of the law.
- The Administration's Federal Flood Risk Management Standard ("FFRMS") and Process for Further Soliciting and Considering Stakeholder Input continues. As previously reported, the Executive Order's purposes are to reduce the financial exposure of the Federal Flood Insurance Program and protect flood plains and various forms of existing construction.
- Some halting Congressional staff work continue on the next Water Resources Development Act. This bill could provide an opportunity for authorizing near term or longer-term projects for the LP NRDs.

July, 2014 Accomplishments

- Monitored and continued Congressional contacts on the FY 2016 appropriation process to fund projects for the Lower Platte River Natural Resources Districts.
- Continued contacts with the delegation and other Washington sources on funding for the Lower Platte NRD the Missouri River levee expansion project at Offutt Air Force Base.
- Continued to monitor implementation of the final Waters of the United States rule issued by EPA and the Corps of Engineers.
- Monitored developments for and implementation of the Administration's Flood Plain Standard that is in various ways supportive of funding for the Offutt Air Force base levee.
- Continued work on the Corps of Engineers FY2017 funding requests including for the Lower Platte River Watershed Restoration Project in connection with the Lower Platte River and Tributaries Project.
- Worked on the FY 2017 Lower Platte River NRD projects discussion paper for future discussion with all levels of the Corps and the delegation.
- Prepared reports to the LPRNRDs on Washington developments and future budgeting.
- Conferred with LPRNRD managers.
- Maintained a continuing search for potential funding opportunities for the LPR NRDs.

August 2015 Planned, Anticipated and Potential Actions

- Continue contacts with the Congressional delegation on appropriations and the Corps of Engineers on future budgeting for the Lower Platte River NRDs in FY 2016 Appropriations process and for the developing FY 2017 budget. Continuing priorities include appropriations for the Section 205 Small Flood Control Program, project funding, and sources of federal funding for the Air Force levee and on the Missouri River at Offutt.
- Maintain contacts for LPR NRD projects funding in the developing FY 2017 Corps of Engineers budget particularly Section 205 projects and the potential advancement of the Lower Platte River Watershed Restoration Project authorized in 2007.
- Confer on development of a new Water Resources Development ("WRDA") bill.
- Further monitor and report on developments on the Administration's flood plain rule and the National Flood Insurance Program.
- Meet with USACE on conversion of Section 205 projects to other Water Resource Development Act programs.
- Prepare reports to, and confer with LPR NRD management.
- Continue search for federal funding opportunities and report to LPR NRDs.



Re: Nebraska Educational TV (NET) NRD Video Project

Attached is the working outline of the NET hour long feature on Nebraska NRDs. This is Attachment A of the final contract agreed to between NARD and NET. The outline is the same as the draft outline provided to the NRD managers and NARD Board last month. The working title of the program is "Protecting Lives, Protecting Property and Protecting the Future".

Under the contract, the NARD will be a co-producer of the show, which allows us to all necessary rights to produce (including edits) and distribute the program. We will also provide the content expertise, services, materials and personnel as detailed in Attachment A.

The program will be six segments as follows:

- I. Intro/Overview/History
- II. Water Resource Management (Water Quality and Quantity)
- III. Flood Control, Recreation and Soil Erosion
- IV. Education
- V. Trees and Wildlife Habitat/ Grazing Lands
- VI. Summary - Current state of water and resources in Nebraska

The focus of the program will be on the public benefits Nebraskans receive from the NRDs. This provides an excellent opportunity to produce an educational video that will help all NRDs deliver a positive message. This will include what has been done in the past, what we are doing now and what is planned for the future.

The NARD staff will be responsible for making sure the NRD staff, board members and individuals are at the requested locations for the interviews. NARD will help with preparing individuals being interviewed. One of the points we want to bring up in the production is the ability of local people to be involved with the NRDs to protect natural resources and the economy. Thus, it is going to be crucial that we have members of the public identified to be involved with the video.

Obviously it is not possible to have a focus on every NRD with only an hour long segment. However, we can try to include as many different individual NRDs on the segments as possible. The local NRD spokesperson who covers a topic is going to have to explain that other NRDs have similar programs and, if applicable, give state totals (i.e., total number of trees planted, total number of customers served by rural water projects, etc.).

