IV. PRESENTATIONS

- A. Pat Welsh - South Central District Director Pat Welsh, South Central District Director and board member of the Tullahoma Board of Education, presented the board with the Board of Distinction plaque. He explained that all boards across the state are evaluated in four ways, planning, policy, promotion, and board development. He stated that not all systems will get this award this year.
- B. Eakin Drama Group The Eakin Drama Group sang two songs from their play 101 Dalmations that took place in April at Eakin Elementary School.
- C. SCOPE representatives Diane Neeley spoke about this year's SCOPE conference that she and Tim Harwell attended with six students from our school system in March. Ms. Neeley talked about the different events that they and the students participated in such as a mock school board meeting, group discussions and debates. Ms. Neeley gave the names of the students that attended, Naveah Buchanan, Carlie Belle Barber, Olivia Gabhart, Ryan Waterson, Blake Olive and Lilly McCollum. Carlie Belle Barber and Ryan

Waterson came to the board meeting and spoke about their experience at the conference. Mr. Harwell presented both Carlie and Ryan with their SCOPE certificate.

- D. Charlie Pope - United States Marine Corps Educator Workshop Charlie Pope spoke on the United States Marine Corps Educator Workshop that he attended. Mr. Pope said there were 254 applicants and only 46 were chosen, 12 from the state of Tennessee. He showed a brief video and then spoke about what the workshop meant, what he and the other educators experienced and how it is intended to help educators understand what happens when recruits go to basic training so they can better inform the students.

- F. Bid No. 22-35 SCHS Marching Band Uniforms The funds came from fundraisers and an anonymous donation of \$10,000.00. Mr. Gilliland, SCHS Band Director, sent a memo requesting to approve the bid. Dan Reed asked if we were laying carpet in some areas at schools. Mr. Kleindienst said carpet was being put down in some administrative areas but not in classrooms.

10. 6.311 Care of School Property Dr. Garrett stated "with our addition of one-to-one computers we would like to suggest the changes that you see in the bottom paragraph. If a student does not return the equipment the parent would meet with the Director of Schools and we would work out a payment plan in order to make things right again. We have so many computers out and so we want to make sure that we strengthen this policy."

John Boutwell asked "would the parent be advised of the policy prior to receiving the computer" and Dr. Garrett answered "yes, they have to sign off on the agreement". David Brown asked "how many computers come up missing in any given year"? Ryan Womack said they are doing inventory cleanup at this time so he doesn't have an exact number. Motion to approve was made by Glenn Forsee and seconded by Andrea Anderson. Motion Approved by

11. 6.310 Student Dress Code Dr. Garrett stated that during the town hall meetings that one of the things heard from many parents was they did not feel that schools were consistent with the dress code. "We will be very clear with principals and teachers and parents want us to be consistent" Dr. Garrett said. "So that is our expectation that if we streamlined this, you guys approve this, it is a little more lenient but we expect people to follow it. I make that commitment to you that we will follow the policy. And I make that commitment to parents because that's what I heard from parents and I appreciate the feedback that they gave me."

Mr. Cook asked "When will this go into effect?" Dr. Garrett responded "next school year". Glenn Forsee asked "How many forms of communication will a parent receive about this?" Dr. Garrett stated that she could do an all-call, email, social media, we can do a letter home, teachers could talk about it in their open house, and any kind of meetings they're having to prepare for next year. Dan Reed commented "The only thing nervous thing I see here is where do we draw the line between a not heavy coat and a heavy coat?" Tim Harwell stated "there is going to be some interpretation there. I think that separation from what a hoody or a light jacket is that next level is what we would consider a heavy jacket. A parka, any of those type of jackets." "The biggest thing is something they could conceal something in and could be cumbersome during the school year in the hallways we would ask them to keep that in their locker until the end of the school day" Mr. Harwell explained.

The Bedford County Board of Education met in a regular monthly session on March 15, 2022 at 5:30 pm in the Learning Way Elementary gymnasium located at 200 Learning Way, Shelbyville, TN. Board members Nicole Cashion, David Brown, Brian Crews, Andrea Anderson, Michael Cook, Glenn Forsee, John Boutwell, Diane Neeley, and Dan Reed were present.

Chairman Michael Cook called the meeting to order, followed by a moment of silence, and the Pledge of Allegiance lead by Addie Tidwell, Stone Tidwell and Ella Tidwell who are students at Liberty School.

