## Election of Officers

### Review Board Policy 8272 Code of Ethics

The Board reviewed Policy 8272 Code of Ethics.

**Code of Ethics**

It shall be the policy of Raymond Central Public Schools that members of the Board of Education will exercise their responsibilities in accordance with the following Code of Ethics:

1. As a member of the local Board of Education, representing all the citizens of the Raymond Central School District, each Board member will recognize:
  - a. That he or she has been entrusted with the educational development of the children and youth of the district.
  - b. The district expects that the first and greatest concern of a school Board member will be the best interest of each and every one of the young people enrolled in the district's schools.
  - c. That the future welfare of this district, of this state, and of our nation depends in the largest measure upon the quality of education provided in Raymond Central Public Schools to meet the needs of every learner.
  - d. Members of the Board of Education must collectively take the initiative in helping all the people in this district to have updated, accurate information about the public schools system, and to provide the finest possible school programs, school staff, and school facilities.
  - e. That by statute the authority of the Board of Education is derived from the state which is ultimately responsible for the organization and operation of the public schools and which determines the degree of discretionary power exercised by the Board representing the people of the Raymond Central district.
  - f. That a school Board member must never neglect his or her personal obligation to the district and legal obligation to the State of Nebraska, nor surrender these responsibilities to any other person, group or organization; but that, beyond this, each school Board member has a moral and civic obligation to our country which can remain strong and free only so long as public schools in the United States are kept strong and free.
2. In view of the foregoing consideration, it must be the constant endeavor of each school Board member:
  - a. To devote time, thought and study to the duties and responsibilities of a school Board member so that he/she may render effective and creditable service.
    - i. If a board member is absent from more than two consecutive (regular) board meetings and the individual is not excused by the board, a vacancy is created in that seat.
  - b. To work with fellow school Board members in a spirit of harmony and cooperation so as to convert differences of opinion which arise during discussion and debate into a consensus for the benefit of the students enrolled in Raymond Central Public Schools.
  - c. To base personal decisions upon all available facts in each situation, to vote honest conviction in every case, unswayed by partisan bias of any kind; thereafter, to abide by and uphold the final majority decision of the Board of Education.
  - d. To remember at all times that individual Board members have no local authority outside the meetings of the Board of Education, and to conduct relationships with school staff members, local citizens, and all media of communication on the basis of this fact.

- e. To resist every temptation and outside pressure to use the position as a school Board member to benefit either oneself, immediate family or any other individual or agency apart from the total interest of the school system.
- f. To recognize that it is as important for the Board of Education to understand and evaluate the educational program of Raymond Central Public Schools as it is to plan for the business of the school district.
- g. To bear in mind under all circumstances that the primary function of the Board of Education is to establish and maintain the policies by which the schools are to be administered, but that the administration of the educational program and the conduct of school business shall be the primary responsibility of the Superintendent of Schools and the professional and non-professional staff members who are employed to work with the Superintendent of Schools.
- h. To welcome and encourage active cooperation by citizens, organizations, and the media of communication in Raymond Central Public Schools with respect to the establishment of policy on current school operation and proposed future developments.
- i. To strive step by step to achieve the ideal conditions for the most effective service by a Board of Education to its district, in a spirit of teamwork and unwavering commitment to the American system of public education as a primary means for preservation and perpetuation of our representative democracy.

**Conflict of Interest/Contracts**

It shall be the policy of Raymond Central Public Schools that any contract whether oral or written, formal or informal, which is entered into by the school district and in which a member of the Board of Education is directly or indirectly interested, is voidable unless certain reporting, disclosure and abstention requirements are met. The school district is authorized to enter into a contract in which a member of the Board of Education is directly or indirectly interested so long as:

1. The Board member makes a declaration on the record regarding the nature of his/her interest prior to official consideration of the contract.
2. The affected Board member does not participate in consideration or discussion of the contract.
3. The Board member does not vote on the granting of the contract except that if the number of members of the Board declaring an interest in the contract would prevent the Board with all members present from securing a quorum in the issue, then all members may vote on the matter.
4. The Board member does not in any way participate in the inspection, operation, administration or performance under the contract on the part of the district.

It shall further be the policy of Raymond Central Public Schools that the above provisions apply not only to formal contracts but also to open accounts.

**Conflict of Interest/Employment of Family Member of Board Member or Supervisor and Employment of Board Member**

1. A member of the Board of Education or an administrator or other employee with supervisory responsibilities may employ or recommend or supervise the employment of an immediate family member if:
  - a. He or she does not abuse his or her official position (for this purpose, “abuse” means employing an immediate family member: who is not qualified for and able to perform the duties of the position; at an unreasonably high salary; or who is not required to perform the duties of the position);
  - b. He or she makes a full disclosure on the record to the Board of Education and a written disclosure to the Superintendent and/or Secretary of the Board; and,
  - c. The Board of Education approves the employment or supervisory position.
2. No immediate family member of a Board of Education or an administrator or other employee with supervisory responsibilities shall be employed by the School District:
  - a. Without first having made a reasonable solicitation and consideration of applications for such employment.
  - b. Who is not qualified for and able to perform the duties of the position.
  - c. For any unreasonably high salary.
  - d. Who is not required to perform the duties of the position.
3. Neither the Board of Education nor an administrator or other employee with supervisory responsibilities shall terminate the employment of another employee so as to make funds or a position available for the purpose of hiring an immediate family member.
4. This policy shall not apply to an immediate family member of a member of the Board of Education or an administrator or other employee with supervisory responsibilities who was previously employed in a position with the School District prior to the election or appointment of the Board member or employee. Prior to or as soon as reasonably possible after the official date a Board member takes office or an employee assumes his or her responsibilities, such Board member, administrator or other employee with supervisory responsibilities shall make a full disclosure of any immediate family member employed in a position subject to this policy.
5. A member of the Board of Education may not be engaged in a contract to teach with the Raymond Central Public School District. Nor shall a member of the Board of Education cast a vote in favor of the election of any employee when the Board member is related by blood or marriage to such employee.

**Conflict of Interest/Other Than Contracts or Employment**

1. Members of the Board of Education of this School District shall abstain from voting on matters on which they may have a conflict of interest. Any Board member who would be required to take any action or make any decision in the discharge of his or her duties that may cause financial benefit or detriment to him or her, a member of his or her immediate family, or a business with which he or she is associated, which is distinguishable from the effects of such action on the public generally or a broad segment of the public, shall take the following actions as soon as he or she is aware of such potential conflict or should reasonably be aware of such potential conflict, whichever is sooner:
  - a. Prepare a written statement describing the matter requiring action or decision and the nature of the potential conflict; and,
  - b. Deliver a copy of the statement to the Secretary of the Board of Education, who shall enter the statement into the public records of the School District.

The Board member shall take such action as the Commission shall advise or prescribe to remove himself or herself from influence over the action or decision in the matter.

2. The provisions of paragraph 1 above shall not prevent a Board member from making or participating in the making of a School District-related decision to the extent that the individual's participation is legally required for the action or decision to be made. In such an event, the Board member shall report the occurrence to the Commission.
3. Except as defined in Nebraska statute and this policy, conflict of interest of a Board member shall not prevent a Board member from serving on the Board or restrict the hiring or purchasing practices of this School District.
4. The Superintendent, or the Superintendent's designee, shall provide:
  - a. Each Board member with copies of state statutes of Nebraska pertaining to conflicts of interest at the organizational meeting of the Board of Education held at the regular School Board meeting in January of each year. In addition, any newly appointed or elected Board member shall be provided such statutes.
  - b. When possible, provide each Board member with a list of financial matters on the agenda to come before the Board of Education at the next regular meeting in sufficient detail to allow the Board member to identify potential conflicts of interest and report and receive advice from the Commission.
5. For purposes of this policy, immediate family members shall be defined as a child residing in the Board member's household, a Board member's spouse or an individual claimed by that Board member or the Board member's spouse as a dependent for federal income tax purposes.

##### Administrative Reports

##### **Submitted by Troy Lurz, Jr-Sr High School Principal**

**Professional Development:** The Professional Learning Team spent time today working on learning targets and the intentionality of what we are teaching in our classrooms. This piece fits tightly into our Instructional framework conversations and is pivotal to the connections we will eventually make with the rest of the system. It is my estimation that once we get this right as a school and a system, we will see a huge difference in how we approach learning in our schools.

**Achievement Scores and Testing:** Nothing new to report on state testing. We are requiring the staff to offer a culminating assessment or semester exam. The intention is to measure the learning that has taken place since we started in August. The expectation is that students must be given an assessment that tests their skills, and dispositions, against the standard expected with respect to the course content. Ultimately, we are looking at mastering content standards and the teachers currently have the autonomy to define what that looks like. We will reevaluate the process after the semester with guidance from the Academic Achievement and/or Structures. Grades are due before the educators leave on December 20. This ties down the semester and gives the staff and students a needed break away from school.

**Friday Celebrations:** We continue to celebrate the goings-on at our fine school in a variety of ways. Our present vehicle is the Friday Celebration time. We have used Advisory periods and before school times will be the most frequent. Note: To date, we have handed out Fifty-four (54) VIP Awards to students. Two were for preschool students. We have also recognized thirty-six (36) staff members for their merit and hard work. The excitement when the preschool student, "Big George" got his can't be easily explained. The secondary students loved it.

