## BOE Meeting

3. Public Open Forum
  - 3.1 Recognition of Visitors – Vice-President Schmitt and Dr. Stirn welcomed guests.
  - 3.2 Public Comment – Comments were received from students, parents and community members. Comments were related to the release of a probationary teacher, the expansion of the high school, the high school schedule for 2016-2017 and Maxxum, a proposed alcohol and drug residential treatment facility located on the Glenwood property.
  - 3.4 Correspondence and Recognition –A thank you card was received from Carol Gallois for the sympathy flowers sent on behalf of the board on loss of her mother.
- 4.0 Action Items
  - 4.1 Consent Agenda – Dr. Stirn – The last impact check received was the day after the January board meeting for nine (9) homes in the amount of \$65,150.13 and \$4,818.78 in transition fees. Dr. Stirn also reviewed the revenues and expenditures with the board. All revenues and expenditures are within the budgeted amounts.
  - 4.2 Early Childhood Blended Learning –The proposal for expanding the early childhood blended learning program (classroom with a blend of special education and regular education students) was presented in January. Director Potsic’s proposal includes increasing the number of blended classes up to eight (8) sections and decreases the early education classes to two (2) sections. Currently, the district houses eight (8) sections of early childhood rooms and two (2) sections of blended classrooms. Parents opting into the blended program will need to provide their own transportation for the regular education students and pay a monthly tuition fee of \$250.00 along with the \$50.00 registration fee.
  - 4.3 Approve Memorandum of Understanding between the Central Education Association and Board of Education to replace Section 6.2 Pregnancy and Parental Leave in the collective bargaining agreement. - No action was taken, the item was tabled to the March board meeting to allow time to review the changes in the section.
  - 4.5 Approve Memorandum of Understanding between the Central Education Association and Board of Education to replace Section 6.4 Sick Bank in the collective bargaining agreement. – The memorandum of understanding replaces the old language, provided protection to the district and removes the superintendent from the process of granting or denying sick bank access.
  - 4.6 Approve Memorandum of Understanding between the Central Education Association and Board of Education to replace Section 5.7 Step III Grievance in the collective bargaining agreement. The memorandum of understanding cleans up the steps in the grievance process (step II was missing). Step III consists of a meeting with the board, Step II is a meeting with administration.
  - 4.7 Approve Lunch Prices for 2016-2017- The federal government mandates district lunch prices that participate in the National School Lunch Program. District 301 is complying with the mandate by increasing student lunch fees five cents and staff lunch prices will increase ten cents.

- 4.8 Approve Baseball Overnight Trip – The boys baseball team will travel via coach bus to the Ripkin tournament in Myrtle Beach South Carolina over spring break. All expenses are paid by the baseball players.
- 4.9 Approve Band Overnight Trip – The CHS band will travel to Nashville, Tennessee to tour Belmont University and several music related venues.
- 4.10 Approve Wrestling Overnight Trip – This overnight trip allowed our wrestling team to compete in the sectional competition. One wrestler will now go to Champaign Illinois to compete in the State competition.
- 5.0 Information Reports
- 5.1 Committee Reports – CCC -Discussions included an update on the K-5 pilot program “Words Their Way”, teachers are happy with the program and would like to use it next school year with additional PGAP training. The CCC is considering getting more involved in the professional development of teachers. PGAP surveys have been sent to staff. Work continues on the purpose of CCC. Considerations include becoming more involved in how the curricular decisions affect staff how to assist them. The members of CCC would like to be more involved in technology decisions mainly when using technology in the classroom. Teachers are interested in looking at programs to teach keyboarding in the lower grades.
- DLT – The work with focus groups and the high school expansion project was discussed. The DLT reviewed and discussed the 5essentials survey results and discussed our district P-20 priorities., success by 6, 3 by 3, algebra readiness in 8<sup>th</sup> grade and access to honors and AP classes.
- Foundation – The Trivia event will be November 12, 2016 at the Elgin Riverboat. A new fundraiser will occur in 2017. The new event will be Pizza Palooza, a family activity/fundraiser. They are still looking for ways to utilize funds, possibly a college prep class to prepare students for college entrance exams.
- 5.2 WYSE Team Competition Results – The WYSE Team won 1<sup>st</sup> place at the Regional competition and the team has been highlighted in the Chicago Tribune. The team will compete in the State competition in March.
- 5.3 Expansion Options for CHS – Stephen Nelson and John McNutt brought sample materials for a pre-engineered structure, the sport floors, copies of the finish board of the color palate from the 2010 plans. Steve also shared a power-point of an updated site plan. The project would have a lead-time of approximately 8-9 months. Dr. Stirn met with the City of Elgin Development Committee, based on that conversation the Focus Group will reconvene in March. The expansion project dates back to 2009, additional funds were not available due annual land payments for 135 acres that was previously purchased. The land is now paid for which allows the impact and transition fees be used to pay off debt certificates. Debt Service Extension Bonds could also be issued to help finance construction.
- 5.4 5essentials – Assistant Superintendent Mongan reviewed the results from the 5essentials survey with the board and compared the results to last year. Students, parents and teacher respond to this survey. Updated feedback will be brought back in April or May.

- 5.5 Concussion Policy Update – Athletic and Activities Director Diversey reviewed the updated plan. District 301 has implemented a concussion management oversight team. This team made up of consultants (a physician, an athletic trainer and a nurse) to create policy and protocol for the management of concussions. The consultants develop policy and protocol for concussion management both in sports and in the classroom.
  - 5.6 Board Policy 4:170 Safety – This policy has been updated with some new language related to safety, rapid response, emergency drills and the training and use of the Automated External Defibrillator units.
  - 5.7 Board Policy 4:175 Convicted Child Sex Offender, Criminal Background Check and or screen; Notifications – This is a new policy that took language from the previous version of policy 4:170 and made it a stand-alone policy for dealing with convicted child sex offenders.
  - 5.8 Telephone System Refresh – Some of the district buildings have experienced lengthy phone outages due to limitations with the network. Director Smith is looking into updating the current phone system by going to a completely internet based phone system.
  - 5.9 Enrollment Report – The enrollment shows a 12 student drop at the high school due to early grads. Total enrollment is still up 11 students from the 6<sup>th</sup> day enrollment.

- 6.1 UC Rossiter requested a list of mathematics and science textbooks and the grade level the books are used. We complied with the request.
  - 6.2 Trey Cobb One Chance Illinois – requested information on a gifted and talented program. We complied with the request.
  - 6.3 Gabriella Lauricella Smart Procure Illinois requested copies of purchase orders from September 18th to present. SmartProcure FOIA's the district approximately every six months. We now have the spreadsheet set up for them to respond to their requests.

**A. Teachers Eligible for FMLA Leave**

Teachers who are eligible for FMLA leave due to the birth of a child, the placement of a child for adoption or foster care, or to care for the newborn or newly placed child within the first 12 months following birth or placement, shall be entitled to take up to sixty (60) work days of leave. All paid and unpaid leave taken for the birth of a child, the placement of a child for adoption or foster care, or to care for the newborn or newly placed child within the first 12 months following birth or placement shall run concurrent with any leave available under the Family and Medical Leave Act ("FMLA"). Additionally, if a teacher elects to take any of the sixty (60) work days of leave, and the teacher has personal paid leave days available, the teacher must use the paid leave. Leave taken for the sole purpose of caring for the newborn or newly-placed child may not be taken on an intermittent basis, unless a teacher is approved by the Administration to return to work temporarily at the beginning of the school year for orientation and start of the year activities (e.g. SIP, meeting students, setting up a classroom, preparing plans for a substitute teacher). Any such approval shall be at the Administrator's sole discretion and shall be nonprecedential and nongrievable.

During the first 12 months following the birth or placement for adoption or foster care, if a teacher has exhausted his or her FMLA leave and the teacher or his/her newborn or newly-placed child has a serious health condition, the teacher will receive an additional thirty (30) work day leave, provided that the teacher submits proper medical documentation of the serious health condition. During this leave, the teacher must use sick leave days, if available. Moreover, during this leave, the teacher may continue in the group insurance program(s) provided under this Agreement, under the same terms and conditions as before the teacher's leave began.

Upon a return from this leave, the teacher shall be entitled to return to his or her prior position or to an "equivalent" job.

**B. Teachers Not Eligible<sup>1</sup> for FMLA Leave**

Teachers who are not FMLA-eligible shall be entitled to take up to a thirty (30)

work day leave due to the birth of a child, or the placement of a child for adoption or foster care. If paid sick leave is available, it must be applied to the first thirty (30) work days of absence and any subsequent period of absence that is substantiated by medical certification.

Upon a return from this leave, the teacher shall be entitled to return to his or her prior position or to an “equivalent” job.

**C. Extended Leave**

***Paid*** - Following the exhaustion of the pregnancy and parental leave set forth in Paragraphs A & B above, nothing shall prohibit any teacher who submits proper medical documentation substantiating a medical need from using additional personal paid sick leave days (if available) consistent with the terms of use provided in 6.3(A) of this Agreement.

***Unpaid*** - In addition, after the expiration of the leave periods set forth in Paragraphs A & B above, any teacher may elect unpaid leave, for up to the balance of the academic year in which the birth or placement took place. Birth or placement that takes place during the summer shall be regarded as taking place in the following academic year.

***General Conditions*** - During the extended leave, the teacher shall be able to continue in the group insurance program(s) provided under this agreement by making advance monthly payment of the premium(s) due to the district. Teachers must provide reasonable notice to the Superintendent or designee at least 30 (thirty) days in advance of taking the leave, or as soon as practicable. Following receipt of such notice, the Superintendent or designee shall meet with the requesting teacher to determine the start and end of the leave period, to discuss the teacher’s decision whether to continue in the group insurance program(s), including any related payment schedule, and to discuss any adjustments to the teacher’s compensation to reflect the impact of the unpaid leave. Upon return from extended leave, the teacher shall be reinstated to a position in the district.

**D. Spouses Employed by the District**

If spouses are employed by the District, they may together take only 12-weeks for FMLA leave when the reason for the leave is the birth, adoption, foster placement, or first year care of a child.

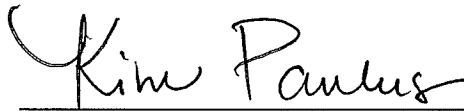
**E.** It is understood that a non-tenured teacher may be approved for a pregnancy or parental leave under the same terms and conditions applicable to a tenured teacher. However, for a school term to count toward the attainment of tenure, the non-tenured teacher must work at least one hundred twenty (120) full time employment days. A school term that is not counted toward attainment of tenure shall not be considered a break in service for purposes of determining whether the non-tenured teacher has been employed for the period of time necessary to attain

tenure, provided that the non-tenured teacher actually teaches or is otherwise present and participating in the District's educational program in the following school term.

- F. Notwithstanding any reinstatement rights within Section 6.2 to the contrary, the District reserves the right to honorably dismiss a probationary or tenured teacher in the event of a reduction in force or to non-renew a probationary teacher who is on a pregnancy or parental leave under this Section 6.2.

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## 6.2 Pregnancy and Parental Leave

### A. Teachers Eligible<sup>1</sup> for FMLA Leave

~~Teachers who are absent~~eligible for FMLA leave due to the birth or of a child, the placement of a child for adoption of their child(ren) or foster care, or to care for the newborn or newly placed child within the first 12 months following birth or placement, shall be entitled to atake up to a thirty (30)-sixty (60) work days of leave. If the teacher who gave birth requires more than a thirty (30) work day leave for medical reasons, she shall provide a certificate from her physician verifying that she is medically unable to return to work. During this leave, Teachers are required to use paid sick days, if available, and may use up to thirty (30) available paid sick leave days without a certificate from a physician. All paid and unpaid leave taken for the birth of a child, the placement of a child for adoption or foster care, or to care for the newborn or newly placed child within the first 12 months following birth or placement shall run concurrent with any leave available under the Family and Medical Leave Act ("FMLA"). Additionally, if a teacher elects to take any of the sixty (60) work days of leave, and the teacher has personal paid leave days available, the teacher must use the paid leave. Leave taken for the sole purpose of caring for the newborn or newly-placed child may not be taken on an intermittent basis, unless a teacher is approved by the Administration to return to work temporarily at the beginning of the school year for orientation and start of the year activities (e.g. SIP, meeting students, setting up a classroom, preparing plans for a substitute teacher). Any such approval shall be at the Administrator's sole discretion and shall be nonprecedential and nongrievable.

