**ITEM: C. Approve Election Judge Salaries for the November 3, 2009
General and Special Elections**

COMMENTS BY: Board Chair Moroz

For election judges serving in a School District election, which is not held in conjunction with a state election, the School Board may determine the rate to be paid to election judges. The School District shall pay at least the prevailing Minnesota minimum wage for each hour spent carrying out duties at the polling place and in attending required training sessions. Further, a judge who travels to pick up election supplies or delivers returns to the clerk or county auditor shall receive not less than the prevailing Minnesota minimum wage plus mileage. The School Board shall determine the mileage amount to be paid.

After a comparison of wages being paid to election judges in surrounding cities and School Districts, it is the recommendation of the School District Election Administrator that Wayzata School District reimburse the election judges appointed for the November 3, 2009 election at the following rates:

- Head Election Judge - \$10.00 per hour
- Election Judge - \$ 8.50 per hour
- Election Judge Training - \$15.00 flat fee

She puts her students above all other concerns and bridges the gap between learning and behavior.

Her proactive approach allows her to build strong relationships with students prior to a time when a needed intervention may be necessary. This approach has been instrumental in lowering behavior referrals and building a sense of success into her students. Amy introduced a behavior poster to our students that is up in many parts of the building. It reminds students of their behaviors and gives them a reminder of what good behaviors require.

Amy also works closely with parents. Parents feel comfortable talking to her and sharing with her. The feedback that they get back from Amy is both respected and appreciated.

Oakwood is a better school because of Amy's dedication and hard work. Our students are truly the winning recipients of a caring and trusting role model like Amy.

Summer learning programs offered through the Wayzata Public Schools are rich in opportunities for learners of all ages and are cooperatively provided through Special Education, Academic Reinforcement, Reading Intervention, Secondary Summer School and Community Education. The following is a report on each of these components for the summer of 2009.

Elementary Summer School Program

This program offers elementary students the opportunity to maintain skills learned during the regular school year. The summer day includes both large group and small group instruction with an emphasis on a station approach. This approach allows for differentiation of curriculum and instruction to help focus on individual student needs as identified by each student's teacher from the 2008-09 school year. Summer activities focus on developing skills in the areas of reading, math, and written language. Additionally, students work to develop appropriate social skills. Students also have the opportunity to maintain and develop technology skills.

An enrichment component is included in the summer activities. This year's enrichment program, "Frogs", facilitated a theme approach to many reading, writing, math, science and art activities while developing a greater awareness of our environment. The culminating activity was a field trip to French Park where students participated in sessions led by naturalists, including sessions entitled, "Would You Drink This Water" and "Food Chain Tag."

A total of 449 students were served in the Elementary Summer Program, including the academic reinforcement and special education services for those eligible. Ten percent of the 449 students, identified as English Language Learners (ELL), received support in the classroom. The average daily attendance was 93 percent.

The Elementary Reading Intervention Program for Summer School was again offered in the Wayzata School District during the summer of 2009. Sixty-four percent of the first grade students enrolled in the Elementary Summer Program also received the services of the reading intervention program.

Rationale: Researchers have found that students in low socio-economic groups progressed at a pace similar to other students during the school year. However, over the summer these students lost significant ground, while other students continued to make a small gain. Based upon this research, Wayzata Public Schools provided identified students with a reading intervention during Summer School.

Model: The intervention was modeled on the one-to-one tutoring program called Reading Recovery that is currently being implemented in four of our elementary schools. Nancy McCoy, trained Reading Recovery teacher, provided training in lesson design for participating teachers. Teachers worked one-to-one with students and were assigned 5 students each.

Results:

Data was gathered on 38 students. Students were tested at the beginning of the program and again at the end. Growth was measured using a Running Record test (Developmental Reading Assessment) to get a text level. Students exited the program with increased text reading levels from 0 to 8 levels. An expected amount of growth for 12-16 days of instruction would be from 1-2 levels.

High School Summer School – Credit Recovery and TAP

Our overall summer school numbers grades 9-12 are becoming consistent year to year with slight variations in the course requests. We saw an increase in requests for core academic classes and fewer requests for electives. Last summer we instituted a two session plan with 14 days in each session. We continued with this plan again this year meeting with considerable success. With only 14 days per session, classes were intense and demanded students' attention. A strict attendance policy was enforced allowing for 1 absence per session. The students in turn responded accordingly and were quite successful in credit attainment. This past summer the day program issued a total of 477 credits.

We again offered a breakfast program to attending students. We averaged over 69 meals each day. A special recognition goes to General Mills for their generous donation of cereal and to Mary Anderson of Culinary Express for making the arrangements.

The summer program culminated with its second annual graduation ceremony. Nine students graduated with six participating in the ceremony. It was a festive occasion appreciated by all who attended.

The success of summer school is greatly due to the team effort of many Wayzata staff from our data management team, to transportation, to custodial, to our secretaries, teachers and para professionals.