Note: We continue to find inventive ways to celebrate our world and the work at the high school. If we do not celebrate it when it is happening, it is often overlooked, assumed, or never recognized. We want to make a habit of celebrating everything.

**Counseling/ACT/Senior Experience/Scholarships (Tasha):** November - Mini College Fair was well represented by military representatives and colleges. We will host an additional two in the Spring. Junior students completed their job shadow and the ASVAB.

December - SCC came out to offer the ACCUPLACER test which replaces the ACT for a class placement exam for any students interested in SCC.

**Congratulations Sarah Lange:** Congratulations to Sarah Lange for receiving the United States Senate Youth Program Scholarship. This includes a \$10,000.00 scholarship and a one-week trip to Washington D.C. This is a HUGE honor for Sarah.

**Financial Literacy:** According to Nebraska State Statute [79-3002](#), financial literacy is defined as, but is not limited to, "knowledge and skills regarding budget and financial record keeping; banking; taxes; establishing, building, maintaining, and monitoring credit; debt; savings; risk management; insurance;

and investment strategies." Personal finance, however, is not defined by state statute.

**When does the Financial Literacy Act go into effect?** The Financial Literacy Act was signed into law on May 26, 2021 and went into effect on August 28, 2021. The requirements, including the high school graduation requirement, began in the 2023-2024 school year. The Act also requires each student to complete at least one five-credit high school course in personal finance or financial literacy prior to graduation before the end of the 2023-2024 school year. This would apply to current high school juniors, or those graduating in 2024.

***Our Financial Literacy Story and How It Is Being Addressed:*** *Per Rebecca Parks*

*Beginning in the 2023-24 school year, all high school students in the State of Nebraska are required to take a course in Personal Finance. Raymond Central has for years been ahead of the game in preparing students and requiring a class with topics in personal finance. Previously senior students took a course called Adult Living. Now many of the topics from Adult Living are included in the course that meets the state guidelines for personal finance which is called Life and Career Readiness.*

*In Life and Career Readiness, some topics that students discuss include: Credit including the use of credit cards, credit reports and scores, auto, student and home loans; Taxes with topics including filling out Federal and State taxes, different types of taxes, payroll deductions, net/gross pay; Completing a Bank Reconciliation; Money Management Skills such as budgeting and creating a budget; Housing and Transportation Choices including Renting/Buying/Leasing.*

*Not only does this course meet the state requirements for personal finance, it also includes topics that are part of Raymond Central's Senior File. These topics include: Table Setting and Etiquette; Mock Interviews (which include cover letters, resumes, applications, introductions and the actual mock interview). Students work really hard during their time in Life and Career Readiness. As I shared above, there are many topics to cover in a semester.*


*During my time at Raymond Central, I have been blessed to talk with past students who share the skills and information discussed informally Adult Living, now Life and Career Readiness have helped to prepare them for life after high school. I look forward to continuing to work with students to share/teach/discuss these important topics.*

**Evaluation Update:** We are in compliance with our non-tenured staff (completing the last of them presently) and we are on track with our evaluation systems. Feedback to staff has been immediate and delivered with confidence. It is our understanding that they appreciate the feedback they receive in the conversations and through the walk-throughs data. Our collective efforts are to offer staff constructive feedback that helps them grow as professionals and also validates the good work they are doing. The only way we can do this with accuracy and fidelity is to be in their classrooms on a regular basis and to continually ask questions about what is happening.

**Staffing:** We have a wonderful staff. Still searching for a media technology support staff worker. The office staff has absorbed those duties for now.

**Student Council:** The high school student council is collecting new and like new winter wear and toys. Donations will first go to the caring shelves and then the rest will be donated to the salvation army.

The Jr High Student Council will be holding a dance for all RC 7th and 8th graders on January 24 from 7:00-10:00 PM in the New Gym. The Junior High Student Council will also be partnering with Nebraska Make-A-Wish- Foundation to host a Wish Week January 24-31. More information will be shared later.

**Professional Development/Learning:** The Professional Learning Team will work on the January 13 setting the stage for the next day of professional learning day on January 20. Our focus will be on items associated with Chapter 3 in *Learning that Sticks* and Chapter 2 in *the New Classroom Instruction that Works*. Learning targets will be a central focus of our energies as we differentiate the difference among varying concepts: learning targets, learning objectives, learning intentions, and perhaps even success criteria.

**Achievement Scores and Testing:** At our staff gathering on January 3, we discussed semester exams and how we will conduct culminating activities in the future. This conversation will likely take on another layer as we close in on the end of the second semester and school year. We believe that the process went fairly well. Just a reminder that the intention of a culminating exam or activity is to measure the learning that has taken place over the semester and in some situations, the year. The expectation is that students are given an assessment that tests their skills, and dispositions, against the standard expected with respect to the course content. The teachers currently have the autonomy to define what that looks like. Subcommittees will work to improve this process in the coming months.

**Student Teachers and Long-term Substitute:** We have a few new faces around our building this semester: Jackson Hilyard (Social Studies), Breanna Trampe (Family/Consumer Science), Cayton Butcher (Math), Taryn Miller (Long-Term Sub). If you see them out and about, please welcome them.

**Summative and Formative Assessments:** We are in our first full year of implementing our summative and formative assessments. Although there are a few wrinkles still being ironed out, we have been able to establish a baseline for the staff to use with respect to data that we use to derive at grades. This is a structured attempt to bring common language and consistency to grading practices. It is also a big first step to accountability with respect to accurate grade reporting so that a student's actual academic progress and feedback are represented fairly, accurately, with specificity, and are timely reported.

For your reference: Formatives let students see **what they ARE** learning; Summatives let them see **what they HAVE** learned; Formatives are **FOR** learning; Summatives are **OF** learning; Formatives are **CHECK-UPS**; Summatives are an **AUTOPSY**.

**Decision-Making Matrix:** One of the first recommendations that came as a result of the subcommittee structure shared with you last month was to move Friday celebration to Advisory and to change the frequency. The decision-making system is up and rolling and is designed to give everyone a voice. All subcommittees are working on something right now. The structures subcommittee also met on the morning of January 9 and unanimously agreed to a change in the use of our block schedule. The recommendation is that we now move to a modified block that better fits our needs. Good things are on the horizon and we have a vehicle to help make things work. It has been impressive to see the groups collaborate and problem solve.

**Evaluation Update:** We continue to get in and observe classrooms on a routine basis. We are adding a content area to the evaluation cycle this spring. 

## Bond Elections

---

<b>LB 135</b>	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Holdcroft	Government	Provide, change, and eliminate provisions relating to elections for certain purposes related to bonds and tax levies

Senator Holdcroft introduced a similar measure (LB 878) in the 2024 Session, which was placed on General File but advanced no further.

LB 135 creates a separate election process and provides limitations for school districts that call for an election to (i) approve the issuance of bonds, (ii) approve a property tax levy or levy increase, or (iii) approve exceeding a property tax levy limitation by a school district.

The election must be held in conjunction with the statewide primary or general election or, in an odd-numbered year, in conjunction with a regularly scheduled general election of a political subdivision. The school board must file the order or certify the question for the issue to be on the ballot by:

- March 1 for the statewide primary election,
- September 1 for the statewide general election, and
- the eighth Friday prior to the general election of a political subdivision.

### *Exception*

The question may also be submitted at a special election if the purpose of the bonds, of the tax levy or levy increase, or of exceeding the tax levy limitation is to address an emergency due to circumstances beyond the control of the school board of the school district, such as the destruction of a facility or other infrastructure by fire, flood, tornado, or other emergency circumstance.

### *Process*

The school board of the school district must:

- (a) designate the form of ballot,
- (b) reimburse the election commissioner or county clerk for the expenses of conducting the election and at the minimum rate as described in law,
- (c) give notice of the election by first-class mail at least 30 days prior to the election, and
- (d) cause the sample ballot to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the school district one time, not more than 15 days nor less than 7 days prior to the election. No notice of the election would be required to be given by the election commissioner or county clerk. The notice of election must state where ballots for early voting may be obtained.

The ballots would be counted by the election commissioner or county clerk conducting the election and two disinterested persons appointed by the election commissioner or county clerk. When the polls are closed, the receiving board would deliver the ballots to the election commissioner or county clerk conducting the election who, with the two disinterested persons appointed by the election commissioner or county clerk, would proceed to count the ballots. Ballots for early voting

shall be furnished to the election commissioner or county clerk and ready for distribution by the election commissioner or county clerk conducting the election not less than 21 days prior to the election.

When the school district lies in more than one county, the election commissioner or county clerk in any other county containing part of such school district would, upon request, certify its registration books for those precincts in which the school district is located to the election commissioner or county clerk conducting the election and would immediately forward all requests for ballots for early voting to the election commissioner or county clerk charged with issuing the ballots or otherwise arrange for distribution of ballots for early voting.

Not less than five days prior to the election, the school board of the school district would certify to the election commissioner or county clerk conducting the election a list of all registered voters of the school district in any other county or counties qualified to vote on the question.