Here are the timelines and deliverables:

Timeline:

- Field production July through September.
- Script writing and editing October through January
- Completion of program February 1, 2016

NOTES:

- 1) There are provisions in the contract for time extensions, if additional interviews are needed or if there are schedule conflicts to obtain planned interviews.
- 2) A preview of the program will be provided at the NARD Legislative Conference in January.
- 3) We would like to get most of the field interviews done this summer.

Deliverables:

- One 60 minute documentary program for NET Broadcast
- Six video segments from documentary for web placement/DVD use
- 150 DVDs of the program and the six stand-alone segments. Each full participating district will get six copies. Additional copies will be available from NARD.
- Accompanying web page on NET Connects

NET Broadcasts:

The final hour-long show would run six times a month on NET 2 and then ongoing the months following. The average NET television audience is 50% Women 18 and older, 34% Men 18 and older, and 16% children and teens age 2-17. Sixty-six percent of the total audience is age 50 and older. The nature of NET World (NET2) is informational and educational, so those viewers looking to be engaged, active learners know NET World (NET2) is a place where they can find programming that will inform them.

NET has an average of 700,000 television households at any given time across Nebraska and surrounding states.

Broadcast notes:

- Broadcasts will include analog and digital television broadcast
- Cable and Satellite, including all other direct to home delivery and video-on-demand technologies
- Broadband, including internet streaming and file downloading technologies
- NET will also retain rights to video segments to use in any future NET Broadcast.

Cost

The final cost, including the 150 DVDs is \$81,600. At the June 15, 2015 NARD Board Meeting, the board unanimously approved a motion to share the cost equally with the NARD Foundation and each of the 21 NRDs that agreed to participate. The final total cost per participating district is \$3,710, which is outlined in Attachment B. This is slightly higher than originally estimated because two districts decided not to participate (Middle Republican and North Platte) and expanded field location interviews.

A separate invoice will be sent out from the NARD Foundation with a hard copy of this memo.

This is to follow up on your conversation with Ed Hobza, a member of our Fire Department in regard to possible cost sharing by the NRD for a water rescue boat to be used by our Department's Dive Team. An estimate of \$49,750.00 has been received from Clark Boat Company in Bellevue, Iowa for the purchase of a twenty foot rescue/dive boat. The cost estimate includes reinforced plating for shallow water operation, light bar, sirens, dive tank holder, side scan sonar and a galvanized trailer.

The boat was chosen for its ruggedness and versatility in the many types of water bodies in which it will be used. Our Department personnel respond to rescue and recovery dive calls, along with assisting other agencies with surface water and ice rescue incidents throughout the Eastern Nebraska Region, which includes the Missouri, Platte, and Elkhorn Rivers, along with regional area lakes and ponds. The addition of the specialized rescue/dive boat to the Yutan Fire Department's equipment will help to ensure safe and successful rescues and recoveries throughout the areas to which we provide Mutual Aid.

General Description

The Shell Creek Watershed Coordinator is a part time position averaging approximately 20 up to 40 hours per month. Primary duties are to work closely with the Lower Platte North Natural Resources District (LPNNRD) and the Shell Creek Watershed Improvement Group (SCWIG), who is an advisory Sub-Committee to LPNNRD on Shell Creek Watershed priorities. The Coordinator will provide administration of Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund (NET), Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality (NDEQ) and other grants related to the project and work to insure successful development and completion of the Shell Creek Watershed Improvement Group (SCWIG) and Lower Platte North Natural Resources District (LPNNRD) Goals and Objectives. Works closely with SCWIG, LPNNRD Assistant Manager and General Manager to accomplish Shell Creek Watershed business, activities, procedures and proper actions needed in assigned program areas.

Job Responsibilities

1. Organize, schedule and attend SCWIG meetings, as needed, in collaboration with the SCWIG Board Co-Chairs and LPNNRD. Provide verbal and/or written reports to inform SCWIG and LPNNRD members about project progress and any concerns that need to be addressed. Compile and distribute information packets prior to meetings.





