



What do you enjoy about your job/position?


I enjoy working with the students, parents, faculty and administration to assist in creating future leaders.







PAEC PROGRAM UPDATES FROM FEBRUARY 2026

PAEC Academy at Divine Infant

1) Academics

ACCESS for ELLs testing was successfully administered during the final week of February. Students completed the assessment using the traditional paper-based format this year. As part of our continued effort to modernize assessment practices and increase student familiarity with digital testing platforms, we are exploring the transition to a computer-based administration model for next school year.

In preparation for the upcoming Illinois Assessment of Readiness (IAR) testing window, student accommodations are currently being reviewed and entered to ensure compliance with IEPs and documented instructional support. IAR will be administered using a computer-based format, and staff are working to ensure all students are adequately prepared and supported for this testing environment.

Additionally, the building is in active discussion regarding the potential adoption of the McGraw Hill Corrective Reading curriculum. This program is being considered as part of our broader efforts to strengthen foundational literacy instruction and provide targeted intervention support. While movement toward purchase is underway, the discussion remains open as we continue to evaluate implementation logistics, training needs, and budget considerations.

2) Festivities

On February 19th, Academy proudly hosted an Inventor's Day as a culminating celebration of Black History Month. Throughout the month, classrooms intentionally dedicated instructional time to exploring significant historical events, influential leaders, and the lasting contributions of Black innovators whose work has shaped our society. Instruction focused not only on historical knowledge, but also on helping students understand the impact of perseverance, creativity, and problem-solving in advancing equity and progress.

As part of the Inventor's Day experience, students honored Cornelius Henderson, a distinguished civil engineer known for his work on major infrastructure projects. In recognition of his contributions to engineering and bridge construction, each classroom was provided with popsicle sticks, masking tape, and foam sheets and challenged to collaboratively design and build a functional bridge. The activity emphasized teamwork, planning, creativity, and applied problem-solving skills.

Each class approached the challenge with a unique design perspective, resulting in a wide range of innovative structures. Ms. Kramer, our occupational therapist, evaluated each bridge for structural integrity, adding an engaging and authentic testing component to the experience. Students observed as their designs were assessed, celebrating both successful builds and the learning opportunities that emerged through the process. The event was a meaningful, hands-on extension of classroom instruction and a memorable way to celebrate our Black History Month programming.


Nourishing Community: Celebrating Black History Month Through Food and Tradition

Vocational Program Update

This month has been productive and focused on expanding partnerships, strengthening student supports, and preparing for postsecondary transitions.

Community and Business Partnerships

We held a conference call with the owner of several Wingstop franchise locations to discuss a potential work partnership. Following the conversation, we provided him with our Work Partnership Agreement, which he is currently reviewing. We look forward to continuing discussions and establishing this opportunity for our students.

We are also excited to share that we officially launched a new work partnership with Ronald McDonald House Charities. At this time, one job coach is accompanying two student workers to the site twice weekly. This partnership is providing valuable, hands-on work experience in a supportive environment.

Student Programming and Employment Preparation

The Level Up Program continues to run twice per week. We currently have three senior students who attend and demonstrate a strong commitment. These students are actively working through employment assessments and building skills necessary for workplace readiness.

Mr. Tafoya has been overseeing the daily task of running the work programs, ensuring appropriate staff coverage as job coaches accompany students to community work sites. In addition, Mr. Tafoya supports students by helping them create a professional resume that will help with their applications for part-time employment opportunities in the community.

Graduation Monitoring and Transition Planning

The principal and vocational counselor met with staff at Proviso East High School to review senior student progress and confirm that all East students remain on track for graduation. We are pleased to report that they are currently meeting requirements. We will be coordinating with Proviso West High School in the near future to complete the same review process for West students.

Postsecondary Options and Career Fair

Ms. Holsten has been actively coordinating our upcoming Postsecondary Options and Career Fair on **Friday, March 6th, from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.** All board members are warmly invited to attend.

At this time, we have 23 confirmed agencies participating. These organizations represent a wide range of opportunities, including local community colleges, trade schools, apprenticeship programs, and both public and private workforce development agencies. This event will provide students and families with direct access to valuable resources as they plan for life after high school.

The PAEC Behavior Intervention Team continues to provide behavioral support and interventions to reduce undesired behaviors within the Proviso Township school districts.

