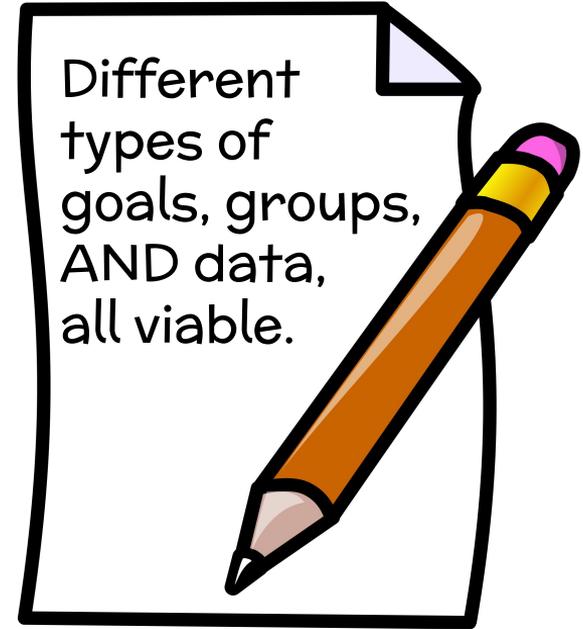

410 - FAMILY AND MEDICAL LEAVE POLICY

[Note: School districts are required by statute to have a policy addressing these issues.]

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to provide for family and medical leave to school district employees in accordance with the Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (FMLA) and also with parenting leave under state law.

II. GENERAL STATEMENT OF POLICY

The following procedures and policies regarding family and medical leave are adopted by the school district, pursuant to the requirements of the FMLA and consistent with the requirements of the Minnesota parenting leave laws.

III. DEFINITIONS

A. "Covered active duty" means:

1. in the case of a member of a regular component of the Armed Forces, duty during the deployment of the member with the Armed Forces to a foreign country; and
2. in the case of a member of a reserve component of the Armed Forces, duty during the deployment of the member with the Armed Forces to a foreign country under a call or order to active duty under a provision of law referred to in 10 U.S.C. § 101(a)(13)(B).

B. "Covered servicemember" means:

1. a member of the Armed Forces, including a member of the National Guard or Reserves, who is undergoing medical treatment, recuperation, or therapy, is otherwise in outpatient status, or is otherwise on the temporary disability retired list, for a serious injury or illness; or
2. a covered veteran who is undergoing medical treatment, recuperation, or therapy for a serious injury or illness and who was a member of the Armed Forces, including a member of the National Guard or Reserves, and was discharged or released under conditions other than dishonorable, at any time during the period of five years preceding the first date the eligible employee takes FMLA leave to care for the covered veteran.

C. "Eligible employee" means an employee who has been employed by the school district for a total of at least 12 months and who has been employed for at least 1,250 hours of service during the 12-month period immediately preceding the commencement of the leave. An employee returning from fulfilling his or her Uniformed Services Employment and Reemployment Rights Act (USERRA)-covered service obligation shall be credited with the hours of service that would have been performed but for the period of absence from work due to or necessitated by USERRA-covered service. In determining whether the employee met the hours of

service requirement, and to determine the hours that would have been worked during the period of absence from work due to or necessitated by USERRA-covered service, the employee's pre-service work schedule can generally be used for calculations. While the 12 months of employment need not be consecutive, employment periods prior to a break in service of seven years or more may not be counted unless the break is occasioned by the employee's fulfillment of his or her USERRA-covered service obligation or a written agreement, including a collective bargaining agreement, exists concerning the school district's intention to rehire the employee after the break in service.

- D. "Military caregiver leave" means leave taken to care for a covered servicemember with a serious injury or illness.

- E. "Next of kin of a covered servicemember" means the nearest blood relative other than the covered servicemember's spouse, parent, son, or daughter, in the following order of priority: blood relatives who have been granted legal custody of the covered servicemember by court decree or statutory provisions, brothers and sisters, grandparents, aunts and uncles, and first cousins, unless the covered servicemember has specifically designated in writing another blood relative as his or her nearest blood relative for purposes of military caregiver leave under the FMLA. When no such designation is made and there are multiple family members with the same level of relationship to the covered servicemember, all such family members shall be considered the covered servicemember's next of kin, and the employee may take FMLA leave to provide care to the covered servicemember, either consecutively or simultaneously. When such designation has been made, the designated individual shall be deemed to be the covered servicemember's only next of kin.

- F. "Outpatient status" means, with respect to a covered servicemember who is a current member of the Armed Forces, the status of a member of the Armed Forces assigned to:
 - 1. a military medical treatment facility as an outpatient; or
 - 2. a unit established for the purpose of providing command and control of members of the Armed Forces receiving care as outpatients.

- G. "Qualifying exigency" means a situation where the eligible employee seeks leave for one or more of the following reasons:
 - 1. to address any issues that arise from a short-notice deployment (seven calendar days or less) of a covered military member;
 - 2. to attend military events and related activities of a covered military member;
 - 3. to address issues related to childcare and school activities of a covered military member's child;
 - 4. to address financial and legal arrangements for a covered military member;
 - 5. to attend counseling provided by someone other than a health care provider for oneself, a covered military member, or his/her child;
 - 6. to spend up to 15 calendar days with a covered military member who is on short-term, temporary rest and recuperation leave during a period of deployment;
 - 7. to attend post-deployment activities related to a covered military member;

8. to address parental care needs; and
 9. to address other events related to a covered military member that both the employee and school district agree is a qualifying exigency.
- H. "Serious health condition" means an illness, injury, impairment, or physical or mental condition that involves:
1. inpatient care in a hospital, hospice, or residential medical care facility; or
 2. continuing treatment by a health care provider.
- I. "Spouse" means a husband or wife. For purposes of this definition, husband or wife refers to the other person with whom an individual entered into marriage as defined or recognized under state law for purposes of marriage in the state in which the marriage was entered into or, in the case of a marriage entered into outside of any state, if the marriage is valid in the place where entered into and could have been entered into in at least one state. This definition includes an individual in a same-sex or common law marriage that either: (1) was entered into in a state that recognizes such marriages; or (2) if entered into outside of any state, is valid in the place where entered into and could have been entered into in at least one state.
- J. "Veteran" has the meaning given in 38 U.S.C. § 101.

IV. LEAVE ENTITLEMENT

A. Twelve-week Leave under Federal Law

1. Eligible employees are entitled to a total of 12 work weeks of unpaid family or medical leave during the applicable 12-month period as defined below, plus any additional leave as required by law. Leave may be taken for one or more of the following reasons in accordance with applicable law:
 - a. birth of the employee's child and to care for such child;
 - b. placement of an adopted child or foster child with the employee;
 - c. to care for the employee's spouse, son, daughter, or parent with a serious health condition;
 - d. the employee's serious health condition makes the employee unable to perform the functions of the employee's job; and/or
 - e. any qualifying exigency arising from the employee's spouse, son, daughter, or parent being on covered active duty, or notified of an impending call or order to covered active duty in the Armed Forces.
2. For the purposes of this policy, "year" is defined as a rolling 12-month period measured backward from the date an employee's leave is to commence.
3. An employee's entitlement to FMLA leave for the birth, adoption, or foster care of a child expires at the end of the 12-month period beginning on the date of the birth or placement.
4. A "serious health condition" typically requires either inpatient care or continuing treatment by or under the supervision of a health care provider, as defined by

applicable law. Family and medical leave generally is not intended to cover short-term conditions for which treatment and recovery are very brief.

5. A "serious injury or illness," in the case of a member of the Armed Forces including a member of the National Guard or Reserves, means:
 - a. Injury or illness that was incurred by the member in the line of duty on active duty in the Armed Forces or that existed before the beginning of the member's active duty and was aggravated by service in the line of duty on active duty in the Armed Forces and that may render the member medically unfit to perform the duties of the member's office, grade, rank, or rating; and
 - b. in the case of a covered veteran who was a member of the Armed Forces, including a member of the National Guard or Reserves, at any time, during the period of five years preceding the date on which the veteran undergoes the medical treatment, recuperation, or therapy, means a qualifying injury or illness that was incurred by the member in the line of duty on active duty in the Armed Forces or that existed before the beginning of the member's active duty and was aggravated by service in the line of duty in the Armed Forces and that manifested itself before or after the member became a veteran, and is:
 - (1) a continuation of a serious injury or illness that was incurred or aggravated when the covered veteran was a member of the Armed Forces and rendered the servicemember unable to perform the duties of the servicemember's office, grade, rank, or rating; or
 - (2) a physical or mental condition for which the covered veteran has received a U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs Service-Related Disability (VASRD) rating of 50 percent or greater and such VASRD rating is based, in whole or in part, on the condition precipitating the need for military caregiver leave; or
 - (3) a physical or mental condition that substantially impairs the covered veteran's ability to secure or follow a substantially gainful occupation by reason of a disability or disabilities related to military service, or would do so absent treatment; or
 - (4) an injury, including a psychological injury, on the basis of which the covered veteran has been enrolled in the Department of Veteran Affairs Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers.
6. Eligible spouses employed by the school district are limited to an aggregate of 12 weeks of leave during any 12-month period for the birth and care of a newborn child or adoption of a child, the placement of a child for foster care, or to care for a parent. This limitation for spouses employed by the school district does not apply to leave taken: by one spouse to care for the other spouse who is seriously ill; to care for a child with a serious health condition; because of the employee's own serious health condition; or pursuant to Paragraph IV.A.1.e. above.
7. Depending on the type of leave, intermittent or reduce schedule leave may be granted in the discretion of the school district or when medically necessary. However, part-time employees are only eligible for a pro-rata portion of leave to be used on an intermittent or reduced schedule basis, based on their

average hours worked per week. Where an intermittent or reduced schedule leave is foreseeable based on planned medical treatment, the school district may transfer the employee temporarily to an available alternative position for which the employee is qualified and which better accommodates recurring periods of leave than does the employee's regular position, and which has equivalent pay and benefits.

8. If an employee requests a leave for the serious health condition of the employee or the employee's spouse, child, or parent, the employee will be required to submit sufficient medical certification. In such a case, the employee must submit the medical certification within 15 days from the date of the request or as soon as practicable under the circumstances.
9. If the school district has reason to doubt the validity of a health care provider's certification, it may require a second opinion at the school district's expense. If the opinions of the first and second health care providers differ, the school district may require certification from a third health care provider at the school district's expense. An employee may also be required to present a certification from a health care provider indicating that the employee is able to return to work.
10. Requests for leave shall be made to the school district. When leave relates to an employee's spouse, son, daughter, parent, or covered servicemember being on covered active duty, or notified of an impending call or order to covered active duty pursuant to Paragraph IV.A.1.e. above, and such leave is foreseeable, the employee shall provide reasonable and practical notice to the school district of the need for leave. For all other leaves, employees must give 30 days' written notice of a leave of absence where practicable. The failure to provide the required notice may result in a delay of the requested leave. Employees are expected to make a reasonable effort to schedule leaves resulting from planned medical treatment so as not to disrupt unduly the operations of the school district, subject to and in coordination with the health care provider.
11. The school district may require that a request for leave under Paragraph IV.A.1.e. above be supported by a copy of the covered military member's active duty orders or other documentation issued by the military indicating active duty or a call to active duty status and the dates of active duty service. In addition, the school district may require the employee to provide sufficient certification supporting the qualifying exigency for which leave is requested.
12. During the period of a leave permitted under this policy, the school district will provide health insurance under its group health plan under the same conditions coverage would have been provided had the employee not taken the leave. The employee will be responsible for payment of the employee contribution to continue group health insurance coverage during the leave. An employee's failure to make necessary and timely contributions may result in termination of coverage. An employee who does not return to work after the leave may be required, in some situations, to reimburse the school district for the cost of the health plan premiums paid by it.
13. The school district may request or require the employee to substitute accrued paid leave for any part of the 12-week period. Employees may be allowed to substitute paid leave for unpaid leave by meeting the requirements set out in the administrative directives and guidelines established for the implementation of this policy, if any. Employees eligible for leave must comply with the family and medical leave directives and guidelines prior to starting leave. The superintendent shall be responsible to develop directives and guidelines as necessary to implement this policy. Such directives and guidelines shall be submitted to the school board for annual review.

The school district shall comply with written notice requirements as set forth in federal regulations.

14. Employees returning from a leave permitted under this policy are eligible for reinstatement in the same or an equivalent position as provided by law. However, the employee has no greater right to reinstatement or to other benefits and conditions of employment than if the employee had been continuously employed during the leave.

B. Twelve-week Leave under State Law

An employee who does not qualify for parenting leave under Paragraphs IV.A.1.a. or IV.A.1.b. above may qualify for a 12-week unpaid leave which is available to a biological or adoptive parent in conjunction with the birth or adoption of a child, or to a female employee for prenatal care or incapacity due to pregnancy, childbirth, or related health conditions. The length of the leave shall be determined by the employee but must not exceed 12 weeks unless agreed by the employer. This leave is separate and exclusive of the family and medical leave described in the preceding paragraphs but may be reduced by any period of paid parental, disability, personal, or medical, or sick leave, or accrued vacation provided by the employer so that the total leave does not exceed 12 weeks, unless agreed by the employer, or leave taken for the same purpose under the FMLA. The leave taken under this section shall begin at a time requested by the employee. An employee who plans to take leave under this section must give the employer reasonable notice of the date the leave shall commence and the estimated duration of the leave. For leave taken by a biological or adoptive parent in conjunction with the birth or adoption of a child, the leave must begin within 12 months of the birth or adoption; except that, in the case where the child must remain in the hospital longer than the mother, the leave must begin within 12 months after the child leaves the hospital.

C. Twenty-six-week Servicemember Family Military Leave

1. An eligible employee who is the spouse, son, daughter, parent, or next of kin of a covered servicemember shall be entitled to a total of 26 work weeks of leave during a 12-month period to care for the servicemember. The leave described in this paragraph shall be available only during a single 12-month period. For purposes of this leave, the need to care for a servicemember includes both physical and psychological care.
2. During a single 12-month period, an employee shall be entitled to a combined total of 26 work weeks of leave under Paragraphs IV.A. and IV.C. above.
3. The 12-month period referred to in this section begins on the first day the eligible employee takes leave to care for a covered servicemember and ends 12 months after that date.
4. Eligible spouses employed by the school district are limited to an aggregate of 26 weeks of leave during any 12-month period if leave is taken for birth of the employee's child or to care for the child after birth; for placement of a child with the employee for adoption or foster care or to care for the child after placement; to care for the employee's parent with a serious health condition;; or to care for a covered servicemember with a serious injury or illness.
5. The school district may request or require the employee to substitute accrued paid leave for any part of the 26-week period. Employees may be allowed to substitute paid leave for unpaid leave by meeting the requirements set out in the administrative directives and guidelines established for the implementation of this policy, if any. Employees eligible for leave must comply with the family and medical leave directives and guidelines prior to starting leave.

6. An employee will be required to submit sufficient medical certification issued by the health care provider of the covered servicemember and other information in support of requested leave and eligibility for such leave under this section within 15 days from the date of the request or as soon as practicable under the circumstances.
7. The provisions of Paragraphs IV.A.7., IV.A.10., IV.A.12., IV.A.13., and IV.A.14. above shall apply to leaves under this section.

V. SPECIAL RULES FOR INSTRUCTIONAL EMPLOYEES

- A. An instructional employee is one whose principal function is to teach and instruct students in a class, a small group, or an individual setting. This includes, but is not limited to, teachers, coaches, driver's education instructors, and special education assistants.
- B. Instructional employees who request foreseeable medically necessary intermittent or reduced work schedule leave greater than 20 percent of the work days in the leave period may be required to:
 1. take leave for the entire period or periods of the planned medical treatment; or
 2. move to an available alternative position for which the employee is qualified, and which provides equivalent pay and benefits, but not necessarily equivalent duties.
- C. Instructional employees who request continuous leave near the end of a semester may be required to extend the leave through the end of the semester. The number of weeks remaining before the end of a semester does not include scheduled school breaks, such as summer, winter, or spring break.
 1. If an instructional employee begins leave for any purpose more than five weeks before the end of a semester and it is likely the leave will last at least three weeks, the school district may require that the leave be continued until the end of the semester.
 2. If the employee begins leave for a purpose other than the employee's own serious health condition during the last five weeks of a semester, the school district may require that the leave be continued until the end of the semester if the leave will last more than two weeks or if the employee's return from leave would occur during the last two weeks of the semester.
 3. If the employee begins leave for a purpose other than the employee's own serious health condition, during the last three weeks of the semester and the leave will last more than five working days, school district may require the employee to continue taking leave until the end of the semester.
- D. The entire period of leave taken under the special rules will be counted as leave. The school district will continue to fulfill the school district's leave responsibilities and obligations, including the obligation to continue the employee's health insurance and other benefits, if an instructional employee's leave entitlement ends before the involuntary leave period expires.

VI. OTHER

- A. The provisions of this policy are intended to comply with applicable law, including the FMLA and applicable regulations. Any terms used from the FMLA will have the same meaning as defined by the FMLA and/or applicable regulations. To the extent that this policy is ambiguous or contradicts applicable law, the language of the applicable law will prevail.

- B. The requirements stated in the collective bargaining agreement between employees in a certified collective bargaining unit and the school district regarding family and medical leaves (if any) shall be followed.

VII. **DISSEMINATION OF POLICY**

- A. This policy shall be conspicuously posted in each school district building in areas accessible to employees.
- B. This policy will be reviewed at least annually for compliance with state and federal law.

412 - EXPENSE REIMBURSEMENT

[Note: School districts are required by statute to have a policy addressing these issues.]

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to identify school district business expenses that involve initial payment by an employee and qualify for reimbursement from the school district, and to specify the manner by which the employee seeks reimbursement.

II. AUTHORIZATION

All school district business expenses to be reimbursed must be approved by the supervising administrator. Such expenses to be reimbursed may include transportation, meals, lodging, registration fees, required materials, parking fees, tips, and other reasonable and necessary school district business-related expenses.

III. REIMBURSEMENT

- A. Requests for reimbursement must be itemized on the official school district form and are to be submitted to the designated administrator. Receipts for lodging, commercial transportation, registration, and other reasonable and necessary expenses must be attached to the reimbursement form.
- B. Automobile travel shall be reimbursed at the mileage rate set by the school board. Commercial transportation shall reflect economy fares and shall be reimbursed only for the actual cost of the trip.

IV. AIRLINE TRAVEL CREDIT

- A. Employees utilizing school district funds to pay for airline travel are required to ensure that any credits or other benefits issued by any airline accrue to the benefit of the school district rather than the employee.
 - 1. To the extent an airline will not honor a transfer or assignment of credit or benefit from the employee to the school district, the employee shall report receipt of the credit or benefit to the designated administrator within 90 days of receipt of the credit or benefit.
 - 2. Reports of the receipt of an airline credit or benefit shall be made in writing and shall include verification from the airline as to the credit or benefit received. Reimbursement for airline travel expenses will not be made until such documentation is provided.
- B. Employees who have existing credits or benefits issued by an airline based upon previously reimbursed airline travel for school district purposes will be required to utilize those credits or benefits toward any subsequent airline travel related to school district purposes, prior to reimbursement for such travel, to the extent permitted and/or feasible.

