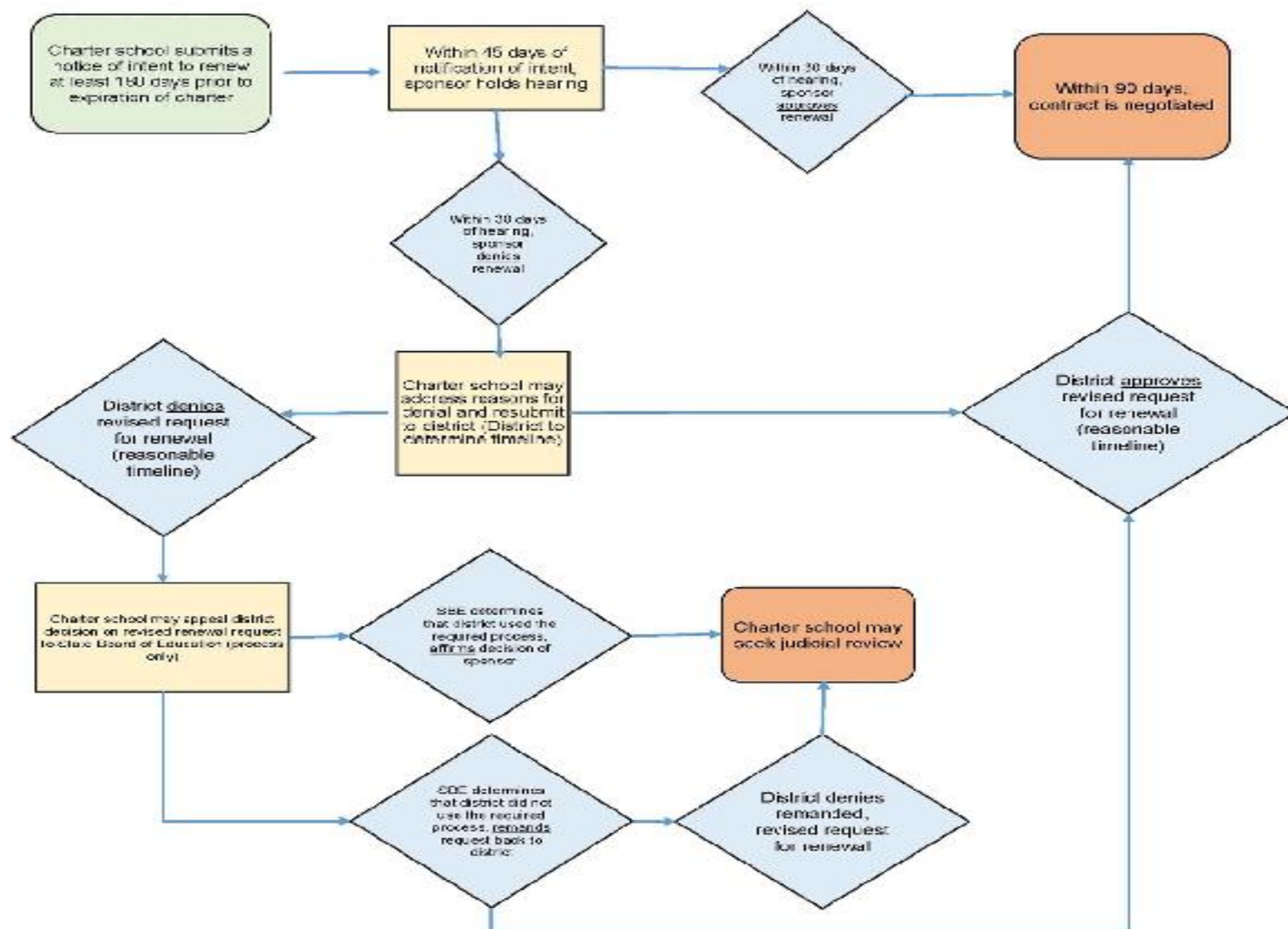

Renewal

Receive charter renewal requests	Negotiate a new contract within 90 days of renewal decision
Hold public hearing regarding renewal within 45 days	Approve or disapprove any remanded denied renewals
Approve renewal or state reasons for denial within 30 days of hearing	

Renewal criteria in statute: ORS 338.065

- ▶ (A) Is in compliance with this chapter and all other applicable state and federal laws;
 - ▶ (B) Is in compliance with the charter of the public charter school;
 - ▶ (C) Is meeting or working toward meeting the student performance goals and agreements specified in the charter or any other written agreements between the sponsor and the public charter school governing body;
 - ▶ (D) Is fiscally stable and has used the sound financial management system described in the proposal submitted under ORS 338.045 and incorporated into the written charter under this section; and
 - ▶ (E) Is in compliance with any renewal criteria specified in the charter of the public charter school.
-
- ▶ (b) The sponsor shall base the renewal evaluation described in paragraph (a) of this subsection primarily on a review of the public charter school's annual performance reports, annual audit of accounts and annual site visit and review as required by ORS 338.095 and any other information mutually agreed upon by the public charter school governing body and the sponsor.