Middle School Summer School

The Middle Summer School Program offered students going into 7th, 8th, and 9th grade the opportunity to improve and enhance their math and reading skills. The grade level enrollments were: 28 students going into 7th grade, 39 students going into 8th grade, and 60 students going into 9th grade. The rising 9th grade students earned up to 1 credit for their participation. Overall the 9th graders earned 40.5 credits toward their high school requirements. The program had three facets to it. There were the previously mentioned facets; math and reading, along with a hands-on activity. These hands on activities vary by grade level.

The rising 7th grade students put their math and spatial skills to use in the Scratch programming software class. These students wrote programs that used math skills within a coordinate plane. Our rising 8th grade students explored math and engineering concepts through the construction of Lego's Simple Machines. Students developed pulleys, cars, and magic lock boxes (boxes requiring specific maneuvers to open). The rising 9th grade students programmed Lego Mindstorm Robots to maneuver an obstacle course, throw a ball, and use feedback from sensors to control their movement.

Special Education Extended School Year

Special Education services provided at the early childhood, elementary and high school sites meet the mandated requirements for special education students who qualify for services under Extended School Year (ESY). Each student's Individualized Education Plan (IEP) or Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) team determines what, if any services are needed during the summer months and to what extent those services should be provided.

Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) services are determined individually and may be provided through the summer program or other team determined method.

Elementary Academic Reinforcement Program students are instructed by a team of at least one elementary teacher, one special education teacher, and one special education paraprofessional.

Secondary Special Education provides students services at the High School which are taught by special education teachers and related services staff. Additionally, some ESY services are provided through homework packets provided by the licensed special education teacher or other individually determined method.

Students who require ESY services work on IEP related goals and objectives that may include but are not limited to the following: academic, communication, behavioral, social/emotional, self-help skills, organization and work completion, or jobs and job training. Here is a summary of the number of children/students served at each level:

Community Education

Community Education offers summer programs for learners preschool through adults. Although the array of offerings is not as expansive during the summer as during the other seasons, programs are designed to provide enriched and expanded learning opportunities which complement the school-year program.

The Barefoot in the Grass Preschool Program enrolled 196 three, four and five year-old students in seven classes. Included in this were school readiness children with the intent being to boost their skills before they get to kindergarten. Classes were held at the Family Learning Center. This year the program collaborated with Early Childhood Special Education to provide preschool options for children with special needs.

Care for Kids provided childcare for 48 children when their parents were attending Adult Basic Education courses. In addition, Care for Kids provided 82 BLOCK Time spaces for Peppermint Fence and ECFE families. Block time is a once per week pre-paid 2 – 3 hour childcare space.

Home Base is District 284's school-age care program designed to meet the need for before and after school care as well as care on release days and in the summer. The program provides children fun, healthy recreational and social experiences designed to both increase each child's self esteem and provide care while parents work. Home Base operated care for children entering Kindergarten through entering sixth grade. The summer program enrolled 884 children. Summer care was available at Birchview, Gleason Lake, Greenwood, Oakwood, Plymouth Creek, and Sunset Hill. Children enjoyed a variety of field trips each week to compliment the on-site program.

The **WISHES Youth Enrichment Summer Program** is an extension of the after-school enrichment program during the academic year. This year 792 students were enrolled in a variety of classes held at Birchview, Kimberly Lane, and Plymouth Creek elementary schools in the district. Classes took place in June and July including a variety of offerings such as art instruction, crafts, drama, engineering, chess, technology/computers, Camp Invention, science, and math. A total of 792 students enrolled in 68 classes offered with 55 percent of those classes at full capacity. Out of the 68 classes offered, 15 were canceled and 53 classes were held.

The **WISHES Youth Enrichment Summer Program** supported access to all seven elementary libraries for families throughout the summer at weekly times that were published in the spring elementary school newsletters. The summer Home Base programs and families were able to continue summer learning through this program!

As an extension of the **WISHES MacPhail Strings Program**, students were able to sign up for private string lessons over the summer months. Interested students met weekly at Wayzata High School for violins lessons.

Music Production enrolled 84 students this summer. Small group lessons, full band rehearsals and an enthusiastic staff combined for an outstanding one-week experience. The program culminated with visits to music and recording studios in the metro area.

“Let’s Make a Movie” was offered to middle school students interested in learning more about the technology and creativity in movie production. Eleven students developed their own movie and presented their work to family and friends.

Adult Basic Education offers a variety of programming to adults sixteen years of age and older wanting to improve their English and basic literacy skills, pass the GED test (high school equivalency), learn skills that will help them transition to postsecondary, increase their employability, find or retain employment, and to prepare for the U.S. Citizenship test. 2009 summer programming extended learning opportunities to residents that included seven weeks of daytime and evening English skills, literacy skills and GED preparation classes, ten weeks of online GED preparation, five weeks of open computer lab in collaboration with Interfaith Outreach Community Partners for students to work on job search, computer skills, and resume writing. In late August a workplace English class established at Len Busch Roses. Two hundred and eighty-seven adults participated in ABE summer opportunities.