*Other Provisions*

- All ballots cast at the election shall be counted by the same board.
- When all the ballots have been counted, the returns of such election shall be turned over to the school board of the school district in which the election was held for the purpose of making a canvass.
- The two disinterested persons appointed on the counting board would receive wages at no less than the minimum rate set in section 48-1203 for each hour of service rendered (current state minimum wage).
- The question may not be submitted at an election within ten months after being defeated at any election.
- The registered voters of the school district would be entitled to vote on the question presented at the election, and the question would be approved if a majority of the votes cast upon the question were in favor.

## Consumption Tax

---

Similar to previous attempts by former senator Steve Erdman, LR 10CA proposes a consumption tax. The constitutional amendment provides that, beginning January 1, 2028, the state would impose a retail consumption tax or an excise tax on all new goods and services, and the Legislature

may authorize political subdivisions to do the same. There shall be no exemptions except for grocery items purchased for off-premises consumption.

If approved by the Legislature, the measure would appear on the November 2026 General Election ballot.

Similar to previous attempts by former senator Steve Erdman, LR 11CA proposes that, beginning January 1, 2028, no other tax may be imposed in Nebraska except for the consumption tax proposed in the companion measure, LR 10CA.

If approved by the Legislature, the measure would appear on the November 2026 General Election ballot.

LB 49 is the result of an interim study (LR 341), which was filed by Senator McKinney and which received a public hearing by the Education Committee on November 1, 2024.

The interim study stated that:

School districts for Nebraska public schools are utilizing a ban and bar process by which school districts prohibit students and family members from school property with the threat of police enforcement should an individual violate a ban. There are no regulations related to the appropriate use of a ban, the length of a ban, or to whom and when a ban may be applied. There have been instances of school districts instituting bans against students and family members who have disagreed with staff or administrators regarding the educational needs of the student, even though there was no evidence of a threat by the student or family member, and some school districts have even implemented four-year bans. *There is no due process or appeal mechanism by which a student or family member can allege that a ban and bar is unreasonable or retaliatory.*

Under LB 49, a ban and bar action is defined as any action by a school district to prohibit students, family members of students, or other individuals from being on school property, attending school activities, or communicating with school officials, subject to enforcement as *criminal trespass* under the Nebraska Criminal Code (i.e., §§ 28-520 to 28-522) if an individual violates a ban and bar action.

LB 49 requires that, by January 1, 2026, the State Board of Education must develop and distribute a model policy relating to a ban and bar action. The policy must:

- (i) Specify that a *ban and bar action* by a school district may only be used in response to an immediate and significant threat of harm to a student, school official, or other individual or to facilitate the enforcement of a court order;
- (ii) Specify that any ban and bar action must be limited in scope and duration in such a manner to accommodate the right of parents and family members to be involved in their child's education and, in no event, exceed one calendar year unless otherwise required by court order;
- (iii) Protect the right of parents to be involved in the education of their children and their right to contest, appeal, or otherwise challenge a ban and bar action;
- (iv) Not discriminate or be applied in a discriminatory manner against any family members on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, disability, or national origin;
- (v) Provide that any individual subject to a ban and bar action must be given written notice of the action that includes the term of the ban and bar action, a description of the conduct giving rise to the ban and bar action and the evidence the school district has of the conduct, and instructions on how to appeal the ban and bar action; and
- (vi) Not be used against a student of the school district.

The model policy must provide that any individual subject to a ban and bar action may request a hearing before the school board of the school district. The individual may appear at the hearing to contest the issuance or scope of the ban and bar action. An appeal must be requested in writing and delivered to the school board within 10 days after receipt of notice by the individual of the ban and bar action. The individual may be represented by counsel at the individual's expense. The school board must hear an appeal within 30 days after receipt of an appeal request.

#### School District Policy

LB 49 provides that, by July 1, 2026, each public school district must *either* adopt the model policy or adopt a policy consistent with the model policy.

## Education Savings

---

LB 131 amends the existing 529 program (NEST 529) to permit the use of savings plans for expenses for tuition in connection with enrollment or attendance at an elementary or secondary school up to \$10,000 per beneficiary per taxable year. This would make the plan applicable to private schools.

A 529 college savings plan is a tax-advantaged account for education expenses and is generally state-sponsored. Its name stems from Section 529 of the IRS tax code, which gives these plans special tax breaks to encourage saving for education.

## Enrollment, Attendance

---

<b>LB 143</b>	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Subject</i>

Under existing law (§ 79-215), in order to carry out the provisions of the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children, a school board must permit children of military families to enroll "preliminarily" in a school district if a parent presents evidence of military orders that the military family will be stationed in this state during the current or following school year.

LB 143 provides that the preliminary enrollment and any advanced enrollment policies related to a child of a military family shall also apply if the child has an individualized family service plan, has an IEP, or receives special education.

## Miscellaneous

---

Background: In 2020, Senator Matt Hansen introduced LB 1160 to create the Nebraska Statewide Workforce and Education Reporting System Act to be implemented by the Nebraska Department of Labor. The Act would:

- (1) Provide workforce-outcomes data to postsecondary institutions to guide program, educator, and institutional improvement;
- (2) Support students and parents in understanding what education, training, and career pathways best prepare students for occupational success;
- (3) Provide comprehensive data about student success and workforce outcomes to policymakers to inform decisions and resource allocation;
- (4) Track workforce outcomes in order to better align programs with demands in the labor market;

- (5) Disaggregate student outcomes by race, ethnicity, gender, and economic status in order to identify and close educational attainment gaps; and
- (6) Identify the long-term return on investment from early education programs.

The 2020 measure also required the Department of Labor to execute a memorandum of understanding with the Nebraska Statewide Workforce and Education Reporting System to ensure the exchange of available data throughout the prekindergarten to postsecondary education to workforce continuum. The Department of Education was included in this memorandum of understanding.

LB 11 is an appropriation bill meant to provide funding for various entities that are a part of the memorandum of understanding for purposes of the Nebraska Statewide Workforce and Education Reporting System Act.

The bill appropriates \$130,893 for FY2025-26 and \$179,795 for FY2026-27 to each of the following entities:

- Department of Education;
- Board of Trustees of the Nebraska State Colleges;
- Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska; and
- Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education.

---

<b>LB 29</b>	<i>Sponsor</i> Conrad	<i>Committee</i> Government	<i>Subject</i> Create a review process for agency rules and regulations

LB 29 amends the Administrative Procedure Act relating to state agency rules and regulations.

The bill provides that, beginning January 1, 2026, each agency must conduct a review of all existing and pending rules and regulations and *every three years* thereafter.

Each agency head must designate an individual who is responsible for oversight of the review. The report must indicate whether:

- (a) The rule or regulation is essential to the health, safety, or welfare of the public;
- (b) The costs of the rule or regulation outweigh the benefits;
- (c) The agency has a process in place to measure the effectiveness of the rule or regulation;
- (d) A less restrictive alternative has been considered; and
- (e) The rule or regulation was promulgated as the result of a (i) state statutory requirement, (ii) federal mandate, or (iii) court decision.

Upon receipt of the agency reports required, the Reference Committee (Executive Board) of the Legislature is required to refer each report to the appropriate standing committee of the Legislature

based on each committee's jurisdictional oversight. The standing committee must then review the agency report and submit a report to the Clerk of the Legislature by December 15 of such year. Each standing committee report must include recommendations for legislation, if necessary, to clarify any rule or regulation or provide recommendations for clarifications to any rule or regulation.

*Note:* LB 29 requires that agency rulemaking and regulationmaking would be suspended during the pendency of the agency review process with the exception of any proposed rule or regulation that: (a) affects the health, safety, or welfare of the public; (b) is time sensitive; or (c) is subject to state or federal statutory deadlines.

---

<b>LB 122</b>	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Meyer	Education	Require display of the state and national motto in schools

LB 122 is similar to other legislation from the past requiring the display of the state and national motto in schools.

The bill requires each school board to prominently display the national motto of the United States, "In God We Trust", and the state motto of Nebraska, "Equality Under the Law", written legibly in English on a poster or plaque no less than 8.5” by 11” in size, in each classroom or in another prominent place in each school building where each student is able to see and read it each day school is in session.

The bill allows a school board to accept contributions to defray the costs of implementing the legislation.

*Notes:* In 2021, Senator Erdman introduced LB 36 to require the display of the national motto in each school. Interestingly, in the 2021 legislation, language was included to require the Attorney General to intervene on behalf of any school board and any other party named as a defendant for their role in implementing the law.

The legislation is apparently for the benefit of only those students who have eyesight.

Arkansas, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee, Utah, and Virginia have laws requiring the display of the national motto "In God We Trust" in public schools. Some states permit it but do not require it.

## **Sales Tax**

---

<b>LB 170</b>	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Brandt	Revenue	Eliminate the sales tax exemptions for candy and soft drinks

LB 170 would eliminate the sales tax exemption (and thereby increase state revenue) for candy and soft drinks.

Under the bill, "candy" is defined as a preparation of sugar, honey, or other natural or artificial sweeteners in combination with chocolate, fruits, nuts, or other ingredients or flavorings in the form of bars, drops, or pieces. Candy does not include any preparation that contains flour, or that requires refrigeration.

