D. Early Childhood Special Education Contract with Wayzata Community Church

Regarding the contract between the School District and Wayzata Community Church Nursery School to provide education services for Early Childhood Special Education students, the cost of this contract for the 2008-2009 school year is \$42,457.97, which is a 3% increase over the previous year's contract. There are no other changes in the contract.

Donna Marget, Early Childhood Special Education Coordinator, believes that the space at Wayzata Community Church Nursery School is well-suited to the instructional needs of these students.

E. West Suburban Interagency Early Intervention Agreement

Each of the West Metro School Districts, Hopkins, Minnetonka, Orono, St. Louis Park, Wayzata, and Westonka, participate together on the West Suburban Interagency Early Intervention Committee (WSIEIC). Interagency Early Intervention Committees are required by law to coordinate services for eligible children, age's birth through two and their families. Part of this collaboration includes a Central Intake System that coordinates mandated Child Find activities, referral processes, evaluation procedures, and services coordination. For the past many years, this Central Intake Process has been co-funded by Hennepin County and Special Education state funding reimbursement. Hopkins has hosted the contract for the positions that support this Central Intake process through an independent contract with the MN Visiting Nurses Association. (MVNA). MVNA provided the WSIEIC with notice that it will no longer be providing this service to the collaborative. As a result, Wayzata has agreed to host the Central Intake positions, which include a licensed professional and a clerical professional. Wayzata will report the expenditures to EDRS and collect the unreimbursed costs from Hennepin County. Wayzata is willing to host these positions for up to six years and then would look to another WSIEIC School district to assume their turn.

We believe it is important as a part of this process to have a written agreement between the six districts that spells out this arrangement and insures that if there are any remaining unreimbursed costs to the program that each district would pay their fair share based on child count. The written agreement is attached for the Board's approval. The agreement was written by Susan Torgerson of Kennedy and Graven. An example of the sharing of unreimbursed expenditures is as follows; for Fiscal Year 07, each District's special education budget was assessed

H. Health/Safety Plan – Attachment 99

In order to gain state approval for health and safety projects that will be included in the District's tax levy for taxes payable in 2009, the District must meet a number of requirements.

An updated health and safety plan can be reviewed at www.thetotalprogram.com

The District must:

- 1) Have a Board-approved safety plan in place, known as “Attachment 99,” for the 2008-2009 school year. Each year the Department of Education selects some areas for specific attention by all districts in the coming year; the plan addresses these specific areas (e.g. lockout/tagout, which is a process to ensure that electrical circuits that are shut off for service are not accidentally turned back on prematurely, and working in confined spaces).
- 2) Conduct periodic safety inspections of its buildings. This year Sunset Hill Elementary, Kimberly Lane Elementary, and East Middle School were inspected by Mr. Mike Weigel, an employee of the Metropolitan Educational Cooperative Service Unit. The inspector identifies hazards that need correction. When fines could be levied by an enforcing agency such as the Occupational Health and Safety Agency, he also notes the potential fine. He includes photos of some of the identified hazards when he deems it useful.

A Committee of CFAC members, two Board members, and finance staff has been meeting to make recommendations about the establishment of a trust to hold and invest the asset reserved to fund the District's post-retirement benefit obligations under Government Accounting and Standards Board Rule No. 45 (“GASB45”). A new state law passed in March authorizes school districts to form a trust to hold these assets, so that the districts can comply with the requirement of GASB 45. The assets can be invested in the same way that pension assets can be invested, which means a broader array of investments than school districts can usually invest in. The trust administrator must be a bank, an insurance company, or the Public Employee Retirement Association (PERA). The committee has concluded that it would be advisable to form an irrevocable trust, to be overseen by the Board Finance and Business Committee. The District would select an investment advisor to recommend investments and asset allocations to the District.

The policy authorizes the trust and sets out the oversight by the Board Finance and Business Committee.

A motion was made by Ms. Carter Peterson and seconded by Ms. Linda Cohen to waive the reading and accept for first reading the proposed new Board policy 730 – “Trust for Other Post Employment Benefits”. The motion passed 6-0, with Mr. Hesby being absent.

2. Proposed Amendments to Board Policy and Regulations 728 and 728-R – “Operations of District-Owned Activity Bus” – First Reading

Board Policy and

Board Policy 728 was revised in April 2008 with two significant changes:

- A. Subject drivers of the activity bus to random drug and alcohol testing, just as the law requires for drivers for Adam Services and First Student. The law does not require drug and alcohol testing for activities bus drivers, but the administration believed that it was reasonable and prudent to impose the same requirement as for commercially-licensed drivers.
- B. Require a criminal background check of all drivers. This is a requirement of state law.

Subsequently, the administration learned that state law imposed additional requirements on employers who subject certain employees to random drug and alcohol testing. After consulting with attorney Sara Ruff, former Executive Director of Finance and Business, Alan Hopeman, drafted regulations to conform to the state law on drug testing. In addition, Ms. Ruff reviewed Board Policy 728 and suggested the changes that are presented.

A motion to waive the second reading and adopt the proposed amendments to Board Policy and Regulations 728 and 728-R – “Operations of District-Owned Activity Bus” was made by Ms. Patricia Gleason and seconded by Ms. Carter Peterson. The motion passed unanimously.

B. Curriculum and Instruction

1. Engineering, Technology and Design (ETD) Curriculum Presentation

It was noted by Dr. Jane Sigford, Executive Director of Curriculum and Instruction that for the past two years the Engineering, Technology, and Design Department has conducted a curriculum review. As part of the process, the department’s name was changed to ETD from Industrial Technology. The name change was symbolic of the many changes that occurred within the department and its offerings. Nancy Neal, the curriculum resource teacher and ETD teacher at Central Middle School, and Terri Bostrom the ETD teacher at East Middle School, co-facilitated the process and were present to give an overview of the outcomes of the process.

No Board action was required.

Wayzata stands out in 2007-08 standardized testing

As the number of students required to take standardized tests continues to increase, students across all levels in Wayzata Public Schools are performing exceedingly well on tests such as the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments (MCA IIs).

WHS ninth grade students passed the GRAD test of written composition at 96 percent, compared with the state rate of 89 percent.

Approximately 84 percent of the class of 2008 took the ACT and the average score for Wayzata Public Schools students

during the 2007-08 testing season was 25.01, once again well above the national and state averages. Students in the district also continue to post strong SAT scores (averaging 625 for math and 611 for critical reading).

With a growing number of Advanced Placement offerings (25 courses were offered in 2007-08) 871 Wayzata High School students enrolled in one or more AP courses and staff administered 1,131 tests to 648 students with 87 percent of them earning college credit.

District overview and student accomplishments

Wayzata Public Schools enrolled more than 9,800 students during the past year and graduated approximately 744 students.

As of August 8, 2008, the district has 10,017 total students enrolled with 4,334 in elementary, 2,378 in middle schools and 3,305 at WHS.

The district also has approximately 62 students attending either the FAIR School or IDDS and 250 Choice is Yours students enrolled in the district from Minneapolis.

Student demographics are changing in the district. As an example, the English Language Learners population is

on the rise with more than 252 students speaking one of 28 different languages. The two languages spoken by the most ELL students in the district are Spanish and Russian.

Similar to the results on AP exams, more students continue to take the ACT at WHS and the composite scores con-

tinue to improve in contrast to national averages, which have tapered off. Approximately 21 percent of WHS students took the SAT and achieved an average score of 625 on math and 611 on critical reading, more than 100 points better than national averages.

