



Fall Headcount Enrollment



Course Completion Rates – Fall Terms




Productive Grade Rates – Fall Terms



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
Freshmen Persistence Rates: Fall Terms





Full-Time Freshmen Comparative Persistence Rates








3-Year Freshmen Comparative Graduation Rates






Learners Employed and/or Enrolled Within 6 Months of Graduation





Fall Full Time FTIC 3-Year Tracking



Vaughn Construction, LLC. in the amount of \$29,272,000 (including contingency) for the construction of the Alamo Colleges District – Northwest Vista College, Cypress Campus Center Capital Improvement Project (CIP), subject to subsequent execution of GMP amendment acceptable to District counsel by Chancellor or delegate.

PURPOSE

To adjust the 2017 CIP project budget for Northwest Vista College with impacts of project savings and to approve the Guaranteed Maximum Price Construction Manager-at-Risk fee negotiated with J.T. Vaughn Construction, LLC. in an amount not to exceed \$29,272,000 for the construction of the Alamo Colleges District – Northwest Vista College, Cypress Campus Center Capital Improvement Project (CIP) subject to staff confirmation of scope and subsequent execution of GMP amendment.

BACKGROUND

The Board allocated \$79M of CIP Program funding to five projects at NVC. Revision to the CIP Project budget for Northwest Vista College is recommended based on the overall project savings from the projects listed below. This surplus is available for additional funding for uncompleted NVC CIP projects.

In February 27, 2018, the Board approved the purchase of Construction Manager-at-Risk Services for the District for the General Obligation Bond Projects. Alamo Colleges District staff, the Construction Program Manager and the Architect have negotiated with the contractor for a Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) of \$29,272,000 (including contingency) for this work. The GMP as presently drafted includes \$3,591,280 General Conditions Cost, and \$1,333,310 Construction Phase Fee. The Construction Program Manager, Architect, and Construction Manager-at-Risk have analyzed a variety of value engineering alternatives for this project. This draft GMP represents the best value for Alamo Colleges District.

MAJOR FEATURES

The Northwest Vista College, Cypress Campus Center is a renovation of the existing 57,452 square foot facility for Alamo Colleges District. The newly renovated campus center will create a holistic student engagement, an integrated learning support (one stop shop for students to receive tutoring), a hub to support dining, a multipurpose space and an innovation suite including a student and faculty maker space.

PURPOSE

This contract action awards a job order contract for construction services of an exterior welding tank storage at Palo Alto College, Rio Grande Multipurpose Building. The expansion will double the welding stations and the construction of a new welding tank storage that meets the high wage, high demand initiative.

BACKGROUND

The renovation work allows for additional welding stations and relocating the air scrubbers from within the welding lab to the newly constructed secure exterior welding tank storage.

Dear Mr. Kingsbery:

Added in SB2 of the second special session of the 88th legislature, Section 6.0301 of the Texas Property Tax Code applies to appraisal districts established in a county with a population of 75,000 or more and alters the make-up of the Bexar Appraisal District Board of Directors. Three members elected by majority vote in the May 2024 general election joined the five directors appointed by the taxing units that participate in the district in the manner prescribed by Section 6.03, Texas Property Tax Code.

To implement the necessary term changes and as required by Section 5.13(d), Texas Property Tax Code, members appointed in this cycle shall draw lots at the first meeting of 2025 to determine which two shall serve a term of one year, beginning January 1st, 2025 and expiring December 31st, 2025, and which three shall serve a term of three years, beginning January 1st, 2025 and expiring December 31st, 2027. After that, appointed members will serve in four-year terms.