"Soft drinks" is defined as nonalcoholic beverages that contain natural or artificial sweeteners. Soft drinks do not include beverages that contain milk or milk products, soy, rice, or similar milk substitutes or that contain greater than 50% of vegetable or fruit juice by volume.

## School Budget and Finance

---

<b>LB 161</b>	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Juarez	Education	Redefine formula students under the Tax Equity and Educational Opportunities Support Act

Under the current provisions of TEEOSA, the final calculation of state aid uses the sum of average daily membership (ADM) plus 60% of the qualified early childhood education average daily membership.

LB 161 would enhance the calculation by using 100% of the qualified early childhood education average daily membership.

## School Psychologists

---

<b>LB 84</b>	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Rountree	Education	Adopt the School Psychologist Interstate Licensure Compact

LB 84 is the model legislation promoted by the National Center for Interstate Compacts for the School Psychologist Interstate Licensure Compact. Once seven states enact the ICSP model legislation, the compact member states can begin the process of making the Compact operational. Only West Virginia and Colorado have adopted the Compact so far.

The purpose of this Compact is to facilitate the interstate practice of School Psychology in educational or school settings, and, in so doing, to improve the availability of School Psychological Services to the public. The Compact is intended to establish a pathway to allow School Psychologists to obtain equivalent licenses to provide School Psychological Services in any Member State. In this way, this Compact would enable the member states to ensure that safe and effective School Psychological Services are available and delivered by appropriately qualified professionals in their educational settings.

The objectives of the Compact are to:

- A. Enable School Psychologists who qualify for receipt of an Equivalent License to practice in other Member States without first satisfying burdensome and duplicative requirements;
- B. Promote the mobility of School Psychologists between and among the Member States in order to address workforce shortages and to ensure that safe and reliable School Psychological Services are available in each Member State;
- C. Enhance the public accessibility of School Psychological Services by increasing the availability of qualified, licensed School Psychologists through the establishment of an efficient and streamlined pathway for Licensees to practice in other Member States;
- D. Preserve and respect the authority of each Member State to protect the health and safety of its residents by ensuring that only qualified, licensed professionals are authorized to provide School Psychological Services within that State;
- E. Require School Psychologists practicing within a Member State to comply with the Scope of Practice laws present in the State where the School Psychological Services are being provided;
- F. Promote cooperation between the Member States in regulating the practice of School Psychology within those States; and
- G. Facilitate the relocation of military members and their spouses who are licensed to provide School Psychological Services.

Under LB 84, "School Psychological Services" means academic, mental, and behavioral health services, including assessment, prevention, consultation and collaboration, intervention, and evaluation provided by a School Psychologist in a school, as outlined in applicable professional standards as determined by Commission Rule.

"School Psychologist" means an individual who has met the requirements to obtain a Home State License that legally conveys the professional title of School Psychologist or its equivalent as determined by the Rules of the Commission.

## Student Safety, Health, and Welfare

---

<b>LB 14</b>	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Cavanaugh, M.	Education	Adopt the Hunger-Free Schools Act

LB 14 is nearly identical to previous attempts by the sponsor on the topic of free meals for students. LB 99 (2023) and LB 117 (2021) were also introduced by Senator Cavanaugh.

The difference between LB 14 and previous versions is that the measure applies not only to public schools but also nonprofit private schools.

LB 14 creates the Hunger-Free Schools Act. To qualify a school must:

- (1) Offer “eligible breakfasts” and “eligible lunches” at no cost to all students for any school breakfast program or school lunch program operated by the school during the school day;
- (2) Submit information regarding the number of eligible breakfasts and eligible lunches served in a manner prescribed by NDE; and
- (3) Maximize federal reimbursement for eligible breakfasts and eligible lunches by operating under the community eligibility provision if the school has an identified student percentage greater than or equal to 62.5%.

NDE is required to reimburse each qualified school a portion of the cost of each eligible breakfast and each eligible lunch served by such school during the second preceding school fiscal year in an amount intended to offset the cost of the provision of the eligible breakfasts and eligible lunches at no cost to all students. NDE must make disbursements annually to each qualified school that complies with the requirements of the Program in the amount of:

- (a) For each qualified school that has adopted the community eligibility provision for the school fiscal year that such eligible breakfasts and eligible lunches were served:
  - (i) The difference between the federal reimbursement rate for a free breakfast and the federal reimbursement rate for a fully paid breakfast for each fully paid breakfast served; and
  - (ii) The difference between the federal reimbursement rate for a free lunch and the federal reimbursement rate for a fully paid lunch for each fully paid lunch served; and
- (b) For each qualified school that has not adopted the community eligibility provision in the year that the eligible breakfasts and eligible lunches were served:
  - (i) 30 cents for each eligible breakfast served to a student eligible for a reduced-price breakfast;
  - (ii) 40 cents for each eligible lunch served to a student eligible for a reduced-price lunch;
  - (iii) The difference between the federal reimbursement rate for a free breakfast and the federal reimbursement rate for a fully paid breakfast for each fully paid breakfast served; and
  - (iv) The difference between the federal reimbursement rate for a free lunch and the federal reimbursement rate for a fully paid lunch for each fully paid lunch served.

The bill provides intent language to appropriate funds to carry out the Hunger-Free Schools Act. In 2023, the fiscal note for LB 99 indicated a cost of \$55 million for the Program.

The legislation permits a school to collect information from the parent or guardian of a student to determine eligibility for other services of the school district.

Note: Eligible breakfast and eligible lunch is defined as a school breakfast or school lunch served to a student which is reimbursable, in total or in part, with federal funds, as specified under

regulations promulgated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture under the federal Child Nutrition Act of 1966.

---

<b>LB 140</b>	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Sanders	Education	Require school policies relating to use of electronic communication devices by students

LB 140 was introduced at the request of the Governor. The bill provides that, prior to school year 2025-26, each school board must adopt a policy that establishes rules and standards concerning the use of "electronic communication devices" by students while on school property or attending a school function.

The bill defines "electronic communication device" as any device that transmits by electronic means any writing, sound, visual image, or data of any nature to another electronic communication device. Electronic communication device includes a cell phone.

The development of the policy must include stakeholder participation to ensure that the policies are responsive to the unique needs and desires of students, parents, and educators in each community. The policy:

- (a) Must prohibit the use of an electronic communication device by students while on school property or attending a school function (except as provided below); and
- (b) May include student discipline and enforcement mechanisms that limit access to cell phones by students only if the school board adopts the policy as part of the rules and standards adopted in accordance with the requirements of section 79-262 (Student Discipline Act).

*Exceptions:*

The policy may not prohibit a student from using an electronic communication device while on school property or attending a school function under any of the following circumstances:

- (a) When required by a student's IEP;
- (b) When authorized by a teacher for educational purposes during instructional time;
- (c) In the case of an emergency or perceived threat of danger;
- (d) When necessary to monitor or manage a student's health care; or
- (e) When determined appropriate by the school board or otherwise allowed by an appropriate school employee.

Note: The bill is not meant to authorize monitoring, collecting, or otherwise accessing any information on an electronic communicating device not owned by or provided for academic use by the school district.

## Student Discipline

---

<b>LB 149</b>	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Hansen	Education	Eliminate the prohibition on suspending a student in prekindergarten through second grade

*Background:* In 2023, LB 705 was passed and signed into law, which, in part, prohibited an elementary school from suspending a student in prekindergarten through second grade. Each school district was required to develop a policy to implement this provision. Under the law, an elementary school was allowed to suspend a student in prekindergarten through second grade if the student brings a "deadly weapon" on school grounds.

The heart of LB 149 (2025) is contained within the outright repealer provision (Section 5 of the bill), which repeals Section 79-265.01. LB 149 would eliminate the law created in 2023 and permit suspension of any student under the provisions of the Student Discipline Act.

## Student Surveillance

---

<b>LB 31</b>	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Conrad	Education	Require school policies relating to the use of student surveillance, monitoring, and tracking technology by school districts

LB 31 is the result of an interim study, filed by Senator Conrad. The study was granted a public hearing before the Education Committee on November 1, 2024.

In the bill, Senator Conrad declares that the:

[U]se of student surveillance, monitoring, and tracking technology tools by school districts, other governmental entities, and companies contracting with schools for the use of student surveys and student surveillance, monitoring, and tracking has grown exponentially in recent years, *raising serious concerns about transparency, use of taxpayer dollars, parental rights, and student privacy;*

She also notes that numerous public schools in Nebraska have instituted various tracking systems that surveil and monitor students, including digital hall passes, anti-vaping devices, fingerprint swipes, cameras, and electronic surveys. And that tools of mass surveillance are being purchased and utilized with taxpayer funds through contracts with private companies.

The bill provides that parents have a well-established and fundamental right to control their children's education. Students have a well-established and fundamental right to privacy from unwarranted government surveillance. Taxpayers have a well-established right to ensure public entities are good stewards of public funds and a well-established right to transparency for governmental operations and expenditures.