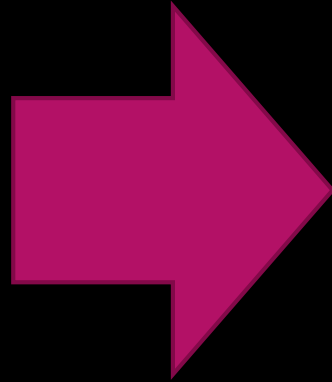

Corvallis Public Schools Foundation Update

Background

The Corvallis Public Schools Foundation supports local k-12 schools and inspires a lifetime of learning in all students. Our major areas of focus are **reducing barriers** to education, **creating pathways** to graduation, and **expanding excellence** through enrichment.

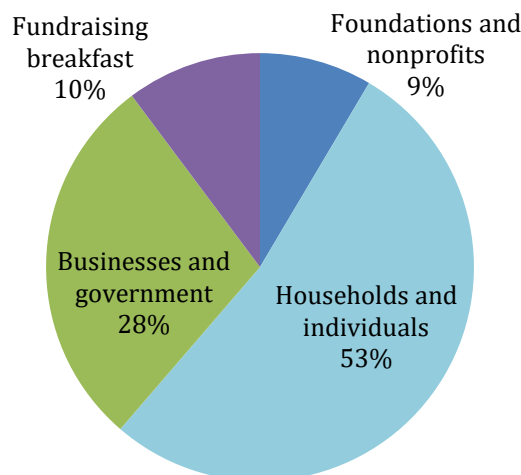
The Foundation has a staff of 1.6 FTE (full-time equivalent) and a Board of Trustees made up of 14 community members. We have monthly board meetings and four committees: Finance, Governance, Grants and Scholarships, and Development.

2017-18 Financial Overview

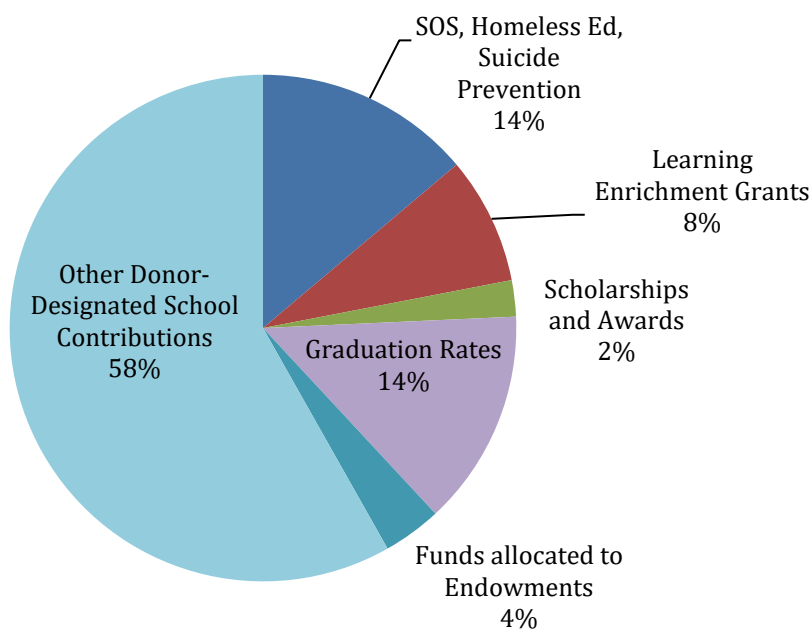
In the past three years, we have more than tripled our fundraising, doubled our endowed funds, and increased our net assets by 45 percent. Our assets total \$1,523,402 (\$213,398 in cash and \$1,310,004 in investments). We have no liabilities. Our assets are distributed in the following manner:

- Unrestricted, \$306,971
- Temporarily restricted, \$576,965
- Permanently restricted, \$639,466

Total contributions received during the 2017-18 fiscal year were \$704,451.



Major allocations during the 2017-18 fiscal year totaled \$502,681.

Student Profile I: Students Served & Demographics (Excluding Kindergarten)

- 360 unique students served
- 36% students of color
- 24% students with disabilities
- 45% students navigating poverty (includes 14 students experiencing homelessness)
- 10% multilingual students (11 languages represented)

Elementary boost

11 students in grades 1-3 participated in a two-week program hosted at Wilson.

Middle school math

70 fifth graders participated in 2-week programs hosted at Cheldelin and Linus Pauling to help them prepare for middle school math classes.

Middle School Women of the Woods: Woodshop Palooza

62 sixth grade girls experienced a hands-on afterschool wood shop camp for one week at CHS and CVHS to introduce them to STEM education and help them feel more comfortable choosing STEM courses as electives.



High school programs

High school offerings included the following major categories:

- Programs designed to cover entire course content (credit recovery)
- Programs designed to allow extra time to finish course requirements for credit
- A credit-bearing program for emerging bilinguals
- Programs for math and writing Essential Skills
- AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination)

Twenty-three students participated in more than one high school program.

158 students participated in 184 credit-bearing opportunities, earning a total of 156 half-credits.

Essential Skills

Eleven juniors participated in a three-day program after school was out in June. Four students completed their Math essential skill requirement, three students partially completed the Writing essential skill, and one student used the opportunity to finish an English credit requirement.



Graduation Impact

Of the 13 senior participants:

- 2 graduated as a result of the summer programs
- 8 are continuing enrollment in 18-19

AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination)

Forty-seven eighth grade students participated in 2-day camps hosted at Corvallis High School (27) and Crescent Valley High School (20).