- C. The requirements of this section apply to all airline travel, regardless of where or how the tickets are purchased.

V. **ESTABLISHMENT OF DIRECTIVES AND GUIDELINES**

The superintendent shall develop a schedule of reimbursement rates for school district business expenses, including those expenses requiring advance approval and specific rates of reimbursement. The superintendent shall also develop directives and guidelines to address methods and times for submission of requests for reimbursement.

**414 - MANDATED REPORTING OF CHILD NEGLECT OR PHYSICAL
OR SEXUAL ABUSE**

[Note: This policy reflects the mandatory law regarding reporting of maltreatment of minors and is not discretionary in nature.]

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to make clear the statutory requirements of school personnel to report suspected child neglect or physical or sexual abuse.

II. GENERAL STATEMENT OF POLICY

- A. The policy of the school district is to fully comply with Minnesota Statute Chapter 260E requiring school personnel to report suspected child neglect or physical or sexual abuse.
- B. A violation of this policy occurs when any school personnel fails to immediately report instances of child neglect, or physical or sexual abuse when the school personnel knows or has reason to believe a child is being neglected or physically or sexually abused or has been neglected or physically or sexually abused within the preceding three years.

III. DEFINITIONS

- A. "Accidental" means a sudden, not reasonably foreseeable, and unexpected occurrence or event that:
 - 1. is not likely to occur and could not have been prevented by exercise of due care; and
 - 2. if occurring while a child is receiving services from a facility, happens when the facility and the employee or person providing services in the facility are in compliance with the laws and rules relevant to the occurrence of event.
- B. "Child" means one under age 18 and, for purposes of Minnesota Statute Chapter 260C (Juvenile Safety and Placement) and Minnesota Statute Chapter 260D (Child in Voluntary Foster Care for Treatment), includes an individual under age 21 who is in foster care pursuant to Minnesota Statute section 260C.451 (Foster Care Benefits Past Age 18).
- C. "Immediately" means as soon as possible but in no event longer than 24 hours.
- D. "Mandated Reporters" means any school personnel who knows or has reason to believe a child is being maltreated, or has been maltreated within the preceding three years.
- E. "Mental Injury" means an injury to the psychological capacity or emotional stability of a child as evidenced by an observable or substantial impairment in the child's ability to function within a normal range or performance and behavior with due regard to the child's culture.

F. "Neglect" means the commission or omission of any of the acts specified below, other than by accidental means:

1. failure by a person responsible for a child's care to supply a child with necessary food, clothing, shelter, health care, medical , or other care required for the child's physical or mental health when reasonably able to do so.
2. failure to protect a child from conditions or actions that seriously endanger the child's physical or mental health when reasonably able to do so, including a growth delay, which may be referred to as a failure to thrive, that has been diagnosed by a physician and is due to parental neglect;
3. failure to provide for necessary supervision or child care arrangements appropriate for a child after considering factors as the child's age, mental ability, physical condition, length of absence, or environment, when the child is unable to care for the child's own basic needs or safety or the basic needs or safety of another child in his or her care;
4. failure to ensure that a child is educated in accordance with state law, which does not include a parent's refusal to provide his or her child with sympathomimetic medications;
5. prenatal exposure to a controlled substance as defined by state law used by the mother for a nonmedical purpose, as evidenced by withdrawal symptoms in the child at birth, results of a toxicology test performed on the mother at delivery or the child's birth, medical effects or developmental delays during the child's first year of life that medically indicate prenatal exposure to a controlled substance or the presence of a fetal alcohol spectrum disorder;
6. medical neglect as defined by Minnesota Statute section 260C.007, Subdivision 4 6, Clause (5);
7. chronic and severe use of alcohol or a controlled substance by a parent or person responsible for the care of the child that adversely affects the child's basic needs and safety; or
8. emotional harm from a pattern of behavior which contributes to impaired emotional functioning of the child which may be demonstrated by a substantial and observable effect in the child's behavior, emotional response, or cognition that is not within the normal range for the child's age and stage of development, with due regard to the child's culture.

Neglect does not occur solely because the child's parent, guardian, or other person responsible for the child's care in good faith selects and depends upon spiritual means or prayer for treatment or care of disease or remedial care of the child in lieu of medical care.

G. "Nonmaltreatment mistake" occurs when: (1) at the time of the incident, the individual was performing duties identified in the center's child care program plan required under Minnesota Rules Part 9503.0045; (2) the individual has not been determined responsible for a similar incident that resulted in a finding of maltreatment for at least seven years; (3) the individual has not been determined to have committed a similar nonmaltreatment mistake under this paragraph for at least four years; (4) any injury to a child resulting from

the incident, if treated, is treated only with remedies that are available over the counter, whether ordered by a medical professional or not; and (5) except for the period when the incident occurred, the facility and the individual providing services were both in compliance with all licensing requirements relevant to the incident. This definition only applies to child care centers licensed under Minnesota Rules Chapter 9503.

- H. "Person responsible for the child's care" means (1) an individual functioning within the family unit and having responsibilities for the care of the child such as a parent, guardian, or other person having similar care responsibilities, or (2) an individual functioning outside the family unit and having responsibilities for the care of the child such as a teacher, school administrator, other school employee or agent, or other lawful custodian of a child having either full-time or short-term care responsibility including, but not limited to, day care, babysitting whether paid or unpaid, counseling, teaching, and coaching.

- I "Physical Abuse" means any physical injury, mental injury (under subdivision 13), or threatened injury (under subdivision 23), inflicted by a person responsible for the child's care on a child other than by accidental means; or any physical or mental injury that cannot reasonably be explained by the child's history of injuries, or any aversive or deprivation procedures, or regulated interventions, that have not been authorized by Minnesota Statute section 125A.0942 or section 245.825.

Abuse does not include reasonable and moderate physical discipline of a child administered by a parent or legal guardian that does not result in an injury. Abuse does not include the use of reasonable force by a teacher, principal, or school employee as allowed by Minnesota Statute section 121A.582.

Actions that are not reasonable and moderate include, but are not limited to, any of the following: (1) throwing, kicking, burning, biting, or cutting a child; (2) striking a child with a closed fist; (3) shaking a child under age three; (4) striking or other actions which result in any nonaccidental injury to a child under 18 months of age; (5) unreasonable interference with a child's breathing; (6) threatening a child with a weapon, as defined in Minn. Stat. § 609.02, Subd. 6; (7) striking a child under age one on the face or head; (8) striking a child who is at least age one but under age four on the face or head, that results in an injury; (9) purposely giving a child poison, alcohol, or dangerous, harmful, or controlled substances that were not prescribed for the child by a practitioner, in order to control or punish the child, or other substances that substantially affect the child's behavior, motor coordination, or judgment or that result in sickness or internal injury, or that subject the child to medical procedures that would be unnecessary if the child were not exposed to the substances; (10) unreasonable physical confinement or restraint not permitted under Minnesota Statute section 609.379 including, but not limited to, tying, caging, or chaining; or (11) in a school facility or school zone, an act by a person responsible for the child's care that is a violation under Minnesota Statute 121A.58.

- H. "Report" means any communication received by the local welfare agency, police department, county sheriff, or agency responsible for child protection pursuant to this section that describes maltreatment of a child and contains sufficient content to identify the child and any person believed to be responsible for the maltreatment, if known.

- I. "School Personnel" means professional employee or professional's delegate of the school district who provides health, educational, social, psychological, law enforcement or child care services.

- L.** "Sexual Abuse" means the subjection of a child by a person responsible for the child's care, by a person who has a significant relationship to the child (as defined in Minnesota Statute section 609.341, Subdivision 15), or by a person in a current or recent position of authority (as defined in Minn. Stat. § 609.341, Subdivision 10) to any act which constitutes a violation of Minnesota statutes prohibiting criminal sexual conduct. Such acts include sexual penetration sexual contact, solicitation of children to engage in sexual conduct, and communication of sexually explicit materials to children. Sexual abuse also includes any act involving a minor that constitutes a violation of Minnesota statutes prohibiting prostitution, or use of a minor in a sexual performance. Sexual abuse includes all reports of known or suspected child sex trafficking involving a child who is identified as a victim of sex trafficking. Sexual abuse includes threatened sexual abuse which includes the status of a parent or household member who has committed a violation which requires registration under Minnesota Statute section 243.166, Subdivision 1b(a) or (b) (Registration of Predatory Offenders).
- M.** "Threatened injury" means a statement, over act, condition, or status that represents a substantial risk of physical or sexual abuse or mental injury. Threatened injury includes, but is not limited to, exposing a child to a person responsible for the child's care who has (1) subjected the child to, or failed to protect a child from, an overt act or condition that constitutes egregious harm; (2) been found to be palpably unfit; (3) committed an act that resulted in an involuntary termination of parental rights; (4), or committed an act that resulted in the involuntary transfer of permanent legal and physical custody of a child to a relative.

IV. REPORTING PROCEDURES

- A.** A mandated reporter shall immediately report the information to the local welfare agency, agency responsible for assessing or investigating the report, police department, county sheriff, tribal police department, or tribal social services agency. The reporter will include his or her name and address in the report.
- B.** An oral report shall be made immediately, by telephone or otherwise. The oral report shall be followed by a written report within 72 hours (exclusive of weekends and holidays) to the appropriate police department, the county sheriff, local welfare agency, or agency responsible for assessing or investigating the report. Any report shall be of sufficient content to identify the child, any person believed to be responsible for the maltreatment of the child if the person is known, the nature and extent of the maltreatment and the name and address of the reporter.
- C.** Regardless of whether a report is made, as soon as practicable after a school receives information regarding an incident that may constitute maltreatment of a child in a school facility, the school shall inform the parent, legal guardian, or custodian of the child that an incident has occurred that may constitute maltreatment of the child, when the incident occurred, and the nature of the conduct that may constitute maltreatment.
- D.** A mandated reporter who knows or has reason to know of the deprivation of custodial or parental rights or the kidnapping of a child shall report the information to the local police department or the county sheriff.

- E. With the exception of a health care professional or a social service professional who is providing the woman with prenatal care or other health care services, a mandated reporter shall immediately report to the local welfare agency if the person knows or has reason to believe that a woman is pregnant and has used a controlled substance for a nonmedical purpose during the pregnancy, including, but not limited to, tetrahydrocannabinol, or has consumed alcoholic beverages during the pregnancy in any way that is habitual or excessive.
- F. A person mandated by Minnesota law and this policy to report who fails to report may be subject to criminal penalties and/or discipline, up to and including termination of employment.
- G. An employer of a mandated reporter shall not retaliate against the person for reporting in good faith maltreatment against a child with respect to whom a report is made, because of the report.
- H. Any person who knowingly or recklessly makes a false report under the provisions of applicable Minnesota law or this policy shall be liable in a civil suit for any actual damages suffered by the person or persons so reported and for any punitive damages set by the court or jury, plus costs and reasonable attorney fees. Knowingly or recklessly making a false report also may result in discipline.

[Note: The Minnesota Department of Education (MDE) is responsible for assessing or investigating allegations of child maltreatment in schools. Although a report may be made to any of the agencies listed in Section IV.A., above, and there is no requirement to file more than one report, if the initial report is made to MDE, it would be helpful to MDE if schools also report to MDE.]

V. INVESTIGATION

- A. The responsibility for assessing or investigating reports of suspected maltreatment rests with the appropriate state, county, or local agency or agencies. The agency responsible for assessing or investigating reports of maltreatment has the authority to interview the child, the person or persons responsible for the child's care, the alleged offender, and any other person with knowledge of the maltreatment for the purpose of gathering facts, assessing safety and risk to the child, and formulating a plan. The investigating agency may interview the child at school. The interview may take place outside the presence of the alleged offender or parent, legal guardian, or school official. The investigating agency, not the school, is responsible for either notifying or withholding notification of the interview to the parent, guardian or person responsible for the child's care. School officials may not disclose to the parent, legal custodian, or guardian the contents of the notification or any other related information regarding the interview until notified in writing by the local welfare or law enforcement agency that the investigation or assessment has been concluded.
- B. When the investigating agency determines that an interview should take place on school property, written notification of intent to interview the child on school property must be received by school officials prior to the interview. The notification shall include the name of the child to be interviewed, the purpose of the interview, and a reference to the statutory authority to conduct an interview on school property.
- C. Except where the alleged offender is believed to be a school official or employee, the time and place, and manner of the interview on school premises shall be within the discretion of school officials, but the local welfare or law enforcement agency shall have the exclusive authority to determine who may

attend the interview. The conditions as to time, place, and manner of the interview set by the school officials shall be reasonable and the interview shall be conducted not more than 24 hours after the receipt of the notification unless another time is considered necessary by agreement between the school officials and the local welfare or law enforcement agency. Every effort must be made to reduce the disruption of the educational program of the child, other students, or school employees when an interview is conducted on school premises.

- D. Where the alleged offender is believed to be a school official or employee, the school district shall conduct its own investigation independent of MDE and, if involved, the local welfare or law enforcement agency.
- E. Upon request by MDE, the school district shall provide all requested data that are relevant to a report of maltreatment and are in the possession of a school facility, pursuant to an assessment or investigation of a maltreatment report of a student in school. The school district shall provide the requested data in accordance with the requirements of the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statute Chapter 13 and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, 20 United States Code section 1232g.

VI. MAINTENANCE OF SCHOOL RECORDS CONCERNING ABUSE OR POTENTIAL ABUSE

- A. When a local welfare or local law enforcement agency determines that a potentially abused or abused child should be interviewed on school property, written notification of the agency's intent to interview on school property must be received by school officials prior to the interview. The notification shall include the name of the child to be interviewed, the purpose of the interview, and a reference to the statutory authority to conduct the interview. The notification shall be private data. School officials may not disclose to the parent, legal custodian, or guardian the contents of the notice or any other related information regarding the interview until notified in writing by the local welfare or law enforcement agency that the investigation has been concluded.
- B. All records regarding a report of maltreatment, including any notification of intent to interview which was received by the school as described above in Paragraph A., shall be destroyed by the school only when ordered by the agency conducting the investigation or by a court of competent jurisdiction.

VII. PHYSICAL OR SEXUAL ABUSE AS SEXUAL HARASSMENT OR VIOLENCE

Under certain circumstances, alleged physical or sexual abuse may also be sexual harassment or violence under Minnesota law. If so, the duties relating to the reporting and investigation of such harassment or violence may be applicable.

VIII. DISSEMINATION OF POLICY AND TRAINING

- A. This policy shall appear in school personnel handbooks.
- B. The school district will develop a method of discussing this policy with school personnel.
- C. This policy shall be reviewed at least annually for compliance with state law.

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415 - MANDATED REPORTING OF MALTREATMENT OF VULNERABLE ADULTS

[Note: This policy reflects the mandatory law regarding reporting maltreatment of vulnerable adults and is not discretionary in nature.]

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to make clear the statutory requirements of school personnel to report suspected maltreatment of vulnerable adults.

II. GENERAL STATEMENT OF POLICY

- A. The policy of the school district is to comply fully with Minnesota Statutes section 626.557 requiring school personnel to report suspected maltreatment of vulnerable adults.
- B. A violation of this policy occurs when any school personnel fails to report suspected maltreatment of vulnerable adults when the school personnel has reason to believe that a vulnerable adult is being or has been maltreated, or has knowledge that a vulnerable adult has sustained a physical injury which is not reasonably explained.

III. DEFINITIONS

- A. "Abuse" means:
 - 1. An act against a vulnerable adult that constitutes a violation of, an attempt to violate, or aiding and abetting a violation of: (1) assault in the first through fifth degrees as defined in Minnesota Statutes sections 609.221 to 609.224; (2) the use of drugs to injure or facilitate crime as defined in Minnesota Statutes section 609.235; (3) the solicitation, inducement, and promotion of prostitution as defined in Minnesota Statutes section 609.322; and (4) criminal sexual conduct in the first through fifth degrees as defined in Minnesota Statutes sections 609.342 to 609.3451. A violation includes any action that meets the elements of the crime, regardless of whether there is a criminal proceeding or conviction.
 - 2. Conduct which is not an accident or therapeutic conduct as defined in Minnesota Statutes section 626.5572 which produces or could reasonably be expected to produce physical pain or injury or emotional distress including, but not limited to, the following: (1) hitting, slapping, kicking, pinching, biting, or corporal punishment of a vulnerable adult; (2) use of repeated or malicious oral, written, or gestured language toward a vulnerable adult or the treatment of a vulnerable adult which would be considered by a reasonable person to be disparaging, derogatory, humiliating, harassing, or threatening; (3) use of any aversive or deprivation procedure, unreasonable confinement, or involuntary seclusion, including the forced separation of the vulnerable adult from other persons against the will of the vulnerable adult or the legal representative of the vulnerable adult; and (4) use of any aversive or deprivation procedures for persons with developmental disabilities or related conditions not authorized under Minnesota Statutes section 245.825.
 - 3. Any sexual contact or penetration as defined in Minn. Stat. § 609.341 between a facility staff person or a person providing services in the facility and a resident,

patient, or client of that facility.

4. The act of forcing, compelling, coercing, or enticing a vulnerable adult against the vulnerable adult's will to perform services for the advantage of another.

Abuse does not include actions specifically excluded by Minnesota Statutes section 626.5572, Subd. 2.

