Regular May Meeting – Time Moves To 8 PM

Note that next month (May), the start time for our regular meetings will adjust back to 8 PM.

March 26th School Cancellation

You'll remember that school was cancelled on Tuesday, March 26th. The decision to cancel school was due to icy conditions across the district. These conditions impacted roads, parking lots, sidewalks, approaches, etc. A cancellation was utilized instead of a late start because it was felt that conditions during late-start travel window (9 AM – 10 AM) would not be materially safer than the normal travel window when looking at forecasted temperatures, etc. during the early morning hours of March 26th.

The March 26th cancellation will not impact the last day of school which is still scheduled to be Friday, May 17th (with an early 11:30 AM dismissal on that last day).

Legislative Items

The Legislature has completed 56 of the 60 days this session – they adjourned on Friday and will resume the session on Tuesday, April 9th. Days 57, 58, and 59 are scheduled for the week of April 8th. The final day (Day 60) is scheduled for Thursday, April 18th.

LB 388 and LB1331 are two bills of interest. LB388 ties a number of items together including caps on previously excluded political subdivisions and a sales tax increase. LB1331 is intended to provide additional state funds to schools through two components – increasing foundation aid (new this past year) and front loading 1107 tax credit money through the TEEOSA formula. LB388 is running into a variety of problems (opposition to the sales tax component, revising technical errors, etc.). They have been often paired together at LB388 is said to be necessary to fund the non-1107 portion of 1331. LB1331, for however long it would actually be sustainable, would be welcome. While it would send more money to schools, its net-effect would be to fund property tax relief and not fund increased investments in education due to the mechanisms put into place last year by LB243. We'd welcome the additional aid as a means of lowering the local property tax requirement. A compromise does exist to put some of the pieces in place now and likely move both pieces forward by cutting out the sales tax components and focusing solely on the 1107 funds – for our district the 1107 piece would be greater than the foundation piece tied to the 388 funding mechanisms. Whether there is enough sense, goodwill, or sincerity to work towards this solution in the waning days is unknown at this time.

With less than a handful of days left in the session, it is difficult to say what will happen with either – although we'll continue to monitor very closely. LB388 only came out of committee (Revenue) a couple of weeks ago and LB1331 (Education) only came out committee in the last week or so. The size, scope, and impact of the concepts behind these proposals are very large. The degree of overlap with regards to the leadership and influence within the two aforementioned committees is not insignificant, I'd suggest that a more serious and sincere collection of members would have brought these measures forward well before the final 3 weeks of the legislative session. I will keep you informed.

When the legislature looks to tackle the issue of property tax dependence, the loudest narratives tend to broadly paint all schools as being problematic to the process. We certainly need to find better balance in our revenue sources for funding education, but it is not an honest argument to paint schools in general as being the source of the problem. It becomes doubly concerning when some of the legislators suggest that our smaller, rural schools are not only efficient financially but also underperforming academically – therefore they should be pushed towards consolidation, across the board. These narratives were again prevalent in the floor debate on LB388. I did correspond with a few senators last week and shared with them some of the factual numbers that exist with regard to our district that directly counter that narrative – both in terms of taxing, spending, and academic performance. Some of the financial information that I shared with the senators that I reached out to is attached to my report.

Heartland Robotics Teams – Successful Again At US Open Event

For the second consecutive year the Heartland Robotics Team competed in the US Open Robotics Tournament in Council Bluffs, IA. For the second consecutive year our team returned with Top 10 performances.

Last year, only our top team competed in the tournament. This year we entered 3 teams (9 students) in the tournament as separate teams. A total of 26 teams were entered in the competition.

- In the Match Play / Alliance Competition our 3 teams finished 2nd, 3rd, and 5th respectively.
- In the Skills Competition our 3 teams finished 5th, 9th, and 10th respectively.

We're very proud of our teams for the incredible year of competition that they've had this year. Next month, at the May meeting, we'll have the group speak to the Board about their experiences this year and at the US Open event.

Heartland Quiz Bowl Team – Southern Nebraska Conference Champions

Our HS quiz bowl team participated in the Conference quiz bowl competition on March 18th. Our team came home from the competition as Conference champions – this is the first championship for our quiz bowl team since the Conference began the competition in 2012.

Our quiz bowl team also won the ESU 6 quiz bowl competition in Seward on February 22nd.

Congratulations to our students and teams on an outstanding showing at this year's quiz bowl competitions for their outstanding accomplishments.