~~If a teacher is eligible for FMLA leave, the leave time taken under this Section shall be deducted from the teacher's FMLA entitlement when one of the following conditions occurs:~~

~~(1) A teacher, who does not require more than a thirty (30) day leave for medical reasons has been absent for thirty (30) days; or~~

~~(2) A teacher who gave birth and provided a certificate from her physician that she was medically unable to return to work, is either no longer disabled, or exhausts available sick leave days, whichever occurs first.~~

~~However, nothing shall prevent a teacher from electing to use FMLA leave prior to the occurrences described above.~~

During the first 12 months following the birth or placement for adoption or foster care, if a teacher has exhausted his or her FMLA leave and the teacher or his/her newborn or newly-placed child has a serious health condition, the teacher will receive an additional thirty (30) work day leave, provided that the teacher submits proper medical documentation of the serious health condition. During this leave,

the teacher must use sick leave days, if available. Moreover, during this leave, the teacher may continue in the group insurance program(s) provided under this Agreement, under the same terms and conditions as before the teacher's leave began.

Upon a return from this leave, the teacher shall be entitled to return to his or her prior position or to an "equivalent" job.

**B. Teachers Not Eligible<sup>1</sup> for FMLA Leave**

Teachers who are not FMLA-eligible shall be entitled to take up to a thirty (30) work day leave due to the birth of a child, or the placement of a child for adoption or foster care. If paid sick leave is available, it must be applied to the first thirty (30) work days of absence and any subsequent period of absence that is substantiated by medical certification.

Upon a return from this leave, the teacher shall be entitled to return to his or her prior position or to an "equivalent" job.

**C. Extended Leave**

*Paid* - Following the exhaustion of the pregnancy and parental leave set forth in Paragraphs A & B above, nothing shall prohibit any teacher who submits proper medical documentation substantiating a medical need from using additional personal paid sick leave days (if available) consistent with the terms of use provided in 6.3(A) of this Agreement.

*Unpaid* - In addition, after the expiration of the leave periods set forth in Paragraphs A & B above, any teacher may elect unpaid leave, for up to the balance of the academic year in which the birth or placement took place. Birth or placement that takes place during the summer shall be regarded as taking place in the following academic year.

*General Conditions* - ~~A teacher may continue on an unpaid leave, for no longer than one school year. During the extended leave, the teacher shall be able to continue in the group insurance program(s) provided under this agreement by making advance monthly payment to the district of the premium(s) due, to the district.~~ Teachers must provide reasonable notice to the Superintendent or designee at least 30 (thirty) days in advance of taking the leave, or as soon as practicable. Following receipt of such notice, the Superintendent or designee shall meet with the requesting teacher to determine the start and end of the leave period, to discuss the teacher's decision whether to continue in the group insurance program(s), including any related payment schedule, and to discuss any adjustments to the teacher's compensation to reflect the impact of the unpaid leave. ~~A teacher who returns from pregnancy leave. Upon return from extended leave, the teacher shall be reinstated to a position in the district.~~

**D. Spouses Employed by the District**

If spouses are employed by the District, they may together take only 12-weeks for FMLA leave when the reason for the leave is the birth, adoption, foster placement, or first year care of a child.

**E.** It is understood that a non-tenured teacher may be approved for a pregnancy or parental leave under the same terms and conditions applicable to a tenured teacher. However, for a school term to count toward the attainment of tenure, the non-tenured teacher must work at least one hundred twenty (120) full time employment days. A school term that is not counted toward attainment of tenure shall not be considered a break in service for purposes of determining whether the non-tenured teacher has been employed for the period of time necessary to attain tenure, provided that the non-tenured teacher actually teaches or is otherwise present and participating in the District's educational program in the following school term.

**F.** Notwithstanding any reinstatement rights within Section 6.2 to the contrary, the District reserves the right to honorably dismiss a probationary or tenured teacher in the event of a reduction in force or to non-renew a probationary teacher who is on a pregnancy or parental leave under this Section 6.2.

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I am recommending the approval of the foreign language exchange program trip to Dresden, Germany, for our German foreign language students and the approval of the trip to Spain for our Spanish foreign language students. These trips are planned to occur summer 2017 and will be paid for by students and their families.

**Re: Request for Approval of Planning and Conduction of the 2017 GAPP Exchange Cycle which involves a Trip to Germany**

**1) What does GAPP stand for?**

GAPP stands for *German American Partnership Program*.



**2) And what is GAPP?**

GAPP is a school-to-school exchange program that pairs an American school with a German school to give students from both countries the opportunity to visit each other's schools and to experience each other's cultures by sharing in the lives of their families and communities.

**3) Who endorses GAPP?**

The GAP-Program is endorsed both by the German government (Foreign Office) and by the U.S. Department of State.

**4) What happens during a GAPP exchange?**

There are two parts to a GAPP-exchange: Trip and Hosting. For us in 2017, this would mean that would mean a trip to Germany in the summer of 2017 with CHS students going to Germany for 21 days. The second part is German students coming to CHS in return in the fall of 2017, being hosted by the CHS students who previously enjoyed the hospitality of the German students. Besides staying for two weeks with the partner school, there is also a shorter travel portion of about 4 days that is only done by the visiting school. For the 2017 exchange, Frau Bliss is looking into the possibility of traveling with the students to Bavaria.

**5) Have we done this before?**

Over the past 16 years, the German department of CHS has participated at least eight times in a GAPP exchange between *Central High School* and the *Ferdinand-Sauerbruch-Gymnasium*. This exchange has now been in place for about 20 years. It was started by Kate Tamms.

**6) Where in Germany is our partner school located?**

Our partner school is the *Ferdinand-Sauerbruch-Gymnasium in Großröhrsdorf* (near the city of Dresden in the East German state of Saxony. (See map on page 4)

**7) What will be the tentative travel dates for the 2017 GAPP exchange?**

The tentative travel dates for our group would be June 10 – June 30, 2015. This would require our group to leave slightly before all of the emergency days are used. (Instead of 5 emergency days for students, we would have only four. We cannot really leave any later due to

the start of the summer break at our partner school in Saxony. Part of the GAPP requirement is to spend at least 2 weeks at the partner school.)

### **8) What is planned for the Germany trip in 2017?**

- Flight from Chicago to Dresden (via Munich or Frankfurt am Main)
- 15 days with host families, attending school at the *Ferdinand-Sauerbruch Gymnasium*
- During the family stay portion in Großröhrsdorf, CHS students would attend classes. However, our partner school will also plan a program that encompasses traveling to nearby cities (*Dresden, Bautzen*), sites like a fortress, and hiking in "*Saxony Switzerland*",
- 4 days of CHS group travel in Bavaria, with possibilities of seeing sites in Munich, Nuremberg, Salzburg, or one of the castles of King Ludwig II. The train would be the main means of transportation.
- Return flight from Munich.
- If we find Bavaria too expensive for the travel portion, we could alternatively do the trip portion in the Rhine area with departure from Frankfurt. This has been done multiple times in the past.

### **9) How can students benefit from participating in the exchange program?**

- Students can form long lasting international friendships that may involve entire families and might go well beyond their years at high school
- Students can dramatically increase their ability to hear and speak German
- A lot of students have seen an increase in personal confidence and maturity after mastering this experience and consider such a trip an "eye-opening-experience".
- Through an experience like this, students learn to live our former mission of becoming "*responsible contributors to our ever changing global society*" and our current mission of "*changing the world*".

### **10) How can the entire district benefit from the experience?**

Students participating directly in the exchange are not the only ones benefitting from the exchange. As part of the GAP-requirement, the German students have prepared presentations (in English) on Germany related topics that can be given in any class where it is requested by a teacher. In the past, the German guests have even visited other schools in the district and met with classes of the middle and elementary schools that they were invited to. The benefits of the program therefore can expand to the entire district. Also, our students are very popular guests in English classes in Germany where they will have to report on life in the USA.

### **11) Who is Central's sponsor for the GAPP program and who else will chaperone the trip?**

Central's designated sponsor of the GAPP exchange is Mrs. Anette Bliss (CHS German Teacher and Foreign Language Department Chair). Mrs. Bliss (a native of Germany with dual

citizenship) traveled with CHS students to Germany in 2004; 2006; 2011; 2013; and 2015. The second chaperone is as of yet not fully determined. If Central's second German teacher is not available, Mrs. Cathy Mullahy (currently CHS Teacher and Department Chair for Career/Tech Education) agreed to step in. Mrs. Mullahy traveled with students to Germany in 2006, 2011 and 2013 and has been to the country several times on her own due to family ties.

### **12) Who else is involved in the planning of the trip?**

Frau Bliss usually works together with ISE (International Student Experiences) to work on the details of the trip involving monetary aspects (plane tickets; train tickets; hotel reservations, etc.). ISE is a Minnesota based non-profit organization that is specialized in student travel.

### **13) What are the costs of the trip for the students?**

The final costs of the trip are still being negotiated. The costs for the 2015 trip were \$ 3,450 per student. The cost of the trip depend on the group size and the itinerary. Past experience has shown that each year the trips are more expensive.

### **14) What else is relevant for the Board to be aware of?**

Besides approval for the described exchange and trip, Frau Bliss seeks permission that the return flight is conducted with a single chaperone. Rationale: A late departure would allow Frau Bliss the possibility to spend time with her family in Germany. This has been past practice in all of the prior exchanges. The group has always returned with the second chaperone only.

**SUBJECT:** BOARD POLICY 4:170 AND 4:175 – SAFETY  
**DATE:** MARCH 17, 2016

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The revisions to policy 4:170 Safety updates language to the safety policy related to the safety plan, safety drills and automated external defibrillator (AED) plan. New policy 4:175 Convicted Child Sex Offender; Criminal Background check and/or Screen; Notifications is now its own policy.

## Operational Services

### Safety

#### Safety Program and Security

All District operations, including the education program, shall be conducted in a manner that will promote the safety of everyone on District property or at a District event. The Superintendent or designee shall develop and implement a comprehensive safety and crisis plan incorporating both avoidance and management guidelines. The comprehensive safety and crisis plan shall specifically include provisions for: injury prevention; bomb threats, weapons, and explosives on campus; school safety drill program; tornado protection; instruction in safe bus riding practices; emergency aid; post-crisis management; and, responding to medical emergencies at an indoor and outdoor physical fitness facility. During each academic year, each school building that houses school children must conduct a minimum of comprehensive safety and security plan that includes, without limitation:

- Three school evacuation drills,
- One lockdown drill,
- One bus evacuation drill,
- One severe weather and shelter in place drill, and
- One law enforcement drill.

1. An emergency operations plan(s) addressing prevention, preparation, response, and recovery for each school;
2. Provisions for a coordinated effort with local law enforcement and fire officials, emergency medical services personnel, and the Board Attorney;
3. A school safety drill plan;
4. Instruction in safe bus riding practices; and
5. A clear, rapid, factual, and coordinated system of internal and external communication.

The law enforcement drill must be conducted according to the District's comprehensive safety and crisis plan, with the participation of the appropriate law enforcement agency. This drill may be conducted on days and times that students are not present in the building.

In the event of an emergency that threatens the safety of any person or property, students and staff are encouraged to use any available cellular telephone to follow the best practices discussed for their building regarding the use of any available cellular telephones.

#### School Safety Drill Plan

During every academic year, each school building that houses school children shall conduct, at a minimum, each of the following in accordance with the School Safety Drill Act, 105 ILCS 128/:

1. Three school evacuation drills
2. One bus evacuation drill
3. One severe weather and shelter-in-place drill
4. One law enforcement drill

#### Automated External Defibrillator (AED)

The Superintendent or designee shall implement a written plan for responding to medical emergencies at the District's physical fitness facilities in accordance with the Fitness Facility Medical Emergency Preparedness Act. The plan shall provide for an automated external defibrillator (AED) to be available according to State law

requirements. This policy does not create an obligation to use an AED nor is it intended to create any expectation that an AED will be present or a trained person will be present and/or able to use an AED.

### Soccer Goal Safety

The Superintendent or designee shall implement the Movable Soccer Goal Safety Act in accordance with the guidance published by the Illinois Department of Public Health. Implementation of the Act shall be directed toward improving the safety of moveable soccer goals by requiring that they be properly anchored.