Adult Enrichment’s summer class offerings are an extension of the spring term. Classes are typically fitness classes such as Kung Fu and Pilates, and other classes that require a summer environment such as kayaking. From June – August, 2009, 15 classes were offered attracting 86 adult learners.

Driver Education served 155 students who took the 30-hour classroom component of the driver education curriculum. Sessions of classroom instruction were offered through June and July and taught by licensed District staff. In addition to classroom instruction, 105 students completed the 6-hour behind the wheel instruction in order to test for their permit.

IOCP – Community Education Open Computer Lab Project

In response to conditions that make it challenging for unemployed and underemployed people to find work, Wayzata Public Schools Community Education Department and Interfaith Outreach and Community Partners (IOCP) partnered to increase community access to computers and computer training.

From late April through the end of July, 2009, Community Education made available a computer lab for open use to: upgrade computer skills; search for jobs online and completed online job applications; find and accessed employment training and education; search and accessed financial aid applications for school and training. In addition, some clients increased their computer skills for the purpose of improving employment opportunities. Many participants were able to expand their job search parameters, write effective cover letters and enhance their applications due to guidance from an onsite IOCP Employment Specialist and the ABE Coordinator.

19 individuals used the lab 49 times over 9 open lab sessions for a total of 122 hours. To date, several clients have received interviews, three have started new jobs and three have found training and financial aid. Other success stories are in process.

The Expanded Learning Community

This report highlights the major programs offered and administered this past summer through the Wayzata Public Schools. We also recognize the work and accomplishments of so many other partnering community organizations and agencies that contribute learning opportunities to our community's summer learning menu. Together and throughout the entire year, we continue to model excellence among learning communities.

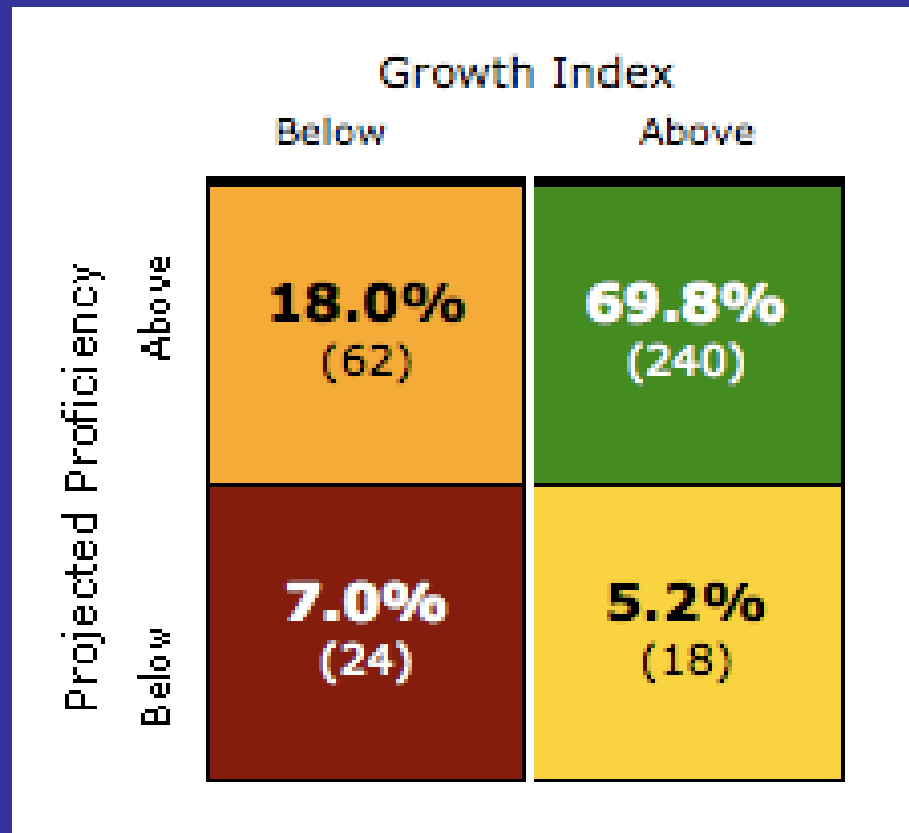

2009-2010 Site Goal: 67.6 percent of all students in grades 3-5 at Gleason Lake Elementary will achieve or exceed their individual RIT score growth target on the reading NWEA Map in spring 2010.

