



















The Alamo Collegiate Network (“ACN”) Partnership is a partnership of the Alamo Community College District and the San Antonio Independent School District, pursuant to Texas Senate Bill 1882, now codified in Section 11.174 of the Texas Education Code. For SB 1882 partnerships for non-profits where the partnership Director reports directly to the Board, it is a best practice for the Board to maintain an annual evaluation for the Director. However, for partnerships with organizations that have an established employee performance system, such as the ACN Partnership, a separate Board evaluation is not needed.

The ACD Chief High School Programs Officer is assigned to supervise and evaluate the ACN Director, using the ACD Employee Performance System. The ACN Board requests approval of additional evaluation criteria to be used in conjunction with the ACD Employee Performance System.
