MWISD Student Health Advisory Council

Background

A School Health Advisory Council (SHAC) is a group appointed by the school district to serve at the district level. Members of the SHAC come from different areas of the community and from within the school district. Texas law [Texas Education Code, Title 2, Subtitle F, Chapter 28, Subchapter A, §28.004] requires the establishment of a SHAC for every school district.

The SHAC is required to meet at least four times each year but MWISD's District of Innovation plan allows for the council to meet twice yearly.

The SHAC assists the district in ensuring that local community values are reflected in health education instruction. The Texas Department of State Health Services has developed a guide titled- School Health Advisory Council: A Guide for Texas School Districts. This document provides the SHAC with guidelines and expectations from the state. MWISD utilizes this guide to plan appropriate actions and discussions.

2022-2023 Membership

Due to lack of involvement after requesting parents to participate, the committee determined that next year, we will advertise better by posting meetings not just on the district website but also post meetings to Facebook, Twitter, and send notifications through the schoolwide parents' information system.

Meeting Dates

Mineral Wells ISD Student Health Advisory Council met three times during the 2022-23 school year. We reviewed goals and added a goal for the next school year. The SHAC tried to host meetings virtually, but the turnout was not good. The last meeting returned to in-person.

Accomplishments and Activities

The previous goal of creating a school store at MWHS that carried food for students was not realized. The campus principal asked for more time to plan for it. It is still a goal of the committee.

CPR and Stop the Bleed training provided to all staff.

SHAC determined that vaping is a concern in the schools. Made a plan to work with Palo Pinto County Extension Office to present a parent night and provide an assembly about the dangers of vaping to junior high and high school students in fall of 2023. Also, the council determined that we need a focus on vaping dangers throughout the year by providing activities from the American Heart Association and others at specified times.