The scores listed at right correspond to student performance on the new MCA II test, which replaced the MCAs. This test is administered to students in the state and represents higher state standards in the areas of reading and math.

60.9 percent of the students taking the spring 2008 MAP will meet or exceed their individual NWEA reading RIT expected growth target.

63 percent of the students who participate in spring MAP testing will meet or exceed their individual NWEA reading RIT target score.

Oakwood

61.8 percent of students who participate in spring MAP testing will meet or exceed their individual NWEA reading RIT growth target score.

Summer learning programs offered through the Wayzata Public Schools are rich in opportunities for learners of all ages and are cooperatively provided through Special Education, Academic Reinforcement, Reading Intervention, Secondary Summer School and Community Education. The following is a report on each of these components for the summer of 2008.

Special Education

Special Education services provided at the early childhood, elementary and high school sites meet the mandated requirements for special education students who qualify for services under Extended School Year (ESY). Each student’s Individualized Education Plan (IEP) or Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) team determines what, if any services are needed during the summer months and to what extent those services should be provided.

Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) services are determined individually and may be provided through the summer program or other team determined method.

Elementary Academic Reinforcement Program students are instructed by a team of at least one elementary teacher, one special education teacher, and one special education paraprofessional.

Secondary Special Education provides students services at the High School which are taught by special education teachers and related services staff. Additionally, some ESY services are provided through homework packets provided by the licensed special education teacher or other individually determined method.

Students who require ESY services work on IEP related goals and objectives that may include but are not limited to the following: academic, communication, behavioral, social/emotional, self-help skills, organization and work completion, or jobs and job training. Here is a summary of the number of children/students served at each level:

Academic Reinforcement

This program offers elementary students the opportunity to maintain skills learned during the regular school year. The summer day includes both large group and small group instruction with an emphasis on a station approach. This approach allows for differentiation of curriculum and instruction to help focus on individual student needs as identified by each student's teacher from the 2007-08 school year. Summer activities focus on developing skills in the areas of reading, math, and written language. Additionally, students work to develop appropriate social skills. Students also have the opportunity to maintain and develop technology skills.

An enrichment component is included in the summer activities. This year's enrichment program, "Go Green", facilitated a theme approach to many reading, writing, math, science and art activities while developing a greater awareness of our environment. The culminating activity was a field trip to Fish Lake Park where students participated in sessions led by naturalists. These sessions, which focused on mammals in our environment, were designed to broaden students' understanding of a mammal's life cycle and habitat quality.

Additional enrichment experiences were provided through the Wayzata Music Education Boosters and available to all students attending the elementary summer program. The music experience included a highly interactive assembly for students. Students in the fifth grade were provided with a small group guitar lesson. Ideally, the targeted summer school population will be better represented in music groups in future years as a result of the positive summer music experience.

A total of 399 students were served in the Elementary Summer Program, including the academic reinforcement and special education services for those eligible. Ten percent of the 399 students, identified as English Language Learners (ELL), received support in the classroom. The average daily attendance was 85 percent.

Reading Intervention

The Elementary Reading Intervention Program for Summer School was again offered in the Wayzata School District during the summer of 2008. Forty-three percent of the first grade students enrolled in the Elementary Summer Program also received the services of the reading intervention program.

Rationale: Researchers have found that students in low socio-economic groups progressed at a pace similar to other students during the school year. However, over the summer these students lost significant ground, while other students continued to make a small gain. Based upon this research, Wayzata Public Schools provided identified students with a reading intervention during Summer School.

Model: The intervention was modeled on the one-to-one tutoring program called Reading Recovery that is currently being implemented in four of our elementary schools. Nancy McCoy, trained Reading Recovery teacher, provided training in lesson design for participating teachers. Teachers worked one-to-one with students and were assigned 5 students each.

Results:

Data was gathered on 35 students. Students were tested at the beginning of the program and again at the end. Growth was measured using a Running Record test (Developmental Reading Assessment) to get a text level. Students exited the program with increased text reading levels from 0 to 6 levels. An expected amount of growth for 12-16 days of instruction would be from 1-2 levels.

Secondary Summer School

Secondary Summer School took on a new look for summer 2008. With the added concerns for math readiness and MCAII testing, a concerted effort was made to enroll students who could benefit from added instruction. Students in 7th and 8th grades were given instruction in mathematic computation, operations and language. A communications teacher was paired with the math teacher in each of the classrooms. The program was similar with the rising 9th graders with the addition of our popular robotics curriculum. A computerized math curriculum ALEKS® math was implemented at all levels. Student surveys indicated students like a combination of face-to-face instruction with the computerized program rather than either delivery method in isolation. The students' summer program also increased from 15 to 28 days.

The structure of the **Credit Recovery** and the **TAP** program changed from a single 29 day session to two 14 day sessions. This framework assisted students and staff in focusing on their subject matter with minimal distraction. Informal interviews with students and review of student records indicate this approach was successful at increasing student attendance and course completion.

This year it became necessary to offer breakfast at the secondary level. 85 students received daily nourishment from the breakfast program. It is recommended we pursue offering through Culinary Express a breakfast program at all levels for summer 2009.

The summer program culminated with a graduation ceremony of 10 students who completed their requirements through the summer program

Community Education

Community Education offers summer programs for learners preschool through adults. Although the array of offerings is not as expansive during the summer as during the other seasons, programs are designed to provide enriched and expanded learning opportunities which complement the school-year program.

The Barefoot in the Grass Preschool Program enrolled 110 three, four and five year-old students in six classes. Included in this were school readiness children with the intent being to boost their skills before they get to kindergarten. Classes were held at the Family Learning Center. This year the program collaborated with Early Childhood Special Education to provide preschool options for children with special needs.

Care for Kids provided childcare for parents attending Adult Basic Education courses. In addition, Care for Kids offered block time spaces for Peppermint Fence and ECFE families. Block time is a once per week pre-paid 2 – 3 hour childcare space.

Home Base is District 284's school-age care program designed to meet the need for before and after school care as well as care on release days and in the summer. The program provides children fun, healthy recreational and social experiences designed to both increase each child's self esteem and provide care while parents work. Home Base operated care for children entering Kindergarten through entering sixth grade. The summer program enrolled 900 children. Summer care was available at Birchview, Gleason Lake, Greenwood, Kimberly Lane, Plymouth Creek, and Sunset Hill. Children enjoyed a variety of field trips each week to compliment the on-site program.

The WISHES Youth Enrichment Summer Program is an extension of the after-school enrichment program during the academic year. This year 786 students were enrolled in a variety of classes held at all elementary schools in the district. Classes took place in June and July including a variety of offerings such as art instruction, crafts, drama, golf, science, math and reading. A total of 786 students enrolled and all 45 classes that were offered were held with 77 percent of those classes at full capacity.

Music Production enrolled nearly one hundred students this summer. Small group lessons, full band rehearsals and an enthusiastic staff combined for an outstanding one-week experience. The program culminated with visits to music and recording studios in the metro area.

As an extension of the **WISHES MacPhail Strings Program**, students were able to sign up for private string lessons over the summer months. Interested students met weekly at Central Middle School for violins lessons.

“Let’s Make a Movie” was offered to middle school students interested in learning more about the technology and creativity in movie production. Twenty students developed their own movie and presented their work to family and friends.