To begin the appointment process, each taxing unit authorized to vote may nominate one candidate for each of the five positions on the Bexar Appraisal District Board of Directors **by resolution of its governing body** and submit the name(s) of the unit's nominee(s) to the Chief Appraiser **by October 15th.**

To serve as a member of the board of directors, your nominee:

- must be a resident of the district for at least two years immediately preceding the date they take office (*Section 6.03(a)*);
- may not be an employee of a participating tax unit unless the individual is also a member of the governing body or an elected official (*Section 6.03(a)*);

- may not have engaged in the business of appraising property for compensation or has represented property owners for compensation in proceedings under this title in the appraisal district at any time during the preceding three years or be related within the second degree by consanguinity or affinity, as determined under Chapter 573, Government Code, to an individual who is engaged in the business of appraising property for compensation or has represented property owners for compensation in proceedings under this title in the appraisal district (*Section 6.035(a)(1) & (a-1)(2)*);

- may not own property on which delinquent property taxes have been owed for more than 60 days after the date the person knew or should have known of the delinquency. This restriction does not apply if the person is paying the delinquent taxes or has deferred or abated a suit to collect delinquent taxes (*Section 6.035(a)(2) & 6.412(a)(2)*): or

- may not have served as a member of the board of directors for all or part of five terms unless the individual was the county assessor-collector at the time the individual served (*Section 6.035(a-1)(A)*).

The number of votes each taxing unit is entitled to in this year's selection process has been calculated and enclosed. Before October 30th, the chief appraiser will mail a ballot to the presiding officer of each taxing unit. After receiving the ballot, each eligible taxing unit will cast its allotted votes by resolution of its governing body and submit the votes to me before December 15th.

Please note, Section 6.03, Texas Property Tax Code states that taxing units with at least 5% of the total votes in the election for Bexar Appraisal District Board of Directors must determine its vote by resolution adopted at the first or second open meeting of the governing body held after the date the chief appraiser delivers the ballot to the presiding officer of the governing body. The votes will be counted as soon as possible after December 15th, and the five candidates with the greatest number of votes will be declared elected. The chief appraiser will submit the results to the taxing units before December 31st.

Please find the attached Alamo Colleges District Police Department's Monthly CLERY Act activity report through July 2024 and yearly totals summary page. Please note that the report reflects new CLERY reporting activity categories enacted in 2008 and required beginning in 2009 when a bias motivation is present, including the Theft / Larceny category which was not part of the previous CLERY reporting requirement however was previously included for informational purposes. None were motivated by bias or hate. The CLERY Act was amended in 2011, effective for reporting year 2011, to include reports received for Simple Assault that are motivated by bias or hate. Simple Assaults are included in this report for information purposes however none were motivated by bias or hate. The CLERY Act was amended in 2014 as per VAWA and Campus SaVE Acts, effective 2015 to include reports of Domestic Violence, Dating Violence and Stalking.

Burglary of motor vehicle is considered a theft from a vehicle under Uniform Crime Reporting definitions and therefore is included in the Theft category for CLERY purposes. For CLERY reporting purposes the Theft / Larceny category includes all thefts and burglary of motor vehicle reports made to the Alamo Colleges District Police Department and is reported as one total when reported to the Department of Education and published by the Department in its annual report. They have, however, been separated for this report.

Theft totals listed on this report include all thefts of district property and personal property belonging to students, faculty and staff reported to the Alamo Colleges District Police Department.

The CLERY Act was amended in 2011, effective for reporting year 2011, to include reports received for Simple Assault that are motivated by bias or hate. The CLERY Act was amended in 2014 as per VAWA and Campus SaVE Acts, effective 2015 to include reports of Domestic Violence, Dating Violence and Stalking.

None of the activity reflected on this report were bias motivated but are provided for informational purposes.

Significant Activity in August:

*The below reports include arrests by being booked into 201 N. Comal (The Justice Intake Assessment Annex), by being issued a citation (other than traffic), or by being detained and released with the possible pending charges being filed with the Bexar County District Attorney's Office.

1) ACCESS (074502 – Public Intoxication) On 08/07/2024, an officer was dispatched to San Pedro and Ashby for a report of a male screaming in the street. The officer located the male and asked him if he was ok and he stated he was being harassed by some unknown individuals off campus. The male was speaking in an aggressive, incoherent, and repetitive manner. Upon further investigation the male (non-student) was found to be in possession of two glass pipes. Due to the male's erratic behavior the male was arrested and transported to the San Antonio magistrate office where he was booked for public intoxication.