We will be sending a follow on funding request for an additional \$100,000 in August 2015, and will be requesting those funds to be provided prior to 30 September to allow efficient continuation of the study into the first quarter of federal fiscal year 2016. A final request for the remaining \$75,000 in non-federal cost share match can be anticipated during spring 2016.

We look forward to launching this important study and working with the Lower Platte North Natural Resources District, the City of Fremont, Village of Inglewood, and Dodge County to finalize a plan for reducing flood risks in the vicinity of Fremont.

ACI Conference Report

July 13-17

Flagstaff, Arizona

The 2015 ACI conference began with a keynote from Chris Sietsema, from a digital marketing consultancy called Convince & Convert. Chris emphasized that “how can we help?” is more important for service-oriented organizations like ours than trying to make our offerings look exciting. Chris returned for a session later in the day with practical suggestions for boosting traffic and engagement with websites & social media.

In the afternoon, a roundtable presentation was held where speakers from several different state agencies highlighted successful programs. The Missouri example was very interesting, as they went through a “rebranding” to make all of their publications, web sites, etc consistent, so it’s obvious at a glance that they all belong to the same agency. We went through a similar “facelift” over the last few years, with all of our brochures, newsletters, websites, letterhead, business cards, etc. being brought into alignment.

The highlight of the day (and the conference) was a presentation from Steve Elliot, a journalism professor at Arizona State. His presentation, “Tight Writing: Making Every Word Count”, was an excellent refresher course on how to avoid jargon, cliches, and wordiness in our publications.

On Wednesday, the conference took a field trip to the Grand Canyon. Chris Parish from The Peregrine Fund and Allen Zufelt from the Arizona Game and Fish Department gave a very interesting presentation on recovery efforts for the endangered California condor. While the species was successfully bred in captivity and reintroduced to the wild over the past two decades, they were still seeing a very high mortality rate. Eventually they discovered that many of the birds were dying from lead poisoning, caused by feeding on gut piles from game animals that had been shot. Working with hunting and firearms groups, they started a program that allows hunters to receive free copper ammo. By avoiding a strict regulatory approach, they’ve seen great uptake of the program from hunters.

Following the condor presentation, photojournalist Chuck Emmert gave a presentation on how to create compelling videos using just a smartphone. This would be a good way to create some short, simple videos for the NRD (how to properly plant a tree or take a water sample, for example).

In the afternoon we had free time to explore the Grand Canyon before returning to Flagstaff. One interesting note, the park has banned pre-packaged plastic water bottles. You are allowed to bring in your own bottle and refill at one of the park’s water stations, but not bring in bottled water. They also have numerous water-saving measures in place (for instance, water-free enzymatic urinals).

On the final day of the conference, there were sessions on social media, digital marketing, and managing digital assets (photos, videos, etc). A communications roundtable was held in the afternoon and focused on an excellent marketing campaign from the Arizona Game & Fish Department. This campaign uses simple, stark images of wildlife on billboards and compelling human interest stories in video and audio spots to promote hunting and wildlife conservation. The entire campaign revolves around the idea that hunters, mountain bikers, bird watchers, and

other outdoor enthusiasts have helped conserve and protect Arizona's wildlife. You can see many of the videos and find out more at <http://gameandfishfacts.com>.

Finally, at the awards banquet that concluded the conference, Nebraska was very well-represented, with the Game and Parks Commission taking home 9 awards in various categories (photography, feature writing, and more).

Overall it was an excellent conference with a lot of useful tips and ideas. Thank you to the board for the opportunity to attend.

This letter is a supplement to the variance request for a new well I am submitting to be drilled in 7-18N-2E Colfax County. This parcel of land is currently irrigated and is certified irrigated by the Lower Platte North NRD. The land is irrigated from my neighbor's well Bryce Grotelueschen. Bryce has the well and pivot and it completes the circle on my land. Bryce and I had an agreement for him to irrigate my land. Recently Bryce and I had a rent dispute and now we are no longer working together. In fact we may end up litigating the issue so I request privacy from the NRD in this matter.