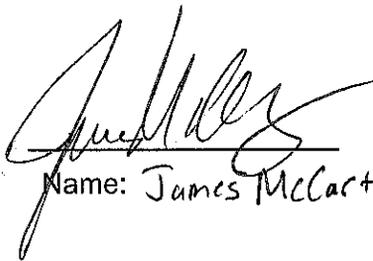

This agreement is made by and between the Heartland Community Schools, District No. 0096 in the County of York, in the state of Nebraska, hereinafter referred to as the District and **Karma Yantzie**, hereinafter referred to as the Employee.

1. The terms hereinafter enumerated in this contract shall take effect on August 1, 2024.
2. The salary of the Employee shall be payable in equal installments. The first installment shall be payable on or about the 20th day of September and the remaining installments shall be payable on or about the 20th day of each month thereafter.

Future amendments or additions to indexed salary resulting from extra duty assignment or allowable advancement shall established through written memoranda of understanding and attached hereto.

3. The Employee hereby agrees to be governed by the policies of the Board of Education of the District and the duties to be performed by the Employee under this contract shall be subject to assignment of the Superintendent of the District.
4. The Employee agrees to devote full time, during days of employment, to his/her position in all respects, to diligently and faithfully perform the assigned duties to the best of his/her professional ability.
5. In addition to the duties set forth herein, the Employee may be assigned such "extra duty" assignments as defined from time to time by the parties of this agreement which shall be upon such terms and conditions and at such additional stated rate of compensation as outlined in the collective bargaining agreement or between the parties of this agreement.
6. This contract may be cancelled or amended by a majority of the members of the school board during the school year for any of the following reasons: (a) upon cancellation, termination, revocation or suspension of the professional certificate or licensure by the State Board of Education; (b) breach of any of the material provisions of this contract; (c) for any reason set forth in this contract; (d) incompetence; (e) neglect of duty; (f) unprofessional conduct; (g) insubordination; (h) immorality, or (i) physical or mental incapacity. Cancellation or amendment under this contract shall be governed by the provisions of 79-12, 110, R.R.S. (1982 Supp.)
7. That upon the termination of this contract for just cause, or upon the release of the Employee from this contract, the compensation paid or to be paid hereunder shall be an amount that bears the same ratio to the yearly salary herein specified as the number of days of service to the date of such termination bears to 185 days of service. Any unearned fractional portion of an installment paid, but not earned prior to termination of the contract, shall be refunded by the Employee.

8. There shall be no penalty for release or resignation by the Employee from this contract, provided no resignation shall become effective until the close of the school year unless accepted by the Board of Education of the District, and the Board shall fix the time at which the resignation is to take effect.
9. This contract shall conform to the regulations governing deductions from the above stated compensation with reference to withholding tax, social security, and Employee's retirement. Other deductions may be withheld as agreed to by the parties to this contract.
10. The Employee hereby affirms that he/she is not under contract with another Board of Education within the state of Nebraska during the term(s) of employment covered by this contract.
11. It is understood and agreed that this contract is not valid until the Employee's professional certificate is registered in the office of the Superintendent and that the Employee shall not be compensated for any services performed prior to the date of registration of this certificate.
12. Terms and conditions set forth in this agreement shall be subject to such wages and conditions of employment as may, from time to time, be mutually agreed upon by and between the Board and Employees or a duly recognized collective bargaining agent for said Employees, and said agreement, when reduced to writing, and executed by the parties, shall be deemed to be included herein by reference and shall become a part hereof.
13. Hereafter, renewal, amendment, termination, or cancellation of this agreement shall be subject to the requirements of Section 79-824 through 79-842 R.R.S. and any other applicable state statutes.

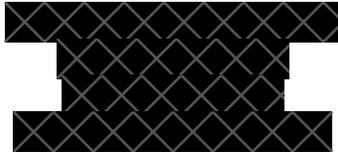

Safe Return to School Plan

Approved: August 9, 2021

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General Information

(Pursuant to the Federal American Rescue Plan)

On March 11, 2021, President Biden signed the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act of 2021, Public Law. The ARP Act includes nearly \$122 billion for the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER III) Fund that allows state and local education agencies (LEAs) to take additional steps for continued safe in-person instruction and to address unfinished teaching and learning to mitigate the COVID-19 pandemic. The ARP Act requires each school district that receives ARP ESSER funds to develop and make publicly available on the school district's website, no later than 30 days after receiving ARP ESSER funds, a plan for the safe return to in-person instruction, and continuity of services for all schools (Safe Return Plan). The ARP Act further requires that the district seek public comment on the Safe Return Plan and take those comments into account in finalization of the Safe Return Plan. A school district must periodically, but no less frequently than every six months through September 30, 2023, review and, as appropriate, revise its Safe Return Plan.