2) SPC (074524 – Theft & Felony Warrant) On 08/13/2024, an officer was dispatched to the Culinary Arts building for a theft report. An employee reported his personal HP Laptop had just been stolen from his office. The ACPD CID was contacted, and they were able to provide a possible description of a suspect. The suspect was eventually located at Dawson Park located across the street to the THCA. The male was found in possession of the stolen laptop and was arrested for an active felony warrant and booked into the Bexar County Adult Detention Center.

3) SAC (074525 – Possession / Deliver Drug Paraphernalia & Public Intoxication) On 08/14/2024 an officer was patrolling the San Antonio College when he saw an individual lying near the east doors of the Science Annex. The officer stopped and approached the individual to check on his welfare. The officer observed the male (non-student) talking to himself and sweating profusely. When the male stood up, the officer seen a baggie containing a small amount of a crystal-like substance. Upon further investigation the male was also found to be in possession of a glass pipe. The male issued a misdemeanor citation for possession of drug paraphernalia and was arrested and transported to the San Antonio Sobering Unit where he was released to medical staff for further evaluation and care.

4) SPC (074538 – Emergency Detention) On 08/15/2024, an officer was dispatched to the residence of a female student who made an outcry stating that she was having suicidal ideations and planned to harm herself. The officers contacted her at her home and stated she was diagnosed with autism and has been having issues financially and with finding housing. She said she has previously attempted suicide and had a plan to attempt again in the same manner. The female student was transported to Laurel Ridge Treatment Center where she was released to medical staff for further evaluation and care.

5) SAC (074540 – Possession / Deliver Drug Paraphernalia) On 08/15/2024, an officer was patrolling SAC when he saw a male individual sitting at the Eco Centro Parking Lot charging his phone in the dark. When the officer approached the male (non-student), he attempted to quickly hide a what appeared to be a purse. Upon further investigation the male was found to be in possession of a glass pipe found in his bag. The officer had dispatch run the male for any wants or warrants and dispatch informed the officer, the male was clear. The male was released at the scene.

6) SAC (074547 – Possession of Controlled Substance & Indecent Exposure & Evading Arrest or Detention) On 08/16/2024 an officer was requested for a male (non-student) who was seen masturbating on the west side exterior of the San Antonio Chandler Physical Education Center

by a female individual. When the officer attempted to stop the male, he ignored his commands and ran away from the officers. While running away from the officers, the male reached into his pockets. The officers gave commands to keep his hands out from his pockets and he did not comply and that is when the officer tased the male. The officers were able to handcuff the male and upon further investigation the male was found to be in possession of methamphetamines. The male was arrested and transported to the Bexar County Adult Detention Center where he was booked for possession of controlled substance and indecent exposure.

7) SAC (074570 – Traffic) On 08/22/2024 an officer observed a white Ford Fiesta, disregard a stop sign and enter the intersection without first coming to a complete stop at 400 block of Dewey Place and the 100 block of Belknap St. The officer conducted at traffic stop and approached the female (non-student) driver of the vehicle and asked her for her insurance and driver license. The driver stated she did not have either. The officer collected her information and had dispatch run a check of her name and vehicle. Dispatch informed the officer the vehicle was not insured, and the registration was expired, and the driver had a clear and active driver license. The officer issued the female driver a written warning for disregarding the stop sign and for not having her driver license. She was also issued a citation for no liability insurance and for an expired registration. The vehicle was impounded, and the female was given a courtesy ride to her residence.

8) Off Campus (074586 – Misdemeanor Warrant) On 08/26/2024 while patrolling the perimeter of San Antonio College officers observed 5 individuals loitering and sitting in an abandoned lot that had a "no trespassing sign" posted on the privacy fence. The officer observed one of the individuals quickly hid his hands for some unknown reason. The officer also seen a smoking pipe in his right hand. The officer had dispatch run a check on all individuals and dispatch informed the officer that one of the males (non-student) had a misdemeanor warrant out of Bexar County for criminal trespass. He was arrested and booked at the Bexar County Adult Detention Center. The other male was issued a warning for the pipe and all other individuals were released at the scene.

