## **RECEIVE THE 2020-2021 ANNUAL SCHOOL HEALTH ADVISORY COUNCIL REPORT**

The Chairperson of the Irving ISD School Health Advisory Council (SHAC) will present the 2020-2021 Annual School Health Advisory Council Report to the Irving ISD Board of Trustees. An annual update is required by Senate Bill 283. This report details the activities of the School Health Advisory Council during the 2020-2021 school year, as well as meeting dates and support of district initiatives that impact student health and wellness. It also contains a list of SHAC members for the next year.

**As required by S.B. 283, the following details the activities of the School Health Advisory Council during the 2020-2021 school year:**

**Meetings (see Exhibit A for agendas):**

**September 21st:** Due to COVID, our first meeting of the year was held virtually via Zoom. Attendance was good, (approximately 15 members in attendance) we welcomed returning members back for another term of service on the School Health Advisory Council (SHAC) and congratulated Sheila Browning, former nurse at Lively Elementary, on her retirement as she transitioned to “community member” status on SHAC. See Exhibit B for the list of SHAC members. Dr. Sandi Cravens, Health and Physical Education Coordinator and School Health Advisory Council Co-Chair, reviewed the responsibilities of members and reminded all about the Ground Rules and Zoom Norms. Old Business started with department updates. First, Olga Rosenberger, Director of Food & Nutrition Services, shared the hard work and success her department has been engaged in since the onset of COVID last spring. They have been extremely busy and have served over 1 million meals to our Irving families. The current summer guidelines are still in place which allow families to pick up meals (breakfast and lunch free of charge) for all children ages 1 – 18 years. Families pick up seven meals for each child at a time. There are currently eight pick-up locations for our Irving community. Meal service will continue for remote learners.

Second, Jose Villasenor, Employee Wellness & Support Coordinator, shared the Cigna Employee Assistance Program which is open to all Irving ISD employees. It helps with a variety of wellness topics, such as family and physical health, legal and financial guidance, substance abuse, relationships, and emotional health, and includes three free counseling sessions. Jose also covered a list of topics for the many wellness sessions that have been offered to employees in the past year.

Third, Sofia Galvan, At Risk/Responsive Services Coordinator, was unable to attend, but sent the bullet points below to Dr. Cravens so she could update SHAC on her department.

- This is Year 2 of the district’s Social Emotional Learning implementation plan, staff will continue to receive professional development, elementary campuses will start implementing Sanford Harmony SEL curriculum, and there will also be parent workshops.

- Staff will receive a Cultural Intelligence training next month, and a trauma-informed training will be offered to all campus staff.
- This year, Dereka Hall is supervising 6 Social Work interns that are supporting various campuses and working very closely with the school counselors. They are offering resources to families, making home visits, and reaching out to students that need further motivation to engage in remote learning.
- We have offered Mental Health First Aid training to the campus leaders and the response has been positive, we plan on offering these trainings to teachers as well.

Last, Karyn Beauchamp, Director of Clinic & Health Services, was unable to attend so there was no update from her department.

In Old Business, Dr. Cravens shared that all swimming programs are on hold, (except for the Singley PE swimming class and swim team) and would resume once field trips are approved. She was also excited to report that the district would be participating in Go Red again this year.

Next, Amber McHugh and Kathy Miller both shared their experiences as online teachers this fall. Both reported that it's going well, but they are very busy. Kathy's PreK students are working hard, and their parents are very involved and have a lot of questions. Amber's high school students are working in an online course related to personal fitness.

Last, Dr. Cravens shared the following paragraph with members and assured them she is updating the SHAC page with the required information.

Starting in the 2020-21 school year, House Bill 18, described below, will clarify that all SHACs should advise on elementary and middle school health curriculum, and also high school health curriculum if the district requires health for graduation. HB 18 calls for the integration of physical and mental health in the health curriculum and expands awareness about e-cigarettes to all substance abuse. School counselors are added to the SHAC membership, and for each campus, the SHAC must post a statement of whether the campus has a full-time nurse or full-time counselor. This bill also expands the required publication of statements from the SHAC, including a statement of the policies and procedures adopted to promote the physical health and mental health of students, the physical health and mental health resources available at each campus, contact information for the nearest providers of essential public health services and the contact information for the nearest local mental health authority.

No other new business was discussed, and the meeting was adjourned.

**November 10th:** The second meeting of the year was also via Zoom because of COVID.

Jose Villasenor, Employee Wellness Coordinator, started off the department updates. He shared the Employee Wellness newsletter, and he was excited to launch his Twitter handle for his department. @IISD\_Wellness.

Next, Karyn Beauchamp, Director of Clinic & Health Services, reported that the district is doing well managing the COVID cases and students are recovering at a quick rate when they do contract the virus. She also mentioned that conversations continue regarding employee vaccinations offered by the district via a third party, and student vaccinations when one is approved for younger ages.

