**Program Description:** The 2005 Bond Program includes new construction, replacements and/or renovations of thirty-four (34) projects: 14 Elementary Schools, 5 Middle Schools, 3 High Schools, 2 Other Schools, 8 Support Facilities, Technology Infrastructure, and Technology Instructional.

\*For the 2005 Bond Program, the total interest earnings is \$19,577,524.

\*The Designated Fund Balance of \$6,000,000 has been returned to Undesignated Fund Balance.

\*The arbitrage paid is \$1,446,524.

\*Projects funded by Bond Interest but completed under revised budget returned to Bond Interest.

**Budget Variance:**

- On October 24, 2005, the Board of Trustees approved the purchase of land for Elementary 15 from the 2005 Bond Program at an estimated cost of \$464,459. Since this purchase was not scheduled in the bond until the Spring of 2009, the Board elected to purchase the land with general operating funds combined with a reimbursement resolution which would allow the Board to repay the general funds for the purchase at a later date. Reimbursement deadline is October 24, 2008.
- On September 25, 2006, Board of Trustees designated \$6,000,000 of Fund Balance as Contingency for Capital Projects.
- On March 5, 2007, the Board of Trustees approved Budget Amendment No. 49 appropriating \$6,114,471 of Bond Interest Earned to the Capital Projects Fund. This adjustment financed projects over budget including: Bowie Replacement \$177,085, Victoria Walker Elementary \$185,445, Alamo Improvements \$900,468, Crockett Improvements \$1,142,740, Hopper Primary Improvements \$1,367,043 and Highlands Replacement \$2,341,690.
- On March 5, 2007, the Board of Trustees approved Budget Amendment No. 50 appropriating \$490,000 of Bond Interest Earned to the Capital Projects Fund. This adjustment financed the Construction Department District salaries and Program Manager expenditures.
- On September 10, 2007, the Board of Trustees approved Budget Amendment No. 01 appropriating \$2,055,587 of Bond Interest Earned to the Capital Projects Fund. This adjustment financed the overage on H. Mann Improvements.
- On November 19, 2007, the Board of Trustees approved Budget Amendment No. 18 appropriating \$4,027,578 of Bond Interest Earned to the Capital Projects Fund. This adjustment financed projects over budget including: Stallworth Stadium \$1,527,418 and Facilities Management Complex \$2,500,160.
- Bond Fees has a budget of \$1,793,542. To date, all bond fees have been paid from premium. With all bonds issued, the District Administration does not anticipate additional bond fees thus reflects a savings of \$1,793,542.
- Program Budget Forecast was presented in a separate report. As of February 21, 2008, additional funding from Designated Fund Balance was not anticipated.
- On April 14, 2008, the Board of Trustees approved Budget Amendment No. 68 appropriating \$972,611 of Bond Interest Earned to the Capital Projects Fund. This adjustment financed the overage on Highlands Replacement.
- On January 12, 2009, the Board of Trustees approved Budget Amendment No. 33 to reimburse General Funds for the land purchase of Elementary 15.
- On August 31, 2009, the Board of Trustees approved Budget Amendment No. 123 moving \$2,600,000 to the Interest and Sinking Fund account.
- On June 28, 2010, the Board of Trustees approved Budget Amendment No. 27 moving \$3,000,000 to the Interest and Sinking Fund account.