9) SAC (074591 – Emergency Detention) On 08/27/2024, officers were dispatched to W. Park Ave. and N. Main Ave. for a male stating he wanted to shoot himself. Officers were able to locate the male (non-student) who was yelling saying he wanted to end it all and if he had a gun, he would shoot himself. The male had an approximately one inch cut on his forehead and was bleeding due to banging his head on the sidewalk. EMS arrived and treated the male and released him at the scene. The male was then transported to the Methodist hospital to receive further care and evaluation.

10) SAC (074614 – Possession / Deliver Drug Paraphernalia) On 08/27/2024 while on patrol at San Antonio College Officers observed what appeared to look like a bike hidden behind the wall that leads to under the Southeast side stairwell of Parking Garage 3. Upon entering the stairwell, the officers observed two individuals, who were sitting on the ground with their belongings in the back corner behind the wall. The officer asked dispatch to conduct a check on both males for any wants or warrants, and they both returned clear of any. Upon further investigation, one of the males had a smoking pipe in his possession. He was issued a misdemeanor citation and both males were released at the scene.

11) SPC (074628– Felony Warrant) On 08/28/2024 while an officer was patrolling SPC he saw a Ford Fusion drive west on the 100 block of Maryland St and entered parking lot#1. The officer saw the vehicle displayed a Texas vehicle registration insignia that expired on 08/22. The officer contacted the driver who stated he was a current student looking for the science building. The officer informed the male student of his expired registration sticker, and the student stated he was aware his sticker was expired. Dispatch checked the student for any wants or warrants and it was confirmed the student had an active felony warrant for credit card abuse out of Kleberg Co. TX. The

male was arrested and transported to the Bexar County Adult Detention Center where he was booked for the active felony warrant.


12) NLC (074650 – Possession of Dangerous Drug & Criminal Trespass & Public Intoxication)

On 08/30/2024, Officers conducted a check of the wooded area for possible encampments. Upon checking the area nearest Judson Early College Academy (JECA) campus parking lot area there were two males (non-students) at what appeared to be a campsite. The campsite was set up with a tent makeshift bed and a cooking area. Upon further investigation one of the males was found to be in possession of pill bottles containing prescribed Trazadone belonging to another person. He was arrested and booked in the Bexar County Adult Detention Center for possession of dangerous drug. The other male was transported to the San Antonio Sobering Unit where he was accepted and released to medical staff for further care and evaluation. Both males were issued Criminal Trespass Warnings.





Vaughn Construction LLC; and delegated to Administration the authority (i) to solicit a series of specific project proposals (including pricing) from among projects approved by the Board from sub-groups of the selected CMARs; and (ii) to contract with the best-ranked such proposers.





In February 2023, a Request for Qualification Statements (RFQS) was advertised for Construction Management at Risk contracts. Purchasing & Contract Administration sent notices to 298 potential Offerors.

The Construction Manager at Risk firms were selected according to established procedures by the Alamo Colleges District and in accordance with Texas Government Code, Section 2269.253 as a RFQS two-step process. As part of the two-step process used, the Alamo Colleges District may not request fees or prices in step one. In step two, the Alamo Colleges District may request that five or fewer offerors, selected solely on the basis of qualifications (in step one), provide additional information, including the construction manager-at-risk's proposed fee and prices for fulfilling the general conditions.

In April 2023, the Board approved the pool of 10 construction management at risk firms and delegated the second step processes to Administration as authorized by Texas Government Code, Section 2269.053 and notice of such delegation in the published RFQS.