I am requesting this new well so that I can continue to irrigate my land. I did not grow up a farmer. This land is the first piece of land I bought and I still owe money on it. In order to continue making my payments I need to be able to irrigate it. I am paying irrigated tax rates on the land and have been for some time. The farm will not cash flow without being irrigated and I do not want to lose the land.

With installation of the new well I will not be irrigating any more land that is currently being irrigated, just irrigating what I have been all along. In fact, the pivot currently being used passes over the creek to the east of the property and the new pivot location will not pass over the creek at all. It is not good stewardship to water a creek and creek bank. This new location will eliminate this completely. The new configuration will actually save at least 15 acre inches annually from being wasted down the creek! Additionally, the new well will have a flow meter, soil moisture probes and possibly telemetry to stop the pump and pivot remotely. I teach irrigation water management for the USDA and I plan on making this site the model for the area in regards to irrigation water management if you allow me to drill this well. We have a long way to go in irrigation water management and I am at the forefront of that cause.

Please consider this variance request so that I can continue to farm. Let me know if you have any questions.

Tom,

I have reviewed the information and documentation you provided. While this entity has a "constitution" and "by-laws" I would take the position that it is still just an advisory subcommittee of the Lower Platte North NRD. As a result, any claims against it should be directed to the NRD rather than in the name of the "Shell Creek Watershed Improvement Group" which technically doesn't exist as a separate entity.

In a perfect world it would make sense for the District to:

- 1) I would suggest that you begin by asking LARM for a written coverage opinion as it relates to both your E&O coverage for the appointees as well as any lawsuits brought against the NRD and/or the advisory group for property damages claims. I will be honest in that I'm not sure you have insurance coverage based on the way I understand LARM's insurance to work.
- 2) Discuss with the board LARM's coverage opinion;
- 3) Have the chair formally appoint SCWI as an advisory subcommittee for the District;
- 4) Ask for the board to affirm the chair's appointments;
- 5) Restructure the "Constitution" and "By-laws" as informal policies established by the advisory subcommittee. This cleans up the fact that SCWI created documents which on their face purport to bind the group (in fact only the NRD has that authority). The board can later ratify those policies if you want.
- 6) Going forward it will then be key that this advisory subcommittee doesn't take any action on behalf of the NRD but rather only makes recommendations to the NRD.

I believe the above actions are necessary in order to protect against the argument that this entity is an unincorporated charitable association under Nebraska Revised Statutes 21-608 et. seq.

POLICIES:

Policy 1. Purpose of SCWIG

The purpose of the Shell Creek Watershed Improvement Group (SCWIG) is to function as an informal advisory subcommittee to the Lower Platte North Natural Resources District (LPNNRD). SCWIG is not intended to serve either as an unincorporated non-profit organization, a separate legal entity, or a voting committee of LPNNRD. As such, SCWIG is not permitted to take any independent action on behalf of LPNNRD. Rather, SCWIG's primary function is to make recommendations to, and assist, LPNNRD in the following areas:

1. Co-ordinate efforts throughout the Shell Creek Watershed to reduce flooding and manage water runoff to reduce soil erosion and sedimentation;
2. Co-ordinate efforts and create opportunities to reinstate and/or establish land into vegetative cover or other similar programs in the Shell Creek Watershed;
3. Co-ordinate efforts and create opportunities to establish water control and impoundment structures in the Shell Creek Watershed; and
4. Co-ordinate efforts to improve surface and groundwater quality in the Shell Creek Watershed.

SCWIG recommendations will be brought before the LPNNRD Projects Committee for potential consideration by the full LPNNRD Board of Directors.

Policy 2. SCWIG Officers and Area Representatives

SCWIG subcommittee membership is voluntary and will consist of residents, landowners and farm operators within the Shell Creek Watershed boundaries located in Boone, Madison, Platte and Colfax counties. In addition, subcommittee membership will be sought from the city councils or village boards of the four communities primarily affected by the watershed; those being Newman Grove, Lindsay, Platte Center, and Schuyler. SCWIG members may present information and ideas, and discuss or debate items presented by other members and the public.