This goal was determined using a cohort model for those students in grades 4 and 5 and by predicting the performance of third grade students based on historical data gathered over the past three years. Specifically, the goal was determined by expecting the current third grade students for whom we have no growth data to perform at or above the given data that we have collected over the past three years. The percentage of third grade students who achieved or exceeded their individual RIT score growth target on the reading NWEA MAP test over the past three years was 55.5, 62.7, and 63.3 respectively. The average percent of third grade students who met or exceeded their individual RIT score growth target on the reading NWEA MAP test is 60.5. The current fourth grade class had 63.1 percent of the students meeting targeted growth during third grade. The current fifth grade class had 73.3 percent of the students meeting or exceeding targeted growth during fourth grade. Based on this data, we would expect 65.6 percent of the students in grades 3-5 to meet or exceed targeted growth. (60.5 + 63.1 + 73.3 divided by 3 = 65.6 percent)

2009-2010 Elementary Equity Goal:

The percent of elementary black students who meet the MCA projected proficiency level as measured by the NWEA MAP spring 2010 reading assessment will increase from 73% to 78%.

Summary/Interpretation of Data Analysis:

- When comparing Gleason Lake Elementary School to others schools in the nation that administer the NWEA MAP test, the school percentile rank for the percentage of students meeting or exceeding their RIT point growth target in reading is as follows:
 - Third grade students: approximately the 75th percentile
 - Fourth grade students: approximately the 95th percentile
 - Fifth grade students: approximately the 98th percentile
- Students can show growth without meeting or exceeding their expected RIT growth target.
- Significant decrease in the number of students who were below projected proficiency and had not made expected growth from the 07-08 school year to the 08-09 school year. In the 07-08 school year, 27 students were below projected proficiency and did not make expected growth, compared to 12 students in the 08-09 school year.
- Greatest opportunity for growth continues to be with the students whose MAP scores identify them as projected proficient on the MCA, yet are not making expected growth.
- In relation to the equity goal, Gleason Lake black students gained an average of 13.5 RIT points.

Action Plan to Achieve Goals:

Professional Development:

- Train all staff to implement effective comprehension instruction to further literature comprehension.
 - Continue Cohort VI and add Cohort VII training of teachers in the National Urban Alliance (NUA) strategies related to vocabulary, comprehension skills, and thinking maps. These 23 teachers will receive four full days of professional development by a national trainer and two half days of training throughout the 09-10 school year.
 - Two staff members will be designing and teaching a 15 hour academy class that focuses around literacy. Staff members will be reading a book and discussing the content in cross-grade level groups. In addition, time will be devoted to aligning the language arts materials to the state standards.
 - One staff meeting each month will be devoted to continue our learning of NUA (National Urban Alliance) strategies to improve achievement in the area of reading. The strategies are as follows: Frame of Reference, Circle Map, Taxonomy, Metacognition, Defining Format, Keyword Notes, List-Group- Label, Read-Talk-Write, and Thinking Maps
 - Use classroom visits and observations to gain feedback about vocabulary and reading comprehension instruction in individual classrooms through peer coaching observations.
- Continue to train 6 Data Coaches in the areas of NWEA, Just 5 Clicks and Skyward who provide specific grade levels with needed assessment data to guide instruction.
- Use RTI practices and Soar to Success strategies with low quartile students through reading intervention programming.

Teaming:

- Continue working with literature specialists in expanding ‘leveled text’ book collections in classrooms and community collections.
- Grade levels will meet weekly during common prep time to share reading strategies and interventions to monitor progress. Grade level language arts assessments will be given throughout the year and, teams will meet and analyze student data according to the various strands.
- Develop professional growth plans which support building goal.

Assessments:

- Use fall and spring assessments in grades K-2 to measure accuracy and comprehension.
 - K- ISEL Testing in October and May
 - 1st grade- Observation survey in August, DRA Text Levels Sept-June and DRA Comprehension Leveling May
 - 2nd grade- Leveled text reading in August, Scott Foresman Assessments and DRA Text Levels September-June
- Use fall and spring MAP testing in grades 3-5 to measure growth in vocabulary, comprehension, and literature.
- Use Scott-Foresman grade level language arts formative and summative assessments throughout the school year to monitor ongoing progress in student achievement in language arts.



Building Initiatives

Initiative

Build connections and positive relationships with staff and students

Classroom teachers have identified 50 students who would benefit from having a staff member at Gleason Lake serve as their mentor. We believe that making personal connections with students will help to build a positive learning community.

Strategies/Activities

- Staff members were paired with the students and throughout the year they spent time making specific connections with their assigned mentee. This consisted of writing positive notes, playing games, working on homework, eating lunch, reading books, and other student centered activities.

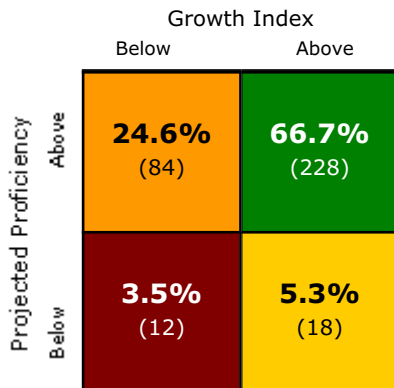

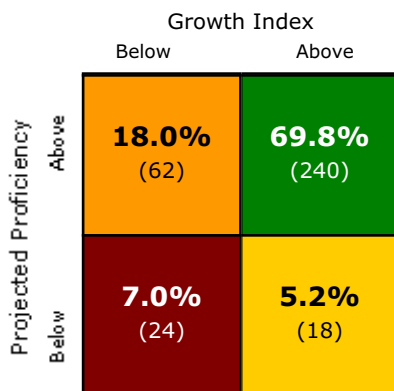

2. Preliminary Levy Limitation and Certification – 2009 Payable 2010

Minnesota Law requires school districts to certify their proposed property tax levy payable in 2010 to the county auditor on or before September 30, 2009. We have recently received the levy data from the Minnesota Department of Education and are analyzing the details. A summary spreadsheet and a written analysis of the proposed levy will be provided to Board members at the School Board meeting.