Olga Rosenberger, Director of Food & Nutrition Services, updated the Council on their efforts to feed remote and in-person learners. Remote learners can now pick up a week's worth of meals on Saturdays at designated locations; and in-person learners are sent home with a weekend meal pack on Fridays.

Last, Sofia Galvan, At-Risk/ Responsive Services Coordinator, was pleased to report that GAGGLE, the company that scans student emails for alarming language, is doing a nice job of alerting schools and counselors when students use phrases that signal they may be in need of help. GAGGLE also assists in making an action plan to address the issue if needed. Additionally, Sofia emphasized that our students continue to be possible targets of human trafficking. As a result, a plan has been put in place to get all professional staff trained on recognizing the signs and how to respond to help students who may be victims of this abuse.

Then, Dr. Sandi Cravens, Health and Physical Education Coordinator and School Health Advisory Council Co-Chair, provided an update of familiar programs/initiatives. PE swimming and swim team are currently active, but all other swimming programs are still on hold. She relayed teacher concerns about teaching Big Decisions and Healthy Decisions virtually; so, she will create asynchronous modules for both that teachers could use if they chose to.

Dr. Cravens provided an update on Senate Bill 11 and shared the website that includes the information required in the bill. The SHAC also welcomed two new members required by Senate Bill 11. Counselors Kimest Sanders (Lee) and Rachel Chamberlin (Lady Bird) will be valuable members of SHAC going forward.

New Business included an overview of the \$50,000 grant received by the physical education department this year. Every elementary school will have access to training, resources, and curriculum materials from the CATCH (Coordinated Approach to School Health) Nutrition program because of this grant funding. CATCH personnel will provide support as teachers work to promote healthy lifestyles on their campus and with their parents.

Before the meeting was adjourned, a couple of members asked about Food for Thought, the district food pantry program, and Superintendent Hernandez's desire to have students serve on SHAC. Dr. Cravens took note and said she would return in January with an update and/or answers to these questions.

**January 19<sup>th</sup>:** At our third meeting of the year, we once again met via Zoom. As usual, we started with department updates. First, Sofia Galvan, At-Risk/Responsive Services Coordinator, shared good news about parent meetings she is planning. Because of COVID she was unable to offer any during first semester but has planned several for second semester. The topics include suicide and anxiety awareness, and mental health first aid. She'll also be bringing in a guest speaker Tina Bryson, the author of the book, Flipping Your Lid.

Second, Olga Rosenberg, Director of Food and Nutrition Services, offered an update for her department. They continue to serve thousands of meals to our remote learners. They even put goodies in their food packets, such as pencils, erasers, etc., to bring some joy to students who remain at home who may be missing out on the fun of going to school. She also mentioned that the reason for menu changes can be attributed to vendors who are experiencing worker shortages and are unable to fulfill certain food items. When questioned about the menu format, Olga explained they currently use an app called School Café, that has many user-friendly features for parents. However, she is always open to new ideas and information.

And the last department update was from Jose Villasenor, Employee Wellness & Support Coordinator. Jose shared the three top items he is working on: the virtual employee wellness fair, a gratitude video for teachers, and an employee wellness app. He explained that a survey revealed most employees prefer pre-recorded sessions that they can watch on their own time. Jose also shared a video that MacArthur students created to say "thank you" to teachers who are working so hard to connect and educate students during this unprecedented school year. The video was very well received, and teachers will love it. He briefly mentioned a wellness app that is in the early stages of development by our own Irving ISD high school students who are creating it.

Karyn Beauchamp, Director of Health Services, was unable to attend the meeting so no update was available from her department.

Next, Dr. Sandi Cravens, Health and Physical Education Coordinator and School Health Advisory Council Co-Chair, offered follow up to two topics discussed at the last meeting. She explained the purpose and process of Food for Thought, our district's food pantry for students; and Mary Richarte, community member, and Dr. Tracy Brown, Director of Guidance and Counseling, provided further clarification and information on the program.

The other item that required follow up pertained to students serving on the School Health Advisory Council. Dr. Cravens shared a board policy that outlined the requirements for SHAC members that did not mention students. However, Olga Rosenberger, Director of Food and Nutrition Services, brought to our attention that the current wellness policy did list students as potential members. It was decided that Dr. Cravens will follow up with Olga regarding the policy and seek guidance from upper leadership regarding next steps.

In program updates, Dr. Cravens shared that she is currently working on reproductive health units in Canvas for both middle and high school levels to use for asynchronous lessons. In addition, she has requested permission to restart the **Swim Safe** (2<sup>nd</sup> grade) program in March based on safety protocols used by swim team and high school PE swimming classes.