SCWIG subcommittee members will nominate officers and up to 10 area representatives for LPNNRD confirmation as follows:

Officers:

Co-Chair

Co-chair

Secretary

Representatives:

Boone County 2

Madison County 1

Platte County 3

Colfax County 2

At-large 2

Terms for Officers and Representatives will generally be at least two years, but may be longer as recommended by SCWIG and approved by LPNNRD.

Policy 3. Subcommittee Meetings

Subcommittee meetings will be held on a regular basis as determined necessary by SCWIG and LPNNRD. An annual meeting will be held in January of each year to nominate and select SCWIG officers and representatives by majority vote. Selected nominees will be presented to LPNNRD for confirmation.

Policy 4. Subcommittee Recommendations

SCWIG will vote on presented recommendations for LPNNRD's consideration. A majority of the subcommittee must be present to vote on and forward approved recommendations to LPNNRD. All votes will be conducted by either voice vote, show of hands or roll call.

Policy 5. Policy Amendments

SCWIG may recommend policy additions or amendments to LPNNRD by a two-third vote of the subcommittee. LPNNRD will consider all recommended SCWIG subcommittee policies and amendments for potential adoption.

General Description

The Shell Creek Watershed Coordinator is a part time position averaging approximately 20 up to 40 hours per month. Primary duties are to work closely with the Lower Platte North Natural Resources District (LPNNRD) and the Shell Creek Watershed Improvement Group (SCWIG), who is an advisory Sub-Committee to LPNNRD on Shell Creek Watershed priorities. The Coordinator will provide administration of Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund (NET), Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality (NDEQ) and other grants related to the project and work to insure successful development and completion of the Shell Creek Watershed Improvement Group (SCWIG) and Lower Platte North Natural Resources District (LPNNRD) Goals and Objectives. Works closely with SCWIG, LPNNRD Assistant Manager and General Manager to accomplish Shell Creek Watershed business, activities, procedures and proper actions needed in assigned program areas.

Job Responsibilities

1. Organize, schedule and attend SCWIG meetings, as needed, in collaboration with the SCWIG Board Co-Chairs and LPNNRD. Provide verbal and/or written reports to inform SCWIG and LPNNRD members about project progress and any concerns that need to be addressed. Compile and distribute information packets prior to meetings.
2. Prepare all necessary reports, quarterly and otherwise, as requested by the NET, NDEQ, and others to insure proper administration, utilization and expense documentation of the grant funds provided to LPNNRD.
3. Assist with coordination and oversight of the timely distribution of Best Management Practice and Project Payments from the NETF and NDEQ grants. Some payments are issued on a regular basis and others are issued after installation of certified practices. Land treatment assistance is provided by the SCWIG to land owner/operators who qualify for incentive program payments.
4. Maintain and report grant status and balances to LPNNRD and SCWIG. Monitor account balances and consult with LPNNRD if fund transfers need to be made.
5. Assist with targeted mailings, landowner meetings, newsletters, press releases and other media sources to provide information and education to the Shell Creek

landowners/operators regarding LPNNRD and SCWIG Goals and Objectives, the resource inventory process, cost-share programs and technical assistance.

6. Assist with follow-up to insure timely completion of all paperwork, payments and documentation regarding land owner/operator assistance programs.
7. On occasion, attend LPNNRD Projects Committee Meetings and/or Board Meetings as needed, to inform LPNNRD members about project progress and any concerns that need to be addressed.
8. Provide coordination and technical support to Schools involved with Shell Creek Water Quality Sampling and Assessment.
9. Work closely with NRCS and LPNNRD to update and maintain program and project spreadsheets.