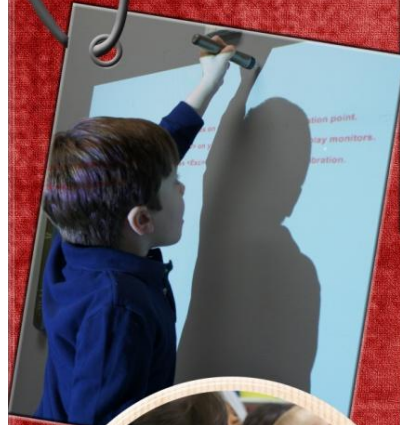

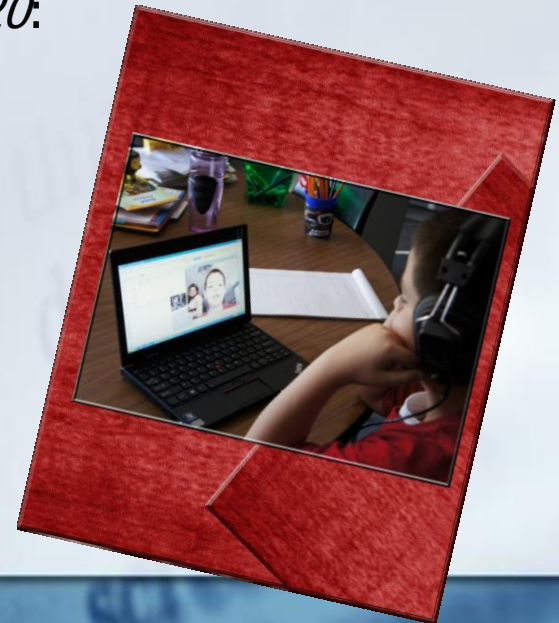

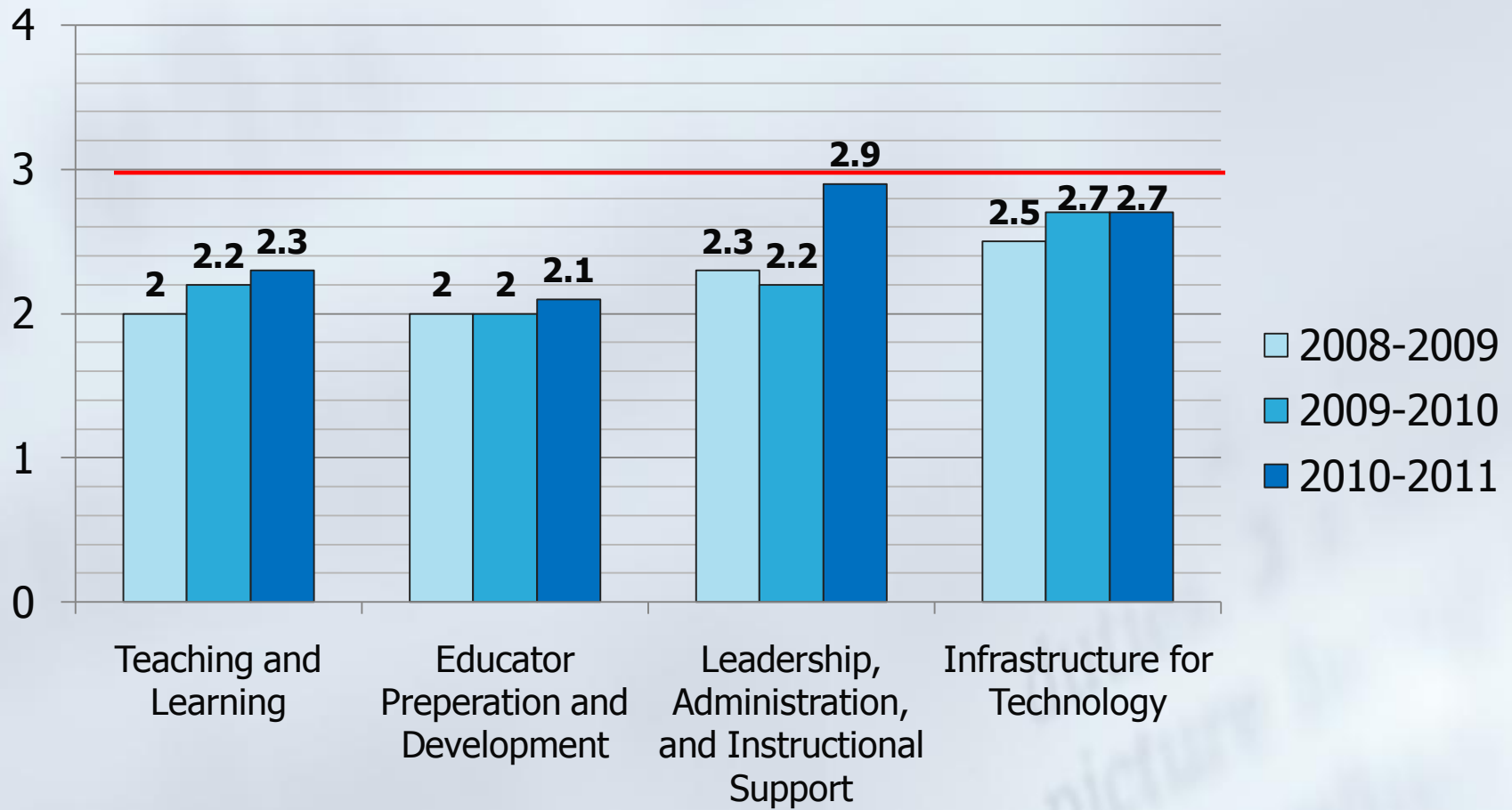

  - Computer Lit is the only junior school class that has an assigned responsibility to Teach Technology TEKS.
- High school technology courses chosen by students.
  - Technology TEKS are course specific.
  - Prerequisites for classes not always followed- courses lack an established sequence.