- B. "Caregiver" means an individual or facility who has responsibility for the care of a vulnerable adult as a result of a family relationship, or who has assumed responsibility for all or a portion of the care of a vulnerable adult voluntarily, by contract, or by agreement.
- C. "Common entry point" means the entity responsible for receiving reports of alleged or suspected maltreatment of a vulnerable adult and designated by the Commissioner of the Minnesota Department of Human Services as the MN Adult Abuse Reporting Center (MAARC).
- D. "Financial Exploitation" means a breach of a fiduciary duty by an actor's unauthorized expenditure of funds entrusted to the actor for the benefit of the vulnerable adult or by an actor's failure to provide food, clothing, shelter, health care, therapeutic conduct or supervision, the failure of which results or is likely to result in detriment to the vulnerable adult. Financial exploitation also includes: the willful use, withholding or disposal of funds or property of a vulnerable adult; the obtaining of services for wrongful profit or advantage which results in detriment to the vulnerable adult; the acquisition of a vulnerable adult's funds or property through undue influence, harassment, duress, deception or fraud; and the use of force, coercion, or enticement to cause a vulnerable adult to perform services against the vulnerable adult's will for the profit or advantage of another.
- E. "Immediately" means as soon as possible, but no longer than 24 hours from the time initial knowledge that the incident occurred has been received.
- F. "Mandated Reporters" means a professional's delegate while engaged in education.
- G. "Maltreatment" means the neglect, abuse, or financial exploitation of a vulnerable adult.
- H. "Neglect" means the failure or omission by a caregiver to supply a vulnerable adult with care of services, including but not limited to, food, clothing, shelter, health care, or supervision which is: (1) reasonable and necessary to obtain or maintain the vulnerable adult's physical or mental health or safety, considering the physical and mental capacity or dysfunction of the vulnerable adult; and (2) which is not the result of an accident or therapeutic conduct.
- I. Neglect also means the absence or likelihood of absence of care or services, including but not limited to, food, clothing, shelter, health care, or supervision necessary to maintain the physical and mental health of the vulnerable adult which a reasonable person would deem essential to obtain or maintain the vulnerable adult's health, safety, or comfort considering the physical or mental capacity or dysfunction of the vulnerable adult. Neglect does not include actions specifically excluded by Minnesota Statute section 626.5572, Subd. 17.
- J. "Vulnerable Adult" means any person 18 years of age or older who: (1) is a resident or inpatient of a facility; (2) receives services required to be licensed under Minnesota Statute Chapter 245A, except as excluded under Minnesota Statute section 626.5572, Subdivision 21(a)(2); (3) receives services from a licensed home care provider or

person or organization that offers, provides, or arranges for personal care assistance services under the medical assistance program; or (4) regardless of residence or whether any type of service is received possesses a physical or mental infirmity or other physical, mental, or emotional condition that impairs the individual's ability to provide adequately for the individual's own care without assistance or supervision and, because of the condition or infirmity and need for care or services, has an impaired ability to protect the individual's self from maltreatment.

- K. "School Personnel" means professional employees or their delegates of the school district engaged in providing health, educational, social, psychological, law enforcement or other caretaking services of vulnerable adults.

IV. REPORTING PROCEDURES

- A. A mandated reporter as defined herein shall immediately report the suspected maltreatment to the common entry point responsible for receiving reports.
- B. Whenever a mandated reporter, as defined herein, knows or has reason to believe that an individual made an error in the provision of therapeutic conduct to a vulnerable adult which results in injury or harm, which reasonably requires the care of a physician, such information shall be reported immediately to the designated county agency. The mandated reporter also may report a belief that the error did not constitute neglect and why the error does not constitute neglect.
- C. The reporter shall to the extent possible identify the vulnerable adult, the caregiver, the nature and extent of the suspected maltreatment, any evidence of previous maltreatment, the name and address of the reporter, the time, date, and location of the incident and any other information that the reporter believes might be helpful in investigating the suspected abuse or neglect. A mandated reporter may disclose not public data as defined under Minnesota Statutes section 13.02 to the extent necessary to comply with the above reporting requirements.
- D. A person mandated to report suspected maltreatment of a vulnerable adult who negligently or intentionally fails to report is liable for damages caused by the failure. A negligent or intentional failure to report may result in discipline. A mandatory reporter who intentionally fails to make a report, who knowingly provides false or misleading information in reporting, or who intentionally fails to provide all the material circumstances surrounding the reported incident may be guilty of a misdemeanor.
- E. Retaliation against a person who makes a good faith report under Minnesota law and this policy, or against vulnerable adult who is named in a report is prohibited.
- F. Any person who intentionally makes a false report under the provisions of applicable Minnesota law or this policy shall be liable in a civil suit for any actual damages suffered by the person or persons so reported and for any punitive damages set by the court or jury. The intentional making of a false report may result in discipline.

V. INVESTIGATION

The responsibility for investigating reports of suspected maltreatment of a vulnerable adult rest with the entity designated by the county for receiving reports.

VI. DISSEMINATION OF POLICY AND TRAINING

- A. This policy should appear in school personnel handbooks as appropriate.
- B. The school district will develop a method of discussing this policy with employees as appropriate.

- C. This policy should be reviewed at least annually for compliance with state law.

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418 - DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE/DRUG-FREE SCHOOL

[Note: School districts are required by statute to have a policy addressing these issues.]

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to maintain a safe and healthful environment for employees and students by prohibiting the use of alcohol, toxic substances, medical cannabis, ~~non-intoxicating cannabinoids~~, edible cannabinoid products and controlled substances without a physician prescription.

II. GENERAL STATEMENT OF POLICY

- A. Use or possession of controlled substances, toxic substances, medical cannabis, ~~non-intoxicating cannabinoids~~, edible cannabinoid products, and controlled substances before, during, or after school hours, at school or in any other school location, is prohibited as general policy. Paraphernalia associated with controlled substances is prohibited.
- B. A violation of this policy occurs when any student, teacher, administrator, other school district personnel, or member of the public uses or possesses alcohol, toxic substances, medical cannabis, ~~non-intoxicating cannabinoids~~, edible cannabinoid products, or controlled substances, in any school location.
- C. An individual may not use or possess cannabis flower, cannabis products, lower-potency hemp edibles, or hemp-derived consumer products in a public school, as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 120A.05, subdivisions 9, 11, and 13, including all facilities, whether owned, rented, or leased, and all vehicles that the school district owns, leases, rents, contracts for, or controls.
- D. The school district will act to enforce this policy and to discipline or take appropriate action against any student, teacher, administrator, school personnel, or member of the public who violates this policy.

III. DEFINITIONS

- A. "Alcohol" includes any alcoholic beverage Containing more than one half percent alcohol by volume.
- B. "Controlled substances" include narcotic drugs, hallucinogenic drugs, amphetamines, barbiturates, marijuana, anabolic steroids, or any other controlled substance as defined in Schedules I through V of the Controlled Substances Act, 21 U.S.C. § 812, including analogues and look-alike drugs.
- C. "Edible cannabinoid product" means any product that is intended to be eaten or consumed as a beverage by humans, contains a cannabinoid in combination with food ingredients, and is not a drug.
- ~~D. "Nonintoxicating cannabinoid" means substances extracted from certified hemp plants that do not produce intoxicating effects when consumed by injection, inhalation, ingestion, or by any other immediate means.~~

- E. "Medical cannabis" means any species of genus cannabis plant, or any mixture or preparation of them, including whole plant extracts and resins, and is delivered in the form of: (1) liquid, including, but not limited to, oil; (2) pill; (3) vaporized delivery method with use of liquid or oil but which does not require the use of dried leaves or plant form; (4) combustion with use of dried raw cannabis; or (5) any other method, excluding smoking, approved by the Commissioner of the Minnesota Department of Health.
- D. "Toxic substances" includes glue, cement, aerosol paint, or other substances used or possessed with the intent of inducing intoxication or excitement of the central nervous system.
- G. "School location" includes any school building or on any school premises; in any school-owned vehicle or in any other school-approved vehicle used to transport students to and from school or school activities; off school property at any school-sponsored or school-approved activity, event, or function, such as a field trip or athletic event, where students are under the jurisdiction of the school district; or during any period of time such employee is supervising students on behalf of the school district or otherwise engaged in school district business.
- H. "Sell" means to sell, give away, barter, deliver, exchange, distribute or dispose of to another, or to manufacture; or to offer or agree to perform such an act, or to possess with intent to perform such an act.
- I. "Toxic substances" includes: (1) glue, cement, aerosol paint, containing toluene, benzene, xylene, amyl nitrate, butyl nitrate, nitrous oxide, or containing other aromatic hydrocarbon solvents, but does not include glue, cement, or paint contained in a packaged kit for the construction of a model automobile, airplane, or similar item; (2) butane or a butane lighter; or (3) any similar substance declared to be toxic to the central nervous system and to have a potential for abuse, by a rule adopted by the Commissioner.
- J. "Use" means to sell, buy, manufacture, distribute, dispense, be under the influence of, or consume in any manner, including, but not limited to, consumption by injection, inhalation, ingestion, or by any other immediate means.

IV. EXCEPTIONS

- A. A violation of this policy does not occur when a person brings onto a school location, for such person's own use, a controlled substance, except medical cannabis, ~~non-intoxicating cannabinoids,~~ or edible cannabinoid products, which has a currently accepted medical use in treatment in the United States and the person has a physician's prescription for the substance. The person shall comply with the relevant procedures of this policy.
- B. A violation of this policy does not occur when a person possesses an alcoholic beverage in a school location when the possession is within the exceptions of Minnesota Statutes section 624.701, Subdivision 1a (experiments in laboratories; pursuant to a temporary license to sell liquor issued under Minnesota laws or possession after the purchase from such a temporary license holder).
- C. A violation of this policy does not occur when a person uses or possesses a toxic substance unless they do so with the intent of inducing or intentionally aiding another in inducing intoxication, excitement, or stupefaction of the central nervous system, except under the direction and supervision of a medical doctor.

- D. The school district may not refuse to enroll or otherwise penalize a patient or person enrolled in the Minnesota Patient Registry Program as a pupil solely because the patient or person is enrolled in the registry program, unless failing to do so would violate federal law or regulations or cause the school to lose a monetary or licensing-related benefit under federal law or regulations.

[NOTE: The 2024 Minnesota legislature amended this law to add this protection.]

V. PROCEDURES

- A. Students who have a prescription from a physician for medical treatment with a controlled substance, except medical cannabis, ~~non-intoxicating cannabinoids~~, or edible cannabinoid products, must comply with the school district's student medication policy.

[Note: School districts are required by Minnesota Statutes section 121A.22 to develop procedures for the administration of drugs and medicine. If the school district does not have a student medication policy such as MSBA/MASA Model Policy 516, this Paragraph A. can be modified to provide: "Students who have a prescription from a physician for medical treatment with a controlled substance, except medical cannabis, ~~non-intoxicating cannabinoids~~, or edible cannabinoid products, must provide a copy of the prescription and the medication to the school nurse, principal or other designated staff member. The school district's licensed school nurse, trained health clerk, principal or teacher will administer the prescribed medication except medical cannabis, ~~non-intoxicating cannabinoids~~, or edible cannabinoid products, in accordance with school district procedures."]

- B. Employees who have a prescription from a physician for medical treatment with a controlled substance, except medical cannabis, ~~non-intoxicating cannabinoids~~, or edible cannabinoid products, are permitted to possess such controlled substances and associated necessary paraphernalia, such as an inhaler or syringe. The employee must inform his or her supervisor. The employee may be required to provide a copy of the prescription.

- C. Each employee shall be provided with written notice of this Drug-Free Workplace/Drug-Free School policy and shall be required to acknowledge that he or she has received the policy.

[Note: The Drug-Free Workplace Act requires that school district employees be notified by a published statement of the prohibition of the use of controlled substances and actions that will be taken against employees for violations of such prohibition. 41 U.S.C. §§ 8103; 34 C.F.R. Part 84. An acknowledgment will document satisfaction by the school district of this federal requirement.]

- D. Employees are subject to the school district's drug and alcohol testing policies and procedures.

- E. Members of the public are not permitted to possess controlled substances, ~~non-intoxicating cannabinoids~~, or edible cannabinoid products, in a school location except with the express permission of the superintendent.

- F. No person is permitted to possess or use medical cannabis, ~~non-intoxicating cannabinoids,~~ or edible cannabinoid products, on a school bus or van; or on the grounds of any preschool or primary or secondary school; or on the grounds of any child care facility. This prohibition includes (1) vaporizing or combusting medical cannabis on any form of public transportation where the vapor or smoke could be inhaled by a minor child or in any public place, including indoor or outdoor areas used by or open to the general public or place of employment; and (2) operating, navigating, or being in actual physical control of any motor vehicle or working on transportation property, equipment or facilities while under the influence of medical cannabis, ~~non-intoxicating cannabinoids,~~ or edible cannabinoid products.
- G. Possession of alcohol on school grounds pursuant to the exceptions of Minn. Stat. § 624.701, Subd. 1a, shall be by permission of the school board only. The applicant shall apply for permission in writing and shall follow the school board procedures for placing an item on the agenda.

VI. SCHOOL PROGRAMS

- A. Starting in the 2026-2027 school year, the school district must implement a comprehensive education program on cannabis use and substance use, including but not limited to the use of fentanyl or mixtures containing fentanyl, for students in middle school and high school. The program must include instruction on the topics listed in Minnesota Statutes, section 120B.215, subdivision 1 and must:
 - 1. respect community values and encourage students to communicate with parents, guardians, and other trusted adults about cannabis use and substance use, including but not limited to the use of fentanyl or mixtures containing fentanyl; and
 - 2. refer students to local resources where students may obtain medically accurate information about cannabis use and substance use, including but not limited to the use of fentanyl or mixtures containing fentanyl, and treatment for a substance use disorder.
- B. School district efforts to develop, implement, or improve instruction or curriculum as a result of the provisions of this section must be consistent with Minnesota Statutes, sections 120B.10 and 120B.11.
- C. Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the school district shall have a procedure for a parent, a guardian, or an adult student 18 years of age or older to review the content of the instructional materials to be provided to a minor child or to an adult student pursuant to this article. The district must allow a parent or adult student to opt out of instruction under this article with no academic or other penalty for the student and must inform parents and adult students of this right to opt out.

VII. ENFORCEMENT

- A. Students
 - 1. Students may be required to participate in programs and activities that provide education against the use of alcohol, tobacco, marijuana, smokeless tobacco products, electronic cigarettes, and nonintoxicating cannabinoids, and edible cannabinoid products.

2. The student may be referred to a drug or alcohol assistance or rehabilitation program; school based mental health services, mentoring and counseling, including early identification of mental health symptoms, drug use and violence and appropriate referral to direct individual or group counseling service. which may be provided by school based mental health services providers; and/or referral to law enforcement officials when appropriate.
3. A student who violates the terms of this policy shall be subject to discipline in accordance with the school district's discipline policy. Such discipline may include suspension or expulsion from school.

B. Employees

1. As a condition of employment in any federal grant, each employee who is engaged either directly or indirectly in performance of a federal grant shall abide by the terms of this policy and shall notify his or her supervisor in writing of his or her conviction of any criminal drug statute for a violation occurring in any of the places listed above on which work on a school district federal grant is performed, no later than five (5) calendar days after such conviction. Conviction means a finding of guilt (including a plea of nolo contendere) or imposition of sentence, or both, by any judicial body charged with the responsibility to determine violations of the federal or state criminal drug statutes.
2. An employee who violates the terms of this policy is subject to disciplinary action, including nonrenewal, suspension, termination, or discharge as deemed appropriate by the school board.
3. In addition, any employee who violates the terms of this policy may be required to satisfactorily participate in a drug and/or alcohol abuse assistance or rehabilitation program approved by the school district. Any employee who fails to satisfactorily participate in and complete such a program is subject to nonrenewal, suspension, or termination as deemed appropriate by the school board.
4. Sanctions against employees, including nonrenewal, suspension, termination, or discharge shall be pursuant to and in accordance with applicable statutory authority, collective bargaining agreements, and school district policies.

C. The Public

A member of the public who violates this policy shall be informed of the policy and asked to leave. If necessary, law enforcement officials will be notified and asked to provide an escort.

**419 - TOBACCO-FREE ENVIRONMENT; POSSESSION AND USE OF TOBACCO,
TOBACCO-RELATED DEVICES, AND ELECTRONIC DELIVERY DEVICES; VAPING AWARENESS
AND PREVENTION INSTRUCTION**

[Note: School districts are not required by statute to have a policy addressing these issues. However, Minnesota Statute section 144.416 requires that entities that control public places must make reasonable efforts to prevent smoking in public places, including the posting of signs or any other means which may be appropriate. Additionally, Minnesota Statute section 120B.238 requires that vaping prevention instruction be provided as set forth in this policy.]

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to maintain a learning and working environment that is tobacco free.

II. GENERAL STATEMENT OF POLICY

- A. A violation of this policy occurs when any student, teacher, administrator, other school personnel of the school district, or person smokes or uses tobacco, tobacco-related devices, or carries or uses an activated electronic delivery device in a public school. This prohibition extends to all facilities, whether owned, rented, or leased, and all vehicles that a school district owns, leases, rents, contracts for, or controls. In addition, this prohibition includes vehicles used, in whole or in part, for work purposes, during hours of school operation, if more than one person is present. This prohibition includes all school district property and all off-campus events sponsored by the school district.
- B. A violation of this policy occurs when any elementary school, middle school, or secondary school student to possess any type of tobacco, tobacco-related devices, or electronic delivery devices in a public school. This prohibition extends to all facilities, whether owned, rented, or leased, and all vehicles that a school district owns, leases, rents, contracts for, or controls and includes vehicles used, in whole or in part, for school purposes, during hours of school operation, if more than one person is present. This prohibition includes all school district property and all off-campus events sponsored by the school district.
- C. The school district will act to enforce this policy and to discipline or take appropriate action against any student, teacher, administrator, school personnel, or person who is found to have violated this policy.

[Note: The following language is not required by law but is recommended by MSBA for inclusion in this policy.]

- D. ***The school district will not solicit or accept any contributions or gifts of money, curricula, materials, or equipment from companies that directly manufacture and are identified with tobacco products, devices, or electronic delivery devices. The school district will not promote or allow promotion of tobacco products or electronic delivery devices on school property or at school-sponsored events.***

III. DEFINITIONS

- A. "Electronic delivery device" means any product containing or delivering nicotine, lobelia, or any other substance, whether natural or synthetic, intended for human consumption through inhalation of aerosol or vapor from the product. Electronic delivery device includes but is not limited to devices manufactured, marketed, or sold as electronic cigarettes, electronic cigars, electronic pipe, vape pens, modes, tank systems, or under any other product name or descriptor. Electronic delivery device includes any component part of a product, whether or not marketed or sold separately. Electronic delivery device excludes drugs, devices, or combination products, as those terms are defined in the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act, that are authorized for sale by the United States Food and Drug Administration.
- B. "Heated tobacco product" means a tobacco product that produces aerosols containing nicotine and other chemicals which are inhaled by users through the mouth.
- C. "Tobacco" means cigarettes and any product containing, made, or derived from tobacco that is intended for human consumption, whether chewed, smoked, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, snorted, sniffed, or ingested by any other means, or any component, part, or accessory of a tobacco product, including, but not limited to, cigars; cheroots; stogies; perique; granulated, plug cut, crimp cut, ready rubbed, and other smoking tobacco; snuff; snuff flour; cavendish; plug and twist tobacco; fine cut and other chewing tobacco; shorts; refuse scraps, clippings, cuttings and sweepings of tobacco; and other kinds and forms of tobacco. Tobacco excludes any drugs, devices, or combination products, as those terms are defined in the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act, that are authorized for sale by the United States Food and Drug Administration.
- D. "Tobacco-related devices" means cigarette papers or pipes for smoking or other devices intentionally designed or intended to be used in a manner which enables the chewing, sniffing, smoking, or inhalation of aerosol or vapor of tobacco or tobacco-related products. Tobacco-related devices include components of tobacco-related devices which may be marketed or sold separately.
- E. "Smoking" means inhaling, exhaling, burning, or carrying any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe, or any other lighted or heated product containing, made, or derived from nicotine, tobacco, marijuana, or plant, whether natural or synthetic, that is intended for inhalation. Smoking includes carrying or using an activated electronic delivery device.
- F. "Vaping" means using an activated electronic delivery device or heated tobacco product."