Monthly Report for July 2015

Two Rivers Obstruction Removal

A bid opening was held on Thursday, July 9th at 2 p.m. at LPSNRD in Lincoln. The LPRCA received two bids with the low bid being Hawkins Construction. The LPSNRD Board, on behalf of the LPRCA approved the bid and a contract with Hawkins Construction at their July Board of Directors Meeting. A pre-construction meeting on-site was held on July 30th. The Corps approved the final plans for the temporary bridge and signage during the last week of July. NGPC staff at Two Rivers SRA has closed a portion of the campground and the entire campground will be closed after Labor Day. Hawkins Construction began bringing in their equipment and constructing the access road and staging areas beginning August 1st. A second on-site meeting is planned for Friday, August 14th at 9 a.m. at Two Rivers. The demolition work in the river is slated to begin on Monday August 17th. Hawkins hopes to have all five of the concrete and rebar piers removed by December 23rd if all goes to plan.

Events

The LPRCA Kayak Tour was held on Tuesday, July 21st. Thirty-seven participants joined the LPRCA for the 5.8 mile paddle from Schramm Park SRA to the highway 50 boat ramp near Louisville. Flows were just above average for July and it was a perfect summer day with highs only in the low 80s. At the mid-point of the paddle, we stopped on a sandbar. I presented some information about the LPRCA and the lower Platte in general. I also spent time discussing the recreation plan and the obstruction removal project. Mike Reed of Douglas County discussed the work of the Lower Platte Weed Management Area. We then continued on back to highway 50 and went to Louisville SRA for a lunch provided by FYRA Engineering. Bruce Dvorak from UNL Nebraska Water Center will provide the keynote presentation at 10 a.m. Dr. Dvorak received a grant from the EPA to assess available technology and needed information for small water systems. SCHUYLER, NE SECTION 205 PROJECT
CESSATION OF DESIGN WORK ON THE PLATTE RIVER LEVEE

July 2015



I. OVERVIEW

Current work on the design of a levee to protect Schuyler from Platte River flooding will be halted under this Section 205 Project after compiling digital files of the design and analysis efforts to date. The design work is being brought to a pause for now due to the lack of funds current available under the existing Section 205 Project to complete the design and build the levee. The decision to cease work for the present was made jointly by the Levee Partners at a working session of the Schuyler City Council on the evening of 12 May 2015. Efforts to restart work to reduce the flood risk to Schuyler from the Platte River may be made in the future, most likely under a separate Section 205 Project authorization.

II. SUMMARY OF THE SCHUYLER SECTION 205 PROJECT

The Schuyler, NE Flood Risk Project began after floodplain map revisions placed more of Schuyler in the floodplain. The change in the floodplain boundaries resulted from an upward revision of discharges at the North Bend gage for the range of frequencies including the 100-year event. Also, an evaluation of ice jam floods along the lower Platte River in 1994 pointed to the potential for higher flood stages due to ice jams which could lead to flanking of the revetment southwest of Schuyler.

The first study product was an Initial Assessment that resulted in a report which was completed in April of 2003. That report recommended that a cost-shared Feasibility Study be conducted. The Feasibility Cost Share Agreement was signed on September 29, 2005. Work began on the study of the Platte River flooding issue and confirmed that most of Schuyler south of the UPRR tracks was in the floodplain.

In May of 2008 a major Shell Creek flood inundated northeastern Schuyler. As a tributary to the Platte which enters the River just downstream of the city, the flood issues presented by Shell Creek at Schuyler were deemed a legitimate problem to study within the scope of the Cost Share Agreement.

There were "no new Section 205 starts" permitted nationally from 1 October 2005 until 2011, so there was not an option to split the Schuyler work into separate

Section 205 Studies; one for the Platte River and one for Shell Creek. A Shell Creek flood struck in June 2010 which did nearly as much damage to Schuyler as the 2008 flood, even though it was found to result from a much more frequent flood discharge. Those two floods resulted in readjusted priorities in the urgency of solving the flood problems caused by Shell Creek and the Platte River. The conclusion was that the Shell Creek flood threat needed to be solved as soon as possible and the Shell Creek Levee became a priority over dealing with the Platte River flood threat. Available data indicates that Platte River flooding occurs much less frequently than Shell Creek flooding. The Feasibility Study was approved with estimated B/C Ratios of > 4.0 for a Shell Creek Levee and > 3.0 for a Platte River Levee.