Through July 2024







FOR THE ELEVEN MONTH PERIOD ENDED JULY 31, 2024

(1) Revenue Variance:

For the eleven month period ended July 31, 2024 operating revenue increased 20.6%, or \$88.1 million to \$515.8 million (first eleven months 2023: \$427.7 million). The increase is attributed to tax revenues from expanding property valuations, resulting in an increase of \$29.2 million over last year. State appropriations, buoyed by a formula change focused on performance resulted in a \$37.3 million increase. Tuition and fee revenues also increased, contributing \$13.8 million additional funds over last year. Other income also increased \$7.8 million.

- a) Tax revenues for FY24 stand at \$256.0 million vs \$226.8 million in the prior year, an increase of 12.9%, or \$29.2 million from the prior year. This represents 100.2% of the budgeted FY24 amount vs. 98.2% in FY23. The budget for tax revenues for FY24 and FY23 stand at \$255.4 million and \$230.9 million. The District continues to benefit from increasing taxable values in Bexar County. The projected ad valorem taxes increase as the taxable assessed value of properties across Bexar County providing a 10% increase in budgeted tax revenues, with no change to the property tax rate. This increase will continue to fund critical facilities maintenance and operations, expansion of workforce programs like nursing and high demand programs.
- b) Tuition & fees for FY24 increased 13.4%, or \$13.8 million, from FY23 amounts. FY24 revenues stand at \$117.5 million, or 100.6% of the budget, vs. FY23 revenues of \$103.7 million, or 100.8% of the budget. The regular tuition positive variance is attributed to an increase in headcounts and semester credit hours taken, in addition to tuition rate increases approved in FY24. Headcount enrollment for Summer 2024 increased 12.9% or 3,403 students to 29,770. Summer 2024 semester hours showed an increase of 13.1%, or 16,181, to 139,391 semester credit hours (As of 07/09/2024). Headcount enrollment for Spring 2024 increased 9.3% or 5,809 students to 68,432. Spring 2024 semester hours showed a similar increase of 7.9%, or 33,309, to 453,155 semester credit hours (As of 02/29/2024).
- c) State appropriations increased 46.4% in FY24, or \$37.3 million, and stand at 100.8% of the budget for FY24 and 90.1% for FY23. As of this month the revenues are \$117.7 and \$80.4 million, respectively. State appropriations including state-paid benefits (group health & retirement) shows a significant increase over last year as reflected in budgeted amounts. Budgeted appropriations for FY24 are \$116.8 million vs. \$89.2 million for the prior year. And the distribution method is different too. Base state appropriations are being distributed upfront in FY24 vs a 10-month schedule in FY23 reflected in the year-to-date increase.

(2) Expense Variance:

- a) The total All Funds expense budget approved by the Board of Trustees for FY 2023-2024 is \$946.9 million, comprised of \$503.9 million in operating expense and \$443.0 million in restricted funds. The operating expense budget is developed using the Funding Model, explained in detail in the approved budget book. The President of each of the five colleges maintains local control of their operating funds and distributes their respective allocated budget to: (a) funded employee positions, and (b) departmental operational expense accounts, based on the strategic initiatives and priorities at that location. The driving force behind the FY24 operating budget is funding the strategic priorities of the Alamo Colleges District (ACD) for our students. ACD, the largest higher education institution in South Texas and the only community college system to win the Malcolm Baldrige National Quality Award, is working to fulfill Chancellor Dr. Mike Flores' moon shot vision of ending poverty in San Antonio through education. To make this bold vision a reality, the District and its five colleges - St. Philip's College, San Antonio College, Palo Alto College, Northwest Vista College and Northeast Lakeview College - are working to make access to a college education and successful completion of a degree or certificate accessible to all residents in its eight-county service area. ACD has implemented the following investment strategies based on several identified community needs to provide accessible college education and opportunities for achieving student success.
- b) Operating expenses for FY24 and FY23 for the same period stand at 80.3% and 76.6% of budget, respectively. actual expenses for FY24 and FY23 are \$419.8 million and \$360.2 million.

“The Alamo Colleges District Board of Trustees hereby approves the monthly Cooperative Purchase Report as presented.”