Driver Education served nearly 150 students who took the 30-hour classroom component of the driver education curriculum. Sessions of classroom instruction were offered through June and July and taught by licensed District staff. In addition to classroom instruction, over 100 students completed the 6-hour behind the wheel instruction in order to test for their permit.

Adult Basic Education is a program for adults sixteen years and older wanting to improve their English Language skills, basic reading, writing, math, GED (high school equivalency) preparation, transition to post-secondary education, and citizenship preparation for personal skill improvement, increase employment opportunities, and for post-secondary education reasons. The ABE summer program extended the school year by seven weeks reducing the interruption in learning for participating residents in their English, basic skills and GED preparation to maximize learning so residents can effectively maintain and enhance skills so they can reach their goals faster. Five daytime and three evening classes offered either Pre-Beginning, Beginning, Intermediate English as a Second Language or GED/ Basic skills classes twice a week. An estimated 110 learners utilized this continuing program through the summer months.

The Expanded Learning Community

This report highlights the major programs offered and administered this past summer through the Wayzata Public Schools. We also recognize the work and accomplishments of so many other partnering community organizations and agencies that contribute learning opportunities to our community’s summer learning menu. Together and throughout the entire year, we continue to model excellence among learning communities.

Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, a regular meeting of the School Board of Independent School District No. 284, State of Minnesota, was duly held on September 8, 2008, at 7:00 o'clock p.m., for the purpose, in part, of awarding the sale of the General Obligation School Building Refunding Bonds, Series 2008A of the District.

Member _____ introduced the following resolution and moved its adoption:

**RESOLUTION AWARDING THE SALE, DETERMINING THE
FORM AND DETAILS, AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION, DELIVERY,
AND REGISTRATION, AND PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF
GENERAL OBLIGATION SCHOOL BUILDING REFUNDING BONDS, SERIES 2008A**

BE IT RESOLVED by the School Board of Independent School District No. 284, State of Minnesota, as follows:

Section 1. Authorization and Sale.

1.01 Authorization. At a meeting held May 12, 2008, this Board determined to sell and issue not to exceed \$33,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of general obligation refunding bonds of Independent School District No. 284 (the "Issuer" or the "District"). Said Bonds shall hereinafter be referred to as the "Bonds" or the "Refunding Bonds". The Refunding Bonds, together with other available funds of the Issuer in the amount of \$_____, shall provide funds for a current refunding of the Refunded Bonds and to prepay on February 1, 2009, the 2010 to 2016 principal installments, aggregating \$32,740,000 in principal amount, of the Issuer's General Obligation School Building Refunding Bonds, Series 1998A, bearing a date of original issue of April 1, 1998 (the "Refunded Bonds"). The Refunded Bonds were originally issued to provide funds for the crossover refunding of the District's General Obligation School Building Bonds, Series 1994B and the District's General Obligation School Building Bonds, Series 1995B.

1.02 Sale. The Board has determined that this issue shall be privately sold after direct negotiation and has determined to retain Sound Capital Management to act as an independent financial advisor to provide bond pricing opinion services for the purposes set forth in Minnesota Statutes, Section 475.60, Subdivision 2(9). The proposal of Northland Securities, Inc. (the "Purchaser"), to purchase the Bonds at a price of \$_____ plus interest accrued to settlement, and upon the further terms and conditions contained in the Official Statement was accepted on September ___, 2008 by the Board Chair and the Superintendent, pursuant to the May 12, 2008 resolution of the Board, and the execution of the bond purchase agreement and award of the sale of the Bonds is hereby ratified by the Board.

1.03 Execution of Documents. The endorsement of the acceptance on the proposal by the Board Chair and the Superintendent is ratified in all respects.

1.04 Purpose; Compliance with Current Refunding Law; Debt Service Savings; Findings; Security.

(a) **Compliance.** The Refunding Bonds shall provide moneys for a current refunding of the Refunded Bonds. It is hereby determined and declared that the refunding of the Refunded Bonds complies with Minnesota Statutes, Section 475.67, and is consistent with the covenants made with the holders thereof. The Issuer has observed and complied with all of the obligations and covenants made by the School Board in connection with the issuance of the Refunded Bonds.

(b) **Use of Proceeds of Refunded Bonds.** All of the proceeds, including the investment earnings thereon, of the Refunded Bonds have heretofore been expended by the Issuer for the uses and purposes for which the District issued the Refunded Bonds.

(c) **Redemption.** The Refunded Bonds are called for redemption on February 1, 2009, the earliest date on which they may be called for redemption without payment of any premium.

(d) **Security.** Until retirement and prepayment of the Refunded Bonds, all provisions made for the security of the Refunded Bonds shall be observed by the Issuer.

(e) **Supplemental Resolution.** The resolutions of the School Board authorizing the issuance of the Refunded Bonds are hereby supplemented to the extent necessary to give effect to the provisions of this resolution.

1.05 Compliance with Law. All acts, conditions and things required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Minnesota to be done, to happen and to be performed precedent to the issuance of the Bonds having been done, having happened and having been performed in regular and due form, time and manner as required by law, it is necessary for this Board to establish the form and terms of the Bonds, to provide for the security thereof, and to provide for the issuance of the Bonds forthwith.

1.06 Minnesota School District Credit Enhancement Program. (a) The District hereby covenants and obligates itself to notify the Commissioner of Education of a potential default in the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds and to use the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, Section 126C.55 to guarantee payment of the principal and interest on the Bonds when due. The District further covenants to deposit with the Bond Registrar or any successor paying agent three (3) days prior to the date on which a payment is due an amount sufficient to make that payment or to notify the Commissioner of Education that it will be unable to make all or a portion of that payment. The Bond Registrar for the Bonds is authorized and directed to notify the Commissioner of Education if it becomes aware of a potential default in the payment of principal or interest on the Bonds or if, on the day two (2) business days prior to the date a payment is due on the Bonds, there are insufficient funds to make that payment on deposit with the Bond Registrar. The District understands that as a

result of its covenant to be bound by the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, Section 126C.55, the provisions of that section shall be binding as long as any Bonds of this issue remain outstanding.

(b) The District further covenants to comply with all procedures now or hereafter established by the Departments of Finance and Education of the State of Minnesota pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Section 126C.55, subdivision 2(c) and otherwise to take such actions as necessary to comply with that section.

Section 2. Bond Terms.

2.01 Designation; Registration; Denomination; Maturities. The \$_____ aggregate principal amount of general obligation bonds sold on this date shall be designated General Obligation School Building Refunding Bonds, Series 2008A, shall be dated November 1, 2008, as the date of original issue, and shall be issued forthwith on or after such date using a global book-entry system. The Bonds shall be issued as fully registered bonds and shall be numbered R-1 upward, in the denomination of \$5,000 each or any integral multiple thereof of a single maturity. The Bonds shall mature on February 1 in the years and amounts set forth below, and shall bear interest from the most recent Interest Payment Date to which interest has been paid or provided for, or, if no interest has been duly paid or provided for, from the date of original issue until paid or duly called for mandatory redemption, if herein provided, at the rates per annum set forth below opposite such years and amounts, as follows:

The Bonds maturing in the years _____ and _____ are term bonds subject to mandatory redemption in the years and principal amounts as specified in Paragraph 2.04(b).

These maturities, together with the maturities of all other outstanding general obligation bonds of the Issuer, meet the requirements of Minnesota Statutes, Section 475.54.