We believe that most components of the levy are materially accurate and complete. At this time, the Administration is recommending that the Board levy the maximum amount in all funds. If the Board approves the maximum allowed, the county auditor will automatically include any positive adjustments in the levy. Otherwise, the final levy amount cannot exceed the preliminary levy amount, except for some very limited exceptions.

The School Board will set the final levy certification amounts at its Regular Board meeting in December.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve the Preliminary Levy Limitation and Certification for 2009 Payable 2010 at the maximum allowed by state statute.

- WHEREAS,** The Hennepin County Board has established a Public Entity Waste Abatement Incentive Fund to provide matching assistance ("Incentive Funds") to selected eligible waste abatement projects; and
- WHEREAS,** Wayzata Public School District No. 284 has made an application for a public entity waste abatement project and has been selected for partial funding of its project; and
- WHEREAS,** Wayzata Public School District No. 284 share of this agreement is \$12,500.00;

PUBLIC ENTITY WASTE ABATEMENT INCENTIVE FUND AGREEMENT

This Agreement is between the COUNTY OF HENNEPIN, STATE OF MINNESOTA (the "COUNTY") A-2300 Government Center, Minneapolis, Minnesota 55487, on behalf of the Hennepin County Department of Environmental Services, 417 North Fifth Street, Minneapolis, MN 55401-3206 ("DEPARTMENT") and the WAYZATA PUBLIC SCHOOLS ISD 284, 17305 19th Avenue North, Plymouth, MN 55447, ("DISTRICT").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Hennepin County Board has established a Waste Abatement Incentive Fund to provide matching assistance ("Incentive Funds") to selected eligible waste abatement projects; and

WHEREAS, the DISTRICT has made an application for a public entity waste abatement project and has been selected for partial funding of said described project in accordance with the terms of this Agreement (application copy attached as Exhibit A);

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual undertakings and agreements hereinafter set forth, the COUNTY, on behalf of the DEPARTMENT, and the DISTRICT agree as follows:

1. TERM AND COST OF THE AGREEMENT

This Agreement shall commence upon execution and terminate December 31, 2011, unless terminated earlier in accordance with the Default and Cancellation provisions of this Agreement.

The total cost of this Agreement, including all reimbursable expenses, shall not exceed twelve thousand five hundred dollars (\$12,500).

2. SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED

a. The DISTRICT will operate its waste abatement project, *Expansion of Organic Composting Project* (hereinafter the "Project"), including the proposed Project budget, as described in the application submitted by the DISTRICT and kept on file with the COUNTY (See Exhibit A).

b. In addition to the services referred to above, the DISTRICT agrees:

1. The DISTRICT shall submit to the DEPARTMENT an interim report by December 31, 2010, and a final report by November 30, 2011. The reports should include at a minimum:

- Project findings and summary;
- Results achieved;
- Obstacles/challenges encountered;
- Amount of material collected, recycled, and disposed;
- Recommendations;
- Detailed budget expenditures; and
- Cost/benefit analysis of the Project.

In addition, the DISTRICT will present the Project findings, as set forth in the final report, to municipal recycling coordinators and other public entity representatives at such times and places as the County may request.

2. All Incentive Funds accepted from the COUNTY over the term of the Agreement shall be used solely for Project expenses relating to waste reduction and recycling, as described in the Project budget. The DISTRICT shall not retain any Incentive Funds in excess of actual Project expenses and shall return any such excess Incentive Funds to the COUNTY upon completion of the Project.
 3. The DISTRICT may not charge its residents/students through property tax, utility fees, tuition fees, or any other method for that portion of the costs of the Project that is funded by COUNTY Incentive Funds.
 4. The DISTRICT shall establish a separate accounting mechanism, such as a Project number, activity number, cost center, or fund that will separate Incentive Fund revenues and expenditures from all other DISTRICT activities, including other solid waste, recycling, and yard waste activities.
 5. Incentive Fund Project activities, revenues, and expenditures are subject to audit by the COUNTY to ensure compliance with the purpose of the grant. Any Incentive Fund expenditures not approved shall be returned to the County.
- c. All right, title and interest in all copyrightable material which the DISTRICT may conceive or originate either individually or jointly with others, and which arises out of the performance of this Agreement, are the property of the COUNTY. The DISTRICT shall assign to the COUNTY all right, title, interest and copyrights of the copyrightable material. The DISTRICT also agrees, upon request of the COUNTY, to execute all papers and perform all other acts necessary to assist the COUNTY to obtain and register copyrights on those materials. Where applicable, works for authorship created by the DISTRICT for the COUNTY in performance of this Agreement shall be considered “works made for hire” as defined in the U.S. Copyright Act.
- d. The DISTRICT hereby warrants that, when legally required, the DISTRICT shall obtain the written consent of both the owner and licensor to reproduce, publish,

