CEO Monthly Report — May

Executive Summary

The Learning Community of Douglas and Sarpy Counties achieved notable recognition this month, advanced several programmatic initiatives, and continued progress on organizational priorities including the executive director's search and the financial audit. Community partnerships and outreach efforts expanded, and our direct-service programs marked important milestones.

1. Key Achievements and Updates

Omaha Choice Awards, Adult Education, 2nd Place

- The Learning Community earned second place in the Adult Education category of the Omaha Choice Awards. This public recognition highlights the quality and impact of our adult programming—particularly in areas of workforce readiness, basic skills, and English language learning—and reinforces our reputation among community stakeholders. The award offers visibility that we will leverage in upcoming outreach, fundraising, and partnership conversations.

2. Executive Director Search

- The search for an Executive Director remains active. We received over 60 applications during the initial recruitment phase, demonstrating significant interest in the role. After reviewing the applicant pool, the search has been reopened to broaden candidate diversity and ensure we identify the best leadership fit for our strategic priorities. The vacancy is currently posted on multiple job boards and professional networks; recruitment and candidate screening are ongoing.

3. Financial Audit

- The annual audit is in progress. Andrew (Audit Lead) continues to coordinate with our external auditors to complete fieldwork and documentation. Based on current timelines, Andrew anticipates the audit will be finalized by July. We will circulate the final audit report and any management letter items to the Council upon completion and will schedule a review if needed.

4. Community Events and Program Milestones

- Cinco de Mayo Parade: Our participation in the Cinco de Mayo Parade was successful in terms of community engagement and visibility. While overall parade attendance was lower than last year, the event provided valuable

outreach opportunities and strengthened our ties with participating community organizations.

- Little Lions Zoo Program Graduation: We celebrated the inaugural graduation for the Little Lions Zoo program. This successful pilot demonstrated program efficacy and family engagement; we plan to enroll children from our cohort in the program again next year and will evaluate outcomes to inform expansion.
- South Center Graduation: A major graduation event was held at our South Center, celebrating numerous participants who completed programs this period. The ceremony underscored program retention and successful participant outcomes and provides testimonial material for communications and funder reporting.

5. Partnerships and Outreach

- Senator Juarez — Facility Tour: Senator Juarez has expressed interest in touring the Learning Community to learn more about our programs and community impact. We are coordinating possible dates with the Senator's office and will invite Council members to attend once the tour is scheduled. This visit represents an opportunity to strengthen legislative relationships and highlight program needs and successes.
- Charles Drew Health Center Collaboration: Initial discussions have begun with Charles Drew Health Center to formalize a collaboration in North Omaha. Under the proposed arrangement, our North Omaha staff would conduct participant recruitment at the health center three days per week, improving access and referral pathways for families who could benefit from our programs.
- Associated Bank — Potential Foundation Support: Associated Bank has indicated interest in supporting our foundation through philanthropic funding. We are exploring partnership models and funding priorities with bank representatives to determine the best alignment with our programmatic and capacity-building needs.

Next Steps and Requests for the Council

- Audit Completion: Expect the final audit by July. I will distribute the audit report and any recommended action items upon receipt.
- Executive Director Recruitment: Continue to support outreach and candidate referrals. I will present a recommended slate of finalists to the Council when available.
- Senator Juarez Tour: I will notify Council members of confirmed dates and request volunteers to participate in the tour.
- Partnership Development: I will provide progress updates on the Charles Drew Health Center recruitment plan and Associated Bank discussions and will request Council input on partnership strategies as needed.

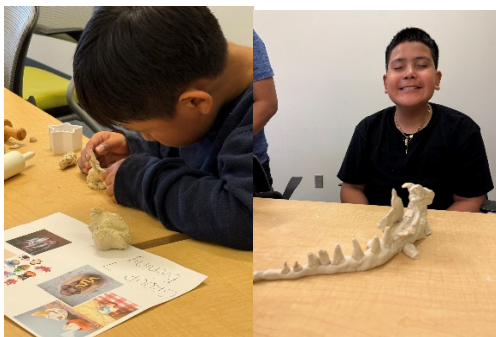

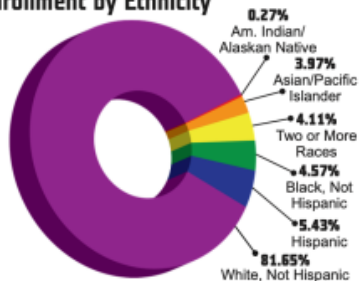

The Graduation Ceremony for the Class of 2025 was held at Badger Stadium, with 235 seniors participating and receiving diplomas from Bennington High School. The graduating class included 35 students who earned Summa Cum Laude academic status with a cumulative GPA of 4.0 or higher, along with 39 students who met at least one criterion for placement on the Academic Wall of Honor, including a GPA of 4.0 or higher, a score of 5 on an AP exam, a score of at least 1360 on the SAT, or a score of at least 30 on the ACT.

BPS provides early childhood services for children from birth to age three and preschool age children who need special education services. Preschool classrooms are 50% students needing special education services and 50% peer models.