LB 31 requires that, by December 1, 2025, the State Board of Education must develop and distribute a model policy relating to the use by school districts of student surveillance, monitoring, and tracking technology. The policy must require school districts to:

- (1) Specifically identify and inventory the type of surveillance tools or student surveys which gather personal information considered for use or actually used in the school district, including:
  - (a) The name and contact information for each private company, vendor, or governmental entity, providing such technology;
  - (b) The cost of each surveillance, monitoring, and tracking technology tool to purchase and maintain;
  - (c) A description of each student surveillance, monitoring, and tracking technology tool, including a description of privacy protection measures for each tool and data collection and data sharing and usage activities;
  - (d) Whether or not parents may opt their student out of being subjected to a student surveillance, monitoring, and tracking tool;
  - (e) If and how the data from a student surveillance monitoring and tracking technology tool will be shared with law enforcement or implicate punitive actions under the Student Discipline Act;
  - (f) How student surveillance monitoring and tracking technology tools ensure proper accommodations for students with disabilities or individualized education programs;
  - (g) How biometric or personally identifiable information is stored, shared, or sold with the private companies, vendors, or governmental entities providing such tools; and
  - (h) Clearly delineate what remedies are available to students and parents for violations of personal privacy related to such surveillance, monitoring, and tracking technology tools, including the Consumer Protection Act, the Political Subdivisions Tort Claims Act and section 79-2,104 (access to school files or records); and
- (2) Post the inventory and information related to surveillance, monitoring, and tracking technology tools considered for use or actually utilized by the school district on the school district's website and ensure such inventory and information is available in hard copy upon request.

### School District Policy

LB 31 requires that, beginning May 1, 2026, each school board must adopt a written policy to be implemented by the school district at the start of school year 2026-27 that provides for standards and guidelines for the purchase and use of tools of mass surveillance. The policy must include procedures and provisions in conformance with the minimum standards set forth in the model policy developed by the State Board of Education and may include any other procedures and provisions the school board deems necessary to conform with the spirit and intent of the legislation.

## Transgender Issues

---

<b>LB 89</b>	<i>Sponsor</i>	<i>Committee</i>	<i>Subject</i>
	Kauth	Government	Adopt the Stand With Women Act

Senator Kauth along with 20 co-sponsors introduced LB 89, which is a much broader version of LB 575 (2023). Four of the eight members of the Government Committee, which has jurisdiction of LB 89, are co-sponsors.

LB 89 creates the Stand With Women Act. In part, the measure is meant to address inconsistencies in court rulings and policy initiatives with respect to the definitions of sex, male, female, man, and woman, which have led to “endangerment of single-sex spaces and resources,” necessitating clarification of certain terms.

The bill applies to educational institutions, including public, private, denominational, or parochial schools offering instruction in elementary or high school grades and postsecondary educational institutions. It also applies to state agencies.

LB 89 provides various definitions:

- (a) “Boy” means an adolescent human male;
- (b) “Female” means a person whose biological reproductive system is organized around the production of ova. Female includes a woman and a girl;
- (c) “Girl” means an adolescent human female;
- (d) “Male” means a person whose biological reproductive system is organized around the production of sperm. Male includes a man and a boy;
- (e) “Man” means an adult human male;
- (f) “Woman” means an adult human female.

### Restrooms and Locker Rooms

LB 89 provides that the governing body of a school must designate each group restroom and locker room within each school building as either for use by females or for use by males.

With exceptions noted below, the governing body of a school may not:

- (a) Allow a male to use a restroom facility designated for use by females;
- (b) Allow a female to use a restroom facility designated for use by males;
- (c) Allow a male to enter or use a locker room designated for and being used at such time by one or more females; or

- (d) Allow a female to enter or use a locker room designated for and being used at such time by one or more males.

*Exceptions:*

- (a) An individual entering a restroom under the following circumstances:
  - (i) Entrance for custodial, maintenance, or inspection purposes; or
  - (ii) Entrance to render emergency assistance; or
- (b) A parent or caregiver bringing a minor child or an individual with a disability that is of the opposite sex of such parent or caregiver into a restroom designated for such parent's or caregiver's biological sex.
- (c) An individual entering a locker room under the following circumstances:
  - (i) Entrance for custodial, maintenance, or inspection purposes;
  - (ii) Entrance to render emergency assistance; or
  - (iii) Entrance by a coach, athletic trainer, or other authorized official or school employee.

Retaliation for Reporting

The governing body of a school or any school official or employee of a school may not retaliate against any person for reporting a violation of this legislation or related rules, regulations, or policies.

Athletics

An interscholastic or intramural athletic team or sport that is sponsored by a school or athletic association (NSAA) must be expressly designated as one of the following based on biological sex:

- (a) Males, men, or boys;
- (b) Females, women, or girls; or
- (c) Coed or mixed.

An interscholastic or intramural athletic team or sport sponsored by a school or NSAA and designated for females, women, or girls may not be open to a male student.

An interscholastic or intramural athletic team or sport sponsored by a school or NSAA and designated for males, men, or boys may not be open to a female student *unless* there is no female team offered or available for such sport for such female student.

The legislation would not restrict the eligibility of any student to participate in any interscholastic or intramural athletic teams or sports designated as coed or mixed.

Policy

LB 89 requires the governing body of each school to adopt a policy implementing the Stand With Women Act. (The measure does not provide details on the policy provisions.)

If the Commissioner of Education determines that any school district has intentionally refused, in a material manner, to comply with the Stand With Women Act, the commissioner must notify the school district of the noncompliance and allow the school district a *reasonable* time to comply.

If the commissioner determines, after such time has elapsed, that the school district is not in compliance and has not made a good-faith attempt to comply, the commissioner must take appropriate remedial action within the commissioner's authority, up to and including qualifying such noncompliance as a violation of the rules and regulations for the *accreditation* of schools.

### Other Provisions

LB 89 provides that an individual born with a diagnosis of a disorder or difference in sex development would have the relevant legal protections and accommodations afforded under the federal Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, as amended.

The bill contains the severability clause so that if any section in the act or any part of any section is declared invalid or unconstitutional, the declaration may not affect the validity or constitutionality of the remaining portions.

LB 89 provides that a government entity, licensing or accrediting organization, or athletic association shall not entertain a complaint, open an investigation, or take any other adverse action against a school for maintaining any separate interscholastic or intramural athletic team or sport for female students.

The use of cell phones in schools has become a national, state, and local concern for education policy makers. Eighteen state school boards have developed policies that either restrict or ban the use of cell phones by students and staff during school hours because of the negative impact of social media on learning and attention.

The restrictions are based on a plethora of research indicating that adolescent use of social media is directly related to increases in anxiety and suicide and that cell phone use has addictive qualities. (Haidt, 2024). Teachers indicate that cell phone distraction is a major problem in classrooms and the absence of cell phones during school has a positive impact on learning and student mental health. (Hatfield, 2024)

The Nebraska Department of Education recently surveyed school superintendents across Nebraska to gain insights about local school district cell phone restrictions, perceived impact of cell phone policy on student safety and well-being, policy enforcement challenges, and stakeholder support of school cell phone policies. Results show that 178 of 216 respondents said their schools have formal cell phone policies, 48 of those schools do not allow cell phones during school hours. One hundred sixty-two schools report parental/guardian support of school cell phone policies. Nebraska schools (157) report that their cell phone policies are either very effective or somewhat effective in helping students maintain academic focus.

Cell phone restrictions take several forms in Nebraska schools. In some instances, students cannot access their phones during school hours. Not having any access is referred to as a cell phone ban. In other situations, students are not to access their phones during instructional hours, but have access during lunch, passing periods, etc. The types of restrictions also vary depending on student developmental level with a trend that students in earlier grades have less access than older students.

Challenges in enforcing cell phone policies are more prevalent when students have some access to their phones during school hours. Because of the addictive nature of cell phones, students who have phones at their desks or in their possession find ways to use devices during class time. In addition, because teachers

most often are expected to enforce cell phone policies, there is inconsistent enforcement of policy across classrooms. National data shows that school districts find full cell phone bans are more successful because they remove temptations and are easier to enforce.

The Nebraska State Board is considering options for addressing cell phone use by Nebraska students. One of the options is to develop a position statement to indicate that the board encourages and supports local school board authority in developing policies that promote student learning and mental well-being and reduce distractions and practices that negatively impact the teaching and learning process.

A second option is to provide policy guidance and best practices for local school districts to consider. This might include a model cell phone policy, examples of existing school policies, and identification of best practices.

The board may decide to include both options as guidance for local school districts. Whatever action the Nebraska State Board of Education takes to address cell phone use by students, it needs to be grounded in the understanding of the effects smart phone invention has had on children and adolescents and how a phone-based childhood and adolescence is affecting the development of social, emotional, and cognitive abilities.

Congressman Don Bacon recently wrote a letter to Chairman Tom Cole, who heads the Committee on Appropriations, to express his support for the increase in Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) funding in H.R.9029 for Fiscal Year (FY) 2025. In his letter, he stated, "Since 1975, IDEA funding has played a crucial role in ensuring children with disabilities receive specialized education which best meets their needs. With the goal of addressing these needs and preparing them for future education, IDEA funding has been instrumental in providing these children with a high-quality education. However, Congress has repeatedly not met its pledge to cover 40 percent of the national average per pupil expenditure, resulting in insufficient IDEA funding. I applaud the increase and urge the committee to maintain a robust level of funding. This investment will not only benefit the populations served by funding but will make our nation's education system stronger overall and lead to better outcomes for America's children."