A Project Partnering Agreement was signed with the City of Schuyler at the end of September 2011 and both levees moved into the Design Phase. An updated cost estimate prepared for the Value Engineering Study, performed on the levee designs in November 2012, indicated that the cost to build the Platte River Levee was nearly double what had been anticipated in Feasibility. The increased cost estimate resulted from several factors related to levee safety, which resulted in the realization that much more levee material would be needed for the levee itself, and for additional berms needed to contain Lost Creek overflows diverted at the levee. Higher cost estimates for the water control structures, Highway 15 Road Closure structure and the exterior drainage overflow culverts further increased the potential cost of the Platte River levee. There was opposition from those living riverward of the levee as indications showed that for some dwellings upstream of Highway 15, stage increases of ½ foot or more might be anticipated during the 100-year flood.

A priority was put on building the Shell Creek levee first, due to the recent floods the community experienced in 2008 and 2010. Though the updated cost estimate prepared for the VE Study had also indicated similar cost growth for the Shell Creek Levee, when the Shell Creek Levee design was completed there were 13 bids to construct that levee and the costs came in closer to what had been estimated in the Feasibility Study. The low bid for the Shell Creek Levee was awarded to TJC Engineering (Contract #: W9128F-13-C-0024) for the amount of \$3,077,595, including the executed option, in October 2013. The Shell Creek Levee was substantially complete in May 2015 and a ribbon-cutting ceremony was held. The contractor is scheduled to complete all remaining work, consisting of minor drainage adjustments, on the levee system in August 2015.

During the time that construction was moving forward on the Shell Creek levee, the Platte River Levee design was being refined with field surveys and soil borings. Stemming from the VE Study with the revised higher cost of Alignment A (Figure 1), the focus shifted back to Alignment B (Figure 2), as the two had been relatively close in cost and benefits at the end of the Feasibility Study. Subsequently, 30% design drawings were developed for both the PR-A and PR-B alignments. Both the Shell Creek project and Platte River project shared the same Computer Aided Design (CAD) directory. The CAD directory allocated for the Schuyler design was LP35.

Many challenges cropped up relative Alignment B as the Platte River Levee design progressed, due to the small available footprint for the levee between Lost Creek and the Oak Ballroom and the Park View Convenience Mart. Floodwall and sheet pile costs along Lost Creek in that area became a significant cost driver for revisions of Levee Alignment B. Alternative alignments which included moving Lost Creek were evaluated by the team, but environmental remediation costs for relocating Lost Creek were found to be in the millions of dollars. By the time that the Shell Creek levee was complete, the majority of the authorized \$7,000,000 in Federal funding for the project had been spent on both levees, leaving the amount of Federal funds that could be spent on completing the design and then building the Platte River levee insufficient for the task.

III. RECENT BACKGROUND LEADING TO DECISION TO PAUSE DESIGN WORK

A. CURRENT STATUS OF DESIGN

A 30% Design had been completed and a cost estimate prepared for an alignment north of Lost Creek with a long floodwall section as shown in Figure 2, in addition to the design for the levee alignment south of Lost Creek. The cost of the northern levee with the long floodwall was estimated to be \$21,149,000, which is too high from a number of perspectives. The city has stated they cannot afford it. Additionally, given the project economics in Feasibility, the BC ratio would be close to 1.0 or even less for such an expensive structure.

B. PROPOSED NEXT STEP IN THE DESIGN

Given the lack of affordability and the questionable Federal Interest of the expensive design, the Design Team Proposed to evaluate what would be the lowest cost Platte River Levee. It was determined that the lowest cost alignment would likely be one set back from Lost Creek either side of Highway 15 as shown by the purple line in Figure 3:



Figure 3: Portion of Platte River Levee Showing an Alignment Set Back from Lost Creek

C. LETTER TO SCHUYLER

1. Following discussions during the weekly Schuyler Levee Partner's Conference Calls it became evident that the likely lowest cost alignment well north of Lost Creek which cuts across the southern part of the city leaving the Oak Ballroom, park facilities and the Parkview Convenience Store on the wet side of the levee would likely not be acceptable to the citizens of Schuyler. Subsequently, the Corps sent a letter to the City to clarify the situation. The purpose of the letter to Schuyler was to obtain an official response on

whether the City wanted the design team to continue to a stopping point with the levee design work in an effort that would require spending an estimated \$111,400 in cost shared funds.

