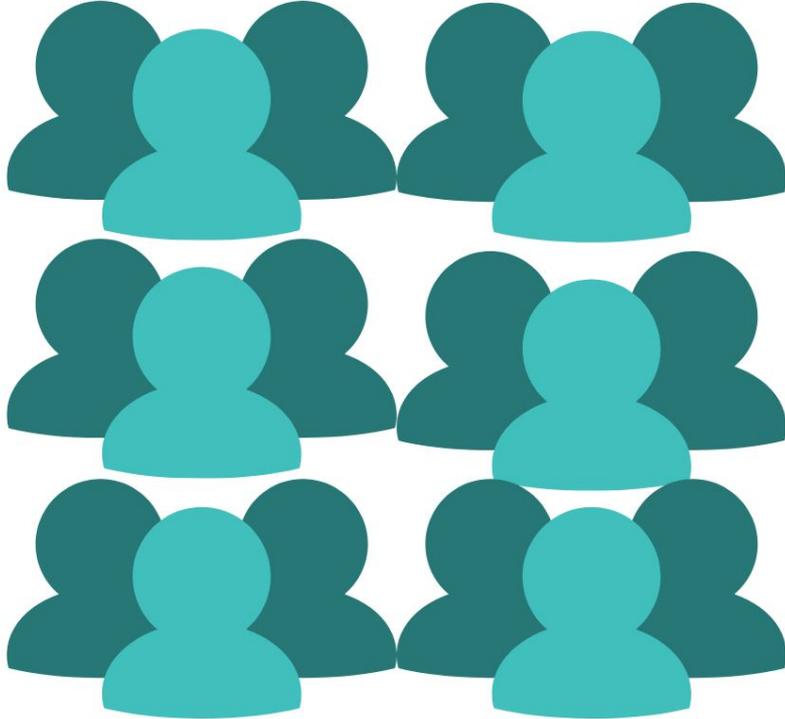

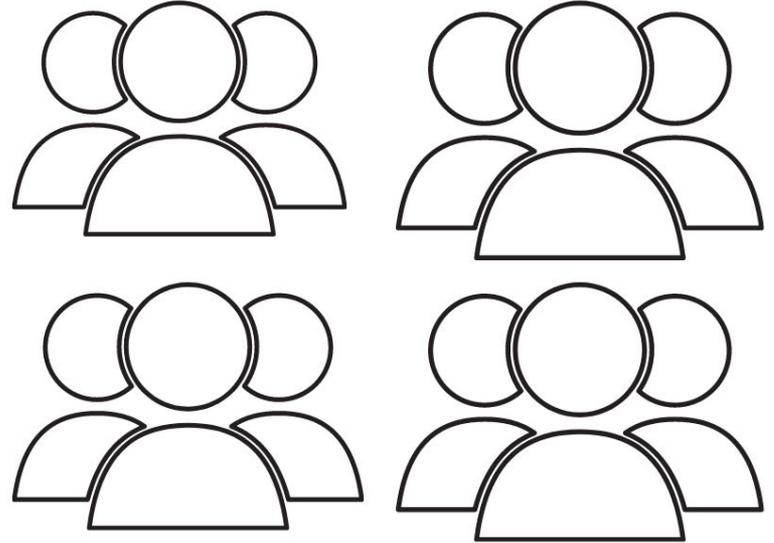
Our Multicultural/Multilingual District

60% Students of Color



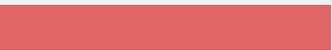
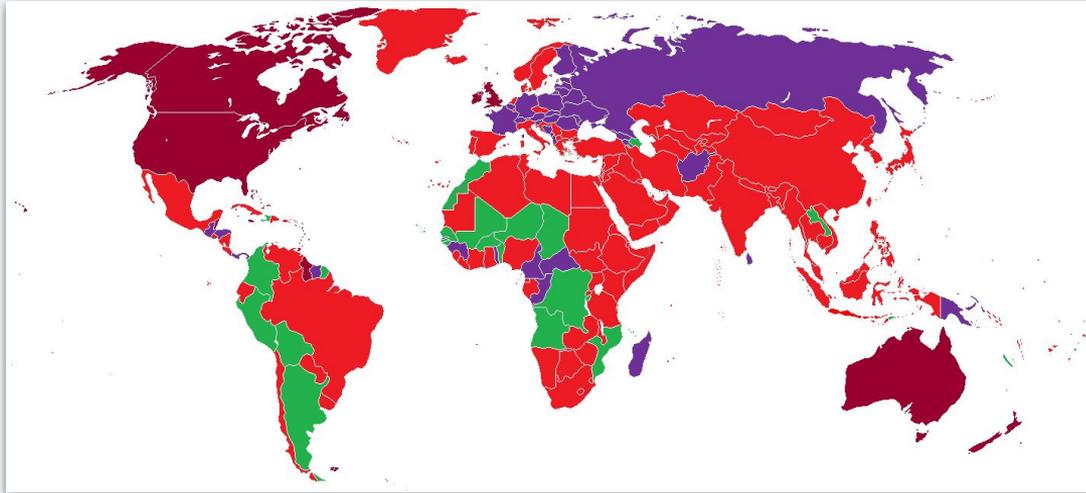