IV. EXCEPTIONS

- A. A violation of this policy does not occur when an Indian adult lights tobacco on school district property as a part of a traditional Indian spiritual or cultural ceremony. An American Indian student may carry a medicine pouch containing loose tobacco intended as observance of traditional spiritual or cultural practices. An Indian is a person who is a member of an Indian tribe as defined under Minnesota law.
- B. A violation of this policy does not occur when an adult nonstudent possesses a tobacco or nicotine product that has been approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco-cessation product, as a tobacco-dependence product, or for other medical purposes, and is being marketed and sold solely for such an approved purpose. Nothing in this exception authorizes smoking or use of tobacco, tobacco-related devices, or electronic delivery devices on school property or at off-campus events sponsored by the school district.
- C. An American Indian student or staff member may use tobacco, sage, sweetgrass, and cedar to conduct individual or group smudging in a public school. The process for

conducting smudging is determined by the building or site administrator. Smudging must be conducted under the direct supervision of an appropriate staff member, as determined by the building or site administrator.

V. VAPING PREVENTION INSTRUCTION

- A. The school district must provide vaping prevention instruction at least once to students in grades 6 through 8.
- B. The school district may use instructional materials based upon the Minnesota Department of Health's school e-cigarette toolkit or may use other smoking prevention instructional materials with a focus on vaping and the use of electronic delivery devices and heated tobacco products. The instruction may be provided as part of the school district's locally developed health standards.

[Note: In addition, school districts may choose to require (a) evidence-based vaping prevention instruction to students in grades 9 through 12; and/or (b) a peer-to-peer education program to provide vaping prevention instruction.]

VI. ENFORCEMENT

- A. All individuals on school premises shall adhere to this policy.
- B. Students who violate this tobacco-free policy shall be subject to school district discipline procedures.
- C. School district administrators and other school personnel who violate this tobacco-free policy shall be subject to school district discipline procedures.
- D. School district action taken for violation of this policy will be consistent with requirements of applicable collective bargaining agreements, Minnesota or federal law, and school district policies.
- E. Persons who violate this tobacco-free policy may be referred to the building administration or other school district supervisory personnel responsible for the area or program at which the violation occurred.
- F. School administrators may call the local law enforcement agency to assist with enforcement of this policy. Smoking or use of any tobacco product in a public school is a violation of the Minnesota Clean Indoor Air Act and/or the Freedom to Breathe Act of 2007 and is a petty misdemeanor. A court injunction may be instituted against a repeated violator.
- G. No persons shall be discharged, refused to be hired, penalized, discriminated against, or in any manner retaliated against for exercising any right to a smoke-free environment provided by the Freedom to Breathe Act of 2007 or other law.

VII. DISSEMINATION OF POLICY

- A. This policy shall appear in the student handbook.
- B. The school district will develop a method of discussing this policy with students and employees.

FACILITIES USE, SERVICES AND REIMBURSEMENT AGREEMENT

THIS FACILITIES USE, SERVICES, AND REIMBURSEMENT AGREEMENT is made by and between the **STATE OF MINNESOTA, BY AND THROUGH THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF MINNESOTA STATE COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES, ON BEHALF OF MINNESOTA STATE COMMUNITY AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE – DETROIT LAKES CAMPUS**, located at 900 Highway 34 East, Detroit Lakes MN 56501, hereinafter referred to as **COLLEGE**, and **DETROIT LAKES PUBLIC SCHOOLS – DISTRICT NO. 22**, a school district under the laws of Minnesota, located at 702 Lake Avenue Detroit Lakes MN 56501, hereinafter referred to as **DISTRICT**, to provide office and classroom space on COLLEGE’s campus for high school operations.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Minnesota State Colleges and Universities is empowered by Minn. Stat. §136F.06, to govern Board-related property, and

WHEREAS, COLLEGE has under its control **MINNESOTA STATE COMMUNITY AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE – DETROIT LAKES CAMPUS** located at 900 Highway 34 East, Detroit Lakes MN 56501 , and has space in that building, and

WHEREAS, COLLEGE and DISTRICT have explored the use of MNSCU’s college campus to allow for location of certain high school operations, and

WHEREAS, COLLEGE and DISTRICT wish to enter into this Agreement governing the use of COLLEGE facilities by the DISTRICT, and

NOW THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

AGREEMENT

1. **PERMITTED USE.** COLLEGE agrees to allow DISTRICT the exclusive use of the facilities, including offices and classrooms, identified for high school operations shown as the cross-hatched areas on **Exhibit A**, attached and incorporated herein. (“Space”) and identified as:
 - a. F109 (including A-F) – 2,856 square feet
 - b. F112 – 156 square feet
 - c. F113 – 121 square feet
 - d. F114 (including F114 A-E) – 981 square feet

e. F116D – 931 square feet
Total square footage included in lease is 5,045.

2. **ADDITIONAL USE.** If the need arises, the DISTRICT may request the use of additional rooms or offices from time to time in writing to the COLLEGE. The COLLEGE agrees that, in its sole discretion, after meeting its responsibilities to students, faculty, administrative employees and other staff members, volunteers and agents, it will allow the DISTRICT to make the additional use of its facilities as needed. All Additional Space use shall be subject to the terms of this Agreement, which shall be amended accordingly prior to use of Additional Space. DISTRICT acknowledges and agrees that this Agreement is not intended to and does not create a landlord-tenant relationship between the parties. DISTRICT is granted only a permit to occupy and use the Additional Space for the purpose identified above during the times available. It is specifically understood that the permission to use the Additional Space and the period of use are not exclusive to DISTRICT, and COLLEGE shall continue to operate its facilities for college classes. COLLEGE reserves the right to enter and use the Space at all reasonable times for purposes of inspecting the same or for such other purposes as may be required by COLLEGE.

3. **TERM.** This agreement shall be effective upon the date the final signature is obtained by the COLLEGE. This agreement shall commence on July 1, 2025, and shall remain in effect until June 30, 2026, unless otherwise terminated earlier in accordance with Paragraph 30, Termination.

4. **SPACE IMPROVEMENTS AND EQUIPMENT.**

Improvements, if any, requested by DISTRICT during the Term of this agreement shall be submitted to COLLEGE for approval, shall be at DISTRICT’s sole cost and expense unless otherwise agreed to by the Parties, and shall be set forth in writing as an amendment to this agreement prior to construction of Additional Improvements. All Improvements shall be made by COLLEGE in compliance with all applicable building codes, laws, rules, regulations, and MnSCU design and construction standards.

5. **FACILITY FEE AND COST REIMBURSEMENTS.** DISTRICT agrees to pay to COLLEGE, a Facility Use fee in the amount of \$ 22,702.50 per year (\$4.50 per square foot). Payments will be made quarterly on September 1, December 1, March 1, and June 1, as set forth in the table below:

7. **COLLEGE DUTIES.** COLLEGE will provide:

- a. Sufficient electrical power for lights, computers, printer, fax machines, radios and other electrical equipment.
- b. Sufficient heat or cooling, consistent with normal usage of the space.
- c. All maintenance and general cleaning of the Space.

The college will make every reasonable effort to relocate the ALC to avoid interruption of classes should electrical or heating services fail for more than 24 hours.

8. **DISTRICT'S DUTIES.**

- a. The DISTRICT agrees that it shall exercise reasonable care in the conduct of its activities in such facilities.

- b. DISTRICT shall pay the facility fees and charges as established under this agreement.
 - c. DISTRICT shall replace or reimburse COLLEGE for any College equipment and College supplies that the DISTRICT may use in operating pursuant to this agreement.
 - d. The DISTRICT agrees to reimburse COLLEGE for personnel costs the COLLEGE incurs while providing agreed upon assistance for services other than maintenance and general cleaning pursuant to this agreement, including salaries and overtime.
 - e. Where feasible, DISTRICT shall give COLLEGE reasonable notice of the need for additional space.
 - f. The DISTRICT shall cooperate with COLLEGE in administering such rules, policies and regulations as outlined in this Agreement or as otherwise applicable.
 - g. DISTRICT Operations Management. The DISTRICT shall designate an employee as the DISTRICT's operations manager, responsible for the day-to-day operations of the Area Learning Center. This person will represent DISTRICT in coordinating with the COLLEGE regarding any security, parking, or other needs that require the COLLEGE's assistance. The DISTRICT shall also designate an employee to be the designated DISTRICT contact in event of injury or emergency.
 - h. DISTRICT is responsible for care and supervision of DISTRICT students and staff.
 - i. DISTRICT shall contract for and provide all security services necessary to meet DISTRICT's needs and shall pay its' security vendor and/or security personnel directly. DISTRICT shall designate the above-referenced DISTRICT Operations Manager, (see Section 8. g., above), to coordinate DISTRICT's security operations with the COLLEGE.
9. **HEALTH AND SAFETY.** DISTRICT shall keep COLLEGE informed of DISTRICT's health and safety requirements impacting COLLEGE, such as emergency drills up to and including evacuation of premises. DISTRICT shall provide a schedule of proposed emergency drill dates and times for COLLEGE approval. COLLEGE shall respond to the schedule request within ten days of receiving said schedule with either approval, or in event of conflict, COLLEGE shall work with DISTRICT to find a satisfactory compromise to meet state requirements. Current requirements for the District include at least 5 lock-down drills, 5 fire drills and one tornado drill per school year.
10. **FOOD SERVICE.** The students and staff will be allowed to use the M-State cafeteria at a designated time agreed upon by the College and the District. COLLEGE and DISTRICT will develop a plan prior to the commencement of classes to accommodate both collegiate food service needs and school district lunch periods. Where feasible, COLLEGE shall provide separate times for school district lunch periods within the Premises.
11. **PARKING.** DISTRICT shall require its students and staff to park in the west parking lot which is adjacent to the campus "B" wing. Parking fees will be

considered inclusive in the facility use fee. COLLEGE will ensure that handicapped parking and access is available in the west parking lot.

12. **SIGNAGE.** The DISTRICT may place temporary exterior signage that identifies the high school operation location within the COLLEGE, subject to approval by COLLEGE as to signage placement. Any requests for permanent or temporary signage, wall hangings, banners, displays, postings, display cases, or bulletin boards must be reviewed by the COLLEGE, and approved by the COLLEGE's authorized representative. All signage shall be in accordance with the COLLEGE's policies relating to signage.
13. **MAINTENANCE OF SPACE.** DISTRICT agrees to maintain the Space in a reasonably clean and sanitary condition. After DISTRICT has completed its use and occupancy of the Space, COLLEGE will inspect the Space for damaged, missing or destroyed items, including fixtures, equipment and machinery. With respect to such damaged, missing or destroyed items, COLLEGE shall have the right, in its sole discretion, to repair, restore, or replace such items at its own cost, and submit an invoice for the same to DISTRICT, which DISTRICT agrees to pay within thirty (30) days thereafter.
14. **END OF TERM; DELIVERY OF SPACE.** DISTRICT covenants that at the termination of this Agreement by lapse of time or otherwise, it shall remove its personal property and vacate and surrender possession of the Space to COLLEGE in as good condition as when DISTRICT took possession, ordinary wear and damage by the elements excepted. Any equipment or furniture paid for by DISTRICT shall remain the property of DISTRICT. DISTRICT shall have the right to remove the above equipment or fixtures at the expiration or termination of the Agreement or any extension.
15. **RULES AND REGULATIONS.** DISTRICT agrees to honor and abide by all federal and state laws, MnSCU Board Policies and procedures, rules and regulations set forth by COLLEGE during its occupancy of the Space, including complying with designated smoking areas related to the District's use of the Space for high school operations under this agreement. This agreement shall include, but not be limited to the following MnSCU Board policies and procedures:
 - a. Possession or Carry of Firearms (MnSCU Board Policy 5.21)
 - b. Use of tobacco products within the COLLEGE facilities is prohibited.
 - c. Acceptable Use of Computers and Information Technology Resources (MnSCU Board Policy 5.22)
 - d. Security and Privacy of Information Resources (MnSCU Board Policy 5.23)
 - e. Compliance with Emergency Operations Plan
 - f. Hazardous Materials. DISTRICT will not store hazardous materials onsite. DISTRICT will consult with the COLLEGE and follow COLLEGE's hazardous materials guidelines for such use in DISTRICT classroom purposes, and for any other onsite chemical or hazardous material use, whatsoever.
16. **HOURS OF OPERATION AND ACCESS.** In recognition of the fact that the DISTRICT and the COLLEGE each have their own academic calendar,

schedule of holidays, professional development activities, course schedules, and hours of operation, the parties shall work cooperatively in providing full access and full functionality to both parties operations. The DISTRICT will have access to the building from 7:00AM until 9:00PM Monday through Thursday and 7:00AM to 7:00PM on Friday. Other days of the week and or times requested shall be submitted to the COLLEGE's authorized agent and will be dealt with on an individual basis.

17. **KEYS AND ACCESS.** Keys and/or electronic access cards will be issued, recorded, and collected according to the COLLEGE's business standards and procedures (i.e., for issuing, use, and collection of keys or access cards). DISTRICT shall allow access to the Space by COLLEGE or its authorized representatives at any reasonable time during the life of this Agreement for the purpose of operation, maintenance, inspection, display and repairs of the Space, upon prior notification to DISTRICT, (or without such notice in case of an emergency).
18. **TECHNOLOGY.** Technology needs will be provided and supported by the DISTRICT. Any technology related improvements that are planned during the Agreement will be coordinated with the College IT department.
19. **CLOSINGS AND EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT.** The DISTRICT agrees that the MnSCU Board Policies 1.A.10 Long-Term Emergency Management and 4.4 Weather/Short-term Emergency Closings shall apply and govern this Agreement. Additionally, DISTRICT agrees to abide by the COLLEGE's Emergency Operations Plan which shall be provided to DISTRICT.
20. **ADMINISTRATIVE COORDINATION.** The DISTRICT and the COLLEGE shall meet quarterly, or as often as needed to address operational issues.
21. **NO AFFILIATION.** The DISTRICT shall not use or make use of COLLEGE's name, insignia, logo, picture or any other material that might create the impression of association, affiliation, partnership, or any joint venture, without the prior written permission of COLLEGE. The DISTRICT may use the name of the COLLEGE in its publicity of an event location as long as such use is not misleading.
22. **DISPUTE RESOLUTION METHODS.** The DISTRICT and COLLEGE shall maintain regular communications between the parties to address operational issues not otherwise contemplated or addressed in this Agreement. Where disputes arise regarding student conduct, the COLLEGE and DISTRICT, each to their own, shall each take appropriate action consistent with their applicable Codes of Conduct. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in instances where conduct or behavior poses an immediate threat to the health, safety or welfare of the student or others in, on or around campus, the COLLEGE may take immediate action to address the threat.
23. **LICENSEE'S INSURANCE.** Prior to DISTRICT's occupancy of the Space, DISTRICT shall provide COLLEGE with a certificate of general liability and property damage insurance naming COLLEGE as an additional insured and reflecting coverage consistent with the requirements contained in **Exhibit B** attached and incorporated herein. DISTRICT shall maintain appropriate

insurance coverage at its sole expense during its use of the Space, and the DISTRICT shall have an ongoing obligation to provide evidence of coverage that meets the state's tort liability threshold, as may be amended from time to time.

24. **HOLD HARMLESS AND INDEMNITY.** DISTRICT shall indemnify and hold COLLEGE harmless for any suits, actions or claims, whether formal or informal, direct or indirect, for injury, death, property damage or loss, including loss as a result of theft or misappropriation, made by or on behalf of any person or persons, firm or corporation arising out of or relating to the conduct, management or use of the Space by DISTRICT or arising out of any work or thing done in or about the Space or structures or equipment in the Space when such has been authorized by DISTRICT, except as such injury, death or property damage or loss is attributable solely to COLLEGE's negligence as determined by a court of law. DISTRICT hereby assumes all responsibility for security throughout its occupancy and use of the Space. The DISTRICT's obligation to indemnify COLLEGE under this clause shall be limited in accordance with statutory tort liability limitations as set forth in Minnesota Statute 466.04 to limit the DISTRICT's total liability for all claims arising from a single occurrence, including COLLEGE's claim for indemnification, to the limits prescribed under section 466.04
25. **MINNESOTA DATA PRACTICES ACT.** DISTRICT and COLLEGE each agree to comply with the terms of the Minnesota Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 13, in handling all data related to this Agreement.
26. **AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT (ADA) COMPLIANCE.** DISTRICT agrees that in occupying the Space, it is responsible for complying with the Americans with Disabilities Act, 42 U. S. C. section 12101, et seq., and any regulations promulgated pursuant to the Act, provided that DISTRICT shall not be responsible for making any alterations or improvements to the Space pursuant to its compliance obligations under this Agreement. COLLEGE IS NOT responsible for issues or challenges related to compliance with the ADA beyond its own routine use of facilities, services, or other areas covered by the ADA.
27. **AUDIT.** The books, records, documents, and accounting practices and procedures of DISTRICT relevant to this agreement shall be subject to examination by COLLEGE, the Minnesota Department of Administration, and either the Minnesota Legislative Auditor or State Auditor.
28. **NO ASSIGNMENT; AMENDMENTS.** DISTRICT shall neither assign nor transfer any rights or obligations under this agreement without the prior written consent of COLLEGE. All amendments to this agreement shall be in writing and executed by a duly authorized representative of each party.
29. **JURISDICTION AND VENUE.** This contract, and amendments and supplements thereto, shall be governed by the laws of the State of Minnesota. Venue for all legal proceedings arising out of this contract, or breach thereof, shall be in the state or federal court with competent jurisdiction in Ramsey County, Minnesota.

30. **TERMINATION.** This agreement may be terminated by either party at any time, for any reason, upon one hundred twenty (120) days written notice to the other party.