In a response, NASB reached out thanking Congressman Bacon for that support. "For many years school districts across Nebraska have been lobbying Congress to make good on its promise to fund Special Education as originally promised. At times it has felt that representatives of Congress have forgotten about that promise made numerous years ago. We appreciate your efforts to make good on the promise of fully funding the obligations of the federal government. Beyond being the right thing to do for vulnerable students across our State, this issue is an economic one for our taxpayers. The lack of funding for these students has been put on the backs of Nebraska property tax payers. Your letter and recommendation are a welcome part of this important conversation. As representatives of all 1,700 locally elected leaders serving their districts and communities, we wish to express our gratitude."



**The NRCSA Executive Committee has made a positive move to assist non-traditional educators move toward full teaching certification.** As a result of this move, new scholarship opportunities were created for paras who are in a “para to teacher program” and for transitional educators. NRCSA will provide three \$1,000 scholarships for the fall semester and three \$1,000 scholarships for the spring semester for the 2024-25 school year. Applicants for the scholarships must be current employees of a NRCSA-member district or ESU. Applicants must be enrolled for that semester in one of two types of programs: (1) in a recognized “para to teacher” program such as is offered by the three State Colleges (Chadron State, Peru State, or Wayne State), or (2) a transition to teaching program in which a person with a minimum of a bachelor’s degree who is employed to teach in a member school while working through a transitional program, such as offered by the University of Nebraska-Kearney. The applicant could currently be teaching under a transitional certificate. Application materials for Spring scholarships were distributed to member Superintendents and ESU Administrators, who were then asked to share with potential candidates in their buildings. Applications were due on Monday, Dec. 2.

The NRCSA Scholarship and Recognitions Committee selected the three Spring semester scholarship winners.

Prior to Christmas break, NRCSA Executive Director Jack Moles visited the districts of the three recipients of the Spring scholarships to make the scholarship presentations. The Fall recipients are: Amanda Dubs (Crawford), Ashley Callahan (Cedar Bluffs), and Vicki Miller (West Point).

Amanda Dubs is currently a paraprofessional at Crawford Elementary School. She is working on a teaching certificate in Special Education and Early Childhood through Chadron State College..

Ashley Callahan is currently a paraprofessional at Cedar Bluffs Public Schools. She is working on a teaching certificate in Elementary Education through Chadron State College.

Vicki Miller is currently a kindergarten paraprofessional with West Point Public Schools. She is working on a teaching certificate in Early Childhood Inclusive through Chadron State College.

### **FOLLOWING IS A REPORT FROM NRCSA’S LOBBYIST, RUSS WESTERHOLD:**

Nebraska voters turned out at historic levels in November during the statewide General Election. Preliminary figures from Nebraska Secretary of State Bob Evnen indicate that 74 percent of all registered Nebraska voters participated in this year’s election, breaking the previous turnout record set in 2020.

All members of Nebraska’s incumbent Republican congressional delegation were reelected. Senator Deb Fischer fended off a tough challenge from Dan Osborn for another six year term, and Republican Congressman Don Bacon again narrowly won reelection to Nebraska’s Second Congressional District seat.

Nebraska voters approved ballot initiatives proposing a constitutional 12 week abortion ban (Initiative 434), paid sick leave (Initiative 436), and legalizing medical marijuana (Initiatives 437 and 438). By approving Initiative 435, Nebraskans also voted to repeal LB 1402, which provided public money to be used by Nebraska’s private schools.

Nebraska voters also filled 25 of the Legislature’s 49 seats. From unofficial results, it appears that Republicans will hold 33 seats in the officially nonpartisan body, and that a total of 18 new senators will be sworn in when the Legislature reconvenes in January.

#### **From Governor Pillen’s website:**

*Governor Jim Pillen is providing state senators with the newly published 2024 School Property Tax Collection Report, aimed at providing historical context for funding of the state’s school districts, the impact of recent legislation in reigning in property tax increases and a request to state senators to consider legislation that will finally address inconsistencies in state aid to schools. The report, compiled by the Governor’s Policy and Research Office (GPRO), compares data across each of the state’s 244 school districts, accounting for the impact of state aid and property tax increases to taxpayers in those districts.*

*“We have newly elected state senators who may not have a complete understanding of how the state’s funding formula has worked historically, nor the impact of recent legislative initiatives when it comes to setting caps and also providing state funding to those districts,” said Gov. Pillen. “This document helps illustrate the impact of those changes and hopefully, inform discussions as we embark on the next legislative session and resume efforts to provide additional property tax relief to Nebraskans.”*

*There are three key findings from the report:*

*Caps are working to slow the growth of school property taxes. It is estimated that in 2024 growth will be 2.7%, the smallest percentage increase since 2018.*

*Cuts in state aid are negatively impacting property tax relief delivery, especially for certain districts.*

*State revenues can eliminate property tax increases enacted by school districts, through the creation of a stable school aid formula.*

*“The majority of a taxpayer’s property tax bill is tied to their local school district – an average of 60 percent,”*

said GPRO Director Kenny Zoeller. “One hundred and eleven school districts have had a reduction in state aid in the current year. Some have increased property taxes to help meet that decrease and others have far exceeded it. We need to find a way to better help districts budget for the aid they do get, thereby creating some predictability and hopefully, further reduce what Nebraskans end up paying in property taxes year over year.”

The analysis calls for Nebraska lawmakers to provide greater funding certainty through the Tax Equity and Equalization opportunities Support Act (TEEOSA). That formula has undergone multiple adjustments since its creation in 1990, which has also made it more confusing and has created disparities among districts in how they manage predicting budget shortfalls that are subsequently made up through property tax increases.

“The formula is inconsistent and hits taxpayers hard. It is not fair to them or the schools. Providing certainty to school districts will allow Nebraska to have sustained property tax reductions for the first time in history,” concludes the report.

**We urge you to consider participation in the NRCSA Partner OneCard program** as a tool for you in managing school expenditures, both large and small. Certainly, the card can help reduce/eliminate any issues relative to unverified cash expenditures. You decide who uses it, can get cards for each of those users, keep all cards wherever you wish, determine the amount to load on each individual card, and how long the time frame of use is. It is a terrific management tool and clearly identifies each expenditure/name/date/amount. Whether small purchases or very large purchases, the card is a terrific tool. NRCSA owns the state contract, so liability for misuse falls to NRCSA, not the district user. We have only had three circumstances of fraud and all three have been the theft of the card number information, not any district employee misuse. For 2023-24, 98 districts/ESUs participated in the program. We have received interest from several districts already this year, so we believe we will end up with over 100 entities using the program. Great job by all participating districts in protecting the card and program! Don't forget, the NRCSA rebate from the transaction fee paid by businesses that choose to accept plastic is used for scholarship, awards, and special needs. For 2023-24, the rebate was over \$30,000 to NRCSA, showing that use is increasing, and large purchases are being included. WIN, WIN, WIN! ## Programs

**Program 1. ES Steam/HAL:** The 4th-6th grade STEAM program at Crofton Elementary was launched in 2021 under the leadership of Lisa Pack. This initiative aims to engage qualifying students with enriching, hands-on experiences in Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math (STEAM). Participants explore a wide range of engaging activities, including robotics, coding, 3D printing, CAD, game design, and maker challenges, all aimed at fostering creativity, problem-solving, and innovation.



**Program 2. One Act:** Crofton Community School's one-act play production activity offers students from every walk of life an opportunity to demonstrate their individual talents in an environment of acceptance and accountability. The diversity collaboration of the students range from those skilled in industrial tech, athletics, academics, visual arts and those with special education needs. For example, of the students involved, a State Champion Wrestler receives Outstanding Performance Awards alongside a student working two jobs outside of school who dedicates time each week to building a set. The success of the program hinges on the team's commitment. No member is allowed to slack in their responsibilities. Because of this, the team has gained recent success, including two qualifying visits to Nebraska State Activities Association's Play Production Championships (2022, 2023), and two District Runner-up awards (2021, 2024). In addition, Crofton has received the Outstanding Technical Crew Award at every competition in which they participated, marking a 100% success rate for the techies! Furthermore, the culture of community support and recognition that the high-school kids are helping create is attractive to underclassmen and the roster is consistently rising, albeit the early 7:00 a.m. practices. It's an "all in" attitude based on respect, learning new communicative skills, and a lot of fun! Crofton One-Act is led by Mrs. Holly Wortmann, assisted by Mrs. Nancy Schieffer and Ms. Shiann Hansen.

## Elm Creek Public Schools

### **Interesting Fact:** Time Capsule Discovery:

In the process of tearing down the old elementary school, BD Construction discovered a time capsule in the old elementary building's cornerstone. This was created in 1922, when the original school was built. The time capsule was hidden in a hollowed-out section of the cornerstone, which we have on display outside of Elm Creek Public Schools. The time capsule was made of copper, with "Elm Creek Public Schools" and the year "1922" engraved on its surface. Inside, smaller containers were found, which were preserved in wax to protect them from moisture over the decades. Inside the container was a penny and the dice, as well as three August 1922 issues of the Elm Creek Beacon, a legal description of the land the school was built on, and the names of school board members who approved the new building in 1922. Another document showed that the school cost \$75,000 to build that year. We were surprised to find that there were no items specifically related to students. It seems that the small group responsible for making the building a reality focused on preserving the story of the challenges they faced in bringing the new school to life.