2.02 Interest Payments. Interest shall be payable semiannually on each February 1 and August 1 to maturity (each an "Interest Payment Date"), commencing August 1, 2009. Interest will be calculated on the basis of a 360-day year of twelve 30-day months and will be rounded pursuant to the rules of the MSRB. Interest will be payable in the manner set forth in the form of Global Certificate or Replacement Bond and Paragraph 4.06 of this resolution.

2.03 Use of Global Book-Entry System.

(a) Description of System. In order to issue obligations in "global book-entry form", the obligations are issued in certificated form in large denominations, are registered on the books of the Issuer in the name of a depository or its nominee, and are immobilized and held in safekeeping by the depository. The depository, as part of the computerized National Securities Clearance and Settlement System (the "National System"), registers transfers of ownership interests in the obligations by making computerized book entries on its own books and distributing payments on the obligations to its participants shown on its books as the owners of such interests. These participants, which include financial institutions for whom the depository effects book-entry transfers of securities deposited and immobilized with the depository, and other banks, brokers and dealers participating in the National System will do likewise if not the beneficial owners of the obligations.

(b) Designation of Depository; Approval of Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations. Depository Trust Company ("DTC") of New York, New York, a Securities and Exchange Commission designated depository, a limited purpose New York trust company, a member of the Federal Reserve System, and a "clearing corporation" within the meaning of the New York Uniform Commercial Code, is hereby designated as the depository (the "Depository") with respect to the Bonds issued hereunder in global book-entry form. There has been submitted to this Board a form of letter of representations (the "Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations") between the Issuer and the Depository setting forth various matters relating to the Depository and its role with respect to the Bonds. This Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations is hereby approved. The Chair or the Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to execute the Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations in substantially the form attached hereto as EXHIBIT C, if such a letter of representations has not already been executed, with only such variations therein as may be required to complete the Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations, or which are not, in the opinion of Bond Counsel, materially adverse to the interests of the Issuer. Execution of the Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations by such official shall be conclusive evidence as to the necessity and propriety of such changes and their approval by Bond Counsel. So long as DTC is the Depository or it or its nominee is the Holder of any Global Certificate, the District shall comply with the provisions of the Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations, as it may be

amended or supplemented by the District from time to time with the agreement or consent of DTC.

(c) **Global Certificates.** Upon their original issuance, the Bonds will be issued in the form of a single Global Certificate for each maturity which shall represent the aggregate principal amount of the Bonds due on a particular maturity date (the "Global Certificates"). The Global Certificates will be originally issued and fully registered as to principal and interest in the name of Cede & Co., as nominee of DTC. The Global Certificates will be deposited with the Depository by the Purchaser and will be immobilized as further provided herein. No beneficial owners of interest in the Bonds will receive certificates representing their respective interests in the Bonds except as provided below in clause (e) of this Paragraph 2.03. Except as so provided, during the term of the Bonds, beneficial ownership (and subsequent transfers of beneficial ownership) of interests in the Global Certificates will be reflected by book entries made on the records of the Depository and its participants and other banks, brokers, and dealers participating in the National System. The Depository's book entries of beneficial ownership interest are authorized to be in integral increments of \$5,000, despite the larger authorized denominations of the Global Certificates. Payment of principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the Global Certificates will be made to the Bond Registrar as paying agent, and in turn by the Bond Registrar to the Depository or its nominee as registered owner of the Global Certificates. The Depository, according to the laws and rules governing it, will receive and forward such payments on behalf of the beneficial owners of the Global Certificates.

(d) **Immobilization of Global Certificates by the Depository.** Pursuant to the request of the Purchaser to the Depository, immediately upon the original delivery of the Bonds, the Purchaser will deposit the Global Certificates representing all of the Bonds with the Depository. The Global Certificates shall be in typewritten form or otherwise as acceptable to the Depository, shall be registered in the name of the Depository or its nominee and shall be held immobilized from circulation at the offices of the Depository on behalf of the Purchaser and subsequent Bondholders. The Depository or its nominee will be the sole Holder of record of the Global Certificates and no investor or other party purchasing, selling or otherwise transferring ownership of interests in any Bond is to receive, hold or deliver any Global Certificates so long as the Depository holds the Global Certificates immobilized from circulation, except as provided below in clause (e) of this Paragraph 2.03.

(e) **Transfer or Exchange of Global Certificates; Substitute Depository; Replacement Bonds.**

Global Certificates evidencing the Bonds may not, after their original delivery, be transferred or exchanged except:

(i) Upon exchange of a Global Certificate after a partial redemption, if authorized in Paragraph 2.04 of this resolution;

(ii) To any successor of the Depository (or its nominee) or any substitute depository (a "Substitute Depository") designated pursuant to subclause (iii) of this clause (e); provided that any successor of the Depository or any Substitute Depository must be both a "clearing corporation" as defined in the Minnesota Uniform Commercial Code, Minnesota Statutes, Section 336.8-102, and a qualified and registered "clearing agency" as provided in Section 17A of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, as amended;

(iii) To a Substitute Depository designated by and acceptable to the Issuer upon (a) the determination by the Depository that the Bonds shall no longer be eligible for its depository services or (b) a determination by the Issuer that the Depository is no longer able to carry out its functions; provided that any Substitute Depository must be qualified to act as such, as provided in subclause (ii) of this clause (e); or

(iv) In the event that (a) the Depository shall resign or discontinue its services for the Bonds or be declared no longer able to carry out its functions and the Issuer is unable to locate a Substitute Depository within two (2) months following the resignation or discontinuance or determination of noneligibility, or (b) the Issuer determines in its sole discretion that (1) the continuation of the book-entry system described herein might adversely affect the interests of the beneficial owners of the Bonds, or (2) it is in the best interests of the beneficial owners of the Bonds that they be able to obtain certificated Bonds, then the Issuer shall notify the Holders of its determination and of the availability of Replacement Bonds to Holders. The Issuer, the Bond Registrar and the Depository shall cooperate in providing Replacement Bonds to Holders requesting the same and the registration, transfer and exchange of such Bonds shall thereafter be conducted as provided in Paragraph 4.04 of this resolution.

In the event of the designation of a Substitute Depository as authorized by this clause (e), the Bond Registrar, upon presentation of the Global Certificates, shall register their transfer to the Substitute Depository, and the Substitute Depository shall be treated as the Depository for all purposes and functions under this resolution. The Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations shall not apply to the Substitute Depository unless the Issuer and the Substitute Depository so agree, and the execution of a similar agreement is hereby authorized.

2.04 Redemption. (a) Optional Redemption. The Bonds of this issue are not subject to optional redemption or prepayment prior to maturity.

(b) Mandatory Redemption. (1) The Bonds maturing in the year ____ shall be subject to mandatory redemption at a redemption price equal to the principal amount of the Bonds to be so redeemed plus interest accrued thereon to the date fixed for redemption, on February 1 in the years and principal amounts set forth below:

(2) The Bonds maturing in the year ____ shall be subject to mandatory redemption at a redemption price equal to the principal amount of the Bonds to be so redeemed plus interest accrued thereon to the date fixed for redemption, on February 1 in the years and principal amounts set forth below:

(3) Mandatory redemption may be in whole or in part of the Bonds subject to prepayment. If redemption is in part, the Issuer shall determine the order of redemption of Bonds; and if only part of the Bonds having a common maturity date are called for prepayment, the Global Certificates to be prepaid may be prepaid in \$5,000 increments of principal and, if applicable, the specific Replacement Bonds to be prepaid shall be chosen by lot by the Bond Registrar as provided below. Bonds or portions thereof called for redemption shall be due and payable on the designated redemption date, and interest thereon shall cease to accrue from and after the redemption date.