Consent Agenda

The Consent Agenda was approved by acclamation upon the motion and seconded by Brian Crews and Glenn Forsee.

Presentations

Ms. Wendy Williams gave a presentation on the program Teaching as a Profession. She also brought 2 students, Nick Harris and Katie Wilder, who are currently in the program and they spoke about their experience in the classes and internship.

Diane Neeley spoke about this year's SCOPE delegation that she and Tim Harwell will be attending. Ms. Neeley introduced the delegates in attendance: Naveah Buchanan, Carlie Belle Barber and Olivia Gabhart. Ryan Waterson, Blake Olive and Lilly McCollum will also be joining them.

A. Transfer funds resolution.

The resolution to transfer funds was explained by Robert Daniel that it relates to cash flow. Money is needed at the end of the year to cover expenses and with so many grants this year more money is necessary. **A motion was made by John Boutwell, seconded by Brian Crews and was passed by a 9-0 vote.**

Michael Cook stated he would like for the board to discuss the plan that is decided on at the board retreat. **A motion was made to discuss the 2nd story plan by Glenn Forsee and seconded by David Brown.** Glenn Forsee would like more clarity on traffic flow. There was discussion about the schematics of the plan and the excavation of the land. Glenn Forsee said “One last thought, two story has advantages, two story has disadvantages, one story has advantages, one story has disadvantages, there’s no perfect scenario but I obviously yield to the wisdom of those who actually make it work.” After discussion the vote was 9-0 to approve the 2nd story plan.

Glenn Forsee asked about how bad the gas/ diesel situation was. Robert Daniel said it's about double. John Boutwell asked about bidding on gas. Robert Daniel mentioned needing to purchase our own tanks in order to bid. John Boutwell brought up electric buses in the future. Diane Neeley talked about obstacles of charging the electric buses. Robert Daniel said also buses that run on propane could be an option to consider. **Motion made to approve the financial report by David Brown and seconded by Brian Crews. Approved by 9-0 vote.**

Attendance Report by Terise Rhodes

Ms. Rhodes reported that there were 1579 withdrawals, 637 of those were in county transfers, 152 went to Independent Homeschool, 74 went to private schools or Umbrella schools, 67 students dropped for various reasons, 444 transferred to another school district, 167 transferred out of state, 65 transferred to out of state online schools. Brian Crews asked about the cost of losing 1579 students. Ms. Rhodes explained that 637 were still in our system they just transferred schools in the county. Dr. Garrett talked about adding high school to the Virtual School and she said that Thomas Magnet has been approved to expand to add 6th grade

Superintendent's Report

Dr. Garrett told about the letter she received from Commissioner Schwinn that said we have been named a Reading 360 District for all the training that our teachers participated in about literacy. “What that means for Bedford County students is our teachers are more qualified and have learned more skills and are working hard to make sure that all students are proficient in reading.” Dr. Garrett stated.

Michael Cook reported that the next board meeting will be at Eakin on April 19th at 5:30. The Board Retreat will be at Henry Horton on April 29th and 30th. He said the board might like to have a study session to discuss the building projects.

Glenn Forsee asked if graduation was May 13th and 14th. Dr. Garrett confirmed and graduation will be at each high school.

Glenn Forsee moved to adjourn the meeting at approximately 6:30.

1 The Bedford County Board of Education shall provide any student who attends a persistently dangerous
2 school (as defined below), or any student who has been the victim of a violent crime while at school, the
3 opportunity to attend a safe school.

4 Any school designated by the Tennessee Department of Education as a persistently dangerous school
5 shall notify the parents or guardians of all students attending such school and provide for all students to
6 be given safe school choice as provided for under the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001.

7 Parents shall be notified annually that if their child is the victim of a violent crime at school, the child
8 has the right to attend another grade-appropriate public school in the district.

9 The Bedford County Department of Education shall assume necessary transportation costs associated
10 with the student attending a safe school.

11 **Section 1: Persistently Dangerous Schools**

12 Any public elementary or secondary school, with the exception of a school established specifically for
13 serving suspended or expelled students or students with behavioral disabilities, shall be considered
14 persistently dangerous if it meets the following criteria for three (3) consecutive years:

15 1. Has violence-related disciplinary actions as reported on the Annual Report of Zero
16 Tolerance Offenses. Violence-related disciplinary actions shall be defined as follows:
17 possession/use of a firearm, battery of a teacher or school employee (including a
18 school resource officer assigned to the school), and possession/use of a school weapon
19 other than a firearm (a more detailed description of each of these offenses is provided
20 in Section 3 of this policy); or

21 2. Has students who have been the victim of a violent crime at school as defined in
22 Section 2 of this policy; and

23 3. The sum of violence-related disciplinary actions and/or incidents of student
24 victimization identified in criteria #1 and criteria #2 above are equal to or greater than

1 3% of the school's average daily membership.