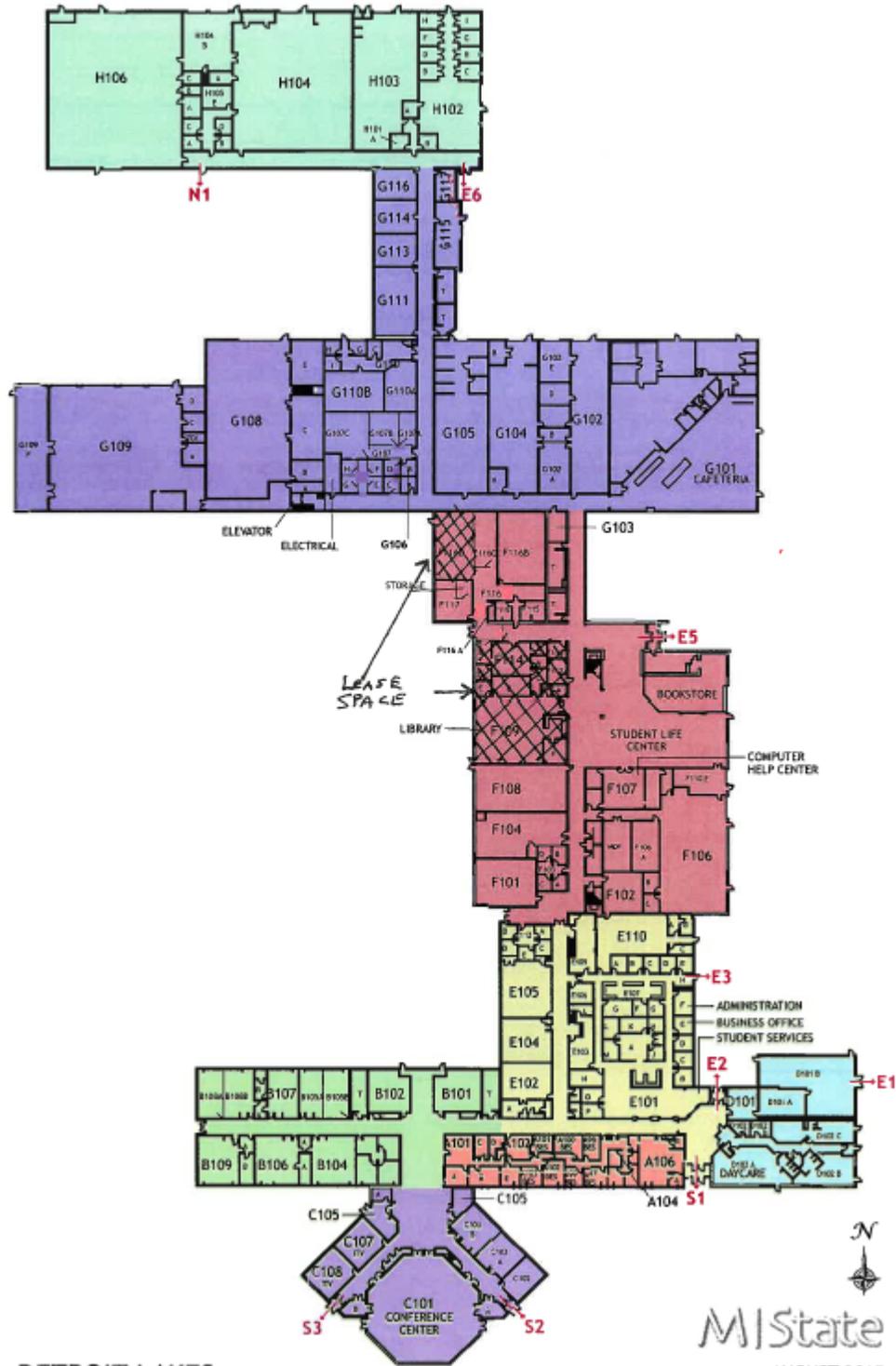

7. **COLLEGE DUTIES.** COLLEGE will provide:

- a. Sufficient electrical power for lights, computers, printer, fax machines, radios and other electrical equipment.
- b. Sufficient heat or cooling, consistent with normal usage of the space.
- c. All maintenance and general cleaning of the Space.

The college will make every reasonable effort to relocate the ALC to avoid interruption of classes should electrical or heating services fail for more than 24 hours.

8. **DISTRICT'S DUTIES.**

- a. The DISTRICT agrees that it shall exercise reasonable care in the conduct of its activities in such facilities.
- b. DISTRICT shall pay the facility fees and charges as established under this agreement.

The DISTRICT shall also designate an employee to be the designated DISTRICT contact in event of injury or emergency.
 - h. DISTRICT is responsible for care and supervision of DISTRICT students and staff.
 - i. DISTRICT shall contract for and provide all security services necessary to meet DISTRICT's needs and shall pay its' security vendor and/or security personnel directly. DISTRICT shall designate the above-referenced DISTRICT Operations Manager, (see Section 8. g., above), to coordinate DISTRICT's security operations with the COLLEGE.
9. **HEALTH AND SAFETY.** DISTRICT shall keep COLLEGE informed of DISTRICT's health and safety requirements impacting COLLEGE, such as emergency drills up to and including evacuation of premises. DISTRICT shall provide a schedule of proposed emergency drill dates and times for COLLEGE approval. COLLEGE shall respond to the schedule request within ten days of receiving said schedule with either approval, or in event of conflict, COLLEGE shall work with DISTRICT to find a satisfactory compromise to meet state requirements. Current requirements for the District include at least 5 lock-down drills, 5 fire drills and one tornado drill per school year.
10. **FOOD SERVICE.** The students and staff will be allowed to use the M-State cafeteria at a designated time agreed upon by the College and the District. COLLEGE and DISTRICT will develop a plan prior to the commencement of classes to accommodate both collegiate food service needs and school district lunch periods. Where feasible, COLLEGE shall provide separate times for school district lunch periods within the Premises.
11. **PARKING.** DISTRICT shall require its students and staff to park in the west parking lot which is adjacent to the campus "B" wing. Parking fees will be considered inclusive in the facility use fee. COLLEGE will ensure that handicapped parking and access is available in the west parking lot.

12. **SIGNAGE.** The DISTRICT may place temporary exterior signage that identifies the high school operation location within the COLLEGE, subject to approval by COLLEGE as to signage placement. Any requests for permanent or temporary signage, wall hangings, banners, displays, postings, display cases, or bulletin boards must be reviewed by the COLLEGE, and approved by the COLLEGE's authorized representative. All signage shall be in accordance with the COLLEGE's policies relating to signage.
13. **MAINTENANCE OF SPACE.** DISTRICT agrees to maintain the Space in a reasonably clean and sanitary condition. Other days of the week and or times requested shall be submitted to the COLLEGE's authorized agent and will be dealt with on an individual basis.

18. **TECHNOLOGY.** Technology needs will be provided and supported by the DISTRICT. Any technology related improvements that are planned during the Agreement will be coordinated with the College IT department.
19. **CLOSINGS AND EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT.** The DISTRICT agrees that the MnSCU Board Policies 1.A.10 Long-Term Emergency Management and 4.4 Weather/Short-term Emergency Closings shall apply and govern this Agreement. Additionally, DISTRICT agrees to abide by the COLLEGE's Emergency Operations Plan which shall be provided to DISTRICT.
20. **ADMINISTRATIVE COORDINATION.** The DISTRICT and the COLLEGE shall meet quarterly, or as often as needed to address operational issues.
21. **NO AFFILIATION.** The DISTRICT shall not use or make use of COLLEGE's name, insignia, logo, picture or any other material that might create the impression of association, affiliation, partnership, or any joint venture, without the prior written permission of COLLEGE. The DISTRICT may use the name of the COLLEGE in its publicity of an event location as long as such use is not misleading.
22. **DISPUTE RESOLUTION METHODS.** The DISTRICT and COLLEGE shall maintain regular communications between the parties to address operational issues not otherwise contemplated or addressed in this Agreement. Where disputes arise regarding student conduct, the COLLEGE and DISTRICT, each to their own, shall each take appropriate action consistent with their applicable Codes of Conduct. DISTRICT shall maintain appropriate insurance coverage at its sole expense during its use of the Space, and the DISTRICT shall have an ongoing obligation to provide evidence of coverage

that meets the state's tort liability threshold, as may be amended from time to time.

24. **HOLD HARMLESS AND INDEMNITY.** DISTRICT shall indemnify and hold COLLEGE harmless for any suits, actions or claims, whether formal or informal, direct or indirect, for injury, death, property damage or loss, including loss as a result of theft or misappropriation, made by or on behalf of any person or persons, firm or corporation arising out of or relating to the conduct, management or use of the Space by DISTRICT or arising out of any work or thing done in or about the Space or structures or equipment in the Space when such has been authorized by DISTRICT, except as such injury, death or property damage or loss is attributable solely to COLLEGE's negligence as determined by a court of law. DISTRICT hereby assumes all responsibility for security throughout its occupancy and use of the Space. The DISTRICT's obligation to indemnify COLLEGE under this clause shall be limited in accordance with statutory tort liability limitations as set forth in Minnesota Statute 466.04 to limit the DISTRICT's total liability for all claims arising from a single occurrence, including COLLEGE's claim for indemnification, to the limits prescribed under section 466.04
25. **MINNESOTA DATA PRACTICES ACT.** DISTRICT and COLLEGE each agree to comply with the terms of the Minnesota Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 13, in handling all data related to this Agreement.
26. **AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT (ADA) COMPLIANCE.** DISTRICT agrees that in occupying the Space, it is responsible for complying with the Americans with Disabilities Act, 42 U. S. C. section 12101, et seq., and any regulations promulgated pursuant to the Act, provided that DISTRICT shall not be responsible for making any alterations or improvements to the Space pursuant to its compliance obligations under this Agreement. THIS FACILITIES USE, SERVICES, AND REIMBURSEMENT AGREEMENT is made by and between the **STATE OF MINNESOTA, BY AND THROUGH THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF MINNESOTA STATE COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES, ON BEHALF OF MINNESOTA STATE COMMUNITY AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE – DETROIT LAKES CAMPUS**, located at 900 Highway 34 East, Detroit Lakes MN 56501, hereinafter referred to as **COLLEGE**, and **DETROIT LAKES PUBLIC SCHOOLS – DISTRICT NO. 22**, a school district under the laws of Minnesota, located at 702 Lake Avenue Detroit Lakes MN 56501, hereinafter referred to as **DISTRICT**, to provide office and classroom space on COLLEGE’s campus for high school operations.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Minnesota State Colleges and Universities is empowered by Minn. Stat. §136F.06, to govern Board-related property, and

WHEREAS, COLLEGE has under its control **MINNESOTA STATE COMMUNITY AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE – DETROIT LAKES CAMPUS** located at 900 Highway 34 East, Detroit Lakes MN 56501 , and has space in that building, and

WHEREAS, COLLEGE and DISTRICT have explored the use of MNSCU’s college campus to allow for location of certain high school operations, and

WHEREAS, COLLEGE and DISTRICT wish to enter into this Agreement governing the use of COLLEGE facilities by the DISTRICT, and

NOW THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

AGREEMENT

1. **PERMITTED USE.** COLLEGE agrees to allow DISTRICT the exclusive use of the facilities, including offices and classrooms, identified for high school robotics program operations as G104. This space contact 3,082 square feet.
2. **ADDITIONAL USE.** If the need arises, the DISTRICT may request the use of additional rooms or offices from time to time in writing to the COLLEGE. The COLLEGE agrees that, in its sole discretion, after meeting its responsibilities to students, faculty, administrative employees and other staff members, volunteers

and agents, it will allow the DISTRICT to make the additional use of its facilities as needed. All Additional Space use shall be subject to the terms of this Agreement, which shall be amended accordingly prior to use of Additional Space. DISTRICT acknowledges and agrees that this Agreement is not intended to and does not create a landlord-tenant relationship between the parties. 17. **CLOSINGS AND EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT.** The DISTRICT agrees that the MnSCU Board Policies 1.A.10 Long-Term Emergency Management and 4.4 Weather/Short-term Emergency Closings shall apply and govern this Agreement. Additionally, DISTRICT agrees to abide by the COLLEGE's Emergency Operations Plan which shall be provided to DISTRICT.
18. **NO AFFILIATION.** The DISTRICT shall not use or make use of COLLEGE's name, insignia, logo, picture or any other material that might create the impression of association, affiliation, partnership, or any joint venture, without the prior written permission of COLLEGE. The DISTRICT may use the name of the COLLEGE in its publicity of an event location as long as such use is not misleading.
19. **DISPUTE RESOLUTION METHODS.** The DISTRICT and COLLEGE shall maintain regular communications between the parties to address operational issues not otherwise contemplated or addressed in this Agreement. Where disputes arise regarding student conduct, the COLLEGE and DISTRICT, each to their own, shall

- each take appropriate action consistent with their applicable Codes of Conduct. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in instances where conduct or behavior poses an immediate threat to the health, safety or welfare of the student or others in, on or around campus, the COLLEGE may take immediate action to address the threat.
20. **LICENSEE'S INSURANCE.** Prior to DISTRICT's occupancy of the Space, DISTRICT shall provide COLLEGE with a certificate of general liability and property damage insurance naming COLLEGE as an additional insured and reflecting coverage consistent with the requirements contained in **Exhibit A** attached and incorporated herein. DISTRICT shall maintain appropriate insurance coverage at its sole expense during its use of the Space, and the DISTRICT shall have an ongoing obligation to provide evidence of coverage that meets the state's tort liability threshold, as may be amended from time to time.
 21. **HOLD HARMLESS AND INDEMNITY.** DISTRICT shall indemnify and hold COLLEGE harmless for any suits, actions or claims, whether formal or informal, direct or indirect, for injury, death, property damage or loss, including loss as a result of theft or misappropriation, made by or on behalf of any person or persons, firm or corporation arising out of or relating to the conduct, management or use of the Space by DISTRICT or arising out of any work or thing done in or about the Space or structures or equipment in the Space when such has been authorized by DISTRICT, except as such injury, death or property damage or loss is attributable solely to COLLEGE's negligence as determined by a court of law. DISTRICT hereby assumes all responsibility for security throughout its occupancy and use of the Space. The DISTRICT's obligation to indemnify COLLEGE under this clause shall be limited in accordance with statutory tort liability limitations as set forth in Minnesota Statute 466.04 to limit the DISTRICT's total liability for all claims arising from a single occurrence, including COLLEGE's claim for indemnification, to the limits prescribed under section 466.04
 22. **MINNESOTA DATA PRACTICES ACT.** DISTRICT and COLLEGE each agree to comply with the terms of the Minnesota Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 13, in handling all data related to this Agreement.
 23. **AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT (ADA) COMPLIANCE.** DISTRICT agrees that in occupying the Space, it is responsible for complying with the Americans with Disabilities Act, 42 U. S. C. section 12101, et seq., and any regulations promulgated pursuant to the Act, provided that DISTRICT shall not be responsible for making any alterations or improvements to the Space pursuant to its compliance obligations under this Agreement. COLLEGE IS NOT responsible for issues or challenges related to compliance with the ADA beyond its own routine use of facilities, services, or other areas covered by the ADA.
 24. **AUDIT.** The books, records, documents, and accounting practices and procedures of DISTRICT relevant to this agreement shall be subject to examination by COLLEGE, the Minnesota Department of Administration, and either the Minnesota Legislative Auditor or State Auditor.
 25. **NO ASSIGNMENT; AMENDMENTS.** DISTRICT shall neither assign nor transfer any rights or obligations under this agreement without the prior written consent of COLLEGE. All amendments to this agreement shall be in writing and executed by a duly authorized representative of each party.

26. **JURISDICTION AND VENUE.** This contract, and amendments and supplements thereto, shall be governed by the laws of the State of Minnesota. Venue for all legal proceedings arising out of this contract, or breach thereof, shall be in the state or federal court with competent jurisdiction in Ramsey County, Minnesota.
27. **TERMINATION.** This agreement may be terminated by either party at any time, for any reason, upon one hundred twenty (120) days written notice to the other party.

Additional Insurance Conditions

- DISTRICT's policy(ies) shall be primary insurance to any other valid and collectible insurance available to the State of Minnesota with respect to any claim arising out of the DISTRICT's performance under this Agreement.
- DISTRICT agrees to notify the State of Minnesota within five (5) business days with a copy of the cancellation notice, unless DISTRICT's policy(ies) contain a provision that coverage afforded under the policy(ies) will not be cancelled without at least thirty (30) days advance written notice to the State of Minnesota
- DISTRICT is responsible for payment of Agreement related insurance premiums and deductibles.
- If DISTRICT is self-insured, a Certification of Self-Insurance must be attached.
- DISTRICT's policy(ies) shall include legal defense fees in addition to the liability policy limits.
- DISTRICT shall obtain insurance policy(ies) from insurance company(ies) having an "AM Best" rating of A- (minus), Financial Size Category of VII or better, and authorized to do business in the State of Minnesota.

- An Umbrella or Excess Liability insurance policy may be used to supplement the DISTRICT's policy limits to satisfy the full policy limits required by the Agreement.

**CITY OF DETROIT LAKES / DETROIT LAKES SCHOOL DISTRICT #22
FACILITY USE AGREEMENT**

THIS AGREEMENT, Made this ____ day of _____, 2025, by and between the City of Detroit Lakes, a municipal corporation, 1025 Lake Avenue, Detroit Lakes, MN 56501, hereinafter called "City," and the Independent School District No. 22 of Becker County, 702 Lake Avenue, Detroit Lakes, MN 56501, hereinafter called "School District."

RECITALS

1. The City is the owner of the following recreational facilities: Washington Ballpark (1301 Washington Avenue), Recreational Center Tennis Courts (210 North Shore Drive), and Snappy Park (1275 Cheryl Avenue), hereinafter referred to collectively as the "Recreational Facilities;" and
2. The School District desires to use said Recreational Facilities for its interscholastic and extracurricular programs; and
3. The City and School District desire to enter into a facilities use agreement defining their rights, duties, and liabilities.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the use fee and pursuant to the terms of this agreement, the City and School agree as follows:

1. **TERM OF AGREEMENT.** The term of this Agreement shall be for ten (10) years, commencing August 1, 2025 and expiring July 31, 2035.
2. **USE OF RECREATIONAL FACILITIES.** The School District is granted the priority, but non-exclusive, use of the Recreational Facilities for its school related interscholastic and extracurricular programs. The City retains the right to use the Recreational Facilities and the right to grant use of the Recreational Facilities to third parties during the term of this agreement, provided that use by the City does not conflict with the use of the Recreational Facilities by the School District as set forth in this Agreement.
3. **USE FEE.** The School District agrees to pay to the City the following annual use fee for the use of the Recreational Facilities described in this agreement:

2025 - 2026	\$25,000 by January 15, 2026
2026 - 2027	\$25,000 by January 15, 2027
2027 - 2028	\$25,000 by January 15, 2028

2028 - 2029	\$25,000 by January 15, 2029
2029 - 2030	\$25,000 by January 15, 2030
2030 - 2031	\$25,000 by January 15, 2031
2031 - 2032	\$25,000 by January 15, 2032
2032 - 2033	\$25,000 by January 15, 2033
2033 - 2034	\$25,000 by January 15, 2034
2034 - 2035	\$25,000 by January 15, 2035

4. SCHEDULE. The School District shall have the priority use of the Recreational Facilities during the official school year schedule. The School shall provide the City with its request for use dates for the Recreational Facilities each year as soon as possible.
5. SUPERVISION. The School District is to provide personnel to supervise students at any time the Recreational Facilities are being used by its students under this agreement. Such personnel shall be assigned by and responsible to School Administration.
6. MAINTENANCE. The City shall provide regular mowing and trimming of the Recreational Facilities. Manicuring of the ballfields, including dragging and striping, shall be the sole responsibility of the School District or other users requesting the maintenance. The City shall provide normal and routines garbage removal at the Recreational Facilities. After use of the Recreational Facilities, the School District shall return the facilities to their prior condition.
7. RESTROOMS. The City shall provide, weather permitting, restroom facilities at the Recreational Facilities. Additional portable restrooms shall be at the expense of the School District or other users requesting the service.
8. UTILITIES. The City shall pay all of the utility cost for the Recreational Facilities. Care shall be taken by the School District to minimize watering and use of electricity.
9. RULES AND REGULATIONS. The rules and regulations of Independent School District No. 22 pertaining to student conduct shall be in effect during all times the Recreational Facilities are used by the School District. Additional policies governing the conduct of students may be developed as needed by the Public Works Director and the School Administration. The policies, rules and regulations shall be enforced

by School District personnel as assigned by the School Administration. The School Activities Director shall notify the Public Works Director of the School District personnel responsible for supervision and enforcement of policies, rules, and regulations pertaining to the various activities conducted by the School District on the premises.