(c) Mandatory Redemption of Global Certificates. Upon a partial redemption in the aggregate principal amount of a Global Certificate which results in the stated amount thereof being reduced, the Holder may in its discretion make a notation of such redemption on the panel provided on the Global Certificate stating the amount so redeemed, or may return the Global Certificate to the Bond Registrar in exchange for a new Global Certificate authenticated by the Bond Registrar, in proper principal amount. Such notation of redemption, if made by the Holder, shall be for reference only, and may not be relied upon by any other person as being in any way determinative of the principal amount of such Global Certificate outstanding, unless the Bond Registrar has signed the appropriate column of the panel.

(d) Mandatory Redemption of Replacement Bonds. To effect a partial redemption of Replacement Bonds having a common maturity date, the Bond Registrar, prior to giving a notice of redemption, shall assign to each Replacement Bond having a common maturity date a distinctive number for each \$5,000 of the principal amount of such Replacement Bond. The Bond Registrar shall then select by lot from the numbers so assigned to such Replacement Bonds, using such method of selection as it shall deem proper in its discretion, as many numbers as, at \$5,000 for each number, shall equal the principal amount of such Replacement Bonds to be redeemed. The Replacement Bonds to be redeemed shall be the Bonds to which were assigned numbers so selected; provided,

however, that only so much of the principal amount of each such Replacement Bond of a denomination of more than \$5,000 shall be redeemed as shall equal \$5,000 of principal amount for each number assigned to it and so selected. If a Replacement Bond is to be redeemed only in part, it shall be surrendered to the Bond Registrar (with, if the Issuer or the Bond Registrar so requires, a written instrument of transfer in form satisfactory to the Issuer and the Bond Registrar duly executed by the Holder thereof or the Holder's attorney duly authorized in writing) and the Issuer shall execute (if necessary) and the Bond Registrar shall authenticate and deliver to the Holder of such Replacement Bond, without service charge, a new Replacement Bond or Bonds of the same series having the same stated maturity and interest rate and of any authorized denomination or denominations, as requested by such Holder, in aggregate principal amount equal to and in exchange for the unredeemed portion of the principal of the Replacement Bond so surrendered.

(e) Notice of Mandatory Redemption of Global Certificates and Replacement Bonds. The Bond Registrar shall call Bonds for redemption and payment as herein provided upon receipt by the Bond Registrar at least forty-five (45) days prior to the redemption date of a request of the Issuer. The request shall be in written form. The request shall specify the principal amount of Bonds to be called for redemption, the redemption date and the redemption price.

Published notice of redemption shall in each case be given in accordance with law, and mailed notice of redemption shall be given to the paying agent and to each affected Holder. If and when the Issuer shall call any of the Bonds for redemption and payment prior to the stated maturity thereof, the Bond Registrar shall give written notice in the name of the Issuer of its intention to redeem and pay such Bonds at the office of the Bond Registrar. The Notice of Redemption shall be given by first class mail, postage prepaid, mailed not less than thirty (30) days prior to the redemption date, to each Holder of Bonds to be redeemed, at the address appearing in the records of the Bond Registrar. For the purpose of giving notice of the redemption of Global Certificates, the Holder of the Global Certificates shall be the Depository or its nominee. In connection with any such notice, the "CUSIP" numbers assigned to the Bonds shall be used. All notices of redemption shall state:

- (i) The redemption date;
- (ii) The redemption price;
- (iii) If less than all outstanding Bonds are to be redeemed, the identification (and, if the case of partial redemption, the respective principal amounts) of the Bonds to be redeemed;
- (iv) That on the redemption date, the redemption price will become due and payable upon each such Bond, and that interest thereon shall cease to accrue from and after said date; and

(v) The place where such Bonds are to be surrendered for payment of the redemption price (which shall be the office of the Bond Registrar).

Section 3. Form of Bonds.

The Bonds to be issued hereunder shall be in the form of Global Certificates unless and until Replacement Bonds are made available as provided herein.

3.01 Global Certificates. The Global Certificates to be issued hereunder, together with the Bond Registrar's Certificate of Authentication, the Register of Partial Payments, the form of Assignment, and the registration information thereon, shall be in substantially the form set forth in EXHIBIT A hereto, which exhibit is incorporated herein by reference as though fully specified in this paragraph, and may be typewritten rather than printed.

3.02 Replacement Bonds. If the Issuer has notified Holders that Replacement Bonds have been made available as provided in Paragraph 2.03(e) of this resolution, then for every Bond thereafter transferred or exchanged (including an exchange to reflect the partial mandatory redemption of a Global Certificate not previously exchanged for Replacement Bonds), the Bond Registrar shall deliver a bond in the form of a Replacement Bond rather than a Global Certificate, but the Holder of a Global Certificate shall not otherwise be required to exchange the Global Certificate for one or more Replacement Bonds since the Issuer recognizes that some Holders may prefer the convenience of the Depository's registered ownership of the Bonds even though the entire issue is no longer required to be in global book-entry form. The Replacement Bonds, together with the Bond Registrar's Certificate of Authentication, the form of Assignment and the registration information thereto, shall be in substantially the form set forth in EXHIBIT B hereto, which exhibit is incorporated herein by reference as though fully specified in this paragraph.

Section 4. Execution; Delivery; Registration.

4.01 Appointment of Registrar. U.S. Bank National Association in St. Paul, Minnesota, is appointed to act as the bond registrar and transfer agent (the "Bond Registrar") and shall do so until a successor Bond Registrar is duly appointed, all pursuant to a contract the Issuer and Bond Registrar shall execute which is consistent herewith and which the chair and clerk are hereby authorized to execute and deliver. A successor Bond Registrar shall be a bank or trust company eligible for designation as bond registrar pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 475. The terms of the appointment of the successor Bond Registrar and its duties shall be specified in a contract between the Issuer and such successor Bond Registrar that is consistent herewith and that the Chair and Clerk are hereby authorized to execute and deliver. The Bond Registrar, which may act through an agent, shall also serve as paying agent until and unless a successor paying agent is duly appointed. The Bond Registrar shall pay principal and interest on the Bonds to the registered Holders (or record Holder) of the Bonds in the manner set forth in the form of Global Certificate or Replacement Bond, as

applicable, and Paragraph 4.06 of this resolution. The Issuer agrees to pay the reasonable and customary charges for the services of such Bond Registrar.

4.02 Execution of Bonds. The Bonds shall be executed on behalf of the Issuer by the manual signatures of the Chair and Clerk of the School Board; provided, however that both of such signatures may be printed facsimiles, in which event the Bonds shall also be executed manually by the authenticating agent as provided in Minnesota Statutes, Section 475.55. In the event of disability or resignation or other absence of either such officer, the Bonds may be signed by the manual or facsimile signature of that officer who may act on behalf of such absent or disabled officer. In case either such officer whose signature or facsimile of whose signature shall appear on the Bonds shall cease to be such officer before the delivery of the Bonds, such signature or facsimile shall nevertheless be valid and sufficient for all purposes, the same as if that officer had remained in office until delivery. If the Issuer has adopted a corporate seal, it shall be omitted on the Bonds as permitted by law.