Student Profile II: Kindergarten students served

Unlike the other summer program demographics, which are based on 2017-18 data, the following counts are based on incoming kindergartners and their 2018-19 data, as of September 27, 2018. The purpose of the Academy was to provide an early start with an emphasis on social and emotional learning. Kindergarten Academy was located at five schools but also drew students who eventually enrolled at other district schools or moved away.

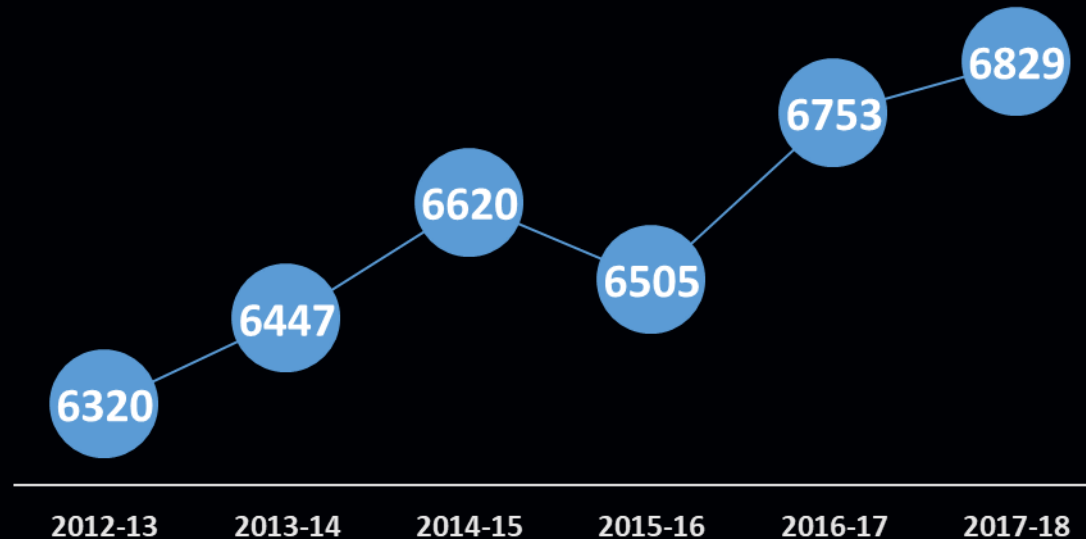

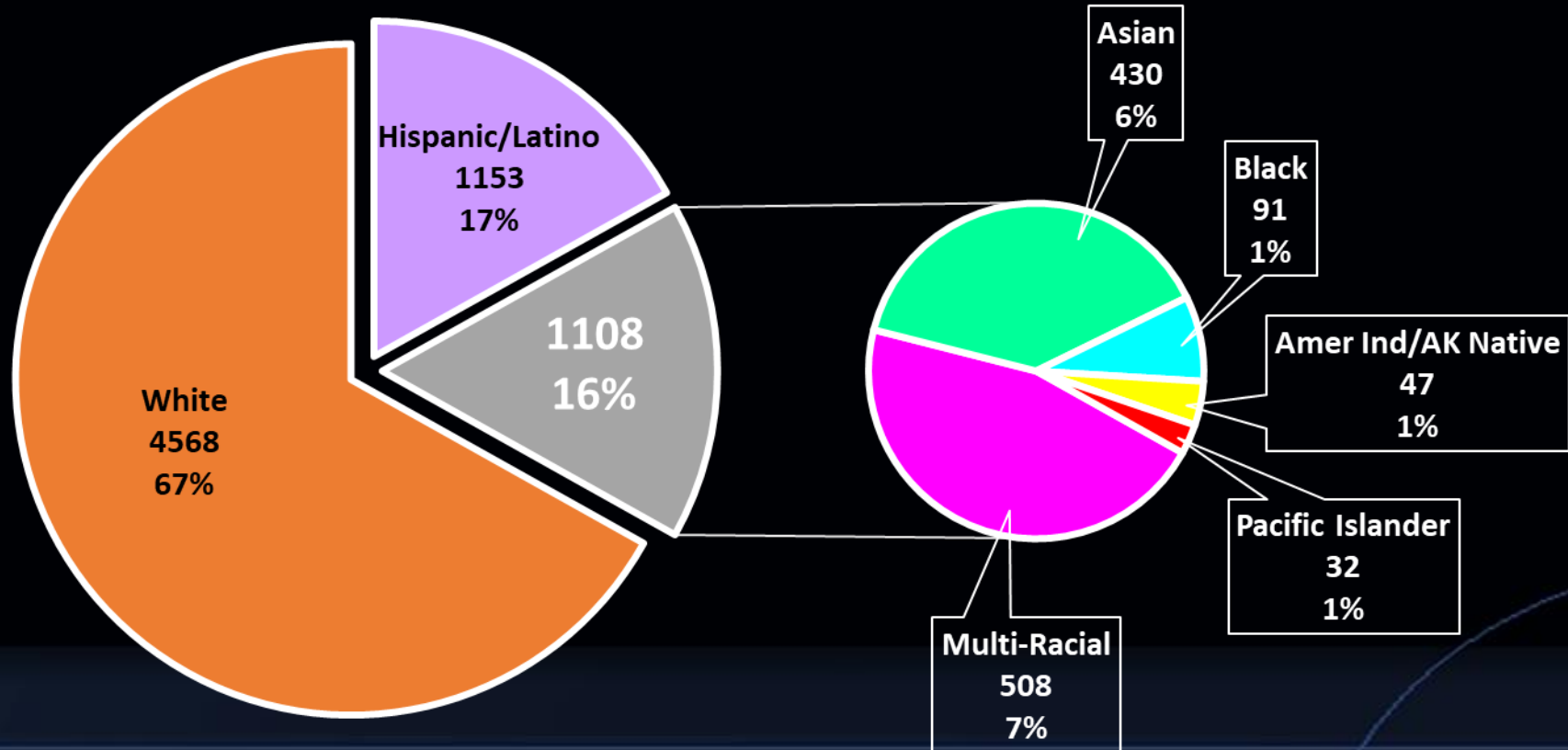
District Demographics :: 2017-18 Enrollment