The Elementary Behavior Coaches are required to implement the 8-Week Step Interventions & Support Curriculum developed based on evidenced-based data and documenting.

District 87 - Jefferson Primary | Sunnyside Intermediate | Whittier Primary | Riley Intermediate | Northlake Middle School | MacArthur Middle School

Whittier Primary:

Early Childhood Referral: (On-going) An Interventionist has been assigned to the student to provide behavior management strategies such as daily sensory walks, intentional transitions and a token economy to encourage positive behavior. *Update:* The Interventionist continues to provide additional support based on administrators request, 3 days per week.

2nd Grade Classroom Referral: The assigned Interventionist has begun coaching the teacher on the implementation of effective interventions to improve the overall function of the class. Interventions have included a token economy system, implementations of class expectations, sensory room/calming corner and mild consequences due to high levels of disruptive and disrespectful behavior.

Jefferson Primary:

Kindergarten Referral: (On-going support) Student has been assigned to an Interventionist due to excessive and extreme attention seeking behaviors. The student is currently receptive to the Lilo & Stitch behavioral chart designed to reduce behaviors such as screaming and blurting out. The Interventionist will be transitioning out of the classroom upon the return of Thanksgiving break. *Update:* The Interventionist continues to support the classroom due to its transition into a full classroom intervention.

First Grade Classroom Referral: (On-going support) An Interventionist has been assigned to collaborate with the teacher on strategies to reduce highly disruptive behaviors such as excessive talking aloud, off-task, wandering the class among all students. *Update:* The Interventionist will be gradually transitioning out of the class and a behavior plan of support will be provided to continue implementations of effective strategies.

First Grade Referral: An Interventionist has been assigned to a student to provide additional support, as this student's behavior is not extreme. Support will consist of reminding the student to focus during instructional time and maintaining attentiveness to improve academics.

2nd Grade Referral: Due to the students low attendance, observations have been paused. *Update:* As of 2/22, the student has returned to school. The Coordinator will be observing the student soon.

1 New First Grade Classroom Referral: There have been several students (3) referred within this class due to excessive disrespect towards the teacher. Students have displayed physical aggression such as throwing items and desks, and have collectively caused significant disruptions within the classroom. An

Interventionist has been assigned to incorporate antecedent modifications (seating changes), a reward system for the on-tasks students, review of expectations and mild consequences for extreme behavior.

District 92 - Lindop School

District 88 - Lincoln Primary | Grant Primary | Grant Elementary | Lincoln Elementary | McKinley Elementary | Thurgood Marshall Elementary | Roosevelt Middle School

McKinley Elementary:

Kindergarten Class Referral: (on-going support) An Interventionist was assigned to coach the teacher on structuring the classroom with a schedule, class expectations, task/time management, transition methods, and token economy systems. *Update:* Interventionists continue to provide on-going support as needed.

First Grade Class Referral: A Student has been assigned an Interventionist due to displaying inappropriate behaviors with peers. The Interventionist will be working with the teacher to implement/demonstrate appropriate peer dynamics through social stories and role-playing.

First Grade Referral: Updates will be provided once observations are conducted and parents consent to behavioral support.

Lincoln Elementary:

Kindergarten Student Referral: (On-going) The student has been observed exhibiting problem behaviors outside of the classroom. An Interventionist has been assigned to provide additional support with the student during special activities such as gym, art and recess.

Fourth Grade Referral: Student was referred due to impulsive and aggressive behavior. An Interventionist was assigned to address behavior regulation and coping skills. *Update: Student has transferred out of the school.*

First Grade Referral: The student has been referred due to excessive chatting and disruptions within the class setting. The student also exhibits behavior that limits his ability to participate during instructional time due to their lack of focus. An Interventionist has been assigned to assist with improving focus by implementing a pre-mack principle/reward system to encourage classroom engagement and minimize disruptions.

Fourth Grade Referral: A student was referred due to continuous oppositional and defiant behavior with adults, as well as attention seeking behavior. An Interventionist was assigned to aid in reducing classroom outburst, oppositional/noncompliance, as well as implementing a differentiated reinforcement technique to receive appropriate attention.