2 4. Persistently dangerous schools are those schools identified by the State Department of
3 Education.

4 **Section 2: Victim of a Violent Crime at School**

5 A student shall be considered a victim of a violent crime at school when the following criteria are met:

6 1. Evidence is found to reasonably indicate that the student has been the victim of any of
7 the applicable offenses identified in TCA 40-38-111(g) or the attempt to commit
8 one of the applicable offenses as defined under TCA 39-12-101; and,

9 2. The offense occurred while the student was attending school or traveling to or from
10 school on a bus.

11 *Required Actions*

12 1. The building administrator or a designated representative of a school where an alleged
13 incident of student violent crime victimization has occurred shall immediately report
14 the incident to the appropriate law enforcement agency.

15 2. Promptly following an investigation by appropriate law enforcement personnel, the
16 building administrator or a designated representative shall determine whether or not
17 reasonable evidence exists to indicate that a student has been the victim of a violent
18 crime. Identification of a perpetrator and/or the filing of criminal charges shall not be
19 considered a prerequisite for determining that a student has been victimized.

20 3. Upon determination that a student has been victimized, and within ten (10) days of
21 the event, the superintendent of schools shall offer the student and his/her parent(s) or
22 guardian(s) a safe school choice.

23 4. The building administrator or a designated representative shall file a report with the
24 Tennessee Department of Education as requested by the Commissioner.

25 *Parental Notification*

26 Every public school shall annually notify parents that if their child is the victim of a violent crime at
27 school, the child has the right to attend another grade-appropriate public school in the district.

1 **Section 3: Definitions**

2 For the purposes of this policy, the following definitions shall apply:

3 *Safe School Choice*

4 The student and his/her parent(s) or guardian(s) are provided an opportunity to transfer to another school
5 within the local education agency (LEA) that is safe for the student. To the extent possible, the LEA
6 shall allow transferring students to transfer to a school that is making adequate yearly progress and has
7 not been identified as being in school improvement, corrective action or restructuring.

8 The LEA is encouraged to take into account the needs and preferences of the affected students and
9 parents. The LEA shall assume necessary transportation costs associated with the student attending a
10 safe school. An LEA with only one school at a particular grade level may choose to facilitate a transfer
11 to a school in another school district; however, such transfer shall not be required.

12 *Violence-related Disciplinary Actions*

13 A violence-related disciplinary action is one taken for any of the following offenses:

- 14 • Possession or use of a firearm.¹
- 15 • Battery of a teacher or school employee (including a school resource officer assigned
16 to the school.) For purposes of this policy, battery is defined as intentional or reckless
17 physical contact with a person without his or her consent that causes bodily injury.
- 18 • Possession or use of a weapon other than a firearm.²

19 *Violent Crime*

20 Any of the following applicable offenses³:

- 21 • Aggravated arson
- 22 • Aggravated assault
- 23 • Aggravated child abuse and neglect
- 24 • Aggravated kidnapping
- 25 • Aggravated rape
- 26 • Aggravated robbery
- 27 • Aggravated sexual battery
- 28 • Aggravated spousal rape
- 29 • Spousal rape
- 30 • Spousal sexual battery

- 1 • Aggravated vehicular homicide
- 2 • Carjacking
- 3 • Criminally negligent homicide
- 4 • Especially aggravated burglary
- 5 • Especially aggravated kidnapping
- 6 • Especially aggravated robbery
- 7 • First degree murder
- 8 • Incest
- 9 • Kidnapping
- 10 • Rape
- 11 • Rape of a child
- 12 • Reckless homicide
- 13 • Second Degree murder
- 14 • Sexual battery by an authority figure
- 15 • Sexual battery
- 16 • Stalking
- 17 • Statutory rape
- 18 • Vehicular assault
- 19 • Voluntary manslaughter

- 3 2. A student who is enrolled and making satisfactory progress in a course leading to a GED;
- 4 3. A student who is six (6) years or younger and whose parent or guardian has filed notice of intent
- 5 to conduct home school with the superintendent of schools; or