### Convicted Child Sex Offender and Notification Laws

State law prohibits a child sex offender from being present on school property or loitering within 500 feet of school property when persons under the age of 18 are present, unless the offender meets either of the following two exceptions:

1. The offender is a parent/guardian of a student attending the school and has notified the Building Principal of his or her presence at the school for the purpose of: (i) attending a conference with school personnel to discuss the progress of his or her child academically or socially, (ii) participating in child review conferences in which evaluation and placement decisions may be made with respect to his or her child regarding special education services, or (iii) attending conferences to discuss other student issues concerning his or her child such as retention and promotion; or
2. The offender received permission to be present from the School Board, Superintendent, or Superintendent's designee. If permission is granted, the Superintendent or Board President shall provide the details of the offender's upcoming visit to the Building Principal.

In all cases, the Superintendent, or designee who is a certified employee shall supervise a child sex offender whenever the offender is in a child's vicinity.

If a student is a sex offender, the Superintendent or designee shall develop guidelines for managing his or her presence in school.

The Superintendent shall develop procedures for the distribution and use of information from law enforcement officials under the Sex Offender Community Notification Law and the Murderer and Violent Offender Against Youth Community Notification Law. The Superintendent or designee shall serve as the District contact person for purposes of these laws. The Superintendent and Building Principal shall manage a process for schools to notify the parents/guardians during school registration that information about sex offenders is available to the public as provided in the Sex Offender Community Notification Law. This notification must occur during school registration and at other times as the Superintendent or Building Principal determines advisable.

All contracts with the School District that may involve an employee or agent of the contractor having any contact, direct or indirect, with a student, shall contain the following:

The contractor shall not send to any school building or school property any employee or agent who would be prohibited from being employed by the District due to a conviction of a crime listed in 105 ILCS 5/10-21.9, or who is listed in the Statewide Sex Offender Registry or the Statewide Violent Offender Against Youth Database. The contractor shall obtain a fingerprint based criminal history records check before sending any employee or agent to any school building or school property. Additionally, at least quarterly, the contractor shall check if an employee or agent is listed on the Statewide Sex Offender Registry or the Statewide Violent Offender Against Youth Database.

If the District receives information that concerns the record of conviction as a sex offender of any employee of a District contractor, the District will provide the information to another school, school district, community

Unsafe School Choice Option

The unsafe school choice option allows students to transfer to another District school or to a public charter school within the District. The unsafe school choice option is available to:

1. All students attending a persistently dangerous school, as defined by State law and identified by the Illinois State Board of Education.
2. Any student who is a victim of a violent criminal offense, as defined by 725 ILCS 120/3, that occurred on school grounds during regular school hours or during a school-sponsored event.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures to implement the unsafe school choice option.

Student Insurance

~~The District purchases student accident insurance covering all students while on the school property and while engaged in any school sponsored activity including sports, activities and trips while off school property. This includes coverage while in transit. The insurance covers only accidents (with certain exclusions/limitations) and shall be considered to be excess coverage over parent/guardian primary health insurance.~~

Emergency Closing

The Superintendent is authorized to close the schools in the event of hazardous weather or other emergencies that threatens the safety of students, staff members, or school property.

Annual Review

The School Board or its designee will annually review each school building’s safety and security plans, protocols, and procedures, as well as each building’s compliance with the school safety drill plan.

## **Operational Services**

### **Convicted Child Sex Offender; Criminal Background Check and/or Screen; Notifications**

#### **Persons Prohibited on School Property without Prior Permission**

State law prohibits a child sex offender from being present on school property or loitering within 500 feet of school property when persons under the age of 18 are present, unless the offender meets either of the following two exceptions:

1. The offender is a parent/guardian of a student attending the school and has notified the Building Principal of his or her presence at the school for the purpose of: (i) attending a conference with school personnel to discuss the progress of his or her child academically or socially, (ii) participating in child review conferences in which evaluation and placement decisions may be made with respect to his or her child regarding special education services, or (iii) attending conferences to discuss other student issues concerning his or her child such as retention and promotion; or
2. The offender received permission to be present from the School Board, Superintendent, or Superintendent's designee. If permission is granted, the Superintendent or Board President shall provide the details of the offender's upcoming visit to the Building Principal.

In all cases, the Superintendent or designee shall supervise a child sex offender whenever the offender is in a child's vicinity. If a student is a sex offender, the Superintendent or designee shall develop guidelines for managing his or her presence in school.

#### **Criminal Background Check and/or Screen**

The Superintendent or designee shall perform the criminal background check and/or screen required by State law or Board policy for employees; student teachers; students doing field or clinical experience other than student teaching; contractors' employees who have direct, daily contact with one or more children; and resource persons and volunteers. He or she shall take appropriate action based on the result of any criminal background check and/or screen.

#### **Notification to Parents/Guardians**

The Superintendent shall develop procedures for the distribution and use of information from law enforcement officials under the Sex Offender Community Notification Law and the Murderer and Violent Offender Against Youth Community Notification Law. The Superintendent or designee shall serve as the District contact person for purposes of these laws. 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Six school districts support the Fox Valley Career Center. The membership districts include Batavia #101, Central #301, Kaneland #302, Geneva #304, St. Charles #303, and West Aurora #129. The purpose of the cooperative is to pool our resources to offer vocational opportunities and experiences that the district could not effectively offer using in-house programming. The superintendents of the membership districts serve as the Board of Directors and it is my recommendation that we continue our long standing partnership with the career center to support vocational opportunities for Central students.

**JOINT AGREEMENT**

**FOR OPERATION OF THE FOX VALLEY CAREER CENTER**

WHEREAS, the school districts which are parties to this agreement all maintain a school system for the education of students attending the kindergarten through twelfth grades inclusive, and

WHEREAS, it is not economically practical for each of said individual school districts to finance and operate an adequate program of career, vocational and technical education for grades eleven and twelve, and

WHEREAS, Paragraph 10-22.31a of the School Code of Illinois (105 ILCS 5/10 – 22.31a) authorizes and empowers boards of education of Illinois school districts to establish joint educational programs as follows:

JOINT EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS. To enter into joint agreement with other school boards to establish any type of educational program which any district may establish individually, to provide the needed educational facilities and to employ a director and other professional workers for such a program. The director and other professional workers may be employed by one district which shall be reimbursed on a mutually agreed basis by other districts that are parties to the joint agreement. Such agreements may provide that one district may supply professional workers for a joint program conducted in another district.

and

WHEREAS, in order to provide enrollments large enough to support and justify such a program of vocational education it is necessary and desirable that said districts enter into joint and cooperative agreement to provide the needed facilities and personnel as authorized by the aforesaid section of the School Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual promises and agreements of the respective school districts which are parties to this agreement, it is hereby agreed between them as follows:

**ARTICLE I**

I - 1        The name of this vocational/career center shall be the Fox Valley Career Center (FVCC).

I - 2 Purposes:

The purpose of the FVCC is to help students develop the college, career and technical knowledge, skills and attitudes they need in order to pursue successful careers, advanced training or education immediately after high school or later.

After graduation from high school, the students should also be adequately prepared to enter employment or appropriate programs in community colleges, technical schools, or universities.

I - 3 Membership

Membership in this joint agreement shall consist of (1) the Batavia Public Schools, Dist. #101, Batavia, Illinois; (2) Central School Dist. #301, Burlington, Illinois, (3) Kaneland Community Unit School Dist. #302, 47W326 Keslinger Road, Maple Park, Illinois; (4) Geneva Community Unit School Dist. #304, Geneva, Illinois; (5) St. Charles Community Unit School Dist. #303, St. Charles, Illinois; (6) West Aurora School District #129, Aurora, Illinois. Other school districts may be admitted in accordance with Article V of this agreement.

**ARTICLE II – ORGANIZATION AND OPERATION**

II - 1 ADMINISTRATIVE DISTRICT. The administrative district for the operation of the program shall be Community Unit District #302, Kane and DeKalb Counties, Illinois, and such administrative district through its Board of Education, hereafter referred to as the Administrative Board, is hereby authorized and empowered:

- (a) To provide the physical facilities, including building, fixtures and equipment, required to set up and establish the program.
- (b) To name and designate a director who shall be a member of the staff of the administrative district and who shall cooperate in the operation with the superintendents who are members of the advisory board as hereinafter set forth.
- (c) To hire and engage teachers and personnel as may be necessary.
- (d) To apply for and receive all payments from state and federal sources which may be available from time to time as grants, contributions or reimbursements from any state or federal agency or department, either for capital outlays or operating expenses.
- (e) To receive contributions or donations to the program of cash, fixtures, equipment or supplies for any similar purpose, from any private individual, firm or corporation.

- (f) To pay all of the expenses and operating costs of the program.
- (g) To do and perform any and all other acts necessary for the establishment and maintenance of the program.

The director and all teachers or other employees shall be considered for all legal purposes as employees of the administrative district and subject to all of the rules and regulations made applicable by law to the employees of such district.

In view of the fact that the buildings, and most of the fixtures and equipment shall be provided by the administrative district, it is understood and agreed that all such property that is used in this vocational center shall at all times and for all purposes be and remain the property of the administrative district.

II - 2 **ADMINISTRATIVE STRUCTURE.** The superintendents of the member school districts shall constitute the Board of Directors which shall make and approve policy and act as liaison to the Boards of Education of participating districts. The Kaneland Superintendent shall serve as Chairperson of the Board of Directors. Such board may elect one of its members to serve as vice-chairperson and shall hold such meetings for the conduct of its business as from time to time may be deemed advisable. Any decision of such board shall be by a majority vote.

In accordance with Section II – 1 of this agreement, a Director of the Center, shall be employed. The duties of the Director shall be determined by the Board of Directors and the Administrative Board. The FVCC Director shall serve as secretary to the Board preparing the necessary materials for the Board of Directors meetings and maintaining records and information resulting from such meetings.

II - 3 **ADVISORY COMMITTEES.** Separate advisory committees shall be organized for each occupational area. They shall represent a diversity of industry from the small and relatively simple firm to complex international corporations. The teachers are to be directly involved with and meet with their occupational committee. Minutes of the advisory committee meetings shall be kept. The primary function of local advisory committees is to advise and counsel the educational system's administration and instructional staff in planning, implementing and maintaining vocational and technical educational programs. Some specific functions might be to:

1. Provide important communication between the educational systems and the community.
2. Review the goals and objectives of the local and technical education program.
3. Make recommendations to administrators regarding students for instructional facilities.

4. Assist in the preparation of a local philosophy of vocational and technical education.
5. Aid in continuous review of the content and organization of the instructional program in keeping with the occupational needs of the community, area or state.
6. Advise the administration relative to setting up qualifications of instructors.
7. Suggest criteria for selection of students.
8. Assist in locating training stations for cooperative students.
9. Assist in the development and recommendation of an equitable financial support system.
10. Assist in planning of a student placement program.
11. Support state and national legislation affecting vocational and technical education.
12. Assist in long-term program planning.
13. Assist with a continuous appraisal of occupational opportunities in the communities served.
14. Assist in the identification of needed research in career, vocational and technical education.

### **ARTICLE III – PROGRAM**

III - 1 The Administrative Board, in cooperation with the Board of Directors, shall contract for and otherwise provide as necessary for personnel, sites, and physical facilities required to house and support the educational and related activities of the Center.

III - 2 The Administrative Board, in cooperation with the Board of Directors, shall establish career, vocational and technical education programs and related services that it deems necessary for the effective operation of the Center, consistent with all project proposals and specification as approved by the Illinois State Board of Education and in the interests of the participating school districts.

III - 3 The Administrative Board, in cooperation with the Board of Directors, shall approve the employment of such personnel as it deems necessary to support the programs and services and shall establish employment and personnel policy consistent with Illinois law.

III - 4 The Administrative Board, in cooperation with the Board of Directors, shall establish policies which maintain the principle of community involvement consistent with the intents and

purposes of the cooperating districts, project proposals and specifications, and approving authorities granted various local, state and federal agencies by law.

### III - 5 Finance

(a) **TUITION COSTS.** Based on gross operating costs, participating districts will be billed 1) 40% of the estimated first semester billing on August first, based on the number of students enrolled, 2) Eleventh day of first semester – balance of tuition based on current enrollment, 3) December 1<sup>st</sup> – 40% of the estimated second semester tuition, and 4) Eleventh day of second semester – balance of tuition amount based on current enrollment. Final tabulation is made in June for additional revenues needed or refunds for excess money collected.

