**In the Matter of the Proposed Closing
of the Lincoln Education Center**

FINDINGS AND CONCLUSIONS

A public hearing on the proposed closing of the Lincoln Education Center was held on August 6, 2025 at 5:30 PM at the City Council Chambers, 1025 Roosevelt Avenue, Detroit Lakes, Minnesota.

The hearing was conducted pursuant to Minnesota Statutes section 123B.51, subdivision 5. The hearing was recorded. All individuals wishing to speak and offer evidence in favor of or in opposition to the closing were given the opportunity to testify during the hearing.

FINDINGS

1. Lincoln Education Center is located at 204 Willow St. E, Detroit Lakes, MN 56501.
2. The Lincoln Education Center was built in 1961 and contains approximately 13,237 square feet.
3. The Lincoln Education Center housed the District's preschool, early childhood family education ("ECFE"), school readiness, and Community Education programming since 1997.
4. In 2023, the District contracted with ICS Consulting, Inc. to complete a LTFM/Facility Assessment ("Facility Assessment") on the District's buildings. The Facility Assessment identified a number of significant issues with the Lincoln Education Center. For example, the Lincoln Education Center is in the need of a complete HVAC system replacement with dehumidification, window and carpet replacement, upgrade to LED light fixtures, a replacement of 9,500 square feet of the roof, and parking lot repairs.
5. The total cost for the Lincoln Education Center repairs identified in the Facility Assessment is \$2,178,000.
6. The Lincoln Education Center's 13,237 square feet of building space represents approximately 2.1% of the total District-owned building space identified in the Facility Assessment (with a total square footage of 628,437 feet). Despite

representing only 2.1% of the total square footage, the estimated cost of the repairs at the Lincoln Education Center is approximately 8.4% of the total District repair cost (\$2,178,000.00 of the total \$25,999,817.00).

7. In 2023, the District hired a demographer to analyze the District's historical enrollment and projected future enrollment. From 2013 through December 2023, the District's enrollment decreased by 1.7 percent. Resident K-12 enrollment decreased by 3.1 percent.
8. While the report projected a potential overall increase in K-12 enrollment by the 2033-2034 school year, the report identified a decline in resident births in Becker County and Minnesota overall that would result in smaller kindergarten classes over the next several years.
9. When reviewing programming needs for School Readiness, the District determined that the Lincoln Education Center would not have enough space and capacity to meet those programming needs desired by the community education department, such as all-day preschool and other programming.
10. The two elementary schools – Roosevelt Elementary School and Rossman Elementary School – have the capacity to house the preschool programming that was previously at Lincoln Education Center.
11. The District is able to house the other programming – including ECFE, School Readiness, and Community Education - at other District owned or leased sites.
12. The closure of the Lincoln Education Center will have minimal impact on District operations. There will be no reduction in programming as a result of the closing of the Lincoln Education Center. All programming at the Lincoln Education Center will continue at other District sites.
13. By closing operations and seeking to sell the Lincoln Education Center, the District would avoid the need to expend \$2,187,000 in LTFM and repair costs. Additionally, the District would save approximately \$25,000 in annual utility expenses, \$15,000 in contracted services, and other miscellaneous costs.

CONCLUSIONS

1. The closure of the Lincoln Education Center is necessary and practicable.

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2. The District has complied with the procedural requirements of Minnesota Statutes section 123B.51, subdivision 5, for the purpose of closing the Lincoln Education Center.

RESOLUTION APPROVING THE REDEVELOPMENT PLAN FOR
REDEVELOPMENT PROJECT NO. 44 AND THE TAX INCREMENT
FINANCING PLAN FOR TAX INCREMENT FINANCING DISTRICT NO. 44-1

A. WHEREAS, the Detroit Lakes Development Authority (the "Authority") and the City of Detroit Lakes, Minnesota (the "City") propose to construct a 36-unit multifamily market-rate workforce residential housing project (the "Project") in the City; and

B. WHEREAS, in connection with the Project it has been proposed that the City and Authority establish Redevelopment Project No. 44 (the "Project Area"), adopt a Redevelopment Plan for the Project Area (the "Redevelopment Plan"), establish Tax Increment Financing District No. 44-1 within the Project Area and adopt the related Tax Increment Financing Plan (the "TIF Plan" and together with the Redevelopment Plan, the "Plans");

C. WHEREAS, the City has performed all actions required by law to be performed prior to the approval of the establishment of the TIF District and the adoption of the Plans, including, but not limited to, notification of Becker County and Independent School District No. 22 having taxing jurisdiction over the property to be included in the TIF District and the holding of a public hearing upon published and mailed notice as required by law; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BE IT RESOLVED by the School Board (the "School Board") of Independent School District No. 22 (the "School District"), as follows:

1. Redevelopment Plan for Redevelopment Project No. 44. The School Board hereby approves the Redevelopment Plan.

2. Tax Increment Plan for Tax Increment Financing District No. 44-1. The School Board hereby approves the TIF Plan as required by Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.176, Subd. 4c.(d)(3) for the TIF District.
