What has  
WWPS been  
working on in  
the past -  
Thank You!

- \$95,000 for coordinator to help establish the WWCCF (2020)
  - Included in Governor Inslee's budget
  - Supported hiring Samantha Bowen to create the structure prior to launch
- \$285,000 for WWCCF capital (EL grants) in 2025; \$55,000 in 2021
- Transitional Kindergarten (TK) to Transition to Kindergarten (TTK) - 2023
  - Prior to and then HB 1550 (Santos)
  - Fending off challenges, helping set the tone
  - Positioned WWPS as the model and resource with legislators
- Experience Factor bill (2024), mitigating the impact and loss of funding (2023 – 2% not 0)
- Killed SB 5780 – EV bus depreciation bill (2025)
- Visits and conversations
  - 2018, 2019 – WWPS briefed House and Senate capital budget leaders about needs
  - House Education tour and visit 2024
  - Senate Education chair visit 2025
  - Rep. Steve Bergquist, visits and calls
- WWPS is “at the table” on discussions

# 2026 Legislative Session Reminders

60 Day Session  
(23 days down!)

Starts January 12,  
ends March 12

All bills from 2025 are  
“eligible” to run in  
2026 – subject to  
“cutoffs”

Budget constraints,  
more cuts possible –  
new investments will  
be difficult

School districts need  
to continue to  
advocate for their  
priorities – regardless  
of the budget situation

Capital budget has  
some capacity but still  
tough to get money  
that isn't in a “bucket”

# Composition of the Legislature

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## Senate and House Democratic Majorities

- Senate Ds: 30-19 – supermajority for Democrats
- House Ds: 59-39 – supermajority for Democrats

30+ new legislators in 2025 of 147 total (includes House members that moved to Senate)

42.8% of the legislature is NEW since the 2020 election.

Only 14 legislators were around when the prototypical schools funding model was adopted in 2009; and nearly 60% (86) are new since the McCleary “fix” was adopted in 2017.

# Reminder about Big 3 actions in 2025

- Special education - \$331 million for 2025-27
  - Removed the cap on enrollment of special education students
  - Increased and simplified the multiplier of the Basic Education rate
  - Decreased the threshold to reach the safety net
- MSOC - \$78.89 million over two years - \$81.26 per student increase (\$35.99 new plus inflation factor)
- Zero movement on transportation AND lost \$13 million/year special passengers

# TTK Budget Challenges

- 25% cut to TTK across all districts = equal cuts would result in loss of 22 students
- Unclear how the 25% would be applied
- Friday learned about concepts Senate is considering to preserve the current level of slots, possibly grow, but allowing the 25% cut
- Stakeholders: WEA, WWPS, EWQSC, WASA, WSSDA, Early Learning lobbyist
- Meeting Friday to discuss concepts

# MSOC, Transportation, Local Effort Assistance (LEA)

## MSOC/Transportation

- HB 2147/**SB 5918** – Increases MSOC by \$100/student or \$100,000, whichever is greater.
- SB 5858 – restores the special passengers safety net program for students who are homeless, in the foster care system, or students with disabilities.
- Other MSOC bills have been introduced too, unlikely to get hearings this session

## LEA

- HB 2116 – would put the levy equalization/Local Effort Assistance (LEA) increases into statute and raises levy and LEA rates to \$5,035 per student by CY 2032. Hearing Feb. 5th in House APP.
- HB 2562 – would put LEA into statute; \$3,838.26 state LEA threshold in subsection (2)(e)(i) corresponds to the 2026 max per pupil levy limit under RCW 84.52.0531, which would increase beginning in 2027. In 2031, the state local effort assistance threshold in subsection (2)(e)(ii) is set at \$5,035, aligning with RCW 84.52.0531.
- HB 2580 – would increase LEA by \$400 per student

# Fixes to last session's SB 5814 – sales tax extension

- Drafted language that I've sent to the House and Senate Finance leads
  - Focused on exemption for temporary staffing and live presentations
- Hearing that both House and Senate may try to provide some relief to school districts
- Depends on how much it will “cost” the state to offer exemptions

# SEATech Capital Budget request: \$3.2M

Fully supported by Senator Perry Dozier, and Reps. Skyler Rude and Mark Klicker – from 16<sup>th</sup>

Submitted by Jerry and Ben January 23<sup>rd</sup>

Heard from Dozier they left about \$400 million in bond capacity for the 2026 supplemental

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- Trying to increase the Small District Modernization Grant program
- Looking at what the Governor proposed for OSPI and all agencies
- \$2.5 million for lead in drinking water (additional)
- After the main investments, sounds like left with about \$93 million for these types of requests

Also heard from Dozier that their “maximum” request can be \$300,000

- He also has a request that’s over that for Pasco