(b) **FINANCIAL RECORDS.** The administrative district shall maintain an accounting system accurately showing all receipts and disbursements for capital expenditures as well as ordinary operating costs. Such system shall be maintained in such manner that capital and operating expenses of the vocational program will be shown entirely separate from the other educational activities of the administrative district, so that in particular the operating costs of the program can be determined with exactness and thus prorated fairly among the participating district. The administrative district shall submit a summary statement of receipts and disbursements for both capital expenditures and operating costs to all participating districts in the form of an annual financial audit.

(c) **FACILITY AND ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS.** In addition to all costs related to educational programs and services, the FVCC budget shall include its direct or pro rata share of all relevant on-going facility-related costs (e.g., trash removal, utilities, snow removal, custodial services, regular repairs, etc). Costs for major facility improvements or repairs shall be reviewed with the Board of Directors and recouped through a payment schedule acceptable to the Board of Directors and administrative district. The budget shall also include the FVCC's direct or pro rata share of costs for professional and administrative services provided by the administrative district.

(d) A tentative budget shall be prepared and presented by the Director at the regular May meeting of the Board of Directors. The tentative budget shall be approved by the Board of Directors for recommendation to the Administrative District. The budget will be adopted by the Administrative District in accordance with statutory requirements. Once the budget has been adopted by the Board of Directors and the Administrative District, it may be adjusted via transfers between line items

not exceeding in the aggregate 10% of the total fund budget. Both the Board of Directors and the Administrative District must approve any such transfer. The Budget as approved shall be binding on the participating districts and also on the Administrative District.

#### **ARTICLE IV – TRANSPORTATION**

IV - 1 Each participating district shall furnish transportation for the pupils of that district to and from the Career Center in a manner prescribed by the Board of Education of the participating district.

#### **ARTICLE V – PROCEDURES FOR ADMISSION OR WITHDRAWAL OF A SCHOOL DISTRICT FROM THIS JOINT AGREEMENT**

V - 1 FVCC operates on a year to year basis, but any participating district may terminate its participation consistent with the School Code of Illinois (105 ILCS 5/10 – 22.31a). Notice of such intent must be given, in writing, to the Board of Directors and to the administrative district by January 31 in the calendar year prior to the year in which the withdrawal becomes effective. Any district which begins participation at the beginning of a school year shall be obligated to continue such participation for the entire school year on the terms and conditions herein set forth.

All tuition charges and obligations of the district withdrawing from the joint agreement must be paid upon withdrawal and all capital assets such as buildings, equipment and facilities used at the Center or as a part of the joint agreement are, and shall remain the property of the administrative district.

V - 2 If the Board of Directors and administrative district deem it advisable, and if facilities are available, other school districts in the area may be permitted to participate in the program upon such terms and conditions as the Board of Directors and the administrative district shall then determine.

#### **ARTICLE VI – PROVISION FOR AMENDMENTS**

VI - 1 It is further understood that this agreement may be amended or supplemented at any time by an agreement in writing signed by all of the participating districts.

**ARTICLE VII – MISCELLANEOUS**

VII - 1 **CREDITS FOR GRADUATION.** Each participating district shall determine its own basis for giving credit for courses attended by any of its students at the Career Center conducted under the auspices of this program.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the school districts which have agreed to participate in the initial operation of this program have hereunto caused this agreement to be executed by their duly authorized officers.

## **JOINT AGREEMENT RESOLUTION**

WHEREAS, present statutes allow school districts to jointly offer programs for better educational advantages, and

WHEREAS, an efficient and proper program may not feasibly be conducted by one district alone, and

WHEREAS, Section 10-22.31a of the School Code of Illinois authorizes joint agreements between several school districts, through their school boards.

Now, therefore, let it be resolved that District Number 301, Kane County, Burlington, Illinois, be authorized to enter into a joint agreement with other school districts of Kane County(ies), and be bound thereby, and

Be it further resolved that the President and Secretary of this Board are hereby authorized to direct and execute said joint agreement, copy of which is attached hereto, and

Be it further resolved that this Board of Education hereby approves of the agreement for 2017(school term) as presented, a copy of which is attached hereto.

The current system has limited redundancy, and has proven to be unreliable due to an aging regional copper phone line infrastructure when calling in or out of the district.

It is recommended that the board approve a lease for equipment and consulting services from Cisco Capital and Singlepath Inc. This refresh of the telephone system will provide equipment redundancy, complete internet based calling, and fully reliable 911 service.

A breakdown of equipment and services is included, along with the financial agreements. The yearly cost of this project falls within the Technology budget.

### TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Please read YOUR copy of this State and Local Government Lease-Purchase Agreement ("Lease") carefully and feel free to ask US any questions YOU may have about it. Words "YOU" and "YOUR" refer to the "Lessee" and the words "WE," "US" and "OUR" refer to De Lage Landen Public Finance LLC, its successors and assigns, as the "Lessor" of the Equipment.

- LEASE.** WE agree to lease to YOU and YOU agree to lease from US, the equipment listed above (and on any attached schedule) including all replacement parts, repairs, additions and accessories ("Equipment") on the terms and conditions of this Lease and on any attached schedule.
- TERM.** This Lease is effective on the date when the term of this Lease and YOUR obligation to pay rent commence, which date shall be the date that funds are advanced by US to YOU, the vendor of the Equipment or an escrow agent for the purpose of paying or reimbursing all or a portion of the cost of the Equipment (the "Commencement Date") and continues thereafter for an original term ("Original Term") ending at the end of YOUR budget year in effect on the Commencement Date and may be continued by YOU for additional one-year renewal terms ("Renewal Terms") coinciding with YOUR budget year up to the total number of months indicated above as the Full Lease Term; provided, however, that at the end of the Original Term and at the end of each Renewal Term until the Full Lease Term has been completed, YOU shall be deemed to have continued this Lease for the next Renewal Term unless YOU shall have terminated this Lease pursuant to Section 5 or Section 17. **8. TITLE, PERSONAL PROPERTY, LOCATION, INSPECTION, NO MODIFICATIONS OR ALTERATIONS.** YOU have title to the Equipment; provided that title to the Equipment will immediately and without any action by YOU vest in US, and YOU shall immediately surrender possession of the Equipment to US, (a) upon any termination of this Lease other than termination pursuant to Section 17 or (b) if YOU are in default of this Lease. It is the intent of the parties hereto that any transfer of title to US pursuant to this Section shall occur automatically without the necessity of any bill of sale, certificate of title or other instrument of conveyance. YOU shall, nevertheless, execute and deliver any such instruments as WE may request to evidence such transfer. As security for YOUR obligations hereunder, WE retain a security interest in the Equipment and all proceeds thereof. YOU have the right to use the Equipment during the term of this Lease, except as otherwise expressly set forth in this Lease. Although the Equipment may become attached to real estate, it remains personal property. YOU agree not to alter or modify the Equipment or permit a lien to be placed upon the Equipment or to remove the Equipment without OUR prior written consent. If WE feel it is necessary, YOU agree to provide US with waivers of interest or liens from anyone claiming any interest in the real estate on which any items of Equipment is located. WE also have the right, at reasonable times, to inspect the Equipment.

**9. MAINTENANCE.** YOU are required, at YOUR own cost and expense, to keep the Equipment in good repair, condition and working order, except for ordinary wear and tear, and YOU will supply all parts and servicing required. All replacement parts used or installed and repairs made to the Equipment will become OUR property.

YOU ACKNOWLEDGE THAT WE ARE NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR PROVIDING ANY REQUIRED MAINTENANCE AND/OR SERVICE FOR THE EQUIPMENT. **10. ASSIGNMENT.** YOU AGREE NOT TO TRANSFER, SELL, SUBLEASE, ASSIGN, PLEDGE OR ENCUMBER EITHER THE EQUIPMENT OR ANY RIGHTS UNDER THIS LEASE WITHOUT OUR PRIOR WRITTEN CONSENT. YOU agree that WE may sell, assign or transfer this Lease and, if WE do, the new owner will have the same rights and benefits that WE now have and will not have to perform any of OUR obligations and the rights of the new owner will not be subject to any claims, counterclaims, defenses or set-offs that YOU may have against US. YOU hereby appoint Municipal Registrar Services (the "Registrar") as YOUR agent for the purpose of maintaining a written record of each assignment in form necessary to comply with Section 149(a) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended. No such assignment shall be binding on YOU until the Registrar has received written notice from the assignor of the name and address of the assignee.

**11. LOSS OR DAMAGE.** YOU are responsible for the risk of loss or destruction of, or damage to the Equipment. No such loss or damage relieves YOU from any obligation under this Lease. If any of the Equipment is damaged by fire or other casualty or title to, or the temporary use of, any of the Equipment is taken under the exercise of the power of eminent domain, the net proceeds ("Net Proceeds") of any insurance claim or condemnation award will be applied to the prompt replacement, repair, restoration, modification or improvement of that Equipment, unless YOU have exercised YOUR option to purchase the Equipment pursuant to Section 17. Any balance of the Net Proceeds remaining after such work has been completed shall be paid to YOU.

**12. INDEMNITY.** WE are not responsible for any losses or injuries caused by the manufacture, acquisition, delivery, installation, ownership, use, lease, possession, maintenance, operation or rejection of the Equipment or defects in the Equipment. To the extent permitted by law, YOU agree to reimburse US for and to defend US against any claim for losses or injuries relating to the Equipment. This indemnity will continue even after the termination of this Lease.

**13. TAXES.** YOU agree to pay all applicable license and registration fees, sale and use taxes, personal property taxes and all other taxes and charges, relating to the ownership, leasing, rental, sale, purchase, possession or use of the Equipment (except those based on OUR net income). YOU agree that if WE pay any taxes or charges, YOU will reimburse US for all such payments and will pay US interest and a late charge (as calculated in Section 3) on such payments with the next Lease Payment, plus a fee for OUR collecting and administering any taxes, assessments or fees and remitting them to the appropriate authorities.

**14. INSURANCE.** During the term of this Lease, YOU will keep the Equipment insured against all risks of loss or damage in an amount not less than the replacement cost of the Equipment, without deductible and without co-insurance. YOU will also obtain and maintain for the term of this Lease, comprehensive public liability insurance covering both personal injury and property damage of at least \$100,000 per person and \$300,000 per occurrence or bodily injury and \$50,000 for property damage. WE will be the sole named loss payee on the property insurance and named as an additional insured on the public liability insurance. YOU will pay all premiums for such insurance and must deliver proof of insurance coverage satisfactory to US. If YOU do not provide such insurance, YOU agree that WE have the right, but not the obligation, to obtain such insurance and add an insurance fee to the amount due from you, on which we make a profit.

**15. DEFAULT.** Subject to Section 5, YOU are in default of this Lease if any of the following occurs: (a) YOU fail to pay any Lease Payment or other sum when due; (b) YOU breach any warranty or other obligation under this Lease, or any other agreement with US, (c) YOU become insolvent or unable to pay YOUR debts when due, YOU make an assignment for the benefit of creditors or YOU undergo a substantial deterioration in YOUR financial condition, or (d) YOU file or have filed against YOU a petition for liquidation, reorganization, adjustment of debt or similar relief under the Federal Bankruptcy Code or any other present or future federal or state bankruptcy or insolvency law, or a trustee, receiver or liquidator is appointed for YOU or a substantial part of YOUR assets.

**16. REMEDIES.** WE have the following remedies if YOU are in default of this Lease: WE may declare the entire balance of the unpaid Lease Payments for the then current Original Term or Renewal Term immediately due and payable; sue for and receive all Lease Payments and any other payments then accrued or accelerated under this Lease; charge YOU interest on all monies due US at the rate of eighteen percent (18%) per year from the date of default until paid, but in no event more than the maximum rate permitted by law; charge YOU a return-check or non-sufficient funds charge ("NSF Charge") of \$25.00 for a check that is returned for any reason; and require that YOU return the Equipment to US and, if YOU fail to return the Equipment, enter upon the premises peaceably with or without legal process where the Equipment is located and repossess the Equipment. Such return or repossession of the Equipment will not constitute a termination of this Lease unless WE expressly notify YOU in writing. If the Equipment is returned or repossessed by US and unless WE have terminated this Lease, WE will sell or re-rent the Equipment to any persons with any terms WE determine, at one or more public or private sales, with or without notice to YOU, and apply the net proceeds after deducting the costs and expenses of such sale or re-rent, to YOUR obligations with YOU remaining liable for any deficiency and with any excess over the amounts described in this Section plus the then applicable Purchase Price to be paid to YOU.