1 Any student entering school for the first time must present:

- 2 1. A birth certificate or officially acceptable evidence of date of birth at the time of registration.¹
- 3 2. Evidence of a current medical examination.² There shall be a complete medical examination of
4 every student entering school for the first time. This applies to kindergarten, first grade and other
5 students for whom there is no health record.
- 6 3. Evidence of state-required immunization.³
- 7 4. Students in grades K-5 must attend the school in the school zone of their residence. Parents must
8 provide proof of residence annually upon registration to the school for grades K-5. (Owning
9 property of any type or payment of any type of tax does not constitute any legal basis for
10 attendance in Bedford County Schools.)

11 Proof of residence must be one of the following documents dated within the past three months of
12 registration:

- 13 a. Utility statement (gas, electric, phone, etc.)
- 14 b. Letter of correspondence from government agency
- 15 c. Letter from landlord verifying the residence

16 Drivers licenses will not be accepted to verify residence.

17 The name used on the records of a student entering school must be the same as that shown on the birth

2 Students in grades K-5 are expected to attend the school to which they are assigned by virtue of their
3 residence. Students will enroll in the school of appropriate grade¹ as designated by school zones based
4 upon the student's primary residence and will be provided transportation, if the distance is one and one-
5 fourth (1 1/4) miles or more.

6 All students grades K-5 **6** are eligible to apply for acceptance to magnet school. If student meets all
7 enrollment criteria and is accepted, transportation shall be provided.

8 Parents of students in grades 6-12 may elect to enroll their children in any school in the school system
9 provided the parent provides transportation to and from that respective school and provided that such
10 choice does not cause overcrowding in the chosen school.

11 The Bedford County Board of Education will not issue waivers of student assignment.

12 TO CLASSES

13 The principal shall be responsible for assigning all students to classes.

16 in the grade or level assigned, he/she may be reassigned by the principal to another grade level. ~~Parents~~
17 **Parent(s)/guardian(s)** shall be kept advised.

19 **The principal shall separate an alleged victim of child sexual abuse from an alleged perpetrator if the**
20 **abuse allegedly occurred while the child was under the supervision or care of the school. If available**
21 **and appropriate, a child shall be reassigned if a request is made by the child's parent/guardian, and the**
22 **perpetrator has been: (1) substantiated by the Department of Children's Services; (2) adjudicated by a**
23 **juvenile court to have committed the child sexual abuse; or (3) criminally charged.³**

6 For minor offenses where corrective measures are taken by the classroom teacher, no formal procedure
7 is required. ~~An inquiry into the incident to ensure that the offender is accurately identified, that he~~
8 ~~understands the nature of the offense, and that he/she knew the consequences of the offense for which~~
9 ~~he is accused.~~ **The teacher shall ensure the following:**

- 10 1. The offender is accurately identified;
- 11
- 12 2. That he/she understands the nature of the offense; and
- 13
- 14 3. That he/she understands the consequences for the offense.
- 15 .

16 SEVERE OFFENSES

17 In case of severe offenses where there is a possibility of suspension, the student shall be advised of the
18 nature of his/her misconduct, questioned about it, and allowed to give an explanation.

19 ~~If the principal determines that the offense is of such nature that the student's continued presence would~~
20 ~~be detrimental to the school or persons within the school, he/she shall refer the case to the disciplinary~~
21 ~~hearing authority.~~³ **If a student is suspended more than ten (10) days, he/she shall receive notice of the**
22 **right to appeal to the Disciplinary Hearing Authority (if applicable).**

1 In order to maintain a safe, civil, and supportive environment in school for students to learn and
2 achieve high academic standards, acts of bullying, cyber-bullying, discrimination, harassment,
3 intimidation, hazing, or any other victimization of students, based on any actual or perceived traits or
4 characteristics, are prohibited.¹

5 This policy shall be disseminated annually to all school staff, students and parent(s)/guardian(s). This
6 policy shall cover employees, employees' behaviors, students and students' behaviors while on school
7 property, at any school-sponsored activity, on school-provided **equipment** or transportation, or at any
8 official school **bus stop**. If the act takes place off school property or outside of a school-sponsored
9 activity, this policy is in effect if the conduct is directed specifically at a student and has the effect of
10 creating a hostile educational environment or otherwise creating a substantial disruption to the
11 education environment or learning process.