4.03 Authentication; Date of Registration. No Bond shall be valid or obligatory for any purpose or be entitled to any security or benefit under this resolution unless and until a Certificate of Authentication on such Bond, substantially in the form set forth in the form of Global Certificate or Replacement Bond, shall have been duly executed by the manual signature of an authorized representative of the Bond Registrar. Certificates of authentication on different Bonds need not be signed by the same person. The Bond Registrar shall authenticate each Bond by execution of the Certificate of Authentication on the Bond and shall date each Bond in the space provided as of the date on which the Bond is registered. For purposes of delivering the original Bonds (Global Certificates) to the Purchaser, the Bond Registrar shall insert as the date of registration the date of original issue; and the executed Certificate of Authentication on each Bond shall be conclusive evidence that it has been authenticated and delivered under this resolution.

4.04 Transfer or Exchange. The Issuer will cause to be kept at the principal office of the Bond Registrar a bond register in which, subject to such reasonable regulations as the Bond Registrar may prescribe, the Bond Registrar shall provide for the registration of ownership of Bonds and the registration of transfers and exchanges of Bonds entitled to be registered, transferred or exchanged as herein provided.

A Global Certificate shall be registered in the name of the payee on the books of the Bond Registrar by presenting the Global Certificate for registration to the Bond Registrar, who will endorse his or her name and note the date of registration opposite the name of the payee in the certificate of registration on the Global Certificate. Thereafter a Global Certificate may be transferred by delivery with an assignment duly executed by the Holder or the Holder's legal representative, and the Issuer and Bond Registrar may treat the Holder as the person exclusively entitled to exercise all the rights and powers of an owner until a Global Certificate is presented with such assignment for registration of transfer, accompanied by assurance of the nature provided by law that the assignment is genuine and effective, and until such transfer is registered on said books and noted thereon by the Bond Registrar, all

subject to the terms and conditions provided in this resolution and to reasonable regulations of the Issuer contained in any agreement with, or notice to, the Bond Registrar.

Upon surrender for transfer of any Bond at the principal office of the Bond Registrar, the Issuer shall execute (if necessary), and the Bond Registrar shall authenticate, date (in the space designated Date of Registration) and deliver, in the name of the designated transferee or transferees, one or more new Bonds of any authorized denomination or denominations of a like aggregate principal amount, having the same stated maturity and interest rate, as requested by the transferor; provided, however, that no Bond may be registered in blank or in the name of "bearer" or similar designation.

When any Bond is presented to the Bond Registrar for transfer, the Bond Registrar may refuse to transfer the same until it is satisfied that the endorsement on such Bond or separate instrument of transfer is valid and genuine and that the requested transfer is legally authorized. The Bond Registrar shall incur no liability for the refusal, in good faith, to make transfers which it, in its judgment, deems improper or unauthorized.

At the option of the Holder of a Replacement Bond, Replacement Bonds may be exchanged for Replacement Bonds of any authorized denomination or denominations of a like aggregate principal amount and stated maturity, upon surrender of the Replacement Bonds to be exchanged at the principal office of the Bond Registrar. Whenever any Replacement Bonds are so surrendered for exchange, the Issuer shall execute (if necessary), and the Bond Registrar shall authenticate, date (in the space designated Date of Registration) and deliver the Replacement Bonds which the Holder making the exchange is entitled to receive. Global Certificates may not be exchanged for Global Certificates of smaller denominations.

All Bonds surrendered upon any exchange or transfer provided for in this resolution shall be promptly canceled by the Bond Registrar and thereafter disposed of as directed by the Issuer.

All Bonds delivered in exchange for or upon transfer of Bonds shall be valid general obligations of the Issuer evidencing the same debt, shall be entitled to the same benefits under this resolution as the Bonds surrendered for such exchange or transfer, and shall carry all the rights to interest accrued and unpaid, and to accrue, which were carried by such other Bonds.

Transfer of a Bond may be made on the Issuer's books by the registered owner in person or by the registered owner's attorney duly authorized in writing. Every Bond presented or surrendered for transfer or exchange shall be duly endorsed or be accompanied by a written instrument of transfer, in form satisfactory to the Bond Registrar, duly executed by the registered owner thereof, with signature guaranteed, or by the registered owner's attorney duly authorized in writing, and shall include written instructions as to the details of the transfer of the Bond.

The Bond Registrar may require payment of a sum sufficient to cover any tax or other governmental charge payable in connection with the transfer or exchange of any Bond and any legal or unusual costs regarding transfers and lost bonds.

Transfers shall also be subject to reasonable regulations of the Issuer contained in any agreement with, or notice to, the Bond Registrar, including regulations which permit the Bond Registrar to close its transfer books between record dates and payment dates.

4.05 Mutilated, Lost, Stolen or Destroyed Bonds. In case any Bond shall become mutilated or be lost, stolen or destroyed, the Bond Registrar shall deliver a new Bond of like amount, number, maturity date and tenor in exchange and substitution for and upon cancellation of any such mutilated Bond or in lieu of and in substitution for any such Bond lost, stolen or destroyed, upon payment of the reasonable expenses and charges of the Bond Registrar in connection therewith; and, in the case of a Bond lost, stolen or destroyed, upon filing with the Registrar of evidence satisfactory to it that such Bond was lost, stolen or destroyed, and of the ownership thereof, and upon furnishing to the Bond Registrar of an appropriate bond or indemnity in form, substance and amount satisfactory to it, in which both the Issuer and the Bond Registrar shall be named as obligees. All Bonds so surrendered to the Bond Registrar shall be canceled by it and evidence of such cancellation shall be given to the District. If the mutilated, lost, stolen or destroyed Bond has already matured, it shall not be necessary to issue a new Bond prior to payment.

4.06 Interest Payments; Record Dates. Interest on any Global Certificate shall be paid as provided in the first paragraph thereof and interest on any Replacement Bond shall be paid on each Interest Payment Date by check or draft mailed to the person in whose name the Bond is registered (the "Holder") on the registration books of the Issuer maintained by the Bond Registrar and in each case at the address appearing thereon at the close of business on the fifteenth day of the calendar month next preceding such Interest Payment Date (the "Regular Record Date"). Any such interest not so timely paid or duly provided for shall cease to be payable to the person who is the Holder thereof as of the Regular Record Date, and shall be payable to the person who is the Holder thereof at the close of business on a date fixed for the payment of such defaulted interest (the "Special Record Date"). The Special Record Date shall be fixed by the Bond Registrar whenever money becomes available for payment of the defaulted interest, and notice of the Special Record Date shall be given by the Bond Registrar to the Holders not less than ten (10) days prior thereto. The term "Holder" shall also include those lawfully entitled to take actions on behalf of the beneficial owners of the Bonds for purposes of any consent or approvals given by Holders.

If the date for payment of the principal of, premium, if any, or interest on this Bond shall be a Saturday, Sunday, legal holiday or a day on which banking institutions in the City of New York, New York, or the city where the principal office of the Bond Registrar is located are authorized by law or executive order to close, then the date for such payment shall be the next succeeding day which is not a Saturday, Sunday, legal holiday or a day on

which such banking institutions are authorized to close, and payment on such date shall have the same force and effect as if made on the nominal date of payment.