and/or use any material supplied to the COUNTY including but not limited to software, hardware, documentation, and/or any other item. The DISTRICT further warrants that any material or item delivered by the DISTRICT will not violate the United States Copyright Law or any property right of another and agrees that the DISTRICT shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the COUNTY, its officials, officers, agents, volunteers, and employees, at the DISTRICT's own expense against any alleged infringement of any copyright or property right.

3. PAYMENT FOR SERVICES

The COUNTY shall pay Incentive Funds to the DISTRICT in an amount not-to-exceed twelve thousand five hundred dollars (\$12,500). The first Incentive Fund payment of nine thousand three hundred seventy-five dollars (\$9,375) shall be disbursed upon execution of the Agreement. The final Incentive Fund payment of three thousand one hundred twenty-five dollars (\$3,125) shall be disbursed upon approval of the final Project report.

4. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

DISTRICT shall select the means, method, and manner of performing the services. Nothing is intended or should be construed as creating or establishing the relationship of co-partners between the parties or as constituting DISTRICT as the agent, representative, or employee of the COUNTY for any purpose. DISTRICT is and shall remain an independent contractor for all services performed under this Agreement. DISTRICT shall secure at its own expense all personnel required in performing services under this Agreement. Any personnel of DISTRICT or other persons while engaged in the performance of any work or services required by DISTRICT will have no contractual relationship with the COUNTY and will not be considered employees of the COUNTY. The COUNTY shall not be responsible for any claims that arise out of employment or alleged employment under the Minnesota Economic Security Law or the Workers' Compensation Act of the State of Minnesota on behalf of any personnel, including, without limitation, claims of discrimination against DISTRICT, its officers, agents, contractors, or employees. DISTRICT shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the COUNTY, its officials, officers, agents, volunteers, and employees from all such claims irrespective of any determination of any pertinent tribunal, agency, board, commission, or court. Such personnel or other persons shall neither require nor be entitled to any compensation, rights, or benefits of any kind from the COUNTY, including, without limitation, tenure rights, medical and hospital care, sick and vacation leave, Workers' Compensation, Re-employment Compensation, disability, severance pay, and retirement benefits.

5. INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE

- A. DISTRICT agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the COUNTY, its officials, officers, agents, volunteers and employees from any liability, claims, causes of action, judgments, damages, losses, costs, or expenses, including

reasonable attorney’s fees, resulting directly or indirectly from any act or omission of DISTRICT, a subcontractor, anyone directly or indirectly employed by them, and/or anyone for whose acts and/or omissions they may be liable in the performance of the services required by this Agreement, and against all loss by reason of the failure of DISTRICT to perform any obligation under this Agreement.

- B. In order to protect DISTRICT and those listed above under the indemnification provision, DISTRICT agrees at all times during the term of this Agreement, and beyond such term when so required, to have and keep in force the following insurance coverages:

- C. An umbrella or excess policy over primary liability insurance coverages is an acceptable method to provide the required insurance limits.

The above establishes minimum insurance requirements. It is the sole responsibility of DISTRICT to determine the need for and to procure additional insurance which may be needed in connection with this Agreement. Upon written request, DISTRICT shall promptly submit copies of insurance policies to the COUNTY.

- D. Duty to Notify. DISTRICT shall promptly notify the COUNTY of any claim, action, cause of action or litigation brought against DISTRICT, its employees, officers, agents or subcontractors, which arises out of the services contained in this Agreement. DISTRICT shall also notify the COUNTY whenever DISTRICT has a reasonable basis for believing that DISTRICT and/or its employees, officers, agents or subcontractors, and/or the COUNTY, might become the subject of a claim, action, cause of action, criminal arrest, criminal charge or litigation arising out of and/or related to the services contained in this Agreement. Failure

to provide the notices required by this section is a material violation of the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

6. DATA PRACTICES

DISTRICT, its officers, agents, owners, partners, employees, volunteers and subcontractors shall abide by the provisions of the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 13 (MGDPA), the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act and implementing regulations, if applicable, and all other applicable state and federal laws, rules, regulations and orders relating to data privacy or confidentiality. If DISTRICT creates, collects, receives, stores, uses, maintains or disseminates data because it performs functions of the COUNTY pursuant to this Agreement, then DISTRICT must comply with the requirements of the MGDPA as if it were a government entity, and may be held liable under the MGDPA for noncompliance. DISTRICT agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the COUNTY, its officials, officers, agents, employees, and volunteers from any claims resulting from DISTRICT's officers', agents', owners', partners', employees', volunteers', assignees' or subcontractors' unlawful disclosure and/or use of such protected data, or other noncompliance with the requirements of this section. DISTRICT agrees to promptly notify the COUNTY if it becomes aware of any potential claims, or facts giving rise to such claims, under the MGDPA. The terms of this section shall survive the cancellation or termination of this Agreement.