## Programs:

### Program 1. - PK-12 MTSS Process

Elm Creek Public Schools successfully utilizes a PK-12 MTSS process that fosters a supportive, data-driven learning environment where all students can thrive. Teachers provide high-quality core instruction, supported by frequent universal screenings to identify students needing additional help. We have implemented targeted interventions in small groups (Tier 2) or through intensive, individualized support (Tier 3) based on each student's specific academic, behavioral, or social-emotional needs. We have a true collaborative approach including teachers, specialists, administrators, and families that regularly review student progress and adjust strategies as needed. By integrating academic and behavioral support systems, promoting equity, and maintaining clear communication, the school ensures that all students receive the appropriate level of support to meet their goals! We are committed to this process and proud of the systems we have developed here at Elm Creek Public Schools! We have grown tremendously in academics and continue to build our positive culture!

### Program 2. - Adopting High Quality Instructional Materials

At Elm Creek Public Schools, we have introduced several new high-quality instructional materials across various content areas. This effort has been made possible through our partnership with ESU 10, whose support we greatly value. We have established a structured adoption process at the district level, guided by clear decision rules. A team of subject area experts leads the selection of evidence-based resources aligned with standards and student needs. Throughout the process, the team collaborates closely with staff to gather feedback. To ensure effective implementation, staff members participate in ongoing training, promoting consistent, engaging, and culturally responsive instruction. Regular reviews of student performance help refine practices, fostering better learning outcomes and greater equity across all grade levels.

- *The program provides an opportunity to connect YOUR school with prospective teachers. You may be in the market to hire one of these tutors in the future and this connection could help!*



### **Nebraska SMART End-of-Semester Feedback Survey**



Since the end of the Spring 2024 Semester, over 372 new students have registered, bringing the total to 514 students, 74% of whom attend NRCSA member school districts.



The Fall 2024 Semester ended with 692 completed tutoring sessions, totaling 952 sessions conducted since February. Tutors spent over 406 hours tutoring during the fall semester.

These can be overcome by fostering a culture of collaboration, prioritizing communication and relationship-building, seeking creative funding solutions, and promoting equity and inclusivity in partnership efforts. Additionally, leveraging support from district leadership, community stakeholders, and external resources can help schools overcome obstacles and maximize the benefits of collaborative partnerships.

We in the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources (IANR), specifically the College of Agricultural Sciences & Natural Resources (CASNR) and Nebraska Extension 4-H, believe this strategy for K-12 partnerships will result in a strong learning innovation network of support for every learner and every educator in the state of

Nebraska. The world of higher education is evolving, driven by changes in technology, demographics, workforce demands, and societal expectations. **The American Heart Association is committed to partnering with schools in rural Nebraska to improve the health of their communities. A few of these opportunities include:**

**Tobacco Free Schools.** Unfortunately, recent data reveals the ongoing challenges of youth tobacco use. The 2021 National Youth Tobacco Survey showed that: Approximately 2 million MS/HS students reported using

e-cigarettes during the pandemic; nearly 85% of them used flavored tobacco products. More than 4 in 10 HS students and nearly 2 in 10 MS students who used e-cigarettes did so 2 out of 3 days and youth showed a strong brand preference.

Many schools have struggled to keep up with the continued innovation of the tobacco industry. To help address that, the American Heart Association created our Tobacco Free Schools Toolkit. The toolkit is designed to help schools update their policies so that now – and in the future – they will cover all products, people, and places while providing mechanisms that support students who are battling tobacco addiction. More information/resources are here.

**Improving Cardiac Response in Schools.** Did you know that the odds of surviving a cardiac arrest in rural areas is only about half of that in an urban area? In the aftermath of a cardiac emergency - minutes matter. The Chain of Survival starts with those who are present and requires everyone to do their part. The American Heart Association is committed to building a Nation of Lifesavers to and to helping school districts and other entities develop [Cardiac Emergency Response Plans](#). These plans consider: access to functioning AED's, a strong base of CPR knowledge and training, as well as the identification of a response team and the annual practice of a cardiac emergency. A note from Mr. Nikolai:

*For those I have not met previously, I am the **American Heart Association's** lead for rural health in the Midwest Region, inclusive of your states. My role allows me to work collaboratively with all manner of organizations that are in a position to impact health in their communities – and schools are certainly near the top of that list.*

*There are many ways our organization has worked to collaborate with schools – supporting access to nutritious, affordable food, helping to address the ongoing challenges of vaping/tobacco use, and more. Today, though I'm focusing primarily on our resources to assist with cardiac readiness / cardiac emergency response planning.*

*Much of the country was watching – or has followed since – the **collapse of Buffalo Bills' safety, Damar Hamlin, on Monday Night Football**. Fortunately, Damar's story had a happy ending. Our goal is to maximize the opportunity for everyone to have a similar outcome should they experience a Sudden Cardiac Arrest. Most organizations will not have the resources that the NFL does to ensure player safety, but there is much that can be done, especially with proper planning.*

*Some data suggests that **nearly 1% of schools will be the site for an out of hospital cardiac arrest annually**. For a variety of reasons, rural areas are disproportionately impacted by both rates of cardiac arrest and poor outcomes. We know that prepared and equipped schools mean better outcomes for staff, students, visitors, and the communities that so often gather in school spaces.*

*We have recently built out/updated a variety of tools to assist schools – and other organizations – with their cardiac readiness. These include:*

- *Sample Cardiac Emergency Response Guidelines and Plans.*
- *A toolkit to maximize the impact of AED placement and implementation.*
- *Training and awareness tools to help with Hands-Only CPR knowledge for staff and students.*
- *A revamped, training site search feature, for coaches, nurses, and others who need CPR certification.*
- *In some cases, we may have – or be able to help secure – financial resources to help schools with purchasing/maintaining AEDs, CPR mannequins, etc. Hearing the scope of that need can help us secure additional resources, so please let us know!*

***Please let me know if you see an opportunity or need to dialogue about these resources further or share them with your member districts. I'm happy to assist with newsletter copy, join or host webinars, or other ideas that fit your standard means of communication.***

*Finally, at the risk of sharing too much – a few other notes I wanted to highlight.*

- *I've attached an invitation for our **Fall Educator Series**. Administrators/Educators from all districts are welcome to attend the sessions they are interested in. You'll see the one in November is on Cardiac Emergency Response Planning.*
- *Last year some 1300+ rural schools in the Midwest participated in our Kids Heart Challenge program. They raised life-saving money for our mission, earned PE equipment for their schools, and helped improve health knowledge in their community. Last year, tens of thousands of families learned Hands-Only CPR through the program.*
- *Thanks to the **Missouri Rural Health Association** for sharing our HeartCorps program on their home page. That opportunity exists for IA, KS, KY, MN, MO, NE, OH, and WI. Happy to chat more!*

#### **Farm to School Network Takes Root in Nebraska**

The Nebraska Department of Education, Center for Rural Affairs, Nebraska Extension, Buy Fresh Buy Local, and No More Empty Pots are pleased to announce the establishment of the Farm to School Network in Nebraska. The network aims to increase access to fresh and nutritious foods in Nebraska schools and strengthen connections between local farmers, educators, and communities.

To build this network, a Network Development Committee and Advisory Committee will lead the process and guide stakeholders to create a strategic, collective action plan that will move farm to school forward in Nebraska. The Network Committees are made up of representatives from key organizations and institutions across the state and are focused on breaking down barriers standing in the way of implementing farm to school initiatives.







**The National Rural Education Association's Legislative Committee (of which NRCSA is a member) continues to represent rural education on the Federal level.**

NRCSA Executive Director Jack Moles and NRCSA Legislative Committee Co-Chair Bryce Jorgenson (Supt. at Southern Valley) attended the NREA Federal Legislative Summit in Washington DC on April 28-30.

Bryce and Jack met with the offices of each of Nebraska's contingency in Congress. They specifically shared three points of emphasis with them:

- Copies of NREA's publication, "Why Rural Matters" was presented to each of the offices.
- Full funding of IDEA was stressed. This would bring about \$171 million more to Nebraska public schools in support of Special Education services.
- Passage of the Secure Rural Schools Reauthorization Act of 2023. This would bring about \$180,000 to school districts surrounded by tax-exempt public lands.

A brief description of the six NREAC legislative priorities are as follows:

1) EDUCATION FUNDING: NREA seeks preservation of critical federal funding for rural schools.

2) REAP FUNDING: NREA urges Congress to increase funding to Title V, Part B of ESSA, the Rural Education Achievement Program, with a specific increase to the Rural Low-Income School Program.

3) INFRASTRUCTURE: NREA supports efforts to ensure any infrastructure proposal in Congress must include funding for modernizing or maintaining rural school facilities.

4) FOOD AND NUTRITION: NREA supports any effort to streamline processes and reduce the administrative burdens related to school meal programs.

