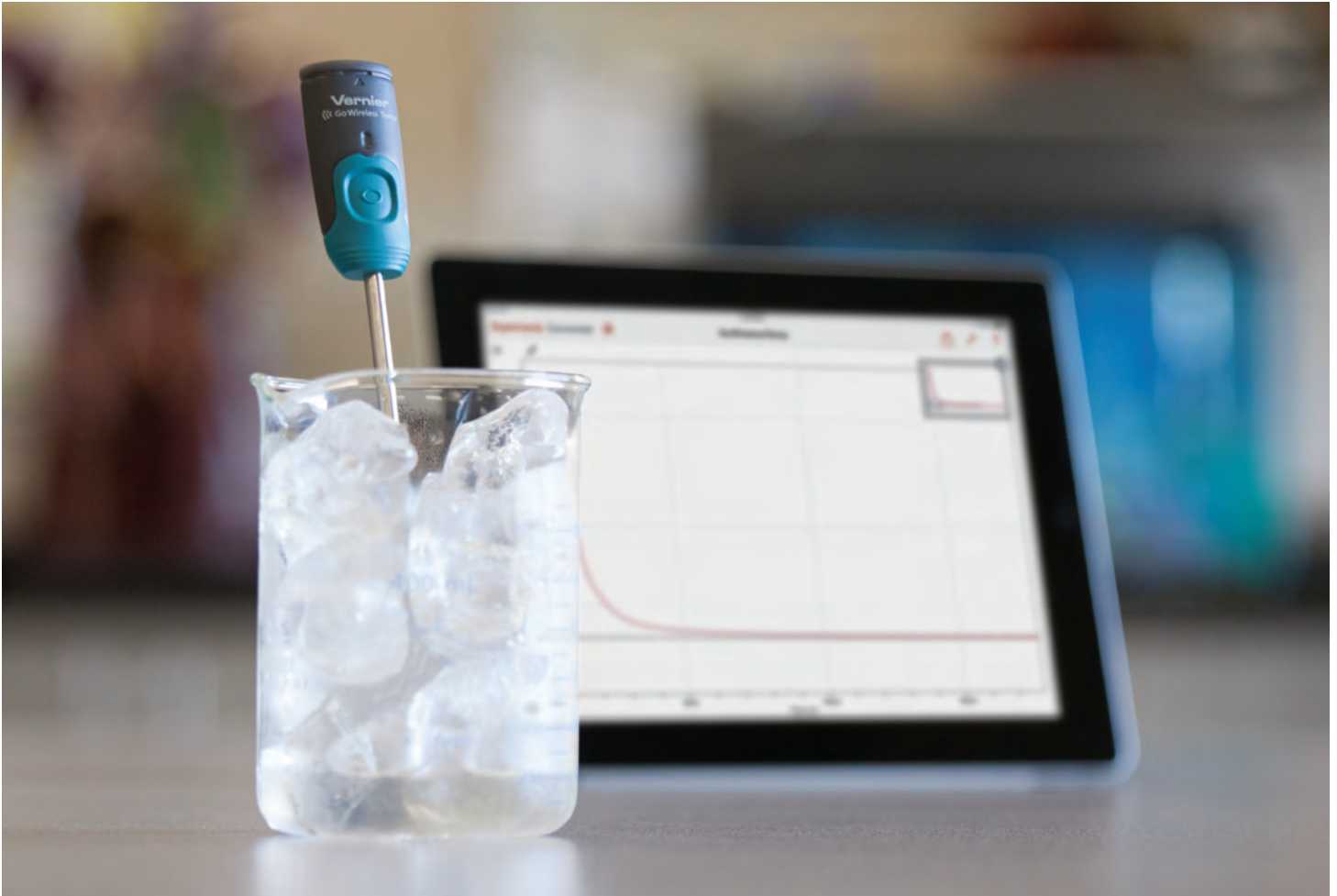

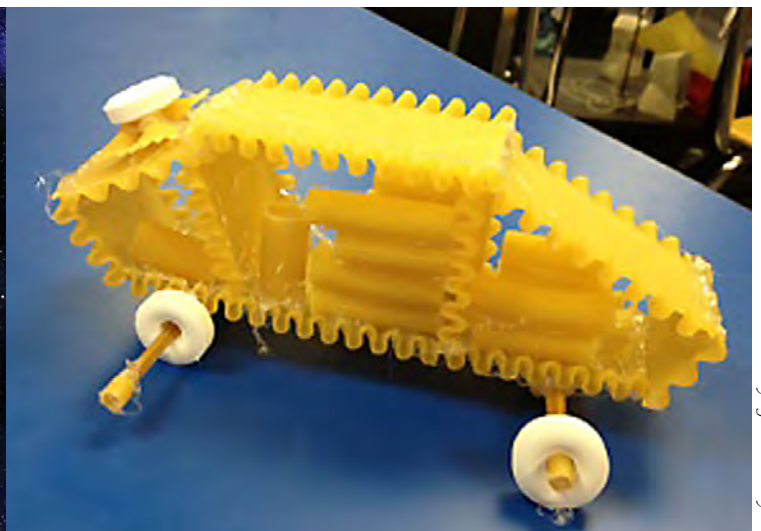

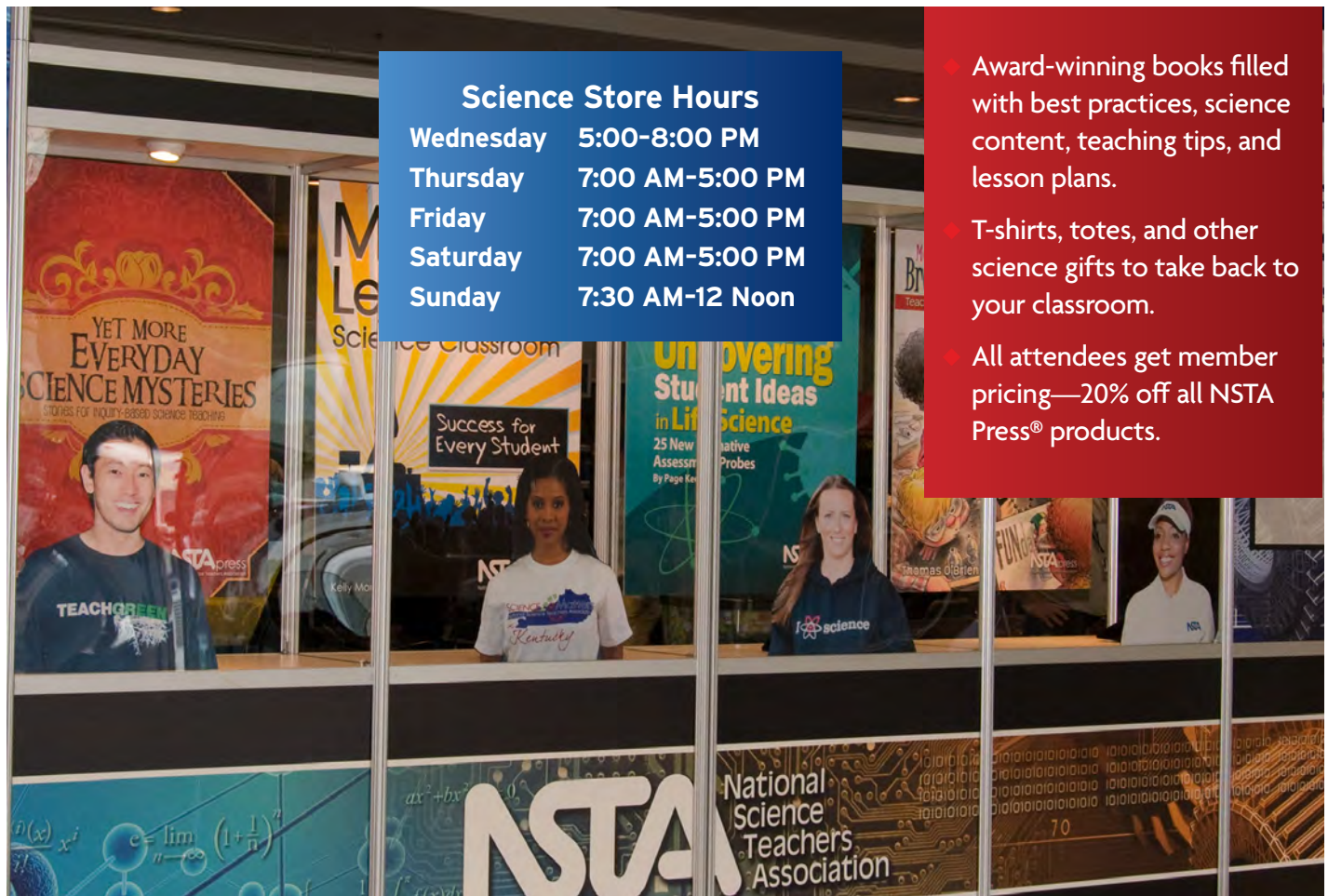

Wood River Elementary and East Elementary

Purpose: To provide extended reading development and increase math skills for at risk students that are entering first, second, and third grade. The extended summer services will provide an early start prior to the beginning of the 2014-2015 school year.

Objective: To reduce academic regression and increase grade level skills with the at risk students, specifically in the areas of reading and math.

Curriculum Focus: Phonemic awareness, vocabulary development, reading comprehension, fluency, guided reading, and writing and grade level math skills. **There will be academic criteria as well as pre and post-screeners to review progress for each child.**

Students Served: Each teacher will serve 10 students. Each campus will have (1 teacher at kinder, 2 at first, 2 at second grade, and 2 at third grade) (7 teachers per campus (x 2=14 total)). (A total of 70 at risk students being served per campus, 140 total amongst East and WR).

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

On October 10, 2011, the Board approved the construction of a covered batting cage at the baseball field. The baseball booster club raised additional money, and paid for finishing out a portion of the building for coach's office and locker room. Both baseball and softball have portable sheds that are used for lawn equipment, and tool storage; both sheds are in poor repair and need replacing.