7. RECORDS – AVAILABILITY/ACCESS

Subject to the requirements of Minnesota Statutes Section 16C.05, Subd. 5, DISTRICT agrees that the COUNTY, the State Auditor, the Legislative Auditor or any of their authorized representatives, at any time during normal business hours, and as often as they may reasonably deem necessary, shall have access to and the right to examine, audit, excerpt, and transcribe any books, documents, papers, records, etc., which are pertinent to the accounting practices and procedures of DISTRICT and involve transactions relating to this Agreement. DISTRICT shall maintain these materials and allow access during the period of this Agreement and for six (6) years after its termination or cancellation.

8. SUCCESSORS, SUBCONTRACTING AND ASSIGNMENTS

- A. DISTRICT binds itself, its partners, successors, assigns and legal representatives to the COUNTY for all covenants, agreements and obligations contained in the contract documents.
- B. DISTRICT shall not assign, transfer or pledge this Agreement and/or the services to be performed, whether in whole or in part, nor assign any monies due or to become due to it without the prior written consent of the COUNTY. A consent to assign shall be subject to such conditions and provisions as the COUNTY may deem necessary, accomplished by execution of a form prepared by the COUNTY and signed by DISTRICT, the assignee and the COUNTY. Permission to assign,

however, shall under no circumstances relieve DISTRICT of its liabilities and obligations under the Agreement.

- C. DISTRICT shall not subcontract this Agreement and/or the services to be performed, whether in whole or in part, without the prior written consent of the COUNTY. Permission to subcontract, however, shall under no circumstances relieve DISTRICT of its liabilities and obligations under the Agreement. Further, DISTRICT shall be fully responsible for the acts, omissions, and failure of its subcontractors in the performance of the specified contractual services, and of person(s) directly or indirectly employed by subcontractors. Contracts between DISTRICT and each subcontractor shall require that the subcontractor's services be performed in accordance with the terms and conditions specified. DISTRICT shall make contracts between DISTRICT and subcontractors available upon request.

9. MERGER AND MODIFICATION

- A. It is understood and agreed that the entire Agreement between the parties is contained herein and that this Agreement supersedes all oral agreements and negotiations between the parties relating to the subject matter. All items that are referenced or that are attached are incorporated and made a part of this Agreement. If there is any conflict between the terms of this Agreement and referenced or attached items, the terms of this Agreement shall prevail.
- B. Any alterations, variations, modifications, or waivers of provisions of this Agreement shall only be valid when they have been reduced to writing as an amendment to this Agreement signed by the parties.

10. DEFAULT AND CANCELLATION

- A. If DISTRICT fails to perform any of the provisions of this Agreement or so fails to administer the work as to endanger the performance of the Agreement, it shall be in default. Unless DISTRICT's default is excused by the COUNTY, the COUNTY may upon written notice immediately cancel this Agreement in its entirety. Additionally, failure to comply with the terms of this Agreement shall be just cause for the COUNTY to delay payment until DISTRICT's compliance. In the event of a decision to withhold payment, the COUNTY shall furnish prior written notice to DISTRICT.
- B. Upon cancellation or termination of this Agreement, the DISTRICT shall itemize any and all Incentive Fund expenditures up to the date of cancellation or termination and return any Incentive Funds not yet expended.
- C. Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, DISTRICT shall remain liable to the COUNTY for damages sustained by the COUNTY by virtue of any breach of this Agreement by DISTRICT. Upon notice to DISTRICT

of the claimed breach and the amount of the claimed damage, the COUNTY may withhold any payments to DISTRICT for the purpose of set-off until such time as the exact amount of damages due the COUNTY from DISTRICT is determined. Following notice from the COUNTY of the claimed breach and damage, DISTRICT and the COUNTY shall attempt to resolve the dispute in good faith.

- D. The above remedies shall be in addition to any other right or remedy available to the COUNTY under this Agreement, law, statute, rule, and/or equity.
- E. The COUNTY's failure to insist upon strict performance of any provision or to exercise any right under this Agreement shall not be deemed a relinquishment or waiver of the same, unless consented to in writing. Such consent shall not constitute a general waiver or relinquishment throughout the entire term of the Agreement.
- F. This Agreement may be canceled with or without cause by either party upon thirty (30) day written notice.
- G. Provisions that by their nature are intended to survive the term, cancellation or termination of this Agreement include but are not limited to: INDEPENDENT DISTRICT; INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE; DATA PRACTICES; RECORDS-AVAILABILITY/ACCESS; DEFAULT AND CANCELLATION; PROMOTIONAL LITERATURE; and MINNESOTA LAW GOVERNS.