ELD Program Mission

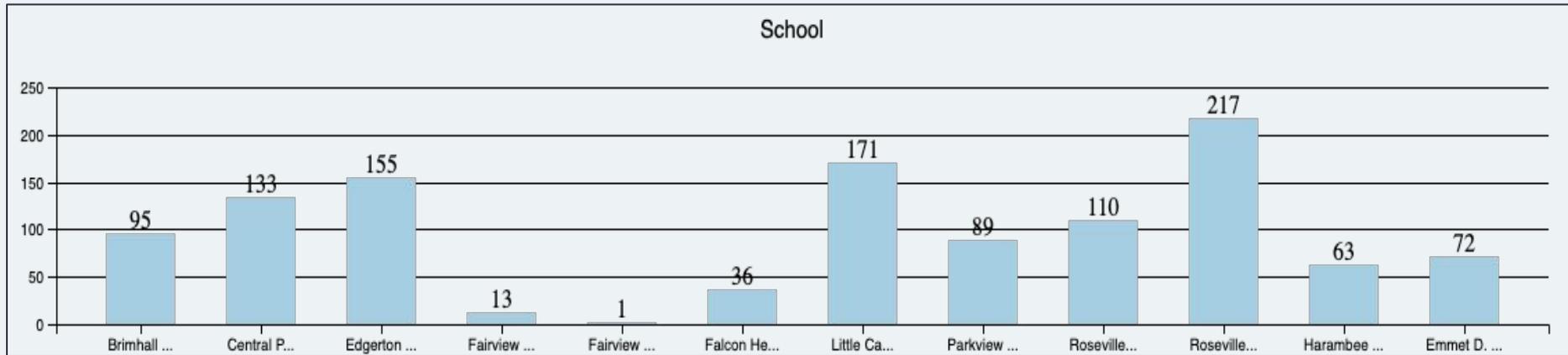
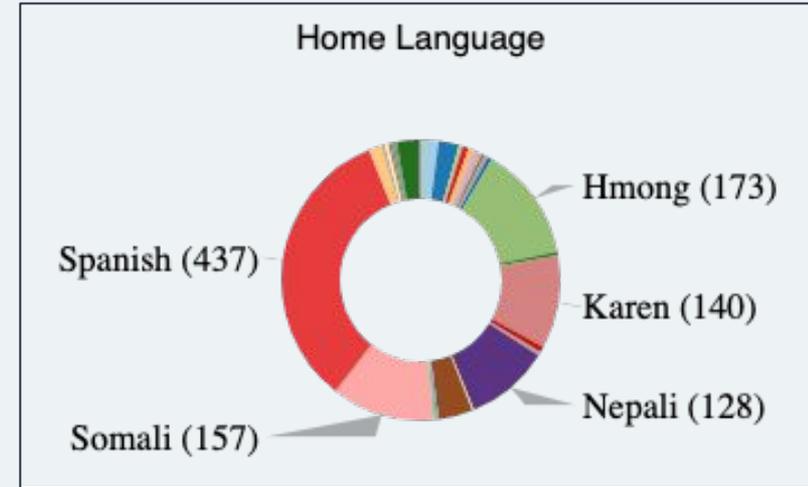

All **English learners (EL)** will achieve mastery in all learning environments through English Language Development (ELD) services, differentiated content instruction, and classroom support.

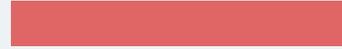

Dual-language Immersion Program



Dual-language Immersion (DLI)



Spanish dual-language immersion instruction is:

- 1.** a research-based, bilingual instructional model that increases equity for English learners through development of native language skills and comprehensible input
- 2.** proven to increase academic achievement for BIPOC students and reduce the achievement gap.
- 3.** designed to teach language through content in both Spanish and English with a goal of bilingualism and biliteracy.
- 4.** an articulated K12 bilingual program that results in bilingual/biliteracy.

Research



Research shows that when Dual Language Immersion programs are implemented with fidelity focusing on bilingualism and biliteracy, high academic achievement and sociocultural competence that **overall student achievement is significantly increased and the opportunity to reduce the gap between white and BIPOC students is closed** (Thomas & Collier, 2004).

Elementary DLI



Demographics

360 students currently enrolled in K-6 DLI

- 170 Spanish Home Language (SHL)
- 190 English Home Language (EHL)
- Students remain in our DLI program with only 1.5% student attrition per year in all of K-6 DLI.
- We continue to add sections and expand each year.
- Success with Kindergarten enrollment and late entry DLI students.