New Business required feedback from SHAC members on a plan for spending Title IV funding which allows for purchases geared towards promoting healthy, active lifestyles, including structured physical education activities. Dr. Cravens detailed an outline to supply all elementary campuses with new gymnastics equipment based on a Comprehensive Needs Assessment conducted by the Title IV committee (see Exhibit C). Members expressed 100% support for this initiative.

No other new business was discussed, and the meeting was adjourned.

**March 30th:** Our last meeting of the year was held via Zoom and there were 15 members in attendance for most of the meeting. In Old Business, Olga Rosenberger, Director of Food & Nutrition Services, shared that her department was ranked among the top 10 in the state by the Children At-Risk organization and is the highest ranked in the North Texas area. She also reported that her department continues to work diligently to provide nutritious meals for our students during these unprecedented times. In addition, as they start to plan menus for next year, it will be under new guidelines that require lower sodium levels and the use of whole grain food items. These progressive changes have been added each year by the federal government and are now approaching a point where the requirements are difficult to meet while still offering tasty, nutritious food that students will eat. The good news is, each year vendors consistently make improvements in their food products that meet those rules.

Next, Sofia Galvan, At-Risk/ Responsive Services Coordinator, highlighted the success of recent virtual parent workshops that were offered during 2<sup>nd</sup> semester. Topics included: human trafficking, drug awareness and prevention, anxiety, and suicide awareness. She also shared details of the first "Irving ISD SEL Day." Campuses were encouraged to use the resources provided to teach students about social-emotional health and strategies to cope with feelings of stress and anxiety. She reported that

several campuses participated and shared pictures on social media. Moreover, Sofia was pleased to announce the addition of three new campuses to the Tele-Behavioral Health program, which brings the total in Irving ISD to 11 campuses whose students can receive four virtual counseling sessions with a behavioral health professional at no cost to their parents.

Then, Jose Villasenor, Coordinator of Employee Wellness and Support Services, reported very positive news about his department. He has offered multiple sessions on various wellness topics for employees that are being very well attended this year. The topics range from financial wellness to cooking demonstrations and staying healthy during COVID. Jose also shared that the virtual wellness fair this year will now be in the format of an asynchronous wellness wall. After a survey revealed that employees preferred to attend health information sessions on their own time, the wellness fair idea was changed to a virtual wellness wall where attendees can click on various vendors who will provide information in the form of videos and written material, as well as details about their products. The wall should be ready in mid-April.

Karyn Beauchamp, Director of Health Services, was unable to attend the meeting and sent the informational items below:

- We are now Care Van Irving – I will be able to provide student immunizations through the state Texas Vaccines for Children program. We are scheduling clinics. All immunizations are on site. Training is beginning for nurses helping schedule clinics in schools – a lot goes into the process.
- Planning to have a drive through clinic at Supplies for Success this fall before school starts. This will be added to the drive through event which is exciting. We are diligently trying to see all students overdue for immunizations and getting them caught up ASAP.
- COVID-19 vaccine – many teachers have now received their vaccines and many are still needing the vaccine. I am working with TVFC to see if I can receive any COVID vaccine for teachers, but right now they have not been able to accomplish this for us. I am still trying.
- Covid-19 numbers are way down in students and staff. BUT, we are watching this next week to see if after Spring Break the numbers are going to rise.
- Covid-19 numbers are reported daily by the campus nurses and I send out a report to all upper management daily. AS of today there are only 4 “active” isolation cases in the whole district of students. The staff has 2 adults that I know of right now. So – overall we are doing great!
- Students and staff will continue to wear masks and right now we are encouraging the 6ft distance between teachers and students. A CDC report does state many studies were conducted and there is evidence that students can be placed 3 ft apart when all are wearing masks. This will help with returning students to the classroom, which we hope

to do as we know students learn better when in the classroom with the teacher.

- We are hoping all will return to in-person learning this fall to help with the increased problem with attendance and students failing due to not doing their required work to pass their classes at home. Teachers need the students in class to learn.
- Nurses are working creatively to perform all state required screenings and data entry.
- We need as much help as possible in the community to let our Hispanic population understand how important receiving the vaccine for COVID is. I know some will be totally against receiving any vaccinations, BUT this vaccine IS working against Covid 19 and the new strains of COVID. Please do what you can to encourage the vaccine. There are minimal side effects and do not only pay attention to the media. They will report the bad, not necessarily the facts of how many it is helping. Parkland COPC on Britain is asking us to help them state the facts about the vaccine.

Following the department updates, Dr. Sandi Cravens shared other details about program initiatives and then moved on to New Business. In New Business, she reviewed the Irving ISD Wellness Plan goals and objectives and asked for feedback from SHAC members. She shared that this plan conveys how the Wellness Policy is put “into action.” After SHAC approval, the next step will be the development of the evaluation tool. There were no objections to the contents of the plan, so Dr. Cravens concluded the meeting by thanking members for their service this year and invited all to return for another two-year term.