YOU are also required to pay (i) all expenses incurred by US in connection with the enforcement of any remedies, including all expenses of repossessing, storing, shipping, repairing and selling the Equipment, and (ii) reasonable attorneys' fees.

**17. PURCHASE OPTION.** Provided YOU are not in default, YOU shall have the option to purchase all but not less than all of the Equipment (a) on the date the last Lease Payment is due (assuming this Lease is renewed at the end of the Original Term and each Renewal Term), if this Lease is still in effect on that day, upon payment in full of Lease Payments and all other amounts then due and the payment of One Dollar to US; (b) on the last day of the Original Term or any Renewal Term then in effect, upon

at least 60 days' prior written notice to US and payment in full to US of the Lease Payments and all other amounts then due plus the then applicable Purchase Price set forth on the Lease Payment Schedule; or (c) if substantial damage to or destruction or condemnation of substantially all of the Equipment has occurred, on the day specified in YOUR written notice to US of YOUR exercise of the purchase option upon at least 60 days' prior notice to US and payment in full to US of the Lease Payments and all other amounts then due plus the then applicable Purchase Price set forth on the Lease Payment Schedule.

### General Instructions

#### Purpose of Form

Form 8038-G is used by issuers of tax-exempt governmental obligations to provide the IRS with the information required by section 149(e) and to monitor the requirements of sections 141 through 150.

#### Who Must File

IF the issue price (line 21, column (b)) is...	THEN, for tax-exempt governmental obligations issued after December 31, 1986, issuers must file...
\$100,000 or more	A separate Form 8038-G for each issue
Less than \$100,000	Form 8038-GC, Information Return for Small Tax-Exempt Governmental Bond Issues, Leases, and Installment Sales



For all build America bonds and recovery zone economic development bonds use Form 8038-B, Information Return for Build America Bonds and Recovery Zone Economic Development Bonds. For tax credit bonds and specified tax credit bonds use Form 8038-TC, Information Return for Tax Credit Bonds and Specified Tax Credit Bonds.

#### When To File

File Form 8038-G on or before the 15th day of the 2nd calendar month after the close of the calendar quarter in which the bond is issued. Form 8038-G may not be filed before the issue date and must be completed based on the facts as of the issue date.

**Late filing.** An issuer may be granted an extension of time to file Form 8038-G under Section 3 of Rev. Proc. 2002-48, 2002-37 I.R.B. 531, if it is determined that the failure to file timely is not due to willful neglect. Type or print at the top of the form "Request for Relief under section 3 of Rev. Proc. 2002-48" and attach a letter explaining why Form 8038-G was not submitted to the IRS on time. Also indicate whether the bond issue in question is under examination by the IRS. Do not submit copies of the trust

indenture or other bond documents. See *Where To File* next.

#### Where To File

File Form 8038-G, and any attachments, with the Department of the Treasury, Internal Revenue Service Center, Ogden, UT 84201.

**Private delivery services.** You can use certain private delivery services designated by the IRS to meet the "timely mailing as timely filing/paying" rule for tax returns and payments. These private delivery services include only the following:

- DHL Express (DHL): DHL Same Day Service.
- Federal Express (FedEx): FedEx Priority Overnight, FedEx Standard Overnight, FedEx 2Day, FedEx International Priority, and FedEx International First.
- United Parcel Service (UPS): UPS Next Day Air, UPS Next Day Air Saver, UPS 2nd Day Air, UPS 2nd Day Air A.M., UPS Worldwide Express Plus, and UPS Worldwide Express.

The private delivery service can tell you how to get written proof of the mailing date.

#### Other Forms That May Be Required

For rebating arbitrage (or paying a penalty in lieu of arbitrage rebate) to the Federal government, use Form 8038-T, Arbitrage Rebate, Yield Reduction and Penalty in Lieu of Arbitrage Rebate.

For private activity bonds, use Form 8038, Information Return for Tax-Exempt Private Activity Bond Issues.

For build America bonds (Direct Pay), build America bonds (Tax Credit), and recovery zone economic development bonds, complete Form 8038-B, Information Return for Build America Bonds and Recovery Zone Economic Development Bonds.

For qualified forestry conservation bonds, new clean renewable energy bonds, qualified energy conservation bonds, qualified zone academy bonds, qualified school construction bonds, clean renewable energy bonds, Midwestern tax credit bonds, and all other qualified tax credit bonds (except build America bonds), file Form 8038-TC, Information Return for Tax Credit Bonds and Specified Tax Credit Bonds.

#### Definitions

**Tax-exempt obligation.** This is any obligation, including a bond, installment purchase agreement, or financial lease, on which the interest is excluded from income under section 103.

**Tax-exempt governmental obligation.** A tax-exempt obligation that is not a private activity bond (see below) is a tax-exempt governmental obligation. This includes a bond issued by a qualified volunteer fire department under section 150(e).

**Private activity bond.** This includes an obligation issued as part of an issue in which:

- More than 10% of the proceeds are to be used for any private activity business use, and
- More than 10% of the payment of principal or interest of the issue is either (a) secured by an interest in property to be used for a private business use (or payments for such property) or (b) to be derived from payments for property (or borrowed money) used for a private business use.

It also includes a bond, the proceeds of which (a) are to be used directly or indirectly to make or finance loans (other than loans described in section 141(c)(2)) to persons other than governmental units and (b) exceeds the lesser of 5% of the proceeds or \$5 million.

**Issue price.** The issue price of obligations is generally determined under Regulations section 1.148-1(b). Thus, when issued for cash, the issue price is the first price at which a substantial amount of the obligations are sold to the public. To determine the issue price of an obligation issued for property, see sections 1273 and 1274 and the related regulations.

**Issue.** Generally, obligations are treated as part of the same issue if they are issued by the same issuer, on the same date, and in a single transaction, or a series of related transactions. However, obligations issued during the same calendar year (a) under a loan agreement under which amounts are to be advanced periodically (a "draw-down loan") or (b) with a term not exceeding 270 days, may be treated as part of the same issue if the obligations are equally and ratably secured under a single indenture or loan agreement and are issued under a common financing arrangement (for example, under the same official statement periodically updated to reflect changing factual circumstances). Also, for obligations issued under a draw-down loan that meet the requirements of the preceding sentence, obligations issued during different calendar years may be treated as part of the same issue if all of the amounts to be advanced under the draw-down loan are reasonably expected to be advanced within 3 years of the date of issue of the first obligation. Likewise, obligations (other than private activity bonds) issued under a single agreement that is in the form of a lease or installment sale may be treated as part of the same issue if all of the property covered by that agreement is reasonably expected to be delivered within 3 years of the date of issue of the first obligation.

**Arbitrage rebate.** Generally, interest on a state or local bond is not tax-exempt unless the issuer of the bond rebates to the United States arbitrage profits earned from investing proceeds of the bond in higher yielding nonpurpose investments. See section 148(f).

**Construction issue.** This is an issue of tax-exempt bonds that meets both of the following conditions:

1. At least 75% of the available construction proceeds are to be used for construction expenditures with respect to property to be owned by a governmental unit or a section 501(c)(3) organization, and
2. All the bonds that are part of the issue are qualified 501(c)(3) bonds, bonds that are not private activity bonds, or private activity bonds issued to finance property to be owned by a governmental unit or a section 501(c)(3) organization.

In lieu of rebating any arbitrage that may be owed to the United States, the issuer of a construction issue may make an irrevocable election to pay a penalty. The penalty is equal to 1½% of the amount of construction proceeds that do not meet certain spending requirements. See section 148(f)(4)(C) and the Instructions for Form 8038-T.

## Specific Instructions

### Part I—Reporting Authority

**Amended return.** An issuer may file an amended return to change or add to the information reported on a previously filed

return for the same date of issue. If you are filing to correct errors or change a previously filed return, check the *Amended Return* box in the heading of the form.

The amended return must provide all the information reported on the original return, in addition to the new or corrected information. Attach an explanation of the reason for the amended return and write across the top, "Amended Return Explanation." Failure to attach an explanation may result in a delay in processing the form.

**Line 1.** The issuer's name is the name of the entity issuing the obligations, not the name of the entity receiving the benefit of the financing. For a lease or installment sale, the issuer is the lessee or the purchaser.

**Line 2.** An issuer that does not have an employer identification number (EIN) should apply for one on Form SS-4, Application for Employer Identification Number. You can get this form on the IRS website at [IRS.gov](http://IRS.gov) or by calling 1-800-TAX-FORM (1-800-829-3676). You may receive an EIN by telephone by following the instructions for Form SS-4.

**Line 3a.** If the issuer wishes to authorize a person other than an officer or other employee of the issuer (including a legal representative or paid preparer) to communicate with the IRS and whom the IRS may contact about this return (including in writing or by telephone), enter the name of such person here. The person listed in line 3a must be an individual. Do not enter the name and title of an officer or other employee of the issuer here (use line 10a for that purpose).

**Note.** By authorizing a person other than an authorized officer or other employee of the issuer to communicate with the IRS and whom the IRS may contact about this return, the issuer authorizes the IRS to communicate directly with the individual entered on line 3a and consents to disclose the issuer's return information to that individual, as necessary, to process this return.

**Lines 4 and 6.** If you listed an individual on line 3a to communicate with the IRS and whom the IRS may contact about this return, enter the number and street (or P.O. box if mail is not delivered to street address), city, town, or post office, state, and ZIP code of that person. **Line 5.** This line is for IRS use only. Do not make any entries in this box.

**Line 7.** The date of issue is generally the date on which the issuer physically

exchanges the bonds that are part of the issue for the underwriter's (or other purchaser's) funds. For a lease or installment sale, enter the date interest starts to accrue in a MM/DD/YYYY format.

**Line 8.** If there is no name of the issue, please provide other identification of the issue.

**Line 9.** Enter the CUSIP (Committee on Uniform Securities Identification Procedures) number of the bond with the latest maturity. If the issue does not have a CUSIP number, write "None."

**Line 10a.** Enter the name and title of the officer or other employee of the issuer whom the IRS may call for more information. If the issuer wishes to designate a person other than an officer or other employee of the issuer (including a legal representative or paid preparer) whom the IRS may call for more information about the return, enter the name, title, and telephone number of such person on lines 3a and 3b.



Complete lines 10a and 10b even if you complete lines 3a and 3b.

### Part II—Type of Issue



Elections referred to in Part II are made on the original bond documents, not on this form.

Identify the type of obligations issued by entering the corresponding issue price (see *Issue price* under *Definitions* earlier). Attach a schedule listing names and EINs of organizations that are to use proceeds of these obligations, if different from those of the issuer, include a brief summary of the use and indicate whether or not such user is a governmental or nongovernmental entity.

**Line 18.** Enter a description of the issue in the space provided.

**Line 19.** If the obligations are short-term tax anticipation notes or warrants (TANs) or short-term revenue anticipation notes or warrants (RANs), check box 19a. If the obligations are short-term bond anticipation notes (BANs), issued with the expectation that they will be refunded with the proceeds of long-term bonds at some future date, check box 19b. Do not check both boxes.

**Line 20.** Check this box if property other than cash is exchanged for the obligation, for example, acquiring a police car, a fire truck, or telephone equipment through a series of monthly payments. (This type of obligation is sometimes referred to as a "municipal lease.") Also check this box if real property is directly acquired in exchange for an obligation to make periodic payments of interest and principal. **Do not** check this box if the proceeds of the obligation are received in the form of cash, even if the term "lease" is used in the title of the issue.

### Part III—Description of Obligations

**Line 21.** For column (a), the final maturity date is the last date the issuer must redeem the entire issue.

For column (b), see *Issue price* under *Definitions* earlier.

For column (c), the stated redemption price at maturity of the entire issue is the sum of the stated redemption prices at maturity of each bond issued as part of the issue. For a lease or installment sale, write "N/A" in column (c).

For column (d), the weighted average maturity is the sum of the products of the issue price of each maturity and the number of years to maturity (determined separately for each maturity and by taking into account mandatory redemptions), divided by the issue price of the entire issue (from line 21, column (b)). For a lease or installment sale, enter instead the total number of years the lease or installment sale will be outstanding.