4.07 Persons Deemed Owners. The Issuer and the Bond Registrar may treat the person in whose name any Bond is registered as the owner of such Bond for the purpose of receiving payment of principal of and premium, if any, and interest (subject to the payment provisions in Paragraph 4.06 above), on such Bond and for all other purposes whatsoever, whether or not such Bond shall be overdue, and neither the Issuer nor the Bond Registrar shall be affected by notice to the contrary.

For the purposes of all actions, consents and other matters affecting Holders of Bonds issued under this Resolution as from time to time supplemented, other than payments, redemptions, and purchases, the Issuer may (but shall not be obligated to) treat as the Holder of a Bond the beneficial owner of the Bond instead of the person in whose name the Bond is registered. For that purpose, the Issuer may ascertain the identity of the beneficial owner of the Bond by such means as the Bond Registrar in its sole discretion deems appropriate, including but not limited to a certificate from the Depository or other person in whose name the Bond is registered identifying such beneficial owner.

4.08 Delivery. The Bonds when so prepared and executed shall be delivered by the Treasurer of the Issuer to the Purchaser thereof upon receipt of the purchase price, and the Purchaser shall not be obliged to see to the proper application thereof.

Section 5. Creation of Fund and Tax Levies.

5.01 Fund. There is hereby created within the Debt Redemption Fund of the Issuer a special fund to be designated "General Obligation School Building Refunding Bonds, Series 2008A Fund" (the "Fund") to be held and administered by the Treasurer separate and apart from all other funds of the Issuer. The Fund shall be maintained in the manner herein specified until all of the Refunded Bonds and the Bonds herein authorized and the interest thereon have been fully paid. There shall be maintained in the Fund two separate accounts to be designated the "Refunding Account" and the "Debt Service Account", respectively.

(a) Refunding Account. The proceeds of the sale of the Bonds herein authorized, less any accrued interest received thereon and other proceeds directed for deposit into the Debt Service Account, plus other available District funds (estimated at \$_____) as may be required to adequately fund the Refunding Account for the purposes set forth below, are hereby pledged and appropriated and shall be credited to the Refunding Account. The Refunding Account shall be used to pay the principal amount of each such Refunded Bond at maturity or on the date on which it has been called for redemption as herein provided, and the issuance expenses of the Bonds. The monies in said Refunding Account shall be used solely for the purposes herein set forth and for no other purpose, except that after such payments have been made, any surplus in the Refunding Account shall be transferred to the Debt Service Account.

(b) Debt Service Account. There is hereby pledged and appropriated and there shall be credited to the Debt Service Account upon issuance of the Bonds (i) any uncollected taxes heretofore levied and pledged to the Debt Redemption Fund of the Issuer for the payment of the Refunded Bonds; (ii) any other unexpended monies pledged to the Debt Redemption Fund of the Issuer for the payment of the Refunded Bonds pursuant to the Resolutions authorizing the issuance of the Refunded Bonds (unless used to fund the Refunding Account; (iii) all taxes herein levied; (iv) all accrued interest received upon delivery of the Bonds (unless used to fund the Refunding Account; (v) any premium or unused discount to the extent not otherwise deposited into the Refunding Account and used for payment of the Refunded Bonds; (vi) all investment earnings on funds held in the Debt Service Account and (vii) any and all other moneys which are properly available and which are appropriated by the Issuer to the Debt Service Account. The Debt Service Account shall be used solely to pay the principal and interest on the Bonds and any of the bonds heretofore or hereafter authorized and made payable from said account as provided by law. If any payment of principal or interest on the Bonds shall become due when there is not sufficient money in the Debt Service Account or the Debt Redemption Fund generally to make such payment, the Treasurer shall pay the same from the General Fund of the Issuer and the General Fund shall be reimbursed for such advances out of the proceeds of the taxes levied for the payment of such Bonds.

5.02 Cancellation of Levies. Until prepayment of the Refunded Bonds, all provisions theretofore made for the security thereof shall be observed by the Issuer and all of its officers and agents. However, the School Board hereby finds, determines and certifies to the County Auditor of each county in which the Issuer is located, in whole or in part, that the proceeds of the sale of the Refunding Bonds to be used to refund said Refunded Bonds, together with other funds available and appropriated to the Refunding Account for said purpose, will be sufficient, together with the earnings on the investment of such funds in said Refunding Account, to pay when due or called for prepayment as herein provided all of the principal of and premium, if any, on the Refunded Bonds. Accordingly, upon Bond Closing the County Auditors of each county in which the Issuer is located in whole or in part are hereby authorized and directed to the extent and in the manner permitted by law to cancel forthwith or if necessary from year to year the taxes levied in the years 2008 payable 2009 through 2014 payable 2015 pursuant to the Resolution authorizing the issuance of the Refunded Bonds and not needed as a result of the establishment of the aforesaid Refunding Account.

5.03 Pledge of Full Faith and Credit; Tax Levies. For the prompt and full payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds as the same respectively become due, the full faith and credit and taxing powers of the Issuer shall be and are hereby irrevocably pledged. In order to provide the moneys for the payment thereof required by Minnesota Statutes, Section 475.61, there is hereby levied upon all of the taxable property in the Issuer a direct annual ad valorem tax which shall be spread upon the tax rolls for collection, as a part of other general taxes of the Issuer, in the years and amounts as specified on the levy

computation sheet attached hereto as EXHIBIT D and incorporated herein by reference as though fully specified in this paragraph.

The tax levies provided in this paragraph are such that if collected in full they, together with estimated collections of other revenues herein pledged for the payment of the Bonds (other than cash on hand), will produce at least five percent (5%) in excess of the amounts needed to meet when due the principal and interest payments on the Bonds, except for interest payable hereunder from cash on hand on the date of Bond closing and pledged for such purpose.

Said tax levies shall be irrevocable as long as any of said Bonds are outstanding and unpaid, provided that the Issuer reserves the right and power to reduce the levies in the manner and to the extent permitted by Minnesota Statutes, Section 475.61.

5.04 Investment Restrictions. No portion of the proceeds of the Bonds shall be used directly or indirectly to acquire higher yielding investments or to replace funds which were used directly or indirectly to acquire higher yielding investments, except (1) for a reasonable temporary period until such proceeds are needed for the purpose for which the Bonds were issued and (2) in addition to the above in an amount not greater than the lesser of five percent (5%) of the proceeds of the Bonds or \$100,000. To this effect, any proceeds of the Bonds and any sums from time to time held in the Refunding Account or Debt Service Account (or any other District account which will be used to pay principal or interest to become due on the Bonds) in excess of amounts which under then-applicable federal arbitrage restrictions may be invested without regard to yield shall not be invested at a yield in excess of the applicable yield restrictions imposed by said arbitrage regulations on such investments after taking into account any applicable "temporary periods" or "minor portion" made available under the federal arbitrage regulations. In addition, the proceeds of the Bonds and money in those accounts shall not be invested in obligations or deposits issued by, guaranteed by or insured by the United States or any agency or instrumentality thereof if and to the extent that such investment would cause the Bonds to be "federally guaranteed" within the meaning of Section 149(b) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code").

