BEE'S School Counselor Report
Building Excellence Encouraging Success

1. College and Career Fair

On September 18th we hosted the Knox and Cedar County College Fair. We had approximately 45 vendors here that day from different military branches, 4 year colleges, community colleges, and cosmetology schools. Our juniors and seniors joined us and I would like to thank Darrel and Rol for the set up and take down of the gym along with many of our seniors that helped greet our visitors and tear down the gym afterward. Hartington Public, Hartington CC, Wausa, and Niobrara were able to join us that day. Other schools had early dismissals or other activities going on so they attended the same fair held at Northeast in the morning. We had two sophomore students that had asked to attend to talk to an AirForce recruiter and thank you to Mrs. Gilsdorf for bringing down our 4th graders that day. It made an impression on them and they were still talking about it the next week when we had guidance together.

2. WSC Career Day at Wayne State College

On October 14th I will be taking the sophomores to the Wayne State Career Day. The sophomores are divided into groups by their career interests that they made last spring. They are given a tour of the facilities, learn more about their major, have lunch on campus, and attend breakout sessions which teach them about preparing them for their careers and college success. We have 8 sophomores interested in learning about the medical field, 1-Advertising and Marketing, 3-Cosmetology and Esthetician, 2-Education, 1-Construction Management, 1-Real Estate, 1-Agronomy, 2-Computer Graphics/Art, 3-Criminal Justice, 2-Animal Science/Vet Science, 1-Food and Nutrition Science, and 1-Mechanics.

3. Senior FAFSA night and Progress

10 of our 18 seniors were able to attend the FAFSA nights this past Wednesday and Thursday evenings. They signed up for their student and parent FAFSA ID's and began working on their FAFSA's. Four of our students that did not attend had their FAFSA's completed last Wednesday with the help of their parents. Remember the FAFSA just opened October 1st. Our goal is to have them all completed by this coming Friday. They know that I can access a database that gives updates on our progress.

15 of our 18 seniors have written activity resumes and asked three adults to write them letters of recommendation for upcoming scholarships. 16 out of the 18 have already

applied to college(s) including UNL, WSC, NECC, Mitchell Tech, SDSU, UNK, UNO, Chadron, Mount Mardy, and considering others. We have one student considering the Air Force and will meet with a recruiter, and another that is undecided but considering mechanics.

They are all working on the local scholarships/some of completed many and filing them away until they are due this year. They are paying attention to the scholarship pages of the colleges they are applying to and when they open to complete the application for all of the scholarships the colleges offer and find out which ones they would qualify for. 16 of the 18 have an Education Quest account and have been shown and reminded how to search for scholarships. My favorite question to ask them when they say they don't have anything to work on is: "Do you have your college paid for yet?" If not, keep applying.

4. Early College Courses

We currently have 16 students signed up for early college courses. 10 of those students are taking Dual Credit upper level math courses taught by Mr. Eisenhauer, and 1 is taking a CNA class through Mrs. Loecker.

5. Elementary Guidance

I have not addressed our elementary guidance very often in my board reports but for grades K-5 we use a social emotional curriculum named Second Step. I am able to meet with each class for 30 minutes a week on different topics that range from empathy, the qualities of good learners, accepting differences, and respectful conflict resolution skills among others. The sixth graders having been exploring career interests and completed a career interest inventory through O'NET a free Career Database that also lets them look up the education requirements for their careers, the percentage of job availability in their fields, and the wage estimations from beginning, middle, to experienced. They are a very curious group and the more they find out the more questions they have.

This month I will attend the Family Violence Summit at the Life Long Learning Center at NECC on October 16th and 17th, the Counselor Camp at NECC on October 21, and the ESU 1 Counselor Workshop on October 29th.

Sports Broadcasting

Sports broadcasting with Jose has gone very well—he's been a passionate and valuable student to help build the program. We also welcomed KBRX onto the livestream for the first time last Friday, with Bloomfield alumni Austin Hamm and myself calling the game. We continue to improve production, including adding more in-game graphics and working on an audio/video sync issue that puts sound about a second ahead of video.

E-Sports

- Our *Marvel Rivals* team had its first official match last week after two scheduled opponents forfeited. Scheduling has been challenging with 12 students and 2 coaches, but the team is underway.
- Both *Rocket League* teams are off to strong starts at 2–1, currently ranked in the top 10 standings.
- Our *Super Smash Bros.* player is 1–2 on the season.

Cameras & Security

We've brought several cameras back online and expanded remote access, which strengthens our campus security coverage.

Chromebooks

We've had three Chromebooks break so far this year, about the same as last year with MacBooks. The key difference is cost—repairs on MacBooks would have been around \$3,000, while the Chromebooks are fully covered under warranty.

LAN Managers Meeting (Sept. 22)

New security software will be added to key devices (admin, mine, and Sam's) to reduce phishing risks and improve protection.

Smart Board Demo

Pine Cove provided a demo smart board that is about half the cost of a Promethean and comes with a "buy 10, get 1 free" promotion. I requested a demo unit for our staff to test as a potential replacement for aging Prometheans.



East chair lift has been repaired and is up and running.

West air handler in the gym has been repaired with a new drain pan. No new leaks noted.

Practice field and game field have been fertilized and an insecticide has been put down.

The holes in the roof of the West canopy have been repaired.

The jersey frames and board plaque have been hung in the West Lobby.

Having fewer seats in the new Jeeps has been a challenge {7} vs. {10} from the old van days but we will adapt. We have been using our small vans to ease some seating burden. We also have a new ADA pickup/dropoff from the rest home. A second grade girl. Myrle and I are having good success with these additional duties. Routes continue to go well. We have had some behavioral issues on two routes, but we watched video and worked through them. Bus #6 has some HVAC issues that we are scheduled to have fixed in the next few weeks. We have had this unit approx. 9 years without any issues. This bus is a blessing for our ADA students so I see the repairs as necessary to offer that type of transportation. Extra curricular activities have been going very well, with Myrle, Travis, Lauren T. and Neal helping drive to these games and events.