For column (e), the yield, as defined in section 148(h), is the discount rate that, when used to compute the present value of all payments of principal and interest to be paid on the obligation, produces an amount equal to the purchase price, including accrued interest. See Regulations section 1.148-4 for specific rules to compute the yield on an issue. If the issue is a variable rate issue, write "VR" as the yield of the issue. For other than variable rate issues, carry the yield out to four decimal places (for example, 5.3125%). If the issue is a lease or installment sale, enter the effective rate of interest being paid.

### Part IV—Uses of Proceeds of Bond Issue

For a lease or installment sale, write "N/A" in the space to the right of the title for Part IV.

**Line 22.** Enter the amount of proceeds that will be used to pay interest from the date the bonds are dated to the date of issue.

**Line 24.** Enter the amount of the proceeds that will be used to pay bond issuance costs, including fees for trustees and bond counsel. If no bond proceeds will be used to pay bond issuance costs, enter zero. Do not leave this line blank.

**Line 25.** Enter the amount of the proceeds that will be used to pay fees for credit enhancement that are taken into account in determining the yield on the issue for purposes of section 148(h) (for example, bond insurance premiums and certain fees for letters of credit).

**Line 26.** Enter the amount of proceeds that will be allocated to such a fund.

**Line 27.** Enter the amount of the proceeds that will be used to pay principal, interest, or call premium on any other issue of bonds within 90 days of the date of issue.

**Line 28.** Enter the amount of the proceeds that will be used to pay

principal, interest, or call premium on any other issue of bonds after 90 days of the date of issue, including proceeds that will be used to fund an escrow account for this purpose.

### Part V—Description of Refunded Bonds

Complete this part only if the bonds are to be used to refund a prior issue of tax-exempt bonds. For a lease or installment sale, write "N/A" in the space to the right of the title for Part V.

**Lines 31 and 32.** The remaining weighted average maturity is determined without regard to the refunding. The weighted average maturity is determined in the same manner as on line 21, column (d).

**Line 34.** If more than a single issue of bonds will be refunded, enter the date of issue of each issue. Enter the date in an MM/DD/YYYY format.

### Part VI—Miscellaneous

**Line 35.** An allocation of volume cap is required if the nonqualified amount for the issue is more than \$15 million but is not more than the amount that would cause the issue to be private activity bonds.

**Line 36.** If any portion of the gross proceeds of the issue is or will be invested in a guaranteed investment contract (GIC), as defined in Regulations section 1.148-1(b), enter the amount of the gross proceeds so invested, as well as the final maturity date of the GIC and the name of the provider of such contract.

**Line 37.** Enter the amount of the proceeds of this issue used to make a loan to another governmental unit, the interest of which is tax-exempt.

**Line 38.** If the issue is a loan of proceeds from another tax-exempt issue, check the box and enter the date of issue, EIN, and name of issuer of the master pool obligation.

**Line 40.** Check this box if the issue is a construction issue and an irrevocable election to pay a penalty in lieu of arbitrage rebate has been made on or before the date the bonds were issued. The penalty is payable with a Form 8038-T for each 6-month period after the date the bonds are issued. Do not make any payment of penalty in lieu of arbitrage rebate with this form. See Rev. Proc. 92-22, 1992-1 C.B. 736 for rules regarding the "election document."

**Line 41a.** Check this box if the issuer has identified a hedge on its books and records according to Regulations sections 1.148-4(h)(2)(viii) and 1.148-4(h)(5) that permit an issuer of tax-exempt bonds to identify a hedge for it to be included in yield calculations for computing arbitrage.

**Line 42.** In determining if the issuer has super-integrated a hedge, apply the rules of Regulations section 1.148-4(h)(4). If the hedge is super-integrated, check the box.

**Line 43.** If the issuer takes a "deliberate action" after the issue date that causes

the conditions of the private business tests or the private loan financing test to be met, then such issue is also an issue of private activity bonds. Regulations section 1.141-2(d)(3) defines a deliberate action as any action taken by the issuer that is within its control regardless of whether there is intent to violate such tests. Regulations section 1.141-12 explains the conditions to taking remedial action that prevent an action that causes an issue to meet the private business tests or private loan financing test from being treated as a deliberate action. Check the box if the issuer has established written procedures to ensure timely remedial action for all nonqualified bonds according to Regulations section 1.141-12 or other remedial actions authorized by the Commissioner under Regulations section 1.141-12(h).

**Line 44.** Check the box if the issuer has established written procedures to monitor compliance with the arbitrage, yield restriction, and rebate requirements of section 148.

**Line 45a.** Check the box if some part of the proceeds was used to reimburse expenditures. Figure and then enter the amount of proceeds that are used to reimburse the issuer for amounts paid for a qualified purpose prior to the issuance of the bonds. See Regulations section 1.150-2.

**Line 45b.** An issuer must adopt an official intent to reimburse itself for preissuance expenditures within 60 days after payment of the original expenditure unless excepted by Regulations section 1.150-2(f). This ESCROW AGREEMENT (the "Escrow Agreement"), dated as of March 1, 2016, and entered into among DE LAGE LANDEN PUBLIC FINANCE LLC, a DE limited liability company ("Lessor"), CENTRAL COMMUNITY UNIT SCHOOL DISTRICT 301, a public body corporate and politic existing under the laws of IL ("Lessee"), and UMB Bank, n.a., a national banking corporation, as escrow agent ("Escrow Agent").

## TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. This Escrow Agreement relates to and is hereby made a part of the State and Local Government Lease-Purchase Agreement dated as of March 1, 2016 (the "Agreement"), between Lessor and Lessee.
2. Except as otherwise defined herein, all terms defined in the Agreement shall have the same meaning for the purposes of this Escrow Agreement as in the Agreement.
3. Lessor, Lessee and Escrow Agent agree that Escrow Agent will act as sole Escrow Agent under the Agreement and this Escrow Agreement, in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in this Escrow Agreement. Escrow Agent shall not be deemed to be a party to the Agreement, and this Escrow Agreement shall be deemed to constitute the entire agreement between Lessor and Lessee and Escrow Agent.
4. There is hereby established in the custody of Escrow Agent a special trust fund designated as set forth above (the "Acquisition Fund") to be held and administered by Escrow Agent in trust for the benefit of Lessor and Lessee in accordance with this Escrow Agreement. Lessee hereby grants to Lessor a security interest in the cash and negotiable instruments from time to time comprising the Acquisition Fund (the "Security Interest"). To the limited extent required to perfect the Security Interest, Lessor hereby appoints Escrow Agent as its security agent, and Escrow Agent accepts the appointment as security agent and agrees to hold physical possession of such cash and negotiable instruments on behalf of Lessor.
5. Lessor shall deposit in the Acquisition Fund the amount specified above. Moneys held by Escrow Agent hereunder shall be invested and reinvested by Escrow Agent upon written direction of an authorized representative of Lessee in Qualified Investments (as hereinafter defined) maturing or subject to redemption at the option of the holder thereof prior to the date on which it is expected that such funds will be needed. Escrow Agent may act as purchaser or agent in the making or disposing of any investment. Escrow Agent shall have no obligation to invest or reinvest moneys if deposited with Escrow Agent after 11:00 a.m. (E.S.T.) on such day of deposit. Instructions received after 11:00 a.m. (E.S.T.) will be treated as if received on the following business day. Escrow Agent shall have no responsibility for any investment losses resulting from the investment, reinvestment or liquidation of funds held in the Acquisition Fund. Any interest or other income received on such investment and reinvestment of such funds shall become part of the Acquisition Fund and any losses incurred on such investment and reinvestment of such funds shall be debited against the Acquisition Fund. If the authorized representative of Lessee does not provide the Escrow Agent with written instructions directing the investment or reinvestment of such funds, the Escrow Agent may invest such funds in money market funds of a type described in Section 6(a)(iv) or Section 6(b)(vi) as appropriate until the Escrow Agent has received appropriate written instructions from the authorized representative. It is agreed and understood that the entity serving as Escrow Agent may earn fees associated with the investments described herein in accordance with the terms of such investments. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Escrow Agent shall have the power to sell or liquidate the foregoing investments whenever Escrow Agent shall be required to pay or disburse all or any portion of the funds held hereunder pursuant to the provisions hereof. In no event shall Escrow Agent be deemed an investment manager or adviser in respect of any selection of investments hereunder.
6. "Qualified Investments" shall be defined for purposes of this Escrow Agreement as follows:
  - (a) For an Agreement **not** qualified for the arbitrage rebate exception for small governmental units under Section 148(f)(4)(C) of the Code, "Qualified Investments" means, to the extent the same are at the time legal for investment of the funds being invested: (i) United States Treasury Bills or United States Treasury Notes traded on an open market or issued directly by the United States at a yield not exceeding 5 % per annum, (ii) United States Treasury Obligations State and Local Government Series time deposit securities with a yield not exceeding 5 % per annum, (iii) obligations the interest of which is not includable in the gross income of the owner thereof for federal income tax purposes under Section 103 of the Code and which are rated AA or better by Standard & Poor's Corporation or Aa or better by Moody's Investors Service, Inc., (iv) shares of qualified regulated investment companies which distribute exempt interest dividends within the meaning of Section 852 of the Code and which are rated AA or better by Standard & Poor's Corporation or Aa or better by Moody's Investors Service, Inc. (tax exempt mutual funds), or (v) United States Treasury Obligations State and Local Government Series demand deposit securities.
  - (b) For an Agreement qualified for the arbitrage rebate exception for small governmental units under Section 148(f)(4)(C) of the Code, "Qualified Investments" means to the extent the same are at the time legal for investment of the funds being invested: (i) direct general obligations of the United States of America; (ii) obligations the timely payment of the principal of and interest on which is fully and unconditionally guaranteed by the United States of America; (iii) general obligations of the agencies and instrumentalities of the United States of America acceptable to Lessor; (iv) certificates of deposit, time deposits or demand deposits with any bank or savings institution including Escrow Agent or any affiliate thereof, provided that such certificates of deposit, time deposits or demand deposits, if not insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, are fully secured by obligations described in (i), (ii) or (iii) above; (v) repurchase agreements with any state or national bank or trust company, including Escrow Agent or any affiliate thereof, that are secured by obligations of the type described in (i), (ii) or (iii) above, provided that such collateral is free and clear of claims of third parties and that Escrow Agent or a third party acting solely as agent for Escrow Agent has possession of such collateral and a perfected first security interest in such collateral; or (vi) shares of money market funds which are registered under the Investment Act of 1940, as amended, and which are rated AAA by Standard & Poor's Corporation or Aaa by Moody's Investors Service, Inc.
7. Moneys in the Acquisition Fund shall be used to pay for the cost of acquisition of the Equipment listed in the Agreement. Payment shall be made from the Acquisition Fund for the cost of acquisition of part or all of said Equipment listed in the Agreement upon presentation to Escrow Agent of one or more properly executed Payment Request and Acceptance Certificates, a form of which is attached as Exhibit A, executed by Lessee and approved for payment by Lessor, together with an invoice for the cost of the acquisition of said Equipment for which payment is requested and a written approval by Lessor of the vendor be paid.
8. The Acquisition Fund shall terminate upon the occurrence of the earlier of (a) the presentation of a proper Payment Request and Acceptance Certificate, with the portion thereof designated "Final Acceptance Certificate", properly executed by Lessee, or (b) the presentation of written notification by Lessor, or, if Lessor shall have assigned its interest under the Agreement, then the assignees or subassignees of all of Lessor's interest under the Agreement or an Agent on their behalf, that a default has occurred or that Lessee has terminated the Agreement pursuant to **Section 5** of the Agreement. Upon termination as described in clause (a) of this paragraph, any amount remaining in the Acquisition Fund shall be used to prepay the principal component of Lease Payments unless Lessor directs that payment of such amount be made in such other manner directed by Lessor that, in the opinion of nationally recognized counsel in the area of tax exempt municipal obligations satisfactory to Lessor, will not adversely affect the exclusion of the interest components of Lease Payments from gross income for federal income tax purposes. If any such amount is used to prepay principal, the Exhibit A of Lease Payments appearing in the

Agreement shall be revised accordingly as specified by Lessor. Upon termination as described in clause (b) of this paragraph, any amount remaining in the Acquisition Fund shall immediately be paid to Lessor or to any assignees or subassignees of Lessor's interest in this Escrow Agreement.