12 Building administrators/designees are responsible for educating and training their respective staff and
13 students as to the definition and recognition of discrimination/harassment.³

14 The Superintendent of Schools shall develop forms and procedures to ensure compliance with the
15 requirements of this policy and state law.

16 **DEFINITIONS⁴**

17 "Bullying/Intimidation/Harassment" is an act that substantially interferes with a student's educational
18 benefits, opportunities, or performance, and the act has the effect of:

- 19 1. Physically harming a student or damaging a student's property;
20
- 21 2. Knowingly placing a student or students in reasonable fear of physical harm to the student or
22 damage to the student's property;
23
- 24 3. Causing emotional distress to a student; or
25
- 26 4. Creating a hostile educational environment.

27 Bullying, intimidation or harassment may also be unwelcome conduct based on a protected class (race,
28 nationality, origin, color, sex, age, disability, religion) that is severe, pervasive, or persistent and
29 creates a hostile environment.

1 Cyberbullying “Cyber-bullying” is a form of bullying undertaken through the use of electronic devices.
2 Electronic devices include, but are not limited to, telephones, cellular phones or other wireless
3 telecommunication devices, text messaging, email, social networking sites, instant messaging, videos,
4 web sites or fake profiles.

5 Hazing “Hazing” is an intentional or reckless act by a student or group of students that is directed
6 against any other student(s) that endangers the mental or physical health or safety of the student(s) or
7 that induces or coerces a student to endanger his/her mental or physical health or safety. Coaches and
8 other employees of the school district shall not encourage, permit, condone or tolerate hazing
9 activities.⁵

10 Hazing does not include customary athletic events or similar contests or competitions and is limited to
11 those actions taken and situations created in connection with initiation into or affiliation with any
12 organization.

13 COMPLAINTS AND INVESTIGATIONS

14 Any individual who has knowledge of behaviors that may constitute a violation of this policy shall
15 promptly report such information to the principal/designee.⁶

16 While reports may be made anonymously, an individual’s need for confidentiality shall be balanced
17 with obligations to cooperate with police investigations or legal proceedings, to provide due process to
18 the accused, to conduct a thorough investigation, or to take necessary actions to resolve a complaint.
19 The identity of parties and witnesses may be disclosed in appropriate circumstances to individuals with
20 a need to know.

21 The principal/designee at each school shall be responsible for investigating and resolving complaints.
22 Once a report is received, the principal/designee shall initiate an investigation within forty-eight (48)
23 hours of receipt of the report. If ~~a report~~ an investigation is not initiated within forty-eight (48) hours,
24 the principal/designee shall provide the Superintendent of Schools with appropriate documentation
25 detailing the reasons why the investigation was not initiated within the required timeframe.⁷ The
26 principal/designee shall immediately notify the ~~parent/legal guardian~~ parent(s)/guardian(s) when a
27 student is involved in an act of discrimination, harassment, intimidation, bullying, or cyberbullying
28 cyber-bullying. The principal/designee shall provide information on district counseling and support
29 services. Students involved in an act of discrimination, harassment, intimidation, bullying, or
30 cyberbullying cyber-bullying shall be referred to the appropriate school counselor by the
31 principal/designee when deemed necessary.⁸

32 The principal/designee is responsible for determining whether an alleged act constitutes a violation of
33 this policy, and such act shall be held to violate this policy when it meets one of the following
34 conditions:

- 35 • It places the student in reasonable fear or harm for the student’s person or property;
- 36
- 37 • It has a substantially detrimental effect on the student’s physical or mental health;
- 38
- 39 • It has the effect of substantially interfering with the student’s academic performance; or

- 1 • It has the effect of substantially interfering with the student’s ability to participate in or benefit
2 from the services, activities, or privileges provided by a school.

3 Upon the determination of a violation, the principal/designee shall conduct a prompt, thorough, and
4 complete investigation of each alleged incident. All investigations shall be completed and appropriate
5 intervention taken within twenty (20) calendar days from the receipt of the initial report.⁷ If the
6 investigation is not complete or intervention has not taken place within twenty (20) calendar days, the
7 principal/designee shall provide the Superintendent of Schools with appropriate documentation
8 detailing the reasons why the investigation has not been completed or the appropriate intervention has
9 not taken place.⁷ Within the parameters of the federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act
10 (FERPA)⁹, a written report on the investigation will be delivered to all involved parties and to the
11 Superintendent of Schools.