Grant Primary:

Early Childhood Student Referral: (On-going) An Interventionist has been assigned to the student and is currently in collaboration with the special education program to support with implementing a behavior/safety and crisis plan. The Interventionist also has incorporated a behavior plan based upon a token economy and small consequences for extremely disruptive and physically violent behavior. *Update:* The Interventionists have continued to provide on-going support due to high levels of disruptive behavior.

2nd Grade Referral: An Interventionist has been assigned due to several students displaying highly disruptive behavior such as yelling aloud, running around the classroom and oppositional behavior. The Interventionist is working with the teacher while implementing interventions such as antecedent modifications, token economy and mild consequences (limited free time) for defiant behavior.

District 93 - Hillside Elementary

District 209 - Proviso East High School | Proviso West High School | Proviso Mathematics and Science Academy

There are currently a total of 6 Behavior Interventionists assigned to 209; 3 are assigned to East and 3 are assigned to West.

Interventionists are now assigned to Grade Level Principals. The 209 district is in the process of implementing a new MTSS Framework within the Panorama system to ensure equitable and responsive circles of support for students. All BI's will follow this framework under the leadership of Deans and their assigned GLP's.

PAEC OT/PT Department

Staff adjustments: None at this time.

3. On 2-2-26, the OT/PT/AT Lead met virtually with the representative from Fun and Function to discuss equipment needs and how the equipment in B Pod at PAEC Center was working out.
4. The AT Team attended a staff meeting on 2-04-26 in-person with a virtual link available from 8:30 AM - 9:30 AM.
5. The OT/PT Department attended a staff training on Enhancing Culturally Responsive Teaching Through Relevance and Relationships by Dr. Don Parker on 2-06-26 in-person from 9:00 AM-12:00 PM.
6. The OT/PT Department attended a staff meeting on 2-12-26 via Google Meet from 11:30 AM to 1:00 PM.
7. On 2-13-26 from 8:00 am - 8:45 am, the Lead OT/PT/AT, PAEC Social Worker, and PAEC Principal began a discussion with Sertomastar representatives about garden plots at the Broadview Park District that PAEC could maintain to work on vocational skills. A subsequent meeting was held with PAEC teachers to explore this idea further on 2-18-26 at 8:00 am - 8:45 am.
8. The Lead OT/PT/AT, PAEC Social Worker, and PAEC Principal collaborated with Sertomastar and Broadview Park District on hosting a Valentine's Dance event at the Broadview Park District for kids (PAEC and community children) 16+ years old on 2-13-26 from 6:00 pm - 8:00 pm. All the students who attended had fun.
9. On 2-18-26, the OT/PT/AT Lead and SLP Lead met with Select Savvy representatives to discuss working relations with contract therapists currently at PAEC.
10. The OT/PT/AT Lead attended a projections meeting to begin discussions of assignments for next school year on 2-18-26 from 1:00 pm - 3:00 pm at PAEC Center.
11. The OT/PT/AT Lead attended the Special Events Meeting for Prom via Google Meet on 2-20-26 and 2-27-26 from 8:00 AM - 8:30 AM.
12. A piece of equipment that came in February included the following: Bean bags for a classroom at PAEC Center, Disco ball for sensory, Pegs & Boards for Fine Motor activities, and Pencil Sharpeners for writing activities. See pictures below.

Melissa previously worked as a contractual psychologist in District 87 at Riley Intermediate and Northlake Middle Schools. We are excited for Melissa to be rejoining us!

Ms. Dayle Ashley-Harding continues to provide TPBA, ADOS, and evaluation support for EC programs at PAEC, District 87, and District 93. She also is helping with parochial evaluations.

Ms. Annamaria Iarrapino has been leading MTSS meetings at Riley Intermediate School. She has been effective in providing intervention and data management support to team members. Annamaria continues to collaborate with related services staff and teachers at Riley and Northlake.

Annamaria also completed CSTAG Level 1 training online and Level 2 in person training with Dr. Cermak at the February 6th Institute Day in District 87. Additionally, Dr. Cermak completed Reunification training with administrative and student services staff at the Institute Day.

Dr. Michael Cermak has been interviewing internship candidates for the 2026-2027 school year. So far we have had more intern applications than ever before with 7 applicants interviewing in person with Dr. Cermak. The decision day is March 13th so Dr. Cermak will be looking at making the final decision within the next two weeks.