10. ASSIGNMENT. The School District shall not assign any rights or duties under this agreement or grant any third party the use of the Recreational Facilities, or any part thereof, nor allow any other person to occupy or use the Recreational Facilities without the prior written consent of the City, which consent shall not unreasonably be withheld. Consent to one period of use by any other person or entity shall not be consent to any subsequent use by persons other than the School District. This agreement shall not be assignable, as to the interest of the School District voluntarily or by operation of law without the written consent of the City. If the City does give consent to assignment or use by third parties, such consent shall not release the School District from its obligations hereunder unless a release is specifically given by the City.
11. CASUALTY DAMAGE. If during the term of this agreement the Recreational Facilities or any portion thereof shall be damaged or destroyed by fire or other casualty so that the Recreational Facilities or a portion thereof shall thereby be rendered unfit for use or occupation, the City shall have the option to either (a) repair such damage with all reasonable diligence and restore the premises to substantially the same condition immediately prior to such event, and until said premises shall have been duly repaired and restored, the use fee or a proportionate part thereof, according to the nature and extent of the damage which has been sustained, shall be abated, or (b) the City or School District may terminate this agreement and in case of such termination, the use fee shall be paid proportionate to the date of such fire or casualty and all other further obligations on the part of either party hereto shall cease.
12. INDEMNIFICATION. School District shall indemnify, protect, save, hold harmless and insure City, and its respective officers, directors, employees and members and agents, from and against any and all claims and demands for, or litigation with respect to, all damages, including expenses, reasonable attorneys' fees, and costs of alternative dispute resolution, which may arise out of or be caused by School District or its agents, employees, students, patrons, invitees, attendees, volunteers, or contractors, with respect to School District's use, operation or maintenance of the Recreational Facilities. School District shall defend City against the foregoing, or litigation in connection with the foregoing, at School District's expense, with counsel reasonably acceptable to City. City, at its expense, shall have the right to participate in the defense of any claims or litigation and shall have the right to approve any settlement, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld. The indemnification provision of this Paragraph shall not apply to damages or other losses proximately caused by or resulting

from the negligence or willful misconduct of City. All indemnification obligations shall survive termination of this Agreement, provided that the incident giving rise to the indemnification obligation must have occurred during the term of this Agreement.

13. **LIABILITY INSURANCE.** School District shall, at School District's expense, maintain in effect bodily injury liability insurance and property damage insurance with limits not less than the maximum liability limits for a municipality as provided in Minnesota Statutes, Section 466.04, as amended. School District shall provide the City with evidence of such insurance in the form of a certificate of insurance no later than ten days after executing this Agreement and annually thereafter. The City shall be an additional insured on such policy and all certificates shall contain a provision that the insurance shall not be cancelled unless prior written notice thereof is given to the City not less than 30 days prior to the effective date of such cancellation. Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement, if the School District fails to maintain a policy of insurance as required by the City for the term of this Agreement, the City may immediately revoke this License.
14. **HOLD HARMLESS.** The City shall not be liable to the School District or to any employee, student or invitee of the School District for any claim or cause of action arising out of death, injury, damage to property occurring in, on or about the leased premises except for damages caused or contributed to by the negligence or breach of this agreement by the City, its employees or agents as determined by a court of competent jurisdiction.
15. **ALTERATIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS.** The School District shall not make alterations, additions or improvements, nor make changes to the Recreational Facilities without prior written approval from City. Any banners or signs placed at the Recreational Facilities shall be approved by the Public Works Director. The School District shall provide lien waivers to City from any contractors or subcontractors furnishing material, services or labor to any improvement, which City may, in its discretion, require in advance of providing City's written approval. The School District shall hold City harmless from any liens, encumbrances or other obligations whatsoever arising from any such alterations or improvements.
16. **OWNERSHIP OF IMPROVEMENTS AND FIXTURES.** Any alterations, installations, additions and improvements made to the Recreational Facilities by the School District shall become the property of City. However, furniture, trade fixtures and other movable personal property installed by School District shall remain the School District's property and may be removed at any time, provided School District promptly repairs any damage caused by removal.
17. **KEYS.** The City shall provide the School District with keys as necessary to access the

Recreational Facilities. All keys must be accounted for and returned to the City at the conclusion of each annual use period.

18. SUCCESSORS. This agreement shall bind the respective successors, and assigns of the parties.
19. DEFAULT. If a party defaults in the performance of any provision of this agreement, the non-defaulting party may give the defaulting party a notice of such default. If the defaulting party fails to cure any default within 10 days after notice, then the non-defaulting party may terminate this agreement by notice to the other party and on the date specified in said notice the agreement shall terminate and the use of the Recreational Facilities by the School District shall end on the date specified. If termination results from default by the City, the City shall refund to the School District the share of the use fee paid by the School District proportionate to the date of such termination. If termination results from default by the School District use of the Recreational Facilities by the School District shall end, but no refund of any share of the use fee paid by the School District is due and the School District shall remain liable for all obligations of the School District established in this agreement.
20. NO WAIVER OF DEFAULT. The failure of either party to insist on strict performance of any provision of this agreement shall not be construed as a waiver of such provision.
21. NOTICE. Any notice by either party to the other shall be in writing and shall be deemed to be duly given if delivered personally or mailed by certified mail in a postpaid envelope addressed to the business office of the addressee noted in this agreement. Notice shall be deemed duly given, if delivered personally, upon the delivery thereof, and if mailed, upon the day following the mailing thereof.
22. ENTIRE AGREEMENT. This document sets forth the entire agreement between the parties concerning the Recreational Facilities. No amendment to this agreement shall be binding upon the parties unless made in writing, duly authorized by their respective governing bodies and signed.
23. NO JOINT POWERS RELATIONSHIP. Nothing in this agreement shall be interpreted as creating a partnership or Joint Powers entity between the parties relative to the Recreational Facilities nor any other activity at the Recreational Facilities other than the relationship of City and School District.
24. NO WARRANTIES. The City makes no warranties or representations and School District has not relied on any such warranties or representations express or implied, relative to the condition of the Recreational Facilities or any other matter relative to

this agreement. School District acknowledges that School District has thoroughly inspected the Recreational Facilities and can and will use the same in an “AS IS” condition without any obligation on behalf of the City to make alterations or improvements.

25. CAPTIONS. All captions, headings or titles in this agreement are for convenience and do not limit the scope of the paragraphs or sections to which they apply.

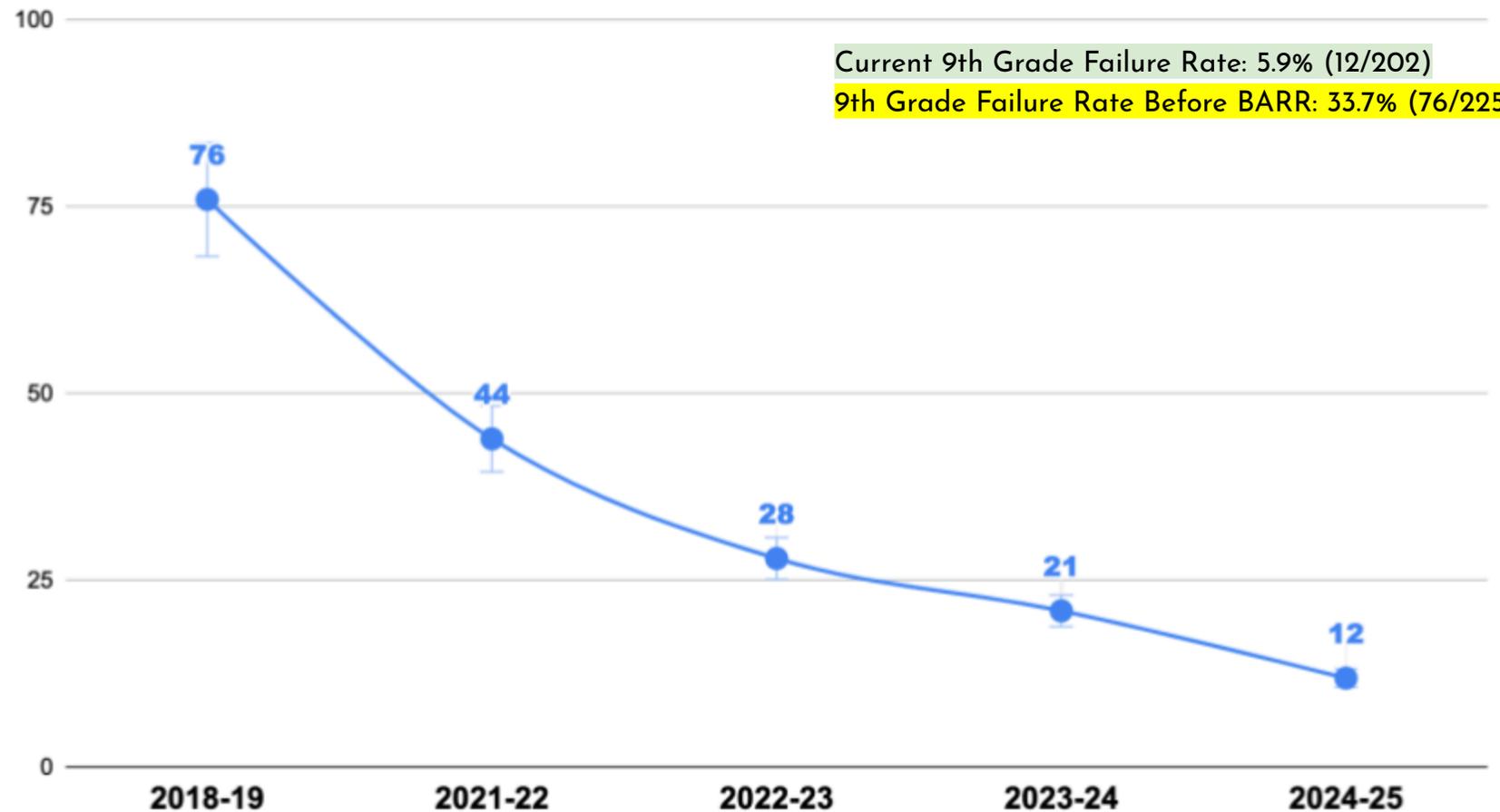

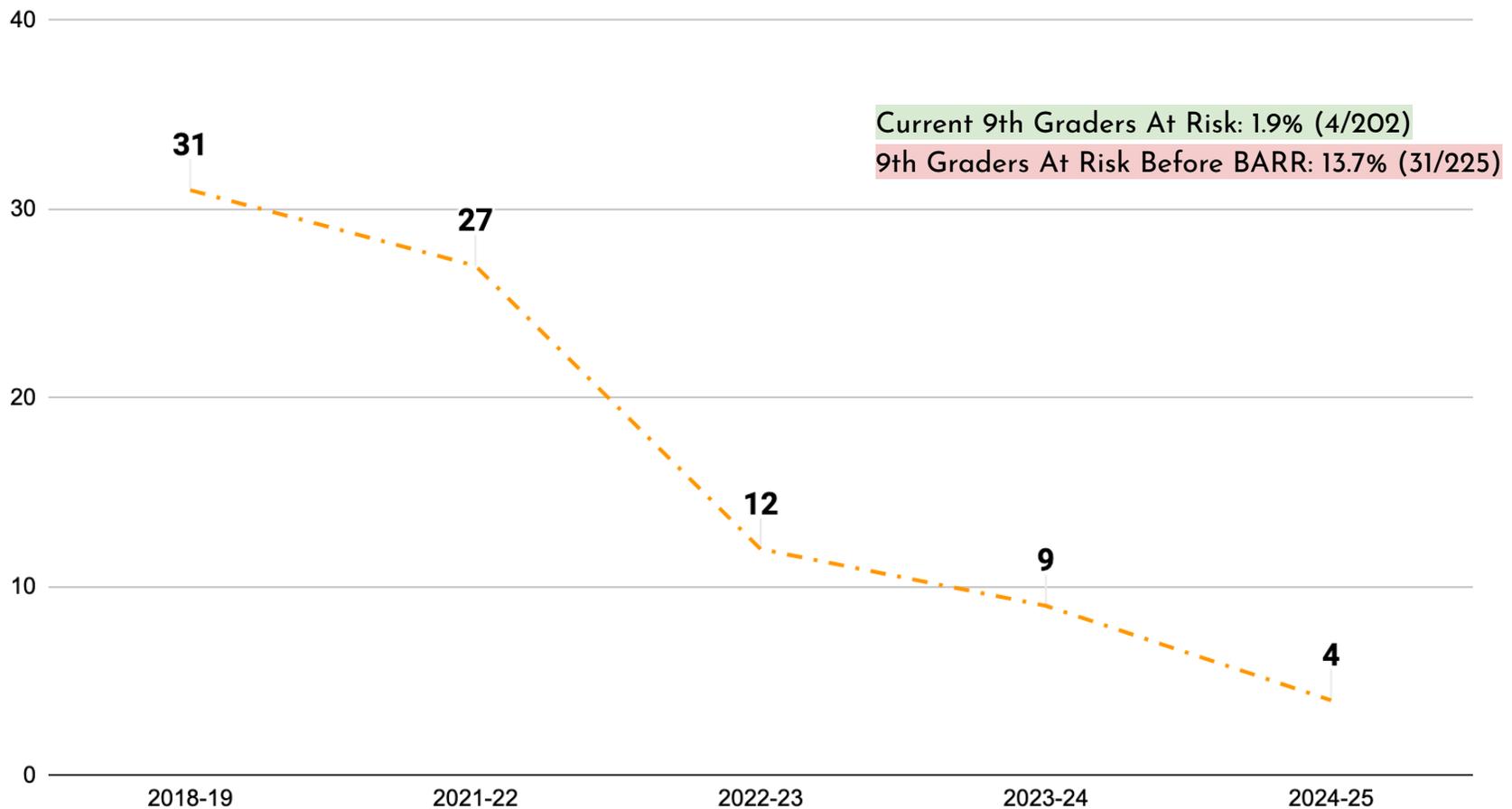
DLHS Total Number of 9th Grade Failures 2018-Present

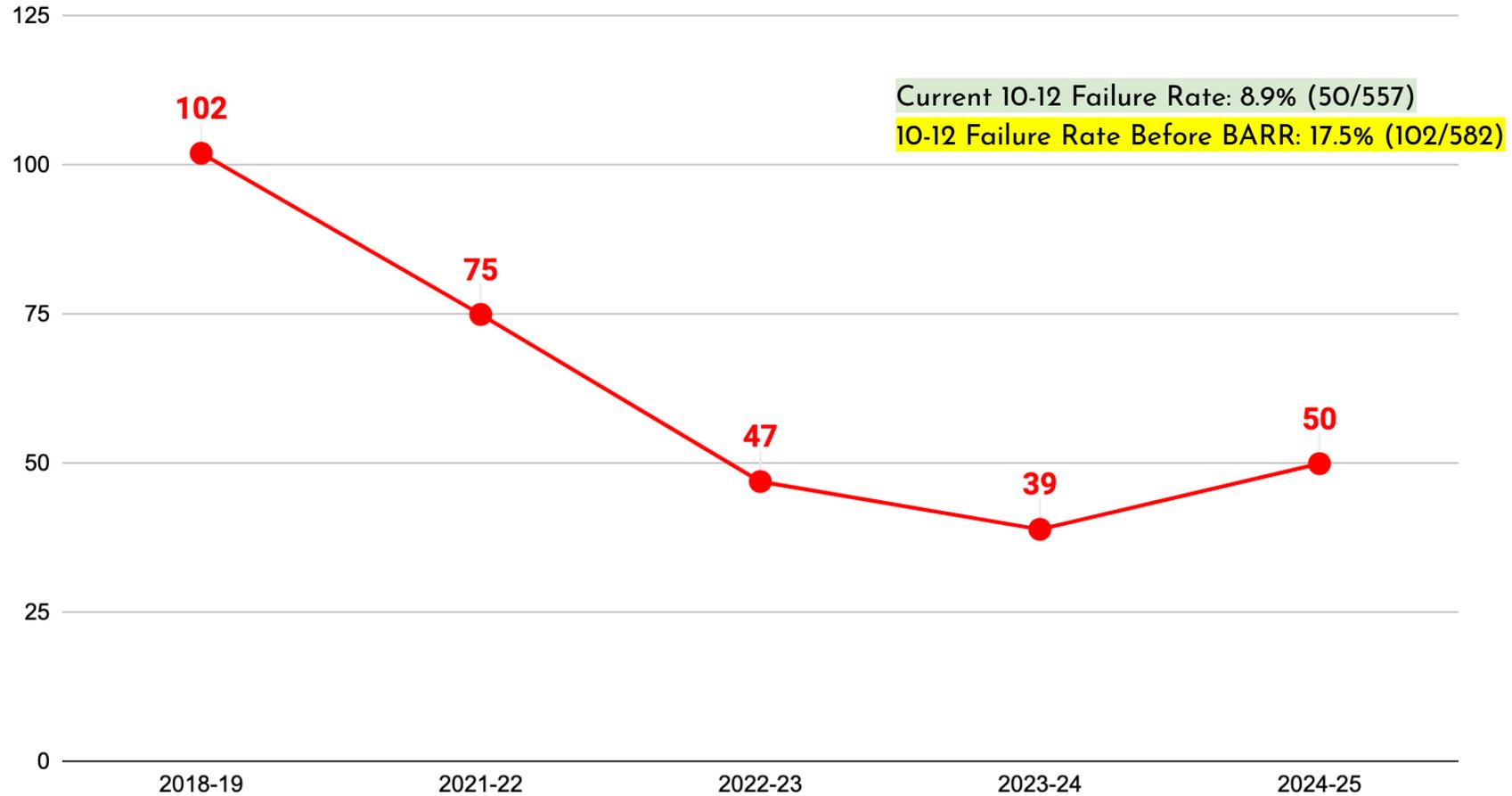
DLHS 9th Graders-3+ Course Failures 2018-Present