PURPOSE

The purpose of this Minute Order is to provide a monthly report of purchases exceeding \$200,000 and any fees charged by the various local, state, and national providers of Cooperative Purchasing (COOP) programs during the specified reporting period. Not all COOP programs charge fees, and some COOP's offer cash rebates paid directly to Alamo Colleges. The Purchasing and Contract Administration Department utilizes the COOP programs to gain greater access to goods and services, cost savings through leveraged buying, and reduced administration costs by issuing fewer competitive bids and proposals. The combined buying power of public institutions throughout the State of Texas and nationally translates into savings and provides an efficient, cost effective and legal means for providing goods and services to departments throughout the Alamo Colleges in an expedited fashion.

BACKGROUND

Vendor contracts awarded through approved federal, state or cooperative purchasing agreements are a statutorily approved alternative to competitively procured vendor contracts. Only the following such contract purchases require prior Board approval:

- a. Purchases valued at \$200,000 or more in any 12-month period that will result in additional gross square footage (permanent or otherwise) that will require cleaning and maintaining, and have at least two utilities present.
- b. Purchases valued at \$200,000 or more in any 12-month period that in the judgment of the Chancellor or Purchasing & Contract Administration would commit the College District or one of the colleges to an entirely new technology that would be pervasive for subsequent years.

For any cooperative purchasing contract valued at \$25,000 or more, Purchasing & Contract Administration shall document any contract-related fee, including any management fee. At least annually, Purchasing & Contract Administration shall present a written report regarding any contract-related fees, including any management fees, to the Board of Trustees at a properly posted open meeting.

Discussion and Possible Action to Extend Bond Counsel Services

Presented for recommended approval to the **ALAMO COLLEGES BOARD OF TRUSTEES** on September 17, 2024.

MINUTE ORDER

"The Board of Trustees hereby approves the extension of the engagement of Norton Rose Fulbright US, LLP for bond counsel legal services for the College District through December 31, 2025, as requested by the Office of the Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration."

PURPOSE

This contract action provides for the continued purchase of bond counsel services as needed based on requirements.

BACKGROUND

External specialist bond counsel represents the District's interests in regard to all bond matters, including the drafting of all legal documents relating to the issuance of bonds, reviewing and approving the disclosure documents relating to the sale of the bonds (in consultation with the representatives of the District and the District's financial advisor), and obtaining the approval of the Texas Attorney General for the issuance of the bonds. Bond counsel also issues its formal legal opinion concerning the validity and enforceability of the bonds, and the exemption of interest paid to bondholders from their federally taxable income.

Texas Government Code Section 1201.027 requires that a public issuer seeking bond counsel services must first select the most highly qualified provider on the basis of demonstrated competence and qualifications, and then attempt to negotiate a contract at a fair and reasonable price.

Matters considered in evaluating demonstrated competence and qualifications include, without limitation, experience as bond counsel to comparable public entities, particularly Texas community colleges, and the experience and expertise of the vendor's proposed engagement-attorney team, as well as that of the entire firm, regarding Texas bond elections, federal tax law (especially private use restriction compliance) and cited examples of vendor creativity in achieving client objectives.

Incumbent bond counsel Norton Rose Fulbright US, LLP was re-selected in 2019 on the basis of competency and qualifications from eleven qualification statements received in response to the College District's Request for Qualifications NO. 18A-017, which were evaluated by representatives from the Office of Legal Services, Office of the Associate Vice Chancellor for Finance and Fiscal Services, and the Treasurer considering the RFQS specifications and requirements.

The General Counsel and the Associate Vice Chancellor for Finance and Fiscal Services are well satisfied with the performance of the incumbent and recommend a minimum extension of the term herein proposed to provide competent continuity of services in anticipation of bond-related activity over the next year.

IMPLICATIONS

Financial: Estimated amount of approximately \$204,000 assuming a bond election and issuance of first tranche during the term of the extension; Fees are paid from debt transaction proceeds as a cost of issuance