5) SCHOOL SAFETY: NREA supports flexible federal formula funding streams that channel resources to rural school districts for school safety that recognizes the geographic and economic challenges in rural communities.

6) BROADBAND AND CONNECTIVITY: NREA believes access to high-speed internet is critical for providing equitable access to learning for students in rural schools. As such, NREAC strongly supports maintaining E-Rate as an element of the Universal Service Fund in its current funding structure.

## **Chadron State College Special Education Para-to-Teacher Program Initiative.**

**Purpose:** This “Grow Your Own” Special Education Teacher program is designed to provide school districts with the opportunity to cultivate and participate in the training of their para-professionals who wish to continue their education to become special education teachers.

**Who:** Any individual who holds a minimum of an Associate's Degree (or equivalent credit hours) from an accredited higher education institution, and who is employed as a para-professional within a school district.

**What:** Chadron State will provide required course work and enrichment activities via online, face-to-face (via Zoom), and on the job experiential learning, leading to a Bachelor's in Education Degree, and a Nebraska Teaching Certificate with an endorsement in Special Education (grades PK-12). With administrator input, program course work will be tailored to best fit your district practices and expectations. Each course will be offered in an 8-week format, with 12-13 credit hours to be completed each 16 week semester.

**How:** Program participants will be advised, monitored, and supported by CSC faculty/staff, and a CSC Education Program liaison is specifically assigned to facilitate their progress. District para-professionals may enter the program at any time in the academic year.

**When:** once participants reach their senior academic year they will embark on completing their capstone course work, via online and Zoom class sessions. This course work has been pared down considerably with the understanding and assumption that these student teachers will be learning “on-the-job”. For example, one section covers classroom management practices. Clearly, one can argue and attest that these student teacher interns are learning more about managing a classroom from being mentored by veteran teachers within your school, and observing them in action. This is the belief and learning approach embraced during this senior year. However, to ensure and assess concept learning, Chadron State faculty will be meeting with your student teacher cohort twice per week for 1.5 hours, via Zoom conferencing technology.

**Graduation:** At the completion of this program students/candidates graduate from Chadron State College, and apply for teaching licensure resulting in a valid initial teaching certificate with and endorsement in PK-12 Special Education. Chadron State's education program is nationally and State accredited. As such, interstate certification reciprocity is not a problem.

## Things for your consideration:

- 1) To qualify for this program participants must hold at least an Associate's Degree or the equivalent in college credit hours. *(CSC will work with those applicants to provide them with the needed coursework leading up to program entry).*
- 2) Districts must agree to maintain para-professional employment throughout the course of the program—including during the student teaching experience.

## **The UNL Department of Educational Psychology has received a grant from the Swanson Foundation which allows them to offer mental health services to rural schools.**

From Dr. Michael Scheel, Chair of the UNL Department of Educational Psychology:

*The UNL Department of Educational Psychology would like to offer counseling and psychological services, as well as consultation services to the schools and communities of Southeast Nebraska. We run a mental health counseling and therapy clinic and we are offering counseling and consultation services to teachers, administrators, students, and community members of Southeast Nebraska. Services will be provided through remote and confidential means (i.e., Zoom conferencing). We are hoping that schools, families, and individuals contact us to schedule an appointment for a telehealth counseling or consultation session.*

*We have recently learned that a donor will support our work with individuals living in rural Southeast NE by paying all fees for services. Thus, whoever seeks out our services will simply have to indicate they live in Southeast Nebraska, and any services we provide will be paid for through the UNL Foundation. Individual, couple, and family counseling will be provided without financial expense. Additionally, we can provide teachers, school administrators, school counselors, and school social workers consultation services for students of their schools without charge.*

*We are very excited to enter a partnership with schools and communities of SE Nebraska to promote mental health and well-being. We are aware of the mental health counseling disparities that exist in Nebraska*

*rural areas, and our department, our College of Education and Human Sciences, and UNL are highly interested in offering our expertise and resources with the goal of enhancing the well-being of SE Nebraska individuals, schools, and communities. We are a group comprised of licensed psychologists and psychology graduate students who regularly provide services through our clinic to the Lincoln community. We are seeking to reach beyond Lincoln to connect more with surrounding rural areas. We also are acutely aware of the importance of addressing mental health concerns right now as we all are experiencing the stress of going through the COVID-19 pandemic.*

*The Counseling and School Psychology Clinic is a training clinic in which graduate students in counseling and school psychology work with clients under the supervision of licensed psychologists. Services are available to all on a sliding scale. For clients from SE Nebraska communities, services will be paid for through UNL Foundation funds supplied by a donor who cares deeply about the welfare of schools and communities in SE Nebraska. Counseling services are offered to improve well-being, improve academic and behavioral issues, stabilize mood, manage stress, and improve life-adjustment issues.*

**A common theme from some of the decision makers on the state level is that “out of control” local spending is to blame for the property tax problem.** NRCSA, along with many other educational entities, maintains that we do not have a school spending issue, but instead have a school funding issue. Attached are two reports, one from NRCSA, the other from Open Sky, that discuss the myth of “out of control” school spending. It is my hope that administrators and Board of Education members will read, then use these reports to counter those claims. When you do please tell your district's story as that is the most powerful way to get this message across.

for investing in education and for ensuring that the federal government supports and protects students, educators, and education institutions as the country continues to educate students of all ages. CEF's mission to increase the federal investment in education will not change, but we'll have to focus more on defense against funding cuts. We will continue to point out the results of education investments – for students immediately and for economic growth in the long term. We will need to communicate well, broaden our community of advocates, and target our efforts so they are as effective as possible.

Things to keep in mind – I generally hope for the best but try to prepare for the worst. I wasn't prepared for last night, but just made a list of some things I expect from a Trump Administration's education agenda, and how likely they are to happen. Key things to keep in mind:

Congress did not enact past Trump budgets that cut education funding – In fact, Congress ignored the Trump Administration's requested steep cuts and increased education funding. I don't expect education funding increases now but do know that Members of Congress do not want to vote for bills that will cost jobs in their district or harm their constituents. One of our jobs will be to continue to highlight why investments in education are so important to those who need to be convinced.

It is hard to make big changes in government quickly – Some Republicans want to eliminate the Department of Education, while continuing many programs at lower funding but in either the Department of Labor or in Health and Human Services. This type of change is hard to enact. There do appear to be some executive actions that would eliminate civil servant positions, and it's easy to shrink a government agency by not hiring behind staff who leave. If Republicans keep control of the House next Congress, they could use the budget reconciliation process to fast-track passage of tax cuts and cuts to entitlements, since reconciliation bills need only a majority in the Senate, not the customary 60-vote margin to pass.

Administrative/regulatory agendas change with each Administration – Since recent presidents have not been able to enact much of their agendas because they often split power with Congress, each successive administration has made changes with executive action, which are then reversed by the next administration. A Trump administration is likely to reverse Biden Administration student loan debt relief

executive actions and impose new ones that support their agenda, such as limiting Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion requirements, limiting transgender student participation in sports or protections at the school level, and changes in interpretation of student civil rights protections.

Possible Republican policy agenda focused on the private sector (except for IHEs) – Conservative theory tends to support the private sector as a more efficient than the public sector for accomplishing goals, and I'd expect to see a renewed focus on support for private school vouchers that families could use toward private school education, more tax policy supporting private school tuition, and "local control" for public schools. At the higher education level, Republicans are likely to sharpen their attention to college admission policies, protections for freedom of speech, policies regarding civil rights, and taxation of endowments. This can occur through appropriations and tax policy (forbidding federal funding if a recipient does a certain thing or requiring a certain action to receive federal funding), and through oversight hearings and federal administrative actions, among other actions.

What's next? Changes in House and Senate party and committee leadership – We'll know more after all House races are called. The Washington Post has a handy list of the current Republican and Democratic seats most likely to change party, and ACG Advocacy is updating its own list of seats still to call, which I'll share. Meanwhile, I've attached a document that ACG prepared on Friday showing who is in line to head each Senate and House committee for each party depending upon who is in the majority, and who is in line for party leadership positions. Republicans plan to hold leadership elections next week, although the House could push its schedule back depending on what is known about all the remaining elections still to be called.

FY2025 appropriations likely not finalized in December – The government is operating on an extension of fiscal year (FY) 2024 funding that expires on December 20. I think it is now likely that Congress will not finalize FY 2025 appropriations bills by then and will instead extend funding into next Spring (this is what House Speaker Mike Johnson (R-LA) supported when the current 3-month extension was enacted in September), giving the new Republican Administration and Senate more say in the outcome. That outcome does not bode well for investments in education; the current bipartisan appropriations bill approved by the Senate Appropriations Committee includes \$12 billion more

*for the Department of Education programs than the Republican bill approved by the House Appropriations Committee.*

Initially, slots would be prioritized for children with identified educational needs, with clear criteria rubrics in place. We would still maintain a two-day per week option for parents who prefer it for their children, as well as for 3-year-old students.

Lastly, we would like to discuss the potential need for expanding our program to eliminate the current waitlist. It is crucial that children who are set to attend Kindergarten at Raymond Central have access to a spot in our preschool program to ensure continuity in their early education.