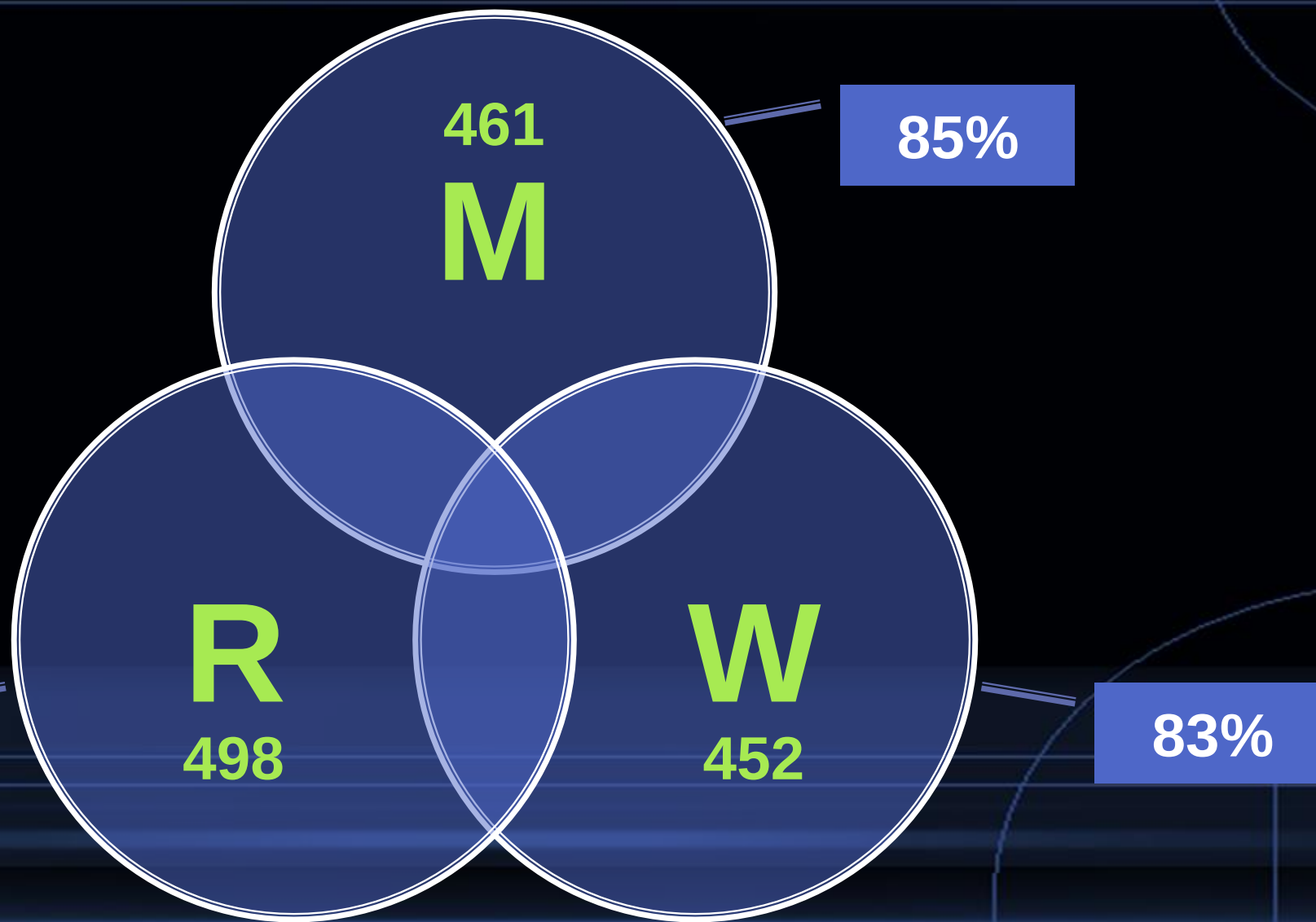

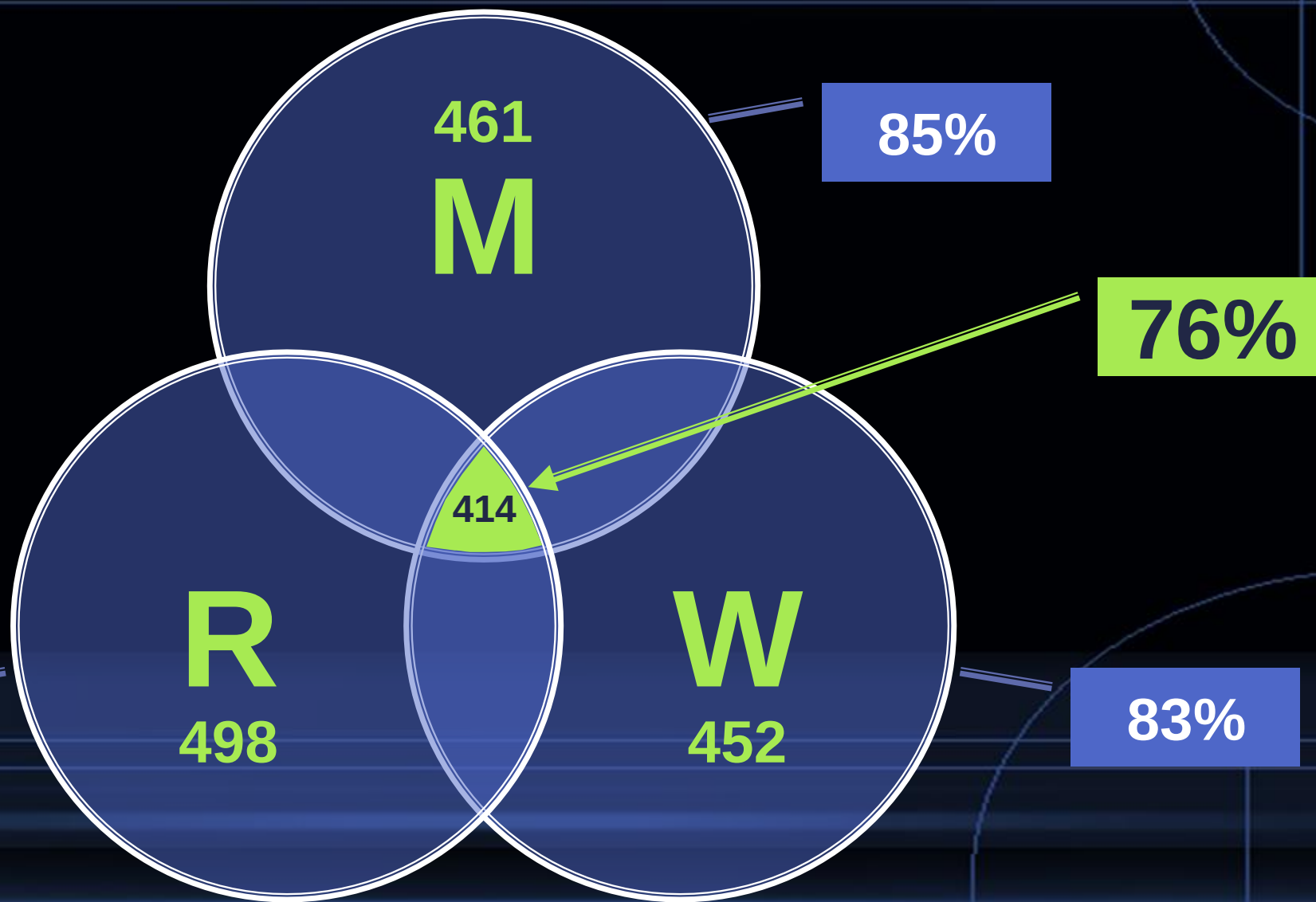

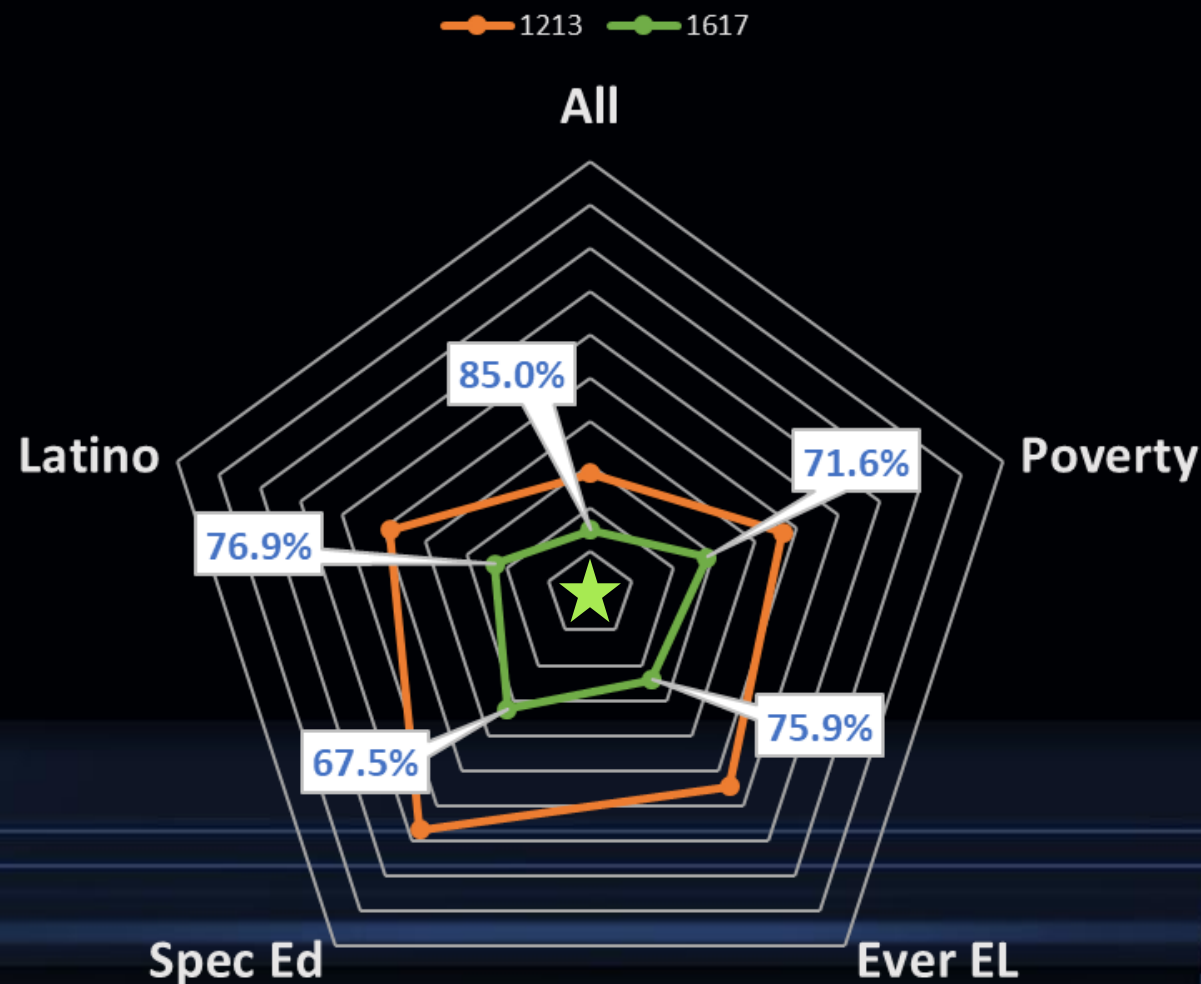

% of Graduates Enrolled in Post-Secondary Immediately After High School

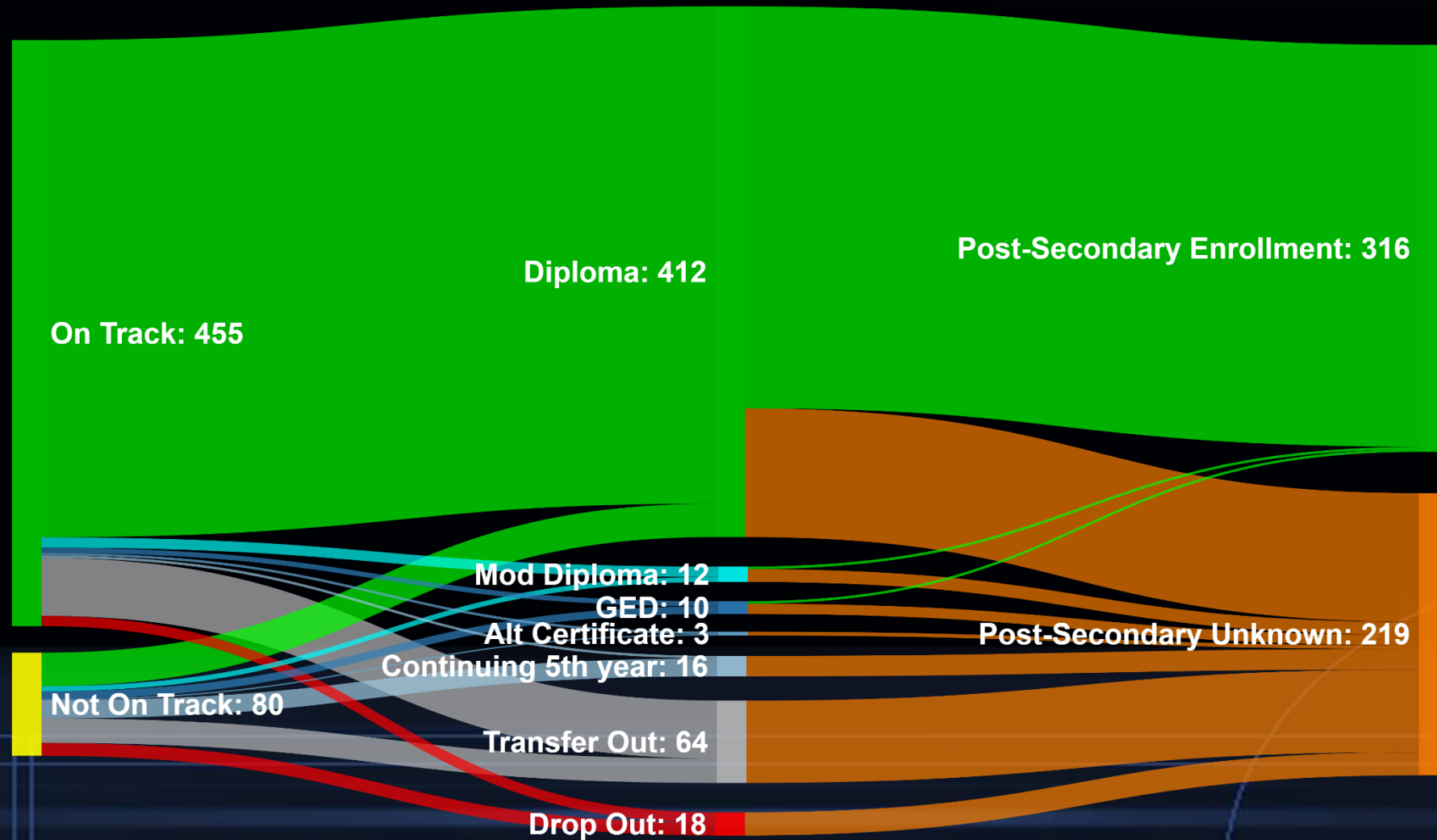

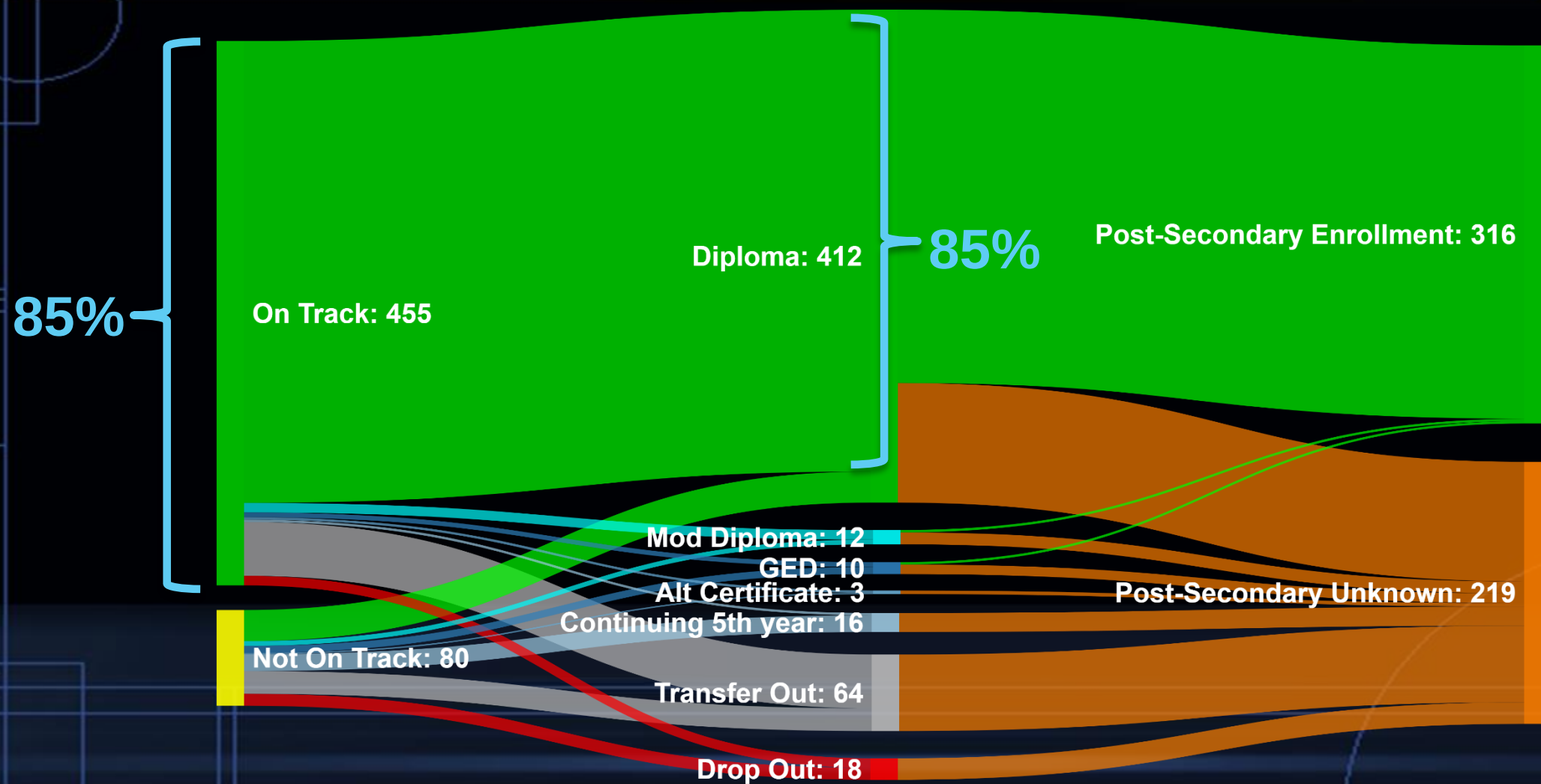

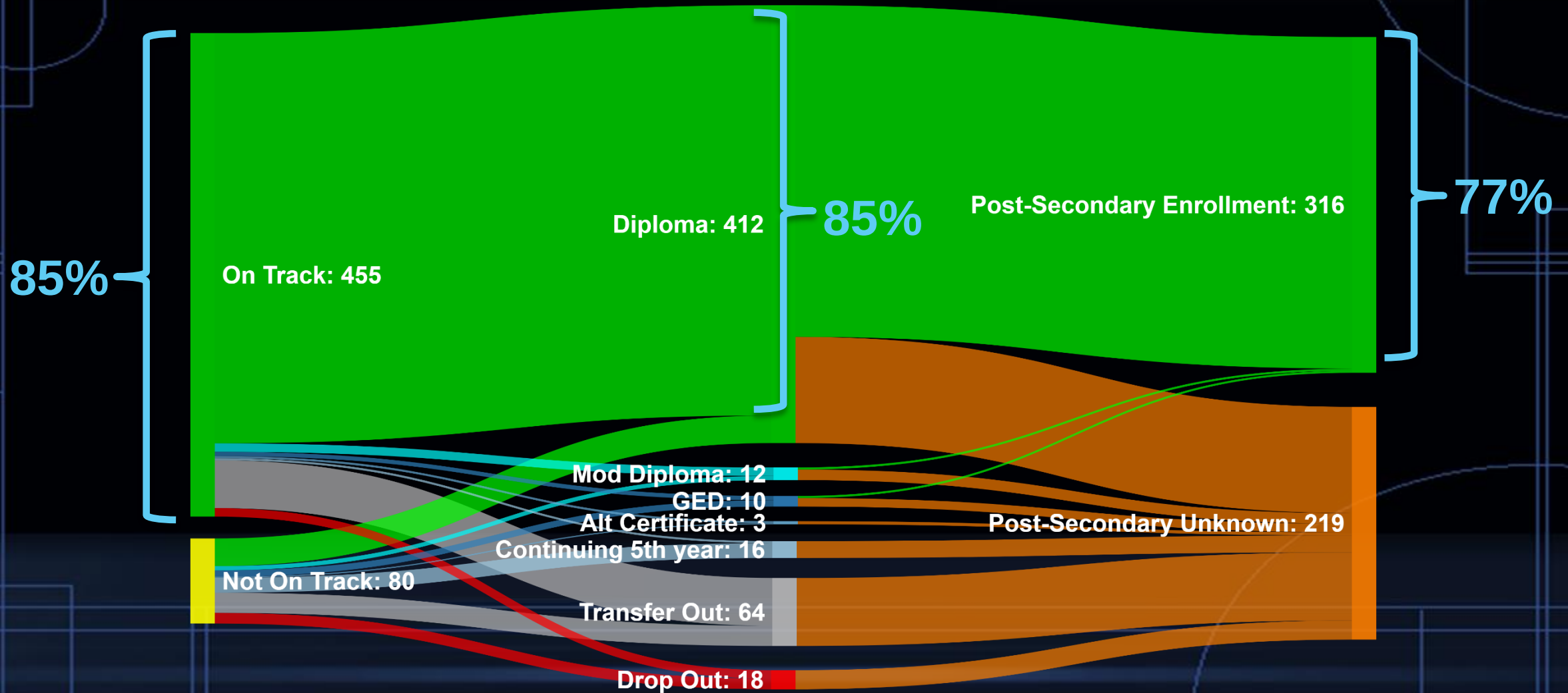

Resolution No. 18 - 1001 - Statement of Opposition to Oregon Ballot Measure 105: Repeal of Sanctuary State Law

ACTION REQUESTED

Background

On December 5th, 2016 the Corvallis School Board adopted Resolution No. 16-1201 – Rights of Undocumented Students and Protocols for Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Access to Schools, which clearly delineated the role that the district plays with regard to immigration law enforcement, how district staff are to interact with law enforcement officials, and directed the superintendent to communicate guidelines for compliance by staff. Resolution No. 16-1201 was reaffirmed by the Board on September 28th, 2017, and is aligned with Oregon's Sanctuary Law (ORS 181A.820) that was enacted in 1987. Measure 105 will repeal Oregon's Sanctuary Law if approved by voters in the midterm election on November 6th, 2018. It is permissible for school boards to opine on state-level policies with the stipulation that such action does not use public resources beyond the simple administration of board meetings.

**STATEMENT OF OPPOSITION TO OREGON BALLOT MEASURE 105: REPEAL OF
SANCTUARY STATE LAW**

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the Corvallis 509J School District believe diversity makes our country stronger — it's part of what defines our nation.

WHEREAS, since 1982, Supreme Court precedent (*Plyler v. Doe*, 457 U.S. 202) has required equal access to public education for all children, including those who are undocumented or come from families with members who are undocumented.

WHEREAS, immigrants living in Corvallis are part of our families, communities, workplaces, and schools.

WHEREAS, we believe in fairness, looking out for each other, and treating others as one would hope to be treated. Schools should welcome others, including those who may seem to be different, and build bridges of understanding. We are committed to the success and safety of every student who attends our district's schools.

WHEREAS, measure 105 is in violation of these values because it would repeal Oregon's sanctuary law.

WHEREAS, measure 105 would make us less safe. Trust is the foundation of good education and policing. People in Oregon, especially children, should feel secure when reaching out to public institutions, including schools and law enforcement.

WHEREAS, state and local government already face a tight budgets, including the Corvallis School District. Taxpayer money should not be spent doing the job of federal immigration agents.

LET IT BE RESOLVED, that the Corvallis School Board OPPOSES Measure 105.

ADOPTED, by the Board of Directors of the Corvallis School District 509J, Benton and Linn Counties, Oregon this 25th day of October, 2018.