11. CONTRACT ADMINISTRATION

In order to coordinate the services of the DISTRICT with the activities of the Hennepin County Department of Environmental Services so as to accomplish the purposes of this Agreement, Dave McNary, Solid Waste Division Manager, or his or her successor, shall manage this Agreement on behalf of the COUNTY and serve as liaison between the COUNTY and the DISTRICT.

Joe Matson, Director of Buildings & Grounds, who can be contacted at 763-745-5150 or Joe.matson@wayzata.k12.mn.us, shall manage the contract on behalf of the DISTRICT. DISTRICT may replace such person but shall immediately give written notice to the COUNTY of the name, phone number and email address (if available) of such substitute person and of any other subsequent substitute person.

12. COMPLIANCE

- A. DISTRICT shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local statutes, regulations, rules and ordinances currently in force or later enacted.
- B. If the source or partial source of funds for payment of services under this Agreement is federal, state or other grant monies, DISTRICT shall comply with all applicable conditions of the specific referenced or attached grant.

13. PAPER RECYCLING

The COUNTY encourages DISTRICT to develop and implement an office paper and newsprint recycling program.

14. NOTICES

Any notice or demand which must be given or made by a party under this Agreement or any statute or ordinance shall be in writing, and shall be sent registered or certified mail. Notices to the COUNTY shall be sent to the County Administrator with a copy to the originating Department at the address given in the opening paragraph of the Agreement. Notice to DISTRICT shall be sent to the address stated in the opening paragraph of the Agreement or to the address stated in DISTRICT's Form W-9 provided to the COUNTY.

15. PROMOTIONAL LITERATURE

DISTRICT agrees that the terms "Hennepin County" or any derivative shall not be utilized in any promotional literature, advertisements of any type or form or client lists without the express prior written consent of the COUNTY.

16. MINNESOTA LAWS GOVERN

The Laws of the State of Minnesota shall govern all questions and interpretations concerning the validity and construction of this Agreement and the legal relations between the parties and their performance. The appropriate venue and jurisdiction for any litigation will be those courts located within the County of Hennepin, State of Minnesota. Litigation, however, in the federal courts involving the parties will be in the appropriate federal court within the State of Minnesota. If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid, illegal or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will not be affected.

Project Description:

The Source Separated Organics program is actively engaged at six elementary schools and three middle schools in the Wayzata School District. In 2009 we look forward to expanding the program to our High School, where there is a tremendous potential to divert organic matter from the waste stream

The expected outcome of these efforts is a reduction in the amount of solid waste leaving the facility, and reduced costs for hauling, tip fees and taxes. We expect a heightened awareness of recycling, re-using and conservation of resources in participating schools. In the future, we expect SSO composting to be second nature for our students and staff.

The composting of organics at the back of the kitchen at the high schools will have a tremendous impact on our program. In addition, composting food soiled paper and cardboard, especially pizza boxes should allow us to reduce the frequency and quantities of refuse pickups. The grant will help offset costs for containers, signage, bags, hauling. We hope to use matching funds to purchase a baler for the cardboard.

Key individuals involved in the project include the students, food service staff, custodial staff, teachers and other school support staff. These individuals will be key to properly sorting, storing and handling of the materials. We are hoping to partner with the City of Plymouth, Hennepin County, and the City of Minneapolis for hauling.

We hope to start the program at the High School in September of 2009. In addition, we hope to continue to expand the scope of the program at all of the schools currently participating. The grant will be used to fund these on-going efforts helping primarily in the areas of compostable dinner ware, compost bags, and hauling costs.

We feel this project is very worthwhile as it will not only reduce waste generated in our schools, but will heighten the awareness of the need to recycle and conserve our resources. We anticipate this program to help establish recycling and composting as the “norm” and the right thing to do. It is something we hope the student can carry over into their adult lives.

2. Innovation and Early Adoption:

Moving into the Wayzata High School, we will divert waste from the kitchen, both food and paper including over 100 pizza boxes per week. We also hope to introduce a voluntary composting site for students in the cafeteria. We will also expand the restroom paper composting.

Evaluation: We have a good record of the amount of refuse leaving the High School and will also monitor the quantities of compost leaving the site. We will then compare the two quantities and determine the efficacy of the program.

Mid-Project and Final Reporting: Reports will be generated based on the quantities of compost hauling and refuse hauling. A cost comparison will be provided.

We currently have a compactor at the High School so diverting the food and paper products to compost will require fewer trips to haul the compactor. We hope to reduce the tonnage of refuse leaving this facility. By involving the students at the High School, we hope to expand all areas of recycling. We feel paper recycling from classrooms at all sites could be greatly improved, and hope this awareness of recycling options will improve all areas of recycling as well as compost recycling. We have been able to reduce the frequency of refuse pickups from five times per week to three times per week.