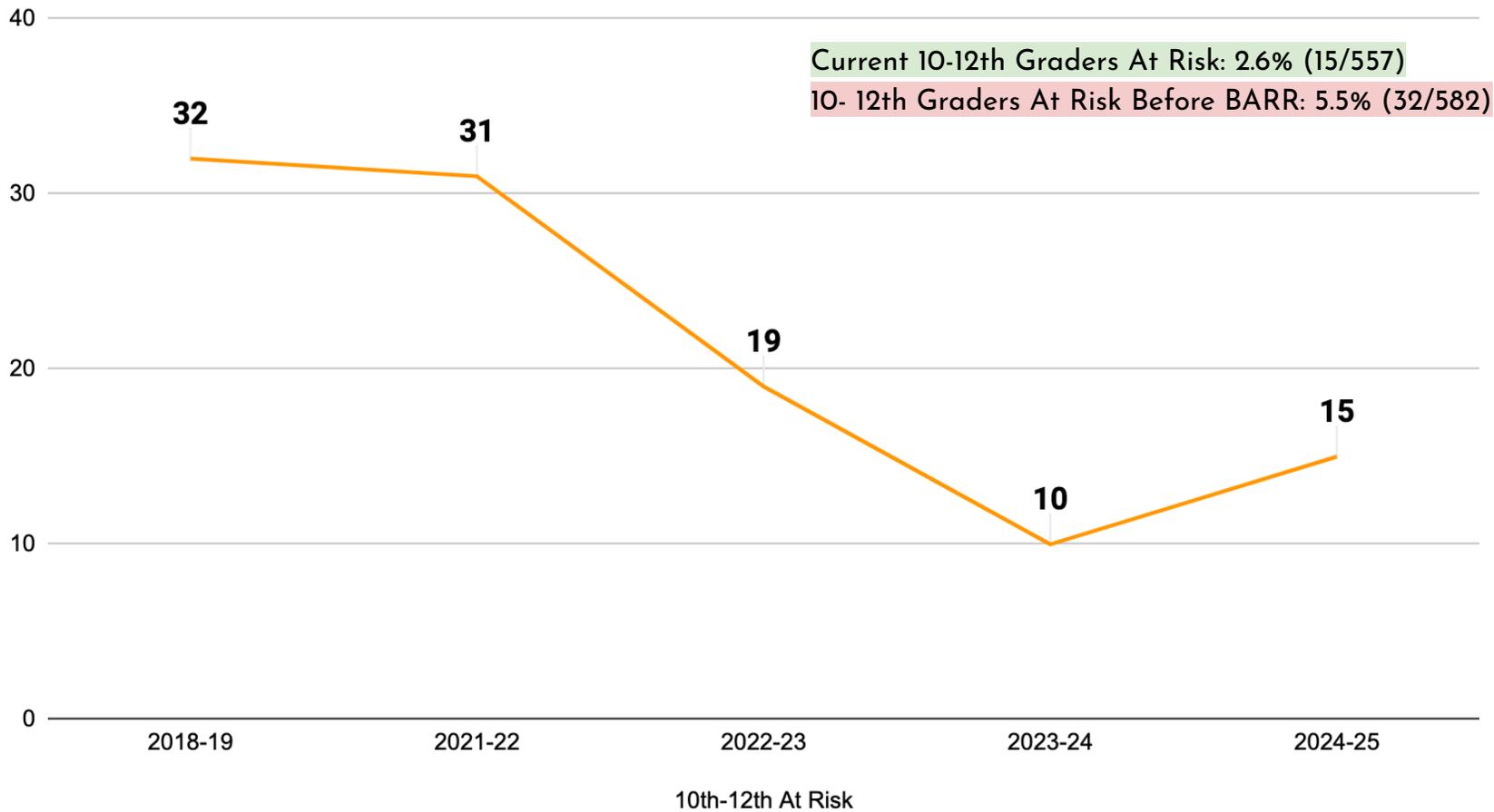
DLHS 10-12th Grade Course Failures 2018-Present

DLHS 10-12th Grades Students- 3+ Course Failures 2018-Present

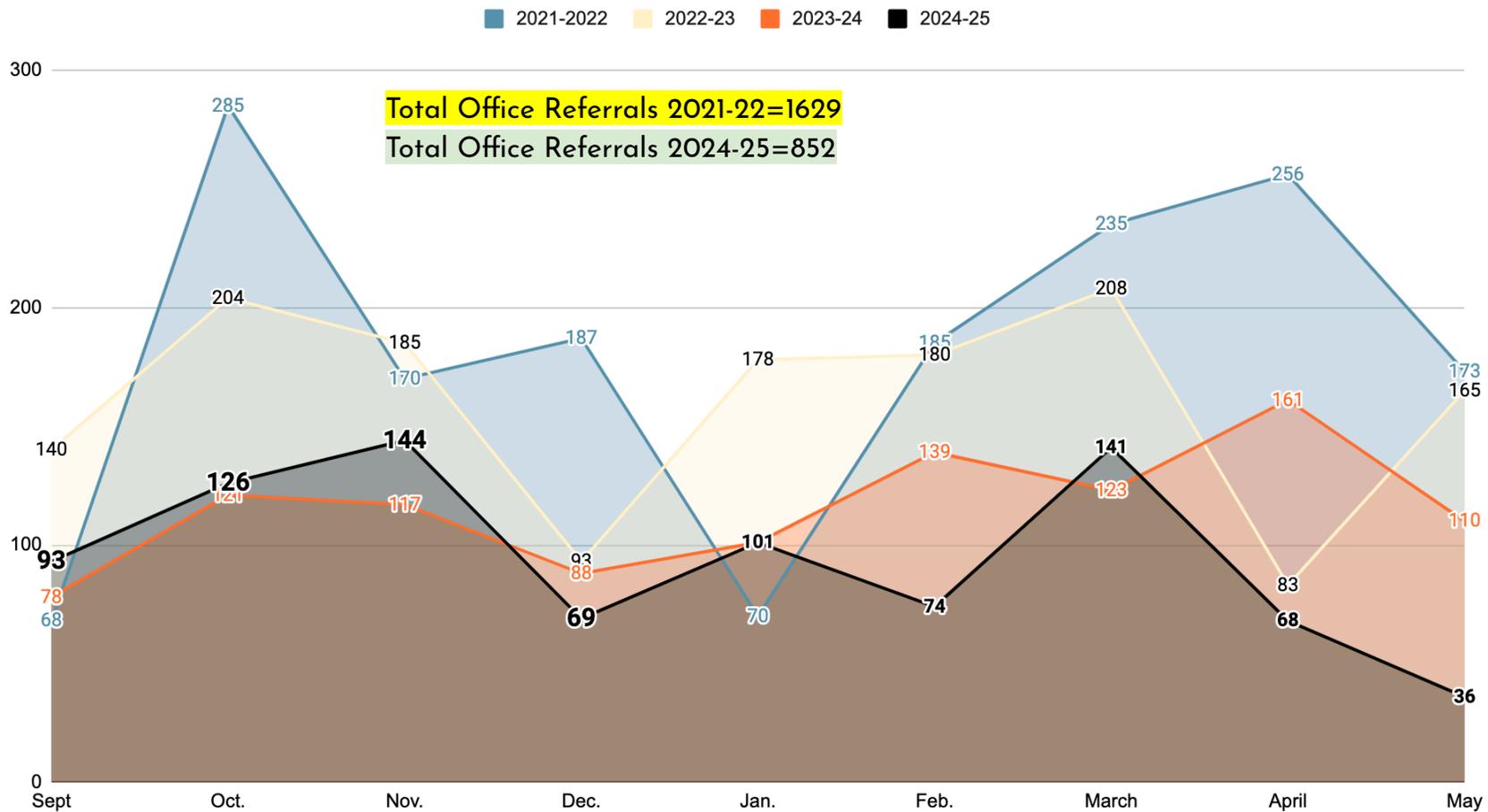

DLHS Office Discipline Referrals/Month-2021-Present

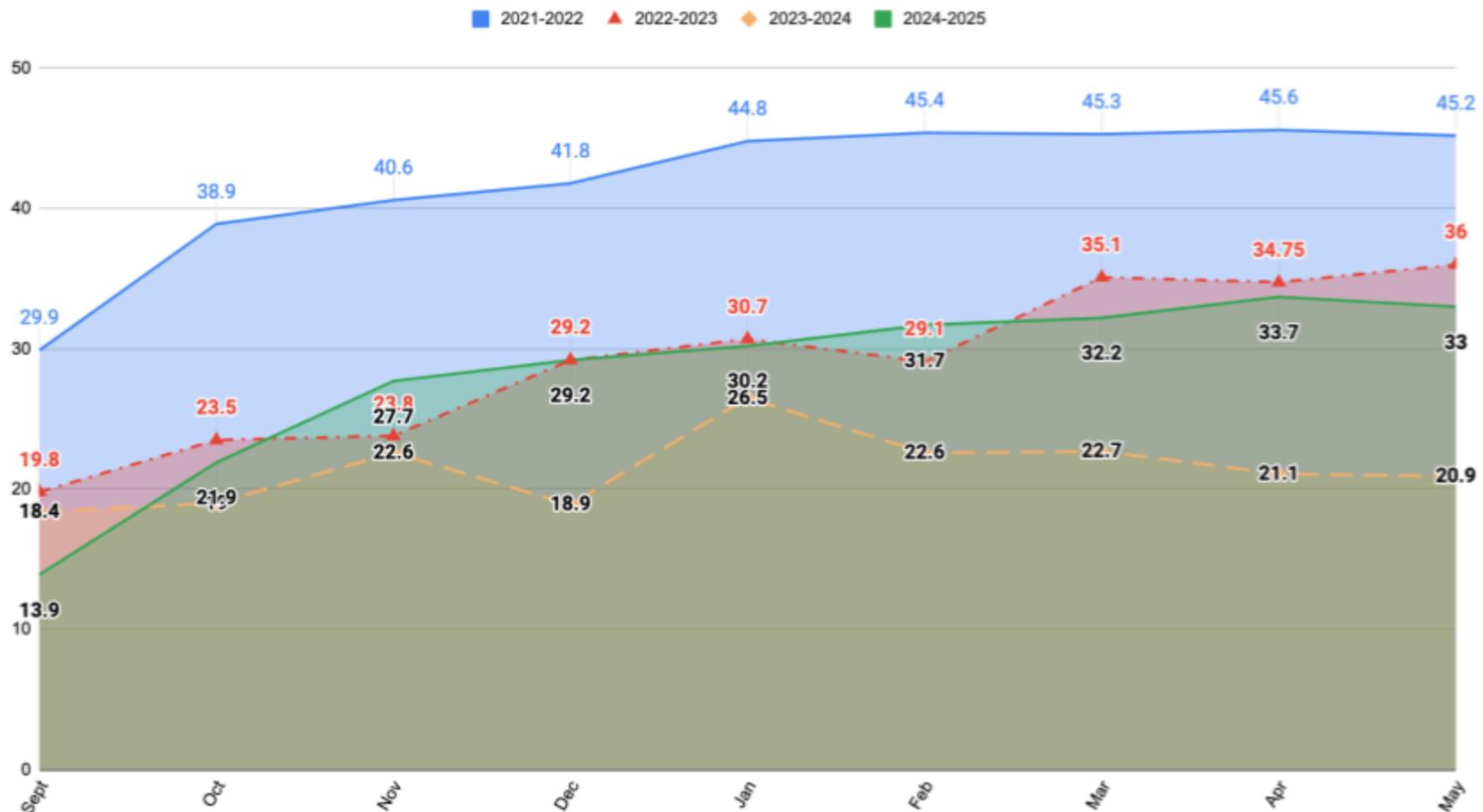

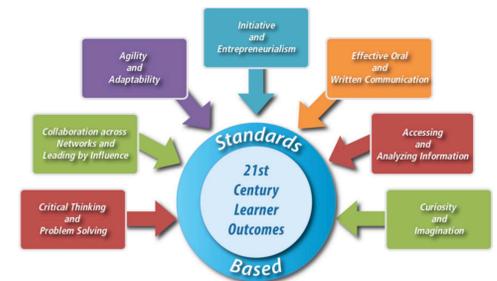

Updating pacing guides was a major focus of our work at DLHS this year. We dedicated time during every in-service day to discuss, review, and revise pacing guides. Throughout the year, Mr. Messer and I established regular checkpoints to monitor progress and provided support to staff as needed.

The Risk Management and Workers Compensation Insurance programs for Detroit Lakes Public Schools are up for renewal on July 1, 2025. Bremer Insurance is our authorized agent of record.

Property/Liability Insurance, Cyber Liability, Volunteer Accident

We will have a \$32,102.16 increase from last year's premium. This year's anticipated Property/Liability, Cyber, Volunteer Accident premium will be \$247,325.51 compared to \$215,220.35 last year. EMC has increased the blanket property coverage limit to \$268,407,879.

Public School property/liability insurance premiums are largely predicated on three variables:

1. Valuation of Buildings/Equipment
2. Number of Students Served
3. Number of Licensed Professional Staff

Our enrollments and staffing levels have remained fairly consistent for the last five years, while our building and equipment valuations have increased following the completion building project.

Our Agent of Record, Matthew Baker, from Bremer Insurance is recommending the EMC Insurance proposal.

I recommend that we renew our insurance program with EMC Insurance as shown on the attached summary between July 1, 2025 and June 30, 2026 at the annual premium of \$247,325.51.

Workers' Compensation Insurance

Our Workers' Compensation will cost \$101,756.00 for 2025-26, an increase of \$6,463.00 in comparison to 2024-25. The 2025-26 premium is based on maintaining coverage with RAS-First Dakota Indemnity.

I recommend that we continue to use RAS-First Dakota Indemnity for our Workers' Compensation Insurance for the policy period of July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2026 at an estimated premium of \$101,756.00.

Summary

The overall premium of Property, Liability, Cyber Liability, Volunteer Accident, and Workers' Compensation Insurance for 2025-26 is \$376,578.51, a 12.2% increase over last year's combined premium. Included in this overall increase is a flat fee of \$27,500 paid to Bremer Insurance for brokerage services. In previous years, this fee has been included as a 4% commission in our premium rates.

The Property/Liability Insurance, Cyber Liability, Volunteer Accident and Workers' Compensation Insurance are budgeted items.

Administration recommends approval of this agreement.

Property: Your blanket property coverage limit was \$257,734,497 on your expiring EMC policy. EMC increased the blanket property coverage limit to \$268,407,879 applying the 4% inflation factor. Your blanket business income and extra expense coverage limit remains at \$2 Million. Your property deductibles will remain \$25,000 all other perils (AOP), with wind/hail deductibles as follows: Over \$50MM bldg. limit, \$75k w/h, \$25MM-\$50MM bldg. limit, \$50k w/h, \$0-\$25MM bldg. limit, \$25k w/h.

General and Professional Liability: Population changes were made based on the estimated number of students in your district.

Auto coverage: Auto glass coverage, the following change was made by EMC - the glass replacement language on the CA7317 Commercial Auto Essential Extension Schools does not provide for a \$0 deductible. It is now subject to a \$500 ded.

School Leaders E&O: No coverage changes were made or requested for your renewal policy period.

Crime Coverage: No coverage changes were made or requested for your renewal policy period.

Volunteer Accident Coverage: ISD #22 has a Volunteer Accident Policy that provides up to \$15,000 Accidental Death Benefit/Accidental Dismemberment Benefit, up to \$10,000 Accident Medical Expense Benefit and up to \$250 dental expense. The Hartford provides you with the accident insurance policy at an annual premium cost of \$652. This is based on using the same 200 volunteer count as provided last year.

Student Medical Payments: ISD #22 has purchased \$1,000 Student Medical Payments coverage at an annual premium cost of \$500.

Inland Marine: No coverage changes were made or requested for your renewal policy period.

Excess Liability: No coverage changes were made or requested for your renewal policy period.

Terrorism: Terrorism coverage is included in your EMC proposal at a \$5,377 annual premium cost; this can be waived if the district chooses which would then reduce the annual premium costs indicated.

Cyber Liability: EMC includes \$1MM cyber/data breach coverage at \$3,686 annual premium (included in the pricing summary).

Workers' Compensation: You instructed us to increase your total payroll from \$27,959,000 to \$28,882,500 for your renewal policy period. We will compare the expiring versus renewal rates and payroll plus debits and credits based on your current loss ratio:

Notes: Your estimated payroll was increased by \$923,500. Your Experience Modification factor increased from 0.70 to 0.84. The 2025 base rates with RAS-First Dakota Indemnity changed slightly. All these factors impacted your Workers' Compensation renewal premium cost, which resulted in an increase of \$6,463.

Renewal Cost Analysis: Your overall premium is up 12.24% this year. Industry wide we are continuing to see rates increases. This is due to the current hard insurance market. The primary reason for the increase is due to increased rates. Your workers' compensation premium increased 6.78%, mostly due to an increased mod factor.

Recommendation to the Board: Bremer is recommending the district renew with EMC for the Package and umbrella, at an annual premium of \$246,670.51. (Federal Terrorism can be waived for a premium savings of \$5,377). For Cyber Liability/Data Breach we are recommending the EMC coverage (MFA must be implemented to consider alternative cyber options). For worker's comp we are recommending renewing with RAS-First Dakota Indemnity at an annual premium of \$101,756. For the Student Accident coverage, we are recommending you renew with The Hartford at an annual premium cost of \$652. The annual premium cost for all proposed insurance coverage is as follows:

2025-26 Budget

This document includes the Detroit Lakes Public Schools initial budget for the upcoming 2025-26 school year. The budget is primarily driven by the Average Daily Membership (ADM). The ADM is a yearlong moving average based on the number of students served by the District at reporting times set by the Minnesota Department of Education. Many factors can come into play such as difference in class size of the outgoing senior class and incoming kindergarten class, changes in open enrollment, change in pre-kindergarten enrollment, student mobility, and the year to year retention ratios. The projected district ADMs for 2025-26 are based on kindergarten registration numbers, as well as past enrollment trends. We are predicting a kindergarten class size of 175 students in 2025-26.

In addition to ADMs, the initial budget for 2025-26 have been prepared based on planning parameters such as employee compensation increases, liability and workers' compensation insurance cost projections, changes in special education funding, general education formula changes, and other updates to anticipated revenues/expenditures.

GENERAL FUND

Unassigned General Fund is projected to have a surplus of \$23,382. This budget reflects estimated revenues of \$42,288,317 and expenditures of \$42,264,935 with a projected year-end fund balance of \$6,569,272.

Revenue changes include increases to the general education formula aid & levy. The General Education formula revenue was increased \$200 (2.74%) to \$7,481 per student. The District's Average Daily Member (ADM) was estimated at 2,663 for the 2025-26 budget. Student projections are based on historical grade by grade progression, incoming kindergarten class size and the latest demographic information. The kindergarten class is estimated at 175 students. From the recently completed legislative sessions, we see maintained funding for summer unemployment costs and compensatory revenue, but some changes in funding for special education programming.

Expenditure changes include an increase in contracted services, maintaining appropriate staffing levels, continued mental health services, increases of salary (including fringe benefits), and operation costs of District buildings.