5.05 Redemption of Refunded Bonds. The Refunded Bonds which mature in 2010 and thereafter shall be redeemed and prepaid on February 1, 2009, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Notice of Call for Redemption attached hereto as EXHIBIT E, which terms and conditions are hereby approved and incorporated herein by reference. The Notice of Call for Redemption shall be mailed to the Paying Agent for and the registered owners of the Refunded Bonds not less than thirty (30) days before the redemption date. The form of the Notice of Call may contain such additional information or different provisions concerning the redemption as may be requested by the Paying Agent for the Refunded Bonds.

Section 6. Exemption from Rebate Requirements.

6.01 Arbitrage Rebate Exemption. It is hereby found and determined that all gross proceeds of the Bonds (other than gross proceeds held in a bona fide debt service fund) will be expended for the governmental purpose for which the Bonds are issued within six (6) months of the date of issuance of the Bonds. Therefore, the Issuer shall not be required to comply with the arbitrage rebate requirements of Section 148(f) of the Code with respect to the Bonds.

Section 7. Certifications, Designations, Defeasance, Arbitrage, Reporting.

7.01 Filing of Resolution; County Auditor Certificate. The Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to file with the County Auditor of each county in which the Issuer is located in whole or in part a certified copy of this resolution, together with such other information as said County Auditor shall require, and to obtain from said County Auditor a certificate that the tax required by law for the payment of said Bonds has been levied, and that said Bonds have been entered upon the County Auditor's Bond Register.

7.02 Defeasance. When all of the Bonds have been discharged as provided in this paragraph, all pledges, covenants and other rights granted by this resolution shall cease. The Issuer may discharge its obligations with respect to any Bonds which are due on any date by depositing with the Bond Registrar on or before that date a sum sufficient for the payment thereof in full with interest accrued from the due date to the date of such deposit. Thus, the Bonds of this issue are NOT designated as "Qualified Tax-Exempt Obligations" for the purposes of Section 265 of the Code relating to the deduction of interest expenses allocable to the Bonds by financial institutions.

7.04 Authentication of Transcript. The officers of the Issuer and each said County Auditor are hereby authorized and requested to prepare and furnish to the Purchaser of said Bonds, and to the attorneys approving legality of the issuance thereof, certified copies of all proceedings and records of the Issuer relating to said Bonds and to the financial condition and affairs of the Issuer, and such other affidavits, certificates and information as may be required to show the facts relating to the legality and marketability of said Bonds as

they appear from the books and records under their custody and control or as otherwise known to them, and all such certified copies, certificates and affidavits, including any heretofore furnished, shall be deemed representations of the Issuer as to the facts recited therein.

7.05 Covenant to Continue Tax Exemption. The Issuer covenants and agrees with the Holders from time to time of the Bonds herein authorized, that it will not take, or permit to be taken by any of its officers, employees or agents, any action which would cause the interest payable on the Bonds to become subject to taxation under the United States Internal Revenue Code, the regulations promulgated thereunder, or any other applicable federal tax law or regulation, and that it will take, or it will cause its officers, employees or agents to take, all affirmative actions within its powers which may be necessary to ensure that such interest will not become subject to taxation under the Internal Revenue Code. The term "Internal Revenue Code" or "Code" as used herein includes the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and all regulations, amended regulations and proposed regulations issued thereunder, as now existing or as hereafter amended or proposed.

7.06 Arbitrage Certification. The Chair and School District Clerk, being the officers of the Issuer charged with the responsibility for issuing the Bonds pursuant to this resolution, are authorized and directed to execute and deliver to the Purchaser an arbitrage certification in order to satisfy the provisions of the Code and the regulations promulgated thereunder.

7.07 Official Statement. The Official Statement relating to the Bonds, on file with the Clerk and presented to this meeting, is hereby approved and deemed final, and the furnishing thereof to prospective bidders for the Bonds is hereby ratified and confirmed, insofar as the same relates to the Bonds and the sale thereof.

7.08 Information Reporting. For purposes of compliance with the provisions of Section 149(e) of the Code, the Issuer shall submit to the Secretary of the Treasury, not later than the 15th day of the second calendar month after the close of the calendar quarter in which the Bonds are issued, a statement concerning the Bond issue which meets the requirements of Section 149(e)(2).

7.09 Payment of Issuance Expenses. The Issuer authorizes the Purchaser to forward the amount of Bond proceeds allocable to the payment of issuance expenses to Northland Trust Services, Inc. on the closing date for further distribution as directed by the Purchaser.

7.10 Continuing Disclosure. The Chair and the School District Clerk are authorized and directed to execute and deliver a Continuing Disclosure Certificate to assist the Participating Underwriters in complying with SEC Rule 15c2-12(b)(5) for full disclosure (The "Rule"). The Continuing Disclosure Certificate shall be entered into for the benefit of the Holders of the Bonds and shall constitute an undertaking to provide or cause to be

provided the annual financial information specified therein and to give notice of the occurrence of the Listed Events specified therein, each in the manner specified therein, as required by the Rule. The provisions of the Continuing Disclosure Certificate are incorporated herein as though fully specified in this paragraph.

The Refunded Bonds were originally issued to provide funds for the crossover refunding of the District's General Obligation School Building Bonds, Series 1994B and the District's General Obligation School Building Bonds, Series 1995B.

General Obligation. This Bond constitutes a general obligation of the Issuer, and to provide moneys for the prompt and full payment of the principal and interest when the same become due, the full faith and credit and taxing powers of the Issuer have been and are hereby irrevocably pledged.

Minnesota School District Credit Enhancement Program. The Issuer has covenanted and obligated itself to be bound by the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, Section 126C.55 and to use the provisions of that statute to guarantee the payment of the principal and interest on the Bonds when due.

Denominations; Exchange; Resolution. The Bonds are issuable solely as fully registered Bonds in the denomination of \$5,000 and integral multiples thereof of a single maturity and are exchangeable for fully registered bonds of other denominations in equal aggregate principal amounts and in authorized denominations at the principal office of the Bond Registrar, but only in the manner and subject to the limitations provided in the Resolution. Reference is hereby made to the Resolution for a description of the rights and duties of the Bond Registrar. Copies of the Resolution are on file in the principal office of the Bond Registrar.

Transfer. This Bond is transferable by the Holder in person or by the Holder's attorney duly authorized in writing at the principal office of the Bond Registrar upon presentation and surrender hereof to the Bond Registrar, all subject to the terms and conditions provided in the Resolution and to reasonable regulations of the Issuer contained in any agreement with the Bond Registrar. Thereupon the Issuer shall execute (if necessary) and the Bond Registrar shall authenticate and deliver, in exchange for this Bond, one or more new fully registered bonds in the name of the transferee (but not registered in blank or to "bearer" or similar designation), of an authorized denomination, in aggregate principal amount equal to the principal amount of this Bond, of the same maturity, and bearing interest at the same rate.

Fees Upon Transfer or Loss. The Bond Registrar may require payment of a sum sufficient to cover any tax or other governmental charge payable in connection with the transfer or exchange of this Bond and any legal or unusual costs regarding transfers and lost Bonds.

Treatment of Registered Owner. The Issuer and Bond Registrar may treat the person in whose name this Bond is registered as the owner hereof for the purpose of receiving payment as herein provided and for all other purposes whatsoever, whether or not this Bond shall be overdue, and neither the Issuer nor the Bond Registrar shall be affected by notice to the contrary.

Not Qualified Tax-Exempt Obligations. The Bonds of this issue have NOT been designated by the Issuer as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" for purposes of Section 265(b) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, relating to the deduction of interest expenses allocable to the Bonds by financial institutions.