12 **RESPONSE AND PREVENTION¹⁰**

13 ~~School administrators~~ **The principal/designee** shall consider the nature and circumstances of the
14 incident, the age of the individual, the degree of harm, previous incidences or patterns of behavior, or
15 any other factors, as appropriate, to properly respond to each situation.

16 A substantiated charge against an employee shall result in disciplinary action up to and including
17 termination. The employee may appeal his decision by contacting the Federal Rights Coordinator or
18 the Supervisor of Student Services.

19 A substantiated charge against a student may result in corrective or disciplinary action up to and
20 including suspension. The student may appeal this decision in accordance with disciplinary policies
21 and procedures.

22 **REPORTS**

23 When a complaint is filed alleging a violation of this policy where there is physical harm or the threat
24 of physical harm to a student or a student’s property, the principal/designee of each middle school,
25 junior high school, or high school shall report the findings and any disciplinary actions taken to the
26 Superintendent of Schools and the chair of the ~~Board of Education~~ **Board**.¹¹

27 By July 1st of each year, the Superintendent of Schools/designee shall prepare a report of all of the
28 bullying cases brought to the attention of school official during the prior academic year. The report
29 shall also indicate how the cases were resolved and/or the reasons they are still pending. This report
30 shall be presented to the ~~Board of Education~~ at its regular July meeting, and it shall be submitted to the
31 State Department of Education by August 1st.¹²

32 **RETALIATION AND FALSE ACCUSATIONS**

33 Retaliation against any person who reports or assists in any investigation of an act alleged in this
34 policy is prohibited. The consequences and appropriate remedial action for a person who engages in
35 retaliation shall be determined by the principal/designee after consideration of the nature, severity, and
36 circumstances of the act.¹³

- 1 False accusations accusing another person of having committed an act prohibited under this policy are
- 2 prohibited. The consequences and appropriate remedial action for a person found to have falsely
- 3 accused another may range from positive behavioral interventions up to and including expulsion.¹⁴

14 Upon information that a student is suspected of violating this policy, the principal of the school shall be
15 notified immediately. If it is determined that board policy has indeed been violated, the principal shall
16 notify the student's parent or guardian and appropriate law enforcement officials. Students who are
17 found to be in violation of this policy will be subject to suspension for a period of not less than one (1)
18 calendar year. The superintendent shall have the authority to modify this suspension requirement on a
19 case-by-case basis.³

20 Use of recommended dosage of a drug authorized by the student's personal medical prescription from
21 his/her registered physician shall not be considered a violation of this policy.

22 Students shall not consume, possess, use, sell, distribute, or be under the influence of illegal drugs or
23 alcoholic beverages in school buildings, on school grounds, in school vehicles or buses, or at any school-
24 sponsored activity, function, or event, whether on or off school grounds.¹ This includes, but is not limited
25 to, abuse of inhalants and prescription drugs.

26 Disciplinary sanctions shall be imposed on students who violate standards of conduct required by this
27 policy. Such sanctions shall be consistent with local, state, and federal laws, up to and including,
28 suspension/expulsion as well as referral for prosecution.² Completion of an appropriate rehabilitation
29 program may also be recommended.

1 Information about drug and alcohol counseling and rehabilitation programs shall be made available
2 through the school office.

3 In order to protect the rights of students, to safeguard the learning environment, and to contribute to a
4 drug-free community, the Board's plan for dealing with alcohol and drugs³ shall include the following:

- 5 1. Appropriate ways for handling alcohol/drug-related medical emergencies;
- 6
- 7 2. Guidelines for reporting alcohol/drug incidents and illegal activities;
- 8
- 9 3. Guidelines for referral of students who may have an alcohol/drug problem and/or are
10 considered "high risk" to agencies and other appropriate sources of assistance; and
- 11
- 12 4. Effective working relationships with appropriate community agencies, such as alcohol/drug
13 service providers, law enforcement agencies, and judicial officials.

14 Through the use of state guidelines, the Director of Schools shall be responsible for:

- 15 1. Developing and implementing an appropriate curriculum on alcohol and drug education for
16 students;
- 17
- 18 2. Providing adequate information and training for all staff personnel as appropriate to their
19 responsibilities;
- 20
- 21 3. Implementing the relevant portions of the Drug-Free Youth Act;⁴
- 22
- 23 4. Developing administrative procedures for the school district to effectively respond to alcohol
24 and drug situations that may occur at school or school-sponsored events; and
- 25
- 26 5. Providing notification to parent(s)/guardian(s) and students that compliance with this policy is
27 mandatory.