OPERATING CAPITAL FUND

Restricted Operating Capital is projected to have a deficit of \$297,367. The budgeted expenditures of \$1,046,000 include significant costs associated with curriculum updates, technology equipment and routine building equipment/site improvements.

Restricted Long Term Facilities Maintenance Revenue (LTFM) is projected to have a surplus of \$140,971. Past LTFM projects have utilized existing General Fund Unassigned fund balance to cover the cost up front and will be replenished by future LTFM aid. The revenue stream is based on \$380 per adjusted pupil unit. Taking the prior negative balance and the estimated current year surplus, the

anticipated year-end fund balance will be negative \$95,250 and expected to be recovered in the upcoming fiscal years.

TOTAL GENERAL FUND

The Total Restricted General Fund is projected to have a deficit of \$321,352 based on revenues of \$2,412,876 and expenditures of \$2,734,228 with an ending combined fund balance of \$2,286,560.

The Total Committed for Severance Pay and Other Post-Employment Benefits General Fund is budget neutral with a projected year-end fund balance of \$2,169,414.

The Total Assigned General Fund is budget neutral with a projected year-end fund balance of \$1,552,650.

The Total Unassigned General Fund is projected to have a surplus of \$23,832 with a year-end fund balance of \$6,569,272

The Total Restricted, Committed, and Unassigned General Fund is projected to have a deficit of \$297,970 based on revenues of \$44,701,193 and expenditures of \$44,999,163 with a year-end fund balance of \$12,577,896.

FOOD SERVICE FUND

The Food Service Fund is projected to have a surplus of \$91 based on revenues of \$2,572,403 and expenditures of \$2,572,312 and a year-end fund balance of \$1,077,768.

COMMUNITY SERVICES FUND

The Community Services fund is comprised of five sub-components:

1. Restricted for Early Childhood/Family Education is projected to have a deficit of \$4,051 and a year-end fund balance of \$84,894.
2. Restricted for Community Education is projected to have a surplus of \$5,291 and a year-end fund balance of \$157,452.
3. Restricted for School Readiness is projected to have a deficit of \$17,583 and a year-end fund balance of \$84,609.
4. Restricted for Adult Basic Education (ABE) is projected to have a surplus of \$174 and a year-end fund balance of \$177,605.
5. Restricted for Community Services - Unassigned is projected to have a surplus of \$14,981 with a funding balance of \$66,469.

Overall, all four components of the Community Education Fund combined are predicted to have a deficit of \$1,188 bringing the overall fund balance to \$571,029.

DEBT SERVICE FUND

The Debt Service Fund is projected to have a surplus of \$59,748 with a year-end fund balance of \$1,095,213. The fund is servicing payments for the Abatement bonds issued in 2018, the Referendum GO Bonds issued in 2019, Facilities Maintenance Bonds issued in 2020, and the exercising of additional levying authority in 2022.

CUSTODIAL FUND

The Custodial Fund is projected to be revenue and expenditure neutral with a year-end fund balance of \$13,970. The fund records fiduciary activities by acting as a flow through mechanism for revenue and expenditures from outside organizations not resulting in a financial benefit to the District.

STUDENT ACITIVITIES FUND

The Student Activities Fund is projected to be budget neutral with a year-end fund balance of \$190,038. The fund records transactions related to student extracurricular activity accounts at the Middle School and High School.

TOTAL (ALL FUNDS)

At the District Wide level, the fund balance of the School District is projected to have a deficit of \$239,819 with a year-end Fund Balance of \$15,459,445 based on combined revenues of \$53,714,478 and expenditures of \$53,954,297.

SUMMARY OF 2025-2026 INITIAL BUDGET

The total Unassigned General Fund, representing the largest portion of our School District's operating expenses, is predicted to have a surplus of \$23,382.

Maintaining a healthy fund balance is essential for future success. Table 1 below gives a brief history of the Unassigned General Fund Balance and Expenditures. District Policy 714 establishes the desired fund balance in the range of 15% to 25% of the annual Statutory Operating Debt (SOD) expenditures as calculated by Minnesota Department of Education. The 2025-26 estimated fund balance to expenditure percentage is 18.6%.

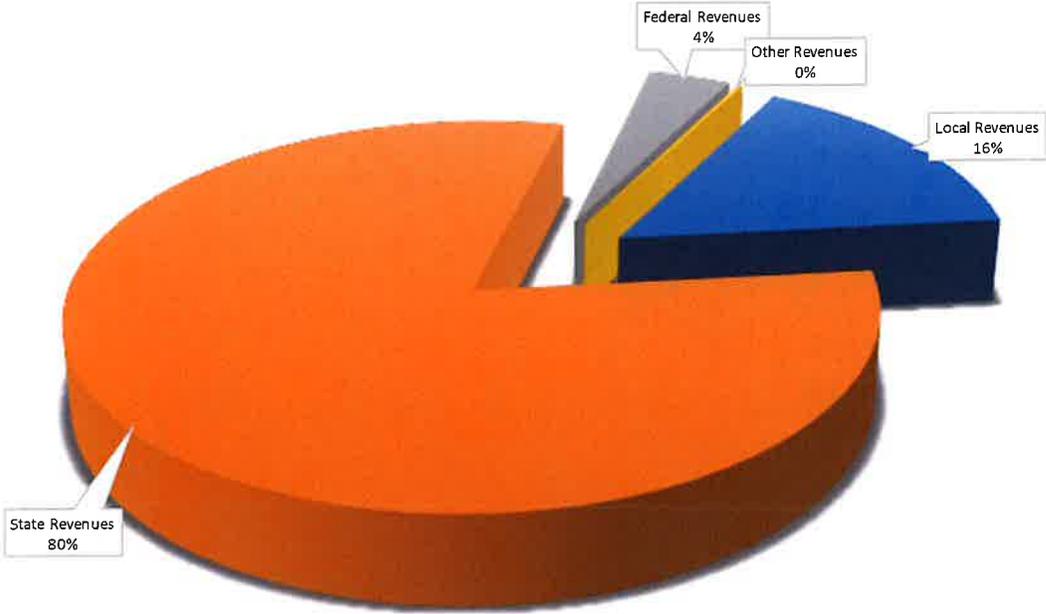

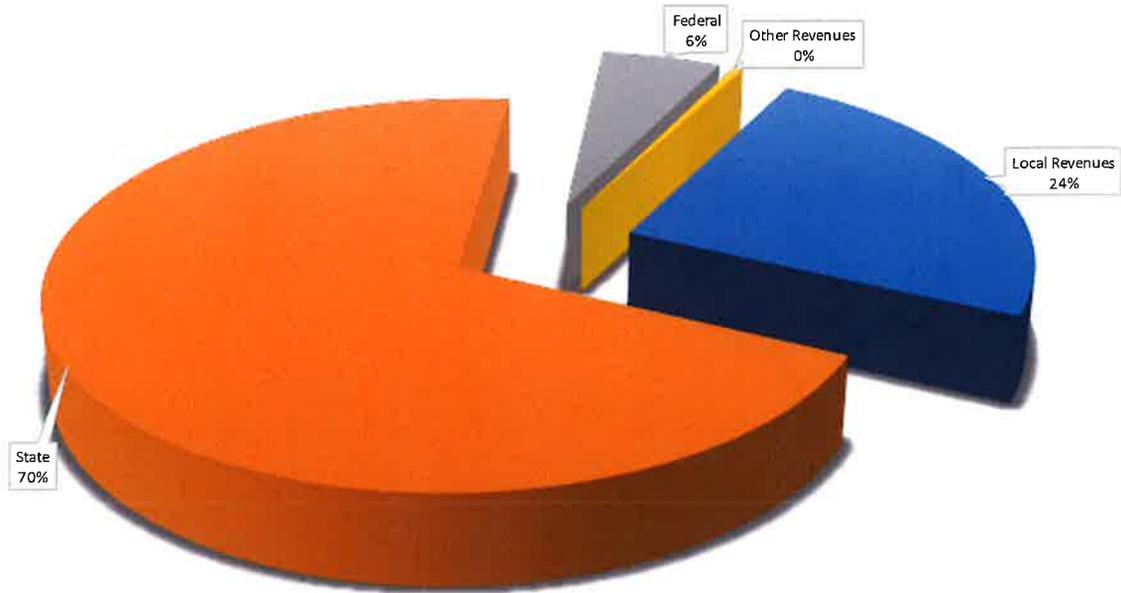

2025-26 General Fund Revenues By Major Source**



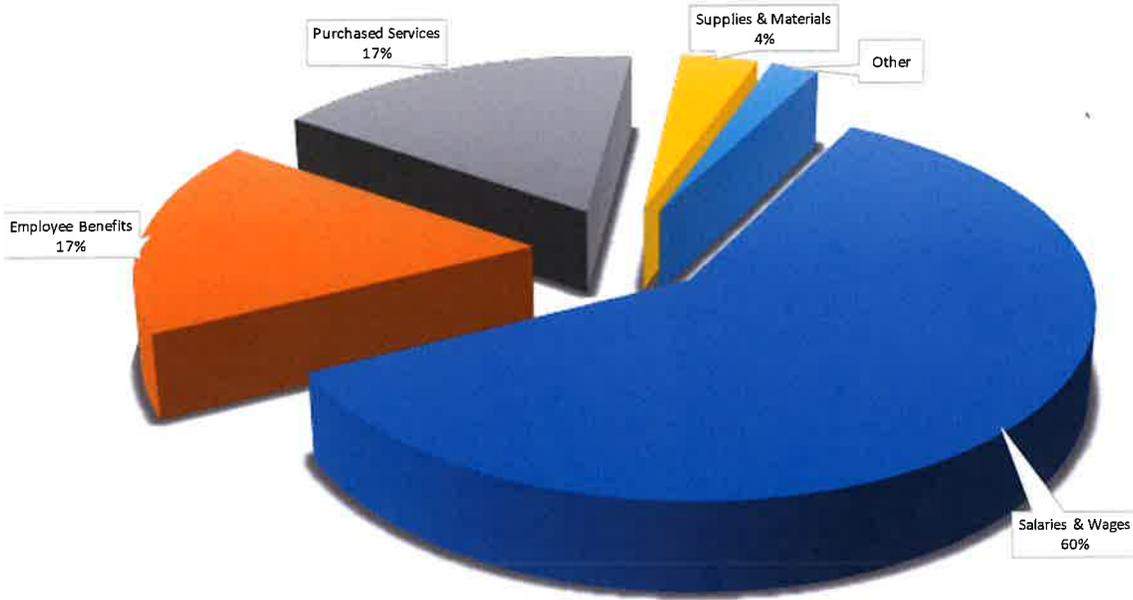

2025-26 All Fund Revenues By Major Source**



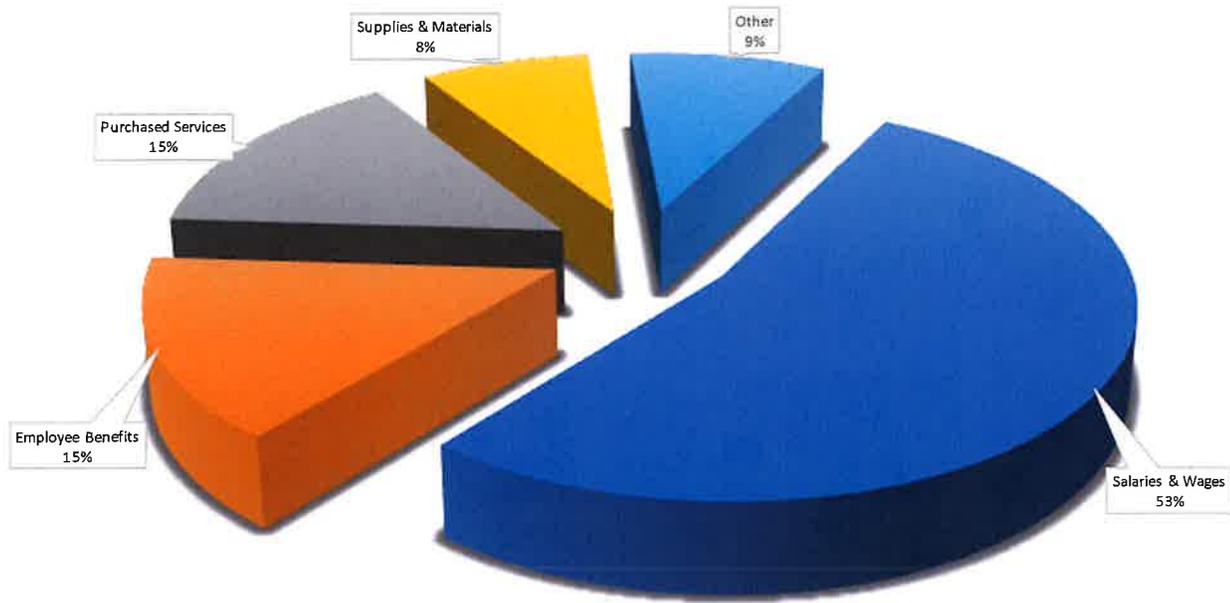

2025-26 General Fund Expenditures By Object**



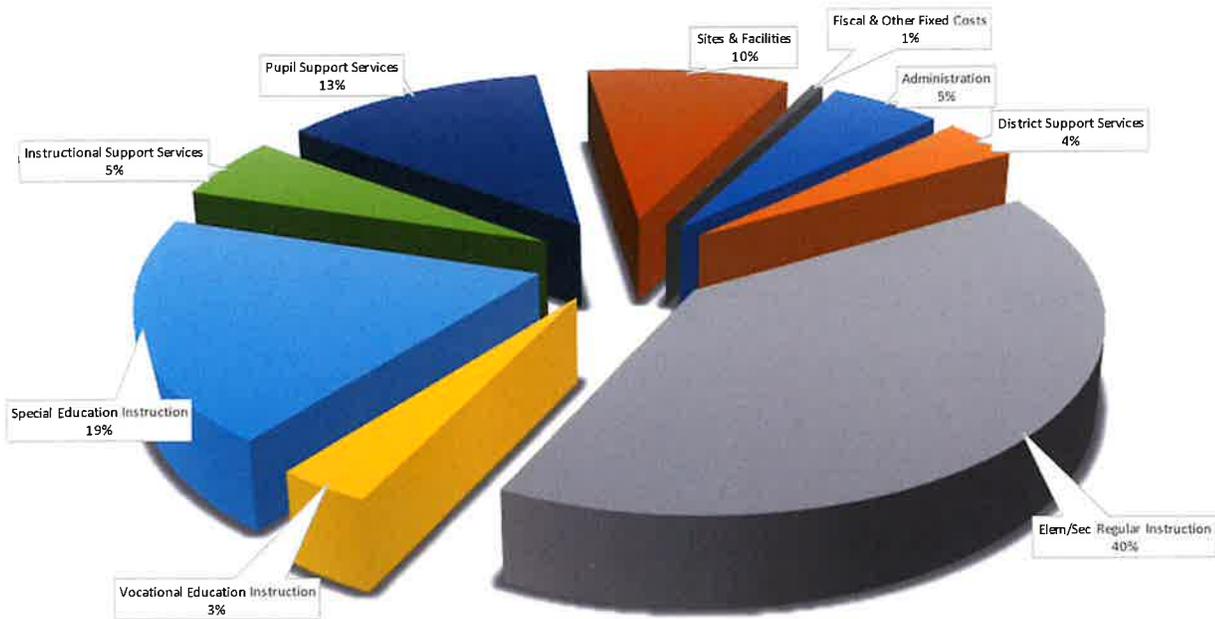

A Facilities Committee Meeting was held on Tuesday, June 10th at the District Office. In attendance were John Steffl, Michael Walther, Mary Rotter, Mark Jenson, and Jason Kuehn.

1. Becker County Environmental Services

Steve Skoog and Ari Devries from Becker County Environmental Services presented to the committee on waste removal options for the District. Using grant funds, Becker County Environmental Services could provide equipment to increase the separation of food waste from regular trash and recyclables. The committee will review the proposal to determine the feasibility of implementing the program at District schools

2. Lincoln Education Center

Realtor Eric Lundmark reviewed the Lincoln Education Center property and adjacent property with the committee, as well as the current real estate market for similar properties. A timeline was discussed for preparing the property for listing on the market, as well as necessary steps needed to finalize the process. The Facilities Committee recommends moving forward with the sale of the two properties.

3. FY 2027 Long Term Facilities Maintenance (LTFM) 10 Year Plan

Director of Finance Kuehn reviewed planned expenditures for the FY 2027 Long Term Facilities Maintenance (LTFM) 10 Year Plan which will be presented at the July Regular Board Meeting.

4. 2025-26 Facility Use Agreements

Kuehn reviewed four lease agreements that will be on the June Board agenda for approval. Three of lease agreements are renewal leases with MSTATE for the DLHS Robotics Program, the Area Learning Center (ALC), and Adult Basic Education (ABE)/Community Education Programs. Additionally, an agreement between the City of Detroit Lakes and the District for use of the Snappy Park, Washington Ballpark, and Recreational Center Tennis Courts beginning in 2025 and extending 10 years at a rate of \$25,000 per year. The Facilities Committee recommends approval of all four lease agreements.

A Finance Committee Meeting was held on Tuesday, June 17th at the District Office. The agenda was as follows:

1. Review of Receipts and Disbursements

Receipts for the month of May totaled \$8,601,048.87. Receipts of note included Student Activity Account deposits, monthly Food & Nutrition Services reimbursements, first half property tax receipt estimates from Becker and Otter Tail Counties, and metered State Aid payments for general and special education funding.

Four sets of disbursement were reviewed by the Finance Committee. The committee recommends approval of the hand payables for May totaling \$2,315,128.23 which includes payments for payroll liabilities, food service vendors, utilities, transportation contracts, annual lease payments for the 2023 network upgrade project and Student Activities.

The committee also recommends approval of the check summaries for May 26th, June 9th and June 23rd in the amount of \$555,998.65.

2. Fund Balances Review

Director of Finance Kuehn reviewed the fund balances through the month of May. Total balances for all funds as of 5/31/2025 were \$22,450,810.40.

District expenditures and revenues through May were reviewed in comparison to the budget.

3. 2025-26 Renewal of Property, Liability and Workers Compensation Insurance

Kuehn reviewed the 2025-26 insurance renewal provided by Bremer Insurance. The renewal includes a \$6,463.00 decrease for Workers Compensation Insurance and \$32,106.16 increase for Property, Liability, and Cybersecurity Insurance. Committee recommends approval.

4. 2025-26 Student Activity and Admission Fees

Kuehn reviewed the updated 2025-26 Activity and Admission Fees for the District. Committee recommends approval.

5. 2025-26 Initial Budget

Kuehn reviewed the Initial 2025-26 Budget for the committee. The overall budget projects a deficit of \$239,819 for all funds with a projected fund balance of \$15,459,445 based on combined revenues of \$53,714,478 and expenditures of \$53,954,297. Committee recommends approval.