Dr. Michael Cermak attended the National Association of School Psychologists (NASP), National Leadership Summit the week of February 22nd. At these meetings Dr. Cermak was given the opportunity to network and learn from leaders from all 50 states and address current topics and issues in education. Dr. Cermak was also able to talk about the many wonderful things happening at PAEC and our member districts as we provide academic, behavioral, social-emotional, and psychoeducational support.

PAEC Social Work Department

1. Ms. Monette Carlos, L.C.S.W., R.P.T. (PAEC School Social Worker – PAEC Early Childhood Program), has completed a total of 8 student re-evaluations this month, coordinated the 100th day of school Spirit Day, and composed social stories for her E.C. parents who are having issues with their child getting on the school bus. Ms. Carlos has covered the following topics in the early childhood classroom groups: Problem-Solving-What to do when we are upset or when someone does not want to share a toy; Matching Emotions; Identifying/Labeling Feelings; Imitating Actions/Listening. Additionally, Ms. Carlos created a few visual posters with problem-solving choices/Various Emotions for teachers to display in their classrooms to remind students what to do. In individual social work sessions, Ms. Carlos has been working on playing functionally, parallel play and cooperative play.
2. Ms. Niane Serrano, M.S.W, and Mr. Patrick Rossi, L.C.S.W.,(PAEC School Social Workers-PAEC Elementary School) continue to facilitate classroom social work groups, as well as provide individual sessions with students on their caseload. Ms. Serrano continues to utilize the Second Step Curriculum in her classroom groups, working on identifying problems and coping strategies. Topics covered by Mr. Rossi during his classroom groups include: Circle of Control; Triggers and Warning Signs and Peer Pressure. Additionally, Mr. Serrano and Ms. Rossi worked on Black History projects with students and discussed black social workers who have made a great impact in their profession.
3. Ms. Nicole Peña, M.S.W. (PAEC School Social Worker-PAEC Academy) has been facilitating small/whole classroom social work groups and individual social work for the students at PAEC Academy. Topics covered include: Black History Month, Coping Strategies, and Empathy. Ms. Peña continues to collaborate with other therapists (i.e., SLP, OT & PT) during super group sessions and weekly Lunch Groups. Additionally, Ms. Peña has consulted with teachers and behavioral specialists and has worked with families in providing outside referrals for those students/families in crisis.
4. Ms. Anna Landmeier, L.C.S.W., Ms. Tanaijah Fields, M.S.W., and Ms. Jill Collins, M.S.W., (PAEC School Social Workers-PAEC Center School) continue to meet with their students on their caseload

individually and/or in classroom groups, as well as attended annual review and re-evaluation meetings. Topics covered during their social work sessions include: Knowing the difference between kind and unkind behaviors; Identifying the qualities of a good friend; Exploring/Processing/Understanding Thoughts/Emotions; Modeling how to be a good friend; Modeling Self-Regulation Skills; Practicing/Modeling Voice Volume Adjustments and Social Functional Skills. Additionally, Ms. Landmeier, Ms. Collins and Ms. Fields are working with the PAEC Building Special Events Committee is the planning and coordinating of the PAEC Center School Prom and March Events, providing resources/supports for parents during the upcoming spring break, as well as assisting with the guardianship application process and vocational supports.

5. Ms. Haviland Byrd, M.S.W. and Ms. Elivette Agosto (PAEC School Social Workers – Proviso West High School) continue to provide individual & small group school social work services to the students with special education needs and to students in the TST Program, as well as attending numerous annual review and re-evaluation meetings. Topics covered in social work sessions include: Substance Abuse; Emotional Regulation; Decreasing Absenteeism, and Coping strategies
6. Ms. Cecilia Feliciano, M.S.W., and Ms. Temika Peace, M.S.W., (PAEC School Social Workers –Proviso East High School) continue to provide individual/small group social work sessions to students on their caseload at Proviso East High School, as well as attending annual review and re-evaluation meetings. Topics covered during their sessions include: Truancy Concerns, Substance Abuse/Use, Peer Relations, and Problem-Solving Skills. Additionally, Ms. Feliciano and Ms. Peace continue to be involved in the Student MTSS Team addressing student concerns involving attendance, grades, behavior and plans for credit recovery.
7. Ms. Donna Kuchera, M.S.W., Ms. Tanaijah Fields, M.S.W., Ms. Ali Kagan, M.S.W., and Ms. Lisa Pirrello, L.C.S.W.