2. A copy of that letter is provided below. The City of Schuyler addressed the proposal for the levee, set back from Lost Creek, at a City Council Meeting in April 2015. There was no consensus to proceed with the design of a setback levee that did not have public acceptance. The Schuyler City Council then asked the Corps Design Team to discuss options with them at a May 12th City Council Meeting.

The purpose of this letter is to document the joint decision of the Schuyler Levee cost-share partners to bring the Platte River Levee design effort to an orderly pause, while all concerned pursue the funds needed to carry the design to construction at a later date. During the meeting held on February 12, 2015 at the Lower Platte North NRD Office in Wahoo, NE, it was jointly decided to incorporate changes to the current 30% design of the Platte River Levee, provide for district technical review and then document the design assumptions and calculations. The focus of the changes is to reduce the estimated cost of the Platte River Levee. The changes to be incorporated include reducing the amount of relatively more expensive floodwall by setting the levee back from the banks of Lost Creek for part of its length, which would also include moving the Highway 15 levee closure structure northward from the Lost Creek Bridge.

Present plans are to resume work on refining the 30% design of the Platte River Levee in April. Review of the design and accompanying Design Documentation Report would be conducted by the Levee Sponsors as well as an Omaha District team of supervisors and subject matter experts. Once revisions resulting from the reviews are incorporated, the design effort would be on hold until sufficient funds can be obtained by all parties to carry the design to completion, develop specifications and contract for the construction of the levee. It is estimated that this additional design work would conclude by the end of 2015 and would cost roughly \$111,400, to be cost shared 65-35 using funding currently available.

Accompanying this letter is the proposed lower-cost Platte River Levee alignment (option 3 on the enclosed map). Please let us know if our plans for the Platte River Levee and the funding of the 30% design effort are acceptable to you.

C. WHAT WAS PRESENTED

Information was presented to “tell the story” of how the Design Team arrived at the most recent design that resulted in a \$21,149,000 cost estimate.

Information on the flood threat, the Initial Assessment, Feasibility Study, VE Study and several successive 30% levee designs was handed out and discussed.

D. CONCLUSION

The Schuyler City Council voted to halt the design effort on the Platte River Levee until better funding; local, state and federal could be brought to resolve the design issues and build the levee. It was noted that by the time the funding was acquired to continue, it could be several years, and anything that was done on the levee at the present time could end up being superseded by future conditions or Federal regulations not envisioned in 2015.

The Schuyler City Council also decided on a preferred alignment for the Platte River Levee, which is the two mile long levee north of Lost Creek with floodwall where required. This design would be similar to the levee alignment B, which is shown in Figure 2, but would have less floodwall and revisions to reduce the construction cost. This option would keep the Parkview One Stop, the Oak Ballroom and the Golf Course Clubhouse on the dry side of the levee.

As a result, the Schuyler City Council deemed that the prudent thing to do was to balance the books at the end of the Shell Creek Levee Construction and the subsequent inspections, LOMR and O&M Manual completion. The cash returned could be used to retire the bonds issued for the Shell Creek Levee Construction. The city did ask that we provide them a digital copy of the work done to date on the Platte River Levee design. The Corps Team and Managers and Directors of the Lower Platte North were in agreement with the City's decision.

E. RECOMMENDATION

All work will halt on the Platte River Levee Design. A minimum amount of funding will be used by the PDT to accumulate design work by technical discipline and either CDs or a download site will be provided to the City so that they can have the information for later use when design work resumes on the Platte River Levee.

V. **RECOMMENDED REMAINING PLATTE RIVER LEVEE TASKS FOR CORPS PDT**

PM will direct the PDT to accumulate the most recent and pertinent design, cost and related information on a location on Branch Shared drive. That information will be forwarded to the City of Schuyler and the Lower Platte North NRD.