Benefits: 3 (+1) Goals of Dual Language Education

- Bilingualism and Biliteracy
 - Grade level academic achievement in both program languages
 - Sociocultural competence
- + **Cultural Competence** (Palmer, Cervantes, et. all, 2019)

Secondary DLI



RAMS:

- Spanish Language Arts, Science, Social Studies
- 81 students enrolled; 15 late-entry

RAHS:

- DLI 9 (Spanish Language Arts)
- 50 students enrolled

Benefits:

- Secondary DLI programs foster a sense of positive identity, both culturally and academically (Collier & Thomas, 2018)
- Higher satisfaction with their school experience, which can decrease dropout rates for latinx students (Lindholm-Leary, 2016)
- Higher ACT scores for native Spanish speakers in DLI compared to non-DLI students (Collier & Thomas, 2018)



Cultural Liaisons



The cultural liaison role is to focus on supporting student groups/activities, parent empowerment, and advocacy for families.

Roseville Area Schools has 16 cultural liaisons representing African-American, Native American, Latino, Somali, Karen, Hmong, and Bhutanese communities.

Our presence at RAHS and student connections has been key to the success of a lot of Latinx students. Being real, building relationships with them, spending time getting to know each other has proven to be an asset to the connections we build with their families. This ties directly to student academic success and social emotional well-being.

Students have a healthy space in which they can hang out with their peers and people they can relate to.

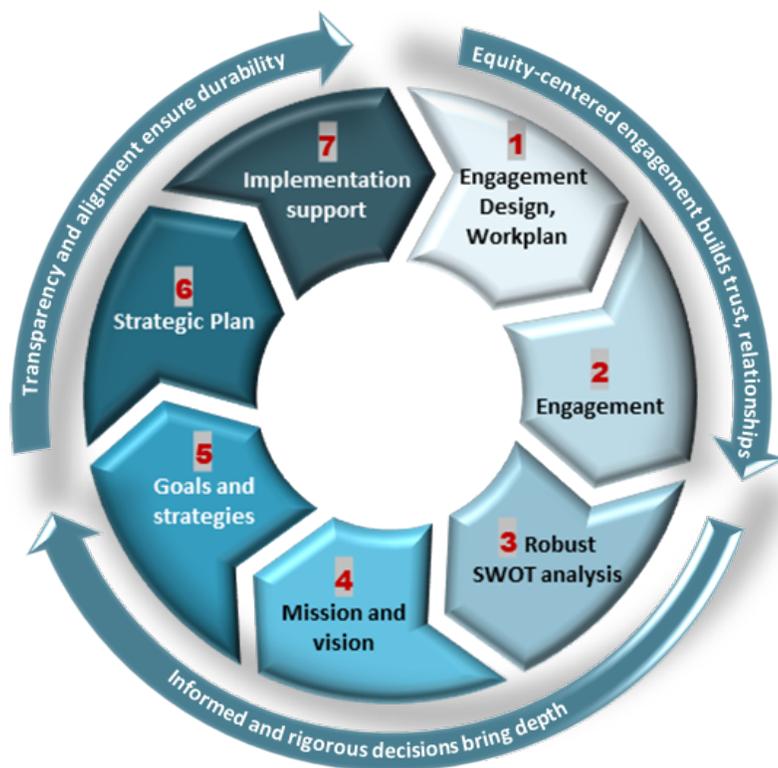

RAS Strategic Planning: Stakeholder Engagement Design



Project Background, Objectives

The Roseville Area Schools strategic planning process is anchored in our long-standing commitment to quality teaching and learning, and equity in all we do. Using an inclusive and participatory process, we will reach out to and engage the full spectrum of key stakeholders -- students, families, staff, community, and partners. We will use stakeholder contributions to shape analyses, a refined mission and vision, and draft strategic goals and strategies. We will share those drafts for stakeholder feedback, use the results to finalize a rigorous Strategic Plan, and work together to ensure every student has the opportunity and support to succeed.

The 2022 strategic planning process includes the following phases:

- **April-July** Round 1 community engagement planning and implementation; documentation, compilation, and analysis shared publicly
- **July-September** Guided by Round 1 results: Analyze internal strengths and weaknesses and external opportunities and threats (SWOT); draft refined mission and vision; draft strategic long-term goals and mid-term priorities; draft Strategic Plan
- **September-October** Round 2 stakeholder feedback on draft Strategic Plan; use results to finalize “working” Plan
- **October-November** Make changes to align with and advance Strategic Plan implementation with regular monitoring

Engagement Objectives

Roseville Area Schools is committed to the following objectives to guide our stakeholder engagement:

- Anchor our strategic planning engagement in equity
- Conduct engagements with cultural humility and an appreciation for the depth and breadth of stakeholder contributions
- Deepen relationships between RAS and key stakeholders

- Gather diverse perspectives from our key stakeholders
- Strengthen mutually beneficial collaborations on behalf of students and families

- Ensure engagement opportunities and formats are welcoming, respectful, culturally appropriate, accessible, and safe for stakeholders
- Offer multiple opportunities and formats for key stakeholders to contribute