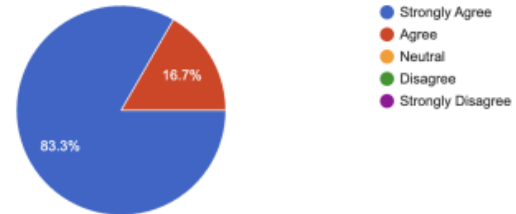



CLASSROOM MAKE UP:
Our preschool classrooms are designed to be **safe, supportive, and inclusive** learning environments for all children. Each classroom is staffed with a **qualified teaching team** to ensure children receive the attention, supervision, and support they need throughout the day. Additional staff are present to support learning, routines, and individual needs as appropriate. Our program uses an **inclusive peer model**, meaning classrooms include a mix of children who receive special education services and same-age peer models. This approach supports social development, communication, and learning through natural peer interactions in a developmentally appropriate setting. We believe this inclusive classroom structure benefits **all children** by fostering friendships, independence, and a strong sense of belonging.

PROGRAM STRUCTURE
Each preschool day follows a **predictable and balanced routine** designed to help children feel safe, engaged, and ready to learn. Children participate in a mix of teacher-guided activities and child-led play throughout the day.

A typical day may include:

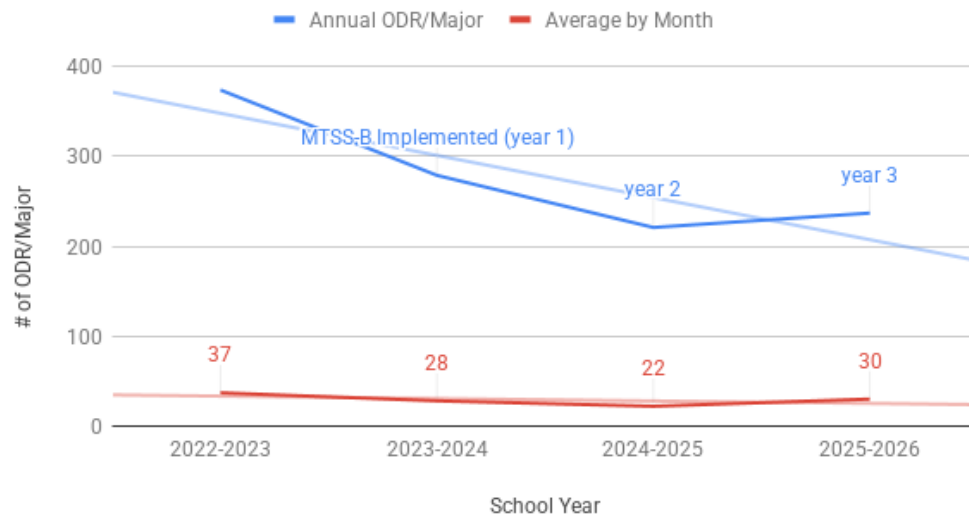
- Circle time
- Learning centers and play-based exploration
- Small group activities
- Read-alouds, music, and movement
- Snack time
- Cross motor play

Throughout the day, children are encouraged to develop a wide range of skills.

Tier 1 MTSS-B Implementation

- 37% decrease in elementary office referrals since implementation of program
- Comprehensive supports for students and staff
- Student success in MTSS-B:
 - Tier 1- 96%
 - Tier 2- 4%
 - Tier 3- 0.2%

- Learning Community Mission: “Together with school districts and community organizations as partners, we demonstrate, share and implement more effective practices to measurably improve educational outcomes for children and families in poverty.”
- High poverty correlates with lower graduation rates
- The D2 Center serves students in the two highest poverty school districts in the Learning Community – OPS and Ralston

D2 Center Services

- Youth Academic Navigators
 - Building 1:1 relationships with struggling high school students
 - Caseload of 30-35 students at a time
 - Additional caseload of 20-25 students for reengagement
- Elective Credits and Tutoring
 - Three electives taught by Nebraska-certified teachers
 - Electives accepted by OPS and Ralston
- Career Navigators for postsecondary assistance
- Dropout Reengagement
 - Services agreement with OPS since 2016
 - YANs and Career Navigators participate

2025-26 Budget = \$1,398,951

- Staff (84% of total budget)
 - Full time: 2 Executive Directors (Programs & Operations); 8 YANs (one is half-time YAN and half-time Reengagement Supervisor)
 - Part Time: 3 Career Navigators (also teach one elective class); 2 math teachers; 1 English teacher; 1 intake specialist
- The Learning Community funds the salary and benefits of 2 YANs, the half YAN/half reengagement supervisor, the two math teachers and one English teacher, and one Career Navigator (new hire; liaison for Ralston Public Schools and Adult Education Center at Goodwill)

2024-25 Highlights

- 160 students graduated (record high; 133 in 2023-24)
- 110 students earned 152 D2C elective credits (both records; 91 students earned 135 electives 2023-24)
- 71 of the 110 students earning at least one D2C elective did so in their final semester in which they graduated

2025-26 Goals

- 150+ graduates and 100+ elective credits earned
- Establish a formal partnership with Ralston Public Schools and pilot a few students second semester in the YAN Program
- Establish a partnership with Adult Education Center at Goodwill to keep students on a pathway to an accredited high school diploma beyond age 21

Additional Updates

- Securing new funding sources in 2026-27 remains a priority
- The Sherwood Foundation is supporting a contract with a new marketing team (E Creative) to improve marketing strategies
- Waiting for the results of the formal evaluation from Munroe-Meyer Institute