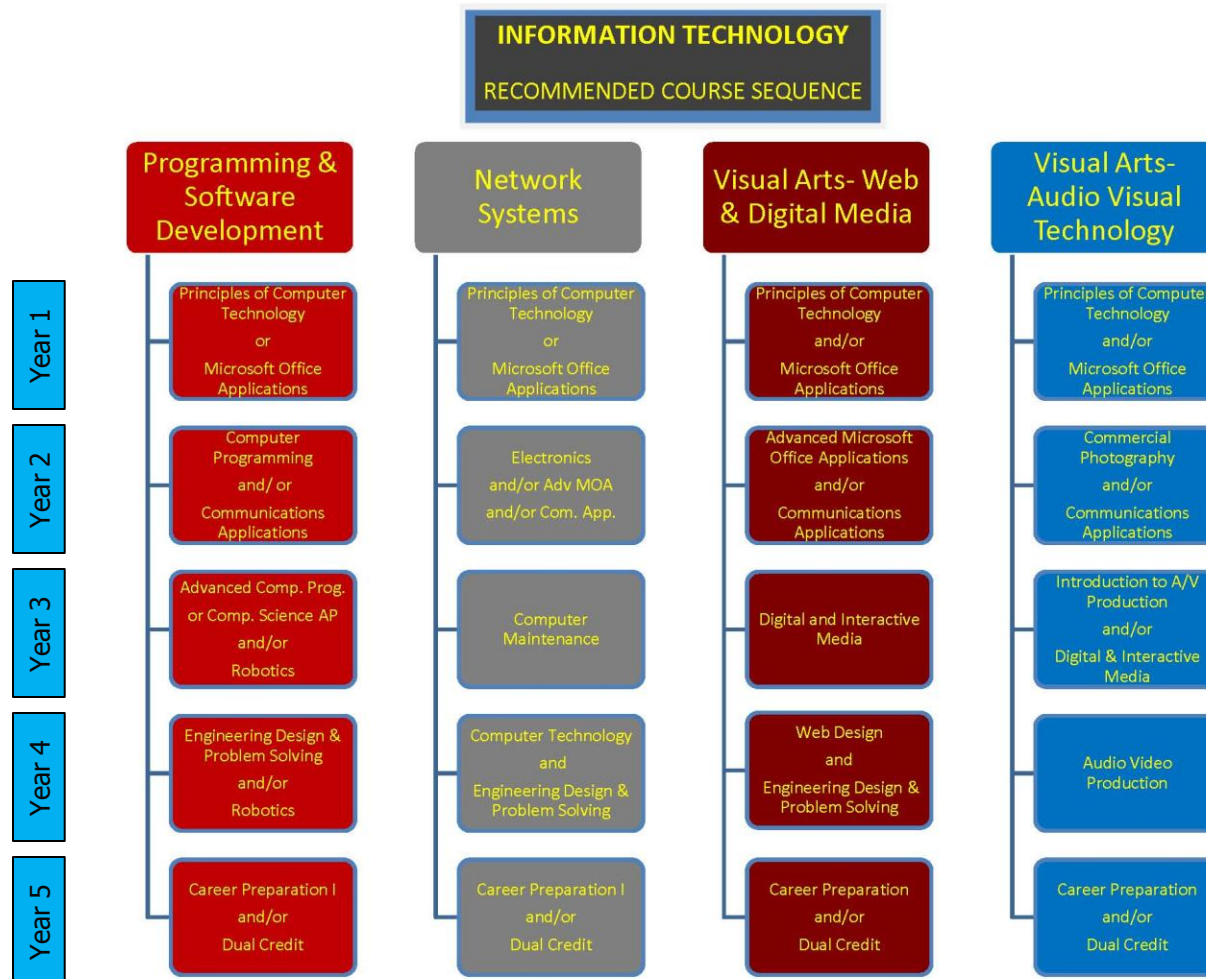

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve various projects at Stallworth Stadium, Lee High School, Sterling High School, Mann Jr. School and Lamar Elementary School.

### **RATIONALE:**

- The 2010 Facilities Condition Assessment (FCA) determined that there are several areas in need of immediate attention. These areas are identified on the attached spreadsheet.
- Tasks listed for Stallworth Stadium include several façade deficiencies and the sewer lift station is in need of repairs.
- Horace Mann Jr. School has deteriorated sanitary sewer piping throughout the building and is in need of replacement.
- The sewer lift station and the sanitary sewer piping underneath the kitchen area at Sterling High School are in need of major repairs or replacement.
- Lee High School is in need of major repairs or replacement of the sewer lift station.
- Lamar Elementary School has sanitary sewer piping throughout the facility that has deteriorated and needs to be replaced.
- Each of these areas could, if left unattended, become health and safety issues.
- The total cost of these projects is estimated to be \$2,528,226.
- Although funding is yet to be determined, this project will be performed in compliance with the Texas School Law Bulletin 44.031 Subsection (f) and Subchapter A, Sections 2254.003 and 2254.004.

**RATIONALE:** Due to the limited time constraint of accepting or rejecting the offers submitted by retail natural gas providers, the administration requests the authority to approve the natural gas services contract for the district's natural gas needs. This action is to secure pricing for services not currently under contract while rates are at historically low levels. The Board of Trustees has allowed this authority on the last three retail electrical provider contracts.

Due to regulatory changes in the market and changes to CenterPoint Energy's natural gas tariffs, Goose Creek CISD (the "District") now has viable options to save money through procurement of natural gas competitively through the Transportation Service program.

For years, large industrial and commercial customers have been taking advantage of these opportunities to purchase natural gas competitively; however, participation had been limited due to the minimum usage requirements previously set at 25 mcf/day. CenterPoint's Transportation Service Rate T-76 was recently amended to lower the minimum usage requirement to 10 mcf/day, thus offering the District an opportunity to save money through competitively procured natural gas for eligible locations.

Regarding timing, natural gas prices remain low by historical standards. The District is therefore in a strong position to take advantage of present market conditions by locking in low prices for a term starting in April 2011 while prices and market conditions are favorable, thereby allowing the District to reduce future natural gas costs while also freeing up funds to address other budgeting constraints.

In addition, the price of natural gas paid by the District under the standard offer rate structure varies each month based on the natural gas cost adjustments established by CenterPoint. It is difficult to accurately forecast or control the natural gas cost for the district under the standard offer rates, which are effectively variable. Through competitive natural gas supply, the District will also increase its ability to hedge portions of the expected natural gas usage and therefore achieve a greater level of price certainty.