9. Escrow Agent may at any time resign by giving at least 30 days written notice to Lessee and Lessor, but such resignation shall not take effect until the appointment of a successor Escrow Agent. The substitution of another bank or trust company to act as Escrow Agent under this Escrow Agreement may occur by written agreement of Lessor and Lessee. In addition, Escrow Agent may be removed at any time, with or without cause, by an instrument in writing executed by Lessor and Lessee. In the event of any resignation or removal of Escrow Agent, a successor Escrow Agent shall be appointed by an instrument in writing executed by Lessor and Lessee. Such successor Escrow Agent shall indicate its acceptance of such appointment by an instrument in writing delivered to Lessor, Lessee and the predecessor Escrow Agent. Thereupon such successor Escrow Agent shall, without any further act or deed, be fully vested with all the trusts, powers, rights, duties and obligations of Escrow Agent under this Escrow Agreement and the predecessor Escrow Agent shall deliver all moneys and securities held by it under this Escrow Agreement to such successor Escrow Agent.
10. Escrow Agent incurs no liability to make any disbursements pursuant to the Escrow Agreement except from funds held in the Acquisition Fund. Escrow Agent makes no representations or warranties as to the title to any Equipment listed in the Agreement or as to the performance of any obligations of Lessor or Lessee. Escrow Agent may consult legal counsel in the event of any dispute or question as to the construction of any provisions hereof or its duties hereunder, and it shall incur no liability and shall be fully protected in acting in accordance with the opinion or instructions of such counsel. Lessee agrees to indemnify Escrow Agent for, and to hold it harmless against, any loss, liability or expense incurred in connection herewith without gross negligence or willful misconduct on the part of Escrow Agent, including without limitation legal or other fees arising out of or in connection with its entering into this Escrow Agreement and carrying out its duties hereunder, including without limitation the costs and expenses of defending itself against any claim of liability in the premises or any action for interpleader. Escrow Agent shall be under no obligation to institute or defend any action, suit, or legal proceeding in connection herewith, unless first indemnified and held harmless to its satisfaction in accordance with the foregoing, except that Escrow Agent shall not be indemnified against any loss, liability or expense arising out of its own gross negligence or willful misconduct. Such indemnity shall survive the termination or discharge of this Escrow Agreement or resignation of Escrow Agent.
11. This Escrow Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State in which Escrow Agent is located.
12. In the event any provision of this Escrow Agreement shall be held invalid or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not invalidate or render unenforceable any other provision hereof.
13. This Escrow Agreement may not be amended except by a written instrument executed by Lessor, Lessee and Escrow Agent.
14. This Escrow Agreement may be executed in several counterparts, each of which so executed shall be an original. Copies, telecopies, facsimiles, electronic files and other reproductions of original executed documents shall be deemed to be authentic and valid counterparts of such original documents for all purposes, including the filing of any claim, action or suit in the appropriate court of law.
15. Escrow Agent shall be entitled to fees and expenses for its regular services as Escrow Agent as agreed to in writing with the [Lessor/Lessee]. Escrow Agent is entitled to fees for extraordinary services and reimbursement of any out-of-pocket and extraordinary costs and expenses, including, but not limited to, attorneys' fees. Escrow Agent shall have a first lien upon the Acquisition Fund for the purpose of paying its fees and expenses. All of Escrow Agent's compensation, costs and expenses shall be paid by [Lessee/Lessor].
16. The parties hereto agree that, for tax reporting purposes, all interest or other income, if any, attributable to the funds held by Escrow Agent pursuant to this Escrow Agreement shall be allocable to Lessee. Lessor and Lessee agree to provide Escrow Agent completed Forms W-9 and other forms and documents that Escrow Agent may reasonably request (collectively, "Tax Reporting Documentation") at the time of execution of this Escrow Agreement and any information reasonably requested by Escrow Agent to comply with the USA Patriot Act of 2001, as amended from time to time. Additionally, the parties shall complete the Incumbency Certificate attached to this Escrow Agreement and provide it to Escrow Agent upon the execution of this Escrow Agreement. The parties hereto understand that if such Tax Reporting Documentation is not so certified to Escrow Agent, Escrow Agent may be required by the Internal Revenue Code, as it may be amended from time to time, to withhold a portion of any interest or other income earned on the investment of monies or other property held by Escrow Agent pursuant to this Escrow Agreement.

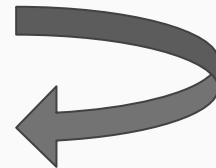
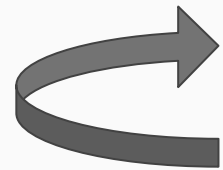

# Communication of Building Closure

- Meetings with See Saw Day Care owner Becky McClure
- Sept. 2015 and Oct. 2015 notified her of the plan to terminate the lease with the intent to demolish building
- Ms. McClure requested that public discussion be delayed until spring to allow her time to look into other facilities