8 **I. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS AND ACCEPTABLE ATTIRE FOR BEDFORD**
 9 **COUNTY SCHOOLS (GRADES 6-12)**

- 10 A) The Student Dress Code will be in effect during both the school year and summer school

- 12 B) Students’ dress and grooming will be clean and neat. Clothes and appearances must be safe and
 13 not disruptive to the educational process.

- 17 E) Sleeveless shirts should have straps at least 2 inches wide.
- 18 F) Chest and midriff must be covered.
- 19 G) Lightweight outerwear garments and “hoodies” are permitted in the building.
- 20 H) Heavy coats can be worn to school but must be stored in lockers after arrival.
- 21 I) Pants, jeans, leggings, shorts, skirts, or dresses are permitted.
- 22 J) Pants, jeans, leggings, shorts, skirts must be worn at the waist without “sagging”.
- 23 K) Holes (4) inches from the top of the knee must have a patch under the hole.
- 24 L) Shorts, dresses, skirts, and skorts should not be shorter than (4) inches from the top of the knee.
- 25 M) Leggings may be worn if the shirt, shorts, skirt, pants, jeans, or skorts worn with them cover at
 26 least (4) inches from the top of the knee.
- 27 N) Leisure pants, jogging pants, sweatpants, and athletic shorts are allowed. All of these must

- 32 1. The principals of individual schools may allow exceptions to the Student Dress Code for

12 ~~D. Tattoos that display drugs, alcohol or tobacco products, or gang or sex-related words or images
13 must not be visible.~~

14 ~~E. Chains and spiked accessories are not permissible. Belts may not hang down as a "tail" from the
15 belt loop.~~

16 ~~F. Head coverings and sunglasses are not to be worn.~~

17 ~~G. The wearing of jewelry in any visible piercing other than the ear is prohibited during school time
18 or school functions.~~

19 ~~H. Anything that is deemed by school administration to be a disruption in the classroom.~~

21 **A) No see through/sheer clothing is allowed.**

22 **B) Logos or manufacturers' trademarks and accessories with writing or images of substances that
23 are illegal for teens (i.e., drugs, alcohol, or tobacco products) or are gang-related or constitute
24 racial or ethnic slurs may not be worn. This prohibition applies to all school activities.**

25 **C) Tattoos that display drugs, alcohol, or tobacco products, gang or sex-related words or images
26 must not be visible.**

27 **D) Chains and spiked accessories are not permissible.**

28 **E) Head coverings (hats, bandanas, toboggans, etc.) are not allowed.**

29 **F) Hoods on "hoodies" cannot be worn on the head inside the school building.**

30 **G) Sunglasses are not allowed.**

31 **H) The wearing of jewelry in any visible piercing other than the ear and nose is prohibited during
32 school time or school functions.**

33 **I) Heavy outerwear may not be worn during the school day inside the building.**

39 **IV. III. COMPLIANCE**

1 *School administrators and teachers are encouraged to use positive reinforcement to obtain*
2 *compliance with dress code requirements. However, **When** a student fails to comply with the dress*
3 *code, discipline is appropriate. The following discipline procedures will apply:*

- 6 1. A student whose clothing or accessories violate the Student Dress Code shall be referred

20 Schools will provide reasonable accommodation to students whose religious beliefs, medical
21 condition or disability requires special clothing.

22 To request such accommodation:

- 23 • Parents must obtain a copy of this policy and an exemption form from their school. The
- 24 exemption form must be completed by the parent and returned to the school. The school will
- 25 forward this information to Supervisor of Student Services.
- 26 • The Supervisor of Student Services will review the exemption request. The parent will be
- 27 notified in writing of the status of the request within ten (10) days.
- 28 • To appeal, the parent may request a meeting with the Supervisor of Student Services. Based
- 29 upon the outcome of that meeting, the Supervisor of Student Services will notify the parent in
- 30 writing of the status of the request within five (5) days.
- 31 • A further appeal may be made to the Superintendent of Schools pursuant to Policy 6.305-
- 32 *Complaints & Grievances.*

33 School system or campus personnel will not discriminate against any student who has been exempted
34 from the mandatory compliance with the standard dress code because of objections based on
35 religious, medical or disability needs.