The District therefore recently issued an RFP for natural gas and received a strong response with four proposals received. The District is utilizing a consulting firm, AEG Affiliated Energy Group (AEG), to assist us in the acquisition of these retail natural gas services.

Regarding potential savings, the benefits of participating in the Transportation Services program depend upon the negotiated rates, performance of relevant natural gas market indices, telemetry costs for each meter, and the regulated delivery tariff structure. Looking at the twelve month period ending October 2010, the District's average gas bill for these three sites amounted to \$10.15/mmbtu (including all delivery charges and fees). Based on current natural gas market prices and proposals received, the District can secure a two year agreement and lock in the natural gas commodity rate such that the future expected natural gas costs would be roughly *20-25% less* (approximately \$60,000 per year in savings for the three sites, or \$120,000 over a two year term).

Regarding timing and procedures, the District has until March 1, 2011 to execute a natural gas supply agreement that would begin on April 1, 2011.

Because of the volatility of the natural gas and energy markets, suppliers typically provide firm fixed price quotations that are only available for a couple of hours. As with electricity contracts, this results in a very small window of opportunity (sometimes only hours) to sign and close a retail natural gas contract.

Therefore, at our February 28<sup>th</sup> meeting, we will request that the Board designate several administrators with authority to execute a proposed Natural Gas Supplier contract for the District for a term up to forty eight months long in duration, so long as the price complies with an established benchmark. Such benchmark will be 10% below the aforesaid average natural gas bill for the eligible sites as referenced above.

The library automation system that is currently being used in Goose Creek is InfoCentre, a product of the Follett Software Co. We have been using this product for 5 years. This product was inherited by Follett when they bought the Sagebrush Company. There will never be any future upgrades or improvements to InfoCentre. The company will continue to offer tech support but no enhancements. There are many things about the product that cannot meet current district needs.

There is an opportunity to migrate to Destiny, a Follett product, if we can do so before the end of March 2010. The product pricing is 50% of the advertised pricing. To move all libraries in the district at the special pricing would cost \$63,000 or \$2863 per site. This includes onsite training and record migration. The pricing we have received in the past for Destiny is \$5000 per site plus training and record migration, over \$110,000.

The librarians are in agreement that this is a move that would be of great benefit to libraries and to the district. They have been willing to postpone some of the online database purchases so that the Destiny purchase can take place. At this time there are enough funds in the current library budget (931) for the Destiny purchase.

Benefits of Moving to Destiny:

- All district library records would be maintained in an integrated union catalog with district-wide standards
  - Makes resource sharing easier with interlibrary loan
  - Saves time in record management
  - Provides better tracking and reporting of materials saving time and money
- Integrates with TEAMS, student information system, updating student records every night
  - Has one patron database for all campuses
  - Saves time when students transfer in district and when new students arrive
  - Can track student circulation records as students move around the district
- Allows the Online Catalog to be accessed on the District and Campus Websites
- Provides a wider range of access points for students to locate materials either on their own campus or district-wide
  - Quest*, a digital student searching interface with individual student capabilities, *Title Peek* cover images helps with student selection, *Visual Search*, *Reading Level Search*, *Accelerated Reader Search*, *Multi-Language OPAC*, and *Lexile Search*
- Is a Browser based system rather than the current Web based system
  - Upgrades are easily implemented by TMS and do not require a client to be installed on individual machines
  - Is more stable than the current system
  - Is Window 7 compatible (InfoCentre may not be)
- Allows for cataloging and searching of non print materials
  - Websites, e-books, databases, and AV equipment
- Upgrades, improvements and enhancements will be continual (InfoCentre will have no further changes)
- Is used by a large percentage of districts in the Region IV area

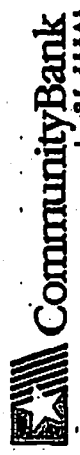