Please Note: The district plans to operate in a traditional learning environment during the 2022-2023 school year unless there is a state or federal mandate that requires school districts to implement the protocols listed below. If a widespread COVID-19 outbreak were to occur amongst students and/or staff, the administration and school board would look to implement some or all of the safety protocols listed below for a short timeframe (1 to 10 consecutive days that school is in session).

Wearing of Masks

Masks may become required if there is a state or federal mandate that requires school districts to implement Universal & Correct Wearing of Masks, if there is a COVID outbreak amongst our student/staff population, or if a student has been exposed to COVID. If a COVID outbreak were to occur, the administration and school board would also look to implement some or all of the safety protocols listed below, including closure for a short timeframe (1 to 10 consecutive days that school is in session). If a student has been known to be exposed to COVID, the student will be subject to protocols as identified by the CDC, the state of Nebraska and/or the local health district, which may include the wearing of a mask and monitoring symptoms for a specific number of days.

Modifying Facilities to Allow for Physical Distancing

All students and staff may need to follow social distancing guidelines whenever possible.

Cleaning & Maintaining Healthy Facilities (Including Improving Ventilation)

The following essential actions will be taken to ensure that the facilities are safe for students and staff to inhabit. The district will:

- Change air filters regularly.
- Post signage about frequent hand washing, cough etiquette, and nose blowing. Signage will be widely posted, disseminated, and encouraged through various methods of communication.
- Follow guidance from the CDC when performing all cleaning related duties.

Contact Tracing (Isolation & Quarantine)

The district will follow the contact tracing (Isolation & Quarantine) guidelines from the CDC, Public Health Solutions, and the state of Nebraska during the 2022-2023 school year.

Diagnostic

Students that are ill are asked to stay at home until they are well. Any student with a fever of 100.4°F or higher (or if the student is displaying other signs of illness) will need to stay home for up to 24 hours.

Efforts to Provide Vaccinations to School Communities

The administration will work with Four Corners Public Health Department (our local health district) to inform patrons about local vaccination clinics in our region and will coordinate with Four Corners Public Health Department in an effort make reasonably available the use of Heartland facilities to provide vaccinations to the extent that such efforts do not materially impact operations or safety.

Accommodations for Children with Disabilities

Students qualifying for extra support through an IEP or through a 504 plan will continue to receive services and support according to their plans throughout the 2022-2023 school year. Accommodations, modifications, and related services will be provided as outlined in a student's plan during in-person learning.

Continuity of Services

The district has invested in technology for all PK-12 students and provided our teachers with remote learning trainings to ensure continuity of instruction will still occur should in-person learning not be possible due to a COVID-19 outbreak. In addition, students will continue to be provided accommodations as stated in their IEP or 504 plans during remote learning. Parent input will be sought to develop a plan for the provision of remote IEP services and student progress will be reviewed by the student's team when in-person learning resumes.

In the event of a COVID-19 outbreak, regular communication, using all available modalities, with students will be required of administrators and teachers to ensure the safety, academic engagement, and wellness of students. If in-person instruction is not possible, breakfast and lunch may be provided to students through a USDA approved system. School counselors and mental health support staff will be available online by appointment for any students or staff in need of assistance.

Closures

It is possible that there may yet be some unforeseen circumstances that are encountered this school year concerning the COVID-19 pandemic, but the district's plan is to operate in a more traditional learning environment during the 2022-2023 school year. Closures longer than a few days in line with guidelines stated above will be at the discretion of the Governor, the Nebraska Department of Education, local health officials, or by action of the school board.

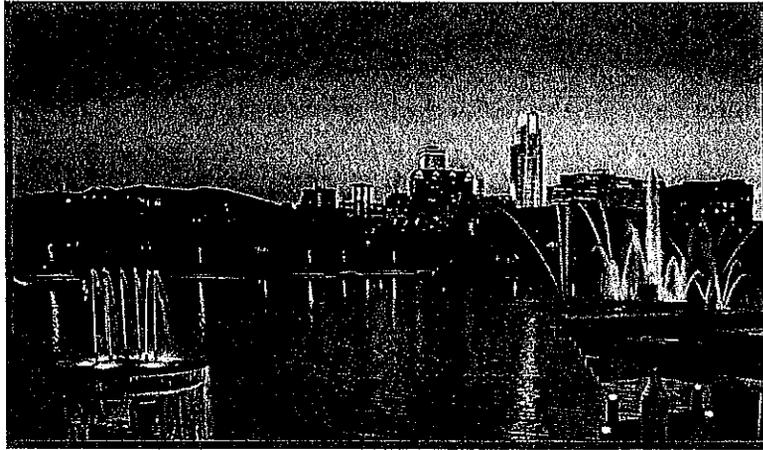