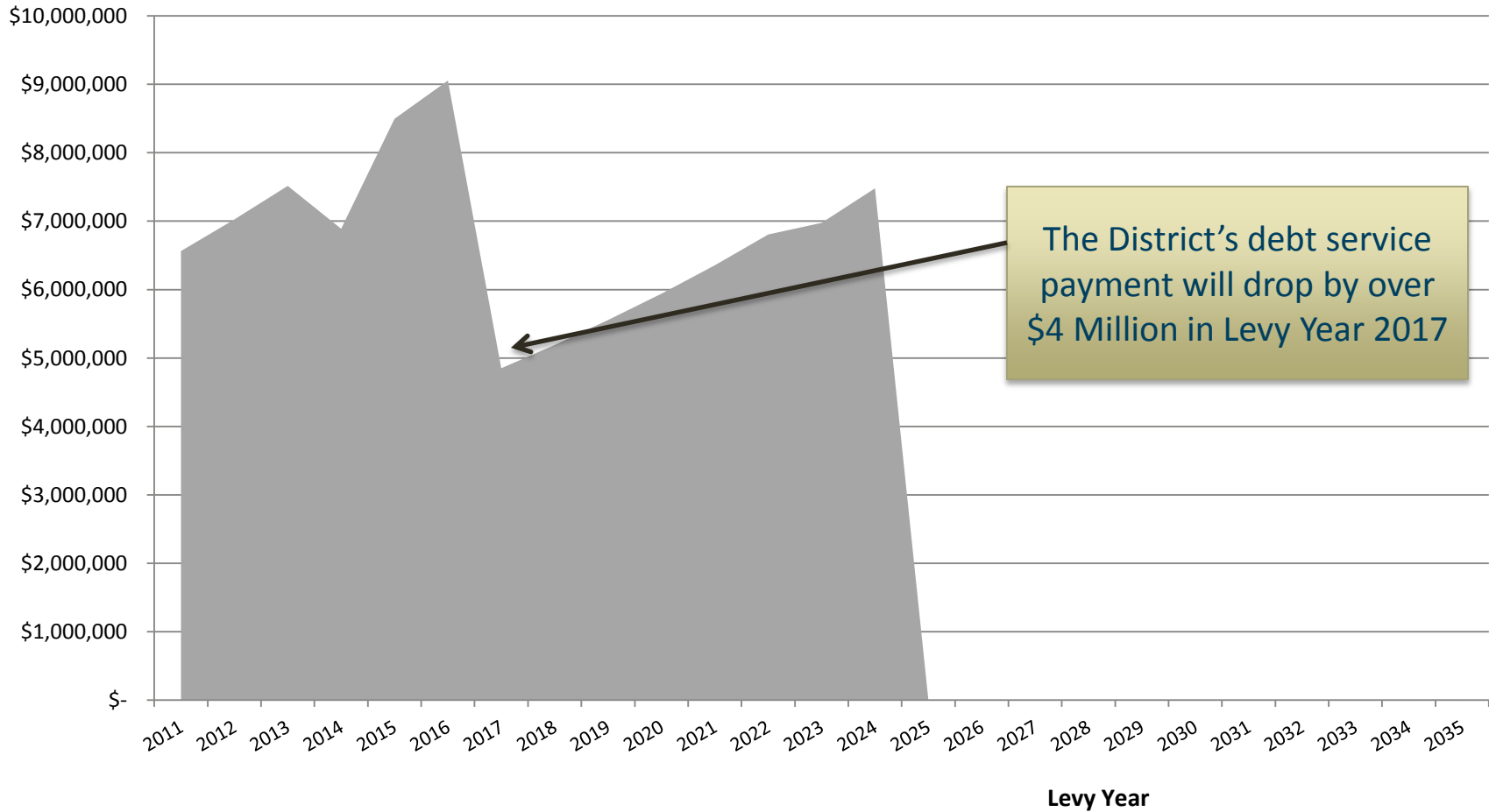

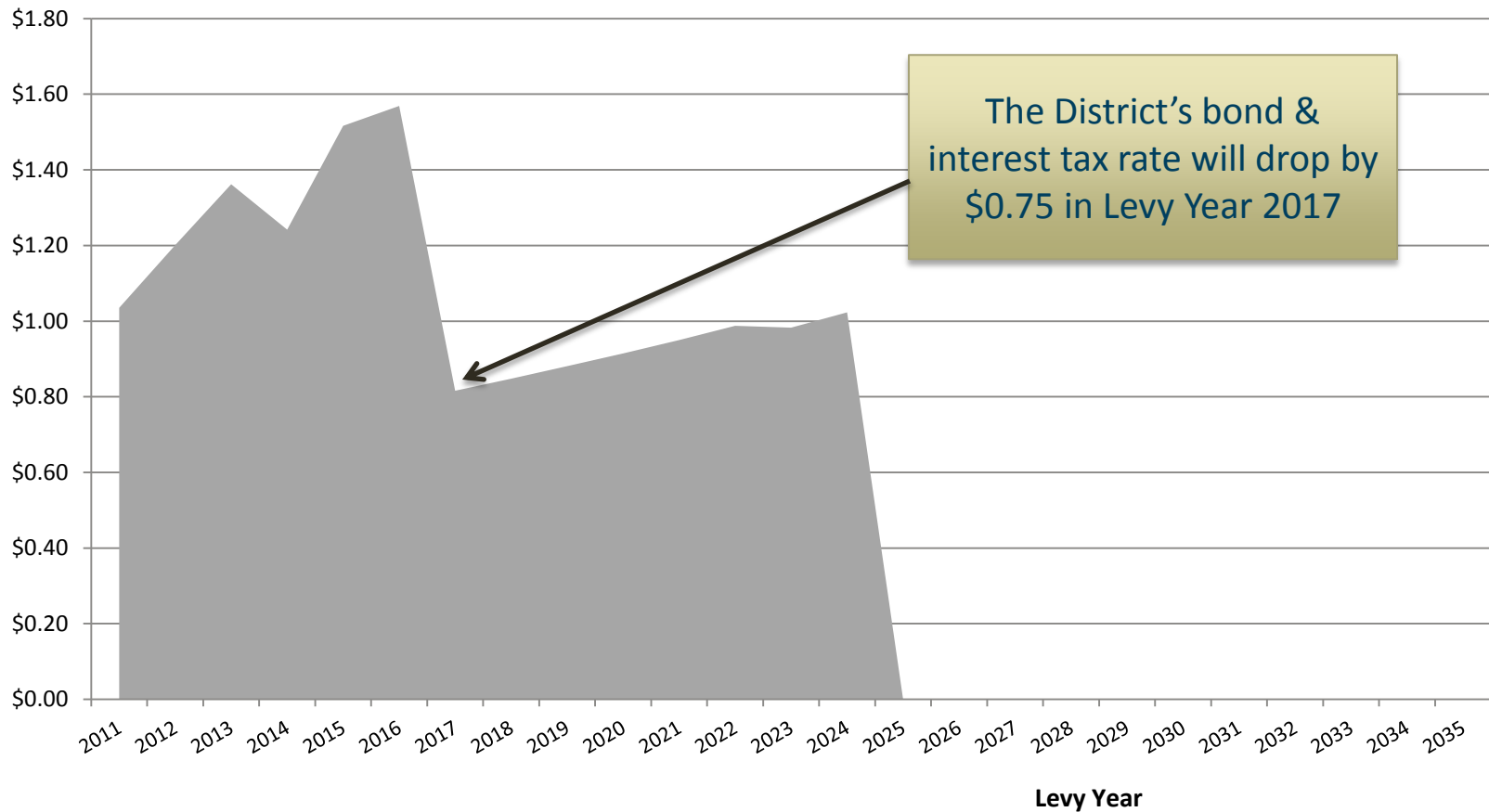

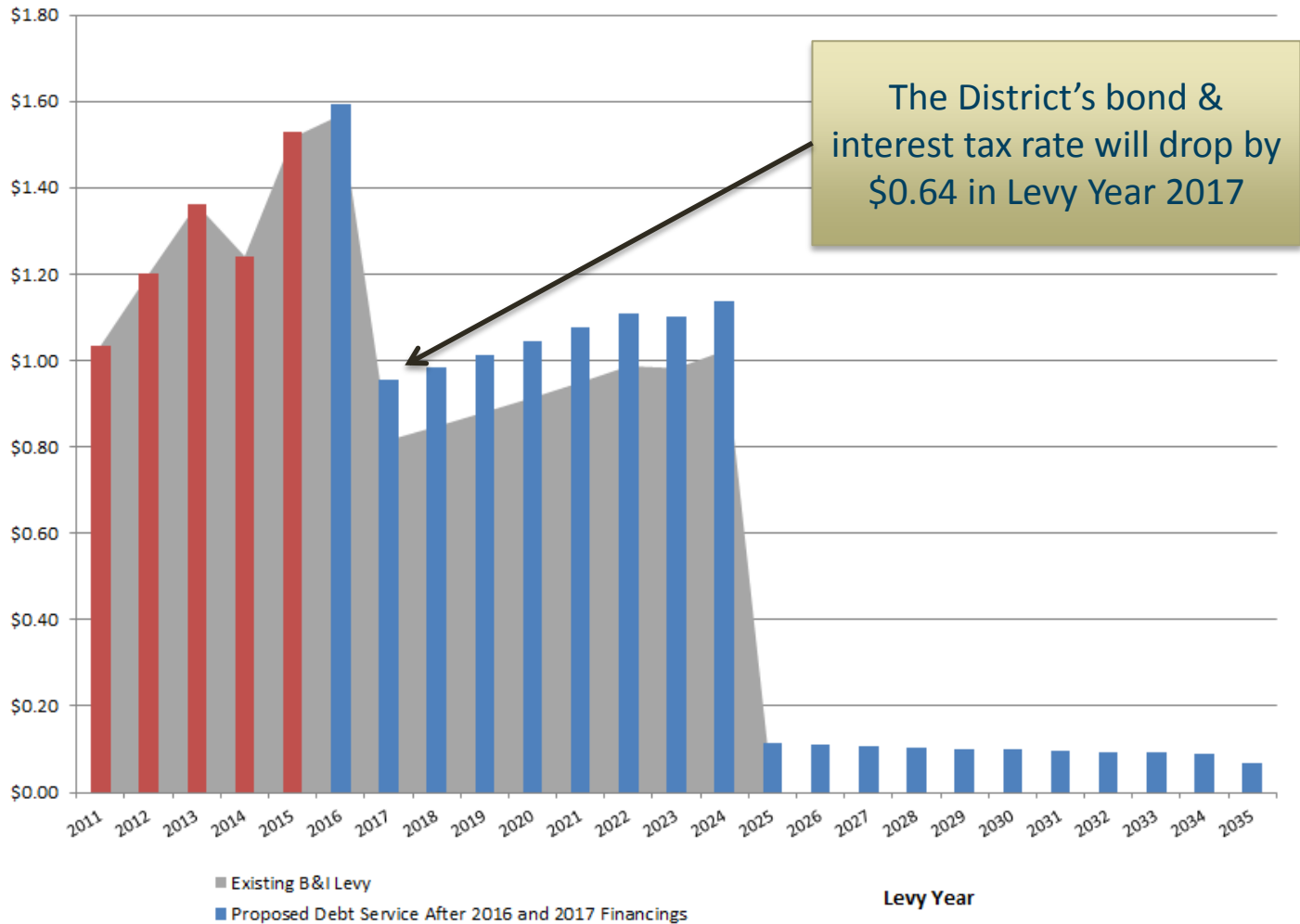

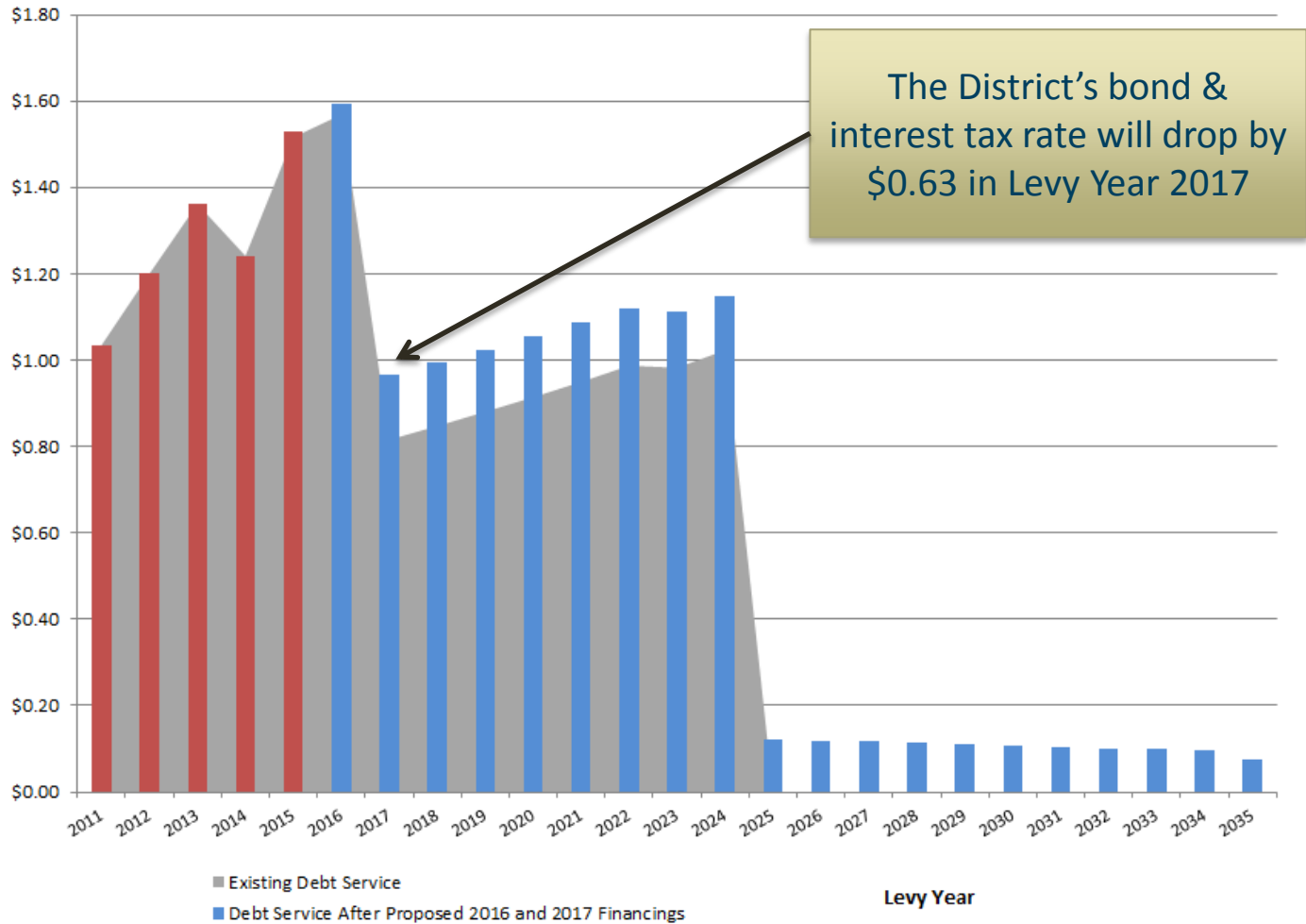

# PROPOSED \$10 MILLION REFERENDUM IN 2016 PROJECTED BOND & INTEREST TAX RATE OVER 20 YEARS

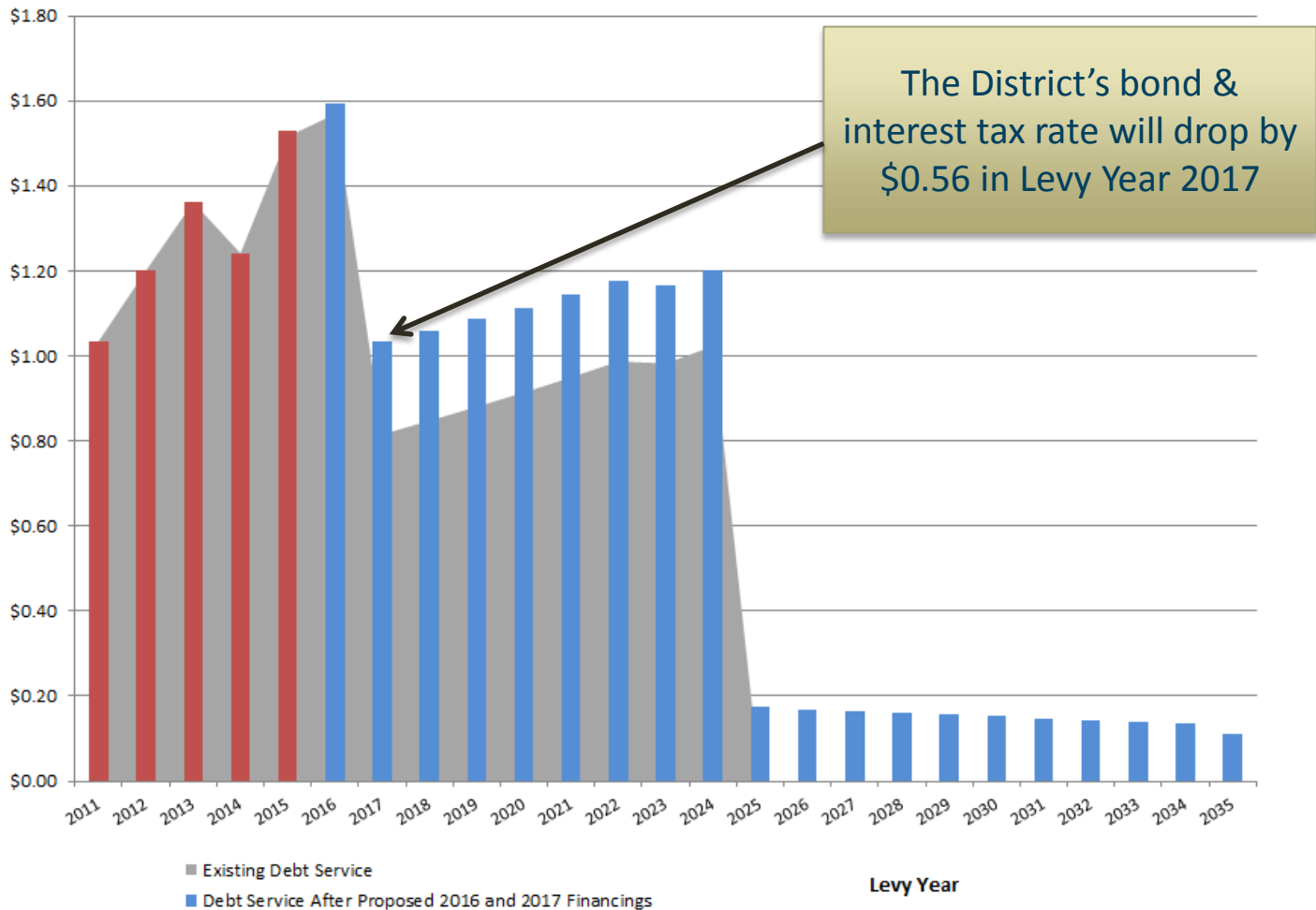
Projected Bond & Interest Tax Rate - \$10.0 Million

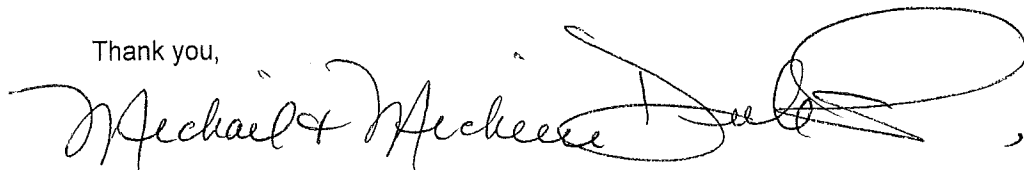
